I hadn't paid that much attention when it was in Judiciary but Section 5 says no person shall restrain any animal by a chain, rope, leash or similar device unless the device is at all times at least three times the body length of the animal. This means that if you tie a horse up with a rope that's shorter than twenty-four feet, you're in violation of the law. Also, a cow or some of the larger animals. I submit that this is one good way to ruin a horse, by nature, a horse gets their foot over a rope and they could get their foot over a twenty-four leash; you could ruin a good horse in a hurry. I submit that this part of the bill is bad. I would ask the good Senator if he would consider holding the bill and considering an amendment to it in...in light of the different sizes of animals. This may be all right for dogs, it may be all right for some other animals, but it certainly doesn't apply to horse, cows and some larger animals.

program could be eliqible up to \$50,000, the damage of their ı. 2. home. And the first \$5,000 is gratis. Now stop and think what that costs taxpayers to just to pay out for one year. Now, 3. today you had placed on your desk a pamphlet relating to the 4. national flood insurance program. Now, this is supplementing 5. the flood-loss loan program because, face it fellows and ladies, 6. there's just is not going to be that money handed out from the 7. Federal government in 1973 for the flood losses. And this type 8. of legislation that is going to be replaced with the national 9. 10. flood insurance program where the Federal government picks up ninety percent of the insurance that people are eligible for when 11. local communities come out with a flood plain ordinance, and you 12. can read about it in the pamphlet. But, Senator Soper here is 13. addressing himself to a problem, and it's a pro...problem of 14. great magnitude in his area and throughout other areas in the 15. State. SENATOR SOURS:

President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, this bill concerns the Replevin Act and its genesis has to do with a recent United States Supreme Court decision entitled the Fuentes' case. Fuentes against Shevin. Now, the bill before us has been prepared by a group of attorneys, including Harry G. Fins, William E. Gainer, Attorney for the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County, Donald Howe, Chairman of a Subcommittee of the Commercial Banking and Bankruptcy Committee of the Chicago Bar Association, and a small group of practitioners who regularly handle replevin matters. The necessity for this change was created by the decision of Fuentes against Shevin which held the Florida and the Pennsylvania Replevin Statutes unconstitutional under the 14th Amendment by reason of no prior notice. What this bill does is give that prior notice, for it sets up the machinery for giving the prior notice. The most important feature of this bill is that it grants a defendant who apparently the courts feel needs...needed more protection than the other cases the additional right to prior notice and hearing before the issuance of a Writ of Replevin, as of now they are not issued in the Circuit Court of Cook County, I'm told, and in Lake County. A second important feature is that it requires the plaintiff seeking the writ to give a sheriff a bond double the amount of the property. Third, it provides for a hearing to protect the plaintiff who is in immediate danger of having the...the res...the thing destroyed. Now, unless one feels that replevin should be forever off the books as a remedy for a creditor, then he would be...persuaded by the goodness of this bill. I'd appreciate a favorable roll call.

SENATOR SOURS:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, this bill revises the law in relation to Recorders. I'm reading the syllabus because that's the most simple explanation of it. It adds a section requiring the name and address of the person preparing real estate instrument to be on same as condition of recording. Exempts court order, will, death certificate and foreign instrument, that is all it does. It's a bill we had last year, the sentiment was against it last year or at least I think I got 29 votes. Since that time the Illinois State Bar Association favors this bill very highly.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Mr. President, this is the same bill we had last year. This is a bill by...it was originally started by the State Bar Association in an attempt to deprive people or to stop people from the unauthorized practice of law. Now, a lot of deeds are drawn out of state, lot of deeds are drawn by lawyers in other states who might not be familiar with this. just causes a lot of problems sending the deeds back. A lot of extra work for lawyers, a lot of extra legal charges and I am sorry to say that the State Bar Association no longer takes the position with respect to this legislation. They were in favor of it for a number of years, it didn't pass and I was told by the Bar Association that they no longer are supporting this; it's up to the Senate to vote it up or down as they may see fit. This is nothing more or less than to make busy work to attempt to stop people from out of state or...or people who are not lawyers from drawing deeds by having to identify who

- they are. Makes the Recorder...making this serve for the 1. 2. Recorder to turn the deed back and as I say, many times it's
- 3.
- difficult, if not impossible. Deeds are sometimes recorded 4 . years after they're drawn. To find out who drew the deed
- and maybe the people who signed the deed are dead and you 5.
- 6. got to go try to run down and find out who drew the deed,
- if you don't, you can try to draw another deed and if you 7.

Senator Rock what happened yesterday was a clarification ...bill to remedy that situation that, in the event, 15. in the event, a document does become recorded without 16. the grantees name that it should not affect the validity 17. of that document. Now, now we're coming to...to the 18. bill at hand, I... I want to repeat myself because this is 19. 20. the...the main issue involved, because of the confusion, and because of the difficulties that has arisen as to 21. titles and to recording facilities, it was necessary 22. 23. for the Illinois Bar Association to present that bill yesterday. I...I...I have I made myself clear, Senator 24. Rock. Now, if this bill passes, if this bill entertain 25. ...or recognized by the Senate, you will again create 26. another situation where you are requiring another ... 27. recitation on a instrument and Senator Sours' bill 28. now is asking that not only do you put the name of the 29. grantee on the deed, but he's asking you to put the name 30. of the person that prepared it, which absolutely has 31. no effect of the legality of the instrument, it has 32. absolutely no effect of any kind except to tell somebody

who...who prepared it and I don't know what...what effect it'd do. Of course, the purpose has been set forth and as Senator Knuppel is supposed to...help the lawyers get more business or is supposed to let somebody know who prepared that bill, so you know who did it, and to avoid, possibly, mistakes. But then you are denying the rights of people to prepare documents. Now, this bill that's now at hand is nothing but a backdoor piece of legislation. You are trying to do through the backdoor what you cannot do through the front door. You cannot say to people that you cannot prepare an instrument, therefore, you're telling the Recorder, don't take this kind of an instrument. Now, ladies and gentlemen, now you're talking about thousands and thousands and hundreds of different documents. I can stand here and recite to you about deeds, warranty deeds, trust deeds, quit claim deeds, articles of agreements, assignments, leases and most important, ladies and gentlemen, the thing that I discussed at the Judiciary, are releases, releases of liens. In my opinion, a person who receives a release of a lien has a right to come to that window and get that release off. When he has paid under a contract, over a period of five years for a home improvement for a new roof or for siding and he receives in the mail a release of a lien, he has a right to go to Recorder and record that release even if it doesn't have the name of who prepared it. And, also, in my opinion, the institution, the company or the individual that put on that roof, the...company or the institution that delivered the lumber that put on the lien in the first place also has a right to prepare that release and I maintain here that...and I repeat again that it involves thousands and thousands of documents that will be returned or have to be returned by the many Recorders that stops progress that delays titles and I'd like to...to state

Now, Senator Palmer, this miserable situation will cer-21. 22. tainly be obviated if that realtor would be required to 23. put his name as the scrivener. Now, as of now, there's no penalty, we just want to know who he is. Now when 24.. 25. you...when you complain that certain industries like the title companies want this you, above all as a lawyer, 26. 27. ought to see the excellence, unless that's too controversial, in the work of a lawyer who draws conveyances.
