April 17, 1990

Speaker Giglio: "The House will come to order. The chaplain for today is Reverend J. Leon Thorn, of St. Matthews African Methodist Episcopal Church in Argo Summits, Illinois. The Reverend J. Thorn is the guest of Representative Zickus. The guests in the gallery may wish to rise for the invocation. Reverend Thorn."

Reverend Thorn: "Thank you. Shall we pray? Eternal God our Heavenly Father, we come at this opening Session in the Name of Jesus. We thank You Dear God, for the roads and the airways that led here. We thank You Dear God, for safe passage that when we arrived on the ground, Dear God we found our friends and our fellow brothers and sisters in good health and good spirit. Lord, we thank You this morning for the opportunity of prayer. For we know that there is power in prayer. We know that there are answers to the many problems that we have. So now Lord we just acknowledge Your power to move in this Body to move among its Members and guide them Dear Lord to make decisions that would bless the lives of the constituents back home. In the precious Name of Jesus, we ask You to guide their minds in all deliberations because we understand, Dear God, that there are many lives that hang in the balance. We understand Heavenly Father that there are many persons that are hurting. Help them to forever be mindful, Dear God, that whatever they do they will affect somebody's lives. And, we ask You in the Name of Jesus to guide them and use them for Your glory. Then, Oh God, we ask special blessing upon the Speaker, upon our Governor, upon the President of this Nation. Lord, that You would be with them as they lead in governing the old ship of state. And then, Oh God, we ask that You would just so bless them to just remember that the government that we seek to give guidance to is

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already upon Your shoulders. And help them to be mindful, Dear God, that Your government shall be surrendered to them that they may do the right and the best thing. And Lord until this government, until this kingdom become the kingdom of Our God and of His Christ and where He shall reign for ever and ever. We shall forever until that day give You the glory and give You the honor for being the Lord of our lives in Jesus name we pray world without end. Let the Body say "Amen". Thank you."

Speaker Giglio: "Death Resolution of a former Member."

Clerk Leone: "House Resolution 1492, offered by Representative Martinez. WHEREAS, The members of this body were deeply saddened by the death of Vito Marzullo, a Chicago political legend and former member of this body; and WHEREAS, On September 10, 1997...1897, Vito Marzullo was born in the Village of Senerchia, Italy, and he emigrated to the United States in 1910 and settled in the west side Chicago neighborhood; and WHEREAS, Upon his arrival, Vito Marzullo declared 'I loved America even when I was in Italy,' and he began working in a factory, then as an apprentice mechanic, and later became a clerk in the County Treasurer's Office; and WHEREAS, Vito Marzullo's service to the Democratic Party began in 1920 when he became a 25th Ward precinct captain, and he piloted his ward through three quarters of the 20th Century, while earning the respect and admiration of men and women in all walks of life throughout the nation; and WHEREAS, In 1941, Vito Marzullo was elected to the Illinois House of Representatives, where he became friendly with another fledgling politician named Richard J. Daley; and WHEREAS, Vito Marzullo was elected alderman of the 25th Ward in 1953, and for 33 years he made sure that government took care of his constituents; and WHEREAS, In the Chicago City Council, Mr. Vito Marzullo was the Chairman of the Local Transportation Committee, and his political ambitions never extended beyond the limits of his Ward because his goal was to serve his neighbors; and WHEREAS, In lectures to students at Harvard University, Northeastern Illinois University and the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois, from which he received its Distinguished Service Award, Alderman Marzullo confided that service and communication were the keys to public

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life, and he said of his constituents, 'We go to church with them, we go to wakes and we go to social affairs and civic affairs and we see the precinct captains all year round, and once you are elected, you don't run away from your people'; and WHEREAS, Devoted to enduring public...to enduring family and community values, Vito Marzullo had resided in his neighborhood since 1918 and in the same home on South Oakley for over 30 years, presided lovingly over his family; and WHEREAS, Vito Marzullo leaves a proud heritage to mourn his passing in the persons of his wife, Letizia; two sons, William and Robert; four daughters, Helen, Adeline, Ann and Eleanore; 19 grandchildren; 7 great-grandchildren; and a host of other close relatives and friends; and WHEREAS, It is certain that the love and warmth that Vito Marzullo shared with all he knew will long be remembered and treasured by family and friends; therefore, be it RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we express our profound sorrow upon the death of Vito Marzullo; that we join with those individuals who mourn the loss of a close friend and colleague; and that we extend our heartfelt sympathy to his family; and be it further RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this preamble and resolution be presented to Mrs. Letizia Marzullo, as a formal indication of our mutually shared sense of loss.

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Martinez."

So, I had a great admiration for him and I still do. All I can say is that the country, the state, the city lost a valuable asset in Vito Marzullo. 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And, he will be missed dearly. I personally lost a good friend and the man that started me in public life. I'm grateful to him even now and I shall always remember him. Thank you."
