The only people, Mr. President and Senators, who appeared at the hearing of the Revenue Committee were those who appeared in favor of the bill. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Mr. Chairman, I would certainly appreciate it and I assumed that Mr. Horsley was a reasonably bright lawyer. He was taught in law school, you never ask a witness why. He just may tell you why. And I wanted to tell you why. Now the answer to this is, that we haven't even heard the testimony. Certainly I might have amendments, but the committee has to hear what the people, the proponents and the opponents have to say about this. This is an extremely complicated thing as Senator Horsley knows. What's being done here, this is political gimmickry in an attempt to get a vote on something that has not been . has not been completely heard. Now, only one side of this has been heard and I'd like to hear the other side of it so that if I have amendments I can draw them. I'm certainly not opposed to a tax freeze. In fact I'm one of the most vehement proponents of a tax freeze, but it has to be an intelligent tax freeze to take into consideration who's getting revenue sharing funds . . . PRESIDENT:

Just a moment. The Chair is going to rule . . . the Chair is going to rule that Senator Horsley's time and explanation vote is up. How . . . how do you wish to vote, Senator Horsley?

SENATOR HORSLEY:

I wish to vote to take it away from committee and give the people of this State what they're asking for. PRESIDENT:

A political gimmick that was put out during 20. the campaign when the Repulican Governor felt himself 21. slipping, in an opportunity to try to secure some 22. additional votes. Now I can't see any particular reason 23. that we ought to stay here into the night hours to 24. debate this issue. We're going to be here all day 25. tomorrow and a couple of other days and we've only got 26. two or three things to talk about, so we'll have plenty 27. of time to talk about this tomorrow and maybe give it 28. full debate. Very briefly. This isn't political gimmickry, not to the constituents that I represent. They do expect something to happen. I'm told that something reasonably could be worked out. This is not any kind of political shenanigan at all. Certainly, as far as I'm concerned, I could care less, except I'd like to end here doing something besides voting for pay increases or against them. I think the taxpayers are around. And I'd say, whether the Legislature is here or not, the taxpayers are there. The people we represent are there all the time. I'd also say, that according to the newspaper, and it may be wrong, that there were opponents to this legislation who appeared at the hearing. And why the hearings were cancelled, I don't know. There may have been excellent reasons for it, but there is no reason for further delay. I vote no. We lose a legislative day by doing this and that may be the purpose of it. It will make it far more difficult to hlep the taxpayer, but to help the people on the gravy train.

Maybe one day I'll stand up to this mike and just vote without thinking about what I'm doing or why I'm doing it so long as it is popular and palatable. When

that day comes gentlemen, I shall find out if there is 1. any money in the Pension Fund and I shall retire from 2. this Body. I just sort of believe that issues ought to 3. be crystalized and that issues ought to be considered 4. in the kind of way that is intelligent. Here are bills, 5. which if there is any rush to pass, should never have 6. in the first instance been sent to a committee for 7. hearings. You are now saying that these bills are A. O. K., 8. let's get them up so we can vote on them when just last 9. week or so you voted to send them to a committee. You 10. are not fooling me, and I can tell you, you are not 11. fooling the taxpayers. They're a great deal more intelligent 12. than you think they are. This entire question came up on 13. tax freezes a few weeks before the election. I studiously 14. avoided, both privately and publiclly, of accusing the 15. Governor of any political gimmickry. I studiously 16. avoided that. I did it not only for him but for my own 17. image as a member of this Senate and as a person gingerly 18. referred to as a politician. I did, however, in answer 19. to questions say that I did not know whether or not the 20. passage of this freeze would make for an increase in the 21. income tax. I told people yes, I did not know. And then 22. they said to me, yes, but he didn't say anything about 23. the income tax, and I said, yes, that's so. Then other 24. persons in that audience said, yes, but four years ago 25. he said there would not be an income tax and one was 26. there. I'm suggesting perhaps, that the issue as raised 27. by this tax freeze, brought back into focus, brought back 28. into the campaign the entire income tax issue and matter. 29. I have no opinion on that. I'm just saying that it's 30. entirely possible that that is what happened and that 31. that was one of the components in the election which 32. effectuated the result as we now know it. Now let's talk 33.

1. about these bills and what we are going to do with them. 2. Those persons who are the most knowledgeable people in 3. this State, like the Taxpayers Federation, who spend 4. every waking hour making a determination as what ought 5, to be and what ought not to be in our taxing structure, 6. have said that even they do not know what should be in these bills and have suggested that there should be at 7. least twenty-one amendments to those bills. Had they 8. been drawn, the question was asked. No, they have not 9. been drawn. It's exceedingly difficult. It's exceedingly 10. complicated subject matter and we cannot yet do it. Now 11. you come today, in this moment of upset, frustration and 12: travail, and say to us, let's get it out of committee and 13. let's vote it up and down. The most irresponsible thing 14. 15. that I've heard since I've been here and I say to you, I'm only voting for this motion of Senator Knuppel's, 16. not because I hope to avoid a final vote on this situation, 17. because we'll have it again tomorrow. But I say to you 18. because I think it's wrong. Because I think it takes 19. advantage of the system which prevails here. Because 20. I think that this is not the way to go. To not consider 21. something that the most knowledgeable people in this 22. State say they don't even have an answer to yet. And 23. we're going to stand here without even seeing the bills, 24. without determining which part of the package we're talking 25. about and vote up on them. To imagize ourselves in the 26. community as being responsible people when we are just 27. the opposite. And when we are making the most irresponsible 28. vote we could ever vote on in this Session to take this 29. out of the committee. Why do you think I was the one who 30. help ed to sponsor and set up and orchestrate the hearings 31. And I stood at this microphone, and I stood at the television 32. camera, and I stood on the radio, and I said that this was 33.
