Seems like at a joint Session a year ago Senator Carroll, I recall the Governor making a speech about getting tough an hiring approximately 1000 enforcers to get these people back to work and get the gips off the public welfare, etc. Could you tell me how many of these enforcers he's actually hired.

I can't tell you the number of enforcers that he has hired, but as you know the courts in Chicago had two or three rulings on this in which we tried to take some of the cases from General Assistance an put them on some of the catagorical assistance an some of the ones where we wanted them to go to work an the...ah...you're just as familiar as I am with the rulings of the courts in this particular field. There have been people put to work. There are training programs going on at the present time. There will be a great enlargement in that particular field...ah..during this...ah...next year.

Ah...in discussion with...ah...Director Weaver I find...that ...ah...after study there's going to be some two hundred additional personnel added to the staff of Public Aid to do nothing but in...obtain employment...ah...for the people that you're talking about an the program you're talking about. This program just started this past week...this past week they have just started and their job is to be liason between public aid workers an industry an commercial business in the communities. Their...the staff is not fully filled out yet. I don't know how many of the two hundred have been employed, but these are the records for one week, Senator Knuppel. Yea. Senator Knuppel these are the records for one week. They have obtained 175 jobs for public aid recipients, after one weeks operation. We're hopeful that this will continue to be that successful.

Well...ah...I have no quarrel with helping people find jobs, etc., but I think this is a kind of a different approach to the problem than what was outlined here a year ago when we were going to have 1000 enforcers who were gonna get gips an cheats off the roll. A year ago I attended a Joint Session of the General Assembly hear the threats of force to be used to effectively change the direction of the Public Welfare Program here in the State of Illinois. We had a Governor who said he was going to hire a thousand enforcers an he was going to cut the rolls. He even cut his budget, which had been recommended by that exemplary leader in the public...i...in the public health field an in...as Director Harold Swank, who submitted a budget of one billion two-hundred an forty-five th...ah...m...million...One billion two hundred five million five hundred an fiftynine thousand nine hundred dollars, for that year to the sum of one million ... one billion one hundred an nineteen million five hundred an sixtyfive thousand five hundred dollars were cut abruptly one hundred twentyfive million dollars. Now, I'm sure the good Governor got the headlines by doing what he did by the threats that he made. We have to have a new course in this area. have to lead these people, we have to help, an we have to pro-

vide a program if we're ever going to get them off welfare an 1. reduce the rolls in the State of Illinois an I'm glad to hear 2. Senator Baltz say that we finally realized this fact. 3. is one of the reasons that I'm going to vote no, because now 4. apparently we have a program that's working. I don't know that we have to vote for this deficiency today. We only need to 6. vote for it before we leave here an I'd like to let this program 7. that we now have, this new approach, this new direction, this 8. new dimension, that's been added to the Welfare Program work 9. an see how it results...what the results are. Certainly the 10. program that was presented to us a year ago has not worked. 11. I think also that we need more...ah...itemization of what's 12. happened because I think the Governor proposed a hundred an 13. thirty-five million an maybe he doesn't really need that. At 14. least this is an admission that some of the really need that, 15. at least this is an admission that some of the headlines of 16. last year have not worked in this year. Thank you, very much. 17. 18. I vote no.

SENATOR PARTEE: I intend of course, to vote for this bill. But I think we see here today, a real example of some of the real competence that individual men in government possess. There was a man by the name of Hap Swank, who had been the Director of this Department for quite a long while an had been working in this Department for quite a while...long while...who gave us what now have eventuated to be three exact figures in terms of need. The Bureau of the Budget, with all its magical qualities, obviously pursuaded the Governor otherwise an we find our

selves today right back to the position, as enunciated by that very fine public servant. I think it would be remiss if I did not say this today that Hap Swank has been vindicated an his position has been made clearer to all of us I'm going to vote for this an we would not have been through all of the contrived crises which we have experienced if we had followed an if the Governor an everyone else had followed his pronouncements.

I'm happy that we are now developing a new kind of budgetary system in terms of legislative involvement in determining the amount of money which is to be available an dispensed to various agencies. I say to you Mr. President, that there has been too much budget gimmickery going on an we propose to watch it with an even closer eye so that this kind of thing does not happen again in the future. I vote aye.

I am not going to say anything with reference to his Excellency nor the Budgetary Commission. I do know, as an actual fact, that but for the intervention of the Federal Government in the supplying of certain funds, that in the light of the state of our national economy this deficiency budget would have necessarily have been much larger then it is. I know how easy it is to stand here an to cry the lazyness on the part of individuals. There are lazy

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Senators, for that matter. As evidence of it, if you look

around in you're...at the various vacant seats here today. This budget of this amount that is requested today is less than would have been necessary because of the stoppage on the part of business perhaps before stoppage of employing men an woman an the forced laying off of many thousands of individuals who perhaps have never before resorted to the relief rolls. Had you been present at any of our more recent meetings...an I see the lights flashing an I will abide by it by simply casting my vote...aye.

Now, as long as the Supreme Court sees fit to ignore the wishes of the State to keep the population stable and the people are allowed to make an attack on our budget and our welfare budget, then, as I said the estimates are from five to twenty percent,

SENATOR VADALABENE:

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Thank you, Mr. President an members of the Senate. HB4113, amends the State Financial Act. As you know, the Federal Price Wage Freeze became effective September of 1971 an at that time some fiftyfive thousand state employees were to receive a 3% wage increase. Due to the freeze, Auditor Howlett was not able to make payment to those people. After the freeze was over, December first of 1971, everyone, including the Governor, was in agreement that the employees were entitled to retroactive pay. Auditor Howlett contends, an I think rightfully so, that under financial Act that he was not legally able to issue checks for retroactive pay. The amendment proposed passed unanimously in the House an will be effective or become law, that is with the Governor's signature, so that these people can be issued checks due them. There are no funds in this piece of legislation. The appropriation part passed the General Assembly in the Spring of 1971 so we have no need for any new tax laws or new appropriations so I would appreciate your favorable vote.
