- Speaker McPike: "Excuse me, Mr. Clerk. Representative

 Matijevich."
- Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, I know that the House is very often noisy and sometimes we are noisy because we have to do our work. Could I have everybody's attention. I often hear many of us Members say that there are some young people in society who have their heads straight. We have got some young people here that have their heads straight. Let's give them our attention, our total attention."
- Speaker McPike: "Mr. Clerk, would you start over, please?"
- Clerk Leone: "Whereas the Members of this Body are pleased and honored to recognize outstanding young citizens throughout

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this state who set an example for their peers; and whereas it has come to the attention that the Dominant Boys, a group from Alton, comprised of seven boys ranging from ages ll to 16, are using their talents to discourage others from using drugs; and whereas the Dominant Boys consist of Brent Robinson, Curtis Faulkner, Cory Faulkner, Chad Alexander, John Brunfield. Alonzo Edwards and Monty Gibson: and whereas through their own experiences, the Dominant Boys have seen the destructiveness of drugs and they courage to speak out against drug abuse; and whereas the Dominant Boys have combined their talents with a message to encourage others not to use drugs by rapping and their message they are able to relate to many people and thus be more effective: whereas Verdene Robinson. the mother two of the Dominant Boys, has encouraged her sons, as well as others, to be examples for their peers and she remained a positive force in their actions: therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives οf the Assembly of the State of Illinois General that congratulate and commend the Dominant Boys for outstanding efforts to discourage the use of drugs and that extend our best wishes to them for continued success in their future endeavors; and be it further resolved that suitable copies of this Preamble and Resolution presented to the Dominant Boys as a formal indication n f our respect and esteem in which they are held by this Body . Speaker McPike: "Representative Matijevich moves for the adoption of the Resolution. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Resolution is adopted. He'd like to congratulate each and every one of these young boys, but so that the House can appreciate the type of work they are doing to discourage the use of drugs in Alton, we

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have allowed them two minutes to give us a presentation of what they call rapping. So, if you guys will just go down front and show the House what you are talking about."

Speaker Greiman: "On the Order of House Bills Second Reading

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 35, a Bill for an Act to amend

Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill.

No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Okay. On page 2 of the Calendar appears a Special Order of Business, Subject Matter - Charitable Games Act, and on that Order of Business, appears House Bill 177. Mr. Clerk, would you read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 177, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Charitable Games Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Greiman: "Ms. Wojcik, the Lady from Cook."

Wojcik: "Yes, Mr... Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House,
what this Bill allows is an additional group of people to
participate in casino legislation, which would be veterans

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and fraternal organizations, which would include Jaycees, Moose, Elks, Kiwanis, Lions and those that would come under the special license of a 501-C4. I move its favorable passage."

- Speaker Greiman: "The Lady from Cook, Ms. Wojcik, moves for the passage of House Bill 177, and on that, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Giglio."
- Giglio: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of I think the House ought to realize what's going on this Bill. Now, last year here with we passed the Charitable Game Act and we had a number of hearings throughout the state. We had a number of people testify and we came up which I thought and a lot of other people thought was a reasonable solution to put forth Las Vegas nights for those people who hold the 501-C3 license which came from the Federal Government. Now, we were going use this and try this for two years and after two years, it would die and i f we wanted to resurrect it, we could do something else. We were only going to allow those had that charitable license, where all the monies derived go to charitable organizations and schools. What are doing with this Bill is to open it up for fraternal organizations, unions, et cetera, to have Las Vegas nights. Now, we had a lot of trouble with the bingo. Singo had become palaces, as you know, and we were very strict with that Bill that we passed two years ago, even to out ìn there that we would only have these Las Vegas nights four times at one place. So, those of you who may not know contents in this Bill, be careful because you are going to open up this Las Vegas nights to a lot more organizations. which a lot of people thought that they wanted to do only for two years with the previous Bill that we passed two years ago."

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Speaker Greiman: "Further discussion? There being none, Ms. Wojcik, to close."

Wojcik: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I have heard the Gentleman on the other side of the aisle, and I would like to point out that I, too, was able to sit in for all the discussions pertinent to casino legislation. At the time that we discussing casino legislation, it was very obvious that the the first casino Bill was for the original intent of fraternals and as we discussed what was going to happen and how it was going to happen, fraternals was eliminated. There was an agreement that at some future time, i. e., right now. we could then come in with an attempt to have fraternals represented. We have big problem with casino nights because the majority of the people represent and most of the people in this House represent are the ones who use casino nights. In my area, it is Catholic have casino night. churches who It is the Lions, it's the Jaycees, it's the Kiwanis. Thev are worthy fraternal group of people. Thev have done justifiable job for many, many years in having casino We are talking about four times a year. niahts. not talking about a parlor. Нe are not talking horrendous gambling. We are talking about charitable evenings four times a year, Ladies and Gentlemen. out to you that most of us in the collar point counties and downstate are not even able tο 1150 the original casino legislation. Therefore, I say that this is going to be for the veterans, it is going to be for the fraternal organizations and it will be for worthy causes, possibly four times a year. There was a casino night held in my area and it was very professionally done. But I have to tell you that after they did it once and all scrutiny they had to go through it was their determination

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that once a year is sufficient. So, I question whether we'll be looking at more than one or two times in the collar areas. You might be looking at four times a year within the City, but I would tell you that from what I experienced probably once would be enough annually. So, I do ask for its favorable passage. It's a good Bill. It's a Bill for the little people and I think we should pass it. Thank you.

Speaker Breslin: "Is there any further discussion? Representative Greiman. The Lady, I believe has closed. Representative Deuchler, for what reason do you rise? Representative Wojcik has closed. You can explain your vote and perhaps ask your question at that time, okay? The question is, 'Shall House Bill 177 pass?' All those in favor vote aye , all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is Representative Greiman, one minute to explain his open. vote."

Greiman: "Thank you. I'm going to vote 'no' on this Bill and I think all of you should think very carefully before your One of the main concerns we had in hand goes to that. drafting this agreement two years ago was a) not to have proliferation of gambling throughout the state, and b) to make sure that organized crime does not find level in our society. This Bill... and I might tell you that before we did this, there were 38 companies in the phone book, when gambling was illegal, that sold and rented gambling equipment. We have a few hundred that licensed now. We will, under this Bill and the three... Bills thereafter have thousands of them licensed. idea was to keep organized crime at a distance to make sure we could monitor it. When you pass this Bill, when write 'yes', you await the next scandal in this community in gambling. You invite it almost because you have

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made it unmanageable, unregulatable kind of arrangement.

And you make a mistake and you will be explaining this vote
in the next few years. Mark my words. Thank you. I vote

- Speaker Breslin: "The Lady from Kane, Representative Deuchler, one minute to explain your vote."
- Deuchler: "Well, I had wanted to ask a question, but just to explain my vote, we had run into a problem with the American Association of University Women who holds one casino night a year, had a 501-C4, did not have a 501-C3 and thus was precluded holding their one fund raiser for women's scholarships. So it really meets a need for the fraternal organizations."
- Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cullerton, one minute to explain your vote."
- Cullerton: "Yes, I just wanted to indicate that I'm voting on the Bill. It's not that, obviously, we want 'present' to not support the veterans in their efforts. as Representative Greiman had stated, we did have long and lengthy negotiations with regard to this Rill. which we only passed. I think, just last year. And it was... the decision was made at that time not to include the veterans organizations and I want to also say that this is not a partisan issue. I feel the same way on any other Bills that have Democratic Sponsors. It's just a matter whether you decide... whether you think this should be I do think that the... I'm not sure if opened up. testified in Committee... I do think that some of the religious organizations who were included in the Act be in favor of this Bill because it would expand them... expand their competition, if you will. so, I think that's also something that should be taken into account."
