- Mr. President, members of the Senate, as President of the
 - 16. DeKalb Chamber of Commerce, along with my fellow members, who are
 - in the balcony in the red coats, it is my pleasure to pay tribute
 - 18. to Senator Dennis Collins for his forty-two years of loyal service
 - to the state of Illinois and in particular to the area of DeKalb 19.
 - in which he resides. Senator Collins graduated from DeKalb's 20.
 - Teachers College, now known as Northern Illinois University,

 - Assembly and served in the 57th, 58th, 60, 61st and 62nd General 24.
 - Assembly. In 1942, he was elected Senator and has served in that 25.
 - capacity, representing the 37th District, until the present. He 26.
 - was the first man in a hundred and twenty years to serve in both 27.
 - the House and the Senate, as Chairman of the Agricultural Committee. 28.
 - Among his numerous achievements, he was well known for his work . 29.
 - in the Tollway Authority. We, of DeKalb and the DeKalb Chamber of 30.
 - Commerce, along with Mr. Mullens, of the DeKalb Agricultural 31.
 - Association, are indeed pleased to present to Senator Dennis J. 32.

I think while we're out of the regular order of business 27. we have another recognition that's a very important one. I'm 28. not sure how we proceed on this now we have....Senator Clarke, 29. is recognized. 30.

SENATOR CLARKE: 31.

Mr. President, and members of the Senate, last year I sponsored 32. a bill to have a portrait painted of a former President pro tem 33.

of the Illinois State Senate, and many people come and go through ı. these legislative halls and it's all too seldom that we stop to 2. think of the caliber of the men and the history that they leave 3. behind. I had occasion as some of you others did in the House to 4. serve a number of years with a father and son team, Dr. Dale and his 5. good father. And that was a real experience that seldom happens. 6. this occasion, we have a retiring Senator whose father was a President 7. pro tem and I felt that it was important while Senator Laughlin was 8. here to recognize this fact. And this bill was passed and we 9. now have the moment for the presentation of this portrait. His 10. family is down here on the occasion that we mention prior among 11. other things and I think before we start I'd like to introduce 12. Mrs. Laughlin, whom we all know, and all the members of the family 13. sitting up in the gallery. You want to stand up? I'd just like to 14. tell you a little bit about Edward E. Laughlin. Because he was 15. born in Putman County, was educated in the public schools, in 16. Dixon College of Law in Dixon. And after his marriage he started 17. practicing law in Hannibal and then moved to Freeport, which is 18. a familiar town that we have heard associated with our own Everett 19. Laughlin. And he came to the Legislature after serving in local 20. government in 1914. That's a long time ago. And after serving a 21. couple of years in the House, he came to the Senate in 1936, and 22. was reelected in 1940, 44 and 48. He died at the end of his last 23. term in 1951. But in 1945, he was elected and served as President 24. pro tem of this Body until 1948, and this was a period that only 25. one of us personally remembers. I think that this is a moment 26. in which we should not only honor the few men that have been 27. President pro tem, but Senator Arthur Bidwill, who was a pro tem 28. himself for many years. He is the only one here, I believe, that 29. remembers this period and Edward E. Laughlin. I would like to 30. call upon Senator Bidwill for a few remarks. 31. PRESIDENT: 32.

SENATOR BIDWILL:

- Senator Clarke, it was a great poet that once wrote these 2. words: Break, break, at the foot of thy craigs, oh sea - would 3. that my tongue could utter the thoughts that arise in me. 4. knew Ed Laughlin (I hope that I don't get logged here) he was a 5. wonderful man. He was a God fearing man. He was a gentle and 6. kind man, and the gentle man in all the sense and significance 7. of the word. He was a man that I - getting politics - out of 8. here, I, I think I was one of Ed's managers when he ran for 9. President pro tem. And I was proud of the fact. And I was 10. just a young buck at the time and he used to admonish me every 11. once in a while about bills I was handling. And I'll never for-12. get one time he said to me, son, if you ever introduce another 13. bill I'm going to vote against it. And his admonishment of... 14. that he often quoted, he often quoted the good book and the 15. Bible. And I'll never forget and I often reminded Ev his son 16. about it - as sufficient under the day as the evil thereof. 17.
 - He was a great credit to his family and his son, I am proud tosay, followed in his footsteps. And I also had the honor, Senator
 - say, followed in his footsteps. And I also had the hohor, SenatorClarke, of serving here with three sons of three former Senators, which
 - 21. I think then this is a record that you can't even break. But it's
 - 22. a pleasure for me to be called upon, Senator Clarke, to say a
 - 23. few words about this wonderful man, who I will never forget.
 - 24. God rest his soul and give peace. And his family will remember
 - 25. that they had a Dad that was the most distinguished and beloved
 - 26. man in the State Senate.

- 27. meant what I said a moment ago. He was one of the finest gentle-
