It arises from the fact that at almost every race track licensed by the state, given its date by the state, with the proceeds audited by the state, conducts 6 or 7 or 4 days for charity for various private purposes. The touchy part of the bill is that these private purposes include the Chicago Daily News Charity Fund, the Chicago Sun Times Charity Fund, Chicago Today's Fund, Chicago Trubune's Fund, Chicago Defender's Fund an a new one. I think all of you receive this...ah...book put out by the...ah...Illinois...th... the Illinois Thoroughbred it's called. It reports that another charity has applied for dates an received dates. The article is titled...it's the last one you received last Wednesday, the article is entitled Charity Begins at Home an it reports that the Truf Breeders Protective Association is going to run two charity meetings at Kahokia and at Fairmont, the southern Illinois tracks. Now in total here's what we have, the Sun Times Daily News Charity Trust runs a meeting operated by the Fox Valley Troting Association at Sportman's Park from February 23rd to 29th, Sun Times Daily News Charity Trust runs another meeting at Washington Park operated by the Egyptian Association from December 1st to 7th. Chicago Defender's Charity has two meetings at Bell Moral from December 8th to the 11th an from February

19th to 21st. Chicago Tri-

bune has one, Chicago Today has one, an the Horseman's Benevolent Protection Association has two more. The total proceeds 1. of this are difficult to calculate. I don't know how many millions 2. of dollars we're talking about. These associations are very 3. reluctant...ah...an private in their disclosure of just how 4. much they receive. I can tell you frankly this is not a partisan 5. bill, it does not have...ah...the approval of the Governor. 6. 7. I don't know if he'll sign it. It does not have the approval of the...ah...racing board. It's simply an idea which will 8. produce revenue, it will produce X dollars, it won't cost us .9. The objections to it which I have heard are basicly 10. the objections that the state doesn't know how to run a race 11. track meeting an the answer to that is that neither does the 12. Chicago Daily News or the Sun Times or the Tribune or Today. 13. When the Chicago Daily News runs its 6 days for charity, all 14. they do is permit one race to be named after their editor an 15. show up at the end of the week to receive their check for their 16. cut in the proceeds. Henry Hanson doesn't punch out the tickets 17. an Mike Royko doesn't park the cars. The regular race track 18. association conducts the entire meeting, slices the roast beef, 19. pours the beer, an simply gives the newspaper their share of 20. the net proceeds from the meeting an this is easy money. 21. I have no particular quarrel with the Chicago newspapers or 22. with any of the organizations running these meetings but I think 23. it's extremely improper for a tax supported, tax enforced, state 24. collected revenue to be turned over to any charity for its private 25. purposes. I see no reason why if we do not...ah...take some 26. action like this that next year NBC won't apply for money for 27. its charity an the Cancer Fund apply for money for its charity. 28. Meanwhile the State of Illinois for its legitimate purposes 29. is starving for money. So here we have a very cheap, inexpensive 30. way for the state to produce X millions of dollars in revenue...a... 31. with no increase in taxes an all it takes is the simple candor 32. to say to the Chicago newspapers we think it's wonderful for 33. you to send these boys to summer camp, raise

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your own charitable money the way everybody else does. Ah...I

If the shareholder does not pay personal property tax on his stock the bank is obligated to pay it for him. Now, from the practical stand point this is what happens in my county at least. Instead of the county sending out tax bills to shareholders of banks each bank submits a list of shareholders to the county officials. They then place an assessed valuation on the stock of the bank, the figures are computed an the tax bill is determined not individually, but for the total number of shares outstanding of that banking institution. The bill is then sent to the bank, an the bank sends it's check to the county. Now that doesn't happen with any other kind of corporate stock in Illinois. That's only solely an peculiarly the case of bank stock. Now, because of the conflict that I have, I have never introduced a bill to do anything about it, but it certainly seems to me to be fair an equitable that if this is

good why does this same provision not apply to stock held by 1. a person in Pekin...an..
