5. Senator Sour moves to suspend the rules for the
6. immediate consideration of the Resolutions. All in favor
7. of the motion to suspend signify by saying aye. Contrary
8. no. The motion carries. Senator Mitchler.

9. SENATOR MITCHLER:

10. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I would point
11. out that Senate Resolution 381, is commending the Oswego
12. Panthers, of Oswego Community High School. First time
13. in this history of the school this fine Basketball Team
14. won the Super-Sectional Tournament and advanced Down-
15. state to the Illinois High School State finals. This
16. was a monumental occasion for the Grade School of Oswego
17. which surprised many people in the fact that it now has
18. an enrollment in excess of one thousand. And it is a
19. warning to all of the previous basketball champion schools
20. that we are on the march, and Oswego Panthers will soon
21. dominate basketball and Oswego will become the basketball
22. Capitol of the World.

25. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

26. ...Yes, Mr. President,...yesterday a similar Resolution
27. was introduced - introduced...by yours truly, commend-
28. ing the Modern Day Knights of Clinton County. And course,
29. I didn't have the opportunity to. . . I want the opportunity
30. to make a speech in their behalf. But I would like to join
31. . . . Senator Mitchler as a co-sponsor of that bill - be-
32. cause we're just a little bit better.

2. Senator Ozinga.

3. SENATOR OZINGA:

4. Just to let all of the big wheels go first - we have
5. a Resolution that comes up with one of the littler of the
6. little schools, which comes up for the first time from
7. Cook County and came in third in the Double A Tournament.
8. And it is quite an achievement to find a private school
9. achieving that and that Resolution will be forthcoming.

12. SENATOR HYNES:

13. Mr. President, as long as we are on the order of
14. basketball, I too, have a Resolution commending one of
15. the finest High Schools in the State, if not the country.
16. And like Senator Donnewald, I am not as eloquent as es-
17. teemed Senator Mitchler. But I would move to suspend the
18. rules for the immediate adoption of a Resolution prais-
19. ing the Morgan Park High School Basketball Team for its
20. winning of the City Championship of the Public League in
21. Chicago, and for its fine performance in the State Tournament.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. ...Senator, that motion has been put and carried. . .
24. we. . . and your Resolution which is Senate Resolution 382
25. will be included in the series that will be adopted momentarily.
26. Senator Sours has put the motion to suspend. Senator Sours
27. is recognized.

28. SENATOR SOURS:

29. Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I
30. want to advert to the spectacular basketball provenance of
31. the Peoria Central Lions, which all of you I am sure just
32. revelled when you saw the colored television on that weekend.
33. The Central Lions have been there in the finals or near the

1. finals the last several years on several occasions. And in-
2. cidentally it was Peoria Central who won - which won the
3. first State Tournament back more than sixty years ago. I'm
4. proud to present that Resolution.

6. Senator Latherow:

7. SENATOR LATHEROW:

8. Well, Mr. President, I . . . I . . . beings Senator
9. Sours brought up this first tournament, I'd have to say we
10. all recognize that was sponsored and created by Coach Omar
11. from Carthage College, Carthage, Illinois. But, I did
12. wonder, Mr. President, maybe if those of us who didn't have
13. a winner put in a Resolution, if that wouldn't save some
14. time.

14. Mr. President, I would move now that we resolve our-

5. specific names on the list. Proceed. Leave is granted.

7. SENATOR OZINGA:

8. I would then move that coming from the messages of

4. gratulations to and condoned...or not condoned but have said
5. this next gentleman is well qualified for the office and they
6. urge us to go ahead and confirm him. Now, that is - I would
7. move then the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of
8. Samuel J. Betar of Wilmette to be Public Administrator of the
9. ...as Public Administrator of Cook County for a term expiring
10. on the first Monday of December of 1977. All right. No ob-
11. jection on him being on this roll call. All right - then -
12. Then, from the message from the Superintendent of Public In-
13. struction where we had held over untill such time as necessary
14. documents were filed with the Secretary of State which had
15. been accomplished was the personality of George P. Nassos.
16. I would now move that he also be included in this Advisory
17. Message and move that the Senate advise and consent to the
18. nomination of George P. Nassos to be a member of the Private
19. Business and Vocational Schools State Advisory Board of the
20. office of Superintendent of Public Instruction for a term
