SENATOR DAVIDSON:

I think that as a representative of our great Nation in the armed forces, you have further obligation to do and I look forward to you ... fulfilling this. And that is to tell the people of the United States, these citizens, in the land that you protect exactly, you do this in your travels, why you were over there, what you were doing and how you did it. And tell them about the enemy, that you were confronted with so that they may have an education first handed by an individual who knows. And I have full confidence that you will be telling the truth and don't hesitate to tell that truth even in the face of one or two of the radicals that may be calling you a liar or doubting your words as you return. You keep up the good work and we're all behind you, all the way, one hundred percent. Thank you.

SENATOR MITCHLER:

Mr. President, members of the Senate, this is a Congratulatory Resolution for the Hoffer Plastics Corporation. I would ask immediate consideration of the Resolution and adoption thereof ...

PRESIDENT:

Senator Mitchler has moved for the suspension of the Rules for the immediate consideration of the adoption of the Resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary nay. The motion is carried. On the motion to adopt, all in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary nay. The motion is carried and the Resolution is adopted. Senator Buzbee.

SENATOR BUZBEE:

Mr. President, we have a very distinguished guest on the Senate Floor today. My predecessor who happened to be from the other side of the aisle, but a man that I can honor very much, and consider a good friend, Senator John Gilbert. PRESIDENT:

Welcome home, Senator Gilbert.

SENATOR GILBERT:

You ... you see the side of the aisle I'm on, I'm that

Trojan horse fellows, over here and you just didn't know it.

I really do miss being with you, and I've heard other retiring

1. Senators and other members of the Senate while they were 2. here call this the greatest fraternity on earth. I assure 3. you that it is, and I miss being with you, but I really do 4. not have regrets in not being here because it has become a 5. full time job, and those of you know that even better than 6. I, as the problems continue to grow. I wish you the best 7. and if there's ever anyway that I can help any of you in 8. any way, please call on me. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Buzbee.

SENATOR BUZBEE:

Senator Gilbert, I hope you don't miss it enough to want to run again in two years.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Gilbert, we're delighted to have you here with us. Please come back again. Resolutions.

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution No. 95 by Senators Partee, Rock and Donnewald. (Secretary reads Resolution No. 95)

PRESIDENT:

Executive. Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

Mr. President, this is a matter which, I would like the attention of the membership if I may because this is a ... a very serious subject. There are a lot of people throughout the country, particularly in my District and in the City of Chicago who are quite concerned. Would you gentlemen in the corner please move it out? Thank you. Quite concerned about what has happened at the White House recently in terms of the budget cuts. Now, we are all, of course, very, very concerned about trimming fat from the Federal budget, and we think it's the way to go; we think it's avery desirable kind of approach. By the same token,

we think though that this waste could be trimmed at another place in areas where successfully people-oriented programs do not have to suffer. And I talked over the weekend and the week before with large number of groups of people in Chicago who are very, very upset about these cuts. Now, there ... there a lot of people who are concerned about daycare centers being forced to close, and just yesterday in the Congress of the United States, a woman Congressman took her two and a half year old child to work with her and suggested to women all over Washington that they take their young children to work with them to dramatically dramatize that the lack of day-care facilities is a real, real problem for a lot of people. There were veterans ... Viet Nam veterans that are meeting the other Sunday and it was distressful to me to hear them talk in terms of the programs which have been cut off which they were a part and about their inability to find work, and about the, what they described as a lack of sensitivity on the part of the Federal Government to find jobs for them. And they said things that disturbed me, things like, you know we were taught by this country to kill. We were taught to kill people that we didn't know; we were taught to kill people that may have been our friends, and now they say we come back to this country with this knowledge and we are concerned that nobody cares whether we have a job or whether we don't have a job. That those programs that were calculated to help us are now being taken away from us and they said somethings that would indicate to me that we are in or on the throes of a real dilemma, with people coming back from overseas with the kind of attitude that we as governmental officials, have not their best interests at heart. Moreover, they have some sensitivity to what they call invidious discrimination between those of them who served and were honorably discharged and returned to this country under what they consider to be

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not the showcase circumstances of the prisoners of war. Now, of course, the prisoners of war were given the kind of reception they were given for the reasons which are obvious to all of us. It would not in my judgement cause anyone to feel that he was being discriminated against because he was not showcased in the same fashion because he came back in the normal course of ... of existence. But there does remain, and there does persist in a percentage of our population, our returning veterans, that feeling. I don't know what can be done; it disabuse them of that feeling and notion. I don't know what I could say to them, I have tried to those that I've talked with. I don't know what can be said to them to say that we are concerned. But I do think that everybody knows that we in this Legislative Hall have absolutely no control over what transpires in Washington. We cannot vote in the Congress of the United States, but this Resolution just does say that we are concerned. This Resolution does say that we in a measure beseech and implore the President and the Congress to reconsider what we consider to be precipitous action. We say we deplore the proposal to dismantle or seriously impare many worthy Federal Social Service programs, that budget reductions could best be achieved by reordering priorities and trimming excess elsewhere. And, we respectfully urge the President of the United States and the Congress to restore the successful social service programs which benefit millions of our citizens. And we ask that a copy, of course, be sent to the President, and to the Illinois Congressional delegation, to the Secretary of the United States' Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Now, Mr. President, I'm asking for the suspension of the rules and the immediate adoption of this ... committee ... of this Resolution. In the event, and I've been around here long enough to make some predictions, in the event that it is not immediately

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adopted and I'm ... I think I can say anticipatorily that I suspect, Senator Graham is not on his feet to say a paternoster, (Latin phrase) if for any reason this is not adopted, I want you to know that when we do send this to committee, if it goes to committee, that I have already been informed that there are several people who desire to be heard on the question, I would hope we could get an early hearing, there is a Mrs. ... Miss Genevia Bay from Chicago who comes from a ... one section of our City, and Mr. Lawrence Green will be here, Mr. Henry Martinez who is with the Spanish speaking people, and Mr. Henry Wilson from the Englewood area. Also, I have been informed that the President of the NAACP, the President of the Urban League, and we are inviting the Dr. Jesse Jackson of PUSH and others who have manifested interest in this question, to come and testify in the committee. I would hope that we could immediately adopt this Resolution and I so move, that the Rules be suspended and that it be immediately adopted.

Well, Senator ... I have ... acknowledged your opportunity to debate the Resolution. Would you withhold your motion to suspend until some Senators here on the Floor who have wanted recognition in response. I believe Senator Conolly was the first to get the attention of the Chair. I do have three other Senators who have requested recognition. Senator Conolly.

SENATOR CONOLLY:

PRESIDENT:

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Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would like to point out at this time that the Inter-Governmental Relations Committee of the National Legislative Conference, approximately 150 State Legislators met last Friday in the East Room of the White House. Met for a briefing by the Cabinet level officials and four ... four Secretaries did meet with us and did give us a briefing upon the President's for ... budget for this

year. There were ... was much discussion about the increase of our Federal budget, and there was much misunderstanding ... misunderstanding and misinterpretation of this budget. leadership of both Houses of the State of Illinois are members of this committee, and I'm sorry that not all of them were able to be in attendance. But, I would like to point out that the President did show ... did appear at this briefing and spoke to 150 State Legislators across the nation and explained his budget. We will have copies of the presentation, the two hour presentation by the members of the Cabinet for this Legislature within a short time. But I think it is interesting to notice that the President of the United States and the Cabinet realize that the State Legislators will have to work with many of these problems in the future and with the special revenue sharing that the President has proposed, did call us in and did discuss the problems of the nation with State Legislators. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Graham.

SENATOR GRAHAM:

Mr. President, and members of the Senate, of course
Senator Partee asked for unamious consent for the immediate
... for the suspension of the rules and of course I'm going
to object, as he anticipated. I'm going to object for two
or three reasons. First of all, I think it should go where
you indicated it was going to go. But, I want it to go there
for the reasons that Senator Partee indicated it should, cause
down there is the proper place to hear their witnesses. Also
want them to know that we on this side of the aisle are not
unmindful of budget cuts in governmental operations. We've
been watching the second floor for three months, and that's
not in Washington, that's here. I would also like to have
it go down there because we might shut off some extra debate

which I anticipate maybe coming on this Floor today because if we're going to get involved in a lengthy debate on this, the Calendar is not going to be much smaller at 1:00 than it is right now, and I'm going to object to unanimous consent, from suspension of the rules.

PRESIDENT:

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The motion was to suspend the rules, which Senator Partee has withheld until these responses can be made. The ... Senator Knuepfer.

SENATOR KNUEPFER:

... Mr. President, members of the Senate, a part of the Resolution as I heard it sounded like some campaign promises that were made, not too long ago. The suggestion that we reorder priorities and save money to provide priorities for those programs that each one of us think are the most necessary. We ought to be doing that down here too, perhaps. And, maybe we could solve some of these problems. I think Senator Partee forgets that there are two sides to this coin. We've got the benefits of one side, that's the revenue sharing. But tied to revenue sharing are the elimination of some categorical programs. I support the concept because I think local governments make better decisions as to how to spend their money than do national governments coming down and spending the money in your locality. But you can't have your cake and eat it both. You're not going to get categorical and revenue sharing. The Federal government obviously has the same financial problems that our State seems to have. We've got those revenues. The State of Illinois has those revenue sharing revenues. So do the municipalities, the townships and the counties. I suggest our job is to reorder within that Body in which we make decisions the spending of that revenue sharing allocation based upon the priorities that we establish and not cry about what happened to our categorical aid. There was a trade, one for the other and we

- simply ought to recognize that. We're not going to get both.
- We're either going to get the opportunity to make those de-
- cisions through the revenue sharing concept, or we're going
- 4. to have somebody impose that decision making upon us. I
- 5. think we've got the better of the deal. I would certainly
- 6. object to this Resolution being considered immediately, and
- 7. I would join with Senator Graham in suggesting consideration
- 8. by the proper committee.
- . 9. PRESIDENT:

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- 10. Senator Don Moore.
- 11. SENATOR DON MOORE:
- 12. Just very briefly, Mr. President, members of the Senate,
- 13. I think also that the Executive Committee is the proper place

 - 14. for this Resolution. As we know and as the Resolution stated,
 - 15. these are proposed cuts, or suggested cuts, there are many areas
 - 16. of concern that, I know we in the ... members of the Legislative
 - 17. Advisory Committee on Public Assistance have. I might add
 - 18. that the Committee is going to Washington on May 17th. We
 - 19. are having a meeting with the entire Illinois delegation, all
 - is. are naving a meeting with the choice arranged acrognetic, and
 - twenty-four Congressmen and our two United States Senators to
 - 21. find out in more detail exactly what some of these programs
 - 22. will do, how they will effect the State of Illinois. I think
 - 23. that it is premature at this time, Mr. President, to go ahead
 - •
 - 24. with this particular Resolution. I think it should be held
 - 25. in the Executive Committee until such time as we have more
 - .
 - 26. information on it.
 - PRESIDENT:
 - Senator Partee. You may renew your motion.
 - 29. SENATOR PARTEE:

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- Well, just by way of renewing the motion, let me say
- 31. that I haven't forgotten, Senator Knuepfer what this is
- 32. about. As a matter of fact, as you talked about it, you
- 33. caused me really to remember some things that I had not

really forgotten, but were perhaps just ... just stored in some recess of my mind. What I did remember as you talked was this is not a precipitous kind of action on behalf of the President of the United States. What I did remember is that he has been planning this for at least two years. And, I'll tell you why I know. I too, Senator, was in Washington, in the White House. I was down there a couple of years ago to ... at an invitation of President Nixon and we were ushered into a nice room there and they had three gentlemen come in to talk to us. It wasn't very subtle. What they really were selling was a thing called revenue sharing, and revenue sharing at that time did not have a great deal of acceptance in this country. As a matter of fact, the then Governor of this State, Governor Ogilvie was not in favor of revenue sharing at that particular point. He was later brought to Washington and had some conversations with the President, and he came back in favor ... of revenue sharing. But, the fact of the matter is that revenue sharing was not very popular and they had three men to talk to us and the only one really that I sort of related to ... the guy who really made the best kind of presentation, and I ... I don't think I feel this way because of his politics, but his name was John Connally and he happens to be a man from Texas and he happens to be a member of the same party I am, but he really made sense and I listened with some care to what he had to say. And, then, the next stage of this development came when the President then sent the Vice-President throughout the United States to talk to various Legislative Bodies and others about the concept of revenue sharing. And you can remember because it was a painful kind of experience for me, personally ... painfully when Vice-President Agnew came to this city and spoke at a joint Session of the Legislature on this concept of revenue sharing. And we asked him questions then because we

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already could see and realize that the unemployment rate was beginning to soar particularly in my community. And we were concerned about it and then as ... the other side of the coin, as we talk about coins, we brought in someone from the other side of the coin and we brought in Wilbur Mills, the Congressman who is in charge of the Ways and Means Committee in the Congress, who was opposed to revenue sharing and he told us about it and told us his version of it and we were at least edified in this State as to both positions of that question. And, then the next phase of this question came just about five or six months ago when a man by the name of Casper Weinberger came to Chicago, which was a last stop on a tour of the United States. He made about five or six speeches in regional areas 14. and talked to the local indigenous politicans, the County Clerks and the people who ran County and Local Government throughout the United States. There were about five or six hundred people up at the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel where Mr. Weinberger introduced to us some of the aspects of revenue sharing and how the composition of the ... of how the distribution of the money was to take place. And, it was there, and I just read that speech the other day, that I had an opportunity to make up there, and where I said to them that we were concerned that the Federal Government did not give us money with the right hand and take money back from us with the left hand. Because all through this entire change over was the feeling and was the knowledge that as certain programs were ... it was said they were going into another category. And, the fact of the matter is that some of the programs were eliminated and they switched them around so it took you a little time to miss some of them. But, the people who were recipient under those various programs and I...I say the word recipient, it does not really relate to poverty, like day care and other things, the recipients of those

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programs did know and felt it. So when I say, Mr. President,
 that I should like to address ourselves to this today and
 adopt this Resolution today and get this Resolution sent down
 to the President and get the Congress ... to know that our
 position is that we think they ought tore-examine this program
 I ... I am very serious. And I would certainly ask that the
 rules be suspended and that we immediately adopt this Resolu-

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, let's just see what we're talking about here. And I'm reading, from sixty to seventy-five percent of welfare households draw benefits from more than one program, from ten to twenty-five percent benefit from at least five programs, and some collect benefits under as many as eleven programs. There is almost no coordination among these programs. At two sites, every benefit exceeded \$6500 minimum advocated by the National Welfare Rights Organization. Contrary to the common assumption, up to twenty-one percent of welfare families in an Eastern city are headed by employable males. Never before has there been such authentic

and indisputable evidence of the confusion and waste that marks the present mess. One net result is to discourage work. The parlor liberals hate to admit it; there are many on welfare who should be working. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, that's what we're talking about. There isn't a one of us on this side who doesn't have the same humane notions as on the other side. But let's get rid of some of this excresence; let's get rid of some of this useless ratholing. Let's put some of these indolent loafers and oafs back on some employer's payroll. Let's beat this motion this morning and put an end to it.

SENATOR DON MOORE:

PRESIDENT:

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In effect, what I have done with this amendment was to restore the act as it was originally written and the paragraph which the Secretary read, Senator Rock, the effect of which would be to completely negate Superintendent Bakalis, guideline insofar as the 15% ... mixing of children or the arbitrary 15% quota, ratio that he has set up. It would negate those guidelines. That is what the amendment does.

SENATOR HYNES:

Mr. President, this bill was heard at length in the Education Committee. Essentially, the same bill has been in and around and through the Legislature for two years, and at the eleventh hour a completely new bill was substituted. amendment is not an amendment. In fact, it's a new bill. was not heard in the Education Committee. There was not one word of testimony for or against this particular amendment, in fact, there was no opportunity for proponents or opponents to testify. And I object to the procedure that was adopted and of the amendment itself.

PRESIDENT:

This ... I'm advised this is a committee amendment, is it? Yes. Is there further discussion? Senator Fawell. SENATOR FAWELL:

Well, no. This amendment was heard in committee, and it has the effect I think, of ... there ... there may be a lot, undoubtedly, a lot of pros and cons in regard to the bill as amended, I'm sure. Because the amendment has the effect of stating to the Superintendent of Public Instruction that you will not promulgate rules and regulations in regard to the question of achieving racial balance by means of busing. But, even so, I think everyone will agree that the bill, in it's amended form, is better than the bill in it's original form I don't ... I hope I am expressing that in the right way. The bill, in it's original form, said that local school districts could not utilize busing in order to achieve racial balance. And Senator Moore did spend quite a bit of time in working with others, and I think we came to the conclusion in the Education Committee that this could not be done. There are some districts that are under Federal order to utilize busing to achieve racial balance. There are some school districts that desire to utilize busing to achieve racial balance, as well as potentially other methods and it was generally felt by the Education Committee that there are some real problems in regard the bill as originally introduced. It was ... at that time then that this amendment was suggested which therefore sets before this Body the question as to whether or not the State Superintendent ought to have the power, or does have the power, by implication from the Armstrong Act to be able to promulgate rules and regulations which would mandate the utilization of busing in given instances in order to achieve racial balance. Now it's feeling of the Education Committee that whereas, obviously, there'll be variations of opinions; that this is the issue and it's a, I think, a much sounder issue to present before the Body. And, I think, when one further considers that a sponsor has the right to put the bill in the ... in the order in which he would desire to

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have it on ultimate presentation on 3rd reading, that ... the 1. 2. amendment here is ... is one that certainly ought to be adopted. 3. In my opinion, it makes the bill certainly a better bill, al-4. though I repeat, I well recognize that there are going to be some, and including myself and I am very closely examining 5. 6. the effects of the bill in its amended form. But ... the 7. Education Committee took all of this into consideration and felt that the bill ought to be upon the Floor for a full debate. 8. ´9. So I ... I think that certainly at this point I ... ...Mr. President and Members of the Senate, Senator Berning, the problem with this SB 215, lies in the fact that County Clerks in recording marriages have a tough enough time now to get the ministers to send back the necessary signed affidavits and have this put through. And, if this were to open up to all mayors and presidents of villages throughout the State, you would find that the County Clerks would soon be asking that the amendment would be on to take and repeal which you are just doing.

I appreciate the intent of your trying to do this for your district, Senator Berning, but...I had communication from the...Clerk in Kendall County and she has pointed out to me on numerous occasions the problems they get when you try to expand the area in which you can issue licenses, where you can ...have the marriages performed. And it's a tough enough problem for these County Clerks to keep record and keep track and make the ... proper...recording. For example a marriage license is issued in one county and somebody goes down into another county of great distance and...a little Village President performs it and that's the last you ever hear of it. There's no record...made of the...marriage. And, I think that you'd be opening up a can worms if we ever passed anything like this. I believe Senator Soper brought out one of the main points on that very thing.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

...Before I acknowledge the next Senator, I might remind you what the President of the Senate said this morning with the regards to not working evenings next week. Senator Ozinga.

SENATOR OZINGA:

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Mr. President, Mr...Senator Berning, I'm just wondering whether the Senator has a premeditated motive in this bill?

I would like to ask him, as an ex-JP; I can remember when the JP's used to perform the marriages and they did away with the JP's. Now, are you trying to do away with the mayors?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Berning.

SENATOR BERNING:

I have no ulterior motive, I assure you, and in this case, this mayor is a very dear friend and while he will not be in office forever, he will be there for the foreseeable future and for the interest ... of those downstate and the edification of them, I mi...might just point out that this is

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Latherow.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

... Senator Sours, I also notice you have in there, as you stated, about veterinarian care when needed to prevent suffering. Otherwise...you have an animal, let's say, of course, this is your bill; I suppose you have several animals that your interested in, and this animal is ill does this prevent you from treating it?

Because it says here you have to furnish veterinarian service
 for it. I...this I'm serious about.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours.

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SENATOR LATHEROW:

Wholly serious.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

I think, there again, we're talking about a rule of reason.

I think this would proscribe letting an animal needing veterinarian care needlessly to suffer without doing anything about it. Now that would not only...for example this...there was one in my' commun...not too long ago where a dog was pinned up in a little outhouse...a little outbuilding rather for five days with no food and water. This would proscribe that for...for example only.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Latherow.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

I...I can agree wholeheartily but you're...you're talking about dogs all the time. Now I'm...I'm talking about your description of animals. You say an animal means any living creature including me, I would assume, domestic or wild. Now, of course, when I treat this animal that I have on my farm and which I do on several occasions, an animal happens to die, then you haul me in before the...what society whatever you want and...and the courts of the State of Illinois and...say that I didn't properly treat that animal because I never had a Veterinarian for it and it died. Now, I wonder if this is the ...the Veterinarian's Bill or the Humane Society's Bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

This is not the Veterinarian's Bill; this is the Humane ı. Society's Bill. Only after it was filed and was on 2nd reading 2. did the Veterinarians happen to notice it. And Richard Lockhart 3. 4. indicated that to me recently that they favor this bill as a good bill. 5.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Latherow would like to ask another question on this noncontroversial bill.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

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Yeah. Well, I... I don't believe you quite answered the question on what position I would be in if the animal I treated personally, and I thought was sufficient, yet the animal died? PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours.

There again, Senator, all I can reply to that is it's a rule of reason. Now, I don't think any States Attorney is going to have you charged with any dereliction in a situation like that. Now, that's true in almost any statute on the books. It always has to be applied with reason not...not the day minimal rule, never...never that. It's rule of reason, because the States Attorney, well, knows that if you get yourself a lawyer and a jury. you're going to make him look sick.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Latherow.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

Well, of course...well, I'm glad you said look sick because ...because of course now...that's a sick attorney you're talking about. Now, ok. Now, let's...let's get back to this. You also say in there that I've got to provide that animal proper shelter and protection from the weather. Now, of course, I'm interested in this. I happen to own some property known as cows and I never put them in the shed. They run out year around and I...

from the Humane Society and they decide for the well...good l. of this animal that I should provide the barn and a place for 2. 3. them to be harbored during all times and bad weather. And I found that the secret to doing away with pneumonia and so on 4. 5. like that has been to close my barns doors and keep the cattle out of there. And, now, they say in there, it's their decision 6. they need shelter. I'm not providing shelter for them now. I'm 7. ġ. ...I'm disobeying the laws of the State of Illinois if this 9. passes then.

SENATOR SOURS:

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There again, Senator, I if...if that has been a common practice with you and they have survived in the past and they seem to thrive according to your statement, there would be no necessity for the shelter. Now as to whether you would have to do it would depend on the common practice in your area in like situations and if that did not exist, of course, no one would bother you or could bother you.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Latherow are you through with your cross examination?
You're not.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

No, I...I just like to say that, I think he's convinced me he has a bad bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Rock. Chair recognizes Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Just...Just...lest we compound the misery here...I...it's...

I am delighted frankly...I just told Senator Partee I wish we had a camera of the two gentlemen, seatmates in the blue coats... arguing with one another. They had all week to talk about this.

This is the most dilapidated bridge across that major body of water in the State. Most of the people live on the East side of the bridge and the factories are on the West. The bridge often slips a cog and strips a gear and they have to do 30 miles out of the way to go to work. The working men do. In 1967, this...a similar bill to this cleared this Body and the House unanimously, I think. It may have lost one vote throughout the process. It was signed by Governor Kerner in that year. Within a short time after his signature, the Federal Government mandated that an urbanized mass transit study be undertaken in all areas such as this before they would release federal money. This is a 50-50 Federal Project. Since then, we have had various federal mandates which have caused this bridge to be delayed, and delayed, and delayed and finally we can see the light on it. We are through, almost, with the

federal mandates, and we can let the contracts in this fiscal
 year. Therefore, I would appreciate a favorable vote on this
 bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

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Well, I just want to make two observations...I...I realize this is Senator Sommers' first bill and it's ... certainly a wealthy bill. ...And I'm sure very beneficial to his district. Two observations I would make, one as I understand the budget, it is not included in the budget although I understand the Chief Executive did make some statement the other night that he would favor...this concept. Secondly...I would point out that one of the arguments against any bill of this type is that it impairs the...validity of general revenue fund this happens to come out of the road fund, the motor fuel tax fund and with those two observations...I will tell him that since it is not in the budget; I think that it belongs on those...those lists which ...which we have yet to receive of priority items. And I intend to vote present.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

I'd urge everyone on this side of the aisle to support this. Actually...every thing that Senator Sommers said is true. This is probably the most dilapidated bridge you'd ever run into, and it actually connects my district which lies in two pieces, and is...probably more beneficial to me than it is to Senator Sommer. Maybe more beneficial to his people but, I've sat there several hours and waited for a boat to go under or gone around to get around to get from one part of my district to another. ... In a metropolitan area such as Peoria where...industry is now spreading down the West side of the river from Pekin...I think

that it's essential to these people. It serves a good purpose,
 and I'm taking the Governor at his word. He says full speed
 ahead, and I want to support him and what he wants to do, and I'd
 like to have the record show my name as the co-sponsor of this
 bill with Senator Sommers. And...with his leave and leave of
 the Body, I'd like to have my name appear as co-sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

All in favor of the motion by Senator Knuppel that his name be entered as a co-sponsor to this bill will signify by saying aye. Oppossed? Will be so shown. Senator Palmer. SENATOR PALMER:

...Will the sponsor yield to a question, please?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

He indicates he will. Senator Sommer.

SENATOR PALMER:

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Senator Sommer, before I ask you the question, I'd like you to know that I'm in favor of this bill and I'm going to vote for it. But I'm very much concerned about this. ...I would like to know that due to fact that this is your first bill whether you!re not too conservative in your request for ...for the amount...after all this is a very important bridge besides the good people of the State of Illinois that it will service; I am sure that the great Senator from Peoria, Senator Sours, will be using this bridge and yourself will be using this bridge, and Senator Knuppel, I want to make sure that this is a good bridge and will be a good bridge. Are you asking for enough money? I want to be sure about that. That's my question.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sommer, can you answer that question? SENATOR SOMMER:

...Senator Palmer, we want to make it a good bridge so that when you come to our area, you will travel in style.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Bruce.

SENATOR BRUCE:

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Yes, if I just may make this one observation, Mr. President. This particular bill points up what I feel to be one of the errors, so far in this Body, as it relates to appropriations. me point out one thing that Senator Howard Mohr has a bill on the calendar, SB 311. Now, heard testimony in the...in the Appropriations Committee that some one hundred and forty seven trains a day go through that particular intersection. I would think that that is a very meaningful project and 3 million dollars. My cohort in the House, Sen... Representative Keller has put in a bill to build a two million dollar overpass in Effingham because we have a lot of trains going through Effingham. difficulty is that we, in this Body, can not take any particular bill by itself and approve it knowing what the total budget of the Department of Transportation is. Now, let me show you where the flaw starts to build into this system. The Department of Transportation appeared on this bill and testified in opposition. Not in opposition to the construction of the bridge but to the use of 4.5 million dollars of taxpayers money this year. They are purchasing right-of-way today. Now there'll be a design study, perhaps next year. After that, they'll be testing the river bottom and sometime there'll be a development for the design of the bridge. And there'll be a bridge. Now 4.5 million dollars won't be spent this year. They testified that it won't be spent this year. I don't know whether Senator Mohr's bill... whether they'll build his overpass. I don't know whether Representative Keller's overpass will be done. We are not engineers I think we've got to rely upon the Department of Transportation to study and tell us what to do on these things. Otherwise, and I would alert Senator McBroom; we're going to have to take the procedure that Congress has and hire a tremendous staff

l. to do...do our own design studies in opposition to the De-2. partment of Transportation, develop our own Transportation 3. Budget. Now, if we're willing to do that, that's fine. 4. to just pass these bills willy-nilly without any idea of 5. what's going to be spent this year or next year, how much 6. money is going to be involved, I think makes this Body look 7. very bad. I would hope that...I'm going to remain...just 8. vote present on the bill. I think that until we develop some 9. sort of appropriations procedure, which we have not done as 10. we did last year on what to do with the stray bills that are 11. outside the budget. I think we'll just...each of us doesn't 12. know what's going to happen. Senator Mohr probably has got . 13. just as good a bill, there are other bills coming behind him.

Senator Mohr.

SENATOR MOHR:

Mr. President, I move the previous question.

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I intend...fully intend to vote aye, but I also fully intend to state without fear of qualification, and I spoke to the Comptroller last night and have spoken over the past couple of weeks. I think this appropriation is much too high. I think the cut that was made by this Body was a token cut...and I would just serve notice right now. I am not a member of the Appropriations Committee. I wish I were but I'll serve notice right now

that when the full appropriation bill comes through, there will be, and in my judgement should be, cuts made. He is, in fact, the first Comptroller this state has had. He has, in fact, encountered some difficulties in reorganizing an office with its duties and functions. However, the money he is requesting is, in my judgement, too much. We have sat and heard and listened and been besieged by the throes and cries and the weeping and gnashing of teeth of the members of the majority party of this Chamber and the Executive Committee as to the question of patronage. And, in my judgement, the additional \$300,000 that is tacked into this appropriation, which I feel frankly is unneeded is for that 65 or 85 jobs that will persumably go to competent people, as our Chief Executive has so well said. And, I would hope that we will all, when the full appropriation comes around, take a good hard look. I vote aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Continue roll call.

SECRETARY:

Mitchler, aye; Glass, aye; Senator Walker for what purpose do you rise? For what purpose do you rise, Senator Walker? SENATOR WALKER:

...Mr. President, you're on a roll call, and I don't want to interrupt the roll call, but I would like recognition...

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

You just did.

SENATOR WALKER:

... after you finish the roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Harber Hall, aye; Senator Buzbee, aye; Senator Netsch, aye. On this question the yeas are 32, the no's are nothing. The bill having received a constitutional majority is therefore declared passed. Anything on the Secretary's desk preparatory to adjournment? Senator Walker.

SENATOR WALKER:

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Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, a point of personal privilege. The scene is 1960, on the Floor of the House when a Senator...a House member, pardon me, by the name of Burhens killed my running mates first bill. Eddie McGowan's bill. And I'm addressing this to you freshman on the other side of the aisle, because apparently you want to start playing games. What you just did to one of the Senators on this side on his first bill, and this applies to the minority leadership over there as well as the Senator who took a walk back to the leadership's office. If you want to start playing games, you're going to find out that we can play a few games too. Now, the Senator who took the walk, I haven't looked at the calender here yet but I assure you I wouldn't call any of my bills for the next couple of weeks if I were you and maybe we can break you of that habit. I don't know what possessed you to do it. You know when we got the troups here, we're going to pass the bill. We're going to spend another 15 or 20 minutes debating I can't personally, and as I've said on the Floor of the House or on the Floor of the Senate on numerous occasions, perhaps I'm wrong. But, I can't see what you gained over there on that side of the aisle by your actions tonight. We knew this was going to be...we knew we...we were warned. So your security isn't so damn tight over there after all. I would close with this suggestion that the Senator who took a walk, I'd be a little careful on calling my bills for the next couple of weeks. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

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Well, we're getting excited now. Let's just calm down...

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

It's about time to adjourn, and we'll take care of that next week.

SENATOR PARTEE:

Let's calm down and adjourn...I don't think that anybody has to be lectured. The constitution in the statute makes everybody who is eligible to be a Senator to be an adult. So, there's no children here and when you talk about precedence...normally the first bill is not a bill of that momentous nature and is not normally that kind of a departure from ordinary circumstances. So, just relax Senator Walker...we are going to have to need your votes; you're going to have to need our votes on a lot of things, and I said early here that games can be played and that this should not be a Session which adjusts itself to that kind of a situation. I think we've reached a point, Mr. President, of diminishing terms, and it is my suggestion that we finalize this night Session as quickly as is humanly possible because we have reached a point where nothing meaningful is going to take place.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours. Gentlemen...

SENATOR SOURS:

I...too, would like to discuss something as a matter of personal privilege.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator, rises on a point of personal privilege...
SENATOR SOURS:

The same thing happened to me Senator Partee. Within the last week, when I had a bill that had 30 votes because one of our side did not support it and sure enough one of the members on your side just disappeared in thin air...in thin air. Now,

1. we discussed that in our private caucus this morning. So, we 2. were anticipating just what happened today. Now, so far as I'm 3. concerned personally, that isn't worth my breath. It's little. 4. it's mean, in the mean sense of the word mean and all it does 5. is engender a miserable mean reaction. And, when you get up 6. and discuss these platitudes; let's be cool, of course you didn't 7. have it done to you. I had it almost done to me. And, I had to 8. get someone on our side to talk with our errant member to get the 9. 30 votes because your man was found away from his chair. Now, 10. what Senator Walker said is true and there are 30 on this side 11. who are aware of it cause we discussed it in detail this morning. 12. So, we were not surprised, but I'll tell you we were disappointed 13. in the quality...in the quality of the opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Mother of the Year, Mrs. Homer Alvey of Lincoln. I would move
for suspension of the rules for immediate consideration of...
adoption of this Resolution.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

In a motion for the suspension of the rules, all in favor will signify by saying aye. The rules have been suspended and the Senator has requested that all Senators join in sponsorship. All in favor of the immediate adoption of the Resolution will signify by saying aye. Opposed no. The ayes have it and the Resolution is adopted. ...I think...all members ... was requested. We'll get to you gentlemen. Can...may we get off our Resolutions? Senator Latherow, for what purpose do you rise sir?
