HB 89, now in the Senate bears an amendment. 17. An amendment which was structured in the main by Speaker Blair 18. 19. and Representative Choate. It's called for convenience sake, 20. the Blair-Choate Amendment to HB 89. That bill will be up for consideration in a few moments in terms of advancement. Now, on 21. 22. 89, the President of the Senate, Senator Harris, has fashioned in the committee an amendment which, in fact, embraces the concept as 23.

set forth in a bill which he introduced which is called SB 247.

Now, let's just take a moment, if we can and see if we can look at the components of these various bills in order to determine whether or not the amendment which Senator Harris has placed on 89 should be adopted. More than that...we have, 17. as far as I'm concerned, no information as to who is going to 18. make these loans. I don't know if any banks are going to make 19. them, and even if some bank makes them, as I read the bill there 20. is nothing in the bill which indicate, that there would be any 21. uniformity in the amount of interest charged from one area to 22. another; and there is nothing in the bill which would say that 23. the money, if borrowed, and the most likely place for a govern-24. mental unit to borrow money is from another governmental unit. 25. I cannot understand, for the life of me, why, if a governmental 26. entity is going to borrow money, it should not borrow that money 27. from some other governmental entity. There's precedent for that. 28. We've borrowed money in the...in the legislature from various 29. state funds. Money was borrowed once from the MFT Fund and from 30. other funds; so, if we're going to borrow money, it ought to borrowed, 31. it seems to me, from another unit of government where interest does 32. not have to be paid. It strikes me as being a little maniacal 33.

1. to say that an a entity which is doing business which cannot sustain itself can then, nonetheless, pay interest on large 2. 3. sums of money to be borrowed. It just...simply does not make sense. Now the other thing that bothers me about the... 5. amendment is this participation by the various branches of government through which the rapid transit or through which 6. the bus line goes. I don't know and there's nothing in the 7. bill which would indicate to us what the proportional shares of 8. 9. the money to be put up by these entities would be. If the bus goes through five towns, what's the formula for determining... 10. how much town A contributes to the loan and how much town B 11. does, if town A has 40% of the passengers and town...town B 12. has 10. There's nothing which would...indicate this. But 13. then, the other thing is, as I read this amendment all loans which 14. would be made, loans which may not be constitutional loans which 15. may not be possible but even if they were constitutional and 16. even if they were possible all of these loans would be required 17. to be paid or repaid by June 30. Now I...I think that just 18. 19. sort of strains credulity. I can understand that the reason the motivating reason for that kind of a provision would be 20. to do whatever is necessary to accelerate the structuring of 21. what has to be in Northeastern Illinois, a Regional Transit Authority. 22. From the very first moment that I commenced to discuss this bill, 23. 89, I made it crystal clear, and let me repeat and re-emphasize 24. here that the bill, HB 89 is indeed an emergency short-range. 25. measure that there must be to follow at the expiration of the 26. efficacy of this bill, there must necessarily be a Regional Bill. 27. It happens that there has already been constructed or put to-28. gether in this state a Transportation Study Commission which 29. will take on this matter of joining a regional bill; and they're 30. set to do it and they have the personnel to do it, and it's very 31. logical that the Transportation Study Commission should do it. 32.

Assumption of debts structuring of a permanent subsidy program would be included in that legislation, and it was determined that to leave in existence an unrepaid loan, whether it be guaranteed or not insofar as the general existing obligations of these Mass Transit Systems. That, insofar as the guaranteed loan is concerned, we should provide for the termination on the 30th of June.
