1. CHAPLAIN: Reverend Phillip A. Desenis, Trinity Church of  
2. Deerfield, Deerfield, Illinois.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. You just read one paragraph that they say they have  
5. about the officers here. Also we were astounded at the warm  
6. and kind reception given to us by the security officers and  
7. state troopers. This was totally unexpected and I dare say  
8. that many an individual's concept of police in general was  
9. changed by the encounter during those few days, so I am going  
10. to put it in the journal. I thought the members would be  
11. interested in knowing that they were very appreciative.  
12. Committee reports.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senator Donnewald, . . . Chairman of Assignment of Bills,

24. Senator Saperstein, Chairman of the Education Committee reports  
25. out SB1547 with the recommendation Do Pass. SB1548 with the  
26. recommendation Do Pass and re-referred to Appropriations.  
27. SB1561 with recommendation Do Pass as amended and referred  
28. to Appropriations. Senator Lyons, Chairman of . . . Appropria-  
29. tions Division of Committee on Public Finance reports out Senate  
30. Bills 1154, 1335, 1437, 1466, 1546, 1549, 1552, 1559, 1563, and  
31. 1564 with the recommendation Do Pass. SB147 and 1369 with the  
32. recommendation Do Pass as Amended. HB4098 and 4634 with the  
33. recommendation Do Pass. Senator Dougherty, Chairman of Local

1. Government Committee reports out HB2562, 63, 64, and 65  
2. with the recommendation Do Pass. Senator Cherry, Chairman of  
3. Executive Committee reports out Senat Joint Resolution 68  
4. with the recommendation Do Pass. Senate Resolution number  
5. 311 with the recommendation Do Pass, and HB2416 with the recom-  
6. mendation Do Pass as Amended.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Any Resolutions . . . motions? We have a . . . Senator  
9. Groen.

10. SENATOR GROEN:

11. Well Mr. President, if I could have the attention of  
12. the . . . Senator Partee . . . connection with my motion . . .  
13. to reconsider the vote in the case of Senator Fawell's bills.  
14. Do you want that heard now or . . . I don't think there is any  
15. controversy involved. We're simply going to try to revive the  
16. bills, let him put on his front door amendment, and . . . then  
17. vote the bills up or down whenever he is ready to call them.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. Let's do it right now.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Groen.

24. SENATOR GROEN:

25. I . . . I would move to reconsider the vote by which those  
26. two bills . . . I don't even recall the numbers . . .

27. PRESIDENT:

28. 1442 and 1443 I believe.

29. SENATOR GROEN:

30. 1442 and 43 were defeated and . . . if that motion be  
31. successful . . . and we do reconsider the vote and bring the  
32. bills back then . . . I have the amendments which I believe  
33. are on the Secretary's desk or Senator Fawell has them, which

1. would both . . . to . . . to each of the bills would be attached  
2. a front door referendum. That's right.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Neistein.

5. SENATOR NEISTEIN.

6. On this motion, if we want to vote the way Senator Groen says  
7. and we should strike all bills and that we are wasting time and  
8. that we should address ourselves to appropriations then how would  
9. we vote on his motion? No?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. If you are in agreement with Senator Groen's motion you vote  
12. in the affirmative.

13. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

14. If we are agreeing with his motion?

15. PRESIDENT:

16. That is correct.

17. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

18. His motion today, but if we agree with his position right along  
19. then we vote no?

20. PRESIDENT:

21. That's a determination you have to make Senator Neistein.

22. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

23. Oh I see, all right thank you.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Is there further discussion of the motion? The motion is  
26. for the reconsideration of the vote by which 1442, Senate Bills  
27. 1442 and 43 were defeated and on that question the Secretary will  
28. call the roll.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,  
31. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,  
32. Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris,  
33. Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow,

1. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein,

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Hall aye. Harris aye. Walker aye. Graham aye. Rock aye.  
7. Nihill aye. Knuppel aye. Dougherty aye. Course aye. On that  
8. question the yeas are 34, the nays are one. The two bills are  
9. reconsidered. Senator . . . Groen.

10. SENATOR GROEN:

11. Well Mr. President, I would now . . . offer and move the  
12. adoption of amendment number one to . . . 1442 which has the purpose  
13. of placing on the bill a front door referendum so that . . .

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Well . . .

16. SENATOR GROEN:

17. . . . the people may vote on this if they want.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. . . . the . . . the Chair is going to rule that that is not in  
20. order and I know that you have discussed this with Senator Fawell but  
21. the sponsor is the only one who can bring it back from third to  
22. second and this has been the ruling of the Chair all along . . . for  
23. purpose of amendment. Senator Fawell is here now and if it's  
24. okay with Senator Fawell to bring it back to second . . . Senator  
25. Fawell indicates that it can be brought back to second reading for  
26. purpose of amendment. Senator Groen offers amendment number one  
27. to 1442. Is there any discussion? All in favor signify by saying  
28. aye. Contrary minded? The amendment is adopted. Senator . . . is there  
29. a similar amendment on 1443?

30. SENATOR GROEN:

31. There is. I would also make the same motion and . . . for the  
32. adoption of the similar amendment to 1443.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Fawell brings 1443 back to second reading. Senator  
2. Groen offers amendment number one on 1443. All in favor signify  
3. by saying aye. Contrary minded. The amendment is adopted. The bill  
4. will be on third reading. Senate Bills on second reading. 811,  
5. Senator Knuepfer.

6. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

7. There . . . then is an amendment to Senate Bill 811 which is on the  
8. Clerk's desk which . . . does nothing but delete the appropriation and  
9. I would move the adopting of the amendment.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Is there any discussion? All in favor signify by saying aye.  
12. Contrary minded. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?  
13. Third reading. 1353, Senator Bruce. Just a moment. We apparently  
14. don't have your amendment, Senator Knuepfer. The Secretary does  
15. not. 1353, Senator Bruce. 1353.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Second reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Any amendments from the floor? Third reading.

20. SENATOR BRUCE:

21. Mr. President.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Bruce.

24. SENATOR BRUCE:

25. Yes, . . . at this time I would like to move to discharge the  
26. Committee on Revenue from further consideration of of SB1352, the  
27. companion to 1353 for the purpose of tabling 1352.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. The bill is tabled. Senator Partee.

30. SENATOR PARTEE:

31. Let the Journal show, Mr. President, that I received a call  
32. this morning from Senator Newhouse who is in Chicago and he asked  
33. to be excused today and I quote, for medical purposes.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Chew.

3. SENATOR CHEW:

4. Mr. President and gentlemen of the Senate, having been  
5. officially excused on a committee hearing one day after a bill  
6. was called on the Senate Floor, I have been told that I could  
7. merely make the request to suspend the rules and request that that  
8. bill come back on to third reading for the purpose of another  
9. legislative try. That's SB1382. May I have that privilege?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. 1382, now I am advised by the Parliamentarian this bill  
12. was defeated. Is that correct?

13. SENATOR CHEW:

14. This is correct.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Clarke.

17. SENATOR CLARKE:

18. Mr. President, this bill was defeated on the last day of  
19. last week. If you will recall, a committee was in Chicago hearing  
20. the Lake Michigan Bill of Rights so called and Senator Chew was  
21. one of those people who was officially excused on that day because  
22. he was at that hearing. Now that was the day . . . the following  
23. day on which he could have made a motion to have this bill brought  
24. back if he could have gotten one of the persons who voted on  
25. the prevailing side, and he has talked to me about this matter. I  
26. feel insofar as he was officially excused on the date following,  
27. that if he can prevail upon one of the people to make the motion  
28. to reconsider, we should suspend the rules and give him that  
29. opportunity at least.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Well that would be the procedure. The . . . and that is the  
32. motion of Senator Chew. The motion before the body is to suspend the  
33. rules so that someone can make the motion . . . so that a Senator may

1. make the motion to . . . reconsider. Senator Carpentier.

2. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

3. Mr. President, in that case then voting on the prevailing  
4. side . . .

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Well, let's . . . take one motion at a time, Senator Carpentier.  
7. The request is for the suspension of the rules. Well, you can't . . .  
8. you have to have yours first. You can't . . . Senator Carpentier's  
9. motion is not in order unless yours prevails. Is there objection to  
10. the suspension of the rules? The leave is granted. Senator  
11. Carpentier, now your motion is in order.

12. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

13. Now, having voted on the prevailing side on Senate Bill 1382,  
14. I move to reconsider.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. 1382 . . . Gentlemen, the motion by Senator Carpentier is to  
17. reconsider the vote by which Senate Bill 1382 was defeated. Is  
18. there any discussion on the motion? Senator Neistein.

19. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

20. As I stated before when Senator Fawell had a bill and I'll  
21. state it again, we'll be here till December 31st rehashing all the  
22. bills if they're defeated and then we come in on these motions to  
23. reconsider and to rehash and . . . go over them. I think this  
24. detains and impedes the legislative process and whether it's . . .  
25. Senator Chew, my esteemed friend, or Senator Fawell, I think it's a  
26. bad precedent to continue in this session when we're only supposed  
27. to hear appropriations.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there further discussion? Senator Carpentier did you vote  
30. on the negative on this bill? Then if there is no further discussion  
31. the Secretary will call the roll. The question is to reconsider the  
32. vote by which Senate Bill 1382 was defeated.

33. SECRETARY:

6. Just a moment. There seems to be a little confusion. The  
7. vote is whether to reconsider the vote by which it was defeated and  
8. that's the question before the body now.  
9. SECRETARY:  
10. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr,  
11. Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee . . .  
12. PRESIDENT:  
13. Senator Partee:  
14. SENATOR PARTEE:  
15. This is a motion to reconsider, is it?  
16. PRESIDENT:  
17. That is correct.  
18. SENATOR PARTEE:  
19. Well, I would like to see him get a roll call on it. Particularly  
20. I'm sensitive to it because I handled the bill in his absence and I  
21. lost it for him and I'd like to see him at least get a chance so  
22. if you vote against it . . . if he gets it . . . when he runs it on  
23. a roll call that's a different question but I would like to see him  
24. get a chance to roll it so I'm going to vote aye.  
25. SECRETARY:  
26. Rock, Romano, Rosander, Saperstein, Savickas, Smith, Soper,  
27. Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker, Weaver.  
28. PRESIDENT:  
29. For what purpose Senator Groen arise?  
30. SENATOR GROEN:  
31. Well Mr. President, I haven't voted and; . . . and . . . and . . .  
32. running the risk of being chastised by the chair for not paying  
33. attention rather than listening to a funny story by my colleague to

1. my right . . . I . . . I would ask if I may what Senator Chew proposes  
2. to do with this bill if it comes back . . . to third reading. Do  
3. you propose to amend it or are we going to debate it and vote upon  
4. it again in the same form in which we defeated it earlier.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Chew.

7. SENATOR CHEW:

8. Senator, as the chief sponsor of the bill I didn't get an  
9. opportunity to properly explain it to the body because I was officially  
10. excused and I'm merely asking to bring the bill back on the calendar  
11. and amendments or any other cause would not be the question. I'm  
12. asking for that courtesy of the Senate.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Groen.

15. SENATOR GROEN:

16. Well . . . Well Mr. . . . President, I thought Senator Partee  
17. did an outstanding job in . . . in . . . in explaining the bill  
18. and presenting the bill. Unless there is going to be some change  
19. made in it . . . I . . . I see no . . . no . . . no point in going  
20. over the same thing again. I'm sure it's going to have the same  
21. result that it did before. It's just a question of who's . . .  
22. who's . . . who's going to do the . . .

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Well we are on roll call Senator Chew and it is out of order.  
25. He . . . his last response is not a question Senator Chew. Oh . . .  
26. Senator Chew may explain his vote.

27. SENATOR CHEW:

28. Yes, first of all I would like to . . . have the Sergeant-  
29. at-Arms ring the bell so we can have the absentee vote on this,  
30. Mr. President. I think we have so much noise here we really can't . . .  
31. we don't know, for instance Senator McCarthy didn't even  
32. hear his name called. I know he is voted now but I'd like to have  
33. the absentees called Mr. President. Aye.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Cherry aye. Donnewald aye. There is a request for a call of  
3. the absentees. I think technically Senator Carpentier has to  
4. call . . . request the call of the absentees. Senator Carpentier,  
5. do you make that request? Request for a call of the absentees.  
6. The absentees will be called.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carroll, Chew,  
9. Clarke, Groen, Harris, Horsley, Kusibab, . . . Laughlin, Merritt,  
10. Mitchler, Mohr, Newhouse, Ozinga, Palmer, Rosander, Saperstein,  
11. Savickas, Sours, Swinarski, Walker, Weaver.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. On that question the yeas are 30, the nays are 6. The bill  
14. is reconsidered and will be on third reading. Senate Bills on  
15. second reading. 1540, Senator Lyons. Senator Lyons was on the  
16. floor a minute ago. Senate Bills on third reading. 82, Senator  
17. Harris. Don't see Senator Harris here right now. 10 . . . 1408,  
18. Senator McCarthy. Senator McCarthy, 1408. 1423, Senator McCarthy,  
19. Senator McCarthy, 1423. 1430, Senator Rock. 1432, Senator  
20. Saperstein. 1475, Senator Rock. 1489, Senator Cherry. 1490 . . .  
21. 1492, Senator Cherry. You want to hold that whole series? 1509,  
22. Senator Latherow. 1509.

23. SENATOR LATHEROW:

24. Mr. President and members of the Senate, this affects the  
25. act that regulates the license of grain dealers throughout the  
26. state of Illinois. Now many of you possibly are aware of the  
27. problem that we seem to be having more of continuously is when . . .  
28. these grain elevators seem to close without enough liquid  
29. assets to pay those people that have deposits of grain in their  
30. accounts. Grain dealers in many cases have been allowed to ask  
31. for a waiver of bond if they could show the necessary assets. In  
32. this particular piece of legislation we are setting a bond of  
33. \$25,000 which will be mandatory, and using a 6% factor on the . . .

1. 5% factor on the . . . amount of grain handled per year . . . to  
2. determine a maximum bond that could be used not to exceed 100,000  
3. dollars. Now there can be a waiver of bond over \$25,000 if they  
4. can show assets of twice the amount of bond . . . bond required.  
5. This bill has been . . . I had a lot of time spent on it. We  
6. worked with all the people concerned and have decided with the  
7. amendment that we put on in the committee and on second reading  
8. here that we would pass it as . . . as is now, if possible.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Cherry.

11. SENATOR CHERRY:

12. President, would . . . Senator Latherow, would you hold that  
13. bill until next week? Our staff is checking out the amendment  
14. that was adopted and we really can take no position at the  
15. moment. We . . . will conclude our research on it by next Monday.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Latherow.

18. SENATOR LATHEROW:

19. Prior, Senator Cherry, to . . . my meeting with these fellows  
20. this morning it was my intent to ask . . . the leadership on  
21. that side for the privilege of holding it until next week, but . . .  
22. I'm not in any hurry . . . personally, I'll put it that way. I  
23. think we've got something here that's going to be necessary to secure  
24. the operations and . . . I'm not 100% satisfied with what's here  
25. either. I hope we can make improvements on it. Thank you.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Bill will be held. House Bills on third reading. 493,  
28. Senator Dougherty. Hold. 1318, Senator Latherow. 1555, Senator  
29. Rock. 1769, Senator Savickas . . . Senator Savickas . . . 1769.  
30. Hold. 2267, Senator Latherow. 2396, Senator Egan. Well they  
31. will be held. 2444, Senator Bruce. Senator Bruce on the floor.  
32. Yes. 2444. Will be held. Senator Harris that whole series, 2780 and  
33. so forth. Senator Harris.

1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Mr. President is Senator Partee on the floor?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. I believe he is, yes.

5. SENATOR HARRIS:

6. Well then . . . let's hold those bills.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. 3047, is Senator Knuppel on the floor? 3077, Senator Hynes.

9. 3080, hold. 3559, Senator Hall. 3647, Senator Sours. House Bills  
10. on third. 3647. 3648, Senator Dougherty. Senator Dougherty.

11. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

12. Mr. President I don't know whether or not there will be  
13. any controversy on the bill but this is the last of those  
14. commission bills for the appointment of the officials of the  
15. units of local government. This bill provides that in the  
16. municipal water districts the commissioner shall first . . . that  
17. one of the commissioners shall be the chairman of the county board  
18. in which the largest area of the municipal . . . the water  
19. commission operates, and secondly that the Mayor of every  
20. municipality within the district is also a member of the board.  
21. That's what it does simply and I would like to ask a favorable  
22. roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there any discussion? Senator Clarke.

25. SENATOR CLARKE:

26. Mr. President, I . . . would like to get a little fuller  
27. explanation of this . . . and the reason for . . . the change as I  
28. understand it . . . this would in effect mean that the Chairman  
29. of the County Board would be a member so that in Cook County where  
30. there are overlapping districts why you would have not only the  
31. Mayors of the various towns but the Chairman of the County Board  
32. as a member of these water commissions.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Dougherty.

2. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

3. That's correct.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Clarke.

6. SENATOR CLARKE:

7. Well could you tell us how it operates now and the need for

8. this change?

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Dougherty.

11. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

12. To the best of my knowledge we do not have one in Cook County.

13. This is a downstate bill presently sponsored by . . . Representative

14. Cunningham who is chairman of that Commission. This is a Commission

15. bill. I'm handling it at his request and this is the way they who

16. from downstate . . . decided it should be.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Clarke.

19. SENATOR CLARKE:

20. Well there are at least two that I know of in Cook County

21. I mean in Broadview and Winchester they have a Water Commission

22. that overlaps.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Dougherty.

25. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

26. I was unaware of that Sir. I give you my word on that. Do

27. you think this would be the derogation, that's all, I mean he would

28. be out voted because the municipalities would each have a

29. representative on there.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Clarke.

32. SENATOR CLARKE:

33. But I . . . but I still don't see the need for it or . . . you

1. know . . . could . . . could we . . . could we hold it until next  
2. week and . . . you know, talk about it?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Will be held. 3681, is Senator Egan on the floor? 3682,  
5. Senator Graham. 3682, hold. House Bills on second reading.  
6. Senator Dougherty.

7. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

8. While on the order of House Bills on second reading, Senator  
9. Lyons asked me to move Senate Bill 1540 from second to third reading  
10. if you will please.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senate bill on second reading, 1540.

13. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

14. Thank you.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Second reading of the bill. No . . . committee amendments.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Any amendments from the floor? Third reading. House  
19. Bills on second reading. Senator Egan. You were not present.  
20. Do you wish to call 3681? 3681. House Bills on third. Senator  
21. Egan is now on the floor. 3681.

22. SENATOR EGAN:

23. Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate, this bill  
24. does exactly what the . . . the description on the calendar says it  
25. does. It allows for residents who are eligible to vote in the  
26. United States in the . . . in the various state . . . in the State  
27. of Illinois to vote for President and Vice President if they are  
28. temporarily residing in another country. The only objection that  
29. I know that this bill had was in regard to those . . . draft  
30. dodgers who have left the country and are residing outside of  
31. the country. The objection was that they should not be allowed to  
32. vote for President or Vice President and the provision in the bill  
33. which requires a passport for applying in order to apply for a

1. ballot would take care of that objection. I know of no others and I would  
2. ask for a favorable roll call.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Sours.

5. SENATOR SOURS:

6. Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, this is  
7. a bill that is long overdue. I urge all on this side to support it.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is there further discussion? Secretary will call the roll.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,  
12. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,  
13. Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris,  
14. Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow,  
15. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr,  
16. Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock,  
17. Romano, Rosander, Sæerstein, Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski,

19. PRESIDENT:

20. On that question the yeas are 45, the nays are none. The  
21. bill having received a Constitutional majority is declared passed.  
22. House Bills on second reading. 2555, Senator Knuepfer. Hold  
23. 3586, Senator Savickas. On second reading, you want to advance  
24. it?

1. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

2. Well, I don't know much about 2346 but I will take it.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. 2346, Senator Dougherty will take 1206 I understand now  
5. rather than Senator Berning. 4079, Representative Moore.

6. 4128 . . . 3626, Senator Chew. 4128, Senator Rock. 4156, Senator  
7. Saperstein has. 4162, Representative Regner. Senator Walker.

8. SENATOR WALKER:

9. 4079.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Well, Senator Walker you want 4079?

12. SENATOR WALKER:

13. Right.

14. PRESIDENT:

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1. You're not taking 4162?

2. SENATOR WALKER:

3. No.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Okay. 4079 to Senator Walker. 4162. Representative Regner.  
6. 4164, Representative Regner. 419...Senator Graham on 4164. 4196,  
7. Senator Graham. 4353. Well, why don't you take it now, Senator  
8. McCarthy.

9. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

10. ...to move it without reference? So, if you could just...  
11. no one else take it. I'll want to pick it up...

12. PRESIDENT:

13. You want to leave it on the calendar. All right. All right.  
14. Both those bills will be held. 4366, Senator Saperstein has. 4368,  
15. Representative Meyer. Senator...4368.. 4369, Representative Meyer.  
16. 4370, Senator Romano. 4397, Representative Katz. 4397. 4909,

20. SENATOR BALTZ:

21. The H.B. 4419 simply increases the amount of group life  
22. insurance that can be purchased or furnished by an employer...  
23. from \$50,000 limits to a \$100,000 limits. If there is no objection,  
24. I'd like to move it to second reading without reference.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. There is objection. 4423, Representative Houde. Senator  
27. Weaver. 4425, Representative...Senator Groen. 4529, Repre-  
28. sentative Rose. Senator Horsley should be assigned that. Should  
29. that be advanced Senator Latherow or...Is there objection?  
30. 4529, Senator Horsley will be the sponsor. Is there objection to  
31. advancing that to second reading without reference? Leave is  
32. granted. 4536, Representative Barry. 4551, Representative Shea.  
33. Who...who's taking that? Senator Dougherty, 4551. 4573, J.J. Wolfe.

1. Senator Clarke. Senator Harris.

2. SENATOR HARRIS:

3. Was 4162 picked up by anyone?

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Graham.

6. SENATOR HARRIS:

7. Oh. Okay. That was in a series...might I have...that's  
8. in a series of bills that Representative Regner did ask me to  
9. handle. 4162. All right. Could the record show...all right...fine.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. 4162, Senator Harris will be shown as a sponsor. On the consent  
12. calendar, Senator Savickas' congratulatory resolution. Is there  
13. objection to the showing of passage of the Resolution? The Resolution  
14. is adopted. Senator Knuepfer.

15. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

16. Yes. I wonder if I may have...this is the appropriate pace...  
17. place to have leave of this Body...to show that Senator Knuepfer  
18. rather than Senator Groen is the chief sponsor of House bill  
19. 4543?

20. PRESIDENT:

21. 4543...where is it right now?

22. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

23. It has been assigned to committee.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. All right. 4543, Senator Knuepfer rather than Senator  
26. Groen. Senator...excuse me, yes.

27. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

28. I am sorry. After that I've got another request to make.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Knuepfer.

31. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

32. I have a bill on postponed consideration that I do not think  
33. is controversial anymore. We appear to be in that order of the



1. calendar. In fact, I have two of them. The first one pertains  
2. to the leasing bills. We got pretty well through the roll call  
3. and then ...

4. PRESIDENT:

5. What is the number...

6. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

7. ...Senator Cherry asked that it be held up. I held that bill...  
8. Oh, those bills are...

9. PRESIDENT:

10. 1467 and 68.

11. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

12. 1467 and 1468 because he had not as yet had an opportunity to  
13. check the amendment. I then put it on postponed consideration.  
14. Senator Cherry has since informed me that the amendment satisfied  
15. him and I'm wondering if this would be the appropriate time to call  
16. those bills back?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. It certainly is. 1467 and 1468. Is there further discussion?  
19. Is it acceptable to have the one roll call on both bills? Is it  
20. acceptable to have the one roll call for both bills?

21. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

22. Yes, it certainly would be acceptable to me 'cause they have  
23. to pass as a package anyway...the two of them go together. I don't  
24. think there is any dissent anymore. I will explain them if anybody  
25. wants me to but...

26. PRESIDENT:

27. The Secretary will call the roll. They're eager to hear you,  
28. Senator Knuepfer, I can tell.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,  
31. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,  
32. Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris,  
33. Horsley, Hynes...

1. PRESIDENT:  
2. Senator Harris.  
3. SENATOR HARRIS:  
4. Well, I really did want these bills explained but...aye.  
5. SECRETARY:  
6. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow,  
7. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein,  
8. Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano,  
9. Rosander, Saperstein, Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski,  
10. Vadalabene, Walker, Weaver.  
11. PRESIDENT:  
12. On that question...on those bills, the yeas are 41. The nays  
13. are none. The bills having received a constitutional majority  
14. are declared passed. Senator Graham.  
15. SENATOR GRAHAM:  
16. I'd like to officially announce I have found a friend on 4162  
17. and 4164. The gentleman from Pontiac, Senator Harris, is going  
18. to handle those bills so let him have them, please.  
19. PRESIDENT:  
20. 4164 also will be...  
21. SENATOR GRAHAM:  
22. And 4162.  
23. PRESIDENT:  
24. 4162.  
25. SENATOR GRAHAM:  
26. Give them to the curly headed man from Pontiac.  
27. PRESIDENT:  
28. Senator Knuepfer.  
29. SENATOR KNUEPFER:  
30. When we're done with that matter, I...  
31. PRESIDENT:  
32. He is done with the matter.  
33. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

1. Oh, I am wondering...I have one other bill on consideration  
2. postponed. I do not think it is controversial. The only reason...  
3. there may be one or two votes against it. The only reason that it  
4. is on consideration postponed was because this bill was called up  
5. in the wee small hours when we simply didn't have enough bodies  
6. to vote on the bill. It got 29 affirmative votes and 1 negative  
7. vote at that time. And...the bodies were simply off the floor.  
8. That is...H.B. 2646. H.B. 2646 has an amendment put on at the  
9. request of Senator Neistein which to the best of my knowledge and...  
10. did resolve his problem because...he and I chatted with it. It does two  
11. things now...it does only two things. It exempts from public...it  
12. provides an exemption to public health residency trainees during the  
13. year that they are in graduate training satisfying a requirement for  
14. a speciality licensure. And it does one other thing. It provides  
15. an exemption for dental assistants while serving under the re-  
16. sponsibility, direction and immediate supervision of a licensed  
17. dentist in accordance with the rules and regulations issued by the  
18. Department of Registration and Education. We did considerable work  
19. trying to satisfy the objections. I think most of the objections  
20. are solved...and I would ask that at this point if anybody has any  
21. questions, I'll be happy to talk about it. Otherwise, I would  
22. appreciate a roll call on the...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there any discussion? Senator O'Brien.

25. SENATOR O'BRIEN:

26. My memory isn't very good, Senator. I think I put an amend-  
27. ment this bill in the last session when it came up in May or  
28. June of last year. This was the dental bill that was sent over  
29. from the House that exempts individuals, I think, who were  
30. practicing dentistry in universities and billing for dental care  
31. and so forth. They were exempt from the term or the definition of  
32. practicing dentistry and therefore were not liable or something of  
33. that nature. I had an amendment and I'd like to check with you

1. on it if I could. Do you remember the amendment?

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Knuepfer.

4. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

5. I am perfectly agreeable. I'm not trying to push this  
6. through. I'm simply trying...I thought it was agreed. If it  
7. isn't, let's not call it and let Senator O'Brien check.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. All right. Will be held. Senator Sours.

10. SENATOR SOURS:

11. Mr. President and Senators, I have an amendment up to...up  
12. at the Secretary's desk with reference to both Senate Bill 1524 and  
13. 1525. I...

14. PRESIDENT:

15. 1524 is brought back to second reading for purpose of amendment.  
16. Can you...let's take them one at a time. Can you explain the  
17. amendment, Senator?

18. SENATOR SOURS:

19. It is the identical lingo in each amendment, Mr. President,  
20. and it simply states...well, it simply provides for a hearing. This...  
21. these were the cigarette distributor bills and there some concern  
22. about turning down an applicant without a hearing. It now reads,  
23. if the Department after investigation and a hearing if requested by  
24. the applicant determines that such person has not been sufficiently  
25. rehabilitated to warrant the public trust. Senator Palmer has seen  
26. this. Senator Neistein has seen it. Senator Newhouse has seen  
27. it. I know of no objection. I move its adoption.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Neistein.

30. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

31. I urge the members of this side of the aisle to support the  
32. amendment and the bill. As the amendment reads now, Senator Sours  
33. is correct. It provides an applicant with a hearing and a remedy

1. to go to court if he thinks that the Director of Revenue acted  
2. arbitrarily, but at least it provides due process for applicants  
3. and I urge everyone to support it.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. All in favor of the adoption of the amendment indicate  
6. by saying aye. Contrary minded. The amendment is adopted.  
7. 1525, Senator Sours also offers a similar amendment. All in  
8. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. The amendment  
9. is adopted. Now do you wish to proceed to the passage of the  
10. bills, Senator?

11. SENATOR SOURS:

12. Yes.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Sours.

15. SENATOR SOURS:

16. Does there have to be any intervening business?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Well, we have had intervening business because we amended  
19. the second bill and then we...

20. SENATOR SOURS:

21. All right. I've said all I should on these bills. I'd  
22. appreciate a favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there objection to the same roll call on both bills? The  
25. leave is granted. Senator Neistein. Senator Partee.

26. SENATOR PARTEE:

27. The action that has been taken was to restore them to a voting  
28. status. Is that correct? Now could we hold them 'til Monday?

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Sours.

31. SENATOR SOURS:

32. I suppose if he wants to defer it until Monday. We've been  
33. deferring a lot these days. I'll go along.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. They will be held. Are there other...Senator Harris.

3. SENATOR HARRIS:

4. Mr. President, now that Senator Baltz does not have that bad  
5. bill of his advanced without reference, I wonder if it would be  
6. alright for me to leave the floor?

7. PRESIDENT:

8. We'll give you permission, Senator. Are there other bills on  
9. postponed consideration that any member wishes to bring up? We  
10. have some Resolutions.

11. SECRETARY:

12. (Senate Resolution 337 introduced by Senator Mitchler.)

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Mitchler.

15. SENATOR MITCHLER:

16. Mr. President, members of the Senate. This is congratulatory  
17. resolution for Dr. James Krimmey, President of Aurora College and  
18. I would ask to suspend the rules...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. Re-  
21. solution is adopted.

22. SECRETARY:

23. (Senate Joint Resolution 71.)

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Motion by Senator Partee for the adoption of the adjournment  
26. Resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded.  
27. Resolution is adopted. We have some additional resolutions. For  
28. what purpose does Senator Clarke arise?

29. SENATOR CLARKE:

30. I just like to reiterate or to get a reiteration of the  
31. time we're coming back Tuesday, so the members are quite sure.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. So there's no mistake we're coming back Monday.

1. SENATOR CLARKE:

2. It was the House that was coming back Tuesday?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. House is coming back Tuesday. The House will be in Session  
5. tomorrow. They're coming back Tuesday. The Senate adjourns today.  
6. We'll come back Monday at noon.

7. SENATOR CLARKE:

8. All right.

9. SECRETARY:

10. (Senate Resolution 338 introduced by Senator Egan et al.)

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Egan.

13. SENATOR EGAN:

14. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would ask  
15. leave of the body to suspend the rules so that this resolution  
16. can be adopted immediately. It's a resolution commending the  
17. policemen throughout the State of Illinois and this being Police  
18. Week, if we don't adopt it this week it will be untimely. I  
19. would ask leave.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. Re-  
22. solution is adopted. Message from the House.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Message from the House by Mr. Selcke, Clerk. Mr. President:  
25. I'm directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives  
26. has passed bills of the following title and passage of which I am  
27. instructed to ask concurrence of the Senate to-wit: House bills  
28. 1104, 1531, 1535, 4323, 4648. First reading of the bills. Message  
29. from the House, Mr. Selcke, Clerk.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Just a moment, please.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Mr. President: I am directed to inform the Senate that the

1. House of Representatives has adopted an amendment offered by the  
2. Governor to a bill of the following title, in the adoption of  
3. which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate to-  
4. wit: House bill 206 which was Senate sponsor was Senator Palmer.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Is Senator Palmer here? Let's put it on the Secretary's Desk.  
7. Senator Partee.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. If we could advance it today, I would appreciate it because  
10. this is something that we've talked about several times. There  
11. were two House Bills each of which amended a separate section of  
12. the statutes relating to the selling of alcoholic beverages on election  
13. day. Both bills passed both Houses. There was a problem with one  
14. of them and it came back for concurrence. The House acted on it  
15. yesterday and we now need final action here, I suppose, to make it  
16. law. The Governor has already signed one portion of it and waits  
17. to sign the other portion, as soon as this is finalized. So I would  
18. like to take whatever action we could today to propel it toward  
19. finalization.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. The Senate sponsor is not on the floor. Do you wish to make  
22. the motion?

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. Yea. I'll make the motion.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. All right. The question in on concurrence in the Governor's  
27. amendment to H.B. 206. Is there any discussion? Senator Clarke.

28. SENATOR CLARKE:

29. Can I ask, is Senator Partee aware of this amendment? Just what  
30. its content is? Could he explain it a little bit?

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Partee.

33. SENATOR PARTEE:



1. I had a perfect awareness of it, which escapes me at the  
2. moment. I talked to the House sponsor yesterday and I know that  
3. the amendment is the amendment which would finalize this entire  
4. picture in terms of amending both the election code and the  
5. liquor code to permit the sale of alcholic beverages on election  
6. day. See, it required two bills. Here's Senator Palmer. Perhaps  
7. he is more conversant with the exact and explicit language.  
8. PRESIDENT:

9. The Secretary advises me that it is a short amendment and  
10. the Secretary can read it.

11. SECRETARY:

12. Be provided, however, that City Council, President and Board  
13. of Trustees or County Board, as the case may be, may further re-  
14. strict the permissable hours for the sale of alcohol, if liquors under  
15. such license in its political sub-division has a public good and  
16. convenience may require.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Is there any further discussion? Secretary will call the  
19. roll.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,  
22. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course,  
23. Davidson, Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham,  
24. Groen, Hall, Harris, Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel,  
25. Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy,  
26. Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien,  
27. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano, Rosander, Saperstein,  
28. Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,  
29. Weaver.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Graham aye. Collins aye. Berning aye. Merritt aye. On  
32. that question the yeas are 38. The nays are none. The Senate  
33. concurs in the amendatory veto by the Governor. Senator Rock

1. is recognized for the purpose of making a motion.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate. In Senator  
4. Newhouse's absence, there are two, four, six, eight House bills  
5. that just came over that conform the penalties to the Uniform  
6. Code of Corrections. Some of these bills were referred to  
7. committees other than the Judiciary Committee. I would move that  
8. the bills that were otherwise assigned be re-referred to the  
9. Committee on Judiciary and those numbers are H.B. 4375, 4376,  
10. 4377, 4379, 4380, 4382. Now, whatever the...I spoke to Senator  
11. Donnewald about this and in an attempt to evenly distribute the  
12. work load they were signing other committees to this type of  
13. bill. They properly belong in the Committee on Judiciary.  
14. Senator Neistein has agreed they should be in Judiciary and I  
15. so move.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. The motion is to discharge those bills from various com-  
18. mittees and reassign them to the Judiciary. Is there objection?  
19. Leave is granted. Senator Rock, can you notify the Chairman of  
20. the other committees that they have been with, so that they un-  
21. derstand? Senator Neistein.

22. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

23. In regard to those bills I'll make a further motion, that the  
24. waiver of notice be granted and that all these bills be heard in  
25. Judiciary this coming Wednesday.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there objection? Leave is granted. Senator Groen.

28. SENATOR GROEN:

29. Well, Mr. President, a short time ago there was placed on my  
30. desk a supplemental notice about a meeting of the Committee on  
31. Welfare and the purpose of the notice is, apparently, to add H.B.  
32. 4079 and if the Chairman of the Committee on Assignment of Bills  
33. would please listen, I'm wondering how in the world this bill gets

1. assigned to Welfare.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. He is not here right now. Senator Donnewald.

4. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

5. Well, Mr. President, addressing myself to this problem, I heard  
6. Senator Rock explain and it's properly explained that we have many  
7. committees that are absolutely overloaded and it's unfair to them  
8. to have this load and other committees that have absolutely no  
9. bills. I'm trying to evenly distribute the load among the  
10. various committees and I think that there is enough expertise  
11. in each to consider any and all bills excepting Judiciary and I  
12. even tried to do that and, of course, that was re-referred. If the  
13. Chairman has no objection, well, that's the reason, if you wish.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Groen.

16. SENATOR GROEN:

17. Well, Mr. Chairman, I can appreciate the problems which some  
18. committees may have. However, it seems to me that if the content  
19. of the bill deals specifically with the subject matter that is  
20. properly assignable to a committee, that committee should receive  
21. that assignment and I can think of no better subject matter to  
22. handle the content of this bill in the Committee on Education.  
23. As a member of the Committee on Welfare, I feel wholly and com-  
24. pletely unqualified to sit in judgment of the merit of this  
25. bill and I can tell you now that the first motion is going to  
26. be that the bill be recommended with no recommendation with the  
27. suggestion that it be re-assigned to the Committee on Education.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Cherry is recognized in connection with Senate  
30. Resolution 290 on the Secretary's Desk. It's on your calendar.

31. SENATOR CHERRY:

32. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I believe  
33. this resolution is timely to be considered at this moment because

1. of the impending visit by the President of our Country to the  
2. Soviet Union. The resolution deals with the right of Soviet  
3. Jews to freely emigrate to other countries. The resolution  
4. deals with infringements of human rights to minority groups that  
5. are citizens of the Soviet Union. The resolution deals with the  
6. right of free exercise of religion by all of the citizens in the  
7. Soviet Union and to end discrimination against religious minorities.  
8. I think the President of the United States wants, upon his visit to  
9. the Soviet Union, to discuss these kinds of situations which we are  
10. given to understand that exist in the Soviet Union. I would urge  
11. favorable consideration by the members of this body so that we can  
12. have some dialogue between our President and the leaders of the  
13. Soviet Union toward the end of ending these kind of things which we're  
14. told exist.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Is there any discussion? All in favor of the adoption of  
17. the resolution indicate by saying aye. Contrary minded. All  
18. those...Senator Clarke.

19. SENATOR CLARKE:

20. Did we suspend the rules, Mr. President?

21. PRESIDENT:

22. There is not a necessity for suspension of the rules. This  
23. was reported out of committee. It's on the calendar.

24. SENATOR CLARKE:

25. Oh, I see.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. All those in favor of the adoption of the resolution indicate  
28. by saying aye. Contrary minded. Resolution is adopted. We have  
29. one other Resolution.

30. SECRETARY:

31. Senate Resolution number 340 introduced by Senators Partee,  
32. Cherry, Donnewald and others. Would you like for me to read it,  
33. Senator?

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Partee.

3. SENATOR PARTEE:

4. If I might have the attention of the membership...may I have  
5. the attention of the membership on this because this is something  
6. you're going to be quite interested in. This is a resolution  
7. which is a product of the thinking of the Legislative Reference  
8. Bureau. As you know in the 77th General Assembly, the final  
9. Legislative Synopsis and Digest...Senator Cherry is going to  
10. be asking me about this in a few minutes because he's talking.  
11. The final digest is now three volumes and contains some 3100  
12. pages, and if changes are not made, the additional entries as  
13. required under our present practices and the increased volume  
14. of our bill introductions may necessitate, it is contemplated, a six  
15. volume digest. So we are proposing by the Resolution certain  
16. changes which will prevent these number of digests and it would also  
17. eliminate what amounts to skyrocketing costs and the number of  
18. volumes will, of course, will diminish the utility of this digest by  
19. the sheer bulk of it. So what we were proposed to do is this: a  
20. bill may be introduced in the Senate by sponsorship of one or more  
21. members of the Senate, all of whose names shall be printed on the  
22. printed copies of the bill and in the journal of the Senate. In  
23. the Legislative Synopsis and Digest, issued weekly during the Session,  
24. only the name of the member who introduced the bill and the names  
25. of the first four co-sponsors shall be indexed with the number of  
26. any bill of which the member is the principal sponsor being placed  
27. in parenthesis. In every issue of the Legislative Synopsis and Digest,  
28. all sponsors shall be shown in the main part of the digest where  
29. bills are listed in numerical order. Where, however, a bill is spon-  
30. sored by a joint legislative commission, by a standing commission  
31. or by a special or standing committee of the Senate, only the name  
32. of such commission or commissions or committee shall be printed in  
33. the Senate Journal and in the legislative synopsis and digest. And

1. we would thereby amend Rule 8 of the Senate Rules to provide this  
2. language. A Resolution may be introduced in the Senate by sponsor-  
3. ship of one or more members of the Senate, all of whose names shall  
4. be printed in the Journal of the Senate. Senator Neistein, may I  
5. have your attention, please...

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Just a moment, please.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. A Resolution may be introduced in the Senate by sponsorship  
10. of one or more members of the Senate all of whose names shall be  
11. printed in the Journal of the Senate. In the Digest issued  
12. weekly, only the name of the member who introduced the Resolution  
13. shall be indexed. In every issue of the Legislative Digest all  
14. sponsors shall be shown in the main part of the digest, where  
15. Resolutions are listed in numerical order. Except in the case  
16. of a Congratulatory, Death or Memorial Resolution, only the name  
17. of the member who introduced the Resolution and the phrase "and  
18. all other Senators and/or other Senators" as the case may be, shall  
19. be set out. Now, the reason for this, I think, is quite obvious.  
20. We would be up to a six volume digest. The sheer bulk of which  
21. would, of course, diminish its utility. So this is the Resolution  
22. which we would ask the Body to consider which is, in my opinion,  
23. and in the opinion of those who are members of the Legislative Refer-  
24. ence Bureau. As I said, this is a product of the Legislative Refer-  
25. ence Bureau Committee. This is our best interest and I would move  
26. for the suspension of rules and its immediate adoption.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Groen.

29. SENATOR GROEN:

30. Well, Mr. President, I think Senator Partee knows for almost a  
31. year and a half now I have engaged personally in a considerable  
32. amount of research not only on this subject matter but the subject  
33. matter of procedures, organization and rules generally. And...Senator

1. could this wait until Monday? I would like to take a look at this  
2. because I have some thoughts and some ideas about this that I might  
3. want to discuss with you and I have not seen this Resolution.  
4. Wonder if I might obtain a copy that I might look at over the  
5. weekend?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Partee.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. Yes, as a matter of fact, that may really be the best thing to  
10. do. I'd like to ask the Secretary to see that copies are made  
11. of this Resolution immediately so that each member may take it  
12. home with him over the weekend. You may have some other additional  
13. ideas that you might want to add to this and we will hold it. We  
14. can hold it without referring it to a committee and just hold it on  
15. the Secretary's Desk until one day next week and we can address our-  
16. selves to it.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. The motion is...to refer to the Resolution to Secretary's  
19. Desk. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. It  
20. will be held there. Is there further business to come before the  
21. Body? Motion by Senator Davidson that the Senate stands adjourned  
22. until noon on Monday. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary  
23. minded. Motion prevails.

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
