Mr. President -- I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has passed a House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment of the following title, in the passage of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 1

HC0001 Engrossed

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Section 8.1 of Article I of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE I BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 8.1. CRIME VICTIMS' VICTIM'S RIGHTS.

- (a) Crime victims, as defined by law, shall have the following rights as provided by law:
- (1) The right to be treated with fairness and respect for their dignity and privacy and to be free from harassment, intimidation, and abuse
- throughout the criminal justice process.
- (2) The right to notice and to a hearing before a court ruling on a request for access to any of the victim's records, information, or communications which are privileged or confidential by law.
 - (3) (2) The right to timely notification of all court proceedings.
 - (4) (3) The right to communicate with the prosecution.
- (5) (4) The right to be heard at any post-arraignment court proceeding in which a right of the victim is at issue and any court proceeding involving a post-arraignment release decision, plea, or sentencing make a statement to the court at sentencing.
- (6) (5) The right to <u>be notified of information about</u> the conviction, <u>the</u> sentence, <u>the</u> imprisonment, and the release of the accused.
 - (7) (6) The right to timely disposition of the case following the arrest of the accused.
 - (8) (7) The right to be reasonably protected from the accused throughout the criminal justice process.
- (9) The right to have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in denying or fixing the amount of bail, determining whether to release the defendant, and setting conditions of release after arrest and conviction.
 - (10) (8) The right to be present at the trial and all other court proceedings on the same basis
 - as the accused, unless the victim is to testify and the court determines that the victim's testimony would be materially affected if the victim hears other testimony at the trial.
 - (11) (9) The right to have present at all court proceedings, subject to the rules of evidence, an advocate and Θ other support person of the victim's choice.
 - (12) (10) The right to restitution.
- (b) The victim has standing to assert the rights enumerated in subsection (a) in any court exercising jurisdiction over the case. The court shall promptly rule on a victim's request. The victim does not have party status. The accused does not have standing to assert the rights of a victim. The court shall not appoint an attorney for the victim under this Section. Nothing in this Section shall be construed to alter the powers, duties, and responsibilities of the prosecuting attorney The General Assembly may provide by law for the enforcement of this Section.
- (c) The General Assembly may provide for an assessment against convicted defendants to pay for crime victims' rights.
- (d) Nothing in this Section or any law enacted under this Section creates a cause of action in equity or at law for compensation, attorney's fees, or damages against the State, a political subdivision of the State, an officer, employee, or agent of the State or of any political subdivision of the State, or an officer or employee of the court. or in any law enacted under
- (e) Nothing in this Section or any law enacted under this Section shall be construed as creating (1) a basis for vacating a conviction or (2) a ground for any relief requested by the defendant appellate relief in any criminal case.

WHEREAS, The mission of the Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP) Multi-Neighborhood Pilot is to target risk and protective factors for alcohol and other substance use and abuse at the individual, family, and environmental levels through a comprehensive approach, including individual programming, media, campaigns, advocacy, and collaboration with governmental agencies in the participating communities of Back-of-the-Yards, Brighton Park, and Englewood, all within Chicago Police District 9; and

WHEREAS, The goals of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot are to prevent adolescent substance use particularly relating to alcohol, decrease rates of alcohol, tobacco and other substance abuse among young adults and youth, build capacity at the community-level to address substance abuse-related issues, and to promote health and well-being in Chicago and throughout the State through replication of the SAPP Multi Neighborhood Pilot; and

WHEREAS, The objectives of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot include but are not limited to, increasing awareness of the negative effects of alcohol use with a focus on youth from 11 to 19 years of age, engaging in a public education campaign around youth and adolescent alcohol use prevention, partnering with schools to incorporate alcohol use prevention into health and science curriculum at the middle school and high school level, partnering with government agencies to promote alcohol prevention messaging, establishing family and community support systems for youth with a focus on training and program development, evaluate existing family and community services, implementing evidence-based trainings through utilizing faith and community-based infrastructure, and assessing full range of social service agencies for service referral; and

WHEREAS, Several State agencies, including, but not limited to, the Department of Human Services, the Liquor Control Commission, the State Board of Education, the Department of Public Health, the Department of Children and Family Services, and the Community College Board, have overlapping jurisdiction over the program and services supporting the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot goals and objectives; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that there is created an interagency working group among the Department of Human Services, the Liquor Control Commission, the State Board of Education, the Department of Public Health, the Department of Children and Family Services, and the Community College Board, for the purposes of assessing and implementing family and community support services for underage substance use: and be it further

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 66

WHEREAS, It is highly fitting that the Illinois General Assembly pays honor and respect to the truly great individuals who have served our country and, in doing so, have made the ultimate sacrifice for our nation; and

WHEREAS, Army Specialist Joseph Whiting Dimock, II was born on May 25, 1989 in Libertyville to Joseph W. and Ellen L. Dimock; he was a member of the Wildwood Presbyterian Church, where he faithfully attended Sunday School, worshipped, and was devoted to the annual summer high school mission trips; he loved the outdoors and was an active member of Cub Scout Pack, the Venture Crew, and Boy Scout Troop 672, achieving the rank of Eagle Scout; for his Eagle Scout project he collected nearly 200 worn, American flags so they could be honorably retired in a special ceremony; and

WHEREAS, SPC Joseph W. Dimock, II graduated from Warren Township High School, where he was a member of the Warren Blue Devils swim team and swim club; in 2006, he and his teammates set the junior varsity swim record in the 400-yard freestyle relay, and the record still stands today; he had a special knack with children and taught swimming for many years through the Wildwood Park District; and

WHEREAS, SPC Joseph W. Dimock, II enlisted in the United States Army during the spring of his senior year and began his service that following August; for nearly 3 years he served with the 1st Battalion, 75 Ranger Regiment; he was in his third overseas deployment, his second in Afghanistan, supporting Operation Enduring Freedom; and

WHEREAS, During his service, SPC Joseph W. Dimock, II received the Ranger Tab, the Combat Infantryman Badge, and the Parachutist Badge; he was also awarded the National Defense Service Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal, the Iraq Campaign Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, and the Army Service Ribbon; he was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star Medal and the Army Commendation Medal; and

WHEREAS, SPC Joseph W. Dimock, II is survived by his parents, Joseph and Ellen; his brothers, Louis and Michael; his paternal grandmother, Elna Jensen Dimock; his maternal grandfather, Alan R. McCausland; and numerous aunts, uncles, cousins, friends, and fellow soldiers; and

WHEREAS, SPC Joseph W. Dimock, II was a son, a brother, an Eagle Scout, and a United States Army Ranger; this fallen soldier deserves to be remembered by the State of Illinois for his service to this country; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the section of road on Route 120/Belvidere Road between John Mogg and Sears Boulevard in Grayslake as "Army SPC Joseph W. Dimock II Joey Memorial Highway"; and be it further

AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO SENATE BILL 2202

AMENDMENT NO. 1 . Amend Senate Bill 2202 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following:

"Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the Smoke-Free Campus Act.

Section 5. Findings. The General Assembly finds that tobacco smoke is a harmful and dangerous carcinogen to human beings and a hazard to public health. Secondhand tobacco smoke causes at least 65,000 deaths each year from heart disease and lung cancer according to the National Cancer Institute. Secondhand tobacco smoke causes heart disease, stroke, cancer, sudden infant death syndrome, low birth weight in infants, asthma and the exacerbation of asthma, bronchitis, and pneumonia in children and adults. Secondhand tobacco smoke is the third leading cause of preventable death in the United States. Illinois workers exposed to secondhand tobacco smoke are at an increased risk of premature death. An estimated 2,900 Illinois citizens die each year from exposure to secondhand tobacco smoke.

The General Assembly also finds that the United States Surgeon General's 2006 report has determined that there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke; the scientific evidence that secondhand smoke causes serious diseases, including lung cancer, heart disease, and respiratory illnesses such as bronchitis and asthma, is massive and conclusive; separating smokers from nonsmokers, cleaning the air, and ventilating buildings cannot eliminate secondhand smoke exposure; smoke-free policies are effective in reducing secondhand smoke exposure.

The General Assembly also finds that a law that prohibits smoking on the campuses of State-supported institutions of higher education will reduce secondhand smoke exposure among nonsmokers as well as prepare students for the workplace and ensure a healthy environment for all campus communities.

Section 10. Definitions. In this Act:

"Campus" means all property, including buildings, grounds, parking lots, and vehicles that are owned or operated by a State-supported institution of higher education, but does not include property covered under the Smoke Free Illinois Act, or enclosed laboratories, not open to the public, in an accredited university or government facility where the activity of smoking is exclusively conducted for the purpose of medical or scientific, health-related research.

"Employee" means an individual who is employed by a State-supported institution of higher education in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit.

"Governing authority" means the administrative branch of the State-supported institution of higher education.

"Guest" means a visitor to the campus of a State-supported institution of higher education.

"Smoke" or "smoking" means the carrying, smoking, burning, inhaling, or exhaling of any kind of lighted pipe, cigar, cigarette, hookah, weed, herbs, or other lighted smoking equipment. "Smoke" or "smoking" also includes products containing or delivering nicotine intended or expected for human consumption, or any part of such a product, that is not a tobacco product as defined by Section 321(rr) of Title 21 of the United States Code, unless it has been approved or otherwise certified for legal sale by the United States Food and Drug Administration for tobacco use cessation or other medical purposes and is being marketed and sold solely for that approved purpose. "Smoke" or "smoking" does not include smoking that is associated with a native recognized religious ceremony, ritual, or activity by American Indians that is in accordance with the federal American Indian Religious Freedom Act, Sections 1996 and 1996a of Title 42 of the United States Code.

"Student" means an individual enrolled in a credit or noncredit course at a State-supported institution of higher education.

"State-supported institution of higher education" means the University of Illinois, Southern Illinois University, Chicago State University, Eastern Illinois University, Governors State University, Illinois State University, Northeastern Illinois University, Northern Illinois University, Western Illinois University, and the public community colleges subject to the Public Community College Act.

Section 15. Prohibitions on smoking.

- (a) Beginning on July 1, 2015, smoking is prohibited on each campus of a State-supported institution of higher education. The prohibition set forth in this subsection (a) shall not apply to any instance in which an individual is traveling through a campus in a vehicle that is not owned by a State-supported institution of higher education.
- (b) An individual or campus subject to the smoking prohibitions of this Act may not discriminate or retaliate in any manner against a person for making a complaint of a violation of this Act or furnishing information concerning a violation to a person, campus, or governing authority.
- (c) The prohibitions on smoking in this Act must be communicated to all students and employees of State-supported institutions of higher education on or before May 1, 2015 and to each guest of a State-supported institution of higher education upon request.
- (d) Each State-supported institution of higher education shall create and post on its Internet website a smoke-free campus map indicating the locations where smoking is prohibited under this Act.

Section 20. Smoke-free campus task force. On or before December 31, 2014, each State-supported institution of higher education shall establish a community task force for the purpose of coordinating with community and campus leaders for the implementation of this Act.

The governing board of each State-supported institution of higher education shall coordinate with its respective community task force to implement a public education and notice program regarding this Act. As part of the notice to students, employees, and the public, "No Smoking" signs or the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) may be clearly and conspicuously posted on each campus where smoking is prohibited by this Act.

Section 25. Penalties and rules. The governing board of each State-supported institution of higher education shall implement this Act and shall promulgate all policies and regulations necessary for this purpose, including, but not limited to, disciplinary action, fines, and an appeals process.

Section 30. Conflict. In case of conflict with provisions of the Smoke Free Illinois Act, the provisions of the Smoke Free Illinois Act shall control.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law.".
