2. I've asked Senator Knuppel to have the opening prayer.
3. Senator Knuppel.

4. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

5. May Our Father who art in heaven bless our efforts here
6. on behalf of our people that all we do is in His way and for
7. His good and for the good of those we serve. Amen.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Reading of the journal. Moved by Senator Graham that
10. the reading of the journal be dispensed with. All in favor
11. signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. The motion prevails.
12. Senator Carpentier;

13. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

14. Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.
15. I'd like the attention of the Senate if I could.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Just a moment. Please, will the...Proceed, Senator.

18. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

19. Yesterday morning in the Transportation Committee we heard
20. House bill 4428. They had an attorney down here by the name of
21. Siegel who in his testimony said that he talked to the late
22. Secretary Carpentier, to Secretary Powell and also all of the
23. Secretaries up to the present one and I challenged him on talking
24. to my late father and then later on he denied that. Then later
25. on he denied he talked to Secretary Powell, Secretary Chamberlain
26. or Secretary Lewis. My next question was to another witness by the
27. name of Mr. Bowman who represen...

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Just a moment. You're entitled to be heard. Please, Senator
30. Horsley, if you could take that conference off the floor, Senator
31. Carpentier may proceed.

32. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

33. Then in cross examining him on another point on their samples

1. of the driver's license that they handed out with the pictures on that
2. they wanted us to vote on, up in the right hand corner above the, the
3. lady's picture is the signature of Secretary John Lewis and I asked if
4. they had gotten permission from Secretary Lewis to use his signature
5. and I went downstairs and they said yes. So this morning I went down-
6. stairs and had a conference with Secretary Lewis at which time he
7. assured me that in no way did he or any of his administrative aides give
8. permission for his name to be used on these samples. I'm pointing
9. this out on a point of personal privilege so it's read into the
10. transcript of the Senate because if these are the kind of witnesses that
11. are going to come down and testify on legislation, then we'd better
12. start taking a better look at the type of characters that are coming
13. down and standing there, actually lying to members of Committee to
14. pass their bill. Thank you Mr. President.

23. Is Senator Lyons on the floor? Let's just hold that until
24. later until he's on the floor.

29. Senator Mitchler, Resolution.
30. SENATOR MITCHLER:
31. Mr. President, this is a commendatory resolution for
32. William Blackie, retiring president of Caterpillar Tractor

11. Motion by Senator Gilbert that the Senate refuse to recede
12. from our amendment and request a conference committee. All in
13. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. The motion prevails.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Message from the House, by Mr. Selcke, Clerk: Mr. President--

3. SENATOR MITCHLER:

4. On House bill 4142 and House bill 4143 which are appropriations
5. to World War II veteran for 4142 and World War I veteran for
6. 4143. These have passed the House. There was some question on
7. the eligibility of Louis Petrick in 4142, but that has been cleared
8. up and I have sent the information over to the President Pro Tempore
9. and I would like these bills advanced to second reading without
10. reference to committee.

12. Is there objection? Leave is granted. Senator Horsley.
13. SENATOR HORSLEY:

14. Mr. President, I think, my memory is getting kind of bad
15. in my old age, but I think Representative Duff asked me to handle

18. Apparently not and it is your bill, Senator.

25. 2648.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. 2648, you are assigned. Do you want to take that off the
28. calendar?

29. SENATOR HARRIS:

30. Yes. Thank you.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. 4549, Senator Hynes. I don't see him right now. These are
33. the ones that have been on three days now. 3766, Representative

1. Burditt. 4155, R. D. Cunningham and 4208. Those will be dropped

25. All Right.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. 1318.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Second reading of the bill, no committee amendments.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Any Amendments from the floor? Third reading. 1365. 1365

32. SECRETARY:

33. Second reading of the bill, one committee amendment from

1. Appropriations.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Carpentier moves the adoption of the committee report...
4. committee amendment. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary
5. minded. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third
6. reading. 1366.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Second reading of the bill, one committee amendment from
9. Appropriations.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Carpentier moves the adoption of the committee
12. amendment. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded.
13. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third reading.
14. 1367.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Second reading of the bill, one...

17. PRESIDENT:

18. One amendment has already been adopted. Any further amend-
19. ments on that bill. Third reading. 1464, Senator Gilbert.

20. SENATOR GILBERT:

21. I'd like to address this remark to Senator Tom Hynes. Senator
22. Hynes this is the Community Education Act. Of course, I agreed
23. with you that I wouldn't do anything with it until you had a chance
24. to further check into it. I wonder if it would be agreeable to
25. advance it to third with the understanding that I will do
26. nothing further with it. If you do decide we want to do some-
27. thing else with it, we'll call it back, but at least have it
28. where we could act on it if we de...when we have decided what
29. to do.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. 1464.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Second reading of the bill, one committee amendment from

1. Appropriations.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Gilbert moves the adoption of the committee amend-
4. ment. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded.
5. The amendment is adopted. Third reading. Senator Harris.

6. SENATOR HARRIS:

7. On 1464, Senator Gilbert, did you provide for an effective
8. date in that amendment? I raise this question...the Appropria-
9. tions Committee staff...I directed them to research all the
10. bills that have appropriations on them. You know we adopted
11. the statutory amendment last year. The bills that do not specify
12. an effective date become effective October 1. Now appropriations
13. bill, I think, unless there is an effective date in the bill,
14. would not be available until after October 1 and I've got a
15. list here. You're bill is one of those affected.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Gilbert.

18. SENATOR GILBERT:

19. The amendment does not include that. I appreciate your
20. calling it to my attention and I will see that it is done and will
21. call it back for that amendment later if we...I'm not sure we
22. want...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. 1466, Senator Merritt. Senator Merritt.

25. SENATOR MERRITT:

26. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I had an agreement
27. with both Senator Lyons and Senator Partee that this Appropriation
28. bill would remain on the calendar pending the omnibus bill for
29. commissions coming over from the House. I understand that that
30. passed there yesterday; so it will be coming over and with the
31. very definite understanding that this will be held on third and
32. eventually tabled when the omnibus bill passes, I would like to
33. move it with that complete and full understanding.

2. Is there objection? It will be...1446.
3. SECRETARY:
4. Second reading of the bill, no committee amendments.
5. PRESIDENT:
6. Any amendments from the floor? Third reading. 1534,
7. Senator Rosander. 1534.
8. SECRETARY:
9. Second reading of the bill, one committee amendment from
10. Appropriations.
11. PRESIDENT:
12. Senator Rosander moves the adoption of the committee amend-
13. ment. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary minded.
14. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third
15. reading. 1552, Senator Dougherty. 1552.
16. SECRETARY:
17. 1552.
18. PRESIDENT:
19. Senator Dougherty, I'm advised that the number should be
20. 1582, rather than 1552. It's an error.
21. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:
22. I thank you.
23. PRESIDENT:
24. 1552 is on third reading. That should be 1582.
25. SECRETARY:
26. On first reading?
27. PRESIDENT:
28. There's apparently a mixup on it here. Senator...just a
29. moment...Let's clear...where are we? 1552 is actually on third
30. reading, Senator Dougherty. So...Senator Carpentier.
31. SENATOR CARPENTIER:
32. Yes, Mr. President, I think the mixup is that Senate
33. bill 1582 should be on second reading today and I'd like to call

1. that at this time. It's the appropriation bill for the...
2. it's the companion bill which contains the appropriations for
3. 1365 through 1367.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. All right. Yes. This is the appropriation which was
6. struck in '67 and...

7. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

8. Right, I'd like to advance it...

9. PRESIDENT:

10. All right. 1582.

11. SECRETARY:

12. Second reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Any amendments from the floor? Third reading. Senator Hall.

15. SENATOR HALL:

16. Mr. President, a point of personal privilege. I'd like to
17. introduce to the Senate...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Hall, I hate to cut you off, but I notified every-
20. body I was going to be cutting them off on these introductions.
21. I know it's a very distinguished class that you have Senator
22. Hall. Senator Partee.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. That's right. Senator Hall, what was the class you were
25. talking about? You know this is really violation of the rules.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Hall.

28. SENATOR HALL:

29. Well, Mr. President Pro Tempore and President, if I were
30. permitted to, I would like to introduce in the back gallery
31. Webster School from East St. Louis.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. I'm glad you didn't violate the rules, Senator Hall. 1575,

1. Senator Rosander. 1575.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Second reading of the bill, no committee amendments.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Graham says he can't hear and he's right...too
6. much noise. Senate bills on third reading. Senator Partee.

7. SENATOR PARTEE:

8. Anyone...4276, if we could. I spoke to them in the Governor's
9. Office this morning. I spoke to Senator Bruce yesterday and
10. there's an emergency situation here. If we could have that one
11. first, I would appreciate it.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. House bills on third reading, 4276. 4276, house bills on
14. third. Senator Bruce.

15. SENATOR BRUCE:

16. Yes Mr. President and members of the Body. House bill 4276
17. is an appropriation of \$1,400,000 in connection with a development
18. of Rend Lake and the Gun Creek area on Rend Lake. The money is
19. in the Governor's budget. The members might remember that \$1,000,006
20. was appropriated last year. The Governor had to veto that since
21. it was not over the past year and conversations both with the
22. Governor and the Department of Business and Economic Development
23. this amount has been placed in the Governor's budget. We have
24. also secured a economic development act, a grant from the federal
25. government which will pay two-thirds of the cost. This is the
26. matching money. I know of no opposition.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,
31. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson,
32. Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall,
33. Harris, Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab,

5. PRESIDENT:

6. McBroom aye, Carpentier aye, Baltz aye, Walker aye. On
7. that question the yeas are 39, the nays are none. The bill
8. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
9. Senate bills on third reading. 82, Senator Harris. 147,
10. Senator Saperstein. 1154, Senator Kosinski. Hold. 1322,
11. Senator Weaver. Senator Weaver, 1322.

12. SENATOR WEAVER:

13. Mr. President and members of the Senate, Senate bill 1322
14. is the annual appropriation to the Universities Civil Service
15. Merit Board. The amount is \$361,300, exactly that appropriated
16. last year and I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,
21. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson,
22. Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall,
23. Harris, Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
24. Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt,

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. I realize this is highly unusual, but this roll call was
31. underway before I realized which bill this was. There is some-
32. thing I wanted to discuss with Senator Weaver about this bill
33. which I do not think will jeopardize its passage. I'm just

1. wondering if he could hold it. I think we could handle it next
2. week, but there is something I didn't get a chance to talk to
3. you about and I'd like to before we go ahead. It's going to
4. happen over at the House if we don't do it here and I think we
5. can do it better over here; so, if we could hold it, I would
6. appreciate it.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Under the rules the only way we can handle this is to
9. postpone consideration.

10. SENATOR PARTEE:

11. I don't want to do that.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. So, this is with the understanding...with the understanding
14. that it...you know, the Chair will recognize the unusual circumstance
15. We'll move to it whenever you suggest, Senator Weaver, if you wish
16. to do that. Senator Weaver.

17. SENATOR WEAVER:

18. I'd be glad to answer any questions the Pro Tempore has. I
19. see that we're right at the same level of funding this year that
20. we had last year. I don't see any reason to hold it, Mr. President,
21. but if you have any questions, I'll be happy to try to answer
22. them.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Partee.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26. Well, I guess it's my fault, Senator, that I didn't hear it.
27. The questions I wanted to get involved in are...just don't lend
28. themselves for discussion at this moment on the floor. I think
29. we could quietly work out what the problems are without engaging
30. the entire Senate in it and for that reason I don't want to ask you
31. the questions publicly at this point.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Weaver, what is your wish?

1. SENATOR WEAVER:

2. I'll be glad to hold it. There's nothing that I won't
3. be willing to answer of the President Pro Tempore.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Motion to postpone consideration. All in favor signify
6. by saying aye. Contrary minded. The Chair will as far as
7. consideration postponed bills, Senator Weaver, will give you
8. priority. 1324, Senator Mitchler. Senator...for what purpose
9. does Senator Clarke arise?

10. SENATOR CLARKE:

11. Well, I'd just like to clarify that last statement that
12. I think in the light of the unusual circumstances in the
13. middle of a roll call that rather than priority when postponed
14. consideration bills are concerned that once this has been dis-
15. cussed and worked out, we should revert to it and pass it.
16. I think that would be agreeable.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. This is agreeable. 1324.

19. SENATOR MITCHLER:

20. Mr. President, members of the Senate, Senate bill 1324 is
21. the appropriation for the ordinary and contingent expenses of
22. the Department of Civil Defense--Civil Defense Agency, and this
23. bill has been...gone through the task force and through the
24. Appropriations Committee. Unless there is any objections,
25. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,
30. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course,

11. bill 1325 is the appropriation for the ordinary and contingent
12. expenses of the Military and Naval Department. This bill has
13. also been cleared with the task force and has been approved
14. "Do Pass" by the Appropriations Committee and I would ask for
15. a favorable roll call.

17. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

32. Yes Mr. President.

33. PRESIDENT:

1327.

1. SENATOR MERRITT:

2. Just as the calendar shows it is the annual appropriation
3. for fiscal '73, the Office of Savings and Loan Commissioner.
4. It was amended before it reached this stage, acceptable on
5. both sides. I would appreciate the last most favorable roll
6. call vote.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

26. by the task force on the other side of the aisle, okayed by the
27. Appropriations Committee and its been properly amended, I'd appreciate
28. your favorable roll call.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

14. the Judicial Inquiry Board. The amount has been reduced now to
15. \$105,000.00. I would be happy to answer any questions anyone
16. might have.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll

33. PRESIDENT:

1. On that question the yeas are 37, the nays are none. The
2. bill having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
3. Senator...for what purpose does Senator Carpentier arise?

4. SENATOR CARPENTIER:

5. I just want to point out that this may be Senator Coulson's
6. last bill as a Senator, and I don't know whether we're lucky or
7. we're unlucky.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Do you want to reconsider the vote? Senator Bruce can
10. 1354...can we take 55, 56 and 57 in one roll call here?

11. SENATOR BRUCE:

12. Yes. So far as I know. I...I personally have questions
13. about it, but if I think all these bills will be non-controversial
14. so...

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Alright. 54...is there objection...54, 55, 56 and 57 will
17. be taken in one roll call. Incidentally, a couple of the
18. Senators have called before for the same roll call. Under...
19. because we are recording, I do not think...I think there is a
20. constitutional question whether we can just say same roll call
21. and do that for bills we have passed but I think it is clear
22. that we can say, agree in advance that one roll call will
23. apply to three or four bills in advance. For what purpose
24. does Senator Groen arise?

25. SENATOR GROEN:

26. Well Mr. President with regard to that and a matter of
27. inquiry if we can do this as we are doing it now and say to
28. Senator Bruce, because you happen to be the sponsor of the next
29. four bills in a row. You object to having this done, why
30. couldn't we select these bills that are non-controversial and agree
31. ahead of time that these are all going to be on one roll call.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. That can be done. Senator Bruce.

1. SENATOR BRUCE:

2. I hate to impose upon this body, but having looked over
3. very quickly I would rather have a roll call on each and every
4. one of these. Some of them are bond interest payment and if
5. they were challenged it would also hold up some inheritance
6. tax money that the state owes and I would not want to in-
7. valadate that because of some contests on bond service money. So
8. if it meets with the approval, I would like to have a roll
9. call on each of the bills.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Alright. I think from the chairs viewpoint its very
12. clear that we can do this. I don't think theres a constitutional
13. question. But if Senator Bruce wishes to have a separate roll
14. call. How about 54 and 57 taken together. Senator Partee.

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

16. I just make the comment and I see that Senator Knuepfer
17. is not here. This is when we could really use a electric
18. roll call. Now the truth of the matter is and I appreciate
19. Senator Groens remarks. It would be commodious to us if we
20. could take them on one roll call but I think Senator Bruce
21. is quite correct that because of the possibilities on bond
22. issues or challenges later in the court we have to take single
23. roll calls on these bills I just think we have to. Just to be
24. on the safe side.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. On anything where maybe there would be some controversy
27. they...if you read the constitution provisions, section 8
28. paragraph C, it seems to me that what we have done in the
29. Senate perspectively can continue. You cant have one roll
30. call on to apply to a number of roll calls but perhaps until
31. the courts rule that way make it clear we should proceed
32. cautiously. 54 and 57 on one roll call. 54, the roll call
33. will be on Senate bills 1354 and 1357. Secretary will call the roll.

1. Senator Bruce.

2. SENATOR BRUCE:

3. Yes, I think we should explain very quickly Senate bill
4. 1354. It is a new appropriation and I would alert the members
5. to that. It's on the deposit of Federal funds. In prior years
6. we could not receive the interest on Federal funds and therefore
7. we put those in banks as compensatory balances, banks did services
8. for the state of Illinois at no expense. The Federal law has not
9. been changed which permits the state of Illinois to deposit those
10. Federal funds and retain interest. We now put those out on bids
11. we get the money back as interest payment. It has been the
12. suggestion of the Auditor and the State Treasurer that now since
13. services are performed we pay this on a direct contractual basis.
14. Treasurer Dixon meets with banks they decide how much they will
15. charge for the various service rendered to the State of Illinois
16. and the original appropriation was \$950,000 it is now down to
17. \$750,000. I think Senator Harris is fully aware of the change
18. 1357 is the regular appropriation for the State Treasurer. There
19. is no increase in it's budget from FY 72 except for the increase
20. of one half of one percent which amounts to \$6,440. I just want
21. to point that out because I think the State Treasurer should be
22. commended for keeping his budget within last year's budget.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Groen.

25. SENATOR GROEN:

26. Senator Bruce do you have any information on the amount of
27. interest income to the state from the deposit of these federal
28. funds? What kind of a profitable balance will we have after we
29. now pay for these expenses?

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Bruce.

32. SENATOR BRUCE:

33. Senator Groen I asked that question, I did not get a reply.

1. There are substantial federal funds which we can now draw interest on
2. and we will be putting....it is my understanding is this...we will
3. come out ahead on this procedure. The dollar amounts I do not know.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Secretary will call the roll. Roll call will apply to
6. Senate bills 1354 and 1357.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,

17. On that question the yeas 37, nays are none. The two bills
18. 1354 and 1357 are declared passed. 1355 Senator Bruce.

19. SENATOR BRUCE:

20. Yes, 1355 is the annual appropriation for inheritance
21. tax refunds. Its up \$250,000 over last year. There just cannot
22. be any way of determining but this year they came relatively close
23. to depleting appropriated funds and it is the opinion of both
24. the task force and Treasurer Dixon that we have sufficient money
25. so that there is no delay in making a refund.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Secretary will call the roll.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,

9. On that question the yeas are 35, the nays are none. The
10. bill having received the constitutional majority is declared passed.
11. 1356 Senator Bruce.

12. SENATOR BRUCE:

13. Yes, 1356 is the bond and interest coupon fee bill. Just
14. pays the interest due the various bond holders.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Secretary will call the roll. For what purpose does
17. Senator Berning arise?

18. SENATOR BERNING:

19. I presume that it is rather presumptuous of me to ask questions
20. about things as stupendous and their impact as service recognition
21. bonds and other items mentioned in here but I do have a question
22. that I hope the sponsor can answer for me. What is...and I notice
23. it is in the previous bill. The public welfare building, what is
24. that? \$8...925,948....

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Dougherty apparently has the answer on that.

27. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

28. A number of years ago the city was authorized to issue
29. 150 million dollars in bonds for the building of state mental
30. hospitals. It was a referendum and this is the money needed
31. to retire those bills, those bonds, rather. I think it was
32. in 1961.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Berning.

2. SENATOR BERNING:

3. How long do they have yet to run, do you have any idea?

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Dougherty.

6. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

7. At that time I believe that the law provided they would
8. be retired in 20 years. I am not positive on that subject.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Berning.

11. SENATOR BERNING:

12. Thank you, now may I ask the sponsor another question?
13. 1355 carries for transportation bonds series A and B. A little
14. over 8 million for A and almost 5 million for B. When we get
15. over here for 1356 this is a million and it looks to me that
16. this is in essence a deficiency appropriation we are making since I
17. notice that all of these are for before July of 1972 and why are we
18. considering this bill 1356 now?

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Bruce.

21. SENATOR BRUCE:

22. Senator Berning I could not answer that question and
23. perhaps someone else can. I dont know whether that is a misprint
24. or...

25. PRESIDENT:

26. The calendar says reappropriates if that is of any
27. assistance to you Senator Bruce. Is is not a new appropriation.

28. SENATOR BRUCE:

29. Yes. I believe I know now. If it's a reappropriation the
30. bonds were put out and a certain amount was appropriated last
31. year. We will reappropriate certain interest payments. If we
32. were able to put the bonds out at a lesser amount we are now
33. reducing or reappropriating if we could not put it out at a lower

1. interest rate and had to pay a higher interest rate we had to
2. reappropriate that money because these are bonds and bond holders
3. want to know that the money is here. It cannot be a new
4. appropriation, it is a continuing appropriation for the payment
5. of bonds that are sold at what ever varying interest rate they
6. are eventually sold at. We dont know but this money has to be
7. appropriated early or the bond houses will not handle the bonds unless
8. the money for the debt service is in our appropriation and since
9. we had to do that before the bonds are sold we dont know exactly
10. what interest rate they will receive. And also that is why it has
11. to be a reappropriation.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Horsley.

14. SENATOR HORSLEY:

15. Well, Mr. President I have sent for an aide that I had doing
16. some research work for me and I haven't got it back yet and I'm
17. going to ask a question but if the research that I get back is what
18. I think it is and what it has in it...well if I vote no I
19. dont know, it puts me in rather a peculiar spot Senator Bruce
20. but I'll ask you this question. I've had some calls from some
21. stock brokers who are going around buying up defaulted Calumet
22. skyway bonds and I'll ask you whether or not in this bill is the
23. money to pay off the defaulted skyway Calument skyway bonds. Now
24. those bonds were issued with the understanding that tolls would
25. be charged to pay one third, one third would be paid by the county,
26. and one third would be paid by the state of Illinois. Now those
27. bonds have been defaulted and we've had a bad situation on our
28. hands. All of it was brought about as explained by Senator Dougherty
29. yesterday because of the State of Indiana changed a line or changed
30. a highway. Traffic didn't come over them to pay the tolls.
31. Now I want to know whether or not there is any money included
32. in this appropriation to pay off any of the Skyway, Calument,
33. Skyway toll bonds?

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Bruce.

3. SENATOR BRUCE:

4. Senator Horsley there is not. I think a very quick reading
5. of the bill by each section would indicate that there could not
6. be payment for those bonds. Section one is for compensation of
7. veterans, two is for hard surface roads which is a 1923 bond
8. issue. The next section relates and thats the grand sum of
9. \$1,200. Section four is the 1917 issue of \$120.00. Section
10. five relates to soldiers \$2,000. Section six is for indigents.
11. Section seven is for the public welfare building which Senator
12. Berning mentioned. Section eight is for bonds for university
13. buildings. Nine is for the anti pollution bond and ten are
14. for three acts relating to bonds that we sold last year both
15. anti pollution and transportation bonds, thats section ten.
16. I dont know where there could be an appropriation for the skyway
17. bonds.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Horsley.

20. SENATOR HORSLEY:

21. Sometimes I wish we had this glass wall up in here so
22. people couldn't pull you off of the floor but I was called off
23. of the floor now is that included in the bill just before this?
24. 1355 and did you pass 1355 while I was standing over there
25. answering questions?

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Yes, 1355 has been passed Senator Horsley.

28. SENATOR HORSLEY:

29. And is that money included in 1355?

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Bruce.

32. SENATOR BRUCE:

33. No, it would not be in 1355, 1355 was for inheritance tax

1. refunds and debt service.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Horsley.

4. SENATOR HORSLEY:

5. That is a debt service because there's \$13 million in there
6. for transportation bonds. Now that is the very thing we're talking
7. about is debt service on these defaulted bonds and that's what
8. we're trying to find out. And I'll be quite frank with you, I
9. have tried all over the State House and all over this place to
10. find out where in this sum of money is hidden because these brokers
11. have been told to go out and buy up these bonds as quick as possible
12. because they're gonna be paid off. Now I want to know where the
13. bill is that's gonna pay them off, or where the money is.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Bruce.

16. SENATOR BRUCE:

17. Well, Senator Horsley, let me assure you that what you're
18. looking for is not in either 1355, 56 or 57. If you'll take and
19. read 1355 that I am sure mandates the State Treasurer to pay for
20. bonds that have been issued pursuant to the transportation bond
21. act which we passed last year. Both series A and series B...

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Bruce, the chair doesn't want to interrupt the two
24. of you but I think we're gonna have to confine our remarks to 1356
25. and if for some reason 55, someone wants to reconsider, then that can
26. be considered, but the matter before the Body now is 1356. Senator...

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. Senator Horsley, on 1356 my answer is that there is no amount
29. of money in 1356 for the payment of any bonds issued for the skyway
30. tollway.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Is...Senator Horsley.

33. SENATOR HORSLEY:

1. Would you be kind enough. I just now found the gentleman
2. who's been looking for the gentleman who also's been looking for
3. gentleman I'm trying to find. And if you could just hold it about
4. ten minutes, I'd appreciate it. I don't want to hold your bill
5. up but I'd appreciate it if you'd hold it, just for a few minutes.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Bruce.

8. SENATOR BRUCE:

9. Well, Senator Horsley, I hesitate to do that. It is not in
10. this bill. It just is not in 1356.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator...just a moment, please. I think, Senator Bruce, we're
13. gonna save a lot of time if you do just hold it for a few minutes
14. and let Senator Horsley check cause otherwise we're gonna have ten
15. minutes of debate while they check. No, we're not on roll call.
16. We don't need to put it on postponed. You wanna just hold it and
17. we'll get back to it very shortly. 1369, Senator Baltz. Do you
18. wish to call that Senator Baltz? Hold it. 1371, Senator Rock.
19. Senator Rock, 1371.

20. SENATOR ROCK:

21. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, Senate bill 1371
22. appropriates \$184,300 to the Office of the Lieutenant Governor
23. for the ordinary and contingent expenses of that office. I have
24. spoken with both Senators Clarke and Senator Harris. There is no
25. objection. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call the roll.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
30. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Hall aye. Senator Horsley.

1. SENATOR HORSLEY:

2. For reasons I stated the other day when this bill was up on
3. second reading and I have a feeling that this bill might be cut
4. down somewhere along the line, and if not, I hope the Governor cuts
5. it down, but at this moment I'm gonna vote no until it is cut down
6. to a reasonable amount. I want to be recorded no.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow,
9. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neis-
10. tein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock,

13. PRESIDENT:

14. On that question, the yeas are 36, the nays are 2. The bill
15. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. 1360,
16. Senator Vadalabene.

17. SENATOR VADALABENE:

18. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. 1360 is
19. the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Auditor of Public
20. Accounts and I would appreciate your favorable vote.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call the roll.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
25. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,
26. Dougherty, Egan...

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Dougherty.

29. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

30. In explaining my vote on this bill, I would just like to intro-
31. duce the pupils from the Burnham School in my district up here.
32. Right over there in the corner. I vote aye. Rise, kids. Thank
33. you, Mr. President.

1. SECRETARY:

2. Egan, Fawell...

3. PRESIDENT:

4. You're not welcome, Senator Dougherty.

5. SECRETARY:

6. Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris, Horsley, Hynes, Johns,
7. Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons,
8. McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse,

16. 1388. 1408, Senator McCarthy. Senator Harris.

17. SENATOR HARRIS:

18. Mr. President, might we proceed out of the regular order of
19. business momentarily to assist the clerks respectively of the
20. Executive and Local Government Committees. They are preparing
21. their committee notices and I have two bills that I would like to
22. seek unanimous consent to have the six-day rule waived. I've dis-
23. cussed both bills with the chairmen of the respective committees.
24. Senate bill 1362 in Executive, and Senate bill 1558 in Local Govern-
25. ment. Might I seek leave to have unanimous consent to have the bills
26. heard at the next meetings of those respective committees waiving
27. the six-day rule.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there objection? Leave is granted. 1423, Senator McCarthy.
30. 1430, Senator Rock. Hold. 1432, Senator Saperstein. 1437, Senator
31. Vadalabene. Is Senator Vadalabene on the floor? Do you want to
32. call that? 1437? 1438, Senator Bidwill. 1438, Senator Bidwill.

33. SENATOR BIDWILL:

1. Mr. President, this is the appropriation for the Illinois
2. Racing Commission. The task force has gone over this and I be-
3. lieve they made some cuts and this is their recommendation. I'd
4. like a favorable roll call.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Is there any discussion? The secretary will call the roll.

7. SECRETARY:

21. on one roll call to take seven bills that the leadership on both
22. sides has indicated could be accepted on one roll call. 1439, 1553,
23. 1554, 1560, 1562, 1566, 1573. Is there objection from any member
24. on that? I'll read those again. 1439, 1553, 1554, 1560, 1562,
25. 1566, 1573. Is there objection? The secretary will call...Senator
26. Horsley, in connection with this? The secretary will call the roll.
27. Senator Harris. On this? Just...yes.

28. SENATOR HARRIS:

29. Well, we've researched some of these bills do not have effective
30. dates on them and that question of the October 1st effective date
31. otherwise comes into play. I think...I think we should either have
32. the understanding that we're gonna have to amend these bills in the
33. House. I'm not at liberty right now to tell you which ones but I know

1. some of them do not have effective dates in them.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Partee.

4. SENATOR PARTEE:

5. Go ahead.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Bruce.

8. SENATOR BRUCE:

9. I believe you called 1554 which is Senator Groen's bill.
10. Senator Harris and I talked and there's some language in there
11. that needs to be straightened up or that money will not be able
12. to be spent. Yea...that should be taken out of the package and
13. amended.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Harris.

16. SENATOR HARRIS:

17. Well, I think maybe we can get this corrected in the next
18. half hour. Why don't we leave this series for just a few minutes
19. and maybe we can get them all squared away and then take action
20. today.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. We'll proceed on the calendar on bills except those that I
23. have listed. 1463, Senator Groen. Do you wish to take...hold.
24. 1476, Senator Saperstein. 1477, 1490. 1509, Senator Latherow.
25. 1541, Senator Newhouse. Senator Horsley.

26. SENATOR HORSLEY:

27. Mr. President, I have a matter of urgency. I have talked to
28. Senator Partee about this. We had a resolution introduced into
29. this body that was heard by the Executive Committee yesterday having
30. to do with the allegations made in the Chicago Daily News and at
31. the committee hearing the resolution was amended rather than to
32. allow three Republicans and three Democrats to handle this matter
33. that it be referred to the permanent Illinois Investigation Commission

1. that has a staff of investigators and people and could get right
2. on it and do the job. I agreed to that amendment. That amend-
3. ment was drafted, unanimously adopted by the committee and only
4. this morning, thanks to Senator Partee, who is a very good lawyer,
5. called to my attention that any resolution which would give to the
6. Commission the power to investigate would have to be a joint com-
7. mission. And for that reason I have had the resolution typed. It
8. is identical word for word with the resolution that was passed out
9. as amended unanimously by the committee yesterday afternoon and I
10. would like to ask for the suspension of the rules and the immediate
11. consideration of the resolution so that I can get it over to the
12. House to see if they can likewise suspend the rules and have
13. immediate consideration there because there is a cloud on a matter
14. of a...one appropriation bill and we want to eliminate that as quickly
15. as possible. And for that reason I would move for the suspension
16. of the rules and the immediate consideration of the resolution and
17. it's adoption.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. Well, Senator is correct that I have made these suggestions to
22. him, but I would be opposed to taking it up at this time out of the
23. order of business or moving to a new order of business to do it
24. because simply, Senator, the fact is, I plan to call House bill 4634
25. which is the appropriation bill for rehabilitation of the chambers
26. of the House and whether that bill goes up or down I want to call
27. it before we have the resolution. Now I think I owe that as a cour-
28. tesy to the Speaker and that's the reason I want to do it. I want
29. to call the bill first before we have this resolution.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator, do wish to persist in your motion or do you wish to hold
32. it up?

33. SENATOR HORSLEY:

1. Well, Senator, I'll just simply have to say to you that there
2. are a lot of people on this side of the aisle and some on yours
3. who have talked privately who are very concerned about this matter,
4. and they're very concerned about this appropriation itself and
5. they prefer not to vote for this appropriation. And I'm certainly
6. trying to accommodate you by speeding this matter up by hours and
7. days in order to get this matter to Mr. Seragusa this afternoon.
8. And your chairman, your co-chairman, of that Commission is right
9. in front of you, Senator Rock, and I'm going to ask the other co-
10. chairman, Senator Sevcik in the House, to co-sponsor it to get it
11. through so that a meeting can be called immediately and instructions
12. begun, and by the time we get back here next week we might even
13. have this matter resolved by Tuesday or Wednesday because somebody
14. is definitely not telling the truth, and I don't think it's going
15. to take them too long to find out who it is.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Partee.

18. SENATOR PARTEE:

19. Well, Senator, I'm just as anxious as you are to find out the
20. truth of the matter as indicated by the position I took yesterday
21. in making the recommendation that this matter be referred to an
22. arm of the Legislature which is equipped to ascertain what the facts
23. are. I am just as anxious as you to move it, but this is, Senator,
24. something that is alleged to have happened six years ago and when
25. you talk about moving it with this rapidity before I have a chance
26. to call the bill, I think is unfair. Now, I don't know how anybody
27. is going to vote on the appropriation. I have not discussed it with
28. a single person on this side of the aisle as to whether they were
29. for or against the appropriation. Further, I don't know whether the
30. Governor is for or against the appropriation. That is not a subject
31. matter which has been inquired of by me. I simply, as the sponsor of
32. the bill having given my word to the Speaker that I would call this
33. bill, would call the bill in the next few moments or whenever we get

1. to it and I would just ask that as a matter of courtesy the reso-
2. lution which is, of course, taken out of the order of business, as
3. you suggest now, be held until we have had a chance to vote on the
4. bill. Now, whatever there is to be said about the subject matter
5. of the resolution, the personalities involved, you can say that
6. when the bill is called. It won't in any way jeopardize anything
7. at all. You have the right to debate it. I would never try to
8. foreclose it. But I think I have a right to call the bill and I'm
9. going to call it. And I'm going to move, if you persist, I'm going
10. to see if I can get some votes to have this resolution heard at
11. the regular period of time. Now, this is a courtesy that I'm going
12. to give the Speaker. He's not involved in this situation and he's
13. got a bill here and he ought to have a vote on it.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Horsley.

16. SENATOR HORSLEY:

17. Senator, your statement about six years does not appear...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Just a moment. For what is your point of order, Senator Bruce.

20. SENATOR BRUCE:

21. Have we moved from the order of business of Senate bills, third
22. reading?

23. PRESIDENT:

24. We have not, but the motion is to suspend the rules. And that
25. motion is always in order, so the Chair would rule that Senator
26. Horsley's motion is in order.

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. Fine.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Horsley.

31. SENATOR HORSLEY:

32. Senator Partee, your statement about six years ago may or may not
33. be correct, because it's purely hearsay. The article is so cleverly

1. written. The first one that appeared, and I have not seen today's
2. paper, but I understand it reiterates the same statement in quo-
3. tations again today. Now, the six years you get, of course, from
4. Jim Coady and he told me that too, that it happened, only he said
5. over the radio this morning five or six years ago. He didn't re-
6. member exactly when. But the fact is, that we're right down here
7. faced with an appropriation with a cloud hanging over our heads
8. and people are going to ask us what in the world is wrong with us
9. and, Senator, I've never said anything to you that was untruthful
10. in my life and I will have to state to you that I cannot vote for
11. your appropriation until this matter is cleared up. And I'm very
12. anxious to get it cleared up quickly, and to get it cleared up
13. next week because we have other matters that we need to get clouds
14. off of. And for that reason I cannot agree to let this thing stand
15. or fall based on what happens to your appropriation bill.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Sours.

18. SENATOR SOURS:

19. Mr. President, Senators, I was going to suggest to Senator
20. Partee that the appropriation bill would have a much friendlier
21. reception if Senator Horsley were permitted at this time. Now, I
22. don't mean to say that this is a bargain, a tit for a tat, nothing
23. like that, but I for one have always been a little sensitive about
24. anybody who maligns the Legislature generally without specifying
25. that his name is John Jones and you know exactly what I'm talking
26. about. Now, I can't see whether one ought to be a precedent to the
27. other except I do feel, after sitting in Executive two hours yesterday
28. and finally at the last moment, when everybody was scurrying around
29. to go to Chicago, everything was done in haste. Now, I look upon the
30. indictment appearing in the paper as affecting me too and so do some
31. of the others over here, and maybe it might be well to get on with
32. it.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Partee.

2. SENATOR PARTEE:

3. It does not escape my notice, Senator, that the climate of
4. friendliness or unfriendliness to this bill bears some relationship
5. to the resolution. I've expressed that to the sponsor of the bill.
6. The sponsor of the bill made his own judgement with reference to
7. asking me to call it. As a courtesy and in keeping my word, I
8. propose to call the bill. I said to you earlier, perhaps you were
9. not listening, that I do not know nor have I made an assessment of
10. how many votes this bill's going to get. I said that to you. I
11. don't know and it doesn't escape my notice. It should be clear to
12. anybody that wherever there is some extrinsic force operating in
13. terms of having some question or questions posed about a particular
14. piece of legislation that there are people who will refrain from
15. voting for it or who would positively vote against it. I don't
16. know but the sponsor wants it called and I have that obligation I
17. think to the sponsor having given my word to call it. Now, whether
18. it wins, loses or draws it's...it will be a matter of history in
19. a few minutes.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Horsley.

22. SENATOR HORSLEY:

23. Well, Mr. President, I have just sent a page over to the
24. House because I've received word that they've about completed their
25. business and they're going home early. Now, I'm trying to help
26. you with speed, the very thing you ask for, and if we delay this
27. till later in the afternoon and the House has gone home, you can't
28. possibly get it to these men and here comes the gentleman now,
29. maybe he can give us word, please. You mean they don't know?

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Partee.

32. SENATOR HORSLEY:

33. Now, the page boy who just now returned asked if they could

1. give him word whether it would be 30 minutes, an hour or longer,
2. and they said no, they could not give him assurance as to when it
3. would be. Now, I would be glad to amend my motion to say that im-
4. mediately after the consideration of this resolution we return to
5. the regular order of business from which we left at the moment we
6. considered this matter, and then nobody could try to introduce another
7. resolution or get by with anything.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Just...if the chair may make a suggestion here. Would, Senator
10. Horsley, would this be acceptable, that we go out of order, take up
11. 4634 immediately right now, and then immediately proceed after that
12. with the adoption of your resolution?

13. SENATOR HORSLEY:

14. Certainly, I'll agree to that.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Is that acceptable, Senator Partee?

17. SENATOR PARTEE:

18. We could of had the vote while we've been talking about it.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. All right.

21. SENATOR PARTEE:

22. Let me say this too, just as an addendum. Don't blame anybody
23. for holding up anything because if the resolution had been in the
24. proper form in the first place, we wouldn't have had this problem.
25. Now, let's go with it.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. 4634. House bill 4634. Just a second. Senator Horsley,
28. your mike is on. Senator Partee is recognized.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. Now, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I suppose most of
31. the members know what this is about. It has had wide newspaper pub-
32. licity. It has had descretion on the floor from many advantage points.
33. At least prolifically, it has been discussed. It is not a complicated

1. situation. It is a simple appropriation. It is an appropriation
2. which has been voted on overwhelmingly by the House of Represent-
3. natives which calls for the expenditure of \$990,000 for the re-
4. habilitation of the House of Representatives. Several things are
5. involved. One of the things involved is to make for more room be-
6. tween their desks and make it, they say, a more commodious place
7. for them to work. Now, it entailed...are new desks and other accouter-
8. ments of a legislative body like new chairs and things of that
9. sort. One of the flies in the ointment, I suppose, has been...
10. PRESIDENT:

11. Just a moment, please. Proceed, Senator.

12. SENATOR PARTEE:

13. One of the flies in the ointment, I think, has been the re-
14. moval of certain traditional seats from the floor of the House of
15. Representatives which has been occupied by the press. Now, this
16. is one of the things, I think has caused some problems. There have
17. been articles written and, of course, there is this new concept of
18. bubbling in or glassing in the House. Now, this is what they want in
19. their House. They voted for it. They, of course, need the approval
20. and approbation of this Body in order to accommodate it. As I said
21. earlier, I don't know what the Governor's position on it is. I
22. have no idea. I do know that this is what the House said they
23. want and this is their appropriation. They have voted for it and
24. they sent it to us. I think we should bear in mind as Senator
25. Graham said earlier during the course of debate on a kindred subject
26. matter that we have some obligation to be conscious of the relation-
27. ship which exists between the two Houses. This is not a unicameral
28. legislature. It's a two house legislature and from time to time
29. we will be going to the House requesting things for the Senate.
30. This is, of course, no reason to pass a bill. We're not log rolling.
31. It's not a quid pro quo situation; but it is a situation in which the
32. House has made this decision and judgement that they should have
33. these new facilities, and this is their bill. I am handling it for

1. them and I say to you that you can make your own judgement in
2. terms of whether or not you are going to support it.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Just a moment, please, gentlemen. Senator Walker...Senator
5. Gilbert, I'm sorry.

6. SENATOR GILBERT:

7. Senator Partee, I was off the floor when you started the ex-
8. planation, I'm sorry, but it's my understanding that between...ap-
9. proximately \$750,000 of this appropriation is for structural im-
10. provement and things of that nature that there's only a hundred
11. and some odd thousand dollars that deals with the glass and the
12. draperies that seem to be getting all the publicity. Am I correct
13. in that, sir?

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Partee.

16. SENATOR PARTEE:

17. I'm glad you asked that question, Senator, because I had
18. planned to say that in the explanation. I am told that a very large
19. portion of the money is to be used for the purpose of undergirding
20. and restructuring the galleries. I don't know if you know, but on
21. some occasions we have a lot more people here than you think. I
22. was told by persons in the Capitol Guide service the other day that
23. on one particular day last week there were 9,000 school children
24. in the Capitol Building. Part of this money, and the major portion
25. of it, is to be used to make those galleries safe. I certainly would
26. not like, and I think nobody would like, to see a holocaust in the
27. State Capitol in which a large number of children were injured or
28. killed or something of that sort. And I think it's certainly a
29. legitimate consideration and I'm glad you asked the question, Senator.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Walker.

32. SENATOR WALKER:

33. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I have a issue

1. of Chicago Today, Sunday, May the 7th here, "Lawmaking in an
2. Isolation Ward." I'm also looking at the current digest here.
3. This bill was introduced in the House on May the 2nd, went to
4. first reading without reference, came out of there two days later,
5. it's been on the calendar over here, it's now being called on the
6. 25th. Personally, I'm inclined to agree with this editorial in
7. Chicago Today and I'm not going to go into it in its entirety.
8. They say one clear excuse for this massive overhaul is in May of
9. 1970, a group of spectators dared to boo and applaud during debate
10. on an anti-war measure. The number of you Senate members have
11. served in the House. When I go back over there, I wouldn't mind
12. looking at the chair that I used to sit in, and I feel that a number
13. of you feel the same way about it. I don't see any need to buy
14. 177 chairs at \$335 each.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. For what purpose does Senator Clarke arise?

17. SENATOR CLARKE:

18. Mr. President, it's just been brought to my attention and it
19. was an item that was brought to my attention yesterday during the
20. debate that there is an outside recording device in the Chamber that
21. is recording this debate. There has been no leave or unanimous
22. consent for this to be recorded and I just think that this should
23. be discontinued until such time as it's announced and unanimous
24. leave is given for this type of recording device.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Point is well taken. I don't know who is doing it, but it
27. should be stopped. It is in violation of the rules of the Chamber.
28. Is it being stopped? I'm advised that it is off. The chair might
29. say the same is true on pictures. Occasionally members arrange with
30. a private photographer to have some pictures taken. If you would let
31. the chair know and we announce it in the Chamber, then everyone un-
32. derstands. And this is the procedure that should be followed. Senator
33. Walker has the floor.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. For what purpose does Senator Mitchler arise?

3. SENATOR MITCHLER:

4. Point of personal order...privilege. On this question of
5. Senator Clarke's, I hate to interrupt, Senator Walker, and I apo-
6. logize to you, sir, I'd never do this. May I ask this. From time
7. to time I have heard the chair admonish those that attempt to re-
8. cord in the Chambers. But the contents and the debate both in
9. the House and Senate are transmitted and there are speakers all
10. over this Capitol Building and other places. And people can sit
11. there with the portable tape recorders and record at leisure.
12. Now, is there anything in the rules or in the statutes that prohibit
13. this person from recording debate and then using it or in some
14. form...I think this is a time to clear this question up in my mind
15. and if it's proper, I'd like to ask that question, sir.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. There are, as you suggest, speakers in the press room, in my
18. office, the attorney general's office now and a great many other
19. places where recordings can be made. It's been the tradition in
20. the Senate that pictures and recording whether of television or
21. other variety are not made without the consent of the body. And
22. the chair is going to follow that tradition unless exceptions are
23. made. Now, I've been advised that this recording that was just
24. made that the president pro tem's office was contacted in advance
25. on that. Senator Partee.

26. SENATOR PARTEE:

27. Yes, Senator Clarke is quite right and I can assure this body that
28. there will be none unless there has been prior consultation with
29. leadership on that side and further that an announcement is made
30. to the members so that they will know if it is taking place.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Mitchler.

33. SENATOR MITCHLER:

1. My question really was, is there anything other than tradition
2. in the Chambers of the Senate that would prohibit an individual
3. from recording, say in the attorney general's office, in your office,
4. sir, or the other Senators that are fortunate to have this piped in,
5. recording and using that either in news media or for their own
6. personal use or whatever it is. Is there anything that prohibits
7. a person from doing that? Or is it just tradition?

8. PRESIDENT:

9. There is nothing that prohibits anyone from recording in any
10. other outlet, but as far as recording in the Senate Chambers that
11. has been a tradition in the Senate not to do it.

12. SENATOR MITCHLER:

13. I just point it out as a matter of...thank you.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. And the chair might add that the gentleman in question here, Mr.
16. Bill Miller, has been, in my opinion, one of the most ethical men
17. and completely honorable in his relationship with the public of-
18. ficials and I think we're fortunate to have a newsman like Bill
19. Miller around. Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. I think we have to, for the record since this is going on tape
22. and will be later transcribed, talk about the difference between
23. recording as it's generally spoken of which I think relates to re-
24. cording with a mechanical device. But recording could be done by
25. somebody, let's say Billy O'Connell had a photographic memory. He
26. would in fact be recording the debate mentally, but not with a mechan-
27. ical device and I think that distinction has to be made. Recordation
28. takes two forms either mental or by some device. So what you're talkin
29. about, so that the record is clear, is recordation with a mechanical
30. device. And that's what we were talking about.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Right. So we...Senator Bidwill.

33. SENATOR BIDWILL:

1. Mr. President, when the speakers were first put into the
2. press room, there was a gentlemen's agreement that there would be
3. no use made of them to use them in recording. And I think the
4. press has upheld that to this date. But we did have a gentlemen's
5. agreement at that time.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator McBroom.

8. SENATOR MCBROOM:

9. Mr. President, members of the Chamber, I want to ask Senator
10. Partee a couple questions if I could. Senator, oh, I'm sorry,
11. Senator Walker has the floor?

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is this on the bill?

14. SENATOR MCBROOM:

15. Yes.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Just so we have the matter straightened out, is there objection
18. to recording now by Mr. Miller of the...there is objection. For what
19. purpose...now I know Senator Groen did not object. There was an ob-
20. jection over here. Yes, Senator Groen.

21. SENATOR GROEN:

22. Mr. President, in connection with this, it seems to me that
23. what we are concerned about is a live use, where it is being recorded
24. and transmitted by radio perhaps live to the public at the time it's
25. going on. Now, it seems utterly ridiculous to have a transcription
26. made of this that is going to be published and not allow it to be
27. done honorably as Bill Miller is trying to do here for his subse-
28. quent use when, in fact we all know that if he wanted to do it dis-
29. honorably, he could go to the attorney general's office or someplace
30. in this building, he could go to the newsroom, he could take that
31. recording, he's trying to do it...I can't see this distinction and
32. I can't see why we do not permit this. And if we are doing it simply
33. on the basis of tradition, I think the tradition is no longer necessary

1. or desirable and I think we ought to change the tradition, if that's
2. the basis upon which it's being done.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Well, the chair just has request from someone else also to
5. record. Now, I wonder if this matter shouldn't be referred to the
6. Rules Committee? And if...that motion is not in order right now,
7. Senator Neistein. Let's refer the matter to the Rules Committee
8. at this point. Senator Walker may continue.

9. SENATOR WALKER:

10. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I been
11. looking over this report from the architects dated May the 8th to
12. the present Speaker of the House. As I go through there it reminds
13. me of several things that could be remedied over there, but not to
14. the tune of \$990,000. They're talking about recessing the lights
15. and anyone who has stood at that podium knows that when the T.V.
16. cameras are operating up in the gallery, it does have somewhat a
17. blinding effect, but it's not intolerable. It's entirely bearable.
18. They intend to take the press from their customary seats in the
19. front of the Chambers and put them in the back, and as this editorial
20. says, that'll only give the press a look at the backside of the House
21. members and that might in fact be a little better than the frontside
22. on occasions. But when you look at the overall expense here, and
23. granted that that balcony may need some shoring up, but it's needed
24. it for a number of years, 15 that I know of, you get into desk,
25. chairs, theatre seats, \$30 each demolition, reconstruction of the
26. entire House floor over there. As this editorial states, it's the
27. wrong time to do it, and in my opinion, it's not necessary. I'm
28. gonna read in conclusion one paragraph, "The Senate should stop
29. this move cold and demand a thorough inquiry into the bill. That
30. means not only expense involved, but the philosophy behind this at-
31. tempt to wall off the Representatives from the people they're re-
32. presenting." Granted some of these repairs are necessary, but not
33. the proposed repairs as set forth in this Senate bill 4634. I would

1. urge what few friends I have here in the Senate to vote no on this
2. bill. Thank you very much.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator McBroom.

5. SENATOR MCBROOM:

6. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I wonder if Senator Partee
7. would yield for a couple of questions.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Indicates he will.

10. SENATOR MCBROOM:

11. Senator Partee, I don't set myself up as a construction expert
12. or an engineer and I'm certain that you don't, but do you have any
13. idea how long it has been before any repairs of any substance were
14. made in the House of Representatives?

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Partee.

17. SENATOR PARTEE:

18. I think, Senator, and I'm not absolutely certain of this, but
19. I think in 1963, which is about nine years ago, there was an expen-
20. diture of, I think, about \$70,000. Now that money was spent for the
21. purpose of shoring up what purported to be sags, you know, where
22. floors had sunk or something of that sort. But what they say now is
23. that the area is dangerously below acceptable loading standards. They
24. say that to rebuild the galleries is essential to the safety of the
25. public and that the present galleries are structurally unsafe when
26. used by more people than there are seats, which means what we call
27. standees. And if you recall, when you go over to the House and you
28. look at the gallery, particularly on ceremonial occasions, like the
29. swearing in of state officers, and so forth, there are probably twice as
30. many people standing as there are sitting. And it's dangerously unsafe
31. they say from some standards that have been determined for people to use
32. it in this way. And you certainly can't tell people they can't stand
33. up there, everybody can't have a seat because there's just so many seats.

1. And this is the basic problem.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator McBroom.

4. SENATOR MCBROOM:

5. Senator Partee, bear with me just a moment more. Senator, I
6. served in the House the same as you did and as you know I voted
7. against this bill in the Appropriations Committee. But I have been
8. doing some reflecting, Senator, and without belaboring the Senate
9. I for one member of this Senate has had my life threatened by tele-
10. phone calls and on a couple occasions by an unsigned letter. And
11. after the situation with Governor Wallace, it gives me cause for
12. reflection. I also have heard, and I don't know that this is true,
13. I don't sit in the House Chambers and watch the galleries, but I've
14. heard, Senator Partee, that the gallery trembles. Do you know if
15. there's any substance for that allegation when it's loaded with
16. people?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Are you talking about the people or the structure?

19. SENATOR MCBROOM:

20. No, no, no.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Partee.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. Yes, Senator, if you walk over there in the gallery when there
25. is some movement or flow of people, the floor is like an accordion
26. almost. It goes up and down.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator McBroom.

29. SENATOR MCBROOM:

30. I would just say to the members of the Senate I think before
31. casting a vote on this, those of us who are here ought to reflect upon
32. the lady who was in the gallery right up here, Mr. Pro Tem, some
33. time ago, and was barefoot and her hair was in disarray, shouting four

1. letter words at members of the Senate from both sides of the aisle. I'm
2. going to support your proposal, Mr. President.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Is there further discussion? Senator Harris.

5. SENATOR HARRIS:

6. Mr. President, I just want to make a few observations about
7. this matter that's before us. Number one, I really believe, and
8. I recognize that we've got a mutual and joint responsibility to pass
9. on legislation of any sort. But this is a matter that it is peculiar
10. to the House and whatever plan or process of change relating to the
11. House Chambers ought to be, in my judgement, a matter for the House
12. to decide insofar as that plan or those changes to its Chambers
13. are concerned. Now, I think, there is deep reaction by our friends
14. in the fourth estate about the significant changes involved in re-
15. location and Senate "being separated from" or not continuing to be
16. directly involved in House debate insofar as physical presence is
17. concerned. Now nobody really can tell at this point in time whether
18. the changes proposed by the House and this bill has joint sponsorship
19. from both sides of the aisle in the House whether in fact the results
20. are going to be really helpful or not. I've given this matter a good
21. deal of thought and I want to make it very clear. I think in the
22. long run our friends in the working press will find that the proposed
23. changes will not only be helpful to them and I believe this, I'm
24. gonna amplify in a minute, but the very fact that the space involved
25. in the floor of the House will be almost entirely allocated to House
26. membership use and those of us who have served in the House, particularly
27. since 1955 or 57, I served in the old 153 body one term, as did
28. the Lieutenant Governor, Senator McCarthy, and the change from 55 to 57
29. was a very noticeable, physical result insofar as restriction on
30. House member activity and accessibility. Unless you've served in the
31. House you just cannot fully appreciate the tremendous limited oppor-
32. tunity that obtains in a House member's service within the body.
33. The vast number of square feet that's available to us as compared to

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1. a House member is a tremendous difference. And so those determinations
2. by the House to allocate the floor space as thoroughly as possible
3. to House members is consistent in my judgment with sound decision-
4. making to ultimately effect and serve the body politic for the very
5. members of the House of Representatives. Now let me touch on this
6. matter of concern by the fourth estate. I anticipate that the
7. Space Needs Commission will assign the working area for the press
8. and the media to a fourth floor location in what we have heard
9. described as found space on four and a half floor above, a great deal
10. of space more than is presently being utilized in the old lounge.
11. And it will, as relates to House activity, make it possible for the
12. working press to go back and forth on four, to their position in the
13. gallery, in the press gallery, if you please, in the House Chambers.
14. They will be able to converse with each other, catch up on something
15. that they've missed, inquire from their colleague, who's been witnessing
16. the debate, and move quite effectively from their location, anticipated
17. location, I, of course, cannot speak for the Space Needs Commission as
18. to where their working area is ultimately going to be located, but there
19. is very serious thought being given to that location right over here
20. which will be a much superior location to the one in which the members
21. of the press work today. Now let me touch on one more point and that
22. is this question of the glass partitioning and its total result and
23. I don't see it as significant as a matter of protection as some do,
24. although that's a very valid consideration. But let me make reference
25. to a story, widely circulated last week, about the disenchantment of
26. the school children of Illinois, as they move by on a five minute ex-
27. posure of our activity here directly involved, not permitted to ask
28. questions while in view of the two houses because it would be dis-
29. ruptive, and point out to you what, I think, all of us have noticed
30. from time to time when the guides of the Secretary of State's office
31. conduct school groups when we are not in session. The children, then,
32. can ask questions and engage in some exchange from an informational
33. standpoint. Now were there a glass partition in existence while we

1. are in session, sensible, reasonable, informational-developing
2. questions could occur from the young people without disrupting
3. debate on the floor. And I think this is an excellent by-product
4. to permit the children to evaluate discourse and inquire not only
5. when we're not in session but when we are in session. Now legitimate
6. concern has been raised about this appropriation bill and we must
7. weigh all of the factors involved. In my conclusion, and I recom-
8. mend it to my colleagues here in the Senate is that the overwhelming
9. result of careful study of this effect of this appropriation bill is
10. one consistent with good government, is one that will produce desired
11. effects, for the benefit of all in the changes that will result in
12. the House Chambers, if this bill becomes law. I call upon you, my
13. colleagues, to support this appropriation.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

15. Senator Mitchler.

16. SENATOR MITCHLER:

17. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I believe as Senator
18. Harris believes, that matters relating to the House belong to the
19. House and unless there is something drastically wrong should be
20. supported by this body and the same courtesy is usually extended by
21. the House to the Senate, particularly so in the matters of the general
22. operation of their respective bodies and their facilities. Now, in
23. voting on this bill at this time, I cannot help but respect my col-
24. league, Senator Horsley, who has raised a very interesting and through
25. his own research, more research than I have available in my file, has
26. pointed out to this body some of the implications that have been made
27. that I guess we have to assume as Senator Sours says, reflects upon
28. all members of the Illinois General Assembly and people involved in
29. state government. Because back home in Kendall County and Kane County
30. they read about these things and not all of the people come down
31. here to just watch what goes on. Now, with respect to the remodeling
32. because of this I recall that I gave my affirmative vote to the pre-
33. vious legislation and appropriation for the remodeling of the Capitol

1. Building and I believe that called for some 725 thousand or what
2. was it. Then I read in the paper where there was \$745,000 in add-on
3. without bidding on the contract and that the work at that time was
4. only 85 per cent complete and I saw extensive pictures in the local
5. newspapers about toilets and washrooms and kitchens and all these
6. facilities in the leaderships rooms, which it didn't strike well with
7. the public, although I am one to appreciate the need for many of these
8. facilities for leadership who work many, many hours beyond what people
9. realize. But I did not know that this would mushroom into the cost
10. that would be involved. I know I voted for the remodeling of the
11. Governor's mansion, rather than construct a new mansion out on the
12. lake as was proposed. And I thought that remodeling the old one
13. would be in keeping, but I've driven by, sort of down that back alley,
14. I don't know exactly what the street, and to me it looks like there's
15. an entirely new structure over there. And I don't know what the
16. final cost of that will be or what will be the eventual reporting on
17. that. All I can say is fool me once, shame on you, fool me twice,
18. shame on me. But I'm going to have to at this time, support Senator
19. Horsley in his request that this legislation be held up because the
20. report would come back rather quickly and could come back before we
21. adjourned and no work on this would start at that time. So when it
22. comes time for me to cast my vote, I'm going to just vote present
23. and with the understanding that I'd like to see this held up at
24. such time as Senator Horsley's committee, or the investigating com-
25. mittee, could clear up so that I wouldn't be fooled the third time
26. in voting for something that could mushroom into something that would
27. be reported in a very derogatory manner and reflect even worse than
28. it already has upon the members of this body and the body across the
29. hall.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Mohr.

32. SENATOR MOHR:

33. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I certainly don't want to

1. belabor this point to much longer but I feel compelled to say just
2. a couple of words on it. We did hear Senator Horsley's resolution
3. in committee yesterday. I think it's a good resolution. I think
4. that, well, it was supported by the committee. And I agree with
5. Senator Harris and his remarks, the need for the remodeling of the
6. Chamber. There's no question about it. However, there is a cloud
7. hanging over our heads. There's been an accusation made here and
8. I feel that this should be resolved before we take action on this
9. bill. I don't believe that we should sit here and be a part of a
10. another power play by the Speaker of the House. I think this thing
11. can wait, whether it be one or two weeks. I don't think that's
12. asking too much but I would think that the Speaker and the House
13. members would want this cloud removed, they would want the answers.
14. I also feel that there is nothing to that story, but I would like,
15. that's a personal opinion, but I would like it...the facts to be
16. brought out. I think if there were any truth to it it wouldn't have
17. appeared in the column that it did, it would have been on the front
18. page in headlines. We're talking about something that happened
19. six years ago. It's history if it did happen. I would like to
20. support Senator Partee on this measure and would support him after
21. the committee reports back on the fact-finding of this investigation.
22. I would vote present and would hope that all of us would vote present
23. to kind of clear the air if you will.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Neistein.

26. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

27. Mr. President, I move the previous question.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Neistein moves the previous question. All in favor
30. signify by saying aye. Contrary minded. Motion prevails. Senator
31. Partee may close the debate.

32. SENATOR PARTEE:

33. Well, I think they are legitimate concerns as expressed by various

1. members of the body but I think there are a couple of things, pro-
2. bably, that have been overlooked. Now, they say this is a power
3. play of the Speaker. Let me tell you, gentlemen, that I don't
4. react to power and I don't react to power plays and the Speaker is
5. the Speaker of the House. He is not a member of my party. But he is
6. the Speaker of the House. This isn't his bill per se. This is a
7. bill which was passed overwhelmingly with about, I think, 13 or 14
8. votes against it by the House. This is what 177 persons in the House,
9. by a majority decision, have decreed that they want and saying what
10. they need and what they ought to have to me is a little bit like
11. putting yourself in this position. We have a bill that went from here
12. over to the House in which we said that we wanted an electronic roll
13. call voting system. Now, what you're inviting is to have someone
14. stand up over in the House, in large numbers perhaps, and say, "Well,
15. the Senate doesn't need an electronic roll call. Yea, we have one
16. but they don't need it." When this would be in absolute defiance
17. of a recorded vote of this body that we did, by a majority vote
18. here, by the required constitutional number of votes, we decreed
19. that we did want one and that we needed one. And I would be per-
20. sonally offended to have some group of House members say to me and
21. to the Senate that we don't know what we need over here, we don't
22. know what we want over here. Now the other part of this situation
23. is this resolution question and how it effects this. The resolution
24. will have its proper place for investigation. It was I who sug-
25. gested that we have a structured organization within the framework
26. of Illinois government which is a handmaiden of this legislative
27. body called the Illinois Legislative Investigating Commission. They
28. are equipped and structured to make this investigation. I suggest to
29. you that however the resolution is decided, however it comes out,
30. whatever their recommendation, that it doesn't strengthen the load
31. limit of galleries in the House. And no matter who is right or who
32. is wrong, if those galleries collapse and hundreds of boys and girls
33. or whoever is up there at the time find themselves in hospitals or in

1. crematoriums, the blood is on your vote and not mine. They say they
2. need it an I'm going to say that I'm going to vote to give it to
3. them. Now, Senator Walker, you over there, you were the Speaker
4. and I really suspect that the close and warm and kinetic rela-
5. tionship that exist between you and the present Speaker, and par-
6. ticularly since both of you live close to each other, in almost ad-
7. joining districts, that you might have had more compassion for this
8. but I really don't really understand it, because I know how warm the
9. relationship is between you and the present Speaker. I know further
10. that you do not permit personalities to interfere with your judg-
11. ment, but I just simply couldn't understand your position this morning.
12. I don't know. I'm sure nobody wants anybody to be injured. I'm sure
13. nobody wants anybody to get killed down here. You know, as a matter
14. of fact, I've thought a lot of times, particularly since I saw the
15. new State House and office building in Hawaii this January that maybe
16. we ought to have some brand new facilities around here. I'm concerned
17. too about the amount of money that we spend to refurbish and rebuild
18. or redo and restructure old buildings. These old buildings, of course,
19. as Senator Horsley would tell you and Senator Sours would tell you,
20. have this very intrinsic, historical value. And it's meaningful for
21. children to walk into these halls and see an old building that's been
22. here for a number of years and that Abraham Lincoln walked here or
23. somebody did something else that has historical impact. We are now
24. trying to get offices in various places. We may well have been better
25. off to take \$20,000,000 and build a state office building for the
26. Legislature, a new facility, if you please, with a swimming pool and
27. all of the other acoutrements to which we are entitled. We sit here
28. and we work day after day, hour after hour, without the physical at-
29. tractiveness that's required for that kind of work. If this were a
30. corporation or any other group you...I've been to the newspaper of-
31. fices, I've seen the kind of offices they have in the field building
32. and other places. They're commodious, they're beautiful, and they live
33. and work under conditions and circumstances which promote and invite

1. the kind of attention and work situation that is required. Now, this
2. is their resolution. I think it ought to be passed. This is their
3. bill. This is what they say they want. I wouldn't want them to tell
4. us what we should or shouldn't have, I don't think we ought to tell
5. them what they should or shouldn't have and I'm happy to solicit the
6. vote and I hope Senator Egan and I are together today. I notice his
7. nice family in the gallery which I won't introduce because that would
8. be a violation of the rules but their sitting back here, his five
9. children and his wife. I'm not going to introduce them though,
10. Senator, because that would be a violation. And I'd ask you...and
11. I'd ask you ladies and gentlemen to take into consideration what is
12. involved here and do not be dissuaded because of the presence of
13. a resolution because however it is finalized it doesn't structurally
14. change the need of the House.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. Secretary will call the roll.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
19. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,
20. Dougherty, Egan...

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22. Senator Egan.

23. SENATOR EGAN:

24. Mr. President, members of the Senate, aside from the fact that
25. a dark cloud hangs over this bill, I think that we oughta take the
26. words of the ex-Speaker of the House very seriously. When Senator
27. Walker says that this time...this bill is untimely I can't help but
28. agree, Senator. The time for this bill is definitely out-of-joint.
29. I agree, Senator Harris, that there are provisions that are needed
30. for the safety of the Chamber. And I agree, Senator Partee, that we
31. should not interfere with the affairs of the House. I agree also
32. that they should not interfere in the affairs of the Senate. But those
33. provisions have been violated time and time again. And so I say that

1. I think that \$990,000,000 contains some waste in this bill. It's
2. that which I object to. And if we can get a bill to provide for
3. the safety, so that there is not blood in the House, I think that's
4. what we should do, I think that's why it is here for us to do. I
5. cannot support this bill until that's what it does. So I vote no.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris, Horsley...

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

9. Senator Horsley.

10. SENATOR HORSLEY:

11. My vote on this is based upon more than maybe some of the matters
12. that we've touched on. I live in central Illinois where the news-
13. papers have carried stories of all that's been going on here in this
14. Capitol complex. I tried a moment ago to get a ball park figure as
15. to how much we are spending and have spent recently on the Captiol
16. Building and it comes to over \$15,000,000. Now, when you couple
17. that with the fact that the newspaper runs big pictures everyday
18. of what's being done here and what's being done there, when you
19. get cost overruns that run \$400,000 on an \$80,000 contract, then
20. people are calling me up and saying what in the sam hill is going on?
21. Now, whatever you need over there in that House, I served over there
22. and I know we had to limit the number of people that we put in the
23. gallery, but, Senator Walker, it runs in my mind before you and I
24. came over here we shored up that gallery and we took care of that
25. problem so we could put all the students we needed in that gallery
26. without any danger. And that's already been done. I haven't heard
27. any case made for this and until this cloud is removed my vote at
28. the present time is going to be no.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32. Senator Latherow.

33. SENATOR LATHEROW:

1. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I sometimes question
2. the fact, and many times I suppose I should say of the expenditures
3. that may go on, but I want it known here that I do not question the
4. money that would be spent to make that structurally sound over there.
5. I don't hesitate one minute to vote for the necessary funds for that
6. and I want to say that my vote, if there is blood on it because of
7. it, it's not because of the structural part of it, it's because
8. of something else in this bill. I vote no.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom...

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

12. Senator McBroom.

13. SENATOR MCBROOM:

14. Mr. President, just very briefly, I'm only suggesting to the
15. members, and I realize that perhaps half of the members in this Chamber
16. or maybe more have served in the House of Representatives, but for
17. those who have not, I think you oughta sometime go over there and
18. spend a few hours and sit in a chair. The floor plan over there
19. is absolutely abominable. It isn't very pleasant, Mr. President,
20. to have your chair jarred all day long from the moment you come into
21. the Chambers till the moment you go home. I realize that perhaps
22. what I'm saying will not change any votes but I just like to point
23. this out to the members who haven't served there. Some of you oughta
24. take time to walk behind Senator Savickas' seat and then divide that
25. by about two. There's less room behind the House members than there
26. is behind Senator Savickas and I've noticed that I frequently bump
27. his chair when I walk on the other side. There's absolutely, you
28. don't mind it, I know, but if I did it all day long, I'm afraid you
29. might, Senator. There...it isn't very pleasant, Mr. President, when
30. you're trying to make a point for someone to walk behind you and
31. jam a chair into the back of your legs so that you forget what you're
32. talking about. I think there's more, I think certainly that the struc-
33. tural changes that...we shouldn't try to prejudge a contractor and I

1. think they're entitled to this and I'm happy to vote aye.

2. SECRETARY:

3. McCarthy, Merritt, Mit...

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

5. Senator Merritt.

6. SENATOR MERRITT:

7. Mr. President, members of the Senate, very briefly in explaining
8. my vote, I like many here in the body am disturbed over the par-
9. ticular timing of this. I would have certainly as one Senator preferred
10. to have the investigation completed upon the current allegations against
11. the architect involved, not prejudging in any way, but should it turn
12. out that some of those are found to be facts and I think that I as one
13. State Senator would have done something to aid and abet the crime in this.
14. By the same token, Mr. President, I feel I have certainly, as all of us
15. should have, some deep responsibility to the fine children of this State
16. who are in these balconies on many occasions. If serious injuries
17. or death would occur, neither would I want that blood on my hands.
18. As I look at it, at one time there was a proposition to build a new
19. state building over here to house the two Houses at a cost of at
20. least 20 million or more. I'm told that up to this time at least,
21. including this current appropriation for this project, that in the
22. entire Capitol remodeling there's only been around 12 to 13 million
23. expended. So if we've done something to preserve something in history
24. that means...has a real deep meaning to so many in the State of
25. Illinois as they visit their Capitol, I feel like that I must face
26. this with some responsible manner and I will give a reluctant aye.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga,
29. Palmer, Partee...

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

31. Senator Palmer.

32. SENATOR PALMER:

33. I'm a little surprised at the dialogue and some of the no votes

1. here. And in explaining my vote I would like to inject the Con-
2. stitution of the State of Illinois. In the section relative to
3. the organizations of the Legislature, it specifically states that
4. each House shall determine the rules of it's proceedings, judge the
5. elections returns and qualifications of it's members, and judge
6. the elections. It seems to me that we must infer from that section
7. that each House should also determine the facilities, the equipment,
8. and the conditions under which they work. It seems to me if each
9. House can decide and determine the qualifications of it's members,
10. they certainly oughta be able to determine and decide the quality
11. of the chairs they sit on and the equipment they use. And more
12. important, I think it's wrong, it's incorrect, that this body should
13. go on record not to vote for this bill and this measure. I vote aye.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Partee, Rock, Romano, Rosander, Saperstein, Savickas, Smith,
16. Soper, Sours...

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

18. Senator Sours.

19. SENATOR SOURS:

20. Mr. President, Senators, there're many thousands of people in
21. this state surviving on what has been called less than poverty wages
22. and salaries. Our school teachers in many areas are underpaid. All
23. of the departments of the state are clamoring for more appropriations.
24. All of which is inconsistent with the 177 chairs, high-backed, probably
25. red leather, at more than 300 per capita. These might be fine assets,
26. and I don't mean to make a pun, however I must confess that no one in
27. my Senate district would ever understand how I could be talking about
28. austerity any time and vote for this bill. So I vote no.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32. Senator Walker.

33. SENATOR WALKER:

1. Thank you, Mr. President. I was taught over 30 years ago if
2. you had a winner and I hope I have one here to back up my books and
3. get out of the courtroom. But there was one remark made on the other
4. side of the aisle about this piece of legislation passing the House
5. overwhelmingly. Well, let me remind you of this. It was sponsored
6. by the Republican and the Democrat leadership over there and any time
7. that you see that cosponsorship on any piece of legislation, if it
8. doesn't pass overwhelmingly, there's something wrong. Don't forget
9. that the two gentlemen, the House members that sponsored this bill,
10. are the ones responsible for making committee assignments, commission
11. assignments, and they have a few IOU's out. So the fact that it
12. passed over there overwhelmingly doesn't surprise me a bit. I do
13. admire the 78 or the 14 who had the guts to vote no on it. It took
14. a lot more intestinal fortitude to vote no over there than it did
15. to vote yes. And I still think it takes more intestinal fortitude
16. here in the Senate to vote no than it does to vote yes. I vote no
17. and without violating the rules of the Senate I would like to intro-
18. duce the beautiful young lady over my left shoulder here, Pearl
19. Walker.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21. Senator Davidson wishes to be recorded no.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Weaver. Weaver.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

25. Senator Carroll, no. Senator Collins. Senator Collins votes
26. no. Senator Davidson votes no. Request for the call of the ab-
27. sentees. The absentees will be called.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Arrington, Baltz, Bidwill, Bruce, Coulson, Course, Fawell,
30. Graham, Hall, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Laughlin, Lyons, Newhouse, Ozinga,
31. Romano, Savickas, Smith, Swinarski.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

33. Senator...Senator Partee moves to postpone consideration. This bill

1. will be placed on consideration postponed. It's my understanding
2. that we now revert to the order of business pursuant to Senator
3. Horsley's motion to suspend the rules and go on the order of
4. resolutions for the purpose of considering Senate Joint Resolution
5. what is the number, Mr. Secretary?

6. SENATOR HORSLEY:

7. I don't know the number, sir, I'll have to ask the Clerk.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

9. Has the Secretary...copies of this resolution? Senate Joint
10. Resolution 72. The chair will recognize Senator Horsley.

11. SENATOR HORSLEY:

12. Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate, this is identical with
13. the resolution that was unanimously adopted by the Executive Committee
14. yesterday after it was amended to provide that we would authorize
15. the Illinois Investigation Commission to look into the charges that
16. has been made by one Henry Hansen in the Chicago Daily News about
17. a 10% kickback by an architectural firm in connection with a state
18. contract and asking them to report back to this body as to their
19. findings and, of course, it empowers them of the right to subpoena
20. books, records, to examine witnesses under oath and hold hearings.
21. I would move the adoption of the resolution.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

23. Is there any discussion? We're on Senate Joint Resolution 72.
24. Senator Horsley's resolution concerning the proposed investigation.
25. Senator Partee.

26. Now, as I understand it, I didn't see it yet, this is the re-
27. solution which is now a Senate joint resolution of the same verbage
28. as the resolution yesterday. Is that correct?

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

30. Identical, sir, word for word, with the resolution you had
31. yesterday with the amendment that was adopted but I believe the
32. Clerk read the wrong number and in view of that with the recording
33.

1. being made of these proceedings, I would ask that the right amend-
2. ment, joint resolution, is it 72? All right, I want to make sure that
3. it is Senate Joint Resolution 72 and I would move it'ss adoption.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

5. Do we wish a roll call on this? Any further discussion? All
6. in favor of the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 72 say aye.
7. Senator Partee.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. Hold it a minute, I want to read this a minute, please.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

11. Certainly. Senator Partee.

12. SENATOR PARTEE:

13. Senator Horsley, this resolution as now drawn, if I read it
14. properly, directs the Illinois Legislative Investigative Commission
15. to look into the House of Representatives Chamber rehabilitation
16. project on the basis that a certain architectural firm was involved
17. in a newspaper article and because it is the same architectural firm
18. involved here, but your paragraph 4 says where there have been nu-
19. merous allegations of excessive time and cost extensions to other
20. state building contracts without any particular reference to this
21. firms contracts, I think, goes beyond what was my understanding.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

23. Senator Horsley.

24. SENATOR HORSLEY:

25. Well, sir, this is identical with the way it was worded yesterday
26. the way it was adopted, that language was there. It follows the
27. request of Senator Karl Berning that was made to the Audit Commission
28. and they're not mandated to do it but it might, you have two specific
29. items that they're mandated to look at and other than that, they are
30. not mandated to anything.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32. Senator Partee.

33. SENATOR PARTEE:

1. Senator, that may be your understanding but it simply is not
2. the fact. And if you will read this resolution you will know that
3. it is not the fact. You say, "Resolved that the investigating
4. commission conduct an immediate inquiry into the matter of state
5. building contracts. Now that to me means every state building con-
6. tract in which this state is engaged. It does not say, as the
7. one yesterday referred to, contracts in which this architectural
8. firm was involved. And that's what you said yesterday. Now, I
9. remembered you said the word all. The word all was in there yester-
10. day, which meant that you were saying that you were asking the
11. Commission to investigate all contacts of this particular architec-
12. tural firm. You have now expanded it to be supportive of the claims
13. that you have made in the newspaper in this county on add-ons and
14. extensions and so forth. That is not what we were talking about
15. yesterday and this is not what I agreed to. I agreed yesterday
16. that we...you were talking about a particular architectural firm
17. engaged on a particular project. The reason for your desiring to
18. look into it was because it was the same architectural firm that
19. was involved in the newspaper article. You have now by this reso-
20. lution expanded this to what would be a hopeless project. I don't
21. think the investigating commission, if there were ten of them, could
22. do what you're asking in this resolution.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

24. Senator Horsley.

25. SENATOR HORSLEY:

26. Senator Partee, if you will have Senator Cherry's secretary
27. bring in the copy of the amendment that was submitted yesterday, you
28. will find it exactly, word for word, with this resolution and the
29. matter of the add-ons referred to in here have to with the same ar-
30. chitect who has been handling these add-ons and that is the purpose
31. of it. This has been a matter of great newspaper controversy through-
32. out central Illinois and this same architect has been the same arch-
33. itect in connection with these add-ons. And this is identical, word

1. for word, with the amendment that was offered yesterday and adopted
2. unanimously by your committee. There is not one word been changed,
3. not even a comma or a period. The only thing that is changed is
4. that it's a Senate joint resolution.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

6. Senator Partee.

7. SENATOR PARTEE:

8. Now, do you intend, by this resolution, to give the Illinois
9. Legislative Crime Investigating Commission the right to look into
10. every contract in which this architectural firm was a part to. Is
11. that what you intend to do? Or do you intend...I have the same
12. trouble over here. There's always someone talking around where I
13. am, I know. Or do you intend to, by this resolution, empower the
14. Investigative Commission to look into all state contracts where there
15. have been time and cost extensions? I think you want to do the
16. former where this particular architectural firm is involved, is that
17. what you desire?

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

19. Senator Horsley.

20. SENATOR HORSLEY:

21. I'm only concerned with this gentleman and the contracts that
22. he is now handling with the add-ons and that is my only concern, sir.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

24. Senator Partee.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26. Well, then, if that is what you propose to do, Senator, if you'd
27. hold this a minute, I will have some suggestive language for you which
28. I think will do precisely that and which would not then leave it sub-
29. ject to any other interpretation. If you'll just hold a minute, we
30. will change the language for you, make a suggestion to you, and get
31. it so that we won't go outside the orbit of what your intention is.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

33. Is that agreeable, Senator Horsley?

1. SENATOR HORSLEY:
2. Just hold it a moment, yes.
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
4. Is Senator Bruce on the floor? For what purpose does
5. Senator Egan arise?
6. SENATOR EGAN:
7. Mr. President and members of the Senate, if we may during this
8. interim, there is a resolution that I would ask leave of the body
9. to suspend the rules so that we could have it's immediate adoption.
10. It's a birthday resolution for our esteemed colleague, Senator Lyons.
11. If we could at this time take it up perhaps that would be...
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
13. Is there any objection?
14. SENATOR EGAN:
15. Would you read the resolution, please, Mr. Clerk?
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
17. Can we have some order, please?
18. SECRETARY:
19. (Senate Resolution #352 introduced by Senator Knuppel, Egan
20. and Rock)
21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
22. Senator Knuppel.
23. SENATOR KNUPPEL:
24. Mr. Chairman, members of the Senate, this was not presented
25. yesterday through my inadvertance. I was called off the floor by a
26. newspaperman just before the time of resolutions. I'd ask leave to
27. have it journalized on Senator Lyons' birthday as of yesterday. Ask
28. leave to do that and ask everybody to join in. Can it be done? All
29. right. Well, anyway, I'd ask everybody to join the resolution.
30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
31. All Senators will be shown. Senator Neistein.
32. SENATOR NEISTEIN:
33. Mr. President, yesterday we received a list of priority bills

1. I think we've completed those. We haven't. How many more priorities
2. are there 'cause I wanna make my motion to adjourn?
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
4. May I suggest that you contact the leadership on your side of
5. the aisle, Senator Neistein?
6. SENATOR NEISTEIN:
7. On your side of the aisle.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
9. On my side, too.
10. SENATOR NEISTEIN:
11. All right, thank you.
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
13. Yea. Is there any objection to the suspension of the rules and
14. the immediate consideration and adoption of this resolution? All in
15. favor say aye. All opposed. The resolution is adopted. For what
16. purpose does Senator Lyons arise?
17. SENATOR LYONS:
18. Well, I wish to...I rise to express my thanks and gratitude to
19. the body for the passage of that congratulatory resolution. Yester-
20. day was the last birthday that I'll ever serve while a member of
21. the Senate. I intend to have the resolution suitably preserved be-
22. cause I have enjoyed my time in this body and I've enjoyed working
23. with the men and women that I've served with as a member of the
24. Senate. So all I wanna say to the membership generally and to each
25. of you individually is thank you very much and I'm most appreciative.
26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
27. We'll now revert to the order of Senate bills on third reading.
28. Senate bills on third reading. Senate bill 1356, Senator Bruce.
29. SENATOR BRUCE:
30. Yes, Senate bill 1356 is the bond and coupon fee bill. I believe
31. all the questions concerning that have been satisfied. I ask for a
32. roll call.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Secretary will call the roll.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
4. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,
5. Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris, Horsley,
6. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin,
7. Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merrit, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse,
8. Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano, Rosander, Saper-
9. stein, Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,
10. Weaver.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

12. Walker, aye. Senator Groen wishes to be recorded aye. Yea.
13. On that question the yeas are 42, the nays are 0. This bill having
14. received a constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. Senator
15. Partee and Clarke on the floor? Senator Cherry, I'm...the President
16. informed me before he left the rostrum that we were to consider next
17. the series of bills which we were to consider on one roll call. I'll
18. read those numbers. All right. Senate bills 1439, 1553, 1554, 1560,
19. 1562, 1566 and 1573. Senator Groen.

20. SENATOR GROEN:

21. Well, Mr. President, I would ask unanimous consent to return
22. Senate bill 1554 to the order of second reading for the purpose of
23. amendment, which amendment is on the Secretary's desk. It is the
24. amendment recommended by Senators Bruce and Senator Harris. I have
25. showed it to both of those Senators and they say that it does clean
26. up the inconsistent part of the bill which regards to the payment and I
27. would move the adoption of the amendment.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. Senate bill 1554 is returned to second reading for the purpose
30. of consideration of amendment...

31. SENATOR LAUGHLIN:

32. One.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. One. Senator Groen moves the adoption of amendment #1. All
2. in favor say aye. All opposed. The amendment is adopted. Third
3. reading. Are there any further amendments, Senator Harris, to any
4. other bills in this series? Senator Harris.

5. SENATOR HARRIS:

6. 1562 needs an effective date amendment. I have an amendment
7. for 1566.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

9. 1566?

10. SENATOR HARRIS:

11. Yea.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. 1566 is returned to second reading for the purpose of the con-
14. sideration of amendment #1, I presume?

15. SENATOR HARRIS:

16. This amendment just adds the July 1st effective date. I move
17. the adoption of the amendment.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

19. Senator Harris moves the adoption of amendment #1 to House
20. bill 1566. All in favor say aye. All opposed. The amendment is
21. adopted. Third reading. Senator Cherry, what about 1562?

22. SENATOR CHERRY:

23. I know of no amendment on that. I think it needs an effective
24. date amendment and I don't know whether it is prepared. I'll check
25. in a moment so that keep that out of the series.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

27. All right. Can we take a roll call then? All but that one now
28. that the others are ready to go? All right. Yes sir, I will. 1562.
29. All right, it will be Senate bills 1439, 1553, 1554 as amended, 1560,
30. 1566 as amended, and Senate bill 1573. Senator Merritt.

31. SENATOR MERRITT:

32. Just, Mr. President, a point of inquiry. Those that were just
33. amended, doesn't it require intervening business?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2. The Secretary has advised the Chair that those bills will be
3. listed last on the roll call so that of the five bills that passed,
4. those two will be shown as having passed fourth and fifth and therefore
5. one, two and three will have intervened. Senator Bruce.

6. SENATOR BRUCE:

7. Well, first of all, I think we make an error when we call these
8. bills as a group but that, be as it may, there is one in the group
9. I would like to make a comment on, and that is Senate bill 1566. I
10. would alert the membership to the changes in the appropriation in
11. the salaries of our various state officers. Going briefly through
12. them, the Department of Law Enforcement we're raising \$2,300 salary,
13. \$3,200 for the State Fire Marshal, \$5,000 additional for the Depart-
14. ment of Transportation, the Secretary thereof. His salary now goes
15. from \$35,000 to \$40,000. The assistant secretary goes from \$30,000
16. to \$35,000. And those are the changes. The Chairman of the Industrial
17. Commission's salary is raised from \$27,000 to \$30,000 and the members
18. are raised \$2,000. Those changes are in the bill. I don't believe
19. they are justified, particularly the Secretary of Transportation. I
20. just alert the members to that change.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22. Senator Donnewald...or Senator Cherry.

23. SENATOR CHERRY:

24. We just submitted to the Secretary's desk a amendment to 1562
25. so I would move to put the bill back on second reading for the pur-
26. pose of an amendment.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

28. Senator Cherry has brought Senate bill 1562 back to second
29. reading for the purpose and consideration and introduction of amend-
30. ment #1.

31. SENATOR CHERRY:

32. Yes, and this amendment, members of the Senate, provides for
33. changing the effective date, making it July 1st, 1972. I move the

1. adoption.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. Senator Cherry moves the adoption of amendment #1 to Senate
4. bill 1562. All in favor of the adoption of the amendment indicate
5. by saying aye. All opposed, nay. The amendment is adopted. Third
6. reading. Can we now put that back in the series? All right. In
7. addition to those other bills, then 1562 is now back in the series.
8. In the tail end. Is there any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.
9. SENATOR MITCHLER:

10. Would you please read that series again. I sorta lost it.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

12. Yes sir. The roll call will be taken on a series of seven bills,
13. whose numbers are 1439, 1553, 1554, 1560, 1562, 1566 and 1573. On
14. those questions, on these bills, the Secretary will call the roll.
15. SECRETARY:

16. ...what was our last bill? I don't know, I'll have to figure
17. it out. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,
18. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson,
19. Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall,
20. Harris, Horsley...

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22. Senator Horlsey.

23. SENATOR HORSLEY:

24. I couldn't quite believe my ears when I heard one aye vote
25. there because there's one vote in that series that this gentleman
26. has often voted no on, and I have always voted no on, and I want
27. to be recorded aye on every bill except 1554.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. For what purpose does Senator Davidson arise?

30. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

31. That's the same way that I feel. I wanna vote aye on all these
32. bills with the exception of 1554.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Senator Davidson will be so recorded as will Senator Horsley.
2. Continue the roll call.
3. SECRETARY:
4. Hynes, Johns...
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
6. Senator Johns.
7. SENATOR JOHNS:
8. Mr. President, I'd like to be recorded as no on 1566, please.
9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
10. Senator Johns will be so recorded.
11. SECRETARY:
12. But aye on the rest.
13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
14. Senator, do wish to vote aye on the remaining bills? Yes.
15. Continue the roll call.
16. SECRETARY:
17. Knuepfer, Knuppel...
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
19. I'm sorry, Senator Knuppel.
20. SENATOR KNUPPTEL:
21. Aye on all except 1566.
22. SECRETARY:
23. Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy..
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
25. Senator McCarthy.
26. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
27. Aye except on 1566.
28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
29. Senator McCarthy, wished to vote aye on every bill except
30. 1566 you wish to be recorded no.
31. SECRETARY:
32. Merritt, Mitchler...Senator Mitchler.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Senator Mitchler.

2. SENATOR MITCHLER:

3. I'd like to be recorded aye on the entire series of bill and I
4. would like to have my name not shown as voting either yea or nay on
5. Senate bill 1566.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

7. Continue the roll call.

8. SECRETARY:

9. Mohr, Neistein...

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

11. Senator Neistein.

12. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

13. I want my name to be recorded aye. How many bills are there in
14. that series?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. There are seven, Senator.

17. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

18. I wanna make sure my name's recorded aye on all seven. Thank
19. you.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano,
22. Rosander, Saperstein, Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vada-
23. labene, Walker, Weaver.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

25. Senator Walker wishes to be recorded aye. Senator Partee.

26. SENATOR PARTEE:

27. For the record, I would request of the Secretary that on each
28. separate bill, the vote on each bill be given for the tape as well
29. as for the journal. In other words there were some fall offs on some
30. of them and let's give the figures on each individual bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32. Senator Bruce.

33. SENATOR BRUCE:

1. I believe this points out the problem we're going to have
2. on calling multiple bills. I voted no on all seven, because
3. if we call these as a group and then allow each Senator to stand
4. up and say I'm going to vote yes on this one and no on that one,
5. the tapes so reflect - the Journal will not reflect that change.
6. The Journal will show that the bills were called at separate
7. times. And again we're back on that constitutional question
8. we've talked about . . . shall be a record vote on each bill.
9. Now if it's possible, I would like to be recorded aye on all
10. bills except the State Officer's Pay Bill. But again, I think
11. we've taken more time doing that than if we had voted each of
12. those bills separately.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

14. Senator Partee.

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

16. I think Senator Bruce's fears are unfounded. There is no
17. problem . . . the record will show which bills you voted for
18. and which you didn't. They will then tabulate those persons
19. who voted for each of the bills and both the record and the
20. Journal will show the number of votes and who they were on each
21. bill. There is no problem.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

23. Senator Bruce.

24. SENATOR BRUCE:

25. Although the Lieutenant Governor and I and evidently my
26. own leader disagree . . .

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

28. For what purpose does Senator Neistein arise?

29. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

30. How many times can the Senator talk on the same bill. This
31. is the fourth time, and if we had followed the original plan we
32. would have been done with the roll call. But you . . . I want
33. an answer to my question. How many times can he speak on the

1. on the same bill?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. Twice at least, Senator.

4. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

5. But this is four times.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

7. There is seven bills. I suppose he could explain his vote

8. on all seven if he really wanted to. Senator Bruce.

9. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

10. Well, let him stay after the hearing and he can explain all

11. he wants.

12. SENATOR BRUCE:

13. I . . . I would just point out that the constitution says

14. final passage of a bill shall be by record vote. A record vote,

15. is a vote by yeas and nays entered on the Journal. Now it also

16. requires that we keep a transcript elsewhere in our constitution

17. which says there shall be a transcript of our proceedings. That

18. cannot be changed. It will not show that a record was taken on

19. a bill. The Journal will not so reflect. I just point that out

20. and when we start voting the group through. Thank you.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22. I am advised by the Secretary that the . . . Senator . . .

23. Senator Neistein for what purpose do you arise?

24. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

25. I want to know what status we are in now? Are we on a

26. roll call? Are we getting a constitutional discertation for the

27. fourth time?

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. The roll call has been completed. It will be announced.

30. Senator Horsley.

31. SENATOR HORSLEY:

32. Mr. President, just a minute, I want to ask one question

33. before . . . I want to change my vote and I think I have that

1. right don't I.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. The Senator is entitled to change his vote.

4. SENATOR HORSLEY:

5. It's not been announced. I want to ask Senator Bruce if

6. one of these bills has the raises in it for the judges which

7. assumes that we're going to vote by other bills to give them

8. the raises which we have not done. Is that true or not?

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

10. Senator Bruce.

11. SENATOR BRUCE:

12. Well, again, no it does not. I'm not the sponsor of any of

13. these bills but, the Judicial Pay Bill is not in this group.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

15. Senator Horsley.

16. SENATOR HORSLEY:

17. . . . will pay the Supreme Court or any of the judges.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

19. That's right. Senator Neistein for what purpose do you . . .

20. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

21. I've never heard of a colloquy during a roll call. Senator

22. Horsley and Senator Bruce, up in back, if they want to have a

23. conference let them go to the laboratory and they can discuss

24. it all day. I want the vote announced.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

26. The Senator's point is well taken. On that question the

27. yeas are 39 and the nays are 2 and these bills will be so

28. recorded. The bills are hereby declared passed. Now the

29. Journal . . . the Secretary advised me that the Journal will

30. reflect a separate roll call on every bill. Senator Partee.

31. SENATOR PARTEE:

32. Are you going to announce a separate roll call for each

33. bill, because I want it on the tape.

1. SECRETARY:

2. The roll call on Senate Bills 1439, 1553, 1560, 15 . . .

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

4. I think, I think . . . Senator Partee.

5. SENATOR PARTEE:

6. What we're asking sir, is that each bill. . . we'll say
7. 1553, 39 ayes, 2 nays and go right down each bill so there will
8. be no question. But that each bill has a separate roll call and
9. that the votes recorded on each particular bill - particularized.

10. SECRETARY:

11. 1439 was 39 to 2. 1553 was 39 ayes and 2 nays. On 1554
12. was 37 yeas and 4 nays. 1560 was 39 yeas and 2 nays. 1562 was
13. 39 yeas and 2 nays. 1566 was 35 yeas and 5 nays. 1573 was
14. 39 yeas and 2 nays.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. The bills will be so recorded. For what purpose does
17. Senator Harris arise?

18. SENATOR HARRIS:

19. A point of parliamentary inquiry. Where is the laboratory?

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21. Senator Partee is it your and Senator Clarke's intention
22. to go right back to the rest of the Senate Bills on third
23. reading and just keep going right through? Senate Bills on
24. third reading. Senate Bill 1541, Senator Newhouse.

25. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

26. Mr. President, I'd like unanimous consent to call Senate
27. Bill 1541 back to the order of second reading for the purpose
28. of amendment.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

30. Is there any objection? Senate Bill 1541 is brought back
31. to second reading. Senator Newhouse.

32. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

33. Amendment number 1, Mr. President, there is an error in
the line items in this bill, so that the total amount of the

appropriation is unchanged. It is simply a line item switched
1. in amounts of money. I move it's adoption.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. Senator Newhouse moves the adoption of amendment number . . .
4. is this amendment number 1 . . . amendment number 1 to Senate
5. Bill 1541. All those in favor of the adoption of the amendment
6. will indicate by saying aye. Senator Horsley.

7. SENATOR HORSLEY:

8. Now, Mr. Chairman, the resolution that Senator Partee and
9. I . . .

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

11. Senator, we're in the middle of trying to adopt an
12. amendment to . . .

13. SENATOR HORSLEY:

14. I thought you had adopted it.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. No sir, not quite yet. All those opposed. The amendment
17. is adopted. Any further amendments? Third reading. Senator
18. Horsley.

19. SENATOR HORSLEY:

20. Well Mr. President, in order to expedite this matter, I
21. have already had copies that are ready and they are printed
22. and we want to get them over to the House as soon as possible.
23. Senator Partee and I have agreed upon the language in this
24. resolution and it is acceptable to me. And it limits it only to
25. a certain aspect rather than to a fishing expedition which
26. goes beyond the matter of immediate concern. And I would move
27. the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution Number 72 at this time.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. Is there any discussion? All those in favor of the adoption
30. of Senate Joint Resolution 72 indicate by saying aye. All those
31. opposed. The Resolution is adopted. Senate bills on third
32. reading. Senate Bill 1546, Senator Hynes.

33. SENATOR HYNES:

Hold it.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2. 47 held, 48 held. Senate Bill 1549, Senator Clarke.

3. SENATOR CLARKE:

4. I have an amendment on the Secretary's desk. I would like
5. to ask leave to bring this bill back and to have this amendment
6. which has an effective date of July 1st, or when the bill is
7. signed. Which ever is earlier.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

9. Senate Bill 1549. Any objection to calling it back to
10. second? It is called back to second reading for the purpose
11. of an amendment. Senator Clarke moves the adoption of amendment
12. number 1 to Senate Bill 1549. Senator Gilbert.

13. SENATOR GILBERT:

14. I have an amendment - the similar type of amendment to 1464
15. if it's not out of order. I mean it doesn't matter to me. It
16. doesn't have to be put on today, which ever you wish. Would you
17. rather wait Kenny? Kenny, would you rather wait? Would you
18. rather wait?

19. SECRETARY:

20. No, that's all right.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22. Can we finish with Senator Clarke's first? Senator Clarke
23. has moved the adoption of amendment number 1 to . . .

24. SENATOR CLARKE:

25. Mr. President. Mr. President.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

27. Senator Clarke.

28. SENATOR CLARKE:

29. I believe amendment number 1 was tabled, so this would be
30. amendment number 2.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32. Senator Clarke has moved the adoption of amendment number
33. 2 to Senate Bill 1549. All those in favor of the adoption of the

1. amendment, indicate by saying aye. All those opposed. The ayes
2. have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?
3. Third reading. Senator Graham . . . I mean Senator Gilbert.
4. SENATOR GILBERT:
5. Senate Bill 1464. This is amendment number 2, we adopted
6. the committee amendment this morning . . .
7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
8. . . . on second reading.
9. SENATOR GILBERT:
10. Well, yes, it was advanced to third.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
12. Oh, I see. Senate Bill 1464 is called back to second reading
13. for the purpose of an amendment. Senator Gilbert.
14. SENATOR GILBERT:
15. Amendment number 2 which is the July 1st amendment.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
17. Moves the adoption of amendment number 2. All those in
18. favor of the adoption of the amendment indicate by saying aye.
19. All those opposed. The amendment is adopted. Any further
20. amendments? Third reading. Senator Clarke.
21. SENATOR CLARKE:
22. I wonder if we could now return to 1549.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
24. Gentlemen, may we have some order. Senator Neistein. Will the
25. Senators be in their seats. We're on Senate bills on third reading.
26. Is that intervening business? All right. Okay. Senator Clarke is
27. recognized for Senate bill 1549.
28. SENATOR CLARKE:
29. Having had intervening business, this is the bill that would pro-
30. vide the money for a portrait to be painted of a former President pro-
31. tem, Senator Laughlin's father. We thought it would be a very fine
32. thing to have this done this year while Senator Laughlin is a member
33. of this body. I'd ask for your support.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2. Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Secretary
3. would call the roll.

4. SECRETARY:

9. Horsley aye.

10. SECRETARY:

12. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein,
13. Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano, Ro-
14. sander, Saperstein, Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vada-
15. labene, Walker, Weaver.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. On that question, the ayes are 37, the nays are 0. This bill
18. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate
19. Bill 1551, Senator Graham. Senator Graham.

20. SENATOR GRAHAM:

21. Mr. President, members of the Senate, this is a appropriation for
22. the continuing of Elections Laws Commission. We have to give you kind
23. of a ball park figure on this, easily figuring at a thousand dollars
24. a meeting if we have to have that many, which I hope we don't, but
25. in the event there is some problems with rearranging or reevaluating
26. the Election Code, the new code which we will be considering on June
27. the 5th, it is important, I think, that we have this contingency in
28. the treasury for the Election Laws Commission. I ask for a favorable
29. roll call.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

31. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call the roll.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,

1. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,

10. SENATOR GRAHAM:

11. Get the roll call first.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. Clarke, aye. Gilbert, aye. Carpentier, aye.

14. SENATOR GRAHAM:

15. Thank you. I hope this is the last one.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. On that question the yeas are 34, the nays are 0. This bill
18. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senator
19. Graham.

20. SENATOR GRAHAM:

21. And now, just for a moment, to be out of order temporarily, I
22. think it's important if you'll grant me...

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

24. Can we have some order? Senator Graham's asking for attention.

25. SENATOR GRAHAM:

26. This may be a rather important announcement. It probably isn't.
27. But I would like to ask that Senator Partee, Senator Clarke, whoever's
28. involved with this will grant us leave to have a committee-of-the-
29. whole hearing on the new recodification of the Election Code on June
30. 5th on the floor of the Senate immediately after adjournment.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32. Well, I would say that suggestion will probably go to the Rules
33. Committee, which, I'm told, is going to meet this afternoon. Is that.

1. SENATOR GRAHAM:

2. I'doubt that. I think it's certainly agreed. We already asked,
3. Mr. President...we already agreed we'd have a committee-of-the-whole
4. meeting. This is to establish the date.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

6. I see. All right. Senate bill 1561, Senator Kosinski. Senate
7. bill 1565, Senator Ozinga. Senator Ozinga.

8. SENATOR OZINGA:

9. This is the appropriation for the Visitation Commission which
10. has been reduced back to \$30,000 and I appreciate a favorable roll
11. call.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call the roll. Senate
14. bill 1565. Did you put the number up.

15. SECRETARY:

16. 15 what? 65, did you say?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

18. 65. Senate bill 1565. Secretary will call the roll.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
21. Cherry, Chew, Clarke...

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

23. Senator Cherry.

24. SENATOR CHERRY:

25. I think before we call this bill I would suggest to the sponsor
26. that we were having a discussion that we were going to address ourselves
27. to 1477 before we considered this bill. Am I correct in that, Senator
28. Ozinga?

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

30. Senator Ozinga.

31. SENATOR OZINGA:

32. What was the question?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Senator Cherry.

2. SENATOR CHERRY:

3. As I understand it, Senator Clarke agreed that we would address
4. ourselves to Senator Saperstein's bill before we addressed ourselves
5. to the consideration of your bill and I would suggest that you do
6. that.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

8. Senator Clarke.

9. SENATOR CLARKE:

10. I have not even talked to Senator Ozinga. I made a off-hand
11. reference to our lovely female member of the Senate the other day
12. that there should not be a feud existing in this area. It was
13. over a newspaper editorial and that certainly both of these
14. commissions had their place and functions. This is the way I
15. feel about it and I say I haven't talked to Senator Ozinga, but
16. I'm sure he would agree.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

18. Senator Cherry we're on roll call. Senator Cherry.

19. SENATOR CHERRY:

20. I simply wish to suggest to Senator Ozinga that he hold the
21. bill until we resolve this issue between Senator Saperstein and . . .
22. Senator Saperstein's bill and your's. Would you hold that
23. Senator?

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

25. Senator . . . Senator Clarke.

26. SENATOR CLARKE:

27. Well Senator, we're in the middle of a roll call and we'll
28. go on postponed consideration. Now I really think that, you
29. know, I don't think there is any need for Senator Saperstein to
30. have any fears or anything of that nature. But I mean . . . I
31. think there is need for both of these commissions and I really
32. think we ought to go ahead and pass them both. We could do that
33. right now, after we finish this roll call.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2. Roll call. Continue the roll call. Senator Cherry.

3. SENATOR CHERRY:

4. With that assurance, Senator Clarke's word is good enough
5. and I will vote aye on this roll call. I would suggest that we
6. call Senator Saperstein's bill next. Senator Saperstein's bill.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

8. Continue the roll call.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,
11. Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris,
12. Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab,
13. Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler,
14. Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer,

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

18. Weaver aye. Senator McBroom aye. On that question the ayes are
19. 35, the nays are none. This bill having received the constitutional
20. majority is declared passed. Senator Saperstein.

21. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

22. Mr. President and gentlemen, 1477 is an appropriation for
23. the Commission on Mental Health and Mental Retardation. Pardon
24. me. It is an appropriation . . . \$7,500.00.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

26. Is there any discussion? The Secretary will call the roll.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,
29. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson,
30. Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall,
31. Harris, Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
32. Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt,
33. Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga,

1. Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano, Rosander, Saperstein, Savickas,

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

4. Hall aye. On that question the yeas are 32 and the nays are 1.
5. This bill having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
6. I am apprised that the President pro tem has been in discussions
7. concerning House bills on third reading, House bill 4098 and for
8. that purpose the chair will recognize Senator Harris.

9. SENATOR HARRIS:

10. Mr. President, members of the Senate, House bill 4098 makes
11. a supplemental appropriation to the State Employees' Group Insurance
12. program. At the time of the development of the original appropriation
13. it could not be ascertained precisely what amount would be needed.
14. This money is some of it actually overdue. The Department of Personnel
15. will proceed as rapidly as possible to initiate it once the bill can
16. be signed. I know of no opposition at this point. We had a very
17. thorough discussion in the Appropriations Committee and would urge
18. the membership to apply a favorable roll call.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

20. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call the roll.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
23. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,
24. Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall, Harris, Horsley,
25. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin,
26. Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr, Neistein, Newhouse,

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

31. Walker, aye. Weaver, aye. Dougherty, aye. Donnewald, aye.
32. Clarke, aye. Coulson, aye. On that question the yeas are 36, the
33. nays are 0. This bill having received a constitutional majority is

1. declared passed. Now, we'll go back to Senate bills on third
2. reading. Senator Neistein, for what purpose do you arise?

3. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

4. I wanna ask leave of this body to hear five bills of Senator
5. Rosander's the Senate sponsor. There John Jacob Wolfe's bills.
6. House bills 1531, 32, 1534, 1535 and 1539 to be heard in Judiciary
7. next Wednesday, at 3:30. I ask leave of the body.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

9. Is there any objection? So ordered. Senator Partee.

10. SENATOR PARTEE:

11. I guess this is in the nature of an announcement or perhaps
12. something that I need to say that people have been asking about.
13. Several of the Senators asked me how long we planned to go and frankly
14. we could be winding up now except for one very vital issue. The Public
15. Aid deficiency bill which we sent over to the House has the House in
16. something in the nature of an uproar at this time. The Governor sent
17. word to us this morning that they were wanting us to stay in long
18. enough that they could bring it here and we could get it to him.
19. Apparently, Mr. Weaver here has indicated that he has run out of money
20. and it's absolutely essential that this bill be passed. On the roll
21. call over there, I am told, I was not there, during the roll call the
22. Speaker gavelled it into defeat and now they are waiting for one side
23. or the other to make the initial move to reconsider it. I don't know.
24. It's been in a state of flux for the last hour and a half so I'd ask
25. you if you could to wait just a few more moments so we could find out
26. what they're going to do because we'll have to necessarily concur in
27. their action and the money is needed and they've run out of money and
28. I'd hate to be the one who walked away here today with people without
29. money for...such as, the aged, and the blind, and so forth. So as
30. soon as we can find out, we'll let you know so we can do something
31. about it.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

33. Senator Harris. For what purpose does Senator Harris arise?

1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Well, I just want to add to the pro tem's remarks that I don't
3. think it came clear to everyone. There is a House amendment on the
4. bill and we will be required to take action on it. I don't think
5. that was made quite clear.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

7. Senate bills on third reading. Senate bill 1570, Senator Mc-
8. Carthy. Senator McCarthy.

9. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

10. Yes, Mr. President, I'd like to move that bill back to second
11. reading for the purpose of attaching a effective date amendment.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. Is there any objection? Hearing none, the bill is returned to
14. second reading for the purpose of an amendment. Senator McCarthy
15. has offered amendment number...

16. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

17. One. It's on the desk up there.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

19. One to Senate bill 1570. Will you explain the amendment?

20. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

21. It just is the effective date act of July 1, 1972 and I move
22. its adoption.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

24. Senator McCarthy moves the adoption of amendment number one to
25. Senate bill 1570. All in favor of the adoption of the amendment indi-
26. cate by saying aye. All opposed. The amendment is adopted. Any
27. further amendments? Third reading. Senate bill 1552, Senator Dougherty

28. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

29. Mr President, members of the Senate, Senate bill 1552 calls for
30. a transfer of one million dollars from the metropolitan...let's see...
31. calls for an appropriation from the Fair and Exposition Authority Recon-
32. struc Fund to the Metropolitan Fair and Exposition Fund for the payment
33. of interest and principal on the bonds made for the retirement and the

1. reconstruction of McCormick Place. I ask for a favorable roll call.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. Is there any discussion?

4. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

5. It appears on...behind 1573, it's out of place or something.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

7. Senate bills on third reading. It's out of order. It's right
8. between 1573 and 1559 which is also out of order.

9. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

10. This is the McCormick Place Reconstruction Fund. The funds come
11. from a racing revenue. It does not come from a general revenue.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call the roll. Sergeant-
14. at-arms better ring the bell.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Arrington, Baltz...Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce,
17. Carpentier, Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course,
18. Davidson, Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen,
19. Hall...

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21. Can we...Senator Dougherty has moved for unanimous consent to
22. remove this action from the journal...from the record.

23. SECRETARY:

24. He can move...Senator Clarke.

25. SENATOR CLARKE:

26. You mean, Mr. President, you mean it would be put on postponed
27. consideration?

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. No, the request was just to take this action out of the record
30. and it stay right where it was...or where it is...Senator Clarke.

31. SENATOR CLARKE:

32. Mr. President, if this can be done by unanimous consent, going
33. back to the bill this morning that Senate Weaver had, where, at

1. the request of the pro tem, he held it up. Why was that not given 1.
2. this accord rather than being put on postponed consideration on the 2.
3. middle of a roll call? 3.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 4.

5. I'm advised there was no such motion before the body at that 5.
6. time. Nobody asked for it. Senator Partee. 6.

7. SENATOR PARTEE: 7.

8. Actually, Senator, I thought that's what was done. I wouldn't 8.
9. object to that at all. I didn't want the bill to have any different 9.
10. posture. I didn't expect it to go on consideration postponed. I 10.
11. thought it was being taken out of the record. That's what I thought, and 11.
12. it would be in the same posture. That's what I thought, or maybe you 12.
13. didn't make that motion but that's what I thought was happening. 13.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 14.

15. Senator Clarke. 15.

16. SENATOR CLARKE: 16.

17. Well, I just like to clarify this matter because, of course, the 17.
18. Lieutenant Governor isn't on the stand, and his right arm isn't there, 18.
19. his parliamentarian, but on numerous occasions in recent weeks, I've 19.
20. heard the ruling made that once a roll call started, that it had to 20.
21. go on postponed consideration. 21.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 22.

23. Senator Partee. 23.

24. SENATOR PARTEE: 24.

25. Yes, by rule we do that, Senator, but we can always suspend the 25.
26. rule and I'm not expecting for one bill to have any different treat- 26.
27. ment than the other. It's kind of obvious to me now that we are dwindl- 27.
28. ing in numbers and maybe it shouldn't have been called in the first 28.
29. place because I just don't think there are enough people here to pass it. 29.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 30.

31. Senator Dougherty. 31.

32. SENATOR DOUGHERTY: 32.

33. 33.

1. Avoiding parliamentary procedure, let's try keep the roll call
2. going and see if we can pick up enough votes.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

4. All right. Continue with the roll...

5. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

27. ident and the law requires it under that act this would straighten
28. it out so that he can be president and treasurer. I would ask for
29. a favorable roll call.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

31. House bill 4157. Is there any discussion? Secretary will call
32. the roll.

33. SECRETARY:

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

14. On that question the yeas are 33, the nays are 0. This bill
15. having received the constitutional majority is declared passed.
16. Senator Graham.

17. SENATOR GRAHAM:

18. I just think it's remarkable that every once in awhile we get a
19. real good profile of the former Speaker of the House of Representatives
20. through the bars. I think it's remarkable and we're glad...I think
21. it's an extremely good picture and I wish he'd do it more often.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

23. House bills on third reading. 3047, Senator Knuppel on the floor?
24. 3647, Senator Sours. 4117, Senator Horsley. I'm going through with
25. those bills that have been designated by the leadership as priority
26. bills. Those are the ones we're dealing with.

27. SENATOR GRAHAM:

28. What's the number of that, sir?

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

30. 4117. House bill on third reading.

31. SENATOR HORSLEY:

32. Well, this is merely a revisory bill and there's no substantive
33. change that I've been able to find.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2. House bill 4117. Is there any discussion?

3. SENATOR HORSLEY:

4. Because all it does is combine amendments into one so that
5. you don't have 18 different amendments with different section num-
6. bers.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

8. I wonder if Senator Partee...4117, 89 and 22 all seem to be
9. revisionary of the same nature. I wonder if we could, much to the
10. consternation of Senator Bruce, take these on one roll call.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

12. House bills...Senator Horsley, these are your bills, is that
13. agreeable...

14. SENATOR HORSLEY:

15. Roll call on the group, if you don't mind.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. Fine. House bill 4117, 4118, 4119, and 4122. Those four bills
18. will be considered on one roll call. Is there any further discussion?
19. Is there any further discussion? Secretary will call the roll.

20. SECRETARY:

29. SENATOR NIHILL:

30. Mr. President, and Senators, what do these things do. I haven't
31. got the bill here. I'm only looking at the synopsis here. What do
32. they really do. Oh, now, wait a minute, some bills go through here
33. sometime you don't know where they come from. I'm reading here. It

1. says relating to the medical, dental and surgical treatment and
2. counseling of minors and combines the difference of amendments
3. made by the previous approved public act. Now what is it?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

5. Senator...Senator Horsley.

6. SENATOR HORSLEY:

7. Every time that we amend a section of the statute and there
8. there's words may be of the word the instead of there or so on,
9. they print both amendments in the statute book. And all these do is
10. combine these. Pete Bobbitt and his staff in the Reference Bureau have
11. gone over these and your staff on your side have gone over every one
12. of them. There isn't a bit of substance in them whatsoever. They
13. just simply clean up and save a lot of money in printing of the law
14. books. We need about five more votes and I'd appreciate it if
15. somebody would get on them so we can get them off the calendar.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. Groen aye.

18. SECRETARY:

19. O'Brien . . . O'Brien . . .

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21. Continue the roll call.

22. SECRETARY:

23. O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Rock, Romano, Rosander,
24. Saperstein, Savickas, Smith, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene,
25. Walker, Weaver.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

27. Ozinga aye. On that question, House Bill 4117, the yeas are
28. 33 and the nays are none. The bill is declared passed. House
29. Bill 4118, the yeas are 33 and the nays are none. The bill is
30. declared passed. House Bill 4119, the yeas are 33 and the nays
31. are none. The bill is declared passed. House Bill 4122, the
32. yeas are 33 and the nays are none. The bill is declared passed.
33. House Bill 4479 4480. Senator Clarke do you wish to call those
bills? 4479 and 80.

1. SENATOR CLARKE:

2. I'd just as soon wait, we got . . .

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

4. Fine. Those are the last I had marked as priority items.

5. Senator Horsley.

6. SENATOR HORSLEY:

7. I have a . . . an emergency bill of 4529, involves the city
8. of Jacksonville. It's Senator Rose or Representative Rose and
9. Representative Kenneth Boyle from Carlinville. And what this bill
10. does is give one and forty one hundreths acres of ground owned
11. by the State Hospital . . .

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. Wait Senator. House bill . . .

14. SENATOR HORSLEY:

15. . . . the city of Jacksonville . . .

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. House bill 4529. Will you put the number on the board?

18. Excuse me.

19. SENATOR HORSLEY:

20. And it has been appraised by real estate people for the sum
21. of \$11,000.00. And that money will be paid to the State of Illinois.
22. The Governor has approved it. The Director of the Department and
23. all concerned has approved it so the City can use this ground that
24. is not needed by the State Hospital.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

26. Any discussion on House Bill 4529?

27. SENATOR HORSLEY:

28. Same roll call.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

30. The Secretary will call the roll.

31. SECRETARY:

32. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
33. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,

12. I think this House Bill 3682 was on that list. It's been
13. amended back to third reading. If the body is of a mind, I'd just
14. as soon pass this and get it out of here. And this deals with
15. your representative committeemen . . .

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. House bill . . . excuse me Senator. House bills on third
18. reading. House bill 3682 is a priority listed bill. 3682. It
19. has been amended. Senator Graham.

20. SENATOR GRAHAM:

21. It deals with the representative committeemen as relates to
22. our new legislative districts. It's been amended. This is important
23. in case we have a vacancy. I urge a favorable roll call.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

25. Is there any discussion? House bill 3682.

26. SENATOR GRAHAM:

27. It's all right over there.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. Senator Partee.

30. SENATOR PARTEE:

31. I don't know, did I miss the explanation or has it been given
32. yet . . . of this bill?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Senator Graham did explain what the bill . . .

2. SENATOR PARTEE:

3. I'm sorry I missed it, but I like to hear him talk anyway.

4. Go ahead . . .

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

6. Senator Graham.

7. SENATOR GRAHAM:

8. Senator Partee this is a bill that deals with legislative
9. district committees. There was some disagreement as to the contents
10. several times. It has been worked out with Clyde Choate's office,
11. Dave Epstein and all the people on both sides of the aisle and
12. as far as I'm concerned, everyone is in agreement with it. And should
13. we have a vacancy, and this bill doesn't pass, we might find a
14. legislative district, especially overlapping, in deep trouble.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. Is there any further discussion? The Secretary will call the
17. roll.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
20. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donnewald,

28. Berning aye. Gilbert aye. Baltz aye. O'Brien aye. Palmer
29. aye. Johns aye. On that question the yeas are 32, the nays are
30. none. The bill having received a constitutional majority is
31. declared passed. Resolutions . . . or message from the House.

32. Oh excuse me, Senator Berning.

33. SENATOR BERNING:

1. Mr. President, if it's not out of order, and as a suggestion
2. to help clear the calendar I have a now agreed to bill, House bill
3. 3060 on consideration postponed. I'd like to call that and get
4. that off the calendar. If there is any question, I will attempt to
5. answer it. Senator Dougherty.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

7. Senator Berning has asked that we move to the order of
8. consideration postponed for the purpose of considering House bill 3060.
9. Is there any objection? All right, we'll be on consideration postponed
10. House bill 3060. Senator Berning.

11. SENATOR BERNING:

12. Senator Dougherty, there seems to be no objection on this measure
13. now. If you feel that this is an appropriate time, it would be a good
14. idea to get it off the calendar.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. Senator Dougherty.

17. SENATOR BERNING:

18. I know.

19. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

20. I can't see any reason why it can't be passed at this time.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22. Is there any further discussion? Senator Berning, you may close
23. the debate. Secretary will call the roll.

24. SECRETARY:

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Rock, aye. Gilbert, aye. Egan, aye. Newhouse, aye. Request
2. for a call of the absentees. The absentees will be called.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Arrington, Bidwill, Carpentier, Carroll, Chew, Coulson, Course,
5. Donnewald, Fawell, Hall, Horsley, Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel,
6. Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow, Laughlin, Lyons, McCarthy, Merritt,
7. Mitchler, Mohr, Ozinga, Romano, Rosander, Savickas, Smith,
8. Soper, Sours, Swinarski.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

10. Coulson, aye. Senator Nihill wishes to be recorded no. Senator
11. Donnewald votes aye.

12. SECRETARY:

13. That's 26 now. Wouldn't have passed it anyhow. 26 and 1. 26
14. and 1.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. Senator Groen.

17. SENATOR GROEN:

18. Well, Mr. President, I haven't voted and before the roll call's
19. announced, Senator Berning, we discussed this bill before and frankly
20. I confess to not recalling what you said this bill did. It was a
21. substitute, as I recall, for something that was declared unconstitu-
22. tional or something. What was it? Would you mind telling me?

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

24. Senator...Senator Berning indicates he will answer the question.

25. SENATOR BERNING:

26. Yes, Senator, we passed in the last session legislation providing
27. for a privilege tax on mobile homes. This was restricted to other than
28. home rule units by virtue of the home rule amendment. That meant in
29. practice then that mobile homes within a home rule unit would be sub-
30. jected to a personal property tax in spite of their decision to impose
31. a privilege tax where as in the other than home rule units as stated in
32. the legislation the privilege tax was to be in lieu of all other taxes.
33. Hence, we then had developed a situation where a mobile home on one

1. side of a county line would be subjected to a privilege tax on
2. the other side it would be subjected to a personal property tax.
3. This is unequal treatment and therefore, in response to an
4. inquiry from one of the State's Attorneys, the Attorney General
5. ruled that this is unequal treatment and is unconstitutional.
6. Therefore, Senate Bill 306 ... or House Bill 3060 which merely
7. sought to reestablish the privilege tax by enacting it into the
8. proper section was amended to strike the entire tax in order to
9. conform with the Attorney General's opinion that it is unconsti-
10. tutional and unenforcible.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

12. Senator Groen.

13. SENATOR GROEN:

14. Now, according to the syllabus it would apply to ... it would
15. apply to non-home rule counties, is that correct? Well now that
16. would include all of the counties but Cook.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

18. Senator Berning.

19. SENATOR BERNING:

20. Yes, Senator, that was what it did, but the amendment merely
21. struck the entire tax section, so there is no ... with the passage
22. of this there is no privilege tax in a non-home rule unit. It
23. therefore would revert to a personal property tax only.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER:

25. Senator Groen.

26. SENATOR GROEN:

27. Well this is what I'm getting at, at the present time my
28. county under the rules and regulation of the Department of
29. Revenue as they have promulgated those rules as to what con-
30. stitutes a permanent residence when the wheels are off and you've
31. got to have a foundation under it and all. I have been in
32. controversy with them about this. But those that are not
33. permanent homes and not taxed as real estate in my county are

1. taxed as personal property. Now what will this bill do to that
2. procedure if anything?

3. SENATOR BERNING:

4. This will validate that personal property tax procedure
5. because it eliminates this privilege tax.

6. SENATOR GROEN:

7. Well, Mr. President, I don't know how many votes he's short,
8. but in view of the explanation given, I would hope that this bill
9. could pass. Any member ... anyone of you who has been a member of
10. the Schools Problems Commission particularly knows of the problems
11. that exist in areas that have mobile home parks and units, where
12. you have hundreds and hundreds of children, but very little tax
13. base contributed by them. This would assist and alleviate those
14. school districts that are facing financial problems and crises

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1. and chaos in some situations where these people are sending their
2. children to the schools, but are not paying their fair share of
3. the cost. It seems to me that this is...it is a good bill and
4. deserves our support. I think you will be praised back home for
5. having supported this legislation and I vote aye.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

7. Senator Groen...for what purpose does Senator Dougherty
8. rise?

9. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

10. I intended to get up and explain as Chairman of the Local
11. Government committee that what Senator Berning has said is essen-
12. tially right. The Attorney General offered an opinion and I
13. believe you are aware of it Mr. President that the tax is un-
14. constitutional because it did not apply to home rule counties;
15. therefore, we are now repealing the privilege tax in the other
16. 101 counties and restoring the personal property tax for whatever
17. it may be worth in view of these various court decisions. In
18. other words, it puts those counties back in a position to realize
19. any income if possible under personal property tax.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

21. For what purpose does Senator Gilbert rise?

22. SENATOR GILBERT:

23. I know that a number of people have some question about this
24. and have changed their position in light of what Senator Dougherty
25. said and the questions that Senator Groen has asked and brought
26. out a little more clearly what this bill does and certainly coming
27. from a county where we have many mobile homes and a county like
28. Senator Vadalabene comes from and Senator Hall and all where the
29. schools are really going to be hurt if this is not done. Senator
30. Johns comes from a district that has a lot of mobile homes in it,
31. particularly in his own home county. I certainly hope that many
32. of you who have changed your position will reconsider and vote for
33. this bill because I think it's real important to all of us. If

1. the personal property tax is eliminated completely then we haven't
2. lost anything by supporting this bill. If it is not, then we
3. have gained a great deal.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

5. Senator Partee.

6. SENATOR PARTEE:

7. While he's tabulating the votes, I have a parliamentary
8. inquiry Mr. President. Mr. President, did you know that the
9. Yale upper grade Center students were in the gallery and that
10. they want to stand up and be recognized?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

12. Senator Partee, I did not know that. Donnewald aye, Hynes
13. aye, O'Brien aye, Lyons aye, Nihill aye, Merritt aye, Merritt
14. aye, Johns aye. How many more do we need. On that question
15. the yeas are 32, the nays are none. This bill having received
16. the constitutional majority is declared passed. Mr. President
17. Pro Tempore. Senator Lyons, do you want to handle the senate
18. bill? Senator Lyons. Senator Lyons is recognized for the
19. purpose of handling a senate bill.

20. SENATOR LYONS:

21. This is Senate Bill 1559, Mr. President. Senate bills
22. on third reading and it creates the Data Information Systems
23. Commission which is a commission which would keep track of
24. developments in the electronic data processing industry field.
25. I ask for a favorable vote of the membership.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

27. Is there any discussion? Senator Lyons is handling this
28. bill for Senators Rock and Mohr for the presiding officer while
29. he is presiding. Senate bills on third reading, Senate bill 1559.
30. It's at the bottom of the page, numerically out of order. Yes.
31. I might point out to the membership that this is a commission
32. that Senator Mohr and myself serve on. I am cochairman of it
33. with John Gentile from the Department of Finance and it concerns

1. itself with the data processing equipment and programs of the
2. whole State of Illinois, of the whole governmental unit. This
3. amount of money was appropriated to the commission when it was
4. created back when Senator Lanigan was here. This is the former
5. Lanigan Commission. The money this year was not spent. So,
6. rather than reappropriate, we decided to lapse \$12,500 and put
7. in a new appropriation. Senator Ozinga.

8. SENATOR OZINGA:

9. This is just the appropriation for the commission not the
10. appropriation for the data processing...

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

12. Oh, no question about...this is just for the commission.
13. Now the commission consists of representatives of each of the
14. offices of Superintendent of Public Instruction, Secretary of
15. State, the University Systems and of course, John Gentile and
16. myself and Representative Waddell.

17. SENATOR OZINGA:

18. And also the Legislative Reference Bureau and the Legislative
19. Council, are they in on this same...

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

21. Yes.

22. SENATOR OZINGA:

23. This is the same one then. That's it then.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

25. Is there any further discussion? The Secretary will call the
26. roll.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier,
29. Carroll, Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson,
30. Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall,
31. Harris, Horsley...

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

33. Cherry aye. Will you ring the bell Mr. Sergeant-at-arms.

1. SECRETARY:

2. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow,
3. Laughlin, Lyons, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Mohr,
4. Neistein, Newhouse, Nihill, O'Brien, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee,

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. Vadalabene aye. Call the absentees.

9. SECRETARY:

11. Course, Davidson, Fawell, Horsley, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
12. Laughlin, McCarthy, Mohr, Partee, Romano, Rosander, Savickas,

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

15. Horsley aye, Gilbert aye, Partee aye. On that question
16. the yeas are 32, the nays are none. The bill having received
17. the constitutional majority is declared passed. Resolutions.
18. Resolutions. Senator Latherow, for what purpose do you arise?

19. SENATOR LATHEROW:

20. Mr. President, I have an amendment on the Secretary's desk
21. to House bill 1318. I wonder if we could take that up at this
22. time.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

24. Certainly, House bill 1318. It's house bills on third read-
25. ing.

26. SENATOR LATHEROW:

27. This as I move it back to second and there are two amend-
28. ments on that and I'd like to table both amendments.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

30. Senator Latherow has asked leave to move House bill 1318 back
31. to second reading for the purpose of offering another amendment.
32. Any objection? House bill 1318, second reading. The first two
33. amendments, I think the proper motion is you make a motion to

1. reconsider the vote by which those amendments were adopted. All
2. in favor of that will say aye. All opposed.

3. SENATOR LATHEROW:

4. I have an amendment...

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

6. Move to table those amendments.

7. SENATOR LATHEROW:

8. I move to table those amendments.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

10. Amendments one and two. Senator Latherow has moved to table

13. SENATOR LATHEROW:

14. Sir, I have the amendments on the Secretary's desk to in-
15. troduce and I'll put this amendment on if it's all right with
16. you and move it back to third and I'll hold that until the first
17. of the week and I'll have a complete explanation of the bill in
18. this shape on all of your desks the first of the week.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

20. Senator Latherow moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 3
21. to House bill 1318. Senator Dougherty.

22. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

23. Senator Latherow, did you know that the children from the
24. J. M. Clark School, 8914 Buffalo Avenue, were in the gallery?
25. There they are right back here. Thank you.

12. All in favor of the adjournment resolution, indicate by
13. saying aye. Anybody opposed. The resolution is adopted. Senator
14. Neistein, do you have any announcements to make. Senator Neistein.

15. SENATOR NEISTEIN:

16. We're about to adjourn so be patient. The House passed that
17. welfare bill and we're just waiting for the message from the

19. PRESIDING OFFICER:

20. I'm glad you keep us informed, Senator. For what purpose does

30. Senator Dougherty.

31. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

32. Senator Graham, if you wish some enlightenment along that line,

3. I think that you'll find that Senate Bill 1556 is still

5. SENATOR HALL:

6. All right.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. Introduction of bills.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Bill 1583, introduced by Senator Sours, a bill
11. for an "Act making an appropriation to the Department of Revenue."
12. Senate Bill No. 1584, introduced by Senators Hynes, Partee,

9. the C.T.A. or something, I don't know. No please don't take
10. me seriously.

11. SENATOR CLARKE:

12. How far ahead did you want to move them?

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

14. Senator Dougherty.

15. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

16. Looks like if you object to my moving that to the order
17. of second reading without referral to committee ... do you
18. object?

19. SENATOR CLARKE:

20. Yes.

21. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

22. I imagine so.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

24. Senator Partee, I'm advised that the message we've been
25. waiting for has arrived. Message from the House.

26. SECRETARY:

27. Message from the House, Mr. Selcke, Clerk: Mr. President --

19. grateful and appreciative of the members of the Senate who
20. stayed so that we could finalize this today and I would ask the
21. members on this side to certainly vote aye.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

23. Is there any further discussion? The Secretary will call the
