However, without this additional aid that is being sought, 12. Chicago will fall so far behind in its program of services. 13. that the harm done by our neglect will be irreparable. Let 14. me tell you why. You know, as I do, that the federal govern-15. ment who is constantly changing the guidelines and mandates 16. and demands are threatening the support for the T.E.S.L., or 17. Teaching English as a Second Language Program for Chicago. 18. The federal programs have the disadvantage that they are 19. restricted to children from low income families. The State 20. and local programs must supplement the federal programs so 21. that all children or students from Spanish speaking families 22. have the advantage of the bilingual educational program. 23. Approximately 3 million dollars of the E.S.E.A. Title I money 24. from the federal government now being provided for direct 25. services to these children will probably be withdrawn and the 26. money diverted elsewhere. Well, Mr. President and members, I can appreciate Senator Partee's position, but I must echo some of the statements made by Senator Clarke. Now, we can talk about "cat and dog" bills. We can talk about these bills that are going to come over from the House. We can say we're not going to consider those bills that we don't deem of sufficient importance at this late time, but you know and I know, Mr. President, what's going to happen. Your House member, gentlemen, is going to come over here and he's going to tell you how important that particular bill is to him and indirectly perhaps to you back in your district and you're going to have those pressures put upon you, and leadership on both sides will undoubtedly under that pressure yield to it and we'll be here considering those bills whether we like it or whether we don't. Now, I'd just like to give one word of cautionary admonition regarding Conference Committee Reports. Year after year, Session after Session, we have Conference Committee Reports that are prepared largely by Staff where the members of the Committee actually never meet, a Committee Report is put on your desk, and you're asked to sign and you say, "When did the Committee meet?" and they say, "Staff drew this Conference Committee Report. It's agreed to;" and at that late hour, what do you do? If we conducted this business in the manner in which we should, a Conference Committee Report which frequently completely changes the thrust of a piece of legislation, should, when it is reported in here,

be referred back to the Committee that considered that bill in the original instance in this Body and That Committee should review that Conference Committee Report and make a recommendation to this Body as to what it does, whether we should or should not pass the legislation. If we did it properly, that's how we'd do it, but we don't. Now, I am unalterably opposed to staying here, holding night sessions, having tempers get short, pass bills because we want to go to bed, because we want to come back the next morning and wind it up, because we don't want to come back and have bad legislation become the law of this State or at least be submitted to the Governor with the chance that it might be passed and it might become the law. Our responsibility is to orderly, intelligently review the legislation that is placed ____ before us and as I would repeat Senator Clarke's statement, if you look at that House Calendar and the number of bills coming over here, look at our own Calendar this morning, we got a number of bills off that Calendar and it's as large or larger than it was when we came here yesterday morning. It's going to be the same way tomorrow morning and it's going to be the same way Saturday morning if we're here. How are we going to do this job? Are we going to give it . . . these bills the attention? Are we going to give them the study? Are we going to know what we're doing in the final hours of this Session or are we going to let history repeat itself at the expense of the people of this State? I would ask the President pro tem to carefully consider this: the wisdom of a logjam finish or the sensibility and the logic of doing our work today and doing it carefully, adjourning, coming back on Monday and then take the time that is necessary to address ourselves to the problems of this State and do it intelligently. Most of the important legislation is still before us. Let's not just jam it into a few minutes'or a few hours late at night. Let's do it when our tempers, when our feelings are correct, when we can debate these issues and

Now, to give a brief l. description of the program, it is a program that will be, no 2. matter what decision this legislative body makes relative to З. budgeting and where we should insert that, either in the De-4. partment of Public Aid or in the Department of Public Health, 5. it will be a program that is funded by the federal government 6. fifty-fifty through the Department of Public Aid. Director 7. Yoder was here, discussed that with the Appropriations Committee 8. and he agreed with us that that is a Public Aid funded program 9. fifty-fifty, no matter where we put it, either Public Aid or 10. Public Health. I believe there's absolutely no division on 11. that particular question. The question is which department 12. should administer the program. It has been the Task Force 13. decision to remove that from the Department of Public Health 14. and put it in the Department of Public Aid since they are the 15. agency that determines eligibility of recipients, since they 16. are the agency that determines payment, since they are the 17. agency that will authorize the vouchers, since they are the 18. department that will convey those vouchers to the Auditor and 19. approve those for payment. They are also the agency that will 20. receive the money from the federal government again irregardless 21. where we place it in the budget. And for that reason, it has 22. been a Task Force decision that the program remain in Public 23. Aid. And I say remain so that all the membership is fully aware 24. this is an on-going program in the Department of Public Aid. 25. It's our decision it should remain there. 26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR VADALABENE)

> SENATOR HORSLEY: In replying to that, this amendment should be considered as a two-way amendment. The first part of this amendment proposes to cut \$63,000 out of the budget for the Bureau of Environmental Health and cutting out some travel money and it overlooks

the fact that this Department has two milk sanitarians that are necessary and they were added into the budget because they have to regulate 175 manufactured milk processing plants and they regulate and inspect more than 6,000 dairy farms. They also inspect and regulate 30,000 retail food establishments in the State of Illinois and they had requested in the present year three additional inspectors for this purpose because they're greatly needed. This was allowed by the Governor and the Bureau of the Budget and was placed in the budget. In addition to that, we passed legislation here authorizing the department to control electrical, thermal and mechanical hazard on toys and that bill is on the Governor's desk awaiting his signature and that has to be implemented, it has to be handled by the Department of Public Health. Now, by taking \$28,000 of travel out of their money, they cannot handle that program, they cannot handle the other programs and they're mandated into another new program. That has to do with the recreational area licensing law and the youth camp licensing law. Now, there's no additional money put on them for this and yet we're mandating them to handle these programs and yet you want to cut \$63,000 out of their budget. Dr. Yoder has testified he needs this money. He has to have this help if he is going to administer the health programs of the State of Illinois. Now, I hope you will listen to me on this next item because a part of this amendment involves \$6,900,000 in what is called the new Medichek program.

Would you please be a little quiet. Senator Horsley, you may continue.

This is a new federal program that is funded federally with one-half of this money coming from the federal government and the other one-half being furnished by the State of Illinois and is a medical preventative program to handle children from the age

through the preschool age in order to catch disease and crippling disease in man at an early age. Now the only thing . 2. involved according to Senator Bruce here would be merely who 3. is going to administer this money. He gave you the impression 4. that Dr. Yoder had admitted that this was a Public Aid function 5. because under the Federal law the money is funneled through the 6. Department of Public Aid, but that is merely a bookkeeping 7. procedure only and if you have examined on your desk this 8. morning you find a letter there from Director Weaver, Director 9. of the Department of Public Aid, asking that this program be 10. placed in the Department of Public Health as he believes that 11. it belongs there and is not properly a part of the Public Aid 12. program because in the Department of Public Health they have 13. the records of each and every child and they can keep a complete 14. health record of that individual. They also have staff doctors, 15. nurses, dentists who handle local health programs and they can 16. coordinate this program and carry it on more effectively. 17. addition to that, you have on your desk today a communication 18. from the Illinois State Medical Society asking that this program 19. be placed under the Department of Public Health. You also 20. should have just in the last few moments have received a copy 21. of a telegram that was sent to all of the leadership from Dr. 22. Greek of the Illinois State Dental Society stating that this 23. program should be left in the Department of Public Health 24. representing all of the dentists of the State of Illinois. 25. Now, in addition to that, this morning the Public Aid budget 26. which passed out of this House and which had an appropriation 27. in it for this was amended in the House, Senator Bruce, to take 28. this \$6,900,000 out of the Public Aid appropriation bill. 29. was only done this morning in line with the wishes of the adminis-30. tration and the Departments involved, Public Health and Public 31. Aid, to put this program where it belongs so that if you strike 32. it out of this bill, there will be no bill before this Body or

the House to handle this program. Now, if we leave it in this bill and we leave it in Public Aid, it was my argument originally that the Governor could then veto one or the other in line with Federal recommendations and what the Medical Society and the Professional people believe should happen; but now by having amended the Public Aid budget to take it out of that bill which was done in Committee this morning, I just had an aide go and check a few moments ago, and that has been done by the House, we definitely need to leave it in this bill or otherwise you're not going to have the Medichek program in effect in the State of Illinois and receive this Federal money for the prevention of disease and crippling disease on the part of the children.

SENATOR HYNES:

Mr. President and members of the Senate, I rise in support of this amendment as a member of the Task Force that heard the Appropriation bills for both Public Aid and Public Health. I concurred in the judgment which was unanimous of the members that this function...the Medicheck function particularly, be transferred or rather that it remain with Public Aid because one fact that has not come out as yet in this discussion is that the Medicheck program has been in operation since February and since that time it has been operated by the Department of Public Aid. Furthermore, as the Director of the Department of Public Aid, Mr. Weaver, admits in his letter the Department does have some responsibility in this area which is an extension of the Medicaid program, and I would ask simply this, "If Medicaid can be administered by the Department of Public Aid, why cannot this Medichek program which is admittedly an extension of it also be administered there?" It

was our conclusion and finding that there would be a significant 1. savings in administrative costs if this program were to remain 2. with the Department of Public Aid. The Department of Public 3. Aid is presently set up to process medical claims and this will 4. simply add additional work to that already existing Department. 5. It will not require the establishment of an entirely new section 6. as it would if the transfer to Public Aid were to take place. 7. So, we're not really not transferring; we are preventing a 8. transfer. We're trying to keep it where it has been since 9. its inception. Furthermore, I might point out that initially 10. when this cut was proposed, the principal objection that was 11. raised to it was simply that it would be difficult to get 12. medical personnel to work with the Department of Public Aid 13. that the professionals involved would prefer to be with Public 14. Health. Well, I say that is no reason at all, and in fact, 15. persons dedicated to healing and to the healing arts should 16. not really be concerned in my judgment with the title that 17. they bear. I think that the program will work effectively; 18. the amount of money involved in the program is going to be 19. the same minus the administration costs. I think that this is 20: a good amendment, and I think it should be adopted. 21.

SENATOR BERNING:

Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, House Bill 1440 was introduced to implement the new Constitution. There then developed some dispute over whether or not the Constitution was self-implementing and the bill was allowed to be Tabled. it developed that McHenry County in attempting to proceed under the provisions of the new Constitution was advised by Chapman and Cutler that House Bill 1440 was necessary and their interpretation I must admit is a selfish one. They want the law definitive before they will validate the bonds which will be issued for these special assessment improvements. And let me point out that McHenry County and to a certain degree Lake County has a unique situation in that over the years some years back summer residences were developed in areas around the chain of lakes and no substantial road construction was a part of the development. Consequently these substandard roads are inadequate for today's travel and they are completely impassable at times during the winter. These people recognize that the roads not having been built properly and never having been assumed for maintenance by the township or the county, are their own responsibility and they are ready and willing to undertake the cost of improving these roads but the only way that it can be done is by a special assessment. And I might add that the new Constitution incorporated this very self same provision for special assessments much because of the situation that exists in McHenry County and other counties and was recognized as a serious situation by the Constitutional Convention delegates. Now, House Bill 1440 creates a complete and comprehensive new act permitting and I should say it is permissive, permitting counties to undertake local improvements financed by special assessments. And currently the county law does not have the statutory authority for such comprehensive local improvements. The bill is applicable state-wide in all counties except Cook. Cook County has been amended out

- through the Home Rule Amendment, And it covers all areas outside 1. of municipality, defines the improvements as the improving, widening, 2.
- or extending of streets, highways, roads and so on. The bill 3. creates a committee of local improvements in each county, consisting 4.
- of the Chairman or President of the County Board, the County Super-5.
- intendent of Highways and three members of the Board appointed
- by the Chairman. The committee can originate a local improvement 7.

- ments are paid for by special assessments. Mr. President, I 9.

SENATOR KNUEPFER:

Yea, Senator Dougherty, I sometimes think Chapman and Cutler is wrong too and I told you yesterday in the bill that I had that I thought they were wrong but unfortunately right or wrong they're the ones that can authorize the issuance of bonds. I want to point out something else however on this. The old Constitution of 1870.

33. permitted municipalities and sanitary districts to provide use of

special assessment procedures. Now, in spite of that general pro-1. vision, the Legislature felt it was necessary and desirable to 2. provide guidelines for those special assessment procedures. We 3. didn't say just rely on the Constitutional provisions, we've got 4. some very substantial chapters in our statute books providing for 5. the mechanism for special assessments for those two governments. 6. Now, the new Constitution added another government that was entitled 7. to use special assessment procedures and that was the county. 8. seems to me that if we felt that it was reasonable and proper for 9. the Legislature to spell out the guidelines under the old Con-10. stitution and nobody quarreled with those guidelines for muni-11. cipalities and sanitary districts, that is equally as reasonable 12. and proper, and this is all that House Bill 14...or Senate Bill 13. 1440 does...House Bill 1440, is to try and set down some guide-14. lines. If what you're suggesting is true, I think then the special 15. assessment statutes in our books for municipalities probably ought 16. to be abolished and we have no need for those. I don't think that's 17. I think there's a number of court decisions based upon those 18. statutes and I think this is in this case I do concur in general 19. with Chapman and Cutler and I think it's a legislative obligation 20. to provide the guidelines for what obviously is a county power 21. delegated by the Constitution. The Constitution as well, Senator 22. Dougherty, provided for the election of a county executive and yet 23. this Body last year felt that it was necessary to provide legislative 24. guidelines on the basis of the philosophy you are suggesting. 25. could have simply said the Constitution mandates or provides for 26. it, therefore let's let anybody do it that wants. We didn't feel 27. that was desirable. We felt that it was necessary to put guidelines 28. down and we passed a bill. I think this is in exactly the same kind 29. of a situation. In answer to Senator Knuepfer's, I told...as I said before
I have no attempt to guide anyone else's thinking in this. But I
do believe that the Constitution was voted upon less than two
years ago which provided for this type of legislation to be done
without any interference from anyone else. What we're doing, we're
setting up...we have the legislative, we have the executive, we
have the judicial, and now we have another chapter of government,
Chapman and Cutler, that's what's happening. I think we could
solve this problem if you just hold off. I have no desire to
speak any further on the bill. I did try to help Senator Berning
in every way, shape, form or manner but it's my still...my own
opinion, that this bill should be given a little further consideration
and study and be held over until November. It's only a few months.
That's the way I feel about it.

SENATOR PARTEE:

I think I should say particularly to Senator Berning because
I know how much this bill means to him that I realize that my
position on this bill and on the amendments that have been proffered
has been something that might be described as wishy-washy. I have
not been able to take a firm opinion on this because those experts
on whom I depend on some areas of this sort have themselves been
something less than positive. One day they would say one thing to
me and another day their opinions had has changed and they would say
something different. So my lack of steadfastness in this instance
has been reflective of the kind of advice I have gotten in this
area. It has caused me to conclude that there are a lot of unanswerable questions about assessment practices throughout the State which
assessment practices would be in conformity with the mandates and
dictates of the new Constitution. This is not the only area where

- I have had trouble in this particular vein. The House Bills 1. 3620, which was brought here by Representative Berman, and 2. another bill which was brought by Representative Randolph, з. sought to make some different kind of assessment practices, 4. one addressing itself to condominiums, another to 5. co-operatives. This too was the kind of over-all, basic 6. assessment difficulty problem that is engendered in this 7. situation. I personally feel the better way to approach 8. all of these assessment practices is to not do it in any 9. piecemeal fashion. I think we really need a committee or 10. commission. Or a division of one of our existing committees, 11. preferably Revenue, to look into this matter in depth, and 12. then come back and bring us what appears to be the answer. 13. to all of the . . . not only this but peripheral problems 14. that will arise in this area. Now, if you call your bill, 15. I'm going to say to you this -- I am . . . I am going to 16. personally vote for it, just because I feel a personal 17. obligation having delayed you this long. I'm suggesting 18. however, that my judgment tells me, that we do need a lot 19. more study in this particular area. I am sure knowing 20. you as a conscientious person, has no desire to pass a 21. bill which would not be in the overall best interests of 22. the electorate. I can understand, of course, that you 23. have been frustrated by the delays that have been occasioned 24. by the things I've already alluded to. They're ready to assume the 15. obligation and what stands in their way? The willingness 16. of Chapman and Cutler to underwrite revenue bonds. 17. there, lady and gentlemen, hangs the tale. We are stopped. 18. Now I would have no objection to delaying this if, this 19. were not a critical matter and had not already been a 20. critical matter for several months and years in McHenry 21. County. I would plead with you, let us pass this measure 22. so that McHenry County can proceed. This is the construction 23. period. Five months delay is not long, but it does mean 24. that the construction period is over and McHenry County 25. would perforce, be unable to start work for a year. That 26. is a drastic hardship in my humble opinion that is not 27. necessary to impose on the residents of these communities. 28. If then, we pass this bill now, McHenry County can proceed. 29. In the meantime, we can seriously analyze it and if we 30. find that there are corrections necessary by the first of 31. the year in the next Session, I will be the first one to 32.

attempt to pass such corrective measures. And in requesting

- your vote on behalf of McHenry County, let me point out 1. that very likely no other county would, in the meantime, 2. take any positive action because I doubt that there is any 3. other county ready to proceed now, as McHenry County is. 4. Therefore, this is critical in my humble opinion, for this 5. one area only and I submit this has the support of the б. people in the area. They are anxious to do this work at 7. their own expense.
