Beaubien: "Yes, a point of personal privilege."

Speaker Hartke: "State your point."

Beaubien: "After a weekend of hard lobbying, I was able to finally convince Terry Parke to bring some cake in and there's cake up in the front for everybody. Congratulations, Terry, on number... he's not saying. Also, today, you have on your desks a little purple bag. This is Suzie Bassi's birthday and she's going for good health and offering trail mix. A hand for both of these folks. Thanks."

Speaker Hartke: "Happy birthday, Terry. On page 8 on the Calendar, on Third Reading appears House Bill 34. Out of the record. House Bill 55. Mr. Lang. Out of the record. House Bill 207. Representative Monique Davis. Representative Davis. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 207, a Bill for an Act concerning lead poisoning. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Hartke: "Representative Davis on House Bill 207."

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Davis, M.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 207 is a Bill that requires when students receive health or screenings for school part of that screening will be for lead poisoning. I think we've all learned that the research shows that when children are suffering from lead poisoning it reduces their ability to learn and sometimes causes developmental disabilities. Students are required to have health exams in... upon entering school, fifth grade and eighth grade and we're asking that during those health exams the physician also administer a health screening when the physician feels that this would be advisable, because these children could be at risk."

Speaker Hartke: "Is there any discussion? Chair recognizes Representative Parke."

Parke: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Hartke: "The Sponsor will yield."

Parke: "Representative, can you tell me how this works? Who's gonna do the health... the lead screening?"

Davis, M.: "The lead screening will be done by the physician that gives the children their health exams."

Parke: "So, it will be the same physician that we require the student each year to provide a health exam?"

Davis, M.: "Whenever the student is required to have a health exam, part of that exam will be a lead poisoning screening by the same physician."

Parke: "Does that screening require blood to be taken from the student?"

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Davis, M.: "You know, I really don't know what a lead poisoning screening is. That's up to a physician and I don't know."

Parke: "Let me get this straight, you're asking the Body to vote on something and you don't know how it's done?"

Davis, M.: "Representative, you said that same thing to me Friday."

Parke: "Well, you have the same..."

Davis, M.: "Now what I am saying to..."

Parke: "...you had the same blank look on your face when I asked that question."

Davis, M.: "What I am saying to you is, I am not a physician, there may be more than one way to do a screening. I don't know, because I am not a physician."

Parke: "But you want us to vote..."

Davis, M.: "Whatever..."

Parke: "...for this."

Davis, M.: "...whatever it takes, I am asking them to do it. Whatever it takes."

Parke: "Well, ya know, it's great and, ya know, it's a wonderful idea and I think it's something that we ought to be considering, but I think we ought to have the facts to know what we're voting on. Just because it's a good idea, in itself, may not be a good idea. We... all I'm asking is a basic question. Will we draw blood from that student to check on that? You don't even know the answer. Then pull the Bill and come back, because there may be people..."

Davis, M.: "If..."

Parke: "...who do not want their blood taken from their child."

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Davis, M.: "Representative, if you take your child to the doctor and you don't want your child to have any blood drawn, you, as a parent, have the authority to say to the doctor, I wish not to have any blood taken from my child."

Parke: "Where is that in your Bill?"

Davis, M.: "It doesn't have to be in the Bill, it's prin... it's current..."

Parke: "Is this..."

Davis, M.: "...practice."

Parke: "So, this is a voluntary thing?"

Davis, M.: "Yes, Sir, it is."

Parke: "It's voluntary. Is there additional cost..."

Davis, M.: "There is no additional cost."

Parke: "...to the parent?"

Davis, M.: "Whoever pays, whatever they pay currently, this will be a part of the screening for school children. If children go to a doctor for a health screening that is required, this will be a part of that screening. Usually, tuberculosis is a part of that screening."

Parke: "Well, if it's blood work and let me check for a minute. Our staff believes that you have to draw blood. If it's drawn, it must be sent to a lab. The lab must evaluate whether or not there is lead in the blood. Do you know who pays that additional lab work cost?"

Davis, M.: "Representative, if a student goes in for a health examination and is screened for any illness whatsoever, that same lab will do the same work that they currently do. This is not asking for any different lab involvement. It

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is merely saying... this Bill is saying that if a student is perhaps at risk for lead poisoning, then during the physical examinations that's required by the school boards that those students will again have lead screening. Every student will not have it, only when the physician feels the student is at risk for lead poisoning."

Parke: "Representative, when my children were younger, we would take 'em to the doctor, the doctor would ask questions, he would check them over physically and look at them, ask if they had any problems and then give them an okay on their physical. I don't ever remember any blood being drawn. I don't ever remember that they would have to send that out. That would be something predicated on having a medical problem. I still want to know who pays for the lead work... the blood work that's done. Who pays the lab to evaluate that blood work and who pays for the results sent back to the doctor? Now, if you do not have the answer on that, then I would suggest you pull this Bill again and come to the Body with information that we have to have to vote for your Bill. Conceptually, it's a great idea. But again, you're trying to bluff your way through this, you don't have the answers. I think it's only fair that you give us the answer, because there is an additional cost that somebody must bear and if it's the parents, then they ought to know about it and everybody here ought to know that before we vote on it."

Davis, M.: "Representative, I also took my children to the doctor and if the doctor saw a need to draw blood from my

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child to test for anything and it was part of the screening, it was my prerogative as a parent to say 'yes' or 'no'. And regardless to what your animosity might be, your animosity against me or the Bill..."

Parke: "My an..."

Davis, M.: "...it is absolutely no additional cost to screen children for lead. Now, hold on. When I came..."

Parke: "Well, I was..."

Davis, M.: "...to this Body, there was no lead screening at all."

Parke: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Hartke: "Representative Parke."

Davis, M.: "We..."

Parke: "To the Bill. To the Bill."

Speaker Hartke: "To the Bill."

Parke: "Again, the Representative brings to us a Bill that she fully has not evaluated to make sure that this... we're getting all the information necessary. Again, I would ask the Sponsor to pull the Bill and then she can come back. For her to stand in front of us and tell us there's no additional cost when blood work is done and a lab is involved, I think all of us would realize that in fact that cannot be the case. So, until you have the information, I cannot vote for your legislation. I think you are a capable because you have a good idea here. This is a good underlying Bill, but I think that we ought to know is who pays the cost on this and why should we expect parents to pay for this, why should we expect a doctor to pay for this, why should we expect a lab to pay for this, unless we

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know who's paying for this. I... I would ask the Sponsor to pull the Bill until she can get this information to us."

Speaker Hartke: "Further discussion? Chair recognizes Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Hartke: "Sponsor..."

Black: "Representative, on..."

Speaker Hartke: "...indicates she will yield."

Black: "Thank you. On... if you'll look on line 31 of your Bill, the part that you're changing, it says physicians and health care providers 'shall', I thought it said 'may', but it doesn't. It says they 'shall'. In other words, they must screen children for lead poisoning in conjunction with the school health exam. The health exam is required under the School Code, when in the medical judgment of the physician the child is potentially at high risk of lead poisoning. So, the physician does not have to do this test unless the physician feels that there may be a high risk of lead poisoning. Correct? Is that your intent?"

Davis, M.: "That is correct, Representative."

Black: "Okay. Now, the Amendment... the Amendment that was adopted in committee also would allow an advance practice nurse or a physician's assistant to make this decision. Right?"

Davis, M.: "We were... excuse me. We... an advanced practice nurse or someone, let's see, collaborating with the physician under the physician's authority."

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Black: "Right."

Davis, M.: "If they currently perform health exams and the physician has given them the authority, then they may also do that. That is correct."

Black: "My... I think my concern is if the APN, the advanced practice nurse or the PA, the physician assistant, could make this decision and the actual medical doctor would not have to be on scene, as long as that doctor has given collaborative agreement, those two nonmedical doctors could make this decision and draw the blood without the doctor being on site. The doctor may be back in the office or the hospital. Correct?"

Davis, M.: "Well, what the Amendment says, Representative, is an advanced practice nurse who has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating physician that authorizes the advanced practice nurse to perform the exams or the physician's assistant who's been delegated to perform health exams by the supervising physician."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "So, a supervising physician who feels that his or her health practice nurse is qualified and capable to do it, excuse me, health screenings, then they would be qualified to do this."

Black: "Right."

Davis, M.: "And I was asked to add this Amendment by the nurses."

Black: "Okay. I don't have any problem with the Amendment, but as I understand the Amendment, the actual medical doctor...

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When I was in school, ya know, you'd go to a school gymnasium and everybody in the first grade, I can't remember what grades, about three times during our K,12 career, we'd have these school physicals and they would bus us, usually to the high school, and then there'd be hundreds of kids there and you go through. That was a long time ago, there weren't advanced practice nurses and there weren't physician's assistants, the doctor was always on site. But this Amendment would indicate that an APN or a physician assistant, if they had the authority granted by a doctor, could do these exams. The doctor, her or him, would not necessarily have to be present to grant them that authority?"

Davis, M.: "That's correct."

Black: "Okay, All right. Now, the only... the only question that I have and we don't have a final figure yet is... and the department... the Department of Public Health and they did not sign in opposition to the Bill, but let me read what they told our staff. The Department of Public Health stated that there would be a financial impact. The cost of screening an individual for lead poisoning is \$25. Now, that's \$25 per individual and this is a much greater problem, Representative, I mean let's just be honest with each other, much greater problem in your area than mine, because of the age of the housing stock and the fact that they used more lead paint back in those days than they do now. So, I'm not, in any way, shape or form, trying to say that the impact isn't serious because it is and we... I've

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seen empirical studies and what can happen to a youngster who sucks on the window ledge or gets too much of this lead paint in their system. It... they could be ruined for life and we would spend hundreds of thousands of dollars taking care of them. But since the department said it would cost \$25 per individual and they are currently calculating exact fiscal estimate, then I think the question that my colleague asked is one that we will have to face at some point in this process. The Chicago public schools or the Danville public schools or the parents of the children would say, I don't have... I don't have the \$25. In that case, let's say that this individual is on reduced or free lunch and does not have the money. Now, does the school pick up the screening cost or who does?"

Davis, M.: "Well, first of all, Representative, a screening could be a mere survey or questioning and if anything further occurs, it would be up to the physician. So, it does not necessarily have to be a \$25 fee."

Black: "Oh, I agree. Yeah."

Davis, M.: "In other words, the physician could ask how long have you lived in this very old house? Are there lead pipes in this very old house?"

Black: "All right."

Davis, M.: "Did your child live near where they were imploding projects or are you from an old farm house in which a lot of dirt was available for you to get involved in? If these questions are to the degree where the doctor feels the screening is ended, that is no additional cost."

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Black: "Oh, I agree."

Davis, M.: "And Representative, we have absolutely no opponents from the committee hearing."

Black: "I know."

Davis, M.: "We have absolutely no information from the Department of Public Health who is in the process of change."

Black: "I understand that. I know that there are no opponents. I am not... I am not insinuating..."

Davis, M.: "And I really..."

Black: "...that there are."

Davis, M.: "I appreciate... I appreciate your concern, because I, too, am concerned that we would not just arbitrarily screen children for lead poisoning. But when a child goes in for health examination and that physician looks at perhaps the condition of the child, looks at perhaps the learning rate of the child, looks at some disability that has occurred or has occurred, then we want that doctor to say, this child perhaps needs a lead screening. And I'm really sorry if the Department of Public Health, that is in the midst of change at this point, has decided to let you know and not let me, the Sponsor of the Bill, know that they had some concerns. I'm really sorry about that."

Black: "Well, I... I agree with everything you've said. That it is up to the physician's assistant, the advanced practice nurse to do that survey and then if the light bulb goes on or they say, uh oh, this person may have been exposed to excessive lead risk, then is authorized under your Bill to

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do the screening. I don't have a problem with that. I know exactly what you're saying and I also agree with you. All I... all I can say is that our staff was told that if the doctor... there may be 200 kids and the doctor or the physician's assistant may say, we think there are 20 children in this group that need to be..."

Davis, M.: "Screened."

Black: "...have the test to do determine the lead content in their blood. All... all I'm saying and the Department of Public Health did not sign in opposition and my... and the staff doesn't list 'em as an opponent. It does say that there would be a financial impact, that the cost of that screening would be \$25. They don't say they're opposed to it. Our staff just says that the department is currently calculating an exact fiscal estimate. I agree with you, all departments are in a state of change, it is hard to get a straight answer. And I... I would say more... I would be a little more blunt than you were, if the department told the Republican staff that it would cost \$25 a screen and didn't tell the Democrat staff it would cost that, then if I were you, I'd have somebody from the Department of Public Health in my office this afternoon and I... because you... the point you raise is very valid. There's no reason that the two... the House and Democrat staff should not have the same information. So, I... I'm not in opposition to your Bill, but I do think my colleague raises a question that at some point in this process we're gonna have to answer. Is the

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school district responsible for the 10, 15, 20 screens that may be ordered?"

Davis, M.: "No. No, they're not. Whoever pays for th... if your parent pays, that's who pays."

Black: "All right."

Davis, M.: "If public aid pays..."

Black: "All right."

Davis, M.: "...then that's who pays."

Black: "So, it would..."

Davis, M.: "Whoever currently pays for your health exam will pay for your screening..."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "...as well. If it doesn't add any cost... and I'd also like to say to you, Represen... Representative, is most nurses take your blood, few doctors come in and take your blood today. That task is given to nurses, as well as vaccinations and so forth."

Black: "Well, I..."

Davis, M.: "That task is a nurse's task."

Black: "Well, I agree. I was just talking to some doctors and they say they can't... they don't wanna take the risk of drawing blood because of malpractice, so they let the nurses do it."

Davis, M.: "I appreciate your comments, I really do."

Black: "I don't know the answer to this question, maybe somebody on staff does. Does Medicaid... will Medicaid currently pay a doctor or an ER to draw blood for lead screening? I would assume..."

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Davis, M.: "Well..."

Black: "...they would, but I don't know."

Davis, M.: "...if you are getting... if your hospitalization or your physician is being paid by Medicare, that's who would pay for this screening. Ya know, like when I took my kids to the doctor, I was a personal, private pay doctor and we paid the doctor for that health examination."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "So, whoever pays for that exam will pay. The school will certainly not have to pay..."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "...for a child's health exam."

Black: "Yeah."

Davis, M.: "They don't do that today and they won't do that..."

Black: "You're right."

Davis, M.: "...with this legislation."

Black: "Staff... staff just told me that you are right, that is a covered Medicaid expense. I appreciate the opportunity to go over your Bill with you. I do think and I know there's a lot... there's always tension on the floor and sometimes I create a lot of that, but in this pa... fiscal year, I think the new Governor has made it very clear, we have to be very careful what we ask for and we have to be very careful of whether or not we can pay for it. I think lead screening is extremely important. I'd rather pay \$25 and get it corrected than tens of thousands of dollars to take care of someone who has been damaged by blood... by lead poisoning. But at some point, Representative, and I... I know you and I

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know that you're sincere, but at some point, maybe when the Bill goes to the Senate or comes back, if we can focus on that question to make sure we know that not only will the Bill be paid, but there is another question and that is of religious exemption. There are some people... some religions who will not allow the, ya know, they cannot have a blood transfusion, they cannot have a blood test and they generally are exempt from this and I don't know whether your Bill continues that exemption that's current."

Davis, M.: "That doesn't change..."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "...a parent's right to waive his or her child..."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "...getting an examination."

Black: "Fine."

Davis, M.: "Many times, I won't name the religions, but there are religions who say to the school..."

Black: "That's right."

Davis, M.: "...they sign a waiver, we do not want our child to go to a physician for a screen or anything else. We don't take that right away..."

Black: "Okay."

Davis, M.: "...from that parent."

Black: "All right. I appreciate the questions and that's how, ya know, you're more familiar with this issue than I am as a downstater and that's why sometimes I have to ask you questions. I know sometimes you think I'm just trying to harass you, but..."

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Davis, M.: "I do my best..."

Black: "...ninety-nine percent of the time I'm not."

Davis, M.: "I do my best to reply..."

Black: "And you do."

Davis, M.: "...and answer your questions..."

Black: "You do."

Davis, M.: "...and I try to do so, Representative, without animosity towards you or your Bill. Ya know, I believe that as a Representative of people in the State of Illinois we deserve a certain amount of decorum and respect and I try to give that to you as you have courteously given that to me."

Black: "I think you usually have, Representative, and I appreciate that and I got my... not only did I get my flu shot in November, but I got my animosity shot, too, so I'll..."

Davis, M.: "And a nurse is gonna give it to you."

Black: "I'll try and do better too. All right."

Davis, M.: "A nurse is gonna give you that shot."

Black: "All right. Thank you."

Speaker Hartke: "Further discussion? Seeing no one is seeking recognition, Representative Davis to close."

Davis, M.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill in no way requires that a doctor take blood from any student or any child. What this Bill requires is that during a health exam a child, who the doctor perceives may be at risk for lead poisoning, then the doctor would say we're going to screen the child, it could be through questioning or what

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have you. And I ask for an 'aye' vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Hartke: "The question is, 'Shall the House pass House Bill 207?' All those in favor signify by voting 'yes'; those opposed vote 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 117 Members... 117 Members voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this... and this Bill, having received a Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. On Second Reading appears House Bill 538. Representative Acevedo. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 538, a Bill for an Act in relation to criminal law. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions filed."

Speaker Hartke: "Third Reading. House Bill 1208. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 1208, a Bill for an Act in relation to criminal law. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions filed."

Speaker Hartke: "Third Reading. Agreed Resolutions. House Resolution 84. Representative Poe. Mr. Poe. House Resolution 84. Your comments on House Resolution 84."

Poe: "Yeah, House Re... excuse me. The Prairie Heart Institute in Springfield here is February's National Heart Month and we're supposed to have some guests from the Prairie Heart

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Institute here today and this is recognizing them. They're one of the nationally recognized, top five percent in the United States, one of the best in Illinois, one of the largest in the State of Illinois. And we just wanted to have this Resolution as we celebrate National Heart Month."

Speaker Hartke: "You've heard the Gentleman's Resolution. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'; opposed 'no'. Opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And House Resolution 84 is adopted. Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We've already passed the Resolution. I was going to stand and speak in favor of it. Many of you realize that last year I had a heart attack in the fall and I'm currently going to the Prairie Heart Institute for rehab work on the days that I'm down here. I wanna tell you they are just an extremely excellent organization over there and I would recommend that anybody that would ever have need of that facility to utilize it to its fullest, because it's just a fantastic facility. Springfield's lucky to have it here in their city."

Speaker Hartke: "Thank you for your comments. On page 8 of the Calendar appears... on Third Reading appears House Bill 249. Representative Steve Davis. Are you ready, Mr. Davis? Mr. Clerk, read... Out of the record. House Bill 211. Representative Feigenholtz. Out of the record. House Bill 236. Representative Franks. Mr. Franks. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 236, a Bill for an Act concerning telecommunications. Third Reading of this House Bill."

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Speaker Hartke: "Representative Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the General Assembly. House Bill 236 is very similar to a Bill we passed last year unanimously, but unfortunately didn't get a hearing in the Senate. We have amended it slightly. And what this Bill does is it provides that telecommunication carriers that provide directory assistance shall provide that service to their legally blind customers at no charge. The only difference is this year is we took an Amendment, which was drafted by Ameritech, which limits those free calls only into the same calling area as described in the telecommunication carriers' tariff. I'd be glad to answer any questions."

Speaker Hartke: "Is there any discussion? Seeing no one is seeking recognition, the question is, 'Shall the House pass House Bill 236?' All those in favor signify by voting 'yes'; those opposed vote 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Davis, I have voted. Have all voted who wish? Representative Brunsvold. Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 118 Members voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no', and 0 voting 'present'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. There any announcements? Seeing no one is seeking recognition, we are preparing to adjourn. Representative Lang moves... now moves that the House... Chair recognizes the Clerk."

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Clerk Rossi: "Attention Members. The Executive Committee scheduled to meet tomorrow morning will meet at 9:30. The Executive Committee scheduled to meet tomorrow will meet at 9:30."

Speaker Hartke: "Chair recognizes Representative Steve Davis."

Davis, S.: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Public Utilities Committee scheduled for 2:00 today is canceled."

Speaker Hartke: "Chair recognizes Mr. Fritchey."

Fritchey: "Thank you, Speaker. For the purpose of an announcement. The Judiciary I-Committee will delay convening from 8 a.m. until 9 a.m. tomorrow."

Speaker Hartke: "Anyone else have an announcement about a committee? If not, again, Representative Lang now moves, allowing perfunctory time for the Clerk, that the House stand adjourned until the hour of 12 noon on Thursday. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'; opposed 'no'. In opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the House stands adjourned."

Clerk Rossi: "House... House Perfunctory Session will come to order. Introduction and First Reading of House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment #17."

BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

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ARTICLE VIII

FINANCE

SECTION 2.

STATE FINANCE

- (a) The Governor shall prepare and submit to the General Assembly, at a time prescribed by law, a state budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The budget shall set forth the estimated balance of funds available for appropriation at the beginning of the fiscal year, the estimated receipts, and a plan for expenditures and obligations during the fiscal year of every department, authority, public corporation and quasi-public corporation of the state, every state college and university, and every other public agency created by the state, but not of units of local government or school districts. The budget shall also set forth the indebtedness and contingent liabilities of the state and such other information as may be required by law. Proposed expenditures shall not exceed funds estimated to be available for the fiscal year as shown in the budget.
- (b) The General Assembly by law shall make appropriations for all expenditures of public funds by the state. Appropriations for a fiscal year shall not exceed funds

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estimated by the General Assembly to be available during that year.

- (c) The aggregate of appropriations for the expenditure of public funds by the state for a fiscal year shall not exceed the aggregate of appropriations for the expenditure of public funds by the state for the preceding fiscal year by more than 3% or if a cost of living index has been designated by law for this purpose, the percentage increase from the previous year in the cost of living based on that index, whichever is less. The General Assembly may exceed the limit on the aggregate appropriations for the expenditure of public funds by the state for a fiscal year only by an affirmative record vote of three-fifths of the Members elected to each House. This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.
