18. House Joint Resolution No. 7 and it's congratulatory.
19. ...congratulating the suburban economist ... and Senator Don
20. Moore er...Senator...

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Moore.

23. SENATOR MOORE:

24. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. At this
25. time, Mr. President, I would like to move the suspension of the
26. appropriate rules for the immediate consideration and adoption
27. of this Congratulatory Resolution.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Moore ...is... sought unanimous consent to suspend
30. the rules for the immediate consideration of the Resolution. Is
31. there leave? So ordered. All in favor of the adoption of the
32. Resolution signify by saying aye. Contrary nay. The Resolution
33. is adopted.

1. SECRETARY:

2. House Joint Resolution No. 8 ... congratulatory. Congratu-

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Ozinga seeks unanimous consent to suspend the rules

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Don Moore.

16. SENATOR DON MOORE:

17. Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, at this
18. time, Mr. President, I move to suspend the appropriate rules for
19. the immediate adoption and consideration of this Congratulatory
20. Resolution.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Is there leave? So ordered. All in favor of the adoption
23. of the Resolution, signify by saying aye. Contrary nay. The
24. Resolution is adopted. ... Senate Bills on 2nd reading.

25. SECRETARY:

26. SB 70. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee admendments.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Any admendments from the floor? ... Senator Dougherty.

29. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

30. I have an amendment to offer to Senate Bill 70. I'm not
31. ...the sponsor by surprise. I suggested in committee last week,
32. it's the usual Home Rule Amendment, that provides that Cook County
33. will retain it's status as a Home Rule, and we ask be not included

1. in this particular bill. I ask the adoption of the amendment.

2. SENATOR SOURS:

3. Before we get on the roll call, Mr. President and Senators,
4. ... maybe I should state in advance that I consider Senator
5. Dougherty, one of my best friends in the Senate, however, I ...
6. I happen to be an antagonist of Home Rule. And, for that reason,
7. I would hope that ... this amendment not be adopted. I think
8. we had our bellies full last time with all this mumbo jumbo and
9. hocus-pocus about Home Rule ... my candid feeling is Home Rule is
10. a one-way ticket to perdition for the taxpayer. And, for that rea-
11. son, I would s... I would like to request the members on this side
12. ... or those who do not believe in Home Rule so devotedly, oppose
13. this amendment.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Is there further discussion? Senator Dougherty may close
16. the debate.

17. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

18. In answer to Senator Sours, I too have a most profound ad-
19. miration for the gentleman, however, on the other hand, I have a
20. great deal of loyalty to Cook County. And, since Cook County is
21. the only Cook Coun...only County that has a Home Rule provision
22. by the Constitution, we wish that we not be disturbed by any pre-
23. empts from any other county. We just merely want to insure the
24. fact that we will be assured of that which the Constitution gives
25. us. This is no burden ... no burden upon any other county as per-
26. missive and we ask your support, I think those members of the other
27. counties from other jurisdictions would realize this. This has
28. been standard procedure on the part of Cook County, and I ask your
29. acquiescence and approval of this amendment.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Amendment No. 1 from the floor to Senate Bill 70 is before
32. the Senate. All in favor of the adoption of the amendment
33. signify by saying aye. All opposed signify by saying no. The

1. amendment is not adopted. 3rd reading. A request for a roll
2. call is in order. Senator Donnewald joins Senator Dougherty in
3. requesting a roll call. The Secretary will call the roll on the
4. adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 70. Senator Sours.
5. SENATOR SOURS:

6. Just a point of order. I'm the last one to be overly tech-
7. nical, but I believe, the ... it was announced ... the result of
8. the determination by the Chair, now ... is that final or isn't
9. final ... or is it not final.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. The rules provide, that if no additional business has been
12. entered before the Senate and two Senators request a roll call that
13. we acknowledge that request. The fact is that ... our rules pro-
14. vide for this opportunity. ... Senator Netsch.

15. SENATOR NETSCH:

16. Mr. President, don't we have a right to see in writing,
17. any proposed amendment before we are required to vote on it?

18. PRESIDENT:

19. A request by a Senator to have the amendment printed and
20. on the members' desks is in our rules and if you request that ...
21. SENATOR NETSCH:

22. I make that request.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. We will defer action on the adoption of this amendment
25. until the amendment has been placed on the members' desks. Will
26. the Sergeant at Arms see to it that the amendment is reproduced ...
27. Senator Dougherty's amendment is reproduced and placed on the
28. members desks? Proceed with 2nd reading of other Senate Bills.
29. SECRETARY:

30. SB 71. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Amendments from the floor. 3rd reading. Introduction
33. of bills.

1. SECRETARY:

2. SB 168 by Senators Davidson, Schaffer, Graham, Berning
3. and Regner.

4. (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. SB 169 by Senators Davidson, Schaffer, Graham, Berning

7. (Secretary reads title of bill)

8. SB 170 by Senators Davidson, Schaffer, Graham, Berning

11. 1st reading of the bills.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Keegan, did you wish recognition at this time?

14. Senator Keegan.

15. SENATOR KEEGAN:

16. ...Mr. President, I would like the privilege of introduc-
17. ing to the members of the Senate, a group of citizens from
18. Rockford, Illinois who've come to Springfield today to observe
19. ... Illinois Government. My Rockford friends.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Would your guest please rise?

22. SENATOR KEEGAN:

23. Would you stand and be recognized? ... citizens in that
24. group and I ... hope that ... some of the members of the Senate
25. would have time to meet them individually.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Thank you, Senator. If the Senate will be at ease for just
28. a moment, we will have the amendment distributed in just a moment
29. and proceed with consideration of Senate Bill 70. Will the Senate
30. come to order? I'm advised that the amendment to Senate Bill 70
31. has been distributed. Senator Dougherty.

32. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

33. Mr. President, members of the Senate, as I said before

1. this ... is ... merely ... it's customary of...we, from Cook County,
2. to add this amendment to all Legislation pertaining to the coun-
3. ties of Illinois. We, just merely, to keep in conformity with the
4. Constitution which has indicated that counties above a million
5. are ... with ... far and a comp ... the selection of a President
6. by the large membership, and it's all set forth in the Constitution.
7. We are merely trying to keep this in conformity. It does no more
8. than that. I ask favorable consideration.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Sours.

11. SENATOR SOURS:

12. The ... Mr. President, Senators, this bill touches only a
13. million or ... under a million population. It has no reference
14. directly or indirectly to the city of Chicago or Cook County. I
15. think the request made by the good Senator would be the situation
16. where ... a man who normally wears ... suspenders would also get
17. a belt. This will perform no useful function at all. One doesn't
18. need a belt and a pair of suspenders to keep up his breeches.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Partee.

21. SENATOR PARTEE:

22. I think sometimes people need both belts and suspenders, it
23. depends on the way the person is constructed. But, let me just
24. say, Mr. President, that ... I think this is a pertinent amend-
25. ment ... it, you say directly or indirectly does not affect it,
26. but I think inferentially there may be affected and this, of course,
27. clarifies the situation, and I think any language which has as its
28. purpose to clarify a situation and make certain that there cannot
29. be misunderstanding when read by any person of any logical mind,
30. then ... that would be in the best interest of our legislation.
31. We try to make all legislation easy to understand and easy to
32. read. And this, of course, clarifies any misgivings that anyone
33. may have as to whether it does or does not apply to a given

1. locale. So, for that reason, I would think it's absolutely appro-
2. priate.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Is there further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

5. SENATOR NIMROD:

6. ... It ... seems that the bill ... was intended to exclude
7. Cook County because it was over one million inhabitants, but what
8. seems to be happening with the amendment is that in the event any
9. other county ever becomes a Home Rule County, and this is not a
10. prerogative that is kept for Cook County, if any county ever be-
11. comes a Home Rule County, it would also come under this bill, and
12. I think, the intendance ... it's, it's, probably intended to be for
13. a smaller than one million. So, I do not ... I think this would
14. become a confusing thing if we were to apply the Home Rule appli-
15. cation.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Rock.

18. SENATOR ROCK:

19. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, it seems to me
20. that we are engaged in what purports at least to be a long series
21. of discussions about the applicability of a Home Rule Amendment.
22. Whether or not certain members of our Chamber recognize the fact,
23. we do, in fact, have a new Constitution. And, the new Constitution
24. divides, frankly, units into Home Rule Units and non-Home Rule
25. Units. And, it seems to me, in an attempt to conform our statutes
26. to that Constitution, which has been adopted by the people of
27. this State, it's a very simple matter not to talk in terms of
28. counties of less than a million or more than a million or cities
29. of less than 25,000 or more than 25,000, but an entity is either
30. a Home Rule Unit or it is not. And if, in fact, we are to draft
31. legislation which does not purport to apply to a Home Rule Unit,
32. we should say so and that's exactly what this amendment does, and
33. I ... urge it's adoption.
