June 11, 1987

Speaker Greiman: "The hour of 2:00 having arrived, the House will be in Session. Members will be at their chair. Those not entitled to the floor will please withdraw. The Chaplain for today will be the Reverend Jack Hembree, Pastor of Pawnee Assembly of God. Reverend Hembree is the guest of Representative Karen Hasara. The guests in the gallery may wish to join us by rising for the Invocation. Reverend."

Reverend Hembree: "Let us pray. Father, we pause to thank You on this occasion for Your direction, Your strength that You give to each one of us. We pray, Father, today that You would be with us, that You would give clarity of thought, mind and purpose in all things that are done. I pray, Father, today that You would bring strength, courage and health to everyone that is here, that they would feel Your presence and Your touch in their lives. I also pray, Father, that You would bring us all together in Your unity and in Your love and in Your purpose, and we pray this in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Tazewell, Mr. Ackerman, to lead us in the Pledge to the Flag."

Ackerman, et al: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Greiman: "Roll Call for Attendance. Mr. Matijevich, are there any excused absences on the Democratic side?"

Matijevich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Let the record reflect the excused absence on official business of both Representative Granberg and Representative Turner."

Speaker Greiman: "Let the record so reflect. Mr. Piel, on the Republican side?"

Piel: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Would the record show that

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Representative Gordon Ropp, Representative David Harris, excuse me, Representative Myron Olson and Representative Fred Tuerk are excused today. I would also like to add, Mr. Speaker. I would ask that Members of the House keep David Harris and his family, who are going through some grave times right now, in their prayers. Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Piel. Mr. Clerk, take the record. 112 Members having answered the Call of the quorum, a quorum is present. Ms. Masara, for what purpose to you seek recognition."

Hasara: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With due respect to Representative Panayotovich, and those who are very excited about Chicago Vocational School that was down here today, I would like to announce that Griffin Springfield, the alma mater of three of my own sons, beat that school this morning in baseball with a whopping score 14-1. So... those of us from downstate certainly congratulate Griffin. Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Mr. Speaker, I think the entire Membership ought to know, also, that the coach of that Springfield baseball team is our own staff person, Joe Handly."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright, Mr. Hartke, the Gentleman from Effingham."

Hartke: "I... I just got a note here, it was on Sam's desk, since he's not here, it says, 'Dear Sam. Griffin just got lucky.' I don't know what that means, but... "

Speaker Greiman: "Consent Calendar Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Consent Calendar, Third Reading Second Day... "

Speaker Greiman: "Yes. Excuse me, Mr. Clerk, I just wanted to explain to the Body that at this time we are going to read the Consent Calendar for a Third Time and we will consider the vote later on so there... in the afternoon. So there

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will be some time for you to... to register objection to these and have the Bills removed from the Consent Calendar. And on that, Mr. Clerk, Consent Calendar Third Reading."

Speaker Greiman: "On page 4 of the Calendar, on the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading Short Debate, appears Senate Bill 124. Mr. Homer, did you wish to proceed? Out of the record. On that Order appears Senate Bill 169. Mr. Steczo. Out of the record. On that Order appears Senate Bill 289. Mr. Keane. Out of the record. On that Order of business appears Senate Bill 695. Mr. Preston. Mr. Clerk,

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read the Bill. Mr. Steczo, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Could we go back to Senate Bill 169 and move that, please?"

Speaker Greiman: "Yes. As soon as we finish Senate Bill 695."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 695, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. And now backing up. Read Senate Bill 169, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 169, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. I am advised that the next Bill, 908, is on the Consent Calendar. Next Bill... the Gentleman is not in the chamber... the next Bill, 955, Mr. Preston? 955? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 955, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 01 as adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Motions with respect to Amendment 01?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill... yes, Mr. Keane, for what purpose are you seeking recognition?"

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Keane: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wasn't at my desk when 289 was called..."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright. With leave of the House, we'll return to Senate Bill 289. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 289, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 31 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Motions with respect to Amendment 31?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 959. Mr. Capparelli, do you wish to proceed? There's a fiscal note been requested. Out of the record. On this Order appears House (sic - Senate) Bill 960. Out of the record. And on this Order appears House Bill 990, I'm sorry, Senate Bill 998. Mr. Hautino, did you wish to proceed on that? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 998, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Liquor Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears... yes, Mr. Homer. For what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Homer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I was the lead-off hitter here, and at the appropriate time I'd like leave to return to 124."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright. We can do that at this time. Leave to return to Senate Bill 124. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 124, a Bill for an Act to amend

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Sections of the Code of Criminal Procedure and the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 01 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Motions with respect to that Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 1040. Mr. Barger, do you wish us to proceed with that? Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 1046. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1046, a Bill for an Act in relation to rental-purchase agreements. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 1290. Out of the record. On this Order appears... On this Order appears Senate Bill 1296. Ms. Didrickson, did you wish to proceed with that Bill? Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 1302. Mr. McCracken, do you wish to proceed? 1302. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1302, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the coroners... in relation to coroner's inquests, amending certain Acts herein named. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 1322. Ms. Wojcik, do you wish to proceed? Alright, 1322 is out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 1353, Mr. Preston? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

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Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1353, a Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts in relation to programs and procedures of the Department of Children and Family Services. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments 01, 2 and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Motions with respect to those Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 04, offered by Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I offer Amendment 04, same as House Bill 883, which passed out of Committee and got caught in the crunch. The Bill deals with licensing of child care facilities. This Amendment provides that the Department may have the... has the power to promulgate rules regarding the presence of firearms on the premises of day care centers in homes. This issue has been debated before, so I believe everyone is familiar with it. The language of this Amendment was worked out in conjunction with staff on the other side of the aisle in accordance with concerns raised by one of the Republican Members in Committee. So I'm pleased to offer Amendment 04."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bowman, moves for the adoption of Amendment 04 to House Bill, to Senate Bill 1353, and on that the Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Tate."

Tate: "Thank you, Madam Speaker... no, Mr. Speaker, excuse me, I can't see anymore, either... Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this Amendment. This Amendment has been debated before. This chamber has rejected this Amendment before. This is a very impractical approach. The Gentleman accepts the fact that handguns are okay as



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long as you tear apart the handgun and disassemble the gun and you don't have ammunition. I just think that we should beat this Amendment again. I would encourage everyone that thinks that people should have rights to defend themselves in this process, that if you believe in the Second Amendment, then you should be against this Amendment. Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Preston."

Preston: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of the Gentleman's Amendment, Amendment 24. I think it makes perfect sense to require that in daycare facilities, that there not be a handgun lying around. This didn't come out of the air. It came out of a tragedy that happened in a daycare facility where the operators had a handgun. The handgun was loaded and the child got ahold of it and there was a tragedy that occurred. We're not making any great prohibition, just where the facility is located, there ought not be handguns when there are children there."

Speaker Greiman: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bowman, to close."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in response to the only person who spoke against this Amendment, I would just point out that he's dead wrong, that we did not consider this Amendment before. We considered the issue before, but, in response to concerns that were raised on the floor and then the last time it was debated, and then again in Committee, when the Bill went around again, this Amendment, in its present form, has not been seen before by the House. The language in this Amendment was developed in conjunction with staff on the other side of the aisle in response to specific objections which were raised. The simple point to make is this: That

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kids and guns don't mix. That the Department of Children and Family Services says they don't have the authority to write into their day care regulations any... anything that would pertain to how guns were... if guns were to be on the premises, or how they were to be stored if they were on the premises, or anything like that. This gives them that authority. It also establishes the right for parents to know if the guns are on the premises. I think, if you had a child in day care, you would want to know. And if you would want to know, you ought to vote for this Bill... this Amendment."

Speaker Greiman: "The question is, 'Shall the Amendment be adopted?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye'. Those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. The Gentleman from Warren, Mr. Hultgren, to explain his vote."

Hultgren: "Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I had hoped to speak during debate. I believe this is the same Amendment that I'd spoken with the Sponsor about before. It seems to me to be a reasonable regulation. It doesn't prohibit any ownership. It doesn't prohibit possession. It just says, if you're going to have handguns around kids, that you ought to lock them up where the kids can't get ahold of them. That seems to me to be a pretty reasonable approach and I would encourage 'aye' votes on the Amendment."

Speaker Greiman: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 59 voting 'aye', 38 voting 'no', 4 voting 'present' and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. Yes. Ms. Williamson, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker, would you record me as voting 'aye' on that Bill?"

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Speaker Greiman: "The transcript will so indicate. On the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading Short Debate, appears Senate Bill 1403. Mr. Novak, do you wish to proceed with that? Mr. Novak? 1403. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1403, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 1453. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1453, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to prisoners and jails. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 01 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Any Motions with respect to Amendment 01?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. And now on page 5 of the Calendar on the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading appears Senate Bill 43, Mr. Giorgi? We'll take it out of the record. On that Order appears Senate Bill 77. Mr. Cullerton, do you wish to proceed? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 77, a Bill for an Act in relation to the towing and removal of nuisance vehicles. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 01 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Motions with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 02, offered by Representative

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McCracken and Churchill."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. McCracken, on Amendment #2."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We started to discuss this yesterday. This amends the bill."

Speaker Greiman: "Excuse me, Mr. McCracken. Please give the Gentleman your attention. Let us have order in the chamber. Proceed, Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you. This amends the Bill to provide that any person whose car is wrongfully towed has direct recourse against the tower, who in turn has direct recourse against the city or other authority which ordered the tow that was later determined to be illegal. Currently, the Bill requires that any person that has had the car towed away illegally must pay the towing company regardless of whether the tow was authorized, and then must seek reimbursement against the municipal authority, only after the tow hearing is conducted. We think that this places the responsibility and burdon of enforcement in the wrong place, and offer this Amendment for that reason. Let me emphasize. It does not change ultimately who pays for an unauthorized tow. What it does is provide a very prompt recourse on behalf of the person whose car was unlawfully towed against the towing company and between the towing company and the city. The city or other agency which ordered the tow, they must go against... or the towing company must go against that authority for reimbursement. The importance of this, of course, is that, typically, one would be in a better position to collect under this Amendment. One would be able to collect more quickly, in light of an illegal tow under this Amendment. And for that reason I move the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook... the Gentleman from

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DuPage moves for the adoption of Amendment 02 to Senate Bill 77, and on that, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes. I have an inquiry of the Chair."

Speaker Greiman: "Yes."

Cullerton: "Mr. Speaker, has Amendment 03 been filed on this particular Bill? This here particular Bill?"

Speaker Greiman: "We will make inquiry of the Clerk. Mr. Clerk, the Gentleman asks whether Amendment 03, whether there is an Amendment 03 filed for this Bill? We are advised, Mr. Cullerton, that there is an Amendment 03 filed to this Bill."

Cullerton: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker, I have reviewed Representative McCracken's Amendment and I have no objection to it and I would be happy for its... for it to be adopted."

Speaker Greiman: "The question is, 'Shall the Amendment be adopted?' All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 03, offered by Representative Cullerton."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Cullerton, on Amendment 03."

Cullerton: "It's a technical Amendment. But I haven't actually read it yet, because I don't think it's been printed and distributed."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Cullerton, moves for the adoption of Amendment 03 to Senate Bill 77, and on that the Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "I... I'm told it hasn't been printed and distributed. We haven't seen it. I object to proceeding on it at this

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time. If you want to get back to it today, when it's been printed and distributed, that's fine. I object at this point."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Cullerton?"

Cullerton: "Well, as long as Representative McCracken is going to allow us to go back to it, when it's printed and distributed, I would certainly graciously accept that and take it out of the record at this time."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright. We'll take this out of the record upon the understanding that we'll return to it. Holding it on Second Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 115, Mr. Homer? Out of the record. And on this Order appears Senate Bill 117, Mr. McPike. Is he in the chamber? Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 161. Mr. Hartke, did you wish to proceed. Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 192, Mr. O'Connell. Is Mr. O'Connell in the chamber? Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 441, Mr. Homer. 441? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 441, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 21 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Motions with respect to Amendment 21?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 22, offered by Representative McCracken and Cowlshaw."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. McCracken, on Amendment 22."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The president or general superintendent, under this Amendment, will be required..."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Homer. For what purpose do you seek

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recognition?"

Homer: "Mr. Speaker, we don't have a copy of this Amendment. Has this been printed and distributed?"

McCracken: "Mr. Speaker, I'll give Representative Homer leave to come back to this whenever he wishes."

Homer: "Well, let's take it from the record. I just haven't seen the... haven't seen the Amendment. Could we take it from the record?"

Speaker Greiman: "Yes. The choice is yours. Yes. We'll take this out of the record. The next Bill, Ladies and Gentlemen, is an Appropriation Bill on the Calendar which we will call on the Order of Second Reading at this time. Mr. Clerk, on this Order appears Senate Bill 453. Call the... read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 453, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act making certain appropriations. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 31, offered by Representative Leverenz, Bowman, Mays and Tate."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leverenz, on Amendment 31."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Amendment has been agreed with on both sides and I will try to enumerate the number of things that are in it, the number of different Sections. The first would add an appropriation for the Governor's Council and it is a transfer of \$500.00. The second part transfers \$260,000.00 out of one line and into various communications and contractual line items in Children and Family Services. The third part reduces the request from the Department of Revenue for payment of refunds by \$25,000,000.00 in General Revenue Funds. The fourth part reorganizes Section 13 and provides money for

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the State Police. The fifth part would delete transfers from designated funds to General Revenue that were identified as Sections 13.1, 13.2, and 13.3. Further, a new Section 24.5 would add \$500,000.00 for Build Illinois Purposes Fund. Seven would add 24.7 which appropriates \$190,000.00 to CDB for the Department of Agriculture. 24.8 would provide a payment of \$264,000.00 in capitol funds. Section... the next would be 24.9, which clarifies language, and there is no net dollar change. 24.10 would authorize \$38,000.00 of General Revenue Funds, transfer in the Department of Agriculture's Budget. 24.11 would appropriate \$3,954,737.00 to the Department of Mental Health. 24.14 would appropriate \$2,000.00 in General Revenue Funds to the State Appellate Defender for the contractual services line item, and makes a restoration there. 24.15 would reappropriate \$200,000.00 to DCCA, which is a balance that has to be rolled over. As the Amendment then adds to the Bill a number of different things, it makes a total reduction to the Bill of \$12,742,963.00 as it came over from the Senate. Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of Amendment 21."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leverenz, moves for the adoption of Amendment 21 to Senate Bill 453, and on that the Gentleman from Adams, Mr. Mays."

Mays: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I would simply reassert what the Chairman of the Appropriations I Committee said. This is an Agreed Amendment. We do have to move on with this supplemental request, and so urge the people to support."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Yes, we would like to compliment Representative Mays for his astuteness, and him and Representative Tate and Bowman for this very fiscally responsible Amendment."



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Speaker Greiman: "The question is, 'Shall this Amendment be adopted?' Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On the Order of Senate Bills Second Reading appears Senate Bill 504. Mr. Clerk. Mr... yes. Mr. Black, did you wish to proceed? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 504, a bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to coroners. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 548. Mr. Clerk... out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 553. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 553, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor... are there any Motions with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 569. Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 570. Out of the record. Senate Bill 597. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 597, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

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Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Motions with respect to Amendment  
#1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative  
Breslin."

Speaker Greiman: "The Lady from LaSalle, Ms. Breslin, on  
Amendment #2."

Breslin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen this  
Amendment is offered at the request of various concerns of  
the members of the Elementary and Secondary Education  
Committee to conform with what, they think, the Bill would  
do... or should do effectively. First of all, it addresses  
the issue of whether or not we should have a maximum  
capacity or population limit on school districts that this  
should affect. The Amendment as drafted requires that the  
maximum capacity, or maximum population, be 600. However,  
it allows the State Board of Education to issue a size  
waiver when they see that it would significantly increase  
the educational opportunities of the district's students.  
In addition to that, it provides that if two or more of the  
participating districts approve an extension of the  
agreement, the... if there are more than two involved in  
the agreement, those people can opt out at the end of the  
contract period. We made that clear that that was our  
intent in Committee, and I think this Amendment will  
continue to make it clear to all who would read the law at  
a later time. It also indicates that if a district should  
wish to enter into a cooperative agreement with another  
district, they do not have to have equal voting rights on  
the Board, if they contract otherwise. This was in  
response to a inquiry raised by Representative  
Satterthwaite and I think that the Amendment reaches all of

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those concerns. I ask that it be adopted."

Speaker Breslin: "The Lady from LaSalle moves for the adoption of Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 597, and on that the Lady from DuPage, Ms. Cowlshaw."

Cowlshaw: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. There were several concerns raised about this measure when it was presented in the Committee, and every one of them has been met very ably by this Amendment. Thank you very much, Representative Breslin. That's a good job and we should support this Amendment."

Speaker Greiman: "Further discussion? There being none, the question is, 'Shall the Amendment be adopted?' Those in favor say 'aye', those opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, offered by Representative Mautino."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Mautino, on Amendment #3. Is Mr. Mautino in the chamber? Mr. Mautino? Mr. Mautino."

Mautino: "Thank you. Representative Breslin, could we take this out of the record for one minute. Let's you and I get together and we can go over these three Amendments, 3, 4 and 5, that you had some concerns with, for just one moment?"

Speaker Greiman: "Yes. Alright. We'll hold the Bill on the Order of Second Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 630. Out of the record. 707. Out of the record. On this Order appears Senate Bill 5... 857. Mr. Kirkland? 857, Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 857, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Committee Amendments."

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Speaker Greiman: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. On this Order appears Senate Bill 942. Mr. Rice, do you wish to proceed? 942. Take it out of the record. Alright. On this Order appears Senate Bill 945. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 945, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative McCracken and Cowlshaw."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill provides for a grant program for local school districts to conduct a model pilot early child parental training program. And the Amendment would require that not more than 10% of any funds appropriated for this program, in any school year, would be spent in any school district so that we are certain that we will distribute throughout the state, and throughout the state's school districts, the funds appropriated for this program. And I move its adoption."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. McCracken, moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 945, and on that, is there any discussion? There being none the question is, 'Shall this Amendment be adopted?' Those in favor 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Greiman: "Third Reading. The Clerk advises me the fiscal note has been filed in this matter. Ladies and Gentlemen, the Clerk, at the beginning of Session today, read the

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Consent Calendar. We are about to take a vote, now, on the Consent Calendar. So, accordingly, these Bills, having been previously read. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is now open and this is final action on this Consent Calendar. Mr. Clerk. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Cullerton. Mr. Cullerton?"

Cullerton: "Yes. I have an inquiry of the Clerk."

Speaker Greiman: "Yes, Mr. Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Is Senate Bill 63 on the Consent Calendar? That's my ... "

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 68 has been removed from the Consent Calendar."

Cullerton: "Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 111 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', 1 voting 'present'. And these Bills, having received the Constitutional Majority, are hereby declared passed. I have a... Ladies and Gentlemen, the Chair would just acknowledge for the transcript, that we have received a communication from Representative Preston, indicating that he was absent on the 10th of June, which would have been an excused absence by reason of a death in the family. The announcement was noted previously in the record and we now make that notation on the... for the June 10th Session. Agreed Resolutions."

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Hatijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. We have examined the Resolutions. They are all agreed to, and I move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Greiman: "All those in favor say 'aye', those opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it. The Agreed Resolutions... the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. General Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 524, offered by Representative Turner, et al."

Speaker Greiman: "Committee on Assignment. Death Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolutions 520, offered by Representative Shaw, with respect to the memory of Golden Parker."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shaw, moves for the adoption of the Death Resolution. Those in favor say 'aye', those opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it and the Resolution is adopted. Are there any announcements? Yes, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berrios."

Berrios: "Human Services Committee will meet tomorrow from 8:00 to 10:00 in the morning."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright. The Human Services tomorrow 8:00 to 10:00. Are there further announcements? Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes. Just a reminder that the Executive Committee is in recess and will be meeting tomorrow morning at 10:00 a.m. in Room 114. That's the Executive and Veteran's Affairs Committee."

Speaker Greiman: "The Executive and Veteran's Affairs tomorrow at 10:00, Mr. Terzich? 10:00."

Terzich: "Correct."

Speaker Greiman: "Mr. Mulcahey, the Gentleman from Winnebago."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Elementary and Secondary Education Committee, which is in recess, will, likewise, meet tomorrow morning, 10:00, in C-1."

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Speaker Greiman: "Elementary and Secondary tomorrow at 10:00.

Mr. Dunn, the Gentleman from Macon."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley."

Farley: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. A reminder that the House Labor and Commerce Committee will meet immediately after adjournment in Room 118."

Speaker Greiman: "The House Labor and Commerce Committee will meet immediately upon adjournment, Ladies and Gentlemen. And now, Ladies and Gentlemen, we are about to adjourn on a Resolution noting the death of a former Member. And we will adjourn on that until the hour of 12:30 tomorrow. Is that right? Okay. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 493, offered by Speaker Madigan and Representative Daniels. Whereas, Members of this Body have learned with great sadness of the recent passing of Michael A. Ruddy, former Dean of the Illinois House of Representatives and whereas, a native of Chicago, Michael Ruddy was elected to the Legislature in 1928 and he was

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reelected for 18 consecutive terms and whereas, originally serving the southwest side's 4th District, Michael Ruddy's district became the 28th District in the late 1950's and whereas, from 1936 to 1957 Michael Ruddy served as Republican Ward Committeeman of the 15th Ward and whereas, in 1942 Michael Ruddy as described by the Legislative Voters League as attentive, capable... attentive, capable and experienced and whereas, throughout the years Michael A.
