SENATOR BISS:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. House Bill 2360 is a rare opportunity for bipartisan cooperation around here. The Illinois Secure Choice Savings Program is run by a seven-member board. The board includes people like Mike Frerichs and Susana Mendoza, as well as a number of appointees of Governor Rauner, and they have come together in a bipartisan fashion to request some fairly administrative changes to enable them to roll that program out smoothly and properly. Those changes are memorialized in House Bill 2360 and I would be appreciative of your support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 2360 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. SENATOR MANAR:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This bill came out of the Higher Education {sic} (Veterans Affairs) Committee without any opposition. It makes changes to the Higher Education Veterans Service Act, including requiring each public college and university to post a veteran's service guidebook to the institution's website, as well as other suggestions. I know of no opposition to the bill and would ask for an Aye vote.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thanks, Madam President. Senate Bill 746 is an amendment to the Corporate Fiduciary Act. Within the amendment {sic}, it replaces the word "Commissioner" with the word "Secretary". It also removes the requirement for banks, savings and loan

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associations, or savings banks to give notice of its intent to establish a branch office. I'd ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 746 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Madam President, thank you, again. Senate Bill 747 is an amendment to the Private Detective, Private Alarm, Private Security, Fingerprint Vendor, and Locksmith Act of 2004, as well as the Illinois Pharmacy Act {sic}. This is an initiative of IDFPR. It updates language in both Acts to represent current practices and regulatory procedures. I'd -- I know of no opposition and ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 747 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed,

I have the distinct honor and privilege to introduce two gentlemen from the south suburbs. Mr. Joe Bertrand is the Director of Hazel Crest Park District. He provides services to young men and young women across Hazel Crest in the south suburbs. He was down for Park District Day yesterday and he stayed over to kind of see what was going on. And last, but not least, John Curran. John has just retired from the Tinley Park-Park District over decades of service to our community. He actually was the Park District Director to where I went to preschool, so he is to blame for all of the stuff that I do down here. With that, I want to give 'em a warm Springfield welcome. SENATOR JONES:

Thank you, Madam President, and may I add how lovely you look in the Chair and thank you for quieting down the Chamber while I do this very, very important bill. Senate Bill 751 allows Cook and collar counties to collect non-real property taxes and fees in the same manner as they would collect fines, sanctions, and the costs resulting from county code violations. Senate Bill 751 is similar to legislation we passed out of here unanimously, but the Governor vetoed it. This bill, right here, addresses the Governor's concerns and it has no opposition. I welcome any questions. Look for a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 751 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Senator Martinez.

SENATOR MARTINEZ:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. As amended, it extends the sunset of the Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology Practice Act from January 1st, 2018 to January 1st, 2028. It also updates language throughout the Act to be consistent with the current Department of Professional Regulations {sic} (Department of Financial and Professional Regulation) practice and makes the -- the following substantive changes. It amends language in the definition of "(the) practice of audiology" and "the practice of speech-language pathology". It adds audio -- audiologists and speech pathologists may perform basic health screening. It creates standards for the remote practice of audiology and speech-language pathology. It adds ethic training requirements for the continuing education. It amends educational requirements for licensure. And it -- and it grants exclusive title rights to licensed audiologists and speech-language pathologists in advertising. And I'll be happy to answer any questions.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes, thank you, Madam President, Members of the committee -- Members of the Senate. Senate Floor Amendment 2, it removes all the concerns raised by the committee. The purpose is to make sure that the Secretary of State has the ability to revoke licenses of those should someone end up in a fatal accident while overtaking and pass a stopped school bus. There's no opposition and hopefully get a Aye vote from the Members of the Senate.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 840.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Raoul.

SENATOR RAOUL:

Thank you. Senate Bill 840 creates a felony offense of extortion. It's an initiative of DuPage County State's Attorney. Person commits the extortion when he or she knowingly obtains property, services, an advantage, or something of value after inducing that person's consent. This is identical to a -- a bill that passed unanimously last Session.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 840 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 849.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Hutchinson.

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Thank you -- thank you, Madam President and Members of the Senate. Senate Bill 849 allows counties to refuse property tax objections that are based on budget or appropriation ordinances if certain measures are taken. Municipalities currently have this ability. I know of no opposition and I'm happy to answer questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 849 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? SENATOR WEAVER:

A point of introduction, please. You made me think I had a bill for a minute. I got really nervous there.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

I'm sorry. I'm just getting around to your announcement, Senator. Please state your announcement.

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SENATOR WEAVER:

I've got -- thank you. I've got Micah Driesner with me today, along with his family up here - just great folks from the Dunlap area. And he's interested in Boy Scouts, musical theater, tae kwon do, speech and debate, politics and history. Plans to be a -- a law -- be a -- be a law graduate or college professor and hopes to get his Eagle Scout. But please welcome to Springfield Micah Driesner.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Welcome to the Illinois General Assembly, you and your family. I hope you have a wonderful experience. Moving on to Senate Bill 851. Senator Hutchinson. The lady indicates she wish to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 851.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Hutchinson.

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 851 requires the board of trustees of a municipal library to submit to the corporate authorities of the municipality and the Illinois State Library a statement of financial requirements necessary for the next year and the amount of taxes that will need to be levied for the library's purposes. Senate Bill 851 stipulates that this statement shall be submitted no less than sixty days prior to when the tax levy must be certified in the Property Tax Code. Under current statute, this statement is required within sixty days after the

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expiration of each fiscal year. Again, I know of no opposition. It's a very simple bill. Happy to answer any questions, but I look for your support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 851 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 851, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hutchinson, on Senate Bill 852. Out of the record. Senator Manar, on Senate Bill 864. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 864.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Manar.

SENATOR MANAR:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This bill is the result of a situation that happened in the 48th and the 50th Senate Districts. It deals with how libraries convert from municipal libraries into districts and it would say, moving forward, that in order to annex new territory, that has to be approved through an up-front referendum, rather than through what I would describe as a very obscure process today. I'd be happy to take any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 864 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 864, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator T. Cullerton, on Senate Bill 867. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 867.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Cullerton.

SENATOR T. CULLERTON:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 867 amends the Limited -- LLC Act. Reduces the fee collected from five hundred to thirty-nine. We have passed this bill the past two years. I'm looking to pass it again. It has always gone out unopposed. We just have not been able to get it through the House. So I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 867 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 867, having received the required constitutional

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majority, is declared passed. President Cullerton, on Senate Bill 870. Out of the record. Senator Morrison, on Senate Bill 881. Senator Morrison. Out of the record. Senator Hutchinson, on Senate Bill 889. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 889.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Hutchinson.

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Thank you. Senate Committee -- Senate Committee Amendment No. 2 deletes all and becomes the bill. It provides that, except as otherwise specifically provided by statute, no person who is qualified and able to serve as a juror may be excluded from jury service in any court of this State on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or economic status. Previously, Senate Bill 889 also prohibited juror discrimination on the basis of marital status, order of protection status, sexual orientation, and this was -- made it -- this made it much simpler and only mirrored the federal statute that's already in place. So we're just codifying the way federal cases handle their jury selection today.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Is there any discussion? Senator Tracy, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Madam President. A question of the sponsor.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Sponsor indicates she will yield. Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Senator Hutchinson, our analysis actually says that it's not an exact mirror of the federal legislation, that political party discrimination is -- is included or not... I'm sorry, it's economic status, is what I was asking.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Hutchinson.

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Economic status is in the federal statute and has been since 1948.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. No further questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any -- is there further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 889 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 889, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body, we will return to Senate Bill 885. Senator Koehler. The gentleman indicates he wish to proceed. He seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 885 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 885. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for

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consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Koehler.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

Thank you, Madam President. I move for its adoption. I'll -- happy to discuss it on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 885. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 885.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. This bill establishes the Installment Sales Contract (Act), which implements required terms and conditions, disclosures, and mandates to regulate the use of installment contracts for residential real

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estate. It does the same thing as a person would in applying for a mortgage. There's a three-day cooling-off period. There's informational disclosure. There's an amortization schedule. There's a recording of the contract. The buyer has thirty days to cure defaults, and then expands eligibility for foreclosure protections and prohibits prepay payments -- penalty payments. This is still a work in progress. I've recently met with the opponents of this bill, who is the Illinois -- Rental Property Owners Association. They -- we talked about six items that they had concerns about. I met with the proponents and there's certainly four areas where we can, I think, come to some agreement. There's probably two other areas that just need to be clarified. So my commitment is to follow this into the House. The sponsor is going to be Representative Jehan Gordon-Booth, who shares Peoria with me, and we will work to make this an agreed-upon bill. Happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Senator Barickman, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thanks, Madam President. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you. I -- I certainly appreciate the work that the sponsor's doing on this legislation. It was our understanding in committee that the amendment would be held and an agreement would be reached in the Senate. So we're a little confused by that and the sponsor may want to address that. But I also want to -- it -

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- so I appreciate what you're -- hope to do if -- if this moves to the House, but we did have a different understanding of what would be resolved here in the Senate. As this legislation sits before us today, this is a significant shift in policy for the way these installment contracts may be utilized. I think there's a lot of concern that it may, in effect, terminate the ability for people to utilize these contracts. Again, a significant shift. We're -- I'm urging a -- a No vote at this time. Regardless if this does move over to the House, I do hope that you'll work with the opponents to resolve the -- the issues. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Senator Collins, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR COLLINS:

Thank you, Madam President. I raise -- to the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR COLLINS:

Thank you. I have major concern, as well, if this bill does not proceed to the House. And I would like to share a little bit of a historical background of what -- contract buyers and the predatory nature of contracts dealing with contract sellers. Today, contract sellers are causing three additional types of damage. One, these contracts are designed to fail. Two, homes are being abandoned, cost -- contributing to neighborhood deterioration. And, three, sellers are leaving municipalities with the cost of cleanup and/or demolition. The historical framework: Between 1940 and 1970, at least thirty thousand African American families in Chicago alone paid five hundred million more to own their homes than those would have paid if they were white,

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based on the contract buyers' predatory lending practices. In other words, five hundred million was legally stolen from Chicago African American families. Hardly anybody knew that this was happening. Fifty years ago, much was made of injustices to African American renters and through the years there has been significant legislation across the country to protect poor and oppressed renters, but since so few Americans had knowledge about predatory residential contract selling until recently, legislation has not been enacted to protect contract buyers. I think now is the time to protect African American, Latino, Asian, and poor white contract buyers from the predatory components of predatory contract selling. The reason that contract buyers were put into the mainstream of home ownership is we've -- because of the redline practices of the banks, which have carved out a whole community where average, hardworking African American, Latino families cannot receive mortgages. So that is the sordid past history of contract buyers. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler, to -- to close.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

Thank you, Madam President. Yes, to the concerns raised on the other side. I'm sorry if there was a misunderstanding. That what I said in the committee is that -- just what I said here is that we have a list of concerns that we've -- I've talked to both the opponents and the proponents. I'm convinced that we can get to a -- a -- a place of agreement on this. Just to -- in -- in closing let me say that this is a area that I spent a lot of time working in. When I first came to Illinois - my wife and I came to Peoria about forty years ago - I worked for a social service agency

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and I did a lot of work with tenant-landlord issues. Alls we're trying to do here is we're trying to mimic what is -- are the requirements of going in for a mortgage. A -- a -- a contract buyer and a contract seller is -- just as Senator Collins has -- has explained, is -- is when somebody is not bankable, they cannot apply for a loan, then that exchange has to happen between the seller and the buyer. This just puts into place the same protections that we expect when we go to a bank and get a mortgage. And, again, I'm assured that -- that we can get to agreement. This will come back for concurrence and so I'd ask you to give us a chance to work on this in the House and give me an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 885 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 37 voting Yea, 19 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 885, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Righter, on Senate Bill 902. Senator Righter, on Senate Bill 902. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Please read the bill. Senator Righter seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bills {sic} 902 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 902. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Righter.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Righter.

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SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you, Madam President. I would move for adoption on the amendment. It becomes the bill. Be happy to discuss it on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 902. Senator Righter. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 902.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Chamber. Senate Bill 9-0-2, as amended, is an extension of the Pharmacy Practice Act till 2028 {sic} (2020). The language that's in the bill now mirrors the language that came over from the House of Representatives, so it would appear that we have an agreement between the Chambers with regards to the extension of this Act. Be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 902 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 902, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hutchinson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Point of personal privilege.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Please state your point, Senator.

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Thank you, Madam President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, we have a State Conference for the NAACP happening in Springfield this week. We have multiple members of local branch -- or the local Springfield branch of the NAACP, as well as branches from around the State. NAACP, as you know, is the oldest, most respected civil rights organization in existence in our country and many people also don't know that riots in the City of Springfield led to the precursor -- or the founding of the -- of the NAACP in 1908. I just wanted to give a warm welcome to people who care about civil rights for everybody where they live, no matter where they meet and where they come from, that are here to talk about policy and talk about the direction of our new civil rights generation. Would all the members of the NAACP that are here with us in the galleries please stand and be recognized by the State Senate for your advocacy work and for what you're doing here in this capital. Welcome.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

SENATOR HUTCHINSON:

Welcome.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

...Illinois State Capitol. Hope you have a fruitful conference.
Senator Jones, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR JONES:

Thank you, Madam President. Purpose of a announcement.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Please state your announcement, Senator.

SENATOR JONES:

I would like to welcome back our good friend and colleague,

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 928 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 928, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator McGuire, on Senate Bill 937. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 937.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator McGuire.

SENATOR MCGUIRE:

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senate Bill 937, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Steans, on Senate Bill 938. The lady indicates she wish to proceed. Please read the bill.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 938.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Steans.

SENATOR STEANS:

Uh, yes. Thank you very much, Madam President, Members of the Senate. This bill provides that consent protections currently provided to minors under the Consent by Minors to Medical Procedures Act includes chiropractic physicians and licensed optometrists. You know, the various groups have all worked together. I don't know of any opposition to the bill and look forward to your Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Madam President. This just -- a bill on the sale and distribution that applies to dialysis and devices performed at home. The underlying language allows the drugs related to the home dialysis be sold and distributed. I know of no opposition to the bill. Be more than happy to answer any questions.

Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 695 reforms and reconstitutes the Cook County Sheriff's Merit Board. The -- the primary goal of the bill is to speed up the adjudication process. There are currently about two hundred cases pending in front of the Board and the Sheriff believes the streamlining measures in this bill will help address that problem. I do want to state on the record for the purposes of legislative intent that no provision of this legislation is intended to violate or otherwise alter the rights and responsibilities of any party under a collective bargaining agreement or applicable State law, like the Illinois Public Labor Relations Act. I know of no opposition to the bill. Would be happy to answer any questions and ask for the Chamber's support.

Senate Bill 838. Senator Lightford. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 838.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Lightford, on your bill.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 838 creates the Veterans' Cancer Screening Program. It requires the Department of Public Health to promote awareness and programs for cancer screenings of veterans. The program applies to the uninsured and underinsured veterans and entities providing assistance to those groups. It is subject to appropriations and the entities funded by the program will be required to coordinate with local providers. Administrative costs shall not exceed ten percent of costs allocated by the program. Indirect costs of the entities funded shall not exceed twelve

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percent. This is an initiative of a constituent who personally underwent this with her husband who is a veteran and she was here and provided written testimony. And I'd be happy to answer questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 838 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 52 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 838, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 1223. Senator Lightford. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1223.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Lightford, on your bill.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill creates the Accelerated Placement Act. It provides that any student in a school district may be referred by a teacher, administrator, or a gifted education specialist, a guidance counselor, a school psychologist, or parent or legal guardian to the principal for evaluation for possible accelerated placement. This is a wonderful piece of legislation that allows the State to move to the place where we acknowledge that students need and deserve to be challenged more and that they have more accelerated policies put in place. There was no

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opposition in committee and I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1223 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1223, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body, we'll go to page 45 of the printed Calendar, Senate Resolution 140. Senator Murphy. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Resolution 140, offered by Senator Murphy.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Murphy, on your resolution.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. This resolution simply makes suggestions on the number of women that are on corporate boards. It urges them to have more equal representation. And I would encourage an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Resolution 140 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 15. Senator Lightford. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Joint Resolution 15, offered by Senator Lightford.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Lightford, on your resolution.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This is a recommendation of the Illinois Coalition of Global Scholar stakeholders. It designates September 16th of 2017 as "Illinois Waterway Cleanup Day", which is -- corresponds with the International Coastal Cleanup Day. Senate Joint Resolution is a follow-up to House Bill 4983 that is now State law, passed in our -- in the year 2016. I'd be happy to answer any questions that you may have and it's awesome to be able to recognize our high school graduates who have attained global competence. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall -- shall (Senate) Joint Resolution 15 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. We will all turn to Supplemental Calendar 1, Senate Bills 2nd Reading. Senate... Senate Bill 1450 {sic}. Senator Holmes. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1415.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

2nd Reading of the bill. The Committee on Local Government adopted Amendment No. 2.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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3rd Reading. Senate Bill 2032. Senator Oberweis. Senate Bill 2185. Senator Manar. Senate Resolution -- 454. Senator Tom Cullerton. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Resolution 454, offered by Senator Tom Cullerton.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Cullerton, on your resolution.

SENATOR T. CULLERTON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Resolution 454 declares October 9th, 2017 and 2018 as "PANS and PANDAS Awareness Day". Pediatric acute-onset neuropsychiatric syndrome and pediatric autoimmune neuropsychiatric disorder associated with strep infection creates the sudden onset of -- of obsessive-compulsive disorder in children, causing previously healthy children and emotionally well-adjusted children to experience severe anxiety/emotional disturbances. Some of the following symptoms are tics, abnormal movements, severe separation anxiety, irritability, aggression, ADHD, deterioration in learning and school performance, developmental regression, and -- including deterioration in handwriting. We passed this bill two years ago to designate this same day in 2015 -- or in 2015 and 2016, so I would ask for an Aye vote to approve it for '17 and '18 as well.

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Resolution 4-5-4 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted.
