morning, a letter directed to the members of the Senate.

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Ju..ju..Just a second. HB1129 on 3rd reading. Its on the first page of the Calendar.

SENATOR JOHNS:

I'll give you a few moments, gentlemen to..ah..look at the .. ah .. synopsis of the bill .. now, if I might, I would like to address this Senate concerning this bill. The amendments to the University Civil Service System of Illinois, embodied in HB1129, benefit the universities as employers and their employees represented in negotiations by reducing artificial barriers to settlements. At the same time the amendments place no additional financial responsibilities on the several state universities as employers. The amendments are primarily housekeeping in nature. They are based on twenty years experience under the Act. (1) The amendments eliminate the necessity for the use of the strike as an instrument in negotiation, not by prohibition, but by giving the parties time to work out their respective settlements by providing that approved agreements become effective upon the expiration date of the old agreement. (2) Once an agreement is reached the amendments provide that the terms of settlement must be forwarded to the Merit Board as the approving agency under the Act. (3) The amendments give substance to the provisions of the Finance Act, which recognizes the validity of payroll deductions, by authorizing the State Universities to negotiate with the design collective bargaining representative on the check off of dues on the status of the representative. Gentlemen, I would appreciate a favorable vote on this housekeeping bill for the universities and the employees of the universities. PRESIDENT:

Senator Graham.

if at the end of the contract, if they don't have it, why, I...I $d\Theta_n$ 't understand what the bill does. That certainly nothing to do with the check off.

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Senator Johns.

SENATOR JOHNS:

Senator Gilbert, ah...you're right in in the sense that the bill does more than that, but I thought his bill, his comment was directed towards this particular phase of the bill.

FFESIDENT:

10. Senator Gilbert.

SERVATOR GILBERT:

Well, ah...does the bill provide for some form of arbitration...ah...something that's binding arbitration, well the,

Lat's get into the discussion of it then, that's an entirely

different matter then just some...some housekeeping bill...I...

I think its a lot deeper then that, Senator Johns.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Harris.

SETTETOR HARRIS:

Mr. President...ah...first of all, I would like to make a mouple of observations about what I think...ah...is an attitude of most of the members on this side, perhaps all of the members on this side and then direct a question to the sponsor. Now, preparatory to that, I recognize that every separate piece of legislation ought to stand and fall on its own merit, but I mowent to make the point that there is a bill in the Labor and Commerce Committee, Senate Bill 1112, that deals with this sum....subject of collective bargaining for all state employees, now the limited aspect that this bill provides. So, to that extent those two are...those two bills are similiar and I know we mass lots of bills that are similar, but I do want to point out that this bill, when it cleared the committee,

received no support from any member from this side. Now, m... mind you, I'm aware SB1112 won't receive unanimous support from the members of this side, but I think these two bills have so much identical concern, this one in a limited aspect and in...s...as far as people covered, but far more far-reaching insofar as the extent to which it goes to permit union shop activity, that I think it would be an appropriate course of action and I know that most of the members of this side join me in wondering whether the sponsor would be willing to hold this bill, at least until we have had an opportunity for a second hearing on SB1112, in Labor and Commerce.

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Senator Johns.

SENATOR JOHNS:

Mr. President, I respect...ah...Senator Harris's comments very much and just bef...ah...I'll tell you right now...I will hold the bill, but it has negotiation possibilities in here, as well as check off provisions and I wanted Senator Gilbert to be sure and be aware of that too, you see, gentlemen, I will hold it...ah...ah... Chairman Harris...I mean Senator Harris in committee it received eleven to seven...the vote was eleven to seven...but...ah...I'll be glad to hold it for further consideration. Ok?

PRESIDENT:

The bill will be held. Senator Cherry, you wanted the floor? Is there further business to come before the Senate? Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I want talk about something that has given me a great deal of personal anguish, and that is the fact that we have...

PRESIDENT:

Ju...Ju...Just a moment, please...lets have some...proceed
Senator.

SENATOR PARTEE:

We have..ah..concomitant with our belief that the constitutional convention intended that the off year session, if we may describe this as an off year session, was calculated to address itself to matters relating to appropriations and revenue in the main. We have .. ah .. extended that concept to say that in the off year session, we would be concerned primarily with matters relating to appropriations and revenue, constitutional implementation and those matters which have administrative bent. Now, those are the four catagories to which we feel that all bills introduced must conform. Unfortunately, our brothers in the House have taken a different view and it has not escaped my notice that it may cause some personal..ah..anguish for some of our members to be in a district with representatives, who are offering bills in this Session of the legislature. Bills which in the main are being put in for personal aggrandizement because the possibility of there being past is ah..almost nil, but it does I think, place our membership at a disadvantage, because when a person from your district and the House puts in a bill and gets the kind of public relations back home that..ah..it's calculated to do..it..seems that the Senator is inert or asleep, or is not concerned about a probably a..ah..problem that exists at that time. But I would suggest to our membership that those bills that come over here from the House, which are not within those four catagories to which we are going to address ourselves, will not be heard and will not take precedent, certainly, over those bills within those four catagories and I think this is the only reasonable approach we can take. I am certain that..ah.. members of the House will have perhaps some unkind remarks about the position we're taking, but I think this is the only logical and sensible position that the Senate can take and I just wanted the membership to know that we are going to be giving our attention and time to bills within that four catagories and bills from the House which are outside that

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scope will not in any way take precedence over our legislation.

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Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

4. Mr. President. Senators. I certainly want to support that. 5. I...I don't know...ah...how some of you hve reacted to what 6. we're about to get, but many people who have contacted me, ah...organizations, individuals, I have assured them...ah...that 7. 8. so far as I was aware, we would have revenue and appropriations, 9. implementation of the constitution and the administration necessary 10. bills. Now, Senator Partee, may I suggest also, that we consider 11. ignoring some of the bills on the long Calendar today that have nothing to do with Revenue, Appropriations, Implementing the 12. Constitution and the unnecessary possible unnecessary administra-13.

tion bills.
PRESIDENT:

Senator Groen.

SENATOR GROEN:

Mr. President, members, I discussed this same matter yesterday with leadership on my side and with Senator Partee this morning, and it is now my understanding that the Rules Committee will give this...give the following test, so to speak, to House Bills coming to the Senate. If those bills coming from the House had been eligible for introduction in the Senate under our rules they will be processed in the normal course of procedures here, in the Senate. If, however, that House Bill coming over would not have been eligible for action here in the Senate, could of been introduced but would have gone to the Rules Committee and in their interpretation not falling under one of the four catagories would not have been acted upon, then that House Bill shall receive similar treatment and will not be acted upon. Is that the understanding, Senator Partee? I am in whole hearted support 100%

accord with that procedure.

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Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK:

Ah...Mr. President, I want to echo our support as indicated by some of our members for the President pro tempore's stand. I think, we all realize that when we come down here on April the 10th and plan to have an abbreviated session, which ends at the latest, as the speaker is indicating by the 9th of June, that if we are going to consider the most important things that are here, the budget, and constitutional implementation, revenue matters as well as administration programs we're going to have plenty to do and on this side we feel that there should not be a question late in the Session of doing away with dead lines for Committee notices because this is unfair to the public and I talked at the Speaker yesterday about holding to his dead lines in the House for sending bills over here, because the thing that puts us in the bind is the big load that comes over from the House in the latter weeks and I think that we will stand shoulder to shoulder with you in saying, if that happens there's going to another Session someday and there'll be another year with another session and so be it. But I think that it's important that we make this body operate in a reasonable way that gives full public notice and full hearing to the important things that we're going to consider, rather that trying to do everything all at once.

PRESIDENT:

Under our rules then, Senator Partee and Senator Clark, what we will have to do is have a motion following each message from the House reporting bills that those bills re... be referred to the Rules Committee and...ah...the Chair will just automatically call for such a motion, when...ah...matters come from

the House. Senator Soper.

SENATOR SOPER:

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Ah...Mr. President...ah... I'm...ah...referring my remarks
to the leaders on both sides of the aisle, ...ah...Pro Tem
Partee and...ah...to...ah...Mr. ...ah... Senator Clarke. I
would suggest that all these bills that are on the Calendar
be reviewed by the by the Committee, necessary Committee of
the...ah...leadership on both sides, in order to save some
money for the people...ah...State of Illinois, instead of printing
this nonsense on this thing every day and goin through this
whole rigamarole that this thing be paired down, if it doesn't
come within the precepts of the...ah..of the bills that are
to be...ah...admitted that these be stricken at the next week
some time we get rid of this...cause...ah...we use up too much
paper and we're just...were..have to recycle more paper and
I think we ought to save some money.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Neistein.

SENATOR NEISTEIN:

Well, Mr. President, ah...Senator Soper stole half my thunder. I was going to suggest in endorsing what the President pro tempore and Senator Clarke and...ah...my counselor, Senator Sours has said, that if I would be in order with the motion to strike all bills on the Calendar and start from scratch on the administration bills, the appropriation bills, etc., an in that way, Senator Soper we'd save all the paper and time. PRESIDENT:

Senator Fawell.

SENATOR FAWELL:

I, perhaps wasn't listening as carefully as I should, but when Senator Partee was talking about the fact that the House members evidently have two weeks in which to introduce

bills other than revenue and constitutional implementation, etc., it strikes me that as long as they have that privilege, an' I'm speaking here personally of a number of bills are important to my local area. They will evidently be introduced by members of the House because as a practical matter I have to tell my people I don't have the ability to be able to do it here and even though an' I agree with what Senator Groen has said here, we would take the attitude that we aren't going to them here here that puts, me then, and I think others in my position, in a doubly difficult position to go back and say not only we are unable to even introduce these bills of vital importance, but also upon their coming over to the Senate we stand impotent an not able to do anything even at that point. It seems to me that if there is not if our colleagues in the House are going to take that attitude and open it up for two weeks that really they put us on the horns of a dilemma and and force us to...ah...do the same...I...I don't ... It..:It otherwise it puts us into a position, where we are the ones, who are going to have to turn around and tell our constituents that not only could we not introduce but we can't even upon the bills coming over here to the Senate help you, in any way, I'm sorry. And that's a rala...rather difficult position and I think unfortunate position for members of the Senate to be put into and there are some very important local issues as our people see them, that they do want us to address ourselves to, so it...I just throw it out as...as saying, I...I feel it just doesn't unfortunately answer the perplexing question which is before us.

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PRESIDENT:

SENATOR PARTEE:

Senator Partee.

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you've expressed. Now, there's certainly one or two ways

Well, Senator, I thought about the exact same thing that

to do it. If you desire to put in a bill, knowing full well, that it is not going to pass the Rules Committee, perhaps, that should be the course you take. words you could go home and say, the bills that the members of the House put in I also put in, but those bills were not heard because they were not within the orbit of the consideration of the short Session. Now, if you're looking for the same kind of newspaper article back home, or the radio say that you put in a certain bill, then you can do that, but you would do that with the preknowledge that that bill would not be passed by the Rules Committee, so its a question of whether you wanted to tell your people that you put the bill in and it didn't get anywhere or whether you want to stand and look them in the eye and say this bill was not within the orbit of the rules at the time of..of.. our last Session. So you have those two courses open to you. I'm not..ah..in anyway foreclosing you from putting in a bill, you can put the bill in, but you'll put it in with the knowledge that it's not going to be heard, just as you know that bills coming from the House, that are not within the four catagories aren't going to be heard here, so if you want to, I don't want to use word fool, but if you want to..ah..spin your wheels and ..ah..get whatever publicity there is from it, then of course, that course is open to you, but I thought about them. The same thing you raise here and I said originally that this was an agonizing question for me, but that I thought we had to make a decision and we had to make one based on some..ah..real basic justice to ourselves because if we're going to adjust ourselves to those problems which are of eminence relating to the constitutional implementation and administrative measures and appropriations and revenue, then we have to have time to do that an we can't go off helter skelter on every bill that someone is interested

SENATOR GRAHAM:

Mr. President, first of all this sounds something like

PRESIDENT:

Just a moment. Point is well taken. Senator Hall, Senator Swanson, Senator Dougherty, Senator Savickas, gentlemen, let's have some order.

SENATOR GRAHAM:

Secondly of all, I am sure that all of us agree that the tax payers can't afford us down here doing some of the things we're doing, when it costs forty dollars or more to get a bill ready, sixty-five dollars for a Resolution. We're down here spinning our wheels, at a time when we should be addressing ourselves to the real problems of the State, and if we do that, that's more than we can handle, in my opinion. I also, have a fear that we are heading on a direct collision course, if we're not careful, with the House of Representatives. I think, it's common knowledge, that our relationship between the two houses has done nothing perhaps but degenerate for the last few years an' I think we should be well advised if we walk softly through the wet grass barefooted before we start condemning the men from the House of Representatives, realizing, of course, that we should maintain a program that has been adopted by this body, but gentlemen, look, if we are going to get into an open fight with the members of the House of Representatives with regard to the receiving of and the dispatch

of bills to the extent that we won't do anything with any of 1. their bills and they in turn feel they won't do anything with 2. any of ours, then, the only suggestion that I might make to 3 Senator Neistein, if this comes about an I can see the possibility 4 . of it, then, Mon...ah...Tuesday instead of him making the motion 5. to strike all the bills, we might as well adjourn sine die 6. and go home. Now, we are not going to fulfill the obligations 7. of this General Assembly by arbitrarily passing motions and 8. rules on this side of the rotunda without any conversation 9. with the members of the House of Representatives. Now, I challenge 10. our leadership to reinstate the communications that is so necessary 11. between these two Houses and to do it now before we find 12. ourselves in an uncompromising position that will further 13. place us in the eyes of the people as a do nothing General 14. Assembly and this is a challenge, Gentlemen and let's get 15. about it and quit this hassling work out some kind of an agreement 16. with the House of Representatives and try to do it over here. 17. without consulting them or have them try it over there without 18. consulting us. We're going nowhere if this is the course 19.

PRESIDENT:
