Speaker Greiman: "The hour of 12:00 having arrived, the House will be in Session. Members will be at their Chair, those not entitled to the floor will withdraw. The Chaplain for today will be the Reverend William Shereos, Pastor of Hope Evangelical Free Church of Springfield. Reverend Shereos is a guest of Representative Michael Curran. The guests in the gallery may wish to rise and join us in the invocation. Reverend Shereos."

Reverend Shereos: "Let's bow our heads for prayer, please. Almighty God and Eternal Father, we recognized Your sovereign rule over us. We recognize that we are accountable not merely to the constituents of this state, but ultimately and primarily to You, our Creator and Redeemer. You alone are the author of truth, and therefore, we come to You asking for wisdom and guidance. We commit this time to You in Jesus' name. Amen."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Barger, will lead us in the Pledge to the Flag."

Barger: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Greiman: "Roll Call for Attendance. Mr. Matijevich, are there any excused absences on the Democratic side?"

Matijevich: "None today, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Piel, any on the Republican side?"

Piel: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Would the record show that Representative David Harris, Representative Myron Olson and Representative Fred Tuerk are all excused today."

Speaker Greiman: "Let the record so reflect. Mr. Clerk, take the record. One hundred and fourteen Members have answered to the call of the quorum, a quorum is present. Consent

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Mr. Ropp, for what purpose are you seeking recognition?"

Ropp: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like permission to waive the posting rule to post Senate Bill 427 in the Counties

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and Townships Committee, which was ... that Bill was reassigned yesterday, please. Well, I talked to him yesterday, so what?"

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Ropp, we'll call you back on that issue later, to raise that. Ms. Currie, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Currie: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Leave to suspend posting requirements, so that Senate Bill 1258 may be heard today in State Government Administration Committee and posted to Subcommittee tomorrow, June 11th, in the Subcommittee on Equality and Delivery of state services, and leave that Senate Bill 1169, which is posted for the full Committee today, may be posted for that same Subcommittee Hearing tomorrow."

Speaker Greiman: "The Lady asks leave of the House to waive the posting requirements with respect to those Bills. There being no objection, leave to use the Attendance Roll Call is granted, and leave is granted. Representative Farley, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Farley: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. I would also move to suspend the posting rules for Senate Bill 170, Senate Bill 388 and Senate Bill 937 for a Hearing today in Labor and Commerce."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman moves to waive the posting requirements with respect to those Bills. Is there leave to use the Attendance Roll Call? Leave is granted and the posting requirements...Committee on Labor and Commerce as to those Bills is waived. Mr. Farley, could you come to the podium? Mr. Johnson, for what purpose are you seeking recognition?"

Johnson: "Yes, could I have leave to waive the appropriate posting requirements on Senate Bill 582, the Executive Committee, which is in recess. Somehow, the Bill was

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mistakenly not posted. Cleared this with the Chairman and the Spokesman. I think it is an agreed Bill anyway, and I would ask to waive the appropriate posting requirements, so that this can be heard this afternoon."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman asks leave of the House to waive the requirements ... the posting requirements, and on that the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Cullerton."

Cullerton: "I'm sorry. I thought you said, Mr. Speaker, that he does have leave, and I am going to object. I apologize, I thought that you...you already decided the issue."

Speaker Greiman: "No, I merely put the request to the Body, so ..."

Cullerton: "No, I would object, not because of the fine House Sponsor, but because of the fine Senate Sponsor, and the Act that it amends. I would object to that...waiving that posting."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Johnson."

Johnson: "John, I don't understand ... I don't even, frankly, who is the Senate Sponsor? All this is, just so, you know, you can make your decision if you want it. Last year we passed a limited quick take Bill for the University of Illinois. This just simply repeals that. The realtors want it. The University of Illinois wants it. It was a unanimous Bill out of the Senate. There is absolutely no objection anywhere, and somehow the Bill just didn't get posted. That's the total sum and substance of it. I'm promising you, I'm not going to amend it or change it in any way. I don't know anybody who is opposed to this Bill at all. It's just that it's a local matter. The quick take was enacted for the Beckman Institute. All the construction is underway now, and so it's not needed. And everybody agreed that the authority should be repealed, so we don't have it on the books."

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Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Klemm?"

Klemm: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Well, you know, it's...the Bill was inadvertently not posted at the Committee, and it would seem as we have extended this courtesy to every Member of the House who has come before the Executive Committee, and I'm sure before all the Committees. I don't think it's a matter that the Bill is going to pass or not pass. I don't think the merits have been discussed, but I think what Representative Johnson is simply saying is that, you know, it was supposed to be on the call, it did not get placed there inadvertently. I think we sure owe him the courtesy of at least having it there, and I do support his motion."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Johnson, yes, did you wish now ..."

Johnson: "Well, I will move that the appropriate posting requirement be suspended. And I would like to have an opportunity to explain what I am doing and to explain my vote if it's appropriate to do so."

Anonymous: "That's alright."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Johnson, the motion under Rule 20(k), would be out of order, since it is not on the Calendar and would require unanimous consent, otherwise. I don't know if you resolved your issue with Representative Cullerton in putting the motion? Yes, Mr. Johnson."

Johnson: "Believe me, this ... there is nothing partisan about this. I'm just ... I'm just incredulous, that's all. Can I put the motion in writing?"

Speaker Greiman: "Well, you can put the motion in writing, but that's not the defect. The defect is that it would still require ... yes, of course, you can put the motion in. And I would recognize you, but in order to waive the Calendar requirements, you would have to have unanimous consent. I would give you time, Sir, to put the motion in writing,

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certainly. Mr. Cullerton, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Cullerton: "Yes, keeping in mind the old caveat, you can pay me now or you can pay me later. I would remove my objection to the Gentleman's request to suspend posting notice, but I would point out to the Sponsor that I personally am still opposed to the Bill, and I would certainly urge those Members in the Executive Committee to not support the Bill as well. But, I ... we can certainly, as a courtesy to Representative Johnson, allow the posting requirements to be waived."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Johnson. Mr. Cullerton has just announced to the Body that he will remove his objection to posting, and has then admonished us to recall that there are... that the Bill will ... he doesn't remove his objection to the Bill. Do you have a motion you wish to put so now?"

Johnson: "Yes, I would move that the appropriate posting requirements ..."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements with respect to Senate Bill 582, so that the...Bill may be heard in the Executive Committee today. There being no objection, use of the Attendance Roll Call. The posting requirements are waived. On page two of the Calendar, on the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading, Short Debate, appears Senate Bill 124. Out of the Record. On that Order appears Senate Bill 169. Mr. Steczo? Out of the Record. On that Order appears Senate Bill 289. Mr. Keane. Out of the Record. On that Order appears Senate Bill 355. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 355, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

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Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading, Short Debate, appears Senate Bill 377. Mr. Hannig, did you wish to proceed? Mr. Hannig, on 377?"

Hannig: "Yeah."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 377, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Farm Development Act, Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 398. Ms. Jones? 398. You want to take it out of the record? Take it out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 405. Mr. Black, do you wish to proceed? 405. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill. On 405, yes, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 405, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relation to coroners. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 492. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 492, a Bill for an Act to amend the Radiation Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Any motions with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 601. Mr. Levin, do you wish to proceed? 601. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

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Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 601, a Bill for an Act to amend the Carnival and Amusement Ride Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Alright, we'll go back, Mr. Clerk, to Senate Bill 398. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 398, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 595. Out of the Record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 696. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 696, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Excuse me, Mr. Terzich, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Terzich: "Well, I ... I believe I had 684 on Second Reading."

Speaker Greiman: "Yes, you did. And I will go back to it, my eyes skipped it over it, Mr. Terzich. I will go back to it right after this Bill. Any motions with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 684. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 684, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to create sanitary districts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

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Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Mr. McCracken, the Gentleman from DuPage, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We had not yet finished, I think, all of the Bills that Sponsors were seeking a waiver of the posting requirements on. I thought, maybe, we would do that before we went any further on Second Reading. I have had a couple of requests from this side of the aisle, and I was under the impression there were some requests from the other side of the aisle. In particular, I have Senate Bill 427 that has been discussed with both sides of the aisle. We had waited until Representative Van Duyne arrived, because the Bill has been reassigned from Secondary and Elementary Education to Counties and Townships. That reassignment makes impossible the ability to post the Bill for that Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright, the Gentleman from DuPage asks leave to waive the posting requirements with respect to ..."

McCracken: "Senate Bill 427."

Speaker Greiman: "Senate Bill 427. Mr. Van Duyne? Mr. Van Duyne? Mr. Van Duyne, have you had an opportunity to consider that and discuss that with the Sponsor? The waiver of posting requirements with respect to Senate Bill 427. It's Representative Ropp's Bill, Mr. McCracken?"

McCracken: "Yes, it is."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Ropp's Bill."

McCracken: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "Thank you all. The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements with respect to Senate Bill 427. There being no objection, use of the Attendance Roll Call, the posting requirements are waived. On the Order of ... on page three of the Calendar, on the Order of Senate

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Bills, Second Reading, Short Debate, appears Senate Bill 720. Mr. Mautino, do you wish that ... Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 720, a Bill for an Act to amend the Beer Industry Fair Dealing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears House Bill 792. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 792, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Chemical Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Yes, the Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, as you know, one of our colleagues, Representative Olson, is recuperating from surgery, and he has several Bills of which he is the principal Sponsor of. Now under our rules, that presents us some difficulty, because as the principal Sponsor of the Bill, he is the only one that has authority to move the legislation. And with leave of the House, on Senate Bill 1487, we are asking that Representative John Countryman be substituted as the principal Sponsor of Senate Bill 1487, so that he may handle the legislation. We are sure that Representative Olson would not have any difficulty with that, but we are asking if that would be alright with unanimous leave of the House."

Speaker Greiman: "Yes, well ..."

Daniels: "1487 is the Bill."

Speaker Greiman: "Apparently, we have a letter to that effect

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from Senator Barkhausen which designates Representatives
Countryman and O'Connell as the Sponsors."

Daniels: "So, at that ... with leave of the House..."

Speaker Greiman: "With that, leave would..."

Daniels: "...we'll have...the Sponsorship would be Countryman -
O'Connell?"

Speaker Greiman: "That's what the letter indicates."

Daniels: "That's fine. Countryman - O'Connell is fine. Record
will so show."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. McCracken, for what purpose do you seek
recognition?"

McCracken: "Inquiry, Mr. Speaker. I wonder if the Chair has
resolved the scheduling and notice issue raised by the
Aeronautics Committee's Meeting tomorrow. As you can see
from today's Calendar, the Speaker's Resolution is on both
the Rules Committee's Meeting scheduled for tomorrow and the
Aeronautics Committee Meeting for tomorrow. Representative
Daniels' Resolution, which has been on the Calendar for
some time, is not scheduled for Rules Committee tomorrow.
Or it is scheduled for Rules Committee, but it's not posted
for Aeronautics Committee, which meets prior to the Rules
Committee. And we have asked that the Bill be assigned to
that Aeronautics Committee, and that notice and posting
requirements be waived in order that both issues may be
considered by the Committee tomorrow, the last time it will
have an opportunity to act before the deadline."

Speaker Greiman: "Representative Breslin in the Chair."

Speaker Breslin: "On page three on your Calendar, appears House
Bill (sic-Senate Bill) 884 on Second Reading.
Representative Terzich, for what reason do you rise?"

Terzich: "Well, I'm still waiting for 684. I have been bypassed
about three or four times on it. Any particular reason or
..."

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Speaker Breslin: "Representative Terzich, we already moved this Bill to Third Reading."

Terzich: "Okay."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay. So the next Bill is House Bill (sic-Senate Bill) 884. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill. Senate Bill 884."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 884, a Bill for an Act to amend the County Cooperative Extension Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill (sic-Senate Bill) 893, Representative Brunsvold. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 893, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Credit Union Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill (sic-Senate Bill) 915, Representative Piel. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 915, a Bill for an Act to amend the Sales Finance Agency Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 21 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Any motions or Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 993 (sic-Senate Bill 933), Representative Regan. Representative Regan. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 933, a Bill for an Act to amend the Intergovernmental Missing Child Recovery Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

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Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill (sic-Senate Bill) 935, Representative Mays. Is the... Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 935, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Bank Holding Company Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative McCracken. Did you agree, Representative Mays? Do you wish to pass...move this Bill? Representative Mays? Yes. Representative ... on this Bill? Okay. Are there any motions or Amendments, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Representative Daniels, for what reason do you rise?"

Daniels: "Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We have had conversation with the real Speaker, and the real Speaker has agreed, subject to leave of the House, that House Joint Resolution 71, which is presently been assigned to Rules Committee, with leave of the House, be reassigned from Rules to the Aeronautics Committee for tomorrow, and that subject to leave of the House, that posting requirements be waived, and House Joint Resolution 71 be posted for hearing in the Aeronautics Committee tomorrow at noon."

Speaker Breslin: "You have heard the Gentleman's motion and on that motion, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I fully agree with Minority Leader Daniels. I would hope that that was an inadvertence in not posting House Joint Resolution 71 for the Aeronautics

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Committee. It was posted for the Rules Committee, it should also be posted for the Aeronautics Committee, and I support the Gentleman in his motion."

Speaker Breslin: "And it's House Joint Resolution 71, is that correct? Representative Leverenz, for what reason do you rise?"

Leverenz: "Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would ask leave to suspend the appropriate rule to hear Senate Bill 323 in the Appropriations I Committee tomorrow. It has been cleared on the Republican side with Representative Mays. They are nodding their heads."

Speaker Breslin: "You have heard the Gentleman's motion, is there any objection? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall the House allow leave for this transfer and this posting?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Gentleman has leave. The Gentleman from DeKalb, Representative Countryman, for what reason do you rise?"

Countryman: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. I would ask leave of the Body to waive the posting requirement for Senate Bill 1487 in the Judiciary II Committee at eight o'clock tomorrow morning. This is a Bill in which the... Representative Olson had the Sponsorship and it's kind of lost astray. I have cleared it with Representative O'Connell and Representative Cullerton to waive the posting requirement."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Countryman has asked leave to suspend the posting rules on Senate Bill 1487 so that it can be heard in the Judiciary II Committee tomorrow. Is there any objection? Hearing no objection, the Gentleman has leave. Representative Leverenz? Representative Leverenz?"

Leverenz: "I... just to make an announcement that the Appropriations I Committee will meet at the hour of 9:00

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a.m. instead of 8:00."

Speaker Breslin: "Very good. McCracken: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the

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House. The Gentleman's Bill, in effect, sets up a means and a procedural format for the authorization of police ordered tows by private tow operators. My amendment would require that the towing company reimburse the vehicle owner for towing charges where the police ordered tow, is determined to be unauthorized. Now this determination would be made by a tow hearing officer, which is currently provided for in the Bill itself. This provides for reimbursement of the towing charges to the towing company by the law enforcement agency or corporate authorities ordering the tow. So, what this provides for is a method of recourse, expedited, which will allow a person whose car has been illegally towed, to recover from the towing company, instead of the public body, which can be a long, time-consuming process. And, in turn, the towing company, if it has been required to reimburse for an illegal tow, can turn and have its recourse against the entity which authorized the tow. This is different from the current provision where it is currently a burden on the person whose car is towed."

Speaker Breslin: "Excuse me, Representative McCracken. The Sponsor has requested that this Bill be taken out of the record. So the Bill will be taken out of the record. Senate Bill 91, Representative Shaw. Representative Shaw? Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 91, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

They were honored last week by Mayor Washington in the City Council Chambers. We have a resolution today, which I would move for its adoption of House Resolution 515. They are led in their fight for the quest for the State Championship tomorrow morning at 9:30 against Springfield, and Representative Curran and I are going to sit down and make a little wager on that one. And I would like to now introduce to you their coach, Tom Haas, who is a former colleague of mine down at SIU."

Tom Haas: "As Coach of Chicago Vocational High School, we are very pleased to be here, and we thank you for the invitation. And we are having a lot of fun in Springfield, and we certainly appreciate this honor that you are bestowing upon us today. Thank you, very much."

Panayotovich: "Thank you, Ladies and Gentlemen. Good Luck and give Springfield hell tomorrow, guys. Thank you."

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Tom Haas: "Oh, one more thing, Sam. We just happen to have a triple extra large for Sam, CVS Baseball Team. All the way fellas, tomorrow."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall the Resolution be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

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what would be a theft detection device, removal device, so that it wouldn't be such a thing as a pair of pliers or a screwdriver. It would be the item that is specifically used to remove these devices by the merchant. This Bill or this section of the Bill amends the Retail Theft Act which provides for detention, and we wouldn't want to have a detention where somebody walked into the store inadvertently with a pair of pliers, and I therefore move its adoption."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 260, and on that question is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor, say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. With leave of the Body, I would like to go back to Senate Bill 218 for Representative Cullerton. Clerk, read the Bill."

Giorgi: "Madam Speaker, for the purpose of another announcement. The second load of Illinois Federation of Teachers box lunches full of chicken and goodies is in the east wall...hall, and I would appreciate it if the rest of you Members that didn't get some, go out and get some box lunches on the east wall."

Speaker Breslin: "Thank you."

Giorgi: "... Illinois Federation of Teachers."

Speaker Breslin: "Ladies and Gentlemen, we are going to the Order of Senate Bills, Third Reading, Short Debate Calendar. It appears on page two on your Calendar. The first Bill is Senate Bill 159, Representative Levin. Clerk, read the Bill."

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Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 159, a Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts relating to the Department of Central Management Services. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Levin."

Levin: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 159 is a Bill that comes out of the Governor's Cost Containment Task Force. And what it simply does is to authorize computer analysis as to building space that is leased by the state with respect to weather efficiency and so on. They currently do this for buildings they own, and this is authority to do it for buildings that are leased to do computer simulations to determine the most efficient pattern in terms of heating and cooling."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of Senate Bill 159, and on that question is there any discussion? The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "He will."

McCracken: "Representative, all this does is to establish or allow E & R to establish a computerized system of reporting the energy consumption?"

Levin: "That is correct."

McCracken: "And now, I think it's E & R's position that it's difficult to affect the savings when all they do is collect data. Is there some other process covered by other law or regulation which will seek to affect this savings?"

Levin: "Representative, I think the same process is done. It's part of a more complete process. It's done now to buildings that are owned by the state. And, I know I initially got interested in this because I was at the National Conference of State Legislators last summer, and they ... one of their panels was on how you save money in

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terms of buildings, this type of thing. So, I think it's part of a broader analysis that is done. It came from the Governor's Cost Containment Task Force, and, you know, it's another tool to save money for the State of Illinois."

McCracken: "Alright, so apparently CMS would take part in this, and ultimately we would hope to realize the savings of state funds, right?"

Levin: "Yes."

McCracken: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall Senate Bill 159 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 114 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 301, Representative Novak. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 301, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Low-Level Radioactive Waste Management Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Novak."

Novak: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Members of the General Assembly. Senate Bill 301 provides for Low-Level Radioactive Waste Management Act. It requires the Director during the sight selection process to give notice of consideration as a possible sight or as an alternative location for a permanent disposal facility to counties, cities, villages and incorporated towns within a 25 mile radius, and to Members of the General Assembly whose districts fall within the 25 mile an hour radius. This Bill basically was put together in the Senate, because of the Shannahon Facility in southern Will County. A low-level nuclear waste plant was going to go in there

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without giving any local officials advice, nor the Department of Nuclear Safety. This bill is sponsored and supported by the Department of Nuclear Safety, and I urge its adoption. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of Senate Bill 301, and on that question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the Chair has a question. Is this your first Bill, Representative?"

Levin: "It certainly is."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall Senate Bill 301 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 114 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Wolf, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Wolf: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, for purposes of an announcement. The Pensions Committee will meet at four o'clock today in Room D-1."

Speaker Breslin: "Thank you. Pensions at four o'clock today in D-1. Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 513, offered by Representative DeLeo; 514, Satterthwaite; 518, Matijevich et al; and House Joint Resolution 95, offered by Representative Bugielski."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevich is recognized on the Agreed Resolutions."

Matijevich: "Madam Speaker, we have examined all of the Resolutions, and they are the congratulatory type, and I move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevich has moved the

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adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Ladies and Gentlemen, we are not about to adjourn, but we are just doing some housekeeping matters. We'll now go to the General Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 517, offered by Representative Rea; House Joint Resolution 94, Madigan and Stern; House Joint Resolution 96, Hoffman."

Speaker Breslin: "Committee on Assignments. Death Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 516, offered by Representative Krska, with respect to the memory of Lorraine H. Pleshar; and House Joint Resolution 93, offered by Representative Madigan and McGann, with respect to the memory of Stanley P. Balzekas, Sr."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevec moves the adoption of the Death Resolutions. All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Death Resolutions are adopted. Representative McCracken, for what reason do you rise? We are not preparing to adjourn. For what reason do you rise?"

McCracken: "Well, immediately upon adjournment, we will be holding a Republican Conference in 118, it will be about a half hour long."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative McCracken has requested a Republican Conference immediately upon adjournment. We are not preparing to adjourn. But as soon as we do adjourn, all Republican Members should go to the Republican Conference. Representative Matijevec in the Chair."

Representative Ronan, Chairman of the Committee on Transportation & Motor Vehicles, to which the following Bills were referred, action taken June 9, 1987, reported the same back with the following recommendations: 'do pass' Senate Bills 551 and 855; 'do pass as amended' Senate Bills 266, 1181, and 1447; 'do pass Consent Calendar' Senate Bills 132, 259, and 411; 'do pass as amended Consent Calendar' Senate Bills 496 and 832; 'do pass Short Debate Calendar' Senate Bill 1417; 'be adopted' House Resolution 235; 'tabled in Committee' House Resolution 237; 'Interim Study Calendar' Senate Bill 375."

Speaker Matijevich: "Before we ... we have some business we are going to attend to. Before we do that, standing next to me, is Chuck Seeds, who is with the Abbott Laboratory, which is in my ... Abbott Laboratory, which is in my home town. A few weeks ago by a Joint Resolution, the Legislature proclaimed today as Illinois Pharmaceutical Day. And in the gallery, and we have got to do this now, because we have got some business, but there are 100 representatives ... Could I have your attention, please. There are 100 representatives of the pharmaceutical industry in Illinois, who are in attendance today. Because of the crowd outside, many of them haven't been able to come here, they're up in the gallery. And the pharmaceutical industry employs more than 15,000 people throughout Illinois, operating more than 20 production and

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distribution facilities. These companies are Abbott Laboratories, Armour Pharmaceutical Company, G.D. Seril & Company, Fiser Incorporated, Hoffman-Larose Company, Johnson & Johnson, Eli Lilly, E.R. Squibb, Letterly Labs, a Division of American ... In the 20th century, these ... great strides have been made by the research based pharmaceutical industry. This industry is working closely with government, and will continue to greatly improve the quality of our lives. The \$37 billion dollar research invested over the past four decades, has provided a myriad of benefits. I want to, in behalf of all of the legislators, say to all of the pharmaceutical industry, and the representatives up in the gallery, that we extend our best wishes, not only today, Illinois Pharmaceutical Day, but we also pledge our support, our continued support, so that the pharmaceutical industry is viable and is an important part of our Illinois economy. We also want to say thank you for the fact that tonight you are holding a reception in our honor at the Hilton Hotel. God Bless all of you and have a happy day."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Breslin in the Chair. Representative Daniels, for what reason do you rise?"

Daniels: "I would like to ask the Ladies and Gentlemen in the gallery, if those people from G.D. Seril could raise their hands. Anyone up there from Seril?"

Speaker Breslin: "Everybody from Seril, raise their hands."

Daniels: "Now, the Lady...the Lady that's raising her hand from Seril is very happy today, and she may not know how happy she is, because this afternoon the Supreme Court filed its opinion in the G.D. Seril case, which basically covered a 1977 law, which says any business which files a consolidated federal income tax form with other affiliated businesses, but a separate Illinois tax return, cannot

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carry back operating losses. The law says such corporations can only carry their losses forward. That was a 1977 law. G.D. Seril filed a suit challenging that law. Today the Supreme Court overturned that law. The net effect to Seril, the net effect to the State of Illinois. Seril gains \$50 million dollars, the State of Illinois loses \$50 million dollars. So to you, we congratulate, to the rest of us we ... "

Speaker Breslin: "Ladies and Gentlemen, the next Order of Business is House Bills ... Appears as House Bills, Second Reading. Page two on your Calendar, House Bill 144. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 144, a Bill for an Act to amend sections of the Illinois Lottery Law. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1, 2, 3 and 4 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #5, offered by Representative Churchill."

Speaker Breslin: "Number 5 or number 6?"

Churchill: "Leave to withdraw Amendment #5, please."

Speaker Breslin: "Withdraw #5. Are there any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #6, offered by Representative Kubik and Stephens."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Kubik and Stephens. Withdraw #6. Are there any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #7, offered by Representative Turner and Davis."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Turner. Withdraw... Withdraw #7. Any further amendments?"

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Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #8, offered by Representative McCracken and Kubik."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative McCracken withdraws the Amendment. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #9, offered by Representative Turner."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Turner. Withdraw the Amendment. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #10, offered by Representative Turner."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Turner. Withdraw #10. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #11, offered by Representative Turner."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Turner. Withdraw #11. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #12, offered by Representative Churchill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Churchill. Representative Churchill is recognized."

Churchill: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. I have Amendments #12 through #19, and I would ask for a leave to withdraw all of those at this time."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Churchill withdraws Amendments #12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19. Are there any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #20, offered by Representative Stephens and McCracken."

Speaker Breslin: "Representatives Stephens and McCracken withdraw the Amendment. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #21, offered by Representative Churchill and Kubik."

Speaker Breslin: "Withdraw #21. Are there any further

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Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #22, offered by Representative Mays."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Mays withdraws the Amendment. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #23, offered by Representative Davis."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Davis, on Amendment #23."

Davis: "Madam Speaker, and Members of the House, Amendment #23 has itself become the Bill, and what it does, it mandates, the Board shall establish advertising policy to insure that the advertising content and practices do not target or exploit specific groups or economic classes of people, and that its content is accurate and not misleading. The Amendment also asks that the Board review, at least quarterly, all past advertising and proposed concepts for major media campaigns, to insure that they comply with the policy. And if the Board finds that such advertising conflicts with their policy, it will have the authority to direct the lottery to cease such advertising. The second part of this Amendment asks that the Department make an effort to more directly inform the players of the lottery, of the odds of winning prizes. And this effort shall include at a minimum, the Department requiring that the ticket agents display a play card stating the odds of winning for each game offered by that agent, and may I add that this is an agreed Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "The Lady has moved for the adoption of Amendment #23 to House Bill 144, and on that question the Gentleman from Lake, Representative Churchill."

Churchill: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, will the Lady yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "She will."

Churchill: "Representative Davis, I think it's important since we

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have done a lot of work to negotiate this Bill, that we read into the record some questions and answers that would cover the intent of the Bill. Is it your intent with this legislation that the Lottery Control Board review every piece of advertising produced for the lottery?"

Davis: "No, Representative Churchill. No."

Churchill: "Is it your intent, whatsoever, that the Control Board play a part in the creative process, involved with producing advertising, such as picking music, casting, colors, etc."

Davis: "No, Sir, it doesn't."

Churchill: "Is it your basic intent to insure that no advertising is targeted or aimed at a particular minority group?"

Davis: "Yes, Sir. That is my intent."

Churchill: "Okay, thank you. To the Bill, this is a Bill that has gone through quite a few negotiations. We have been working on it, as everybody knows, the House Bill deadlines were extended to let this Bill go through so that we could come up with a product that everybody agreed to. At this point it is in the stature of being an agreed Bill. I say that we should support this Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman from Fulton, Representative Homer, on the Amendment."

Homer: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, it appears that there is a mix up in communications here. Amendment 24 deletes everything after the enacting clause, and I think puts in the agreed terms of the Bill, including the provisions that are in Amendment #23, that Representative Davis is testifying to. So I would suggest to her, that perhaps she would want to withdraw Amendment #23 and join in the support of 24, which incorporates the provisions of 23. In other words, the adoption of 24 is going to delete 23 anyway."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Davis?"

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Davis: "Madam Speaker, we will withdraw #23 and accept Amendment #24."

Speaker Breslin: "Withdraw #23. Are there any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #24, offered by Representative Mays and Giorgi."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Mays."

Mays: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. As Representative Homer pointed out on the previous Amendment, Amendment #24 incorporates all of the agreed to language and I think we ought to incorporate all of the intent language that Representative Churchill and Representative Davis agreed to also on that. Further, it actually sets up the Multi-State Lottery, and it does some other housecleaning things, like establish the fiduciary relationship with the agent. And I would move its adoption."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #24 to House Bill 144, and on that question is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is 'Shall Amendment #24 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no', in the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is 'adopted'. Are there any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #25, offered by Representative Churchill and Kubik."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Churchill."

Churchill: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Floor Amendment #25 just reiterates the fact that all of the net revenues from that lottery should be transferred into the Common School Fund."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #25 to House Bill 144, and on that question is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #25 be adopted?' All those in favor say

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'aye', all those opposed say 'no', in the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Representative Davis, on the Bill. Read the Bill on Third. Excuse me, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 144, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Lottery Law, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Davis, on the Bill as amended."

Davis: "Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the General Assembly, I think we should all give this vote our support ... give this Bill our support, in order to increase the revenue in the State of Illinois, and also to make sure there is fair advertising in the lottery and inform players as to the odds of winning."

Speaker Breslin: "The Lady has moved for the passage of House Bill 144, and on that question is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 144 ... Representative Mulcahey is recognized on the Bill.'"

Mulcahey: "Madam Speaker, just to clarify once again this ... regarding the proceeds from the Illinois State Lottery, they still go to the Common School Fund, is that correct?"

Speaker Breslin: "That's a question of Representative Davis."

Davis: "That is correct, Representative Mulcahey, 100% of the multi-state lottery funds will be going to the Common School Fund."

Mulcahey: "How about the Illinois state lottery funds, they will also go to the Common School Fund?"

Davis: "This bill does not change the current spending of the current lottery."

Mulcahey: "Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Churchill, on the Bill."

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Churchill: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, will the Lady yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "She will."

Churchill: "Representative Davis, a few moments ago we went through some items of specific intent for this Bill. I would ask you at this time if it is still your intent to do the things that we had discussed at that time, and if the language that we placed in the records still is in the record for this Bill?"

Davis: "That is correct. The answers that I gave previously, still remain the same."

Churchill: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, the question is 'Shall House Bill 144 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no', voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Representative Currie, for what reason do you rise? Representative Currie's switch is locked. The Lady wishes to be recorded as voting 'aye'. Mr. Clerk, can you do that manually, please. Mr. Clerk ... Mr. Clerk, I noticed that my switch is not recorded, although I have pressed the 'no' button. Who am I voting for, if not for myself? I wish to be recorded as voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 105 voting 'aye', 8 voting 'no' and one voting 'present'. And this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared 'passed'. To correct the record, Representative Currie does wish to be recorded as voting 'no', as she is recorded. Representative Daniels, for what reason do you rise?"

Daniels: "To remind the Republican Members that immediately after adjournment we will have a Republican conference in Room 118."

Speaker Breslin: "Very good. And it will be 30 minutes,

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Representative Daniels? That will be a 30 minute conference, so all Members should be notified that the Republicans will be in conference for 30 minutes, and thus, Committees will be delayed for 30 minutes. Representative Mays, for what reason do you rise?"

Mays: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. As Chief Sponsor of Senate Bill 907, I would ask leave of the Body to place this Bill in Interim Study."

Speaker Breslin: "Give me the Bill number again."

Mays: "Senate Bill 907."

Speaker Breslin: "Senate Bill 907, Representative Mays asks that the Bill be put into Interim Study. Is there any objection? Hearing none, the Bill will be placed in Interim Study. Ladies and Gentlemen, we are preparing to adjourn. Please remember that the Republican conference is on for 30 minutes, and Committee Chairs should not begin their Committee meetings until 2:35, allowing 30 minutes for the Republicans to confer. Representative Cullerton now moves that the House stand adjourned until 2:00 p.m. tomorrow. That is 2:00 p.m. tomorrow. All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no', in the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and this House stands adjourned until 2:00 p.m. tomorrow afternoon."

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
