Thank you, Senator Rock, if you will withhold your Motion for a moment there are some others who wish to be recognized, and we will get to your Motion. Senator Sours. SENATOR SOURS:

Mr. President and Senators, I should like to join in suggesting that this be supported by the members on this side of the aisle. Without being fictitious I remember Senator Bill Horsley one time in a...humorous note said, "The people should pay us to stay home". Well, that might denigrate some of the self conscious members of this Chamber. But at the same time there was a little sense to that, because whenever we're in Session we spend money. Now, I'd just like to make this one little comparison so we might have of some justification. Many years ago the Congressman was always home by the first of May and he didn't sit in Congress from then on until the next Session which opened in the next year. At that time and I am hearkening back to even before my years...in the time of Coolidge for example, there was a huge surplus in the Treasury. Now, at the the present time I understand our bonded indebtedness exceeds four hundred fifty billion dollars. I want to offer that as a finest example why we should not have annual Sessions where we sit around and simply expend the taxpayer's money. I do hope you'll support this. It's long overdue. ...I confess that there is an immense amount of appeal in this Resolution as far as I'm concerned. But it's...it's not a non-substantive kind of thing. It...it...it poses some immense problems and while I like the idea I certainly think there ought to be some discussion. If you talk about and I'm really just thinking out loud because this does have some substantial implications. If you could talk about appropriations

only how do you deal with the revenue situation? In other words if you pass only appropriations you've got to have some kinds of situations I would think where you may have to deal with the other side of the coin - and that is the revenue. I would like some discussion somewhere along the line about the kinds of things that do happen ...that are emergency in nature. Do we call Emergency Sessions and have two, three, or four, or five concurrent sessions going at one time. ... And I guess what I'm saying is while I intend to like your concept, Senator Rock, I would hate on the judgement of one or two days to provide the people with a Constitutional Amendment.... which we may learn to live to regret... I have heard...a number of allegations about the Constitutional Convention and the deliberations that they had. And there have been a number of instances in which they have been slighted for those deliberations. But I would suggest to you that we ought to be at least as deliberative in looking at this kind of a Resolution as they were deliberative. And while I like it I want to hear more about it and I think the only way I can hear more about it is to see that it goes to some kind of a committee that will at least pay some attention to it. I'm sorry about this deadline situation. But this is a fairly momentous kind of a thing we're talking about.

SENATOR PARTEE:

Well, Mr. President, I certainly understand the concern of the gentleman from DuPage. There is no attempt made here to push anything down fast or hastily. There is the time limitation and if for example the word appropriation is not as inclusive as you would desire, it could be amended of course, to say Appropriation and Revenue; or perhaps you could say budget matters - another word that would be embracive of the

concept. The idea is to restrict the second year Session to budgetary matters. Now, if other matters are of overwhelming importance of that Section of the Constitution which provides for the Speaker and the President to call a Special Session will still obtain. And it would also still obtain for the Governor to call a Special Session for matters extrinsic to Budgetary matters. That's really all this does. The rest of the Resolution is identical to that which appears in the Constitution now. The time limitation is absolutely essential. There won't be anymore meetings of that committee until the 24th of this month. Constitution mandates that this be finalized within the legislative walls within a six month period prior to its submission to the people. It being submitted to the people by its terms on the 5th day of November, it would mean certainly that we would have to have it out of here before May fifth. And we certainly can't do that if we wait until the 24th for a committee hearing. So that's the only reason, Senator Knuepfer, and I think on that basis you'll understand what we're trying to do it.

SENATOR REGNER:

Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I'm in full accord with what I am sure Senator Rock is attempting to get at. However, I think there is some serious shortcomings in this Resolution the way it's worded...referring to appropriations. With that reference you could have every port barrel bill anyone could dream of coming before this General Assembly. You could have every concocted new program coming before this General Assembly. I think we are going to be in Session tomorrow from what I understand and I think this should be held until then and probably over night or something it could be worked up to get the proper wordage in that we could put the limitations on that we want.

The Chair just wishes to announce that the Constitutional requirement for a Constitutional amendment to be read on three successive days cannot be bypassed. The only motion or action that Senator Rock requested was to have the Resolution read a first time today without reference to committee. I would certainly call attention to the membership and I don't want to assume the role of the advocate for the Senator's Resolution. SENATOR BUZBEE:

Thank you, Mr. President, it just seems to me that an issue of this magnitude we're always complaining here about we are sometimes asked to act upon things without really having a chance to have a thorough hearing on it. I know the Commission the organization of the General Assembly is dealing with this very problem right now. I know leadership of both sides of both Houses are dealing with this problem. And I think all of us have our own individual ideas about it. But it just seems that this important of a Resolution...at least should have the decency of a hearing before a committee ...with proper input from citizens who have a desire to talk about it. And you know if we've got this time problem my only question is why wasn't the Resolution introduced two months ago in January when we were here, so that the Executive Committee would have had proper time to deal with. I just think that we would really not be doing the people of the State of Illinois a proper service right now by bypassing committee.

SENATOR OZINGA:

Mr. President, members of the Senate, just so there is no misunderstanding. I am in full accord with the Resolution as was presented by Senator Rock; and wish to become a co-sponsor with it with a little bit of clarifying language. However, it was my suggestion to the Senator that he does

bypass committee in the interest of time, so that nobody gets a misunderstading that he is trying to - what'll I say - avoid the Executive Committee in anyway shape or form. I suggested that this be done because we have other Resolutions and things that we could take up; but coming back on the 16th, I felt that it would only be wise to have a little bit of time to get ourselves straighten out. SENATOR NETSCH:

Mr. President, I would like to add a word of caution to what is being suggested here today, also. It seems to me that the one time we never quite have the opportunity to reflect as deliberately as we should as when we are considering proposed constitutional amendments. And I would remind the members that the last time that we rather hastily passed a proposed constitutional amendment, we just as hastily attempted to rescind what we had done, at the next available opportunity. It seems to that what we are talking about is something very basic...not only to the legislative process, but really to the whole function of State Government. And I don't think that the...voters even though they would have an opportunity in a referendum would appreciate our tampering with our responsibilites as elected State Legislators...without even the opportunity of a committee hearing. It seems to me that it is not the appropriate way to go about changing

by the remarks of the Senator from across the aisle when l. 2. he talks about the licensing. If he will recall I stood here and said that that bill was unconstitutional - warned 3. 4. you people to take more time - The balconies were crowded, 5. everybody wanted to make an impression on his real estate 6. broker, his nurse, and the rest of them and they passed it. And I...many times I've stood here; like with the 8. bill on No-Fault two years ago, and said this bill is un-9. constitutional - nobody listened. Now, what I'm going 10. to suggest is this: I'm going to suggest that the staff 11. excerpt from the constitutional debates . They're all printed the material that dealt with that so that the 12. 13. people will have some material to review in studying this 14. Resolution. I feel that it is long delayed. If you will 15. recall Senator Horsley and myself both, heretofore intro-16. duced Resolution to get off this annual Session kick. It's 17. a slogan. It's unnecessary...we could do it by rule but 18. unfortunately, apparently, the House won't discipline them-19. selves. I would like to see the Resolution adopted but 20. there are some access and debates and some other material, 21. we don't have to be completely in the dark. We can read 22. those debates. We can know what the people in the consti-23. tutional convention thought and I'm sure that the people 24. voted for the new Constitution didn't adopt it for that 25. reason solely. But as far as comparing this with the Supreme 26. Court decision holding a bill that was pushed through here 27. over the objections of some people who had sat in the Con-28. stitutional Convention who warned that it was unconstitutional, 29. I think that's unfair.

apalling - that its suggested that this is something done in haste. I would like for you to look at Section 3, of the legislative article relating to Sessions. The Constitutional Convention and I am not saying anything disrespectful to them, but they debated and cogitated this problem a long time. And there are exactly 34 words in that Section 3. And those 34 words do not mean anything by way of delineation as to what is to take place in the even numbered Sessions and what is to take place in the odd numbered Sessions. We have now had the experience of what happens when there is no delineation, as to what is to transpire in the even numbered years. We talk about committees being so sacrosanct, let me suggest to you that there has to be three readings. And if you are talking about democracy it means every single member of this Body, not just a committee, but every single member of this Body gets a chance to vote on this question. And more than that this question will be out in the public for six full months. It has to be constitutionally before the people are asked to vote on it. And every single voter in this State, after it has been before him for six months, who has every opportunity to know what he is voting on, will have then the opportunity to vote on it. So these arguments about committees and the arguments about haste, to me sort of fall on deaf ears.
