In accordance with Article IV, Section 9(b), of the Illinois Constitution, I hereby veto Senate Bill 930 of the 98th General Assembly.

[November 7, 2014]

Senate Bill 930 increases the maximum speed limit for trucks on interstate highways outside of an urban district from 55 to 60 miles per hour in Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, and Will counties.

Increased speeds on urban interstate highways for trucks will result in the increased loss of human life. Research has shown a correlation between increased speed limits and increased highway deaths. Higher travel speeds lengthen stopping distances, making it more difficult to react to an emergency in time. Speed also exacerbates the size and weight differences between large trucks and passenger vehicles, leading to more severe crashes. In 2013, more than 2,400 commercial vehicles, including trucks, received speeding citations on Illinois roads for driving anywhere up to 51 miles over posted speed limits. Illinois has lost more than 149 lives over the past four years from fatal speed-related crashes involving tractors with and without semi-trailers. National data shows that truck occupants comprise 15 percent of fatalities in large truck crashes, while passenger vehicles, motorcyclists, and pedestrians suffer the greater numbers of fatalities.

The deaths of dedicated public servants over the past 18 months, including Illinois State Trooper James Sauter, 28, of Vernon Hills and Illinois Toll Highway Worker Vincent Petrella, 39, of Chicago, illustrate the devastating impacts of trucks traveling at high speeds on interstate highways. On March 28, 2013, Trooper Sauter pulled over to the left shoulder of I-294 to help a motorist. A fast-approaching semi-truck collided with his squad car, bursting both vehicles into flames. More recently, on January 28, 2014, a semi-truck slammed into the vehicles of Illinois State Trooper Douglas Balder and Vincent Petrella as they attempted to assist a disabled motorist on the Reagan Memorial Tollway near Aurora. Trooper Balder suffered serious injuries and Mr. Petrella lost his life.

Most recently, on July 21, 2014, two fatal traffic accidents involving semi-trucks occurred within three miles of each other along I-55. In the first accident, the driver approached a construction zone at a high rate of speed, totaling the vehicles. Five innocent people lost their lives as a result of that accident: Ulrike Blopleh, 48, of Channahon; Vicky Palacios, 54, of Coal City; Kimberly Britton, 43, of Urbana; Timothy J. Osburn, 64, of Urbana; and little Piper Britton, 11, also of Urbana. Three additional victims were sent to local hospitals. Sixteen minutes after this fatal accident, a rear-end collision between two semi-trucks occurred in the southbound lanes at U.S. 5. One driver was injured, and the other, Deividus Mockus, 41, of Darien, lost his life.

No amount of fines, penalties or jail time can ever replace the lives of those whom we have lost to fatal traffic accidents on our interstate highways. The families, friends, co-workers and communities of these victims are constantly faced with the heartache of their absence.

I urge the General Assembly to stand with me in vetoing Senate Bill 930 in light of recent traffic fatalities involving trucks that were travelling at high speeds on our interstate highways. The convenience of increased speeds for truckers on roadways does not outweigh the safety risks to children, families, and our dedicated public servants.

Accordingly, I must return this bill without my approval. Therefore, pursuant to Article IV, Section 9 (b) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, I hereby return Senate Bill 930, entitled "AN ACT concerning government.", with the foregoing objections, vetoed in its entirety.

Senate Bill 2015 seeks to change the maximum speed limit from 65 to 70 miles per hour on all toll highways under the jurisdiction of the Illinois State Toll Highway Authority (THA).

Recent evidence shows that drivers already travel at excessive speeds on Illinois toll highways. The THA conducted a study of drivers on I-94 in Lake County in 2013 and found that 71 percent of drivers sampled exceeded the posted speed limit by more than 15 miles per hour. A second, more thorough study conducted by the THA measured speeds on seven different toll highway segments and found that between 91 and 98 percent of drivers exceeded posted speed limits by rates ranging from 11 to 15 miles per hour during off-peak hours. As I stated in my veto of Senate Bill 930, which increases the speed limit for large trucks on interstate highways, studies show that increased traffic speeds lengthen vehicle stopping distances, produce more violent collisions, and ultimately, increase the loss of human life.

As with Senate Bill 930, the convenience of increased speeds for drivers on Illinois tollways does not outweigh the safety risks to children, families, and our dedicated public servants.

Accordingly, I must return this bill without my approval. Therefore, pursuant to Article IV, Section 9 (b) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, I hereby return Senate Bill 2015, entitled "AN ACT concerning government.", with the foregoing objections, vetoed in its entirety.

I hereby return Senate Bill 1630 with specific recommendations for change.

An effective healthcare system requires that the needs of patients be met and that healthcare professionals have the resources necessary to meet those needs. The role of government is to strive to maintain that delicate balance of protecting patients' rights without severely limiting the ability of physicians to render necessary healthcare to those patients.

The American Medical Association's ("AMA") Code of Ethics states the following:

"Medical considerations, not cost, must be paramount when the physician chooses a laboratory. . . A physician should not charge a markup, commission, or profit on the services rendered by others. A markup is an excessive charge that exploits patients if it is nothing more than a tacked on amount for a service already provided and accounted for by the laboratory." *E-8.09 Laboratory Services*.

In alignment with the AMA Code of Ethics, Senate Bill 1630 is a bill to prohibit improper escalation of fees in certain medical bills. At no time should patients be subject to unnecessary markups in their healthcare costs. This year, we have seen a historic increase in Illinoisans' access to healthcare. Illinois is a patient friendly state and this bill ensures all patients receive decent, affordable care while being informed consumers. The cost disclosure required under this bill will help to better educate patients by providing transparency as to exactly what they are being charged.

Illinois physicians are vital in our healthcare delivery systems. They are on the front lines evaluating and treating patients and, often times, providing preventative care. While this bill prohibits markups, which harm patients, it is also important to provide physicians a choice in their specialist network to consult on patient care. This choice provides the ability for physicians to ensure high quality care while having the resources to do so. Senate Bill 1630 allows for physicians to cover their collection and transportation costs associated with the medically necessary specimen testing required to make an accurate patient diagnosis. This bill does not alter the direct billing practices of physicians and/or their practices.

Therefore, to further enforcement against markups by physicians, I suggest that the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation have explicit authority to discipline a physician for an improper markup of a bill. Additionally, to ensure quality care, I further suggest that physician choice be made clear in the bill.

Therefore, pursuant to Article IV, Section 9(e) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, I return Senate Bill 1630, entitled "AN ACT concerning regulation." with the following specific recommendations for change:

on page 2, between lines 7 and 8, by inserting "(d) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to prohibit a referring physician from sending a patient's specimen to any laboratory providing anatomic pathology services.";

on page 2, line 8, by replacing "(d)" with "(e)";

on page 2, line 19, by replacing "(e)" with "(f)";

on page 2, line 22, by replacing "(f)" with "(g)";

on page 2, line 26, by replacing "(g)" with "(h)";

on page 3, between lines 2 and 3, by inserting

"(i) The Department of Financial and Professional Regulation may revoke, suspend, or deny renewal of the license of any physician who undertakes a markup of a bill in violation of this Section."; and

on page 3, line 3, by replacing "(h)" with "(j)".

As Governor, it is my duty to ensure that people can stay in their homes. Any changes to the foreclosure process must ensure that the interests of homeowners are protected and that the proper entity bears the cost when someone loses their home.

SB 2664 limits condominium associations from collecting more than the sum of nine months of regular monthly assessments from the purchaser of a foreclosed condominium. Following the procedure in SB 2664 would force the rest of the homeowners in the condominium association to bear the costs of a foreclosure. While it is reasonable for a new homeowner to pay up to nine months of regular assessments when they purchase a property coming out of foreclosure, the lender who owns the mortgage should also contribute to the costs that the homeowners in a condominium association incur when a lender forecloses on a property.

Therefore, pursuant to Article IV, Section 9(e) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, I return Senate Bill 2664, entitled "AN ACT concerning civil law." with the following specific recommendations for change:

on page 10, line 20, by replacing "The" with "Following a foreclosure sale, a consent foreclosure, common law strict foreclosure or the delivery of a deed in lieu of foreclosure, the mortgagee shall have the duty to pay to the association those amounts required by subdivision (g)(1) of Section 9 of this Act, except that, the"; and

on page 12, line 9, by replacing "subdivision subdivisions (g)(1) and" with "subdivisions (g)(1) and".

With these changes, Senate Bill 2664 will have my approval. I respectfully request your concurrence.

WHEREAS, Common symptoms include muscle weakness and pain, gastrointestinal disorders, poor growth, cardiac disease, liver disease, diabetes, respiratory problems, seizures, visual and hearing problems, and susceptibility to infection; and

WHEREAS, Because so little is known about the disease, there are only a few hospitals in the world that offer treatment, causing affected families to travel regularly or even relocate to receive treatment; and

WHEREAS, Mitochondrial disease is progressive, likely terminal, and requires a high level of care and extremely expensive medical treatment that often exceeds covered insurance benefits, creating great financial burdens on affected families; and

WHEREAS, A proposed educational pension cost shift, which would shift the cost burden from the State of Illinois to local school districts, community colleges, and institutions of higher education, is under discussion; this proposal would require all employers of members in the Teachers' Retirement System and the State Universities Retirement System to pay the normal cost of pension benefits earned; and

WHEREAS, If this proposal were to become policy, for the Teachers' Retirement System and the State Universities Retirement System, it would potentially move \$10.187 billion in estimated normal costs of

pension benefits earned from the State to local school districts, community colleges, and institutions of higher learning over a 10-year period; actuarial changes recently made by these 2 systems will further increase these numbers; and

WHEREAS, This plan would move these spending commitments from one taxing body, the State, to a group of taxing bodies, the school districts and community colleges, while additional pension costs would be shifted to State universities; and

WHEREAS, A pension cost shift would lead to a massive increase in local funding requirements on school districts; the cost shift would exacerbate the problem of adequately funding our local schools by taking even more when districts, teachers, and local voters are fighting to simply keep educational opportunities open to our students; in addition, a pension cost shift would likely lead to massive property tax hikes or to classroom cuts that will harm our students; and

WHEREAS, According to the Illinois State Board of Education, 67% of school districts in the State are operating in the red; and

WHEREAS, School districts already bear a large share of the Teachers' Retirement System pension burden by paying a statutory share of the System's total contribution costs, constituting 0.58% of pensionable teacher payroll; districts also contribute towards any locally-negotiated early retirement options and for the pension costs of certain increases in compensation, totaling \$92.5 million in Fiscal Year 2012; and

WHEREAS, Representatives from Northern Illinois University publicly stated that if the cost shift were to be covered by increasing tuition on parents and students, each percentage of payroll cost shifted to the university would translate into a 2% tuition increase; this proposed cost shift would also increase the liability of State-funded universities and all community colleges, thus making higher education even more unaffordable for students and their parents; and

WHEREAS, This plan would harm the interests of all taxpayers, especially in downstate and suburban areas and would sharply increase inequities created by the current school aid formula between Chicago and the rest of the State; because of the impact on institutions of higher education, Chicago taxpayers, parents, and students would also be affected; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we state our belief that an educational pension cost shift is financially wrong and would only serve to shift pension burdens from the State to the status of an unfunded mandate.

WHEREAS, The General Assembly is concerned with the health, safety, and welfare of all returning veterans of this country's armed forces to Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The rate of mental health problems and suicides for members of this country's armed forces remains startlingly high; and

WHEREAS, Between 2005 and 2011, the veteran suicide rate in Illinois was more than twice the rate for civilians; and

WHEREAS, 17.72% of all suicide deaths in Illinois are veterans; therefore, be it

6) one representative from the Department of Military Affairs, chosen by the Director of Military Affairs;

7) one representative from the Department of Public Health, chosen by the Director of Public Health; and

8) one representative of the Department of Human Services, chosen by the Secretary of Human Services; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall meet periodically at the discretion of the chair to investigate and form recommendations concerning the issue of suicides among Illinois veterans; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the Task Force serve with no compensation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Department of Veterans' Affairs shall provide administrative and other support to the Task Force; and be it further

Executive Summary

The following report outlines waivers of School Code mandates that school districts, regional offices of education, or special education or vocational education cooperatives have requested since the last report, which was transmitted in March 2014. Pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/2-3.25g), these requests must be sent to the General Assembly for its consideration before October 1, 2014.

The report is organized by subject area and by school district, regional office, or special education or vocational education cooperative. The General Assembly may disapprove the report in whole or in part within 60 calendar days after each chamber next convenes once the report is filed. This is done by a joint resolution. If either chamber fails to reject a waiver request, then that request is deemed granted.

Section I summarizes the 50 requests received for waivers of School Code mandates for consideration by the General Assembly, which are presented alphabetically by topic area. The largest number of applications received (23 requests) seeks waivers from the requirements for non-resident tuition. There are eight requests for daily physical education; eight requests for school improvement/in-service training; five requests to raise the fee to be charged for driver's education; three requests for administrative cost cap limitations; and one request each for calculation of General State Aid; instructional time; and the use of other practice driving methods in lieu of one or more of the required six hours of behind-the-wheel instruction in a dual control car on public roadways.

Section 2-3.25g of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/2-3.25g) limits the number of waivers of daily physical education that may be requested by school districts and other eligible applicants to an initial, 2-year request, with the possibility of no more than two additional, 2-year renewal requests. Of the eight waiver requests for physical education contained in this report, six districts are requesting their second and final renewal.

This document also contains one other section beyond what is required under Section 2-3.25g of the School Code. Section II is a database with listings of modifications or waivers of State Board of Education rules and modifications of School Code mandates upon which the State Superintendent of Education has acted in accordance with Section 1A-4 of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/1A-4). The database also includes listings of requests that have been returned to or withdrawn by the petitioning entities. In addition, the database includes the 50 waiver requests for the General Assembly's consideration and is organized by Senate and House districts.

Complete copies of the waiver requests for the General Assembly's consideration have been made available to legislative staff.

This is the thirty-ninth report submitted pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code, which requires that the State Board of Education through agency staff compile and submit requests for waivers of School Code mandates to the General Assembly before March 1 and October 1 of each year.

The district's virtual educational program is designed to supplement the current high school (not elementary or middle school) curriculum and would not be used for programming outside of the virtual educational program. Students at each grade level also will participate in additional organized physical activities, as weather permits. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2015-16 school year. If granted, this is the last physical education waiver the district will be permitted to request under the law.

Wilmington SD 209-U – Will (SD 40/HD 80) / Expiration: 2016-17 school year

WM100-5958 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-6) request to allow the district to excuse students in grades 6 through 12 from the physical education requirement for a variety of reasons: those who have failed an academic course needed for promotion or graduation; and those who elect to take a course other than physical education and have permission from their principals to do so. In addition, the district asks to excuse students in grades 9 and 10 from daily physical education if they participate in two or more interscholastic athletic programs. The waiver, if approved, will allow the district to use the instructional day in the “most beneficial manner to students.” If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2015-16 school year. If granted, this is the last physical education waiver the district will be permitted to request under

the law.

Sterling CUSD 5 – Whiteside, Lee (SD 36/HD 71) / **Expiration: 2016-17 school year**

WM100-5959 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-6) request to allow the district to permit students in grades 1 through 5 to participate in physical education twice a week for 25 minutes each session due to inadequate facilities. Students will also have 20 minutes of recess each day, structured physical activities in the classroom, and opportunities to participate in the park district's athletic programs after school. If granted, this waiver would take effect in the 2015-16 school year.

Indian Prairie SD 204 – DuPage (SD 42/HD 84) / **Expiration: 2016-17 school year**

WM100-5972 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-6) request to allow the district to permit students in kindergarten through grade 5 to participate in physical education three times a week for 25 minutes each session due to inadequate facilities. The district states that students receive more daily physical activity under this schedule than what is mandated. In addition to formal classes, students have daily supervised recess sessions with activities such as football, kickball, races, softball, and soccer. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2015-16 school year. If granted, this is the last physical education waiver the district will be permitted to request under the law.

Crete – Monee CUSD 201U – Will (SD 15/HD 29) / **Expiration: 2016-17 school year**

WM100-5979 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-6) request to allow the district to excuse students in grades 9 through 12 from the daily physical education requirement for ongoing participation in show choir or for participation in academic intervention courses designed to assist students in passing content-area courses. The waiver, if granted, will enable students to take additional academic and elective courses. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2015-16 school year. If granted, this is the last physical education waiver the district will be permitted to request under the law.

Mundelein CHSD 120 – Lake (SD 30/HD 59) / **Expiration: 2016-17 school year**

WM100-5983 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-6) request to allow the district to excuse students in grades 11 and 12 from the daily physical education requirement for ongoing participation in cheerleading, dance teams, or show choir. The district states that students eligible for this waiver have rigorous daily practice sessions and that the waiver, if approved, would allow these students to schedule a study hall or enroll in other academic courses. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2015-16 school year. If granted, this is the last physical education waiver the district will be permitted to request under the law.
