Speaker Steczo: "Any further discussion? Representative Andrea	893
Moore."	
Moore, A.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"	895
Speaker Steczo: "He indicates he will."	897
Moore, A.: "I have a question that we need to establish for	899
legislative intent, and it has to do with when the county	900
clerk actually receives the application for registration.	901
Are they allowed to then verify whether this

Government and is now up to us. I ask Representative	917
Morrow to have hope that we can get it through because we	918
have to have it through by January 1, 1995, it's the	
federal law. I'm also pleased to see this Bill come	919
forward with the Amendment attached to it that will, in	920
fact, prevent voter fraud and that's one where you have to,	
the very first time you vote, if you register by mail you	921

think it's good that we've got a compromise here, we seem	966
to have consensus and I congratulate you and Andrea Moore	
as the Sponsor of Amendment 5 and I encourage a 'yes' vote.	967
