Speaker Madigan: "The Clerk shall take the record. There being 114 Members responding to the Attendance Roll Call, there is a quorum present. Ladies and Gentlemen, if I can have your attention for a few moments. We have distributed a schedule for the month of June and it provides that we shall leave here today and we shall go on a schedule of perfunctory days for the remainder of the month. asking all of you to remain available on a 24-hour basis to notified to come back to Springfield for consideration of an agreement that would relate to the budget and implementation of the budget. So, again, the plan would be to leave here today, and to go on a perfunctory schedule basis, as reflected in the schedule which you have in front of you. Asking everyone to be prepared to come back on a 24-hour notice. But, to consider an agreement that relates to the budget. I... I have spoken this morning with all of the Legislative Leaders and they've all indicated that they are available to meet at any time to consider negotiating positions relative to the budget and implementation of the budget. Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Bost."

Bost: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have a question, I don't know whether it's for the… a question for the Chair or just for the… for the Body. I'd like… and a couple of statements. I'd like to figure out where we are as far as the fact… I know we're… we're gonna work on the budget, and you've said that. But, whenever we have… as of… as of yesterday, five docs that have signed letters of intent that they… they are planning to close their practices. And that's about 5 thousand… 3 thousand patients a piece. And I've got one OBGYN and two regular practitioners and… and one internal medicine doctor and one ears, nose and throat specialist. You know, when already about 35 thousand doctors have… have left the Metro-East area and… and not counting the other docs that are leaving in our area. And I… I know the

budget is important. But, is it our intention to do anything on... on the medical mal prob... mal problem and deal with the concerns that are out there or we just going to say, okay, never mind on that one?"

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Bost, speaking for myself, I'm prepared to continue to work on that problem."

Bost: "Today? Or before we leave?"

Speaker Madigan: "Whenever."

Bost: "I would... I would hope so, Mr. Speaker. I think it's an important enough issue that I... I'd like to see something come to the floor. I'd like to have some negotiations back and forth prior to that so that we can actually really cure this problem that is hitting my area so severely. I know that... that we went through this... this yesterday and I know many Members of your side of the aisle were concerned about it. But it's very difficult to go back and tell the people in our area that, well, they were concerned but then nothing happened. So, if... if we could do something on that I would appreciate the indulgence."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Reitz. Is Mr. Reitz in the chamber? Mr. Clerk, on page 6 of the Calendar, on the Order of Senate Bills-Second Reading, there appears Senate Bill 3197. What is the status of the Bill?"

Clerk Mahoney: "Senate Bill 3197 has been read a second time, previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Reitz, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Reitz."

Reitz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senate Bill 3197 deals with the... the concerns that we had... the state fair had with the Mongo ruling and addresses that to address some of the concerns that the court had in publishing the rules and procedures that they have for the state fair. They recommended that it goes... go to JCAR. This should take... address the concerns that the court had. In addition to that, it also adds... increases the membership on the State Fair Board from 15 to 20 members. This would allow the... the State Fair Board to expand, take in some corporate membership and... and also allow people from other regions to participate in the Du Quoin and the Springfield State Fair. And I'd be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Madigan: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Amendment. The Chair recognizes Mr. Rose."

Rose: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Gentlemen yield?"

Speaker Madigan: "The Sponsor yields."

Rose: "Is this the court case regarding Mongo from the state fair last year?"

Reitz: "This... yeah, this clarifies some of the concerns that the court had in that... it in no way jeopardizes the... the court cast that is, I guess, currently pending on... on Mongo."

Rose: "And in that case, the State lost. At least in trial court, the State lost, correct?"

Reitz: "It's still ongoing, but it's my understanding that, yeah, the first ruling that..."

Rose: "It's on appeal..."

Reitz: "Correct."

Rose: "...I believe."

Reitz: "You know, I... I salute what you're trying to do here, Representative, and I... I think this is well-intentioned, I think we're gonna be voting for this. But at some point in time, we need, as a State, to apologize to that family for what happened to them at the state fair last year and the inappropriate remarks that came out of that. So, thank you."

Reitz: "Appreciate that."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Madigan: "The Sponsor yields."

Black: "Representative, what... what happened to Mongo? Is he available to testify?"

Reitz: "He... there was a witness slip in committee, oral testimony if needed. But apparently the committee didn't see fit to need it, so."

Black: "All right. Hasn't he gone on to that great pasture in the sky?"

Reitz: "I'm... I'm not sure. Maybe..."

Black: "Well, I...."

Reitz: "...that's why he wasn't in committee."

Black: "He did. He did. Which I thought I was strange since I thought we had a moratorium on capital punishment. So..."

Reitz: "On champions, especially, yes."

Black: "Yes. So... so, Mongo isn't available to testify. On... on a serious note. This occurred in Representative Cul... I mean, the family involved lived in Representative Cultra's district and I... I applaud the stand that he took on this and he's been very vocal, and I think rightfully so. The integrity of a young 4-H member was questioned, the family's integrity was questioned, and I... I think it was very unfortunate the way this whole thing was handled. But be that as it may, is it your intent with this Bill to bypass JCAR on rules and regulations that the state fair might want to impose?"

Reitz: "Essentially, yes. The... right now, if... according to the court ruling, they... they recommended that everything go to JCAR. They're trying this... we're trying to... to make sure that we don't make J... the JCAR proceedings more cumbersome. There's over 15 thousand, I believe, 15 thousand different contests and fees and they don't want to burden JCAR with that. They want to continue to do things as they've been doing it. All this really does is... is to say that the rules... clarify that the rules will be published and available to everyone so that we don't run into another problem like we did there where there was uncertainty over the... the rules that were in place."

Black: "But, as I understand it, these rules will now be promulgated by the Department of Agriculture and not be subject to review by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. Is... is that..."

Reitz: "They never have been."

Black: "...standard practice?"

- Reitz: "Right. That's... that's the way it's always been. They... what this... what this is trying to do is to clarify the language. The way the... the court interpreted the language is that... the way we had it written in current law is that they probably should have went through JCAR. This is trying to clarify the language to make sure that we do it as we've done it for the last hundred years... one hundred and fifty two years."
- Black: "So, under a... under a certain scenario then the Department of Agriculture could promulgate a rule, their own rule, without review by any legislative body and could conceivably even increase fees to exhibitors or vendors."
- Reitz: "It... this... it's... it's not an administrative rule. It doesn't apply to regulatory. It's just for contests. It strictly is for the contests that they run every year."
- Black: "But, as I understand this would not this allow the Department of Agriculture to also then have the authority to perhaps raise entry fees for contestants or fees... increase fees for vendors who want to sell a product at the state fair or any exposition held under the aegis of the Department of Agriculture at the State Fairgrounds?"
- Reitz: "Right. And they... they can currently do that. We're not changing that in anyway with this... with this law. We're just clarifying that they will publish whatever fees are out there to make sure that there's... there's a better explanation for the public. This... there's nothing in this

that changes the ability of the state fair to... to set any type of fees or regulations on contests."

Black: "Okay. Well, Representative, the fee structure without any legislative input... it... it's not a major concern to me, they're gonna be reasonable fees, of that I'm... I'm fairly certain. But, well, you know, I'm sure there'll be other questions. But I would like to publicly acknowledge it's good to see Mr. Kolaz back on your staff. He'll be a welcome addition."

Reitz: "Yes, it is."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Cultra."

Cultra: "To the Bill. This... really all this Bill does is codify the standard practice that's been in place for many years at the state fair. And I would recommend an 'aye' vote. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "The question is, 'Shall the Amendment be adopted?' Those in favor say 'yes'; those opposed say 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk Mahoney: "No further Amendments. But a fiscal note has been requested and not yet received."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Reitz, there's been a request for a fiscal note. The Bill should remain on the Order of Second Reading. Mr. McCarthy. Mr. McCarthy. On page 14 of the Calendar, on the Order of Resolutions, there appears House Resolution 1022. Mr. McCarthy."

McCarthy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Resolution 1022 is a... a first for me

since... in my 8 years here. It's actually a Committee Resolution, which is why it doesn't list me as the Sponsor. But as chairman of the committee, I will present it. Through Leadership we decided to do it this way. And I will tell you that 12 out of the 13 people on the committee did support the Resolution. So, that... I don't wanna intend by my remarks in calling it a Committee Resolution that it is supported by all... all of the Members. And... but it basically calls for the extension of I-355 South. you who are familiar with the transportation problems up in the Northeast section of our state understand that this is a proposal that has been on the drawing board for probably 20 years. Ι think Representative Hassert Representative McGuire were two of the Sponsors of the original Resolution calling for the construction of this much needed road. It also calls for the construction and the improvements that have been designated by the Toll Highway Authority for 294 going from 95th Street out to I-80. And it also talks about the need for a stronger consensus on the travel needs in Lake County, including the funding and construction of the extension of Route 53. I think that any of you have traveled across the country have seen that most of the major cities in our state... in our country have two or three loops that surround their... their major city in order to keep people out of those cities, keep the smog down, keep the pollution down. And we need to complete this vital link of transportation across our state so that people who don't need to be in the immediate

Chicago area won't be in that area. I... I think it's a great idea that we appointed this special committee. And I was proud to be the chairman of it. And I'm glad we came forward at this time with this Resolution. I will state that other Resolutions may come out of this committee in the future. But this is our first Resolution and I'm proud to be the Sponsor of the... the Committee Resolution. So, I would entertain any questions that the Body would have."

Speaker Madigan: "Representative Kosel. Kosel. Mr. Mathias."

Mathias: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And I want to thank the chairman and the Members of the committee. meetings throughout the tollway area and I want to thank everyone for those of you who could attend the various meetings to get the input from the various local officials and residents of... of the area as to improvements to the tollway system. And I just want to make sure even though on the board it... it only mentions 294 and 355, as the chairman spoke he also stated that the Resolution does include the construction and funding requests for the extension of Route 53 into Lake County, which is a much needed improvement just as all of the improvements mentioned in this Resolution are much needed. And are needed as a group so that we have a solid system that makes sense. And just as it makes sense to extend the south end to meet Route 80, it also makes sense to extend the north end so that it'll also meet the tollway and be able to go into McHenry County where their transportation needs... also call for a major highway. So, again, I wanna thank the

Sponsor and look forward to the toll... working with the toll highway system so that they will implement the improvements that are called for in this Resolution. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "Representative May."

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. Since I was a Member of the Toll Highway Committee and this is a Committee Amendment, I guess at this point I'd just like to present a minority opinion. I have been a critic of the tollway in the past and they have made many reforms. But, I believe this... this Resolution here does not go far enough. It doesn't address the quality of life issues. It seems that we are asking for an expansion of the Toll Authority, which could be millions, billions of dollars and it would lead to a toll increase. Think it needs to be a little more comprehensive. I did ask for an Amendment to it and was told it would have to be a trailer. But I just want to put into the record that we had hearings in Rockford to talk about an entrance and exit ramp there, a booth there that I think isn't addressed. We talked about quality of life issues right along 294. This is a section of the highway that pays for itself. It needs repair, it needs buffering to protect the quality of life for the citizens in that I fear that if we go ahead without... and recommend this without knowing the true cost, it truly will be a toll increase and affect the quality of life in other areas. And that part was ignored. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "Representative Kosel."

Kosel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

McCarthy: "Yes."

Kosel: "I'd like to thank you for your hard work on this. As it's been stated before, 355 South is a major concern. The proposed road would end in my district and I must tell you that there is no question that is asked more than what the future or 355 is. More than property tax relief, more than schools. This particular project is so needed in the area to move traffic north and south. It is... it is something that is desperately overdue and I commend both the Sponsor of the Resolution and the Speaker for his work on this. And hopefully, we will see some resolution. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Rose."

Rose: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield? Mr...

Representative McCarthy, have any of the civil engineers at the University of Illinois looked at your highway specifications on your proposal here?"

McCarthy: "Yeah, I... I think that the assistant to the Minority Leader, Representative Hassert, would probably have a more exact answer to that. But, I'm sure the fine engineers at our premier university would be more than willing to endorse this worthwhile project."

Rose: "Very good, Representative. I look forward to voting for it."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Sullivan."

Sullivan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I would request a Roll Call vote on this, please. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "There's been a request for a Roll Call vote.

And Mr. McCarthy to close."

So, I would ask for your favorable consideration of House Resolution 1022."
- Speaker Madigan: "Question is, 'Shall the House adopt House Resolution 1022?' Those in favor signify by voting 'yes'; those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Has Mr. Franks voted? Mr. Osterman. Has Mr. Osterman voted? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question, there are 103 voting 'yes', 7 voting 'no'. The House does adopt House Resolution 1022. Davis, W.: "Well, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Turner: "She indicates she will."

Davis, W.: "Very quickly. I notice that this Resolution specifically identifies women. Is there something that exists for elimination of all forms of discrimination, period, against everybody?"

Hamos: "You know, I think that's a very interesting point, Representative Davis, and I would certainly support that. This was introduced back in 1979 by then President Jimmy Carter. And I can only guess that at that point the status and rights of women, not only in this nation but around the world, were... were being strongly promoted. So, I think that's why this became a discrimi... a treaty on discrimination against women. But I do also want to point out that even today, 24 years later, the problems of international trafficking of women, the problems of some of the dowry burnings in... that we hear about, there are unique problems to this day with domestic violence and slavery and trafficking and health. So... and even independence. So, I

Thank you."

Dextromethorphan in powder form is available on the Internet. In fact, up until the deaths in my district it ... you could purchase it on e-Bay in powdered form. This is bad, bad stuff. Unfortunately, state is actually preempted under Federal Statute from regulating dextromethorphan. What we're asking the state to do here is not just study it, but to talk to the Federal Government about the possibility of allowing the State of Illinois an exemption to regulate the dex... the use of dextromethorphan. At a minimum... at a minimum, the stuff that's being sold on the Internet has to It's killing people and it's gonna kill more people. And God forbid it hit someone in your district and a family in your district has to go through what families in my district and Representative Brady's district have

Brauer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I, like Mitchell, also want to set the record straight. We've had a series of meetings with all the players, this was done over a period of probably 12 months, and I guess I'm a little upset when a Representative doesn't even contact me and then tries to

establish what's good for my district. I think this is wrong and I think it's a bad precedence (sic-precedent)."

Speaker Turner: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lang, for what reason do you rise?"

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. I see nothing wrong with this Resolution except that I'm not yet sold on the Lincoln part of this Resolution. chaired the House Mental Health Committee, which we used to have, I had extensive hearings on the issue of Lincoln. And I can tell you that while there are those that wanted to close Lincoln, there were quite a few people that thought that this facility could be made into a model facility. In fact, shortly before things went downhill there, Lincoln was one of the more accredited, highestranking facilities in Illinois and, in fact, in the whole region. And so it could be again. And so, while I support much of what's in the Representative's Resolution, I cannot support without more information the notion that we should be telling the Governor to shut down this facility. I don't think we've heard quite enough about it yet. At least recently, the hearings I conducted were a few years ago. If the Representative would take Lincoln out of this I'd be for it, but without that I'm gonna be voting 'no' on the Resolution."

Speaker Turner: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Mulligan, for what reason do you rise?"

Mulligan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think several years ago we tried to keep Lincoln open, but at the present time

we're mowing grass and doing things to the tune of a million dollars. The staff has mostly moved away from way we there and the deal with individuals developmental disabilities has changed quite a bit over the years. The money should follow the client. I think if there was some way to move this forward, that that might be feasible. this point, we are spending a lot of money to just take care of that property. And I think what happened in Human Service Appropriation when we asked the department and looked at how many dollars were being set aside to just mow grass and keep the property open without moving, we felt there were better ways to spend the Unfortunately, that may not be the same kind of facility it is now. There are other proposals out there. currently floating around is to do a residential facility such as New Hope at Rantoul. So, I think there are other ways of looking at this. But I think it's inappropriate for the state, in this budget crisis, to spend that kind of money to mow the grass and keep the place open on the hope that perhaps we're gonna reinstitute that facility, which

doesn't appear to be happening. So, I think the Resolution, as brought by Representative Feigenholtz who's the Chair of the committee, with the feeling that either we do something strategically or we stop spending the terrible amount of money that it's costing us just to keep the upkeep of the place."

Speaker Turner: "The Gentleman from Fayette, Representative Stephens, for what reason do you rise?"

Stephens: "Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Turner: "She indicates she will."

Stephens: "Representative, there is a physical plant here, right? We're talking about buildings and acres of yards and fields and..."

Feigenholtz: "Hundred and three acres, Representative Stephens."

Stephens: "And if the State of Illinois spends no money, we still own the property?"

Feigenholtz: "Yes, we do."

Stephens: "What... what do you suggest? We just let it crumble?"

Feigenholtz: "Well, I'll tell you what I suggest, and I'm glad you asked. Is that actually I think that what we need to do is stop worrying about the land that this property is sitting on. And I think what we really need to focus are the 40 families that are still involved that need state assistance."

Stephens: "Well, I... I'm concern... we are concerned about them, but that's a separate issue. I want to know..."

Feigenholtz: "No, that's the main issue, Representative."

Stephens: "...are we just going to just let these buildings crumble? How about all the tax dollars, all the tax... all the energy that we put into this? The reason I'm asking is, the Governor's now talking about closing other facilities around that state. In his... in his wisdom... for instance, Vandalia. We noticed that he wanted to close the Vandalia Correctional Center. And he said in his budget address, 'Well, we'll close it and the \$32 million we spent last year will just... it will save it all.' That's what... Governor, what are going to do with the buildings? He said, 'Well, we're going to board them up.' Well, do you have any money in the budget for that? No."

Feigenholtz: "Representative, there's...."

Stephens: "Do we have any money in the budget to maintain this facility? Do you... do you expect... what if we have a need for it later in the year?"

Feigenholtz: "It depends which budget you're..."

Stephens: "How about next year?"

Feigenholtz: "...talking about."

Stephens: "Excuse me?"

Feigenholtz: "It depends which budget you're talking about."

Stephens: "Well, we're not getting much help..."

Feigenholtz: "Right now...."

Stephens: "...from the second floor on any budgets are we?

Probably you and I find some agreement there. I just
think... Representative, I understand what you're... the
message you're tying to send, but I... I think there are
unintended consequences, even message wise. And if we're

talking about just letting this facility crumble and fall apart, that serves no public good."

"Representative Stephens, I respect what you're Feigenholtz: I, however, would like to respond in that right saying. now on a... the nation... the whole nation is looking at the State of Illinois and what it is we're intending to do with Lincoln Developmental Center. And I... I encourage my colleagues to read this Resolution. We are at a very critical point right now in our budget situations and also in a very critical point in how we speak to... how we invest people living with dollars for developmental What I've seen so far and what the advocates disabilities. have seen so far have not really included the 40 families and their input. Most of the discussion has been around the land and the property. What I'm trying to do in this... in this Resolution is get people to start thinking about those 40 individuals and what the needs of those forty individuals are and where they want to live."

Stephens: "Well, Representative, I'm not opposed to that. And we... we stand in support of making sure that those families... those 40 individuals receive the sort of care and understanding and reach the potential that... in their life that all of us deserve. And... and you know that... and you and I have worked on issues, for instance, for families of autistic children. We are not about... I... I am opposed to your Resolution, but we're not about abandoning anyone here in the State of Illinois that needs us. That's not what

this is about. That's not what our opposition is about. My opposition..."

Feigenholtz: "Well, what... what is it about, Representative?"

Stephens: "Well, you know what, the State of Illinois has made a commitment to that facility. And if we follow the... the dictates of your Resolution as I understand it, and correct me if I'm wrong, but we're going to spend no dollars, no dollars maintaining what might otherwise be an institution that could be reopened some day in the future, or at the very worst... at the very best we're going to lose value in that property. And that should be a separate issue from supporting those 40 individuals that you reference. That's what I'm saying. That they... that they should not be tied together. That's all. Thank you."

Feigenholtz: Well, Representative, I appreciate your comments. I don't know that there are very many people in this chamber looking forward to opening institutions in the State of Illinois. I think what people in this chamber do, especially in the Appropriations-Human Services Committee, is they concern themselves more about person-based planning, which is actually already being done in most states in the country. And Illinois is struggling to get on that list. When you talk about the property, there's also discussion about building a golf course on this property. And I will tell you, when it comes to spending capital dollars in the State of Illinois, I don't know about you, but I don't wanna be voting for a golf course. I would rather take that money and give it these families

and give it to these people so they can live lives of dignity. So, that we... they can chose their services. They could actually buy their services with these dollars instead of us build... putting money into this 'white elephant'. I think that we could make these people's lives wonderful with less than half the money. And all this Resolution is doing is essentially saying, let's stop and talk to these people and see what they need and make this person-centered planning instead of funding a piece of land with a golf course on it."

Speaker Turner: "A Roll Call has been requested. The Lady moves for the adoption of House Resolution 1007. All those in favor should vote 'aye'; all those opposed vote 'no'. The voting is now open. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question, there are 75 voting 'yes', 34 voting 'no'. And the Resolution is adopted. On the Order of Resolutions, we have House Resolution 1008. Representative P.... We're at Resolution 1010, Representative Dunn."

- Winters: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Resolution would ask that if the… in the unlikely case that a riverboat be sited in Winnebago County in Rockford, that it… the city where it is hosted would enter into agreements with other municipalities in the county to share the revenue. Be happy to answer any questions."
- Speaker Turner: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Resolution 1038. All those in favor should say 'aye'; all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, is the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 1028. Representative Giles."
- Giles: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House... Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Resolution 1028 merely addresses the issue of... one of the issues of childhood obesity and diabetes and... and the reference of physical education. This Resolution is to urge the... and encourage the General Assembly to end the practicing of granting P.E. waivers, physical education waivers. Now, as we talked about in committee, there are certain circumstances in which P.E. waivers... there's dire situations in which P.E. waivers have been granted and... and... and maybe should continue to be

The physical education, what it does is simply lets that individual know that that the body needs activity. And because certain students do not have the opportunity for physical education, especially in our schools where there are some

You said that some schools are... are coming in and... and asking for waivers because they don't have the facilities, but then you talked about the House of Representatives and what you feel is a limited scope of input in the process of granting the waivers. So, do we have an answer if the... if the school does not have the facility, what do we do then?"

Giles: "Well, in most cases, Representative, there's been various waivers. For instance, the State Board of Education will... will recommend a particular waiver to be approved or disapproved.
