They do this by...by passing a resolution setting forth that they will utilize their building funds money from authorized tax rate from the building fund in order to come up with the matching funds. If they choose to borrow money, which this bill authorizes, they must further reduce their building fund in proportion to the amount of money needed to pay the interest an' the principal on the bonds. SENATOR BALTZ:

One more question, an'let me put it...ah...see if I have it straightened out in my mind. If they had a levy of twenty cents in their building fund... it took five cents of this to...ah...borrow money...ah...on the vocational bit, they could then levy five cents on this bond issue but they would have to reduce their building fund levy to fifteen cents, so that the only possible way this could result in a tax increase

PRESIDENT:

Jus...just a moment.

SENATOR BALTZ:

...would be if they went the referendum route.

PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Graham.

SENATOR GRAHAM:

Mr. President, I would like to suggest that those members not interested in this dialogue might retire to room 212 so we could hear what's going on.

SENATOR DONNEWALD:

Well, Mr. President, I wondered...ah...I'd like to have the cler...ah... the...ah...Secretary...ah...s...research an' see how I'm recorded an' while he's doing that I wanna introduce the...ah...part of the junior class of Moder Day High School of good old Breeze with Mr.

Bar...up there on the gallery, immediately behind me. Would

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Donnewald has just violated the rules of the Senate, and...ah...behalf of Moder Day there. On that question, the yeas are 45, the nays none, one present. The bill is declared passed. 1417 Senator Johns.

SENATOR JOHNS:

Mr. President, lady an gentlemen of the Senate, this particular bill is designed to increase the minimum salary for teachers throughout the State of Illinois. In spite of teacher's salary increases which have seemed substantial, a real gap between teacher salaries an' other salaries in Illinois still exists. Increasing resistance to salary adjustment for teachers may be based on the assumption that teacher salaries are high enough. I believe the evidence is completely contrary to this conclusion. Lady an' gentlemen of the Senate, nearly 20 thousand teachers in the State of Illinois depend upon the legislature for salary mandates, as they have no bargaining rights. In spite of increases, average classroom teacher salaries are 4 thousand dollars less than the average household income in the State of Illinois. Teachers when compared to other four year graduates rank 12th out of the 12 in the classifications, because of low beginning salaries ..may...Mr. President...may I have just a little bit of order...

PRESIDENT:

Right...Senator John's has requested order. Gentelmen...
let's...Senator Soper, Senator Bidwill, an' others...I'm sure...
you...Senator Soper you wanna hear what Senator Johns has to
say? Senator Johns may proceed.

SENATOR JOHNS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Because of l...the low beginning salaries for teachers in many areas, the accumulative earnings are

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Chicago is the only major district. I believe there's one other, but Chicago is the only one. What happens to the local school districts when people run for office? Don't the s...the teachers have an opportunity to elect people to the school board that will distribute the money that's given to them by the...ah...State of Illinois from local taxation to meet the necessary salaries of those school districts? When you say that they do not have anybody to...ah...bargain with or negotiate with, they certainly do. They have the local school board to deal with. Ah...they're elected. If they don't like the school board that they have then why don't they get out am get someone else on the school board that will give them every penny that comes in. You're not going to increase quality education just by giving an increase in salary to school teachers. The school teachers are reasonably well paid an' particularly when you consider that this salary is a 9 month salary an not a 12 month salary as most other people an even during the 9 months period they have more vacation time than the other people... the workers of this State of Illinois have in the 12 y...months that they work. Ah...you total up almost a month of the 9 months that they have when you take your Thanksgiving, your Christmas vacation, your Easter vacation. Ah...these people are well paid per hour as a general rule an'it's a local matter that should be determined by the school district. The school board is elected an they should be the people that decide whether the...ah...school district can affort it. If your going to have quality education you're not going to get it by just increasing the salaries with every million dollars that we give from the state. You're going to have to have some innovation programs, you're going to have to have some additional things added to your school besides just putting the money on the table because in ...when the teachers get their increase, justly so then everybody else should get an increase, the janitors, the m...the maintenance employees an other people as well. The people who drive school buses an all. They set the pattern an everything

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else goes up

so I think that they have a local situtation where they can deal directly in Marion with the Marion School Board an Carbondale with the Carbondale School Board. They don't need to come up here. We give them the money. It's up to the school board, from the local taxes an the distributive fund that we have to determine what that school district can afford to give.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Groen Is there further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

SENATOR MITCHLER:

I..I've a question to ask of the sponsor. In granting this increase in base salary...ah...does this conform to the Federal...ah...so called wage control...or would that be involved in any way?

PRESIDENT:

Senator Johns.

16. SENATOR JOHNS:

I do not have the answer to that question, Senator Mitchler.I beg y...your pardon.

PRESIDENT:

Is there further discussion? Senator Merritt.

SEANTOR MERRITT:

Mr. President, members of the Senate, just very briefly this points up to me once again an I...I hate to oppose this legislation...against the teachers, but I think it points up once again what we really do to school districts without hardly knowing that we're doing it. In other words, we come along with this at this time of the year an...ah...when it would be signed into law I'm for certain at a time after the contracts have gone out to teachers. It...it seems to me as if it almost places an undue an unreasonable financial burden on our various school boards throughout Illinois by the bad timing of it.

32. PRESIDENT:

Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

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Mr. President, Senators, this is another situation of officious intermeddling in the local affairs of a school district. School districts have had a hard time lately with referenda. In my city of Peoria there have been four of em which have failed abysmally, which would tend to suggest that the people who pay the freight are unwilling to pass a referendum. Now what we're doing now is going into the back door of this situation an'as Senator Gilbert has said if we are going to fix the minimum we might just as well have a new committee of the legislature. We'll call it the Labor an' Commerce sub-committee for negotiating teacher's salaries. Now, we're getting into a miserable situation if this bill were to pass an'it won't be the first time that we will come again to see them come back next year an next year an next year because once we put garlic in the soup it's there, once we fix the minimum an I know we did that two years ago an'we're back again ...once we do that we'll be plagued continually. Some of us had some observations a year ago, Mr. President, about the Spanish speaking peoples appropriation. Some of...the Senators back here remarking they'll be back within year for more money an'we had that fine example today. I think we should quit officiously intermeddling in the local affairs of school boards. This bill deserves defeat.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Latherow.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

Senator Johns, I wonder if you would accept an amendment to this bill that would say in no case shall these increments of raise be greater than what you've asked for in this bill.

poses that we're gonna have to raise the salaries of the custodians, the administrators, an everyone else connected with the school system. Now with regard to the school teachers I think I can say this without much fear of contradiction, only by those, who care not too much about the quality of our school teachers. If we would either fire or lay off about a third of the school teachers in the State of Illinois, we would probably be as well off or better off than we are today. An when you start talking about the school teachers they are probably one of the most protected segments of our society by the virtue of the fact that we have blanketed in mediocrity by the tenure system. I think that we had oughta quit meddling with the school.local school board's business an let them take care of their own.

Senator Groen.

SENATOR GROEN:

PRESIDENT:

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Well, Mr. President, members, I'm not going to repeat what has been said, but I would just call your attention to the fact that last year we passed a bill which mandates local school districts to provide special education in four catagories for handicapped students an do it by July the 1st of this year. Up to this point the implementation of that proposal...remember that I said we mandated local school districts to do this....the implementation of that proposal ...ah...has resulted in the office of the superintendent publishing so called guidelines. I defy any member of this Chamber to read those guidelines, an' tell anyone, including me, what they say an' what they mean. Now it is my understanding that at this point there are only five school districts in the entire State of Illinois that have been able to find the funds an to move forward in compliance with that law. I endeavored to get an extension of the time for school districts to comply an that extension was denied in committee, but I say to you that you have imposed a tax burden at the local level of uncounted, undetermined

millions an' millions an' millions of dollars by that bill an' you provided no means to pay for it, except mere pittance out of the general funds of the State of Illinois. It seems to me that...an..I...I wanta say one thing further about that when the appropriation bill for special education comes before us for consideration I am having my staff determine their estimate in conjunction with help from the office of the Superintendent of what the total cost of the implementation of that program is going to be statewide an'I intend to offer an amendment to the special education appropriation bill to provide the funds for local school districts to do this without raising real estate taxes at the local level am' I hope you'll support that effort when it comes before you. Now Senator Johns has testified, as indicated in his presentation that this is going to cost ll an'a half million dollars. Is that correct Senator? Would you accept an amendment that would appropriate 11 an a half million dollars to the common school fund to provide the means where local school districts can pay these increases in salaries without increasing real estate taxes at the local level an I tell you when real estate taxes in suburban Cook county, in the city of Chicago are approaching ten dollars a hundred you have reached the confiscatory state an'they can't stand this mandatory increase at the local level unless the state comes up with the money. Now, if you'll accept an amendment to provide the 11 an' a half million dollars that would certainly alleviate the situation to which I have alluded of the increase in taxes at the local level. Would you accept such an amendment? PRESIDENT:

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Senator Johns.

Senator Groen.

SENATOR JOHNS:

No. PRESIDENT:

SENATOR GROEN:

Then it is your desire to put this increased tax burden.

on real estate at the local level.

SENATOR JOHNS:

A reallocation of priorities. We spend too much money foolishly, on things that are really not necessary. To me the whole core of education is through instruction. As I said previously you can have ...ah...a...one room schoolhouse, but if you have a teacher of brilliance an of good personality an of good training an background then the students that...that move away from that building are blessed with a good sound education. All the fringe benefits, all the frills that we place in educational institutions are to me not as necessary as the attraction of good, well trained sound teachers.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Groen.

SENATOR GROEN:

Senator, you're talking about school districts that have been mandated by you as a member of this General Assembly...have been mandated by state government to provide some of those things that you think are foolish. Now, it just isn't that easy an' we are talking here about school districts that Senate Sours has pointed out where referendum...ah...referenda after one upon another have been tried at the local level am local gover... people have simply said we don't want it, we can't afford it.

when you state that you want programs removed... I can tell you an'if you're walking in an Alice in Wonderland situation here where you think that's going to happen, you're just naive about the realities of leg....education, as it reflects itself from the State of Illinois office of the Superintendent an' this General Assembly down to the local level. These local school boards don't adopt these programs because they particularly want them. They adopt those programs because we say they have to an' because the urgings of the office of the superintendent are such that they can't do anything but comply an'adopt some a these programs. You have reached the point in this State, in my judgment Mr. President, where we had...simply must, we simply must let the taxpayers at the local level decide an' I would agree with you that a good teacher deserves a raise, but I say to you that that oughta be on a basis where it is determined that the job she is doing warrants that increase an' let local government, let local school boards, the people that are elected at the local level to operate our schools, make that determination an' not set this General Assembly up...ah...as a super school board over the State of Illinois to dictate to local school boards what they should pay their employees.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Bruce. F...for what purpose Senator Neistein arise?
SENATOR NEISTEIN:

I arise $t_{\rm O}$ move the previous question, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

Well, your Motion is not at...the Chair recognized Senator Bruce first an then you will be recognized. Senator Neistein.

SENATOR NEISTEIN:

That Motion takes preference...ah...precedence an we have the parliamentarian sitting there an I'd like to have a ruling from the Chair.

PRESIDENT:

Well...the..the..Senator Neis...Senator Bruce was recognized by the Chair first am I thought Senator Neistein was making a point of order or a parliamentary inquiry am' since you're making neither Senator Bruce has the Floor am' then you will be recognized. Senator Bruce.

SENATOR BRUCE:

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Mr. President, members of this Body, we have heard a great deal of discussion today about intermeddling by this Senate an' legislature in the affairs of local school districts an' I with many, many others feel that we should not do that am' I believe the consensus a this Body has been over the years not to intermeddle, but I believe we face a different situation here, in that this body has refused over the years to allow collective bargaining, to allow equality...ah...of the two parties, of teachers an school board members, so that they can equally sit down at a table, can discuss their salary, can say to one another what is a equitable distribution of all our funds among all the people in the district. So long as we do that, so long as we prohibit equality between the two parties to where the balance of power rests with school boards I find it hard to say an' agree with the argument that we cannot intermeddle. It's been discussed in here today that perhaps the legislature should bargain with the teachers. You know I think the teachers would like to take you up on that. I think the school boards would be willing to take you up on that. They would love to come here an negotiate with you an this Body, because in their own estimation they would get a fairer treatment than they have by the school districts throughout this State, many of them. in very small areas, many of them having the ability to coerce teachers into receiving almost any salary. So what we discussed here today is a minimum salary bill for teachers throughout all the State of Illinois who at present are denied the right to bargain collectively with school boards an so long as that happens this Body must face up to the problem that that creates

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an' that is that

teachers must come here, they must seek a minimum wage, an we are responsible for that. If we wish to say that we no longer intermeddle, then I say let the party decide at the local level, that's what everyone has said today, SB1112 resides in committee, we have not acted on that in fourteen months. I think it's time we move on collective bargaining. Let's restore to those local units of government, to the local school boards, the teachers, let them fight it out, let's do away with the minimum salary bill am see where we go from there in an equal situation so school boards an' teachers have equal amounts of power, have equal access to resources. We pass, in this legislature, many bills 10. which affect what happens to teachers an their salaries. 11. year I spoke against a bill which changed the funding arrangement 12. that this legislature determined in 1969 that local school boards 13. could not transfer money between funds, thereby denying teachers 14. a salary raise. We have attempted legislature which said that 15. they could not make transfers out of building funds without 16. success. We passed that bill last Session. School boards through-17. out this State now can transfer funds between the funds that 18. they have available to them not on a loan basis as we declared 19. in 1969, not that they have to repay, but money that they can 20. keep in that fund to deny teachers their raises, go to the people 21. an' say we don't have the money in that fund, that's true, but 22. they transferred the money out. Now, finally about school boards 23. that have a great deal of difficulty in making pay raises. 24. We have before this Body two proposals, which will change funding 25. in Illinois. One of those, I believe, would have no difficulty 26. in adequately funding the 11 am a half million dollars. Secondly, 27. we had the problem of what is happening at the local level. 28. Many school districts in this State are not broke, do not have 29. difficulty in paying high...higher salaries. They seem to have 30. no difficulty in increasing administrative salaries year after 31. 32. year. I would like to see a study done of how administrator's salaries, who negotiate in a friendly union agreement with their 33.

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boards on their salary increases over the past ten years compared to teachers. I think it's interesting in the City of Decatur, which has had a strike over the last year, that the number of administrators an their salaries increased in proportion to the number of students or the number of teachers in number o...to students that ratio increased. I find that interesting an' I think that's something this legislature has to look at when we deny teachers a pay increase. Finally there are those school districts that have adequate funds, one district in my.. one school district within my legislative district has more than a million dollars of available revenue in bonds that they invest through the banks, yet they have denied their teachers a salary increase. My point is, gentlemen, that we all here stand and say that we are in favor of local control, that we are in favor of the local units determining salaries, that we want the school boards in the school districts to do the right thing yet we deny them the right to bargain collectively, we deny them the right to sit down as equals around the table and set their salaries in a just fashion an until we do that then we will have minimum salary bills an I will support them.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Neistein.

SENATOR NEISTEIN:

I resume my Motion...move the previous question.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Neistein moves the previous question. All in favor signify by saying age. Contrary minded. Motion prevails.

Senator Johns may close the debate.

SENATOR JOHNS:

I've heard a lot of testimony this morning an I must admit that...some g...some very good arguments on both sides, but I reiterate what I said always as a former teacher I can remember living in a substandard, second class citizenry, attempting to do the

job that professionals in other fields are so much better paid for in consideration of the same time spent in preparation.

This bill is designed to alleviate an injustice for people who have prepared themselves to take care of our most precious asset, our youngsters, an I conclude my testimony an I ask for a favorable roll call.

PRESIDENT:

Secretary'll call the roll.

SECRETARY:

Arrington, Baltz

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11. Senator Baltz.

SENATOR BALTZ:

Well...Mr. President an members of the Senate, I was attempting to be recognized because I did have some questions that I wanted to ask of Senator John. On roll call I know that this is not possible. I still wanna pose the questions, however. One of the questions that I was gonna ask Senator Johns was that if there is a school district or are there any school districts in his territory that might find themselves in financial difficulty even with an attempt to pass a referendum or an attempt to pay their bills from their present tax levies an their present increased state aid that we been giving them. I would assume that the answer to that would of had to have been...ah...yes there are. Ah...I would further pose the question as to whether or not this bill isn't the major step forward...ah.. in...ah...preempting the powers of school...ah...boards an' school authorities which we as a people back home duly elect. This bill frightens me only a little because ...ah...Lydia Baltz, my wife an' I have seven children. She's a teacher...ah...has a masters degree in mathamatics...ah...you might say that the influence ...ah...lay on the proper side a the...a the parenthood, because six of our 7 children have degrees in education...ah...two of them have masters one has a PHD. Ah...I have two son-in-laws that are educators...

one has his masters in education...ah...they...ah...ah...I see ı. them all...on Sunday they come home for Sunday dinner...ah...I 2. think the food is good an the price is right over there. Ah...pro-3. bably I may be a little bit unpopular with the attitude that 4. I take about this bill, however, I think that it'd probably 5. be my family unpopularity might be offset by the popularity 6. that I mightah...regain from the school board members 7. an' the tax payers in general. We overworked the u...ah...use 8. of the word appalled here in the last Session, but I was reminded 9. of that word ever.... after having briefly forgotten about it...ah to. ...for several months an...ah... I think it fits this thing 11. when I say that I was appalled to find out that this would mandate 12. that the taxpayers throughout the State of Illinois would have 1.3. to come up with another 11 an'a half million dollars. Now, 14. to rearrange priorities is pure folly, There is no such thing 15. as rearranging priorities unless you took John Graham's suggestion 16. and laid off one-third of the teachers in the State of Illinois 17. Ah...the...ah...I wouldn't subscribe to that theory. I'd be 18. more unpopular with my own family than I... I will be now, however, 19. there is no such thing as rearrangement of priorities in the ³0. education system in this modern day as I see it. There's got 21. to be some concern I'm sure. When you...ah...think that...ah...there 22. will be no more real reason to elect school board members to 23. represent you on this important body. I would...ah... thank 24. you Senator Neistein, I'm a little color... I a little color 25. blind on this subject, so I would conclude my remarks by ...ah...vo-26. ling to on this measure an urging my colleagues to do the same. 17. SECRETARY: 28. There's only one possible loss that the land owner can suffer and that is as the practical matter the only difference between a condemnation suit with quick take and one which does not have quick take powers is that the jury may not be able to go out and actually view the land as it was as of the date of the filing of the condemnation complaint. That's the only difference that would result if you had

quick take. Otherwise the issues are completely the same and as a practical matter even that wouldn't be involved here because of the fact that the type of condemnation you probably wouldn't by the time the matter got to suit, you wouldn't have an alteration of the land anyway, but what we are saying to our local taxpayers is that your going to have to take the burden of millions of dollars more of obligations here because we will not be able to make the time limits which the EPA and the Federal regulations cast upon us. I have here a letter of support from the EPA. It is gentlemen and lady, a very vital piece of legislation which this Body saw fit to give to the Chicago Sanitary District in the last Session. I concur that that is a vital necessity for that entity and it is a vital necessity for those fast growth areas which are under the gun and ecologically trying to meet their obligations. I implore you to reconsider, those of you who have not voted, and Mr. President...I...I would ask for a call of the absentees and implore the absentees to reconsider and I vote aye.

This is an administration bill intended to improve the quality of care in state institutions which have a large portion of their physician personnel practicing under what is called a hospital permit. It does so by requiring all hospital permit holders to pass an educational council for foreign medical school graduates examination. It eliminates the indefinite renewal of the state hospital permits and thus requiring passage of the Illinois Medical Exam within two years of receipt of a hospital permit. The State hospital permit allows the person to practice medicine in an approved state facility under the supervision of an Illinois licensed physician.

Would make it 9. a misdemeanor. Frankly I thought that was poor law, because we 10. have a section in chapter 38 of the criminal code, entitled theft, 11. which applies exactly to situations where someone and I read 12. from section A obtains or exerts unauthorized control over property 13. of the owner an that's exactly what it is when someone doesn't 14. bring it back, it's unauthorized control over the property of the 15. owner and if the property is worth more than 150 dollars it's 16. theft and it's a felony and the next...it is subject to extradiction. 17. So what we did two years ago we gave the rental car companies an 18. additional tool to collect their money. In the coming sessions of the legislature, one voice of wisdom that I am going to miss will be that voice that comes from Freeport, my dear friend Senator Laughlin. All 11. we do...ator Carroll's bill...is to say that in the first in-12. stance, you must remember, the automobile was given in an au-13. thoratative way, in other words, a man signed a contract for it 14. and his first possession of it was lawful, not unlawful. 15. subsequent time, commences to be lawful depending on conditions or 16. circumstances. SENATOR PARTEE:

Senator, I don't know if you've ever had occasion to rent an automobile, but when you rent an automobile you sign a contract. That contract has on it, among other things, some rather essential information, the name of the company from which you are renting it, its location, by street address and it's telephone number. I am sure that your son, the apple not falling very far from the tree, would put a dime in the phone and call them and tell them he's stranded.

They may first try to collect their money, a very understandable human thing, but they may also couple that with a suggestion that if the money is not paid there is recourse to the states attorney's office. Now look, section 16-11, which has been in the law since 1967, says prima facie evidence theft by lessee, only this wasn't good enough, you see, it shall be prima facie evidence that a person quote "knowingly obtains or exerts un...unauthorized control of property of the owner, when a lessee of the personal property of another fails to return it to the owner within 30 days after written demand from the owner for its return. A notice in writing given after the expiration of the leasing agreement addressed an mailed by registered mail to the lessee at the address given by him an shown on the leasing agreement shall constitute proper demand. Now that was an adequate law. That was a reasonable law. This one is completely unreasonable.
