4/17/2015

Speaker Lang: "It is 9:03, good morning. The House will be in order. Members will be in their chairs. We shall be led in prayer today by Pastor H. B. Sunny Mooney who is with Dayton Avenue Baptist Church in Peoria. Pastor Mooney is the guest of Representative Gordon-Booth. Members and guests are asked to refrain from starting their laptops, turn off cell phones and rise for the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. Pastor Mooney."

Pastor Mooney: "Good morning. It's an honor to be here with you to lead the Session in prayer. Let me just explain why. Sixty-two days ago I had a widow-maker heart attack. The right people at the right place in the right time were provided so that a medical miracle might happen. After arriving to the ER, 40 minutes later I had three stents put in. Forty-eight hours later, my doctor sent me home. I'm allergic to basketball. Yes, he is great. The good news is I played basketball yesterday with the same man that had prayed over me as I was laying there without a pulse. So, it is my privilege. Would you pray with me, please? Dear Heavenly Father, Your word admonishes Your followers to pray to intercede and to give thanks for those in authority. So, I ask You, Lord, to grant Your favor upon these men and these women. They've been placed in offices to establish legislation that will benefit the citizens of this grand state. So, Lord, I thank You for them just as the wisest King Iniquity begged You for wisdom. Lord, please provide them with discernment from on high. Please give them benevolent care for all. Let their labors this day be selfless so that their families and friends and communities might remember

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them and honor them for their sacrifice and service. Lord, we respect that these men and women come from various religious social and demographic backgrounds, but Your word tells me we've all been fashioned in Your likeness. So, according to my faith, I intercede for them. And in the name of my Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, I lifted my prayers for these gathered this new day, Amen."

Speaker Lang: "Be led in the Pledge by Representative Soto."

Soto - et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Lang: "Roll Call for Attendance. Leader Mautino from the Democratic side."

Mautino: "Thank you, Speaker. Excused absences for today: Representatives Acevedo, Arroyo, Crespo, Currie, Golar, Gordon, Jones, Riley, Zalewski and Hernandez."

Speaker Lang: "Really. Mr. Brown."

Brown: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please let the record show that Reps Pritchard and Keith Wheeler are excused today. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Clerk, take the record. We have 105 Members present and we do have a quorum. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "Committee Reports. Representative Barbara Flynn Currie, Chairperson from the Committee on Rules reports the following committee action taken on April 17, 2015: recommends be adopted, referred to the floor is Floor Amendment #2 to House Resolution 324. Representative Burke... Daniel Burke, Chairperson from the Committee on the Executive

Representative Hammond may want to remind me about that later. We're going to start with Second Readings. The first Bill is House Bill 1382, Mr. Bradley. Out of the record. House Bill 1081, Mr. D'Amico. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1081, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative D'Amico, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. D'Amico."

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D'Amico: "I just wish to adopt the Amendment, move it to Third."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3669, Representative Bourne. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3669, a Bill for an Act concerning wi... wildlife. This Bill was read a second time on a previous day. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Davidsmeyer, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Davidsmeyer on the Amendment."

Davidsmeyer: "This Amendment just adds a couple of words requested by the Department of Natural Resources. It doesn't change the intent of the Bill. It doesn't change anything, just clarifies a couple things."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3664, Mr. Davidsmeyer. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3664, a Bill for an Act concerning local government. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendments 1 and 2 have been approved for consideration. Floor Amendment #1 is offered by Representative Davidsmeyer."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Davidsmeyer."

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Daidsmeyer: "House Floor Amendment 1 actually is the original intent of the Bill. It takes Quarry Township out and leaves the Village of Godfrey in. And I move for its..."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "Floor Amendment #2 is offered by Representative Daidsmeyer and has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Daidsmeyer."

Daidsmeyer: "House Floor Amendment 2 was a request from the Port District to allow them to use certain tax incentives with regards to foreign trade zones which they are receiving on the Missouri side of the Mississippi and this is a... I move for its passage."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 2658, Mr. Daidsmeyer. Stay standing, Sir. Out of the record. House Bill 1004, Mr. Ford. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1004, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Ford, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Ford."

Ford: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I move for the adoption of House Floor Amendment #2. And what it

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simply does is extends the... well, it changes the underlying purpose of the Bill."

Speaker Lang: "To do what, Sir?"

Ford: "And it will extend the African-American Response Act by 10 years. And it makes it easier for individuals to receive HIV testing in health care settings."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 229, Mr. Franks. Mr. Franks. Out of the record. House Bill 3528, Representative Hernandez. Representative Hernandez. Out of the record. House Bill 4130, Mr. Mautino. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4130, a Bill for an Act concerning the land. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 4018, Mr. Mautino. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4018, a Bill for an Act concerning liquor. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3819, Mr. Phillips. Out of the record. House Bill 2636, Mr. Sandack. Out of the record. House Bill 3504, Mr. Sims. Out of the record. House Bill 1453, Mr. Walsh. Out of the record. House Bill 14... Excuse me. House Bill 1646, Mr. Sosnowski. Mr. Sosnowski. Out of the

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record. House Bill 2657, Representative Winger. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2657, a Bill for an Act concerning education. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. Ladies and Gentlemen, moving to Third Reading Roll Calls, Third Reading Roll Calls. First Bill is House Bill 642, Representative Chapa LaVia. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 642, a Bill for an Act concerning finance. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Chapa LaVia."

Chapa LaVia: "You look... you look exceptionally handsome today, Speaker. I'm just saying. Thank you... thank you, Members of this amazing House on this great day. This is a piece of legislation that's long overdue. What it does is creates a commission for women in business to make sure we're doing the right thing to encourage them to go further, hit those million dollar marks. And I ask for its favorable passage."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? It's Friday, boys and girls. Mr. Leitch. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3745 (sic-3749), Representative Bourne. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3749, a Bill for an Act concerning fish. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Bourne."

Bourne: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill creates a 50 percent discount for resident veterans on lifetime hunting, fishing, or combination sports licenses."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Chapa LaVia, Moylan. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1744, Mr. Cavaletto. Mr. Cavaletto. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1744, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Cavaletto."

Cavaletto: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 1744 authorizes the Department of Agriculture, on behalf of the State of Illinois and Department of Agriculture, to convey the state-owned property of the Centralia Animal Disease Laboratory to Kaskaskia College for \$1. I ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 4025, Representative Conroy. Out of the record. House Bill 4113, Representative Costello. Please read the Bill."



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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4113, a Bill for an Act concerning education. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Costello."

Costello: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House Bill 4113 does two things. It allows a college newspaper to procure printing services from the university's hometown newspaper. And it also allows both student members of Southern Illinois University Board of Trustees to be voting members. I thank you. And I ask for your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please record yourselves. Anthony, Cabello, Phillips, Unes. Please take the record. On this question, there are 81 voting 'yes', 24 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3306, Leader Durkin to be handled by Leader Bellock I'm told. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3306, a Bill for an Act concerning public aid. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Leader Bellock."

Bellock: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3306 provides that the Department of Healthcare and Family Service shall submit a... the following information in their yearly report to the General Assembly. And it will include data regarding the total numbers enrolled in the Medicaid Assistance program and the total numbers of enrollees in coordinated care. And it shall be broken down by age and the type of coordinated care the individuals are enrolled in."

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Speaker Lang: "Lady moves for the passage of the Bill. Those in favor of the Bill vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Poe, Stewart, Wallace. Please take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. The Chair recognizes Mr. Poe. The Gentleman does not wish to speak? Gentleman does not wish to speak. House Bill 3897, Mr. Hays. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3897, a Bill for an Act concerning education. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Hays."

Hays: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3897 allows the student member who is part of a 10-person Student Assistance Commission to receive a scholarship or grant in the accordance of the Higher Education Student Assistance Act. Amendment 1 also suggests that the Amend.. the student will not receive any special consideration for MAP grants simply that he or she would be eligible."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Butler, Hammond, Sullivan, Tryon. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 4074, Mr. D'Amico. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4074, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. D'Amico."

D'Amico: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. What House Bill... Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 4074 would allow you to apply for your driver's license here in Illinois, if you became a resident for 10 years, if it was revoked in another state. I'll answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 104 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2542, Representative Monique Davis. Please... Out of the record. House Bill 3101, Mr. Evans. Mr. Evans. Out of the record. House Bill 3237, Representative Feigenholtz. Please read the Bill. My understanding is this Bill has an Amendment. Mr. Clerk, please put this Bill on the Order of Second Reading and please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3237, a Bill for an Act concerning liquor. This Bill was read a second time on a previous day. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Feigenholtz, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Feigenholtz."

Feigenholtz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is a technical Amendment of sorts. It combines a couple of issues and clarifies the TTB requirements."

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Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 2788, Representative Fine. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2788, a Bill for an Act concerning insurance. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Fine."

Fine: "Thank you. HB2788 will amend the Managed Care Reform and Patient Rights Act to include an Illinois company, the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care, to the list of associations that are available to accreditate organizations in ambulatory health care settings. There's no known opposition to this Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2462, Mr. Harris. Greg Harris. Out of the record. House Bill 1493, Representative Lilly. Representative Lilly. Out of the record. House Bill 1660, Mr. McAuliffe. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1660, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. McAuliffe."

McAuliffe: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1660 would let the hepatitis C task force

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go for another year. It's expiring January 2016. This'll extend it to 20... January 2017. Be happy to answer any questions and ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Chapa LaVia, Bourne. Chapa LaVia. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 4038, Mr. Moylan. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4038, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Moylan."

Moylan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill states that if you're a convicted felon, you're not required.. or cannot apply for a state plate."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Will the speaker yield?"

Speaker Lang: "He will."

Sandack: "Marty, is there... was there a problem with a former Member convicted of a felony trying to get state plates?"

Moylan: "I'd like to move forward and talk about the future."

Sandack: "All right. So, you want to make sure it doesn't happen moving ahead?"

Moylan: "Correct."

Sandack: "We don't want anyone that's been convicted running around with state plates. I think that's a grand idea. Thank you."

Moylan: "Thank you very much."

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Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Cavaletto, Mayfield, McAuliffe, Wehrli. Cavaletto, Mayfield. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3848, Representative Mussman. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3848, a Bill for an Act concerning public health. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Mussman."

Mussman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill amends the Sexual Assault Survivors Emergency Treatment Act. According to the federal Violence Against Women Act, no victim, regardless of their income level, should be forced to pay the cost of their own rape kit forensic exam or any other outpatient services occurred as the result of the assault. This Bill clarifies the billing protocol for service providers to ensure that survivors do not receive a bill by mistake and that they do accurately and consistently receive a voucher that they are entitled to for follow-up care. This Bill is negotiated language with the Hospital Association. I'm aware of no opposition. And I'm happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Breen, McAuliffe, Wehrli. McAuliffe, Wehrli. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby

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declared passed. House Bill 4122, Representative Nekritz.  
Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4122, a Bill for an Act concerning  
safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Nekritz."

Nekritz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is an initiative of the...  
the Illinois EPA. As impossible as it seems to believe, the  
Congress actually passed some legislation last fall, the  
Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014, that  
expanded some op... the kinds of projects that are available  
for the state's revolving loan finance... fund financing. So,  
what this Bill does is expand our statute so that we can take  
advantage of the projects that were authorized under the  
federal Act that was adopted last fall."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes';  
opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please  
record yourselves, Members. Beiser, D'Amico, McAuliffe, Rita,  
Wehrli. Please take the record. On this question, there are  
105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having  
received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared  
passed. House Bill 1380, Mr. Phelps. Mr. Phelps. Out of the  
record. House Bill 3765, Representative Scherer. Please read...  
Out of the record. House Bill 3429, Representative Sente.  
Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3429, a Bill for an Act concerning  
business. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Sente."

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Sente: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3429 allows for interstate equity crowdfunding. Today's startup and growing businesses can raise funds via the Internet, but they cannot sell shares. So, with this Bill entrepreneurs are being empowered to be able to sell shares to businesses that are interested and we can find another way to allow... and we can allow another way for entrepreneurs to get capital and succeed in their businesses. So... so, to the specifics of the Bill. This Bill allows an entrepreneur to raise up to \$4 million with audited financials. And it allows an investor... a nonaccredited investor the ability to invest \$5 thousand in a business. I ask for your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Demmer."

Demmer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. To the Bill. I'd just like to commend the Sponsor for bringing this legislation. I know she and I have worked on this and several others in the General Assembly have shown support for this measure. This is a great example of a way that we can use new technology, new ways of doing business to support entrepreneurs and small business owners in Illinois. Previously in order to have these generally advertised sale you had to go through quite a bit of paperwork, quite a bit of red tape. This simplifies that process, helps put money in the hands of people who have an idea to build an economy and to add jobs and to really contribute positively to the society. I commend the Sponsor and I strongly urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Brady, McAuliffe. Please take the record. On



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this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3428, Representative Sente. Two in a row. Please read the Bill. I understand this Bill has an Amendment, Representative? So, Mr. Clerk, please put this Bill on the Order of Second Reading and read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3428, a Bill for an Act concerning education. This Bill was read a second time on a previous day. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Sente, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Sente."

Sente: "Thank you. This legislative idea was brought to me by high school students from Stevenson High School in Lincolnshire, Illinois, some of the best and brightest students. They and other students around Illinois are self-motivated go-getters and they're challenging themselves by taking AP, advanced placement, classes and tests to be college ready. They're taking a rigorous and heavy classwork load studying for an AP exam, getting a grade of a 3, 4 or 5 which is equivalent to an A, B or a C on an exam and then potentially they're hearing that their efforts and their score may not be considered at an Illinois public university or community college. And even worse than that, they're being..."

Speaker Lang: "Representative... Representative, this is the Amendment. It sounds like you're making a Third Reading argument. Could you just briefly tell us what the Amendment does? We'll give you time for that on Third Reading."

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Sente: "Sorry. So, the Amendment speaks to specifically allowing a grade of a 3, 4 or 5 to be accepted as general education credit if applicable or an elective and also creates the.. the Illinois Articulation Initiative to have a chance to code and review all 36 AP classes."

Speaker Lang: "Lady moves for the adoption of the Amendment. Representative Ives is recognized on the Amendment."

Ives: "I apologize, Speaker. I'll debate this on Third Reading."

Speaker Lang: "Thank you. Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 1014, Mr. Smiddy. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1014, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Smiddy."

Smiddy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1014 amends the Environmental Protection Act. This legislation would allow Whiteside County, which is in my district, to accept special waste at their landfill upon approval from the EPA. I would ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Ammons, Chapa LaVia, Drury, Franks, Ives, Sommer. Mr. Franks, Mr. Sommer. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 101 voting 'yes' and 2 voting 'present'. And this Bill, having

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received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. The Chair recognizes Mr. Demmer."

Demmer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A point of personal privilege."

Speaker Lang: "Proceed, Sir."

Demmer: "I'd like to welcome today the fourth-grade class from Central School in Rochelle, in my district, down here visiting the Capitol today. Let's give them a warm Springfield welcome."

Speaker Lang: "Happy you're with us today. Thank you for being here. Repre... Representative Kifowit."

Kifowit: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A point of personal privilege."

Speaker Lang: "Proceed."

Kifowit: "It is... it is with deep sadness that I... I want to bring attention to an individual Marine sniper from Glendale Heights that, on Tuesday, took his own life because he suffers from PTSD and had multiple tours in Iraq. And I just want to bring it to the attention of the Body that this is an important issue and I deeply appreciate the support they gave for the task force. And I ask for a moment of silence. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Thank you, Representative. House Bill 2823, Mr. Stewart. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2823, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Stewart."

Stewart: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House Bill 2823 is an IEMA agency initiative that amends the Radon Industry Licensing Act. It permits them to have subpoena

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power. I'd... Available for any questions and appreciate your  
'aye' support."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Franks: "Presently, Representative, does IEMA have subpoena  
powers?"

Stewart: "Yes. They have subpoena power over those that are  
currently licensed under the Act. They do not have subpoena  
power over those that are not licensed under the Act."

Franks: "Okay. So, for those who are licensed under the Radon  
Act, who would... who would that encompass?"

Stewart: "Those that are... those that are licensed. The subpoena  
power that they're asking for is those that are not licensed  
as they investigate complaints against contractors that are  
doing radon mitigation that are not licensed. It would give  
the avail... the ability..."

Franks: "I see."

Stewart: "...to subpoena records and information."

Franks: "Thank you. So, right now, those that are licensed to do  
their thing. There are individual contractors or entities  
that do radon mitigation and they have to be licensed."

Stewart: "Yes, Sir, that's correct."

Franks: "Now, how could someone do radon mitigation if they're  
not licensed?"

Stewart: "Good question, but I'm sure it's probably being done  
which is why IEMA is asking for this subpoena power."

Franks: "Maybe we need to do more, but I think this is a good  
start. Thank you."

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Stewart: "Exactly. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please record yourselves. Guzzardi, Poe, Tabares. Mr. Poe. Please take the record. On this question, there are 104 voting 'yes' and 1 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1665, Mr. Sullivan. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1665, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sullivan."

Sullivan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. What House Bill 1665 attempts to do is codify existing law as it relates to private carriers that are in contract with school districts in transporting students. We have an issue where the insurance companies are trying to treat them at a different standard of care and therefore, increasing liability and costs to the school district. We're just trying to codify existing law. Happy to answer any questions on the Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Burke, Demmer, Hurley. Please take the record. On this question, there are 79 voting 'yes', 26 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2486, Mr. Tryon. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2486, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Tryon."

Tryon: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 2486 is an agreed Bill between the Illinois Department of Public Health, Illinois Stewardship Alliance and the Illinois Environmental Council and meet... It amends the Cottage Food Regulation and Enforcement Act. It exempts baked goods that are baked in home kitchens from having to be done in a home cottage food kitchen if it's going to a fundraiser at a church or a nonprofit organization. It increases the grocery receipt threshold of exempt food from 25 thousand to 36 thousand and allows the department to make rules and implement rules to enforce the Act. If there are any questions, I'd be glad to answer them. Otherwise, I would urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Franks: "Representative, what was the genesis of this Bill?"

Tryon: "Well, the Illinois Stewardship Alliance for the last few years has been active in trying to get consolidation of the Food Code to allow for individuals who own farms to be able to prepare food and sell them on their farm as well as have consistent regulations throughout the state between our hundred health departments."

Franks: "Would there be anything here that would prohibit a county from doing something more stringent because of... as you know, in our home county we've had issues with our health board

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being very, very difficult like on church bake sales and things. And I'd hoped that they would not be able to have the same type of zeal after this... after this Bill passes."

Tryon: "Well, there were members from our health department that were involved in this process so. I think... I don't think that's going... will be a problem. This is not a statewide Code. This amends the Food Code Act. The Public Health Food Act, actually, sets the floor, I mean, instead of a ceiling. But this issue has become statewide and this is... this is the requirements that an individual will have to meet if they want to distribute food to the public."

Franks: "Are there any opponents to this?"

Tryon: "No. It's an agreed Bill."

Franks: "Thank you. I think it's a good start as well."

Tryon: "Right."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Ammons."

Ammons: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Ammons: "Representative Tryon, I just want to clarify that this does not impact local food markets in a negative way. It does not impact local co-ops that provide food at those markets. It doesn't prevent them from doing that."

Tryon: "Absolutely not. They're part of the groups that were seeking this legislation so that there would be consistent interpretation between counties and between different venues that they actually are vending food at."

Ammons: "So, it allows them to do... We had this issue in Champaign County with the health department was trying to prevent them

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from selling at the farmers market unless we had certain regulations on that. But this allows them to be..."

Tryon: "Right."

Ammons: "...able to continue to do that and not eliminate their option."

Tryon: "Exactly. This actually..."

Ammons: "Thank you so much."

Tryon: "...provides... Basically, what this is doing is taking the current law and allowing them to produce more than the \$25 thousand worth of food that they could produce when that law was passed. That was many years ago..."

Ammons: "Okay."

Tryon: "...prices have gone up. So, a person that wants to vend at a... at a farmers market now can have more products that they prepare in their home kitchen."

Ammons: "I appreciate it."

Tryon: "And then, there are some sections that will allow for IDPH to make rules that they can implement on expanding what they can sell at the home... at the farmers market."

Ammons: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Brady, Ford, Sosnowski. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3686, Representative Wallace. Representative Wallace. Out of the record. House Bill 397,



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Mr. Welch. Out of the record. House Bill 3434, Representative Willis. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3434, a Bill for an Act concerning local government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Willis."

Willis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill is actually a very simple... it's a technical Bill regarding the finance reports required by our libraries. What this Bill does, under current law the board of trustees at a local library must submit a report to the Illinois State Library and the city council board of trustees and the board of the town trustees within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year for that city that they are... library is. What this is doing is it's changing the financial requirement so, while they still have to do the reporting, they now have to do it 60 days prior to their annual tax levy. And we set that actually under the Property Tax Code. So, it's 60 days prior to when they have to do the Property Tax Code. I'm open to any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Sandack: "Kathy, this sounds like a sensible timing change, but it's... I don't know... are there three levels of reporting that are required? Is that still the law as you go forward?"

Willis: "Unfortunately, it is."

Sandack: "Shouldn't..."

Willis: "And we're not trying to change that. We're just making it easier for when they report it. So, it makes more sense along with their Tax Code."

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Sandack: "Totally. I think that's a good Bill. I'm going to support your Bill. I think it makes sense to do that before the levy, but it also makes sense to me, and maybe we should work on it soon, to consolidate the reporting and put it online, so that they don't have to have this busy paperwork."

Willis: "I agree with that. And I'll talk to the State Library Association."

Sandack: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Brady, Cavaletto, Flowers, Jackson, Phelps, Verschoore, Wallace. Please take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3533, Representative Wheeler. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3533, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Barbara Wheeler."

Wheeler, B.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this Bill extends the use of the BAIID machine, a breath alcohol ignition interlock device, from one year to five years for people who have two DUI convictions. I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Guzzardi. Please take the record. There are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority,

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is hereby declared passed. Continuing on the Order of Wheeler, House Bill 437. Read the Bill, please."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 437, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Wheeler."

Wheeler, B.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 437 amends the Environmental Protection Act. It does two things. It creates a one-day organic waste collection and 2) it creates a permanent organic waste collection. The first one being and using an example would be a farmers market. The second one being, as a permanent one, would be in a township that already does recycling. I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Kelly Burke. Kelly Burke. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Moving back to the top of these lists to catch up with some people who were not on the floor, House Bill 1382, Mr. Bradley, on the Order of Second Reading. Mr. Bradley. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1382, a Bill for an Act concerning land. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3086, Mr. Bradley. Mr. Bradley. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3086, a Bill for an Act concerning revenue. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #2 was

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adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3655 on Third Reading, Mr. Burke. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3655, a Bill for an Act concerning regulation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Burke."

Burke, D.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would hope that the one that would review this would not think it was a trivial or a casual or a something that was ridiculous when you talk about licensing technicians who apply eyelashes in whatever circumstance. The State of Florida has just recently passed legislation to license and control the activities that are engaged in when individuals apply eyelashes. There have been several instances where young women have done... dealing with a disease, with unfortunate infections and this legislations would ask that those individuals who are engaged in the practice of applying artificial eyelashes be trained and licensed. And I would be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Sandack: "Dan, I'm reading through the analysis and there's... at least my analysis... suggests there's a lot of opponents. Do you know why there are seemingly a good number of opponents to the Bill?"

Burke, D.: "Well, firstly, the Department of Professional Regulation who opposes pretty much every license that's

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proposed in this government. And secondly, the cosmetology industry that for whatever reason I can't understand why they would be opposed because they would be the people engaged in training these individuals to become licensed. So, I frankly, don't understand where their opposition comes from."

Sandack: "Well and thank you for saying that 'cause it causes me pause too that the association that would seemingly be in charge of their members opposes licensure and registration and standards, but apart from that, I also noticed and this is the one that I'd like to talk about, Representative, the Illinois Retail Merchants Association. They seemed to have slipped in in opposition too. Have you had any conversations with them about what their opposition is?"

Burke, D.: "I have not. They did not offer testimony in the committee."

Sandack: "Oh. They just slipped in. They didn't say why."

Burke, D.: "Yes."

Sandack: "All right. And I guess, it'll just take a minute, obviously, there's always going to be an extreme situation where someone gets hurt doing something. Apart from kind of the, I guess, extreme instances, is this an industry that you think really does need and require licensure, registration and kind of the construct of State Government?"

Burke, D.: "Just as in so many other practices or fads or trends, you find that sometimes this is a growing trend. Individuals who had previously operated hair salons now have decided it's such a profitable enterprise that they have converted their business from hair salon to eyelash application. Let me just

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tell you that the average cost for one who receives this treatment is about \$200..."

Sandack: "Oh, wow."

Burke, D.: "...per application and it has to be renewed or refreshed approximately every six weeks."

Sandack: "All right. And last point, it's that obviously this is all news to me. It's interesting and eye-opening. Sorry. Sorry, I couldn't resist. I..."

Burke, D.: "There... we may have an expert in our chamber here."

Sandack: "It's eye-opening and enlightening. Obviously, some in this chamber have a little bit of pause in adding a new, you know, layer of regulation. So, if you could just speak to some of the concern and maybe move away from the thought that this is a revenue generating scheme by the state and I'd be appreciative. And thank you for your answers."

Burke, D.: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Hays."

Hays: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Yes."

Hays: "Representative, my question is more along the lines, the last speaker and myself, are the follicly challenged really qualified to weigh in on this matter?"

Burke, D.: "You might be a good candidate for their activity."

Hays: "I appreciate that. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "That's it, Sir? Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Brady, DeLuca, Jackson, Willis. Please take the record. On this question, there are 63 voting 'yes', 42 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having

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received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. On the Order of Second Reading, House Bill 2502, Mr. Burke. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2502, a Bill for an Act concerning public employee benefits. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #2 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3101, Mr. Evans. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3101, a Bill for an Act concerning business. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Evans."

Evans: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and illustrious Members of this great Body. House Bill 3101 is an initiative of the IBA, Illinois Bankers Association. It addresses two unintended discrepancies to the Illinois and Federal Laws covering high risk and high cost mortgages. The fix in this legislation will help borrowers and lenders decide for the confusion. It encourages lenders to pay third party closing costs on behalf of borrowers. These deals have broad support in the financial industry and there's no opposition. I request your support."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Hammond, Unes. Please take the record. On this question, there are 104 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'present'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. On the Order of Second Reading, House Bill 4096, Representative Feigenholtz. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4096, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Out of the record, Mr. Clerk. House Bill 3592, on the Order of Second Reading, Mr. Morrison. Mr. Morrison. Out of the record. House Bill 3819 on Second Reading, Mr. Phillips. Mr. Phillips. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3819, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #2 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 1646, Mr. Sosnowski. This is on the Order of Second Reading. Out of the record. House Bill 264, Mr. Sosnowski. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 264, a Bill for an Act concerning local government. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Sosnowski, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sosnowski."

Sosnowski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This makes some clarifications to the underlying Bill. And I'd be happy to discuss this further on Third."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Moylan on the Amendment."

Moylan: "Yeah. I'm willing to move the Amendment, but I ask the questions on the Bill."

Speaker Lang: "For Third Reading?"

Moylan: "Yeah."



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Speaker Lang: "Thank you. Those in favor of the Amendment will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. On the Order of Third Reading, House Bill 1380, Mr. Phelps. Out of the record. House Bill 3504, on the Order of Second Reading, Mr. Sims. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3504, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3503, on the Order of Third Reading, Mr. Sims. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3503, a Bill for an Act concerning public aid. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sims."

Sims: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 3503 adds additional data that the Department of Human Services and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services would have to make available in a monthly report regarding Medicaid long-term care eligibility that the department currently posts on its website. The additional information would include any information on denials, appeals, and redeterminations. The intent is a great ray of transparency in regards to long-term care eligibility processing. I know of no opposition. I ask for... answer any questions. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

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Speaker Lang: "Gentleman yields."

Sandack: "Thank you. Elgie, this... it seems like an eminently reasonable and sensible Bill. Where is the reporting going and where is the reporting reporting?"

Sims: "It will be reported on the department's website."

Sandack: "So..."

Sims: "So, all of the information that... that they're receiving will be posted on both of the Department of Human Services website and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services website."

Sandack: "And of course, it's not going to violate any HIPAA Act..."

Sims: "No."

Sandack: "...anything like that. It's just going to talk about..."

Sims: "It's all information related to denials, appeals, and redeterminations. No confidential information at all."

Sandack: "Very good. Thank you."

Sims: "Thank you, Mr..."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Gentleman yields."

Franks: "Representative, I'm not sure what this Bill does. It... I'm reading the analysis and just want to make sure. Can you explain what this Bill does?"

Sims: "As I said, Representative, it allows that additional information on denials, or appeals, or redeterminations that come in from the Department of Human Services and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services will have to be reported on those department's websites."

Franks: "Okay. Thank you. I apologize."

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Sims: "That's all right."

Franks: "I appre... Thank you."

Sims: "Okay. Thanks for the ability to clarify."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Chapa LaVia, Hays, Lilly, Nekritz, Soto, Williams. Nekritz. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3686, Representative Wallace. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3686, a Bill for an Act concerning veterans. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Wallace."

Wallace: "Thank you, Speaker. I rise to ask the chamber to support a program that will create a veterans discount card. It will allow for our servicemen and women to receive discounts throughout the year throughout the state from any number of participating merchants."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill... Excuse me, Mr. Clerk. Mr. Sandack is recognized. The Sponsor yields."

Sandack: "Thank you. My analysis says... maybe this was on the underlying original Bill... that the Department of Veterans' Affairs was an opponent. Has that been... has that opposition been removed?"

Wallace: "To the best of my knowledge, we've come back with an Amendment to work with the Secretary of State rather than the onus being on Veterans' Affairs. The Secretary of State will

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be issuing a new card that designates veterans and so will work in conjunction with that program."

Sandack: "So, that should address the opposition that... to the original Bill?"

Wallace: "Yes."

Sandack: "Thank you, Representative."

Wallace: "Thank you."

On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. On the Order of Second Reading, House Bill 3592, Mr. Morrison. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3592, a Bill for an Act concerning public employee benefits. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. Members, we're moving on to some additional priorities that some of you have given to your respective Leadership. We'll start with Bills on Second Reading. First Bill is House Bill 3573, Representative Ammons. Out of the record. House Bill 3231, Representative Dan Burke. Dan Burke. Mr. Burke. Do you wish to move this Bill, Sir? Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3231, a Bill for an Act concerning animals. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

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Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 4120, Mr. Brady. Mr. Brady. Out of the record. I misread your signal, Sir. Mr. Clerk, please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4120, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments have been approved for consideration. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3404, Representative Chapa LaVia. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3404, a Bill for an Act concerning education. This Bill was read a second time on a previous day. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. A fiscal note has been requested but not filed at this time."

Speaker Lang: "Please hold the Bill on the Order of Second Reading. House Bill 2580, Mr. Costello. Mr. Costello. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2580, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 4049, Mr. Cabello. Mr. Cabello. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4049, a Bill for an Act concerning persons with disabilities. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 2543, Representative Monique Davis. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2543, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Monique Davis, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Davis."

Davis, M.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Floor Amendment #2 provides that the Department of Children and Family Services must also document its efforts to identify, locate and provide notice to an adult grandparent or other adult relative of a child who finds him- or herself in their custody. And we just ask that this Amendment be adopted."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3133, Representative Will Davis. Will Davis, Mr. Davis. Do you wish to move this Bill, Sir? Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3133, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative William Davis, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Davis."

Davis, W.: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I apologize. I wasn't paying attention because I'm walking around in my Big Strike bowling shirt, just trying to set the tone for next week's Diabetes Caucus Fundraiser there. But thank you very

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much, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, the House Amendment #1 is simply to clarify that the fines or sanctions that apply to violations related to the charges of ownership. It also specifies that requests for an appearance before the board must be made within 30 days after receiving a notice that a fine will be imposed. It also clarifies that when a facility becomes compliant with the Act that the fines will no longer accrue and it also technically eliminates duplicative language."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 2669, Mr. Dunkin. Out of the record. House Bill 1119, Mr. Ford. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1119, a Bill for an Act concerning criminal law. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Ford, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Ford."

Ford: "I move to adopt House Floor Amendment #2. What it simply does it guts and replaces the underlying Bill and what it would do is limit the amount of money that the clerk in the Cook County can hold for bail bond."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

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Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3672, Mr. Greg Harris. Representative Greg Harris. Out of the record. House Bill 3896, Representative Hammond. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3896, a Bill for an Act concerning criminal law. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 4007, Mr. Hoffman. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4007, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Hoffman, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Hoffman. Mr. Hoffman on the Amendment."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It's my understanding this is just a technical Amendment that takes care of a EPA issue."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 4115, Representative Jesiel. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4115, a Bill for an Act concerning business. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 2503, Representative Mayfield. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2503, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Second Reading of this House Bill. No



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Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Mayfield, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Mayfield on the Amendment."

Mayfield: "This Amendment is from the Secretary of State's Office. It just makes some technical changes."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3623, Mr. McAuliffe. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3623, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 4089, Representative Moeller. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 4089, a Bill for an Act concerning criminal law. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Moeller, has been approved for consideration."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Moeller."

Moeller: "Floor Amendment #1 simply clarifies the type of information... the specific information that's going to be provided by the county jail, CDHS, when transferring a prisoner from one facility to another."

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Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3217, Mr. Phelps. Mr. Phelps. Out of the record. House Bill 3333, Mr. Rita. Mr. Rita. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3333, a Bill for an Act concerning regulation. Second Reading of this House Bill. No Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3438, Mr. Smiddy. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3438, a Bill for an Act concerning finance. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 2568, Mr. Tryon. Mr. Tryon. Out of the record. House Bill 3687, Representative Wallace. Out of the record. House Bill 242, Representative Willis. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 242, a Bill for an Act concerning criminal law. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendment 1 was adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. Members, we're now moving to Third Reading Roll Call. The first item on this Order is House Bill 1531, Kelly Burke. Out of the record. House Bill 3549, Representative Fine. Out of the record. House Bill 3284, Representative Flowers. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3284, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Flowers."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 3284 creates the Opportunity for At-Risk Women Act which establish a task force to strategize and design a plan for the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to aid in the economic stability of at-risk women and their families. And I'll be more than happy to answer any questions you may have in regards to this legislation."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Chapa LaVia, Evans, Lilly, Manley, Sommer, Tryon. Please record yourselves. Mr. Sommer. Please take the record. On this question, there are 104 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 35... Excuse me. House Bill 3375, Mr. Anthony. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3375, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Anthony."

Anthony: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3375 is an initiative of the Department of Public Health. It simply gives them the... the authority to go after the tattoo shops that are opened up... it got quiet in here... that open up illegally. Any tattoo shops this is where a lot of the people, 15-year-olds and people that are under 18-year-old, will get the illegal

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tattoos. This is also the place where the sex trafficking tattoos are branded on people. So, I request an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Monique Davis."

Davis, M.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Davis, M.: "Do... Representative, do the tattoo artists have to be certified? Do they have to go through any department and pay a fee for registration? "

Anthony: "I'm over here."

Davis, M.: "Oh, there you are. Okay."

Anthony: "Tattoo artists do not have to be licensed, if that's what you're asking, but their business has to be registered."

Davis, M.: "But don't you... Do you think they should be licensed like within a lot..."

Anthony: "Well, I think that's the time for another Bill, if you want to introduce that Bill, but..."

Davis, M.: "Well, it's similar to the fact that we're licensing these people that put your eyelashes on. You know, here we're using an invasive... we're... it's an invasive operation."

Anthony: "Well, if that's something... if that's a Bill you'd like to introduce, by all means have at it."

Davis, M.: "No, I was merely asking if that is what your Bill..."

Anthony: "Well, I voted... I voted 'no' on that Bill actually."

Davis, M.: "You voted 'no' on that Bill, really?"

Anthony: "I did."

Davis, M.: "Okay. So, you're saying that you would like the tattoo artist to... What are you asking?"

Anthony: "What... what this Bill says, right now, the Department of Public Health has no recourse to go after people who open up

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and don't register their businesses with the department... either their local Department of Health or their cities. This Bill gives the Department of Health that ability to go after people, which now currently they do not have."

Davis, M.: "And the only thing you're asking them to do is establish a business license."

Anthony: "That's... that is correct."

Davis, M.: "Okay."

Anthony: "To register their business with the..."

Davis, M.: "To register their business..."

Anthony: "...Illinois Department of Public Health."

Davis, M.: "...but actually, there's nothing in your legislation that protects the health of their clients. Is that correct?"

Anthony: "Well, that's already within the legislation that was passed, I believe, Leader Bellock and those guys passed this Bill a couple years ago."

Davis, M.: "I suggest an 'aye' vote. Thank you."

Anthony: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Bellock."

Bellock: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. To the Bill. I'm pretty sure that a couple of years ago we did do the Bill to license the tattoo parlors because of the endangerment of the blood supply of all the blood donors wanting that. So, we either licensed the tattoo parlors themselves or we licensed the people that actually do the tattoos. I'll look it up. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

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Franks: "Representative, do we have any empirical data of how much DPH has done to regulate those that are already paying these fees?"

Anthony: "Well, in the committee that was actually done and right now, the City of... the City of Champaign actually had, I believe, 35 of these incidents on last year alone."

Franks: "So, did D... was DPH the regulatory body who was overseeing these..."

Anthony: "That is correct."

Franks: "...these alleged infractions?"

Anthony: "Yes."

Franks: "Okay. Do you know... and maybe you don't know... how much money was swept from DPH dealing with tattoo and body art?"

Anthony: "That I do not know, Sir."

Franks: "'Cause I'm just concerned. We had this same issue yesterday. And I'm not sure that we want to continue expanding regulation if we're not going to be regulating those that are actually paying the fees. Because what I don't want to have is really just a backdoor tax increase on individuals by paying a fee and they're not getting any services that they've paid for."

Anthony: "Yeah. But I think the problem with... with this Bill is that, right now the department has no way to come after individuals who are opening up these illegal tattoo parlor shops."

Franks: "Why? Why can't they just close them, if they're illegal? Why can't they just get a... a cease and desist order, if they have not... if they have not got the proper permits? I mean, you can't open a bakery without the proper permit. So, if

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someone opens a store like this, why don't they just shut them down?"

Anthony: "Well, I think that's... that's exactly what they're... You go out to the state, they're trying to do that right now. And you look at it with the... especially the massage parlors and stuff. They can easily pop up."

Franks: "Right."

Anthony: "And that's what's happening throughout this state. Right now, they're popping up everywhere."

Franks: "Right. I've seen them."

Anthony: "And when... when a city... or the Illinois Department of Public Health finds them out, they do start the process, but if they don't register at all, they don't have the ability to go after them and find them. And this Bill will give them that ability."

Franks: "Who would have the ability now? Let's assume someone opens up without the proper business license in whatever municipality. Can the municipality then close them up for not having the proper licensing?"

Anthony: "Normally that's what happens. I believe during the committee the Illinois Department of Public Health stated that the cities can do that. As... in case with the City of Champaign, they were just popping up all over the place and so, the city wasn't able to keep up with the illegal tattoo parlor shops that were popping up."

Franks: "Okay. I understand the issue. I just... I just want to make sure that this will actually solve it and that... that's my concern just because of what we've seen with the... with the fund sweeps, so..."

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Anthony: "Okay."

Franks: "I don't know if you..."

Anthony: "Thank you, Sir."

Franks: "Did you want to say anything else?"

Anthony: "No."

Franks: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Jesiel. Please take the record. On this question, 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3136, Mr. Franks. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3136, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill has been amended and we have... it's now... it has no opponent. And I worked with the Alliance of Automobile Manufacturers. I worked with Google, General Motors and others. And this... and the genesis of this Bill is that we're looking to amend the Vehicle Code because it's clear that soon we're going to have autonomous vehicles. If you've been watching Media, you've seen Mercedes has come out with something soon. Google recently said they anticipate having vehicles ready to be autonomous soon. So, what we... what this Bill will do is to have the Secretary of State conduct a study on the operation of these automated vehicles and produce a report so we'll be prepared to change the laws that may need to be changed in order to make Illinois



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compliant for these autonomous vehicles whether it be standardizing height of some certain signs. And I think it's important that we get in front of the curve. There's a couple other states that have done this. I think it's critically important that Illinois be ready to move on to the next generation of automated vehicles. I'd be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Gentleman yields."

Sandack: "Jack, I had a chance to actually to go to Google and be in a driverless car. So, this... we're kind of behind the curve, believe it or not."

Franks: "Right."

Sandack: "So, I... I think this is a good idea. My only suggestion is, and I don't know if this could be in here or work on the Senate, we ought to be having Google involved in this process..."

Franks: "They are."

Sandack: "Oh, okay. Because the Secretary of State may be overseeing and monitoring it. I can tell you I doubt they have an expertise in the technology with respect to the vehicle, the driverless cars themselves, and what's involved and where they are at. And I know many manufacturers are actually working on a prototype of the... kind of a standard driverless car."

Franks: "You're a hundred percent right and we're... I tell you, we're on the cusp. I just bought a new car and it has the adaptive cruise control, which is amazing. I certainly

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suggest anybody to get that on a new vehicle, if you can.  
It's got the..."

Sandack: "I don't know that we can all afford it. That goes to  
yesterday's discussion."

Franks: "Well, I'm sure it'll be in the next few years it'll be  
a standard on vehicles. And there's a lot of things we're..  
we're moving quickly to the... not necessarily self-driving  
vehicles which there may be. You know, remember when we were  
younger and the Jetsons. They had the four seats and two  
facing forward and two facing backwards. I'm not sure we're  
there yet, but we may be in a few years. But I think you're  
going to see some autonomy with vehicles on... on straight  
roadways and going forward. So, your question of whether  
Google's been involved. I filed the initial Bill. I met with  
Google twice after that. That was... that was the result of  
this Amendment and that they signed off as have the automobile  
manufacturers."

Sandack: "Oh, no, I know they're supportive. I just hope they're  
going to be intimately involved."

Franks: "Oh, they will be very involved, very involved."

Sandack: "Beautiful, perfect. Thank you."

Franks: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed  
'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all  
voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Bellock, Chapa LaVia,  
Nekritz, Sente. Please take the record. On this question,  
there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill,  
having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby

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declared passed. House Bill 1360, Representative Gabel.  
Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1360, a Bill for an Act concerning  
education. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Gabel."

Gabel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 1360 is an agreed upon  
Bill. It ensures that charter schools comply with all non-  
curricular health and safety requirements applicable to  
public schools, pursuant to ISBE promulgation of a list of  
applicable requirements under the laws of the State of  
Illinois. As... there was a report that was published that  
showed that many of the charter schools were not applying any  
of the health guidelines, for example, around concussion or  
around EpiPen use. And after meeting with the  
representatives, they agreed that it was... it's very important  
for the charter schools to... to uphold all the non-curricular  
health guidelines. So, I'm open for any questions and would  
appreciate an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Lady yields."

Sandack: "Robyn... Robyn, maybe it's the original Bill. I have some  
opponents listed. Have all those opponents gone neutral at  
least?"

Gabel: "Yes, yes."

Sandack: "So, the Governor's Office, the Illinois Network of  
Charter Schools, Stand for Children and the Civic Committee  
of the Commercial Club of Chicago are no longer opposing this  
legislation?"

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Gabel: "I have... I don't know of any opponents at this time."

Sandack: "Artful. Thank you, Robyn."

Gabel: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Batinick, Kifowit. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 94 voting 'yes', 9 voting 'no', 1 voting 'present'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3747, Mr. Breen. Mr. Breen. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 3747, a Bill for an Act concerning local government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Breen."

Breen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill is a Bill to dissolve an extra layer of government that we had in DuPage County. We apparently had a county fair just like everyone else and then we had an extra authority created on top of the county fair merely as a pass-through for the regular state funding that everyone gets for the county fairs. We've realized that this is an... it's a layer of government that is totally unnecessary. I don't even believe we have appointed members to the particular authority. And so, this Bill would merely get rid of that particular layer of government. Would urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Burke, Sims. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105

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voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 4078, Representative Kifowit. Representative Kifowit. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 4078, a Bill for an Act concerning government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Kifowit."

Kifowit: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill really curtails the power of state boards to appoint executive directors during the final 90 days of a Governor's time in office. It's... it's a good business Bill and it's a good policy. The point in fact is that what we had, quite frankly, with former Governor Pat Quinn as he appointed an individual to serve out the remaining term of two years in his last final days in office. And what this will do would just eliminate that authority and will give a time frame of no more than 60 days into the term of the new Governor."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "To the Bill, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support of the Representative's Bill. I think this is an outstanding Bill. I encourage everyone to vote for it. What occurred near the end of the last Governor's term, irrespective of partisan politics, irrespective of ideology was shameful. So, thank you for bringing this Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Bryant, Drury, Gabel, Hammond, Sims. Gabel, Sims. Mr. Sims. Please take the record. On this question, there are 104 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this

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question... This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3193, Mr. Martwick. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 3193, a Bill for an Act concerning local government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Martwick."

Martwick: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3193 allows home equity assurance programs to establish low interest home improvement loans by a resolution of its governing commission. This is a change to existing law. These... there are several of these home equity assurance programs that have popped up in Chicago in the early '80s and this one would allow it to be used for other purposes as designed... as decided by the governing body. Ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Franks."

Franks: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Franks: "Mr. Martwick, why do we wish to change the law so with... so there doesn't have to be a referendum and can only be by a resolution?"

Martwick: "Well, as you can imagine, the referendum would be a rather... an expensive and complicated endeavor, not that I'm opposed to that, but the idea behind this, Jack, is that these were designed in the early '80s. There were three of them that were set up around the Chicago area and they were designed as home equity assurance programs. Common knowledge is this... that they were used during the time of racial strife in Chicago to prevent certain people from feeling they needed to flee the neighborhood by giving them assurance in the

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equity in their homes. These programs are only... everyone who lives in these programs has to pay taxes into them, but the only people who get the benefit of the insur... assurance is anyone who opts into the program. And the number of people who opt in when they buy their houses is exceptionally low, so there's a large pot of money that was designed to protect values of properties in the neighborhood that's not being used. And so, the idea was to create... there is a governing board. It's appointed by the mayor of the City of Chicago. And it gives them the authority to use this for other purposes specifically in this case low interest home improvement loans which of course would then sort of fit with the original design of the plan which was to, you know, protect home values in the area."

Franks: "There's currently one on the south... it's called the Southwest Home Equity Assurance Program."

Martwick: "That's correct."

Franks: "When was that established and how?"

Martwick: "So, that when... they were all established, I believe, right around the same time which was late '70s early '80s. Right? It was established the same way as this one was."

Franks: "Okay. That's what you're trying to do to have uniformity to set this up so it'll... it'll be the same..."

Martwick: "Exactly."

Franks: "...authorized."

Martwick: "Yes. They were all..."

Franks: "That's what I was trying to figure out."

Martwick: "Thank you. Yeah. They were all designed with the same intention back in 30, 40 years ago and this is trying to give

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them other options for that pot of money they have to improve the neighborhoods that they... they're in. Yeah. They're all in the same programs."

Franks: "All right. Thank you."

Martwick: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Willis."

Willis: "Thank you. Will the Sponsor yield, please?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Willis: "Is this program only for the City of Chicago or will it affect other places throughout the state?"

Martwick: "So, Kathy, these were set up in, as I said, in the early '80s... late '70s early '80s, and they've been collecting money and it's already in a pot. I believe that by statute you could create a home equity assurance program. It is, however, so that you know the people who live... reside within the boundaries of this pay a tax into this program so."

Willis: "So, it's just refining the programs that are already in place. It's not establishing new ones."

Martwick: "It's refining the program that... one of the programs that already exist. Yeah, that's right."

Willis: "Okay. Thank you for clarifying."

Martwick: "You're welcome."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Bennett, Drury, Flowers, Winger. Winger. Please take the record. On this question, there are 82 voting 'yes', 22 voting 'no', 1 voting 'present'. And this Bill, having received the



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Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2807, Mr. Mitchell. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 2807, a Bill for an Act concerning education. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Mitchell."

Mitchell, C.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is basically a cleanup Bill. Last year when MDP... the professional development tweaks the museums, places like the Shedd Aquarium, for example, were accidentally, I think, excluded. I know of no opposition. And what this Bill effectively would say is, for those museums say, for example, in the City of Chicago or in other places downstate that are working with science teachers and other teachers in providing the professional development opportunities for their kids, they could continue to do so. And I think it's a good Bill and ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Hammond."

Hammond: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Hammond: "Representative, our original analysis shows that the Illinois Association of Regional School Superintendents is opposed to this Bill. Have you worked that out with them?"

Mitchell, C.: "I was actually unaware of their opposition. They never came to talk to me. There was concern by ISBE making sure that we expand the definition to include folks like, say, the Shedd Aquarium, for example, but those are the only folks that came to talk to me. So, I'm not familiar with their opposition, Representative."

Hammond: "Thank you, Representative."

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Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Stewart. Please take the record. On this question, there are 104 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3721, Representative Bryant. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 3721, a Bill for an Act concerning veterans. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Bryant."

Bryant: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill would allow for a National Guard member who works in Illinois, but resides in another state but has been called up by the Governor of another state, to have their job protected in the State of Illinois. Presently, that's not allowed. So, I believe the VA is in support of this Bill. Don't show anyone in opposition. And I urge your... an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Brady, McAuliffe. McAuliffe. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1445, Representative Nekritz. Representative Nekritz. Please read the Bill. Mr. Clerk, please put this Bill back on the Order of Second Reading for an Amendment and read the Bill."

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Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 1445, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. The Bill was read for a second time on a previous day. Amendment #1 and Floor Amendment #2 have been adopted. Floor Amendment #3 is offered by Representative Nekritz."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Nekritz."

Nekritz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Floor Amendment 3 is truly technical."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the technical Amendment will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Bolin: "No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 1429, Representative Sente. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 1429, a Bill for an Act concerning finance. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Sente."

Sente: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 1429 deals with recycling... recycled products. And it says the State of Illinois will give preference to a vendor who has recycled contents in their products and the cost of the product is of equal or lessor value. Ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you. Will the speaker yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Sandack: "Sponsor. Do thank you. Carol, this sounds like a great idea. Walk me through the mechanism of how this would actually work though. Would there be a list of preferred vendors that have demonstrated proclivity for utilizing recycling best practices?"

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Sente: "So, when I spoke with CMS, what would happen here is part of this is just to get this out... out in their criteria when they're soliciting requests for qualifications and proposals and they would identify their selection criteria, so they would stay. So, it wouldn't be a list of preferred vendors more than it would be listings that we prefer recycled content and they would give... be given a higher preference."

Sandack: "So, it would be on their form whether it's online or in written form and then the prospective vendor would check that they qualify. I'm sure there'd be some type of verification from CMS's side that they meet the criteria. But the idea here is... is we get certain vendors identified as, frankly, undertaking best practices."

Sente: "Yes. And we also want to make sure that they're... the quality standards are there. And so, there's a provision for that as well."

Sandack: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Chapa LaVia, Hays, Stewart. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Chair recognizes Mr. Davidsmeyer."

Davidsmeyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A point of personal privilege."

Speaker Lang: "Please proceed, Sir."

Davidsmeyer: "I just want to let the Body know that we've just been joined by the Pittsfield junior high student government,

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right up here behind me. I'd like to wish them a warm Springfield welcome."

Speaker Lang: "Welcome. Happy you're with us today. Thank you. House Bill 352, Mr. Verschoore on the Order of Second Reading. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 352, a Bill for an Act concerning wildlife. The Bill's been read for a second time on a previous day. No Committee Amendments have been adopted. Floor Amendment #2 has been adopted. No further Amendments. No Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. Please read the Bill for a third time."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 352, a Bill for an Act concerning wildlife. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Verschoore."

Verschoore: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First, this is the bobcat hunting and trapping Bill. And there's certain areas of the state that's having a lot... a lot of problems with bobcats. And they virtually, in some areas, wiped out the quail and pheasant population. And I would ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Mayfield."

Mayfield: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Mayfield: "Representative Verschoore, has this..."

Verschoore: "Yes."

Mayfield: "...my understanding was that your Bill would be amended to exclude northeast Illinois?"

Verschoore: "It... it doesn't exclude any county, but the... the Department of Natural Resources will check out the population

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in different parts of the state and they will not allow hunting if there's a... if there isn't an overabundance of bobcats. They're only going to issue around a hundred permits for the whole state, but they're specifically going where there's a large population and they're doing harm to either farm animals or other... other... pheasants."

Mayfield: "So, why didn't you just make this specific to downstate?"

Verschoore: "Well, you can't. We don't want to do that because of... if... well, then we might have to come back and re-amend the Bill to... over the whole state if there gets to be more bobcats in northern Illinois. It's kind of like they have done with the deer population. There's areas where there's a lot of deer, but there's places where the deer aren't so plentiful. And so, they have a... they do a survey of that and that's how they permit or give out the permits."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Mayfield."

Mayfield: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack."

Sandack: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Sandack: "Representative, can... I thought I heard you answer... and I want to make sure I heard it right... there's no regionalization of your Bill. It's going to be administered..."

Verschoore: "State... statewide."

Sandack: "...statewide. So, I'm getting e-mails from folks in DuPage, a lot from the environmental groups that oppose this. Have you had any conversation with some of the suburban

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district representatives of the environmental groups as to what your Bill does and doesn't do?"

Verschoore: "Well, the... the Department of Natural Resources has biologists... biologists that survey how many bobcats are in certain areas. And if there's a low... low number of them, they don't want to... They were on the endangered species list for a long time and they don't want to get back on that. And it's federally regulated also. So, they'll look it over. They'll survey it and if they think there's a lot of bobcats in one area, they'll issue permits; if there aren't, then they will... they will issue no permits for that area. And I think the northern part... they had a... they had a map... I don't have that in my file. But they had a map that showed where the concentration was. But it's mostly downstate."

Sandack: "Thank you, Representative."

Verschoore: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Wehrli."

Wehrli: "Will the Spon... Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Wehrli: "The Department of Natural Resources is going to fol... be following on this Bill just like they do on every other species that involves hunting or fishing. It's the exact same protocol on this as they have been doing for decades currently in the state, correct?"

Verschoore: "That's correct."

Wehrli: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Phelps."

Phelps: "To the Bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Let me just say this. I know there's been a lot

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of e-mails. Of all the Bills that I think we've done in the House for me for 13 years, this may have been the one Bill that I got more phone calls on than anything. Just remember, the bobcats are cold-blooded killers. They're predators. They're eating your dogs; they're eating your cats. They're getting way too many. We're just trying to get so many permits to kind of just make sure we... conservation at its best right now. And remember, this is federally regulated. The Federal Government is going to regulate this. This is... this only going to be a few permits. I ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Verschoore to close."

Verschoore: "I would just ask for an 'aye' vote. These aren't your nasty... these aren't your little kitty cats that run around, nice furry animals. Like I said, in certain areas they've virtually wiped out the pheasant and the quail population. So, anyhow, give me an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Wow. Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please record yourselves, Members. Andrade, Butler, Davis, Durkin, Stewart, Thapedi. Mr. Thapedi. Mr. Thapedi. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 62 voting 'yes', 43 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. The Chair recognizes Mr. D'Amico."

D'Amico: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to announce on May 6 we're going to have the House-Senate softball game. And as you know, last year we lost the trophy over to the Senate. So, we're going to start having practice next week, so bring your stuff down. On Monday night we'll have practice right



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after Session on Washington and Amos. So, please show up.  
Let's get that trophy back here where it belongs. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "House Bill 3672, on the Order of Second Reading,  
Mr. Greg Harris. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 3672, a Bill for an Act concerning local  
government. Second Reading of this House Bill. Amendments 1  
and 2 have been adopted in committee. No Floor Amendments. No  
Motions are filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. House Bill 3217, on the Order of  
Second Reading, Mr. Phelps. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Bolin: "House Bill 3217, a Bill for an Act concerning  
Shawnee Indians. Second Reading of this House Bill. No  
Committee Amendments. No Floor Amendments. No Motions are  
filed."

Speaker Lang: "Third Reading. Mr. Clerk, House Resolution 324,  
Mr. Mautino. Understand there's an Amendment. Mr. Mautino is  
recognized on the Amendment."

Mautino: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
House. I'd like to adopt Amendment #2 which is a technical  
Amendment places the Bill in its final form."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Amendment say 'yes'; opposed  
'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. Mr.  
Mautino is recognized on the Resolution."

Mautino: "Thank you. I'd like to ask the House support for the  
Resolution which would allow for the Auditor General to  
conduct a performance audit on the Kenwood Oakland Community  
Organization which is a tax-exempt organization founded in  
'65. I will be doing an audit from fiscal years '10, '11,  
'12, '13, '14, '15 of state dollars in the programs."

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Speaker Lang: "Mr..."

Mautino: "Ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Phelps, do you rise on this Resolution? Those in favor of the Resolution will vote 'yes'; opposed vote 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Davis, McAuliffe, Wehrli. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And the Resolution is adopted. The Chair recognizes Mr. Phelps."

Phelps: "Point of personal privilege, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lang: "Proceed, Sir."

Phelps: "Thank you, Sir. I'm just reminding everybody on Pat Verschoore's Bill, the Illinois Sportsman's Caucus, April 21, 5:30, Inn at 835. Because of him we're having bobcat for dinner."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Soto."

Soto: "Thank you... thank you, Mr. Speaker. A point of personal privilege. I just..."

Speaker Lang: "Proceed."

Soto: "I just want to remind everyone that on Tuesday, the Illinois Diabetes Caucus... Can we have... can we have their attention? I just want to remind the Members here today that the Illinois Diabetes Caucus Foundation will have its annual... second annual bowling tournament on Tuesday, April 21 from 6 to 8. If you haven't signed up, please do. See you then. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A point of personal privilege."

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Speaker Lang: "Proceed, Sir."

Andersson: "Members of the Hou... of the Hou... Members of the House, thank you. I'd like to alert you to the appearance in the House chamber of someone who is very important to me without whom I would literally not be here. That's my father right up there in the right and my brother. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Welcome. We're happy you're here with us today. The Chair is in receipt of a written Motion by Representative Hammond to table House Bill 1796. Is there leave? Leave is granted and the Motion is adopted and the Bill is tabled. Page 27 of the Calendar, Order of Resolutions, House Joint Resolution 24, Representative Flowers. Please proceed."

Flowers: "I'm sorry, Mr. Speaker. Can you just take it out of the record for one minute, so I can pull it up?"

Speaker Lang: "Out of the record for at least one minute. House Resolution 28, Representative Flowers. You want that one out of the record, too, Representative? Out of the record for another minute. House Joint Resolution 27, Representative Chapa LaVia. Please proceed."

Chapa LaVia: "Hello. You... you still look mighty fine there, Speaker. House Resolution 27 is a passion for me as far as making sure that we're doing everything we do it... can do at the state to inform individuals that might have served during Vietnam... the Vietnam Conflict if they were in contact with Agent Orange and to make sure that they understand that there are services for them 'cause usually some of the plight ends up being cancerous and they end up dying too soon and there's no connection. So, we want to make sure that they're informed,

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and they know they can go to get testing. I'll ask for its adoption. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Resolution will vote 'yes; opposed vote 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Andrade, Davis, Mitchell. Please take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 133, Mr. Evans. Mr. Evans. Out of the record. Well, Mr. Evans is back in his chair. Do you wish to proceed, Sir? Please proceed."

Evans: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and the great Members of this Assembly. House Resolution 133 is a simple. It just encourages businesses to give those initial opportunities to young people, particularly young adults. Many of us wouldn't be here if we hadn't had those first employment opportunities when, quite frankly, we may or may not have been qualified. We were given an opportunity to succeed in an opportunity and it produced the great folks that we have here and all around the State of Illinois. So, please join me in encouraging businesses to take a chance and give those first opportunities to people who need them to catapult the next generation of leaders."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Resolution say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 149, Representative Willis. Please proceed."

Willis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Resolution is simply to encourage employers to allow their veterans off with or without pay for Veteran's Day to recognize their service to our country. I urge an 'aye' vote."

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Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Resolution say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. Returning to House Joint Resolution 24, Representative Flowers. Please proceed."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Joint Resolution 24 calls for Illinois to return to prosperity. Unfortunately, there's a lot of people living in poverty. We're not creating jobs. We're not allowing people to afford education. And I urge for the adoption of the House Resolution 27."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sandack on the Resolution."

Sandack: "We're on 24, correct?"

Speaker Lang: "House Joint Resolution 24."

Sandack: "All right. Will the... the speaker... the Spons... Excuse me. The Sponsor just mentioned 27. May I ask a question of the Sponsor, please?"

Speaker Lang: "Of course you may, Sir."

Sandack: "Thank you. Representative, my analysis says that while you... it talks about creating a return to prosperity commission, but it shall review and evaluate the creation of an Illinois state bank. Is that correct?"

Flowers: "That is correct. Thank you very much. I appreciate it."

Sandack: "I wanted to clarify that for folks that on my side of the aisle that may oppose the notion of an Illinois state bank being created. Thank you, Representative."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Flowers to close, if you wish."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen... and Gentlemen of the House. But Illinois need a state bank. If we're going to have medical marijuana in this state, the

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money cannot be deposited in regular banks. We would need our own state bank in order to deposit those funds. For young people who want to go to school, for businesses who want to expand their businesses and they cannot get loans from the bank, we need our own state bank like North Dakota. This is just a commission to do a study on the feasibility and the possibility of what can happen as far as prosperity and creating jobs here in the State of Illinois. It's not a mandate. It's merely a study and a commission. And I would appreciate your adoption."

Speaker Lang: "The Chair erred and did not recognize Mr. Reis. So, the Chair now recognizes Mr. Reis."

Reis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will this Joint Resolution require a recorded vote? If not, I would..."

Speaker Lang: "Yes, it will."

Reis: "I would like to request one. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Thank you. Those in favor of the Lady's Resolution will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Dunkin. Mr. Dunkin. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 54 voting 'yes', 51 voting 'no'. And the Resolution is adopted. House Joint Resolution 28, Representative Flowers. HJR... I'm sorry. HR28, Mr. Clerk. House Resolution 28. Representative Flowers."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Illinois State... this is urging the Illinois State Board of Education to resolve the matter in regards to standards being... as far as race and standard is concerned that there's three levels of grades that the Illinois State

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Board had initiated and it is discriminatory. And I'm asking the state board not to do that. And I would appreciate an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Resolution will say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 146, Representative Flowers. Representative Flowers, you have one more. Might as well stay there."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Resolution 146 is recognizing Social Security fairness. And there's... in 19... in the Reagan administration, Reagan took away some of the ability of people to be able to collect their Social Security as well as their pension. And we're asking Congress to look into the matter and to resolve it. And I would appreciate an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Resolution say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. Mr. Clerk, Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Bolin: "Agreed Resolutions. House Resolution 373, offered by Representative Moeller. House Resolution 374, offered by Representative Sommer. House Resolution 376 and 377, offered by Representative Beiser. House Resolutions 378 and 379, offered by Representative Andersson. House Resolution 381, offered by Representative Hoffman. And House Resolution 382, offered by Representative Yingling."

Speaker Lang: "Leader Mautino moves for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. Those in favor say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. And now, allowing perfunctory time for the Clerk, Leader Mautino

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moves that the House stand adjourned 'til Monday, April 20 at the hour of 1 p.m. Those in favor say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. And the House stands adjourned 'til Monday, April 20 at the hour of 1 p.m. Have a lovely weekend."

Clerk Hollman: "House Perfunctory Session will come to order. Introduction and First Reading of House Bills.
