On this question, the yeas are The nays are none. The bill having received its constitutional required majority is therefore declared passed. SB 68. Senator Harber Hall. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HARBER HALL:

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

SENATOR HARBER HALL:

SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

As I explained the amendment, it...it merely makes two word changes, it offers the word, "nomination", that's the word, nomination, "or for delegate".

SB 101. SB 103. 18. Senator Sours. 19. SENATOR SOURS: 20. ...103 21. SECRETARY: 22. SB 103. (Secretary reads title of bill) 23. 24. 3rd reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 25. 26. Senator Sours. 27. SENATOR SOURS:

Ladies and Gentlemen,...Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, this bill provides that any person who causes damages to school property may be sued by the district in an action brought by the school board attorney or a special attorney appointed for that purpose. A taxpayer may bring such action on behalf of the

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district provided a demand to sue is made on the District two months before the filing of the taxpayers suit. There's one amendment which suggest that the attorney fee shall not exceed 1/3 of any money, goods or things of value recovered. That is exactly what the Bill does, no more, no less.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Further discussion? The question is, shall SB 103 pass? Senator Fawell.

SENATOR FAWELL:

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I...rise...in opposition to the Bill, Mr. Chairman. I think that what is being attempted here is laudable. But I would point out to the Body that what we are doing here is authorizing a third party, attorney, to inject itself into matter that involve the school board and ... we would actually have the situation where the Board of Education might decide for any number of reasons that it does not desire to bring an action against someone who may have caused some damage to the school property. And yet you would have a member of the public be able to come in and start an action on behalf of the school board, on behalf of the school district. Not only that he could obtain his legal fees from whatever recovery he might be able to bring about. You would have a situation where you could then have counterclaims against the school district because this attorney would lawfully represent the school district. And you would have the almost impossible situation, it seems to me, of having the school district, therefore, represented by two attorneys in the same cause of action and really having the two attorneys being adversaries of each other because the so-called public attorney who would come into the action of his own volition would not really be representing the interest of the Board of Education, who are the elected representatives of the district. Now, that's just one objection which I think

is a cardinal point. I don't have before me the particular 1. amendment which Senator Sours has referred to but as I recall 2. this bill was heard in Judiciary Committee, and...I...I 3. think that's perhaps a bit unfortunate. I think the Educa-4. tion Committee possibly should have been the more proper 5. committee to have heard this bill. But I believe ... it 6. really covers also...actions other than just property damages. 7. In Section 2 it refers to a taxpayer of any such district 8. may bring such action on behalf ...on behalf of the district. 9. And the action that is being referred to, I believe, if my 10. memory serves me correctly, is more than just property damages but 11. refers to...any property damage or financial detriment that 12. may come to the district as a result of the action of a third 13. party so that you could have in effect, it would appear to me, 14. the...situation where a...third party could object to any other 15. types of action by the board on the basis that it would bring 16. financial detriment, and thus you would have a third party 17. being able to institute a suite. And interestingly enough 18. being able to do so on the basis that he represents the 19. board whereas the Board of Education has taken a position 20. they don't want to do that which this man is doing for them. 21. It is just a bill that I...I believe is going to cause a 22. great deal of problems, and if we, I thin, really believe 23. .in our Board of Education representing us we ought to let 24. them make the determination in regards to when on behalf of 25. the district they're going to bring a cause of action. I know 26. that many of us are frustrated by seemingly an apathetic 27. position I suppose as we see it when we aren't sitting on 28. these Boards of Education, in regards to boards not bringing 29. there has been property damage or when someone has done 30. something which we believe is detrimental to the district. 31. But again I repeat that if we have the...faith in a basic... 32. Home Rule Philosophy in...in allowing the Board of Education

to make these decisions, I think, we must allow this...these decisions to be made by the Board and to go so far as to say that any member of the public, any attorney can come in and based upon a fee that he can collect which is more or less on a contingency basis, I think, is unthinkable and I...most respectfully, Senator Sours, must oppose this bill and would hope that we would not see fit to grant a majority vote of it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Gentlemen, it seems like when we get closer to adjournment time we always find one of these propositions facing us. It is the desire of the Chair that we adjourn at 2:00 o'clock and before that time we have some housekeeping to do. So I only admonish you to that extent, otherwise, it will be the prerogative of the Chair to sggest to the sponsor that he withdraw his motion and we take this from the record. That's try to expedite this because we do have committee meetings at 2:15 and some of us haven't had any lunch. Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

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Mr. President, Senators, I drive 150 miles a day to transact some business down here for the people. Now, I've had these bills sitting on because I didn't want to take time...on...on more cogent and more important matters. Now, I don't care when we do this but I do not want to be caught in the crunch because contrary to what the Senator from Naperville has averred this morning, he's wrong. And I'd like to have these bills heard some time soon. Now, if the Chair desires...

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

They are being heard now, Senator, if we can go on with a minimum amount of argument we can probably get...call the roll. SENATOR SOURS:

Well, I'd appreciate a favorable roll call. However, I do think there is one Senator who has some statistics which would

SENATOR PARTEE:

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This is a bill that might be properly described as officious intermeddling. The School Board has its lawyers. They know how to bring losses; they're lawyers. The bill suggests to me what once was a very grave concern of a common law; a concept known as barratry and maintenance where lawyers went about looking for a lawsuit. They were the ambulance chasers of their day. This kind of bill brings that kind of concept back into focus. I think it's a bad bill and I vote no.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Continue roll call.

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SECRETARY:

Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano, Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith, Sommer, Soper, Sours, PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

Just by...reply to Senator Partee, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, the fair City of Chicago recovered last year the pittance of 50 thousand dollars over a loss of 3 million dollars. Now, I say the taxpayer should not be subjected to that kind of useless, malicious destruction of taxpayer property. I vote aye.

SECRETARY:

Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Mitchler aye. Berning aye. Senator Buzbee no. On this question the yeas are 33, the nays are 6. The bill having received its constitutional majority is therefore declared passed. Senator Don Moore having voted on the prevailing side moves that the...that the vote by which this bill was passed be reconsidered and Senator Berning moves

that Don...that Senator Don Moore's motion lie upon the table.

All in favor of Senator Berning's motion will signify by saying age. The ages have it. The motion prevails and the bill is

passed. Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

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While we're on that order, Mr. President, Senators, I would like to table, which may be good news to some of the members here, my Senate Bill No. 101.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours asks leave of the Body for the purpose of tabling SB 101. All in favor will signify by saying aye.

Opposed?. The ayes have it and SB 101 is tabled. SB 112 - no - SB 116 is Senator Knuppel. 116.

SECRETARY:

SB 116. (Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Mr. President and members of the Body, SBll6, is a simple piece of legislation with a lot of complications. However, the purpose is there in the criminal law of the State of Illinois, if a person is guilty of killing another with his automobile, he may be charged, if he's alledged to be guilty, he may be charged with both involuntary manslaughter and reckless homicide, and tried at the same time on both accounts. And he may at the end of that trial be found guilty of reckless homicide, innocent of involuntary manslaughter or the reverse, or he may be found guilty of both, or innocent of both...This...creates a great deal of confusion in the law. It creates and has created conflicting verdicts where the judge or jury have returned a verdit of innocent of one and guilty of the other when the crime as charged is identical clear down to the...radiator cap on

the automobile which struck the person who lost their life.

2. This bill is designed to attempt to remove that confusion

and to make the killing by an automobile that of reckless

4. homicide and create a misdemeanor with a penalty of from

5. six years...six months to one year instead of the present

6. confused situation where a person can be charged both with

,,

a felony and a misdemeanor. Found guilty of one and innocent

of the other and to create what must have been intended when

the language of reckless homicide was brought into the criminal

law, and that is a single offense...when this occurs called

reckless homicide. ... I think this straightens out the law.

I think it's a good law. It...it abolishes the confusion that

exists in the criminal code. And I would ask for a favorable

roll call.

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PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours...Senator Knuppel...Senator Knuepfer.

SENATOR KNUEPFER:

Well, Senator Knuppel, I...I'm no expert in the field but what...what I'm interested in is why you took the small of the two penalties rather than the greater of the two penalties.

...We have had...and I have seen some offenses, we have had them in the county that I live in, that in...as I read them are totally inexcusable. Now, murder has been committed, a persons life has been taken...I'm...I'm...I...I guess not being an expert I...don't know..I don't know the law about the...as to the degree of confusion, but I am concerned about what in effect I see simply reduces the penalty for some offenses that; as I have seen them have been very grievous offenses. And there should have been a grievous and serious penalty. Now, by taking it down to the

misdemeanor category, as I read what your doing; you have said this is not merely as serious offense as if you had allowed the

class 4 felony charge. Can I have an answer to that?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

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May I answer the questions?...I'm not saying and this was here for a number of days, I'm not saying that there's anything unique about...about the penalty that I'm calling for I think the headnote - mis - describes the purpose of the I'd be willing, if...if that's the wish of this Body, if it's only the penalty that they're quarrelling with I'd be willing to call it back to 2nd reading. It sat there for a number of days or weeks...and it was my understanding that Senator Roe was going to propose an amendment. The thing didn't work out. Now, I...I'm not attempting to say that this may be the penalty that should be required. But what I'm trying to do is not to lower the penalty as such, but to get the confusion out of the law. Now, if it's the will of this Body that the penalty be that of...that of a felony; that's fine. However, that isn't what happens. I mean I understand what your saying, too, but generally these cases involve people who ...who kill somebody with an automobile where the...the penalty is not that severe. Now, I had a case in my county where a man was on the wrong side of the road, he was drunk, driving 55 mile an hour in a 25 mile zone, found guilty. You know what he got? Ninety days. So I'm not really lowering the penalty. The penalty is from six months to a year and that's about all that most of them draw anyway. Now, if that penalty doesn't suit you I'll be happy, if it doesn't carry, to...to call it back, put on postpone consideration and call it back, if that's the will of the Body. But the purpose of this is to get rid of the discretion that's in the States Attorney to charge one man with a felony and another who does the same thing with a misdemeanor, or maybe to charge him with both in the same count and have a return verdict of guilty one and innocent of another. It's...it's one offense, it should have one penalty, whatever, that penalty is. Now, I'm not saying there's anything sanctur sanct about the penalty I'm

proposing.

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PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Soper and then Senator Bell. Senator Soper.

SENATOR SOPER:

...Mr. President and Senator Knuppel...I talked to Senator
Roe and I thought it was our understanding you said that you
had this on...on the...on the Calendar for many weeks...you
may have but in Judiciary when we heard this we talked about
this thing, Senator Knuppel, and it was our understanding
that you were going to make it the greater penalty and I
thought that had been done with this now. If it hasn't been done
I'd suggest that you call it back to 2nd, put on the amendment
make it the greater penalty and I think you'll solve the
situation. Otherwise, I...I'd ask this side of the aisle to...
resist...the pasing of this...this form.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Bell.

SENATOR BELL:

Senator Knuppel...I've got the greatest respect for your legislation, generally, that you are introducing and I find by far most of it I support. But I really standing here, now, I think representing the interest of the States Attorney of my county, when I have to say that...I feel he needs the flexability of the law currently as it exist. And it would seem to me that if we; either way we go, whether we classify it as a felony with a higher penalty or classify it as a misdemeanor we're going to guts some of the States Attorney's prerogatives for being able to deal with the various situations that may arise...is what seems to me that they need that flexability.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Mr. President, in answer...in answer to his question it isn't flexability because the appellate courts now are in a state of flux. What happens is confusion because he charges both and as a

result you end up with him found guilty of one and innocent
 of the other and the two are incompatible. It's one offense
 and it ought to have one penalty. Now, I think Senator Roe
 wanted to be heard I'm happy to call it back to 2nd reading,
 if that's the will of the Body to increase the penalty, Senator
 Roe.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

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If your going to call it back to 2nd reading there's no need for further debate. Is it your desire...Senator Roe?

SENATOR ROE:

Mr. President...members of the Senate...perhaps there's been a little breakdown of communication between Senator Knuppel and myself. It was my understanding, and I think it was the understanding of many of the committee members that the bill would be amended to provide Class 4 Felony penalty for reckless homicide. Now, if I created the misunderstanding with Senator Knuppel I...I apologize for it. I could support that type of bill. I think it would be a good bill and...that was my understanding.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Pass it then because there has been a confusion because yesterday was my understanding that Senator Roe was going to and his aide attempted to draw the amendment and he said, well, go ahead so I did. So I'll recall...I'll...I'd like to recall... just pass it now and I'll recall it to 2nd reading.

When Les Gunning and Captain Louder over on the east aisle came to me with the bill, I asked them to procure bipartisan sponsorship and they went and got seven of each...side of the aisle. The bill passed committee unanimously. It's been on 3rd reading since the 28th of March and Senator Walker has really done more work on this than I have and if there's any questions...Senator Walker, I think, is in a position to answer them. But my understanding the capsule is 60 years retirement age for State Policemen.

The question is shall SB 121 pass? Senator Knuepfer. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

McCarthy or Senator Walker, but the question I'd like to ask is...what...what is the relationship of the early retirement to the pension fund? Now, I assume the pension fund is based upon...working till age 65 with a State contribution and an employee contribution to age 65. Now, if you retire somebody early under most pension plans that I'm familiar with this diminishes their pension, if it doesn't diminish their pension, there isn't enough money available. I'm addressing this question to whoever can answer that, but I want to know what the effect is on the pension plan or does somebody simply wait five years before they

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senators Rock, Walker, and McCarthy are all rising to
 answer that question, Senator McCarthy. They're yielding

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Thank you, Mr. President, I understand that the...Mr. Wineburg is taken...has taken no stand on this. He says that the administrative...measure in regards to the pension fund. Do you have further information, Senator Rock?

...before the Public Employees Pension Laws Commission and the Commission did not take any position on the bill except to point out as Senator Knuepfer pointed out that the enactment of this measure would effect an increase in cost to the State through the State Employees Retirement System. The increase in cost, however, the actuary informs is of relatively small proportions and almost negligible and therefore the Commission takes no definite position.

I want to speak on the bill right now or for this Body for the State of Illinois. ...My only problem on it isk and I understand the problem of trying to get employees to retire early. That's a battle we've fought in this legislature ever since I have been here. There is, I won't say a companion bill, but there is a bill floating around here that I have some awareness of that takes downstate teachers and permits them to retire at age 55. That age 55, of course, at full funding of the pension plan. I can not...I can't quarrel Senator McCarthy with 10 or 11 employees because that's obviously not a very significant number. But I think this Body ought to be aware that there are a number of other bills relating to other parts of the pension plan that may have very significant effect on the funding. Now, that wouldn't be so important perhaps if we had pension plans that were 100% funded and we were only talking about small reductions. Since we do not have pension plans that are 100% funding...funded and any...and in fact on the average are some 30% funded then I think we have to concern ourselves maybe not with the 10 or 11 people that are involved, but with the precedent that might be established, the rational for why not including all state employees, downstate
