February 25, 1993

Speaker McPike: "Come to order. The chaplain for today is Reverend Samuel L. Hooks of the St. John A.M.E. Church in Springfield, Illinois. Reverend Hooks is the guest of Representative Curran. Guests in the balcony may wish to rise and join us for the invocation."

Reverend Samuel Hooks: "As we enter this Lenten season, help us to lay aside any reason for not moving forward. We pray much for success in each Session. We're conscious of Thy greatness, goodness and power; glorify Thee for what Thou hath done for us. If we've fallen short of any expectations, we ask that where we are weak give us strength; where we're fearful, give us courage. Help us to be trustworthy to those who support us. Give us understanding in promoting justice. For these things together, with the blessing of life, we give thanks. We ask in the name of Him who prayed 'not my will but Thy will be done'. Amen."

Speaker McPike: "We'll be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Wyvetter Younge."

Younge - et: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker McPike: "Roll Call for Attendance. Now, let the...let the Chair announce that...we would appreciate if you would punch only your switch, and it's understandable that many of our Members have gone home because of bad weather; and, if they have gone home, they should not be punched in. Speaker McPike: "Committee on Assignment. Representative Davis in the Chair."

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Davis: "Thank you very much. I have been asked by the African-American Caucus to share with you, in the final days, just a little tribute to end African-American month or Black History month. Just for a little, and I...I ask that you bear with me--I know you're filing your beers...Bills, and we do understand that. First, I'll start with the history of Black History month. It was started by Dr. Carter G. Woodson, and these are the words of Dr. Carter Goodwin Woodson, a distinguished black author, editor, publisher and historian, who was born December 18, 19...1875 and left this world in April of 1950. Carter G. Woodson believed that the blacks should know their past in order to participate intelligently in the affairs of our country. He strongly believed that the black history, which others have tried so diligently to erase, is a firm foundation for young black Americans 'to build on in order to become productive citizens in our society. Known as the father of black history, Carter G. Woodson holds an outstanding position in early twentieth century American history. He has authored numerous scholarly books on the positive contributions of African-Americans in this country. He has also published many magazine articles. In leaving the beginnings of African-American history in this country, I'd like to share with you something that each and every one of us should be extremely proud of and that is the first or the Maiden speech by one of our former own, U.S. Senator Carol Moseley-Braun. In Washington, Illinois Senator Carol Moseley-Braun, she delivered this speech following the death of the honorable Thurgood Marshall. I ask that you at least be respectful to these words, as many times you have people before you in (sic - to) which you wish to pay

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tribute. The final day for African-American month is, I think, February 28th. Carol Moseley-Braun stated, 'Mr. President, Thurgood Marshall died on Sunday, January 17th of heart failure. I still have great difficulty believing it. I know he was born over 84 years ago, and I know that he himself said that he was old, falling apart; but it was, nonetheless, hard to conceive that a heart as mighty and courageous as his is no longer beating. Thurgood Marshall epitomized the best in America; in fact, what this country is all about. That may seem an odd thing to say about him; after all, he himself was very aware of the fact that the United States did not and still does not live up to its founding principles. He knew that the phrases of the Declaration of Independence, that all men are created equal and are endowed with certain inalienable rights, including those of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, were not all too much of the same, the principle that governs everyday life in America. Thurgood Marshall was born in Baltimore in 1908. He lived and felt the humiliation of racism; of not even being able to use the bathroom in downtown Baltimore, simply because of the color of his skin. But Thurgood Marshall was not defeated by racism. He knew that racial inequality was incompatible with American ideals, and he made it his life's unending fight to see that this country's ideals become true for all citizens, and what a fight it has been. It took Thurgood Marshall from Baltimore... segregate...to unsegregate the public schools where he had graduated from (sic - with) honors from Howard University. It took him to the NAACP, to the Circuit Court bench, into the United States Solicitors (sic - Solicitor) General's Office. He was the first African-American member of the United States Supreme

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Court. That, of course, being a quick biography does not begin to measure the battles that Thurgood Marshall fought and won and the strength and conviction and power he put into each fight. Thomas Jefferson said that a little rebellion now and then is a good thing and is necessary in the political world as storms in the physical. Thurgood Marshall took Jefferson at his word and played a key role in creating a rebellion in America. A rebellion, not of violence, but of law. What Marshall did was to use the United State's legal system to bludgeon and destroy state-supported segregation. What Marshall did was to use the courts and the law to force the United States to apply the promises made to every American in our Declaration of Independence, in our Bill of Rights, to African-Americans who had little or no protection under the law up until the Marshall legal rebellion. What Marshall did was to make the 13th, 14th and 15th Amendments of our Constitution the law of the land in reality instead of just empty promises. The history of the Civil Rights Movement in this country is in no small part the history of Marshall's battles before the Supreme Court. As lead counsel of the NAACP, Marshall appeared before the Supreme Court 32 times, and he won 29. His legal skills, grounded in sound preparation and sensitivity to the evidence, helped him win such landmark decisions as Smith vs. Allright, Shelley vs. Kramer, Sweat vs. Painter, and the biggest case of them all was Brown vs. the Board of Education. I'm somewhat reluctant to dwell on Thurgood Marshall's many successes because I know he wouldn't like it. He wouldn't like it because he knew only too well that there are many more battles that must be fought and won in America's founding principles and American reality...if American realities are to become one

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of the same for every American of every color. In his descent in the Bakke case, Thurgood Marshall said, 'The position of the Negro today in America is the tragic but inevitable consequences of centuries of unequal treatment.' Measured by any benchmark of comfort or achievement, meaningful equality remains a distant dream for the Negro. However, the fact that the battle is not yet won does not lessen Marshall's many accomplishments. He was a man who worked and fought to make a difference. He was a man who did make a difference. 'He certainly made a difference in my life,' (and that's Carol Moseley-Braun speaking), 'opening the doors of opportunity measured only by merit. He helped ensure that I was able to attend the University of Chicago Law School, not a school for blacks only; his work helped (make) my election to the United States Senate possible; he opened doors and created new opportunities for me and for many others. His life was the most convincing evidence that change is possible. I was too close, Mr. President...I want to close. I was very close to Thurgood Marshall; I was too close.' Carol Moseley-Braun closes her Maiden speech in the United Senate by stating, "In the Bakke case, Marshall states, 'In light of the sorry history of discrimination and its devastating impact on the lives of Negroes, bringing the Negro into the main...mainstream of American life should be a state of interest in the highest order.'" I share his view: Elimination of racism is not just an interest of African-Americans, but of all Americans. Only then will we be able to tap the full potential to our people; only then will we live the greatness of the American promise. I hope we will all remember Thurgood Marshall by continuing his lifetime of struggle. I hope we will remember by dedicating ourselves

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to principles and goals similar to the dedication that he made seeking equal opportunity, making equal opportunity available for all Americans; and, as we work toward these goals, I hope we can live our lives as completely as he did, enjoy ourselves as much as he did, and poke as much fun as (sic-at) ourselves as he did. Thurgood Marshall lived a fabulous life. Carol Moseley-Braun states that she will...she will miss Thurgood Marshall, America will miss Thurgood Marshall, and she states that she is proud to have had the opportunity in some small way to continue his work and build on his historic legacy. Ladies and Gentlemen of the 88th General Assembly, I thank you for this opportunity to share with you, on the close of this African-American History month, just a wee bit of contributions that African-Americans have made to this country. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Further announcements. Representative Parke."
