Senator Donnewald has a series of three bills implementing that There is agreement that two of them should be considered now which are in fact, noncontroversial bills. One empowering County Boards to establish demonstration projects and the other to empower school boards to lease their equipment for this purpose. I did not have an opportunity to make this information known to the Republican caucus, and I want to make it clear to this side now that we should in consideration of this program before us revert to the order of Senate Bills on 3rd reading and permit Senator Donnewald to proceed with the 2 noncontroversial bills. We need these bills as implementation of the Section in House Bill 89 that has been adopted.
