So, I think there's a question as to ... well, the credibility of this bill when we allow any ... any peace officer the availability of these important documents. That's my question, and as a statement, I'd like an answer to see what ... what has been done to restrict the availability of these records.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

Senator, I don't ... I don't think we should deal in trifles. You can always ... you can interpret any legislation, the deminimus (Latin phrase) way. For example, under the Internal Revenue Code, I can deduct a ... a fire loss as a casualty on Schedule A of my form income tax, my form 1040. Well, I can't ... I can't deduct the cost of cigars and cigarettes, and if anything is fire and smoke loss, that's it. Now, you can make this bill look as ridiculous as you want to, and if you want to apply the ... the minimal doctrine, I can't prevent this. This is a good bill, and I'm against forgers. And, I certainly know you are too. Now, the only way they could be certain is by having the originals, and there's nothing wrong with this. Some ... some of the original vouchers today are up in the Federal court in the Kerner case where they'll be awhile, and they'll be returned. Now, probably, a deputy marshal, no less, came down

to get those under a court subpoena, and there's no more
 sanctity in the vault of a court than there is in the
 sanctity of the vault of any other proper official. This
 is a good bill, and if you don't like it, then all I can
 suggest is vote your conscience. Don't vote for it.

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

My question, Senators, at the time, is not with the voucher itself. But, the question here is, that any ... in this bill, any peace officer, that means some ... some little peace offi ... officer that could be appointed in a little community of two hundred people or a hundred people, could go in into any urban area and conduct a witch-hunt. What I'm suggesting here that when we talk about the concern of the postal authorities, fine if this was designated, any postal authority, law enforcement officer or postal authority official conducting an investigation on fraud or someone from a ... FBI or someone from the Illinois Bureau of Investigation or the State Police, on a legitimate law enforcement ... group, not just anybody, anybody that's deputized in any community in the State of Illinois being able to go in and take the records of any urban, large urban area and say, well, in the name of conducting an investigation of fraud. This is my concern, that we can have any little community start any witch-hunt they want in here. This is my concern, not on the voucher itself.

SENATOR SOURS:

I sent this down to the Legislative I don't know. Reference Bureau, the Post Office people contacted me originally. There are a lot of agencies that probably might have a justifiable reason to investigate forgery. And I don't think it should be the Post Office to the exclusion of everyone. Senator Savickas, for example suggests we enumerate. Well, Senator Wooten, once we enumerate the ... the legal conclusion under the ... under the decisions means we eliminate the others. That's the trouble with any enumeration. enumerate, then you exclude all the others. And, I don't want it that way. I think this bill ought to be broad. I think we ought to get forgers who go into a housing unit in Peoria and beat an old couple over the head with a club and take their relief check. That's what I'm after. I'm after that bird who has no right to do that. First of all, he commits an offense when he assaults elderly people, for example. Second, he forges a name. Now, the trouble with forgery, I'm told by the Post Office people, the forgers will operate in a certain area in a community for a week or two and then they're gone. They're at the other end of Chicago, for example, or they're in Evanston, or they're in East Peoria. That's the reason this bill ought to be as broad as it can. If you like forgers, vote against it. If you don't like forgers, support me.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Wooten.

SENATOR WOOTEN:

I can't think of any reason why I would ever oppose any legislation designed to take care of forgers or to carry an

investigation forward. But the suggestion has been made that,
 perhaps, it is a bit too broad, and I, myself, would certainly
 like to back any kind of legislation that would pursue those
 ends. But, as long as there is a legitimate question placed
 in my mind that perhaps the statement of the law is too broad,
 I would like to find a way to support this legislation without
 a reasonable ... well, let's say without a ... a serious doubt.

SENATOR SOURS:

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Let me say, I hope in conclusion, this bill ought to be broad. Now, the situations that have arisen today have nothing to do with yanking anyone in front of a judge or a Federal Commissioner. We're talking about an investigation only. haven't found the culprit yet. We don't know where he is. Now, if you're presuming that we're going to get some poor devil and give him the star-chamber treatment, you're supposing about ... about the tenth fact or about the ... about two years after this is discovered. We're talking about a rightful, lawful, proper examination of ... of an alleged forged document by a governmental person who has some authority. This is all investigative. Now, the FBI does that every day Senator Wooten, · whether you and I know it or not. Now, I'm not quite finished. There may be other agencies concerned such as the Secret Service, maybe while they're looking for the forger, it turns out that he has no business, maybe he's an alien un ... unlawfully in this country. Those things turn up and when you limit it to the Post Office, as Savickas would suggest, then of course, you're restricting it where becomes a nullity in a proper case. PRESIDENT:
