33. ing of House and Senate bills concerning appropriations, revenue,

1. constitutional implementation and administration pro-
2. posals.

3. (2) that all House and Senate bills remaining in committee
4. at the close of business June the 2nd be tabled except for
5. appropriation bills, revenue bills, constitutional implementa-
6. tion bills and administration bills.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there any discussion? All those in favor of the adoption
9. of the Rules indicate by saying aye. Contrary minded. All those
10. in favor of the adoption of the rules, please stand. All those
11. opposed, please stand. The Rules changes are adopted. We have

17. We're going to move to vote first Senate Bills on 2nd read-

21. tion of the bill. He would like to advance it to 2nd reading,

9. Senator Davidson, all Representative Barry asked me to do,
10. is to handle them in Committee, because of the fact that he was

25. vised the committee would be placed on ...2nd reading...now what
26. the amendment does - On page two of the bill, where it specifies,
27. kind of specifies what type of picture will be required. There
28. was testimony in the committee that the way the bill is written it
29. will only appertain to one process. Now, I am advised that tech-
30. nically there are three or possibly four different processes
31. that could be utilized. What this amendment does is strike lines
32. 5 through 19 and puts in a new paragraph giving the Secretary of
33. State the descretion to pick one or another of the processes de-

1. pending upon the lowest bid. It does not lock in wet process
2. versus dry process. In addition to that the amendment also says
3. that the provisions of this amendatory act may not be implemented
4. by the Secretary of State unless or until funds therefore have
5. been appropriated by the General Assembly. Now, next week, when
6. Senator Carpentier returns we're going to offer an amendment to
7. add some 3 and one-half million dollars. The Secretary has in-
8. dicated that this is what the cost would be. This is an unbudget-
9. ed item and we are making by this amendment making this bill contin-
10. gent upon receipt of that money. If in the wisdom of the General
11. Assembly they want to appropriate that much money for this program.
12. That's fine. But if the money is not appropriated then obviously
13. the program would fall. I move the adoption of this amendment.

12. I just want to say I think that this is a bad principle for

14. governments...theoretically, the local units of government got
15. their reimbursement when the coal was in the grounds. It was
16. valuable ground..they...I suspect assessed it as valuable ground.
17. Now, to ask the State to come in and to put...to grant funds...
18. tax funds to local government, while they are improving the land
19. I think is far beyond the expectations of what this...this State
20. ought to do and I would encourage a no vote.

25. Of course, this bill would be opposed by local units of
26. taxing ...local taxing units...if they were to lose during the
27. period of this reclamation the revenue so badly needed by units
28. of local government. At the present time we are doing much
29. revenue sharing, hopefully, these periods of time would not last
30. very long. I..the argument of Senator Knuepfer, with respect
31. to the value of the coal and the land, I completely miss, because
32. these lands most of them were stripped back in 1930 and 40 and
33. taxes and valuation on the land then were very low. There's no intent

1. here that units of local government should be paid...more than
2. the presently collected amounts of revenue and that is most
3. counties have an arrangement with the coal companies ...that the
4. coal companies are paying the same taxes, they were paying be-

15. Arrington, Baltz, Berning, Bidwill, Bruce, Carpentier, Carroll,
16. Cherry, Chew, Clarke, Collins, Coulson, Course, Davidson, Donne-
17. wald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Gilbert, Graham, Groen, Hall,
18. Harris, Horsley, Hynes...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Horsley.

21. SENATOR HORSLEY:

22. I got delayed because I had to have some X-ray's taken of my
23. knees..but...not because I was crawling, Senator Knuppel, that
24. isn't why I had the X-ray's taken....I fell over wheelbarrow at home.
25. Now...I want to inquire about this bill. I want to be real serious
26. for a moment. This is the bill that would save the State of Illinois
27. would go in and buy this coal land and would then put the dirt back
28. in, get it ready , reclaim it and then sell it. Now, what is the
29. difference between your bill and the one Representative Nowlan had
30. other than your's is \$5,000,000 and his is \$1,000,000, I think.
31. Is that true?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

2. Well, there's basically, I think, 5 or 6 differences
3. between his bill and my bill. Number one. Is the provision
4. that units of local government will be reimbursed for the loss
5. of any revenue during this period. Secondly, ...the difference
6. in the amount of the appropriation. Thirdly, the State agency
7. that will administer this. In my case it's the Department of
8. Conservation, which owns land, buys land and sells lands...where
9. ...in his bill it was the department...it was the Bureau of...
10. Mines and Minerals which is not usually the owner, purchaser,
11. seller of land, but only now under the new 1626 the one that
12. has charge of the technical reclamation provisions. There are
13. a couple of other minor differences, but those are the primary
14. differences. I think there is a total of 5 differences in the bill.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (Senator Rock)

16. Senator Horsley.

17. SENATOR HORSLEY:

18. Will you answer one question, please? If this bill would
19. get out of here and get over in the House. Would you accept an
20. amendment that all of the mine workings and that portion of the
21. mine would have to be approved and cleared by the Department of
22. Mines and Minerals and given to Conservation before they proceed?

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (Senator Rock)

24. Senator Knuppel.

25. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

26. I don't know if I correctly understand the question. But
27. ...at the present time, in 1961, we enacted our first reclama-
28. tion law. The bill which passed out of the Senate here applies
29. only to those lands which were devastated prior to 1961. This is
30. only the appropriation bill which had been made necessary by the
31. objection which you raised. Now, I have....let me fully answer
32. the question...if I may...I think I can answer the question...
33. let me go ahead....

1. PRESIDING OFFICER, (Senator Rock)

2. Senator Knuppel has the Floor.

3. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

4. I think I can answer the question, if you'll let me con-
5. tinue. I have indicated to the United Mine Workers, because
6. they have in some way objected to the Department of Conserva-
7. tion in handling this matter, that I would accept an amendment
8. that said that the technical advise and supervision of recla-
9. mation would be under the Department of Mines and Minerals,
10. which has the technical staff to do the job. But the ownership,
11. the purchase, where they have the appraiser, etc., see...there's
12. about three different departments actually that have to play
13. some roll in this. But the Department of Conservation would own
14. the land, purchase it, own it and sell it. But they will rely up-
15. on the Department of Mines and Minerals for technical advise in the
16. reclamation and the supervision of the reclamation.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (Senator Rock)

18. Senator Horsley, your time has expired...you may....

19. SENATOR HORSLEY:

20. ...question...I hadn't had time to explain my vote. I would
21. just like to have 30 seconds...cause...I'm going to vote for this
22. bill. Senator Knuppel, there are a lot of people and I'm afraid
23. there may be people on this Floor, who will say, well, the coal
24. operators ought to be the one's to do this. But they forget
25. that most of this coal was mined by lease agreement and that
26. this property was owned by people and we cannot abrogate those
27. agreements. In other words we cannot now go back and say to the
28. coal company you've got to amend your lease agreement and go back
29. and do what you did. So we have no power to do that. We can in
30. the future say to the coal companies, yes, you must make provision
31. to reclaim the land as you go, I think you've got a good principle
32. I think Senator...Representative Nowlan's bill...the amount is
33. unimportant, we'll resolve that later. But the principle....

1. is something has to be done. Because there is no way we can
2. abrogate contracts, which have now expired and which allowed
3. this thing to happen and I, therefore, vote aye.

5. Hynes, Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Kusibab, Latherow,

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (Senator Rock)

8. Senator Mitchler.

9. SENATOR MITCHLER:

10. As I understand, there's a House bill...there's a Senate bill,
11. in relation to acquisition of strip mine land to put this back...
12. into ...conservation or other good use. We have all of this land
13. that has been excavated throughtout the State that is now just lay-
14. there. It's acid run off has run into a lot of problems. I
15. think both of these bills have good intent. One's a House bill,
16. one's a Senate bill...It's obvious that if this Senate bill would
17. pass, go to the House it would receive some amendments, because they
18. have considered the House bill and the same way with the House
19. bill when it got over here. As we heard these bills in committee
20. I think...sort of an understanding that they be voted out they
21. tried to put in the proper order but...if they criss cross...
22. they'd probably go into some kind of a conference committee and
23. come out. So I think, both bills should be given some credit.
24. I just want to say in casting my vote on this that I notice SB
25. 1576 has a appropriation of 5 million dollars to the Department
26. of Conservation for the purpose of strip mine acquisition. I
27. sort of think that the Department of Conservation might had
28. similar legislation in an appropriation, maybe, of 5 million doll-
29. ars, so that they could look toward purchasing shore line along the
30. areas that the Department of Conservation is so interested in, in
31. developing scenic river areas. Then, they would be purchasing this
32. land, so that it could be protected before it goes bad, as did the
33. strip mine lands and then we would have some scenic areas along the

1. shorelines of our rivers. This would be perfectly legal, be-
2. cause it would be purchasing land from private owners and not
3. a zoning type of bill, as I interpreted the Scenic River bill
4. to be. That, is how we are making the Fox River, for example,
5. a scenic river area in Kane, in Kendall County, by the Fox
6. River Valley Pleasure Driveway and park district and other lo-
7. cal park districts, purchasing shoreline land and then turning
8. it over to public property. And I might point out that the park
9. district in that area, when it started in 1947 had 66 feet of
10. public property. Now they have 18 miles of public property a-
11. long the Fox River shoreline and it made a true scenic river
12. area. So I'm going to give this an aye vote and hope that we
13. can acquire other lands through appropriations to the depart-
14. ment of conservation. Aye.

24. SENATOR BRUCE:

25. This is the annual appropriation to the Judicial Advisory
26. Commission...Judicial Advisory Council. \$12,500, is the same
27. amount we had last year...I know of no controversy about it...
28. Judicial Advisory Council, is that Body that regulates the court
29. system in the State of Illinois.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is there....is there any discussion? Secretary will call the
32. roll.

1. miscarriages and a very high percentage of deformed babies.
2. A state program which requires immunization against Rubella
3. will come to haunt us in the future, if there's ever any at-
4. tempt at abortion law reform. Because the favorite method
5. of evading the present abortion laws, is for a women to con-
6. tract Rubella, in the 4th, 5th, 6th, or 2nd week of pregnancy
7. and then to use that as a medical basis for abortion. So I
8. take this to be...a long range device, which abortion laws

29. Well, then we would have to send it to Executive Committee,
30. unless you want...

31. SENATOR HALL:

32. I want to...move that...see if I could get unanimous consent
33. to by-pass committee until it gets...

PRESIDENT:

What is the general nature of the Resolution?

SENATOR HALL:

It's to create a committee to investigate the By-State Development Agency, in my area.

PRESIDENT:

I think we better send it to Executive Committee, Senator?

SECRETARY:

PRESIDENT:

Death Resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye.
