

Now, in answer to Senator Conolly, I'm going to read this paragraph which in the bill describes what security value is. As used in this section value means the current market value of a security as traded on any stock exchange. Senator Conodly, if I went in and said that my stock is selling for \$100 a share, is the bank going to take my word or are they going to check the stock exchange? That's exactly what happens. Or if such security is not as traded the current market value of such security as traded in the market made as such a security by any license security dealer. Is...is the bank going to take my word or are they going to call the security dealer? That's what they have the research departments. I emphasis to you that no bank relies on what the borrower says is the value. They have those facilities to check it out. And Senator Sours if you ever saw a collateral agreement in small print the bank has the authority

1. if they find that the security is not sufficient to support 2. the loan, they can call in the loan because the security is not sufficient. That's how the banks protect themselves on 3. They do not rely on the borrower and again I say to 4. you I agree with you as far as the thief...protect the bank 5. 6. against the thief. But no borrower...what I'm...I'm...what 7. I want to say is the bank does not rely on me when I say 8. here's \$100,000 in securities give me \$20,000. They say come 9. back in a week and we'll tell you if that...if we'll give it . to you.
