Mr. President, members of the Senate, I think that Senator Knuppel has fairly appraised the content of SB1090. I would in reply...state just a little bit about background current situation and some additional information about this entire problem. As most of you are aware, at the present time the unfunded liabilities, the accrued liabilities an this constitutes an outstanding debt of the people of this State to those who are participating and are on pension for all State supported pension systems. That unfunded liability is 2 an ½ billion dollars. Now when we consider the condition of the State's finances, when we consider the obligations of this State, we must con...include this obligation of the people. Secondly, the people who pay the taxes to pay the pensions for the State supported systems are the same people who support your local systems of pensions for those who serve in government...go...in government at the local level, those are

your city, county, and other similar pension systems. The unfund-1. ed liability of those systems is in excess of 2 billion dollars 2. so that when we add together all of the liabilities of the peo-3. ple of the State of Illinois who pay taxes to support pension 4. systems of public employees in this State, the figure has approached 5. almost 5 billion dollars. The history of this subject is long, 6. complex, an' varied. It is true that a few states have seen 7. fit to do this. One of things however, that is true about those 8. states that is not true about Illinois is that those states 9. generally had the wisdom an foresight when they established 10. pension systems in their state to pay into those funds the amount 11. of money to fund those systems 100%, so they do not have to 12. look at an unfunded liability of 2, 2 an a half, 5 billion dollars. 13. Their only concern is what the current cost that will be involved 14. amounts to. That's not the case in Illinois. Now we do have 15. this bill that is...will presently be before you or shortly 16. be before you that would give 5 years of service credit an other 17. systems already have similar benefits that would give up to 18. 5 years maximum provided the individual has..was in state service 19. at the time he went into military service. Now I would state 20. simply catagorically that it is a sound basic pension policy 21. that the obligation of the taxpayer to pay a ta...a pension 22. to an employee does not accrue prior to the time that individual 23. is in service of government an to go back an say to state employees 24. irrespective of when you served if you served in the military 25. prior to state service you are entitled to this would be a...a 26. complete rupture of that basic fundamental pension position. 27. It seems ta me that we have reached a point an I think the public 28. has reached a point where they are tired of increased pensions 29. that have been granted by the General Assembly to all...all 30. segments of public employees. Now, if we grant this to this 31. catagory...to state employees you can bet your bottom dollar 32. that come January of 1973 every other system is going to be 33. here asking you to extend this privilege an this benefit to them. Now, in determining what the cost of this would amount to ...it was of difficult composition an determination because there i...it is difficult to ascertain an determine, but we did go to other states, we did what we could statistically to come up with the best possible estimate an I would agree it is in rough figures. We know that it would not be less then 12 million dollars an we know that the unfunded liability that would accrue as a result of this bill could go with this one system alone as high as 30 million dollars. We know that it would cost a million an a half mimimum and it could go as high as 2 and 1/2 million dollars annually..ah...for the current annual cost of this additional benefit. Now, when you add to this all of the other systems you approach astronomical accrued liabilities as the result of the general application of this policy to all of the pension systems in the State of Illinois. Your current cost put upon local taxpayers for both the state supported an you've go to look at it that way you can't sin.. single this bill out in the light of just this one system. You've got to look at it that every local an state system will have this benefit if it's established now for this one system and it is estimated that that cost could run as high as a hundred million dollars in an ..unfunded liability an as high as 10 million dollars annually in annual current cost. I say to you that the State of Illinois can't afford this benefit. I say ta you that this dangerous principle should not be establish-I say to you that the principle established by the pension laws commission which will be before you an which other systems now have giving up to five years of credit for persons who were in government service an then went in the service of their country is sound and is reasonable. I would ask you to support that bill when it comes before you. I would ask you to defeat this bad bill.

In Senator Carroll's absence I presented the bill an it's an amen...amendment to the Criminal Code an it makes a conviction of theft of a rented or leased motor vehicle a felony. Now, the purpose of this bill I might say gentlemen is not so much to raise the sanction as it is to give that crime felony status for the purpose of extradition. In other words if...if somebody takes off with a leased or rented car an crosses state lines an refuses to return that car under the present law that's a misdemeanor an no states attorney can extradite across state lines from one state to another on the basis of a misdemeanor hence we are just giving this crime ..ah... higher status if you will ...so..for the soul purpose of extradition ..ah...the Committee considered this bill as it did a couple of others rather hurriedly, I made a Motion that it be reported out Do Pass and it stayed in committee. Let me explain to you simply what it does. I would certainly hope that the Motion as made by Senator Rock would be sustained to at least get the bill on 2nd reading an then get it to passage stage. If at that time, you feel that the bill should be defeated, then of course, you could vote in accordance with your feeling. But the bill presents a solution to a very grave problem that persons in this state who rent automobiles for hire have been exposed to. Under the present circumstances when a person rents a car, takes it out of this state, an does not return it the law of our State does not permit the extradition of that person back to Illinois for the reason that it must be a felony to extradite one for, hence, the idea of the bill an on 2nd reading an amendment will be placed on the bill which would make any offense, it's a part of the theft section relating to an automobile be either a misdemeanor or a felony an there's ample precedent in our law for offenses to be either a misdemeanor or a felony, the wreckless homicide statute for example is one of those instances, so that a States Attorney in evaluating a case relating to a theft of an automobile may determine under both sections of the Statute, A an B, whether the offense justifies a misdemeanor or a felony warrant an in those cases where it is judged

to be a felony an extradition proceedings are necessary that latitude would then be given to the States attorney. I think it's an excellent bill an I think the persons who are in the automobile business for hire deserve this legislation an I would certainly ask you to support Senator Rock's Motion to discharge the Executive Committee of this bill Judiciary Committee...thank you...of this bill an bring it to the Floor for...s...on 2nd reading.

amended is an amendment to the trustee's power act, which now authorizes trustees to hold securities in the name of a nominee an it applies both to corporate an individual trustees. bill simply requests permissions with respect to corporate trustees only to substitute a computerized accounting system for the physical system now in effect. It means therefore that a bank would be able to hold certificates of the same issuer in bulk with ownership set forth on the banks records. respect to nominee registration, the bank remains liable for it's acts an the acts of its nominee an must keep these securities separate an apart from it's own individual assets. Implementation of this system could save vault space, eliminate most coupon clipping, ease dividend reconciliations, reduce the number of fails from brokers on sales an facilitate audits. This law has been enacted in New York in 1970 an in 1971 similar laws have been enacted in Massachusettes, California, Connecticut, Oregon, an Texas. This legislation is in my judgement essential to enable the trust industry in Illinois to remain competitive. This bill has the approval of the Illinois Bankers Association an as far as I know there is 1...little or no other known opposition.

Mr. President, Senators, these bills have not improved... ah...in the interim since we had a long detailed presentation in June I think of 1971. This bill allows a corporate trustee an may I say only a few corporate trustees are sincerely supporting this bill an that would include the First National Bank in Chicago an the Continental Illinois National Bank, in Chicago ...the others have less then an apathetic interest in it. bill will allow trustees to invest in common trusts funds...in the name of an nominee instead of the name a the trust itself. Even the bank would not know that the funds were trust funds... an thus could not know when the funds were being used illegally or for a nontrust purpose. Sooner or later this kind of legislation could really set off a scandal in the financial circles. As an example an employee of a trust company could have the trust funds transferred to his account an then could withdraw them for his own use, an by the time the theft might be discovered our hero with his hat on an his suitcase all packed could be safely in Brazil. This bill is no better now than it was last year. It merits your complete defeat.

SENATOR ROCK:

Well, Mr. President, members of the Senate...I have long been aware, of course, of the opposition that Senator Sours has toward what he considers to be this series of bills. Now, my understanding from those conversations an from...others that I've talked with was that his primary concern an I'm not questioning his motivation or his judgement was with HB1693, which as you know is on the Calendar on postponed consideration. This, in my judgement, is a horse of an

altogether different color. This bill merely gives corporate trustees the power to hold securities in bulk, so that they don't have ta hold 15 shares in one name an 15 in the other if in fact they have 30 shares. Now the Trustee's Powers Act already authorized trustees to hold securities in the name of a nominee an it applies both to corporate an individual trustees. All this bill does is request permission with respect to corporate trustees only to substitute a computerized accounting system for the physical system now in effect. I think..in...th...an the Illinois Bankers Association has told me an I've discussed this with other members of the trust industry notably Austin Fleming from the Northern Trust, who was in my office not less than two weeks ago an it just...they...they maintain that in order to keep our competitive status, Illinois should adopt this law so that these large trustees, these corporate trustees can in fact install a computerized operation. I would ask your favorable support.
