Given under my hand and Great Seal of State, this 26th day 12. of November, A. D., 1972. John W. Lewis, Secretary of State. 13. WHEREAS, the United States Congress has now approved federal 14. revenue sharing by completing final action on the State and 15. Local Fiscal Assistance Act; in its first full year of opera-16. tion, federal revenue sharing will provide almost \$300 million 17. annually for the State of Illinois and its counties, town-18. ships, cities and villages; in addition, as an extra sum this year, 19. fiscal year 1973, the State will receive retroactive, onetime pay-20. ments of approximately \$45 million and counties, townships, 21. cities and villages approximately \$90 million; the approval 22. of federal revenue sharing makes it necessary and possible: 23. --to assure real property tax relief and reductions; --to enable and 24. encourage local units of general government to rebate real property 25. taxes for this and future years; --to enable the State government 26. to participate substantially in the expense of local school con-27. struction; --to begin fundamental school finance reform; to under-

take a major readjustment of State and local fiscal burdens; and--

to act promptly, boldiy and wisely, at a critical stage, to estab-

lish and reorder governmental priorities; Therefore, I deem that an

extraordinary occasion exists for convening the Seventy-Seventh As-

sembly in a Special Session. And, NOW, THEREFORE: I, Richard B.

Ogilvie, Governor of the State of Illinois, by the power and au-1. thority vested in me by the Constitution of the State of Illinois, 2. do hereby call and convene a Special Session of the Seventy Seventh з. General Assembly of the State of Illinois, to commence on the twen-4. ty-sixth day of November, A. D., 1972, at 5:30 o'clock, P. M., Cen-5. tral Standard Time, for the following purposes: 1. To enact laws 6. and amend or repeal existing laws or parts thereof to provide 7. for a freeze on real property taxes at present levels; 2. To 8. enact laws and amend or repeal existing laws or parts thereof 9. to authorize real property tax rebates by city, townships and 10. county governments; 3. To enact laws and amend or repeal ex-11. isting laws or parts thereof to authorize state participation 12. in the costs and financing of local school construction; 4. 13. To enact laws and amend or repeal existing laws or parts there-14. of to authorize and encourage cooperation among units and 15. agencies of federal and state and local government in the utiliza-16. tion of federal revenue sharing funds.
