SENATOR MOHR:

Mr. President, members of the Senate, I have an Amendment to ... the temporary Senate Rule No. 10. Its been cleared by the other side of the aisle that ... names the number of Committees which number 14 plus the assignment of bills. No objection, I move the adoption of the Amendment No. 1.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Mohr moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to temporary Rule 10. Further discussion. All in favor, signify by saying aye. Contrary nay. The Motion carries. We will now then proceed to the order of Committee Reports and receive from the Committee on Committees its report on appointments. Senator Mohr.

SENATOR MOHR:

Yes, Mr. President. Each member has been given a copy of the ... standing Committees, ... some of them I understand have been taken off the desk. 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SENATOR HALL:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, Senate Bill 88, a rather emergency piece of legislation introduced because of a problem that most of us have and some of us don't realize we do have. It concerns ... the Ethics Act ... as we amended ... the Statute last year on January 24th of 1972 providing that members ... or Candidates of Local Government, School Districts, etc. ... would also be required to file a statement of financial interest with the County Clerks. was the first time that ... ethics had been introduced to offices of Local Government. Accordingly, ... the problem has arisen at this time because of the elections that are now upon us in the Spring of 1973. Senate Bill 88 is a response to the hundreds of Candidates who are otherwise well qualified to run for Public Office who now find that they may be removed and there is a test before a Court in the Circuit Court of McLean County ... to test whether they can even stand for election in the Primary Elections that we're having there for the City Council and for the Mayor of Bloomington. ... I feel having been connected with the elections in one respect or another for several years ... I tend to put myself in the position of these Candidates throughout the State in Villages and Cities and running for School Boards who are becoming involved in Government for the first time because they feel that it's something that they should do perhaps and would like to do ... and they go down and find out what they do to file for office and they hear about the petitions and they find from their City Clerks or their Township Clerk ... about filing the petitions, but those people don't know anything about the new Ethics lack ... Act that this legislature passed last year, so they don't tell them. And in the City of Bloomington, we have 11 Candidates out of 14 who have not filed an ethics statement for these offices that I ... have mentioned. Obviously, I don't believe I have my preferences in for Candidates but I recognize some of the

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l. people who have filed as people who would make excellent 2. civil servants and officeholders. My bill that I would ask passage of today in the Senate ... responds by saying 3. 4. that even though in this particular period of elections in 5. the Spring of 73 even though some Candidates have not filed 6. as of this date as they should by the Statute. We will give 7. them another 30 days from the passage in the signing of this 8. bill into law. I can see that this could be ... this ... 9. bill could be law on Thursday of this week ... if it's moved 10. as rapidly through the House as I would like to have it move through the Senate and therefore, it would take care of the 11. 12. primary elections that are coming up, some on February the 13. 13th. The bill would become law that is before the election itself and when I read the Constitution ... of the State of 14. 15. Illinois of 1970 Constitution, I see in here that we have a 16. mandate to do exactly what I'm suggesting here. that the General Assembly by law may impose a similar re-17. 18. quirement upon Candidates for or holders of offices in Units 19. of Local Government and School Districts. It does not say how to pass these laws. It does not have to say that they 20. 21. are exactly the same as apply to the state offices and to 22. the members of the Legislature. It says, we may pass laws similar, that is, similar when we talk about statement of eco-23. nomic interest because this comes under Section 2, the state-24. ment of economic interest. That's what I have before you 25. 26. today, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, and I would ask your 27. wholehearted support of this so that we can get ... so that 28. we can assure that elections coming up ... upon us right now will provide for officeholders throughout the State of Illi-29. nois who can be selected by the voters and served without fear 30. 31. of challenge.

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PRESIDENT:

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

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Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I rise in opposition to Senate Bill 88 and I am opposing, Mr. President, Senate Bill 88 on purely constitutional grounds. On January 9th, January 13th to be specific, 1972 House Bill 3700 passed this Assembly and was approved. Senator Hall was a co-sponsor of that bill as it came from the House and that bill Mr. President and members included these local officials and they are under requirement to file the same type of disclosure as are we. This is pursuant to a constitutional provision worked out by the hundred and sixteen members of the Constitutional Convention. I might just as an aside, point out that one of the remaining ten candidates from that town that was mentioned, was himself a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, so certainly he should've known think that in view of the passage of House Bill 3700, in view of the provision of Section 2, Article 13 of our new Constitution which Section was recently and very thoroughly interpreted by the Attorney General of our State in an opinion issued in October, 1972 wherein he says, if I might for a moment just quote, at Page 13 of this 20 some page opinion, "In my opinion", says the Attorney General Scott, "the import of the forfeiture provision is clear under the face of Section 2 and it applies to every official who must file a statement, Number 1 and Number 2 on both the state level and on the level of units of Local Government and School Districts." And he goes on to say, further, at Page 16, "thus, the failure to file within the time specified on the part of candidates for or holders of office results in ineligibility for or forfeiture for that office 9 The Attorney General goes on to say, "I can think of no more plain, concise, unequivocal, unambiguous language to use than this language taken from the Constitution." This bill, Mr. President and members of the Senate would attempt

in my opinion to suspend the provisions of our Constitution. For however brief a time, whether 30 days or four months or six months or two years, it's immaterial. We are presuming to suspend a Constitutional provision and I say to the members of this Senate, in my opinion, we cannot do that. We must not do that In addition, those candidates for local office were under the provisions of House Bill 3700 required to file those statements of economic disclosure at the time they file their nominating petitions which was, I might add, some time ago. They are therefore, currently in violation of that constitutional provision. How can we, I ask, Mr. President and members of the Senate, how can we presume to an Act retroactive Legislation exclus ... excluding or excusing violators once the violation has been committed and it has in this case been committed. ... How can a candidate who has already violated the Constitution of the State of Illinois take that oath of office which you and I took on January 10th, whereby we swear to uphold the Constitution of this State, and of the United States. It was only 20 days ago that we ourselves swore to uphold that Constitution. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I state unequivocally my opposition to this bill and say further that we cannot presume to suspend a Constitutional provision for however brief of time. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator McBroom.

SENATOR MC BROOM:

Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I ... arise in opposition to this measure also. One member last week and I think it might have been Senator Buzbee ... said that he objected to bypassing committee. And I think this is a perfect example of a measure that requires much more study. I... I don't pretend to have the constitutional input that Senator Rock does but I think his ... his comments should be observed by all

of us. I can remember not too long ago and I think that some of the members here can also remember when a Republican House Member of, I think, 7 or 8 terms, Representative Ed Snyder was knocked off the ballot simply because he did not do his homework. I don't recall whether he forgot the statement of candidacy or loyalty oath or whatever the case might be and this situation would put each and every member of the Legislature, if we were negligent in following through and doing our homework. I question that we could pass Legislation to seat ourself and I'd like to make a motion, Mr. President, that this bill be referred to whichever you deem the proper committee, Committee on Assignment of Bills or the Election Committee.

The motion is to commit to the Elections Committee. This motion is debatable. Senator Harber Hall.

SENATOR HARBER HALL:

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Well, Mr. President, we argued ... or we ... did in our last day of Session in the Senate, we did bypass committee ... on this matter. The bill is not changed and the need for it is more severe now then it was even last week. We have here an instrument that will relieve the very serious situation of excluding literally hundreds of candidates over this entire State ... from office. Now, Senator Rock properly pointed out the stringency of the Constitution and I agree with him. But, I would point out to you how we are not invading the wording or the intent or the provisions of Article 13, Section 2, by the interpretation of these words. The General Assembly by law may impose a similar, similar Ladies and Gentlemen, requirement upon candidates for or holders of offices in Units of Local Government and School Districts. That we did. It does not even provide for a penalty, for failure to file an ethics statement in the statutes, but we, it does provide for the filing as we did on January 24, 1972. So ... we have to

uphold the Constitution and I would challenge any state officeholder or members of a Commission or Board created by this Constitution who did not file a verified statement of their economic interest, but the next sentence only pertains to other offices of Local Government and it gives special treatment to that. It says we may, we've done that, in the statutes, and now, I'm suggesting that we make the statutes amended in order to prevent complete chaos throughout ... Local Government in Illinois this year. I would suggest to you, I would tell you, that in the City of Bloomington we don't have enough candidates properly qualified if we ... if we do not pass this bill, to even ... fill the quota for members of vacancies on the City Council Only because the Mayor himself, the ... who is running for reelection and ... a member of the City Council who is also running for election for Mayor only because they had previously filed earlier in 1972 ... only because they had our ... did they file apparently, because no one else who wasn't, ... who hadn't already been on file from a previous contest, no one else filing for these local elections had filed, that is, 11 out 14 had not, so ... I think we have here ... an instrument that we should pass today and I ... would hope that I would be supported ... when I reject the motion to send this to Committee.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Bell.

SENATOR BELL:

Mr. President, members of this Senate, my distinguished colleague from Bloomington, I think at issue here is really what was mandated to us by the people of the great State of Illinois and that was in the form of this ethics legislation that there should be disclosure made before they vote on their candidates. As the present bill is stated, this disclosure would not have to be made until 30 days after the date of the

- Act and as I understand it, maybe I'm wrong here Senator Hall,
- but as I understand it the election would be over by this time.
- 3. Thus, we've circumvented what ... is a very ... of a very prime
- 4. interest here in the State of Illinois the mandate that we have
- 5. disclosure of interest before the people actually vote. I
- 6. would support Senator McBroom's Resolution that this be moved
- 7. to the Elections Committee Thank you
- 7. to the Elections Committee. Thank you.
 - Senator Mitchler:

PRESIDENT:

- SENATOR MITCHLER:
- Mr. President, members of the Senate, I'd like to ask the
 sponsor a question in relation to this bill. if you will agree
- sponsor a question in relation to this bill, if you will agree.Senator Hall, what, at what time would a person that would be
 - Senator Hall, what, at what time would a person that would be
 - elected to office by means of a write-in, vote on the ballot
- 15. file a ethics statement?
- 16. SENATOR HALL:

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- 17. This has not been determined as I understand. This matter
- 18. came up yesterday at a court proceeding on this matter in
- 19. McLean County. There is no provision in the statutes in re-
- 20. spect to write-in candidates, so ... it's very unclear in this
- 21. respect. I think this needs attention by the Legislature to
- 22. cover write-in candidates and to also strengthen the statutes
- 23. in respect and notification of those candidates who wish to
- file so that they will be notified. This can b_{rs} done later
- in this General Assembly. This bill of course does not directits self in that direction only to alleviate the problem that
- 27. is on us right now and in respect to write-in candidates I
- 28. can't give you an answer because there not mentioned
- 29. there not mentioned in the statute in any form in connection
- 30. with the ethics statement.
- 31. PRESIDENT:
- 32. Senator Hynes.
- 33. SENATOR HYNES:

Very briefly, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would echo Senator Bell's comments to the effect that as written, this proposal would permit a candidate in the Primary to file his statement well after the Primary Election and in fact knowing the nature of the Legislative process, I would say that it is probably a safe bet that the time would extend beyond the date of the General Election itself, so that conceivably we could have a candidate go through a primary and an election not have to file the statement while his opponent would have to do so. And secondly, in support of Senator McBroom's comment regarding the ... the need for consideration study of this proposal it seems to me there might be other ways to accomplish the same thing which which could be discussed in Committee. For example, if the date for extending filing were extended in effect permitting a refiling, we would not run into a ... I do not believe the same Constitutional prohibition. These questions I think, are unanswered and I do not think we're in a position to pass on this legislation or responsible manner here this morning.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Berning.

SENATOR BERNING:

Thank you, Mr. President. It is obvious that this ... PRESIDENT:

Senator Berning, could I interrupt you just a moment please? We have been advised by the House that because of the radio time and the TV Broadcast time being reserved and anticipated our timely arrival ... that might there be leave of the Body to interrupt this order of business and return immediately following the Joint Session. It would be a courtesy to a good many other people if the Senate could arrive at 12:15. Is there leave to proceed forthwith to the well of the House for the Joint Session? Would you please line

up outside the door here? The Sergeant of Arms will give you a spot to start from and let's go over in a Body.

SENATOR BERNING:

Thank you Mr. President. What I would merely like to point out to the Body is that we are not being called upon here to violate the Constitution but to provide Legislatively for an amendment to previous legislative action. Furthermore, it would appear to me that insofar as Local Government is concerned it is our primary responsibility to assure continuation and the continuity of Local Government. Certainly not to insure chaos which could be the case here, if I understand the situation correctly. We are not being asked to take action that is going to forever do violence to what most of us accept as necessary ethics procedures, but only to in this instance make it possible for a temporary relaxation in order to assure that Local Government will be able to continue if in no other instance this one in Bloomington and I think thereby we are justified. If you need one other additional instance of our willingness as a Body to ignore

- what appears to be very explicit provisions of the Constitution
- 2. I refer you only to the parochiaid bills which were passed
- irrespective of what appears to be a very firm position in the
- 4. Constitution. We are not being asked to do that in this in-
- 5. stance. All we are doing in my opinion is amending a bit of
- 6. statutory Legislation now on the books. I think this is de-
- 7. fensible that we ought to move on the bill on 3rd reading and
- 8. I would urge this Body not to send it to Committee. We will be
- 8. I would urge this Body not to send it to Committee. We will be
 9. Out of Session for two weeks by that time obviously it would
- 9. out of Session for two weeks, by that time, obviously it would
- 10. be too late to do any good and we will not be discharging our
- 11. responsibility to promote and protect Local Government.

- 27. about the Constitutionality. I hope I directed my answer re-
- 28. jecting ... the Constitutional provision or question. The
- 29. seriousness of the situation is probably the most important
- 30. consideration that we should have today on this particular
- 31. vote and the vote following this vote which will be the pas-
- 32. sage of Senate Bill 88.
- 33. PRESIDENT:

For what purpose does Senator Savickas arise?
SENATOR SAVICKAS:

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A point of information Mr. President. I understand that Senator Hall is closing the debate, but it wasn't his motion, was it? Wasn't it Senator McBroom's motion to commit to ... PRESIDENT:

You, you are correct. It is Senator McBroom's motion and the Chair will invite Senator Hall to close his remarks, and the Chair will recognize Senator McBroom following that. SENATOR HALL:

Thank you. There is just one ... one point Mr. President. I will make, and not try and take up more time when I probably shouldn't of begun to start with ... I would tell you Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate that the City of Bloomington ... whose Council brought this matter before the Court ... are actually wanting and have suggested that Legislative action is the best remedy and they are looking for this remedy today and for the balance of this week, hopefully, so that the question will not throw the City of Bloomington, and I can assure you it involves many many other towns and villages and cities ... into a complete state of chaos. They recognize when they brought this suit that they had solid grounds. They are drawing light to the problem, and they are supporting me in attempting to have the Legislature provide something that will be needed relief and still not invalidate the concept of a filing of an ethics statement. We will still expect it, and we will still have it, as a matter of fact, you should know that virtually every candidate has already filed his statement of ethics statement of economic interest already, but this bill would give him a little longer if there in some towns if this information hadn't been dis ... disseminated by this time. Thank you Mr. President. PRESIDENT:

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SENATOR MC BROOM:

3. Well, Mr. President, I think this has been discussed adequately. I only respond to Senator Berning by saying 5. that he suggests that the mere fact that this bill goes to 6. Elections Committee it's necessarily dead or inoperable.

I don't think that necessarily follows and I'd just like to renew my motion. Thank you.

the Economic and Physical Commission, it was sought that we could report revenue 45 days after the Session. It is now become very apparent that a report at that time the middle of February would be practically meaningless as far as the actualities of what the revenue might be or expenditures.

... So what this does, there is legislation pending to change it by statute for the Commission, but the Resolution just refers to this year to change it to March 21st which would be three weeks after the Governor presents his Message and his revenue estimating to the General Assembly and I would like to ask leave or suspension of the rules for the immediate adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 6.
