23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Senator Don Moore.

25. SENATOR DON MOORE:

26. Thank you Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlement of the
27. Senate. Before I proceed, Mr. President, I would appreciate
28. all of those Senators who are in their office, listening
29. on the squawk box to come down to the Floor of the Senate.
30. This is a bill that effects each and everyone of us, and I
31. think it is of utmost importance that we have a full membership

1. of the Senate in considering SB 154. Never before has a
2. synopsis of a bill more accurately explained the bill
3. than what it does here. And I quote, "Redistricts the State
4. into 59 Legislative Districts. Effective upon becoming
5. law". I know that each and everyone of us, Mr. President,
6. would like to make a little change here or there in each
7. of our Districts. But, as soon as we change one census
8. tract in one district, it just keeps rippling down
9. throughout the entire State of Illinois. I'm sure that
10. this Body is aware that the Illinois Supreme Court has
11. held our Legislative Districts in compliance with the
12. one man, one vote rule as promulgated by the United
13. States Supreme Court. A problem did come up, and we were
14. mandated by the court to reapportion ourselves during
15. this Session of the General Assembly because the court
16. held that all of the so-called public members appointed
17. by the different leadership of House and Senate were not in
18. effect...in effect public. And therefore it is incumbent upon
19. this Session of the General Assembly to reapportion itself.
20. What SB 154 does is to take the exact map as was approved
21. by the court in compliance with one man, one vote and
22. enact it into law by the proper legislative...processes that
23. we have such as being passed by the Senate, passed by the
24. House and signed into law by the Governor. I would like
25. to call the attention to the members that our map is perhaps
26. the most accurate reapportionment map of any State in the
27. Union when it comes to one man, one vote. Our districts are
28. approximately within one tenth of one percent in compliance
29. with one man one vote, on a population basis. I think that
30. it is apparent to all of us that this map favors neither
31. party. We can see that by the closeness of the votes that
32. we have on this Body, 39 and ...or 30 and 29 and the closeness
33. of the votes in the...in the House of Representatives. This

1. bill will meet the mandate of the Illinois Supreme Court.
2. If we do pass this map the terms, and it is my opinion,
3. and we are procuring an Attorney General's opinion on it,
4. the terms of office that we have which are not mentioned
5. in this bill, but which are enacted in the Election Code
6. will remain as set forth because this is not a decennial
7. census reapportionment as required by Section 811 of the
8. Election Code. I believe this is a good bill. To
9. make sure that it has been and is as...the accurate pronouce-
10. ment of the Illinois Supreme Court as being in compliance with
11. one man, one vote, both of the Republican staff and Democratic
12. staff members of the Elections Committee have reviewed this
13. bill. We did come up with a series of minor amendments
14. that they have found that the Reference Bureau made very
15. minor errors in such as the spelling of words and so forth.
16. I believe we have a map here, I am confident we have a map
17. here. That if enacted into law will resolve and make us
18. in compliance with the mandate of the Judicial branch of
19. government. I'd be happy to answer any questions...any...

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Any further discussion?

22. SENATOR DON MOORE:

23. If not, I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

25. The question is, shall SB 154 pass? Senator Partee.

26. SENATOR PARTEE:

27. We have not caucused on this subject and so that the
28. members on this side would be alert and alerted to the position
29. we're taking, I think I should say succinctly at least
30. that I've talked with Senator Clarke and with Senator
31. Moore and Senator Harris and it is of course in the best
32. interest of the legislature that we get this subject be-
33. hind us. I know much about this map, sir, having served

1. on the committee that drew it and we have some pride
2. of authorship here because it developed despite all
3. the criticism that came both from both parties, newspapers
4. and others as to what kind of map this was. The last
5. election showed it to be a very genuinely good map in terms
6. of representation, equal representation. So I would urge
7. those who are within this side of the Chamber to support
8. this legislation.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

10. Senator Clarke.

11. SENATOR CLARKE:

12. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I don't want
13. this moment to pass without saying a few well chosen
14. words because I too, have some familiarity with this map,
15. though not as much as my colleague on the other side. I
16. didn't get a chance to be in on the intimate drawing of it
17. that he was, as I recall. I would say first that I was one
18. of the sponsors, or the sponsor of a bill last December to
19. do this exact same thing, to pass this map in its entirety
20. exactly as it was approved by the Supreme Court and Drawn
21. by the Legislative Reapportionment Commission. Since that
22. time there has been a change in the situation nationwide,
23. as you are aware. There was a United States Supreme Court
24. decision that spoke to the very problems that we wrestled
25. with two years ago and, I'm happy to say, I think had some
26. rationality in terms of what they said regarding this
27. question of reapportionment. Because we were faced at that
28. time with supposedly an exact mathematical requirement
29. under the one man, one vote to whereas the sponsor
30. of this bill said, I don't know whether it was one-tenth
31. of one percent, but it was well under one percent deviation.
32. And as I recall that meant not just splitting cities, and
33. not just splitting counties, but it meant splitting precincts

1. and it meant splitting down into census blocks. And
2. I suggest to you that where the Minority Leader said that
3. this map is in the best interest of...

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM);

5. Let's take our caucuses off the Floor, please.

6. SENATOR CLARKE:

7. This map may be in the best interest of the...this
8. Legislative Body. I don't think it's in the best interest
9. of the citizens of this State, and they're the people that we're
10. here to represent. Because the fact of-the-matter is that
11. where you have these kinds of divisions right down streets
12. and between houses and within villages as we have, especially
13. in the metropolitan area, people don't know who their
14. legislators, representatives are. They don't know who to
15. go to and they're confused as heck. And I submit that that
16. makes for bad representation. Sure, it was an even map in
17. terms of the outcome of this past election. But I think even
18. that, only time will tell, as to whether it was a fair map
19. proportionally or not. But I think that the key thing here
20. is what is in the best interest of the people. Now, I know
21. I'm hollering down a tunnel because this is ready to go
22. and is going to pass and be put on the Governor's desk as
23. is. But I just want to read to you a Section from the
24. Supreme Court decision that indicates not only that the
25. deviation now can be up to sixteen percent, because of other
26. factors that should be considered. But the Supreme Court
27. decision in the case of Virginia, Mahan vs. Howell said the
28. policy of maintaining the integrity of political subdivision
29. lines in the process of reapportioning a State Legislature,
30. the policy consistently advanced by Virginia as a justification
31. for disparity of population, is a rational one. It can
32. reasonably be said upon examination of the plan that it does
33. in fact advance that policy, and I would submit to you

1. that that was the exact position and statement that we
2. took in that Reapportionment Commission two years ago
3. that much of our activity in...this Legislative Body deals
4. with municipalities, with laws effecting home rule units
5. and other types of bodies at the local level and they have
6. a right to have a unified voice down here and they don't have
7. under this plan. For that reason, I think it's a bad plan,
8. and I think that we are setting into State policy for tenure
9. something that was done where we have new guidelines and
10. have an opportunity to do something different that would be
11. in the better interest of the people.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. There are no further discussion, the question is
14. shall...Senator Nimrod.

15. SENATOR NIMROD:

16. Mr. President, I was not present when this original
17. map was drawn up, and I'm aware, and I've seen the inequities
18. that have existed especially in around the metropolitan
19. area. And for the very reasons that Senator Clarke has
20. brought out which do not recognize the lines of political
21. subdivision, and since I have worked very closely with this
22. map in the past and had a chance to observe it, I noted
23. that there are some 450,000 Suburbanites who have for all
24. practical purposed been disenfranchised by the present map.
25. And on this basis their votes are diluted in with the city
26. district which does not give them an opportunity to select
27. their representatives. In addition to that, throughout the sub-
28. urban area a number of the villages and a number of the
29. cities in that area, have been broken down into such units
30. as where the various people do not know who represent them
31. and for the very reason which Senator Clarke mentioned about
32. the divisions which were established. I realize that there
33. is a very little support for changing this map at this particular

1. time, but it is a map...it is a map that we are going to
2. have to live with for the next ten years, and I do believe
3. this not only exists in the area of the suburbia and Cook
4. County area but also in a number of downstate districts.
5. I would hope that we would give this some thought and make
6. sure that we do take this into consideration and that we
7. can tackle this problem of reapportionment on the basis that
8. would be fair to all people within the State and in it's
9. present condition. I cannot support this matter.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

11. Senator Welsh.

12. SENATOR WELSH:

13. Mr. President, members of the Senate, because of a
14. campaign promise I made to the citizens of the Village of
15. Oak Park, I too, together with Senator Clarke and Senator
16. Nimrod will have to oppose this bill.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

18. Senator Partee. Senator Savickas.

19. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

20. I move the previous question.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

22. Senator Savickas moves the previous question. All
23. in favor of the...moving the previous question will signify
24. by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The question
25. is shall 1...SB 154 pass. Upon that question the
26. Secretary will call the roll.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Bartulis, Bell,

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Senator Bell.

31. SENATOR BELL:

32. I'd like to just make the observation fellow Senators,
33. Mr. President, in reference to my vote here, that it's to my

1. understanding during the past sixteen years this legislature
2. has been reapportioned, I guess, four, maybe five times, and
3. we face the possibility of doing it yet again. And you talk
4. about your constituents not knowing who their Senator is
5. or who their Representative is, we've just gone through one
6. election to try to stabilize that initially. If we do this
7. thing yet again, reapportion ourselves yet again, we're
8. going to find ourselves with our constituency even more fouled
9. up with them trying to relate and know who represents
10. them. I think that the one tenth of one percent representa-
11. tion of meaning that...well meets the Constitutional mandate, and
12. the...of the one man, one vote rule, and I certainly support
13. this bill and would hope that we would be able to bring
14. some stability to the people of our district to know just
15. who their Senator is going to be for the next few years any-
16. way. I vote aye.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. Continue the roll call.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Clarke,
21. Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald, Dougherty,
22. Fawell, Glass,

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Senator Glass.

25. SENATOR GLASS:

26. ...Thank you Mr. President, for...for the reasons expressed
27. by Senator Clarke and Senator Nimrod. I am also going
28. to vote no. I think that the area that I represent,
29. Wheeling Township in Evanston Township is so badly split
30. by this map that...it is not a good map for them. It's not a
31. good map for suburb an Cook County, and I vote no.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Graham,

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. Mr. Secretary, members of the Senate, I too, have a
3. strange looking district, if you take a look at it.
4. I started out in 1958 with four townships in one county.
5. I now have thirteen townships in four counties. But I
6. also recognize the climate of the General Assembly and the
7. situation in Springfield, and I could not assure you that
8. by any adverse action here we could come out with anything
9. better, and I vote aye.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan,
12. Knuepfer, Knuppel,

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Senator Knuppel.

15. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

16. I...I think I'm the tip on the dog's tail. I think
17. I'm the tip on the dog's tail here getting here by 337
18. votes and if anybody ought to be unhappy with this reapportion-
19. ment map, which put me in a new district where I had to move
20. into it and...and put me in a new district with only
21. 9,000 of my constituents, I ought to be the unhappy party.
22. I'm happy with the people that I inherited. I was happy
23. with the people that I had. I do think that these districts
24. are grotesque. I feel certain that under the Supreme
25. Court decision we now have that when we do reapportion
26. again we're going to be able to do a whale of a lot
27. better job and people will be able to identify better
28. if we can follow county lines and other well defined
29. geographic as well as political lines. Nevertheless,
30. despite my own happiness, I'm going to vote because
31. of my happiness with my new people with the reapportion-
32. ment as it is, and I'll vote aye.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. The Senator votes aye, being happy and unhappy both,
2. aye. Continue the roll call.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Kosinski, Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy,

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. Senator McCarthy.

7. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

8. Yes, Mr. President, members, I think Senator Bell
9. brought up a couple of good points why we in the legislature
10. should ratify this map by this Act. He pointed out, I think,
11. extremely well that the people whom he represents should be
12. given the first consideration and when you change lines five
13. times since 1956, you're not really giving political stability
14. and identification to the people that you represent. So
15. I echo and reaffirm what Senator Bell said and compliment
16. him for his logic. I think there is another consideration
17. that we might take into mind and that is that we should
18. pass this bill overwhelmingly. There are enough complications
19. in this Session as to achieving legislative product where
20. the people will want us to act insofar as legislation is
21. concerned on the merits and to not pass this legislation
22. and it's true to reapportionment, I think would just ask
23. another terribly complicating political consideration to
24. each decision that we make from now until the end of July,
25. insofar as we'd be into this business of attempting to
26. re-draft legislative lines with a personal consideration,
27. mine, which would be not healthy for the ultimate legis-
28. lative products that must come forth. So, Mr. President,
29. I'm pleased to ratify that which the Commission did. I'm
30. pleased to do it as a legislator because I think reapportion-
31. ment, redistricting is a legislative function. This is
32. merely a ratification of what has been done, we're speaking
33. for the people that sent us here from the districts and

1. I certainly along...would like to see an overwhelming
2. vote in this, and I'm pleased to vote an aye.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Continue the roll call.

5. SECRETARY:

6. Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch,

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. Senator Netsch.

9. SENATOR NETSCH:

10. Mr. President, my vote is yes. It expresses no views
11. on the merit of the reapportionment in which I was not a
12. participant. I feel, however, that the Supreme Court was
13. correct in its opinion that the act of reapportionment was
14. unconstitutional for the reasons stated. That leaves
15. us then in the position of either...taking up another bill
16. on reapportionment and turning this Session into a nightmare
17. or passing this bill which would re-establish the original
18. districts. Under those circumstances, I think, there is no
19. reasonable alternative except to vote yes.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee,
22. Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano, Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer,
23. Scholl, Shapiro, Smith, Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski,
24. Vadalabene, Walker, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. ...Senator Schaffer would like to be recorded aye.
27. Senator Vadalabene would like to be recorded aye, or...oh,
28. you want to speak. For what purpose do you rise, Senator?

29. SENATOR VADALABENE:

30. Well, everybody's been happy and some have been
31. unhappy, now I'm sad. I was reapportioned into a new
32. district; was one which you couldn't possibly believe
33. could happen to any district, and I won by 27,000 votes

1. So I vote aye.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. We couldn't guarantee you anything better. On this
4. question, Fawell, aye. Hall, aye. I think you're down.
5. You're on. On this question the yeas are forty-eight, the
6. nays are seven. The bill having received it's constitutional
7. majority is therefore declared passed. Senator Johns.

8. SENATOR JOHNS:

9. Mr. President, having voted on the prevailing side,
10. I move that we reconsider.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. You move that...the bill by which this bill was passed
13. be reconsidered.

14. SENATOR JOHNS:

15. Right. That...

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

17. Senator Carroll moves that the motion of Senator
18. Johns lie upon the Table. All in favor of the motion
19. to Table the motion of Senator Johns will signify by
20. saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it, and the motion
21. to Table prevails. Gentlemen, now I think we have a
22. request here and it's sent from Senator Sours. We'll
23. try to get back to you. We have some more Resolutions,
24. and I would like to then go to the order of Senate Bills
25. 2nd, move them up and then Senator Sours, perhaps we can
26. get to your motion.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Resolution 107 by Senators Hynes and Ozinga,
29. and it's congratulatory.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Senator Hynes moves for a suspension of the rules
32. for the immediate consideration of Senate Resolution number
33. 107. All in favor of the suspension of the Rules will

1. signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The
2. rules are suspended. All in favor of the immediate adoption
3. of the Resolution will signify by saying aye. Opposed.
4. The ayes have it. Senate Resolution 107 is hereby declared
5. adopted.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Joint Resolution number 31, by Senators Nimrod,
8. Latherow, Harris, Merritt, Sommer, Scholl, Bell, Howard
9. Mohr, Shapiro, Weaver, McBroom and Soper.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. Senator Nimrod.

12. SENATOR NIMROD:

13. Mr. President this...senate...this Resolution is one
14. which calls for the House and the Senate to review and to
15. study the EPA laws both in the...under the...the Act and
16. also with the Attorney General. And I would move for the
17. immediate suspension of the rules and the adoption of the
18. Resolution.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Gentlemen, you've heard the motion. All in favor of
21. the suspension of the rules will signify by saying aye.
22. Opposed. The ayes have it, the rules are suspended. All
23. in favor of adopting Senate - House Joint Resolution number
24. 31 will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have
25. it, and the Resolution is adopted.

26. SECRETARY:

27. Senate Resolution number 108 by Senators Harris, Partee
28. and all members of the Senate.

29. (Secretary reads Resolution No. 108)

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Ladies... Ladies and Gentlemen, please, continue, Mr. Secretary.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Senate Resolution 108.

1. (Secretary reads Resolution No. 108)

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. Senator Harris.

4. SENATOR HARRIS:

5. Mr. President, I'm sure we all want to join in the
6. adoption of this Resolution to our great and good friend,
7. Shelby Vasconcelles. I move to suspend the rules for
8. the immediate consideration of the adoption of the
9. Resolution.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. Senator Harris requests that all Senators join in the
12. sponsorship of the Resolution. He moves that the rules be

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

3. SECRETARY:

4. SB 155 (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. SENATOR SOURS:

6. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
7. I...I should like to refer to Senate Bills 324 and 325.
8. I left an amendment up there this morning. I think it's
9. on 325.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. Your desire is to do what? It's on 3rd reading.

12. SENATOR SOURS:

13. No, that isn't it, it's on the other side.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Your desire is to return Senate bill 325....

16. SECRETARY:

17. They're not up here.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. ...to the order of 2nd reading for the purpose of con-
20. sidering an amendment. Is that correct, Senator?

21. SENATOR SOURS:

22. Apparently, it's not up there. I'll have to dig it
23. up again. I thought I'd put it up there, but I would
24. like to while you're on that same order refer to SB 206.
25. I do have an amendment for that which I've left with...
26. I've left up there.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

28. Well, Senator Sours, let's complete one thing at a
29. time. Are you moving 325 to be returned to the order of
30. 2nd reading for the purpose...

31. SENATOR SOURS:

32. Well, apparently we have no...we have...the amendment
33. is not up there.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. We do have it I believe.

3. SENATOR SOURS:

4. All right.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. And gentlemen, when you're bringing the amendments
7. down if you would give them to Kenny and not to Ed Fernandes,
8. it would help expedite this because, Mr. Fernandes has
9. both hands, all three hands are full. The Secretary...
10. you have the amendment on 325 there...or...you...what...
11. where is 206, Senator?

12. SENATOR SOURS:

13. It's on the same order of reading.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

15. You want to move then, we will take your motion on
16. 325 from the Record and move that 206 be returned to the
17. order of 2nd reading for the purpose of the consideration
18. of an amendment. All in favor will signify by saying aye.
19. The bill is now on the order of 2nd reading. Senator Sours.

20. SENATOR SOURS:

21. I left the amendment up there on 206, Mr. President.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Amendment No. 1 by Senator Sours.

24. SENATOR SOURS:

25. This bill, or this amendment simply is for clarifica-
26. tion because it...it refers to a paper, and all this does is
27. change the word from paper to newspaper. It's just a...a
28. finer language expression, that's all the bill...that's
29. all the amendment does.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. A definitive Resolution...amendment presented by
32. Senator Sours. All in favor of the adoption will signify
33. by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it and the amendment is

1. adopted. Any further amendments? The bill will be returned
2. to the order of Senate Bills 3rd. What is your disposition
3. on SB 325? Do we have that amendment?

4. SENATOR SOURS:

5. I'm going to get that amendment. If you'll just proceed,
6. I'll call your attention to it when we have a lull.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. We will proceed. Senator Knuppel, for what purpose do
9. you rise? You are recognized, sir. Senator Knuppel.

10. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

11. In the same order, I'd like to return SB 116 to 2nd
12. reading for the purpose of an amendment. We were mixed up on
13. that yesterday. The amendments are on the desk. And the
14. purpose is to change the penalty for reckless homicide from...

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Let's return it first, and then you can explain your
17. purpose.

18. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

19. All right.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. The motion is that SB 116 be returned to the order of
22. 2nd reading for the purpose of the considering an amendment.
23. All in favor will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes
24. have it. The bill is now in 2nd reading. Senator Knuppel
25. will explain his amendment.

26. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

27. I'll offer the amendment which was suggested yesterday
28. which increases the penalty for reckless homicide from that of
29. Class 3 misdemeanor to a Class 4 felony. I assume this meets
30. the comments...that Senator Roe...right. I'll offer that
31. amendment.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Senator Roe indicates that it does and...is that Senate

1. amendment number one? Senator Knuppel moves the adoption
2. of Amendment No. 1 to SB 116. All in favor of the adoption
3. will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it,
4. the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? The
5. bill will be returned to the order of Senate bills, 3rd
6. reading. And we are now on the order of Senate Bills, 3rd
7. reading. And we are starting at the top with SB No. 2, Senator
8. Karl Berning. He indicates he has no interest at this time.
9. Senator 20...or SB 20, Senator Latherow. SB 21, Senator
10. Chew is not here. SB 24, Senator Latherow, he is not here.
11. SB 26, Senator Walker. SB 48, Senator Don Moore. He in-
12. dicates that he would like to have the bill read a 3rd
13. time.

14. SECRETARY:

15. SB 48 (Secretary reads title of bill)
16. 3rd reading of the bill.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

18. The Chair recognizes Senator Moore for the purposes
19. of explaining his bill. Senator Don Moore.

20. SENATOR DON MOORE:

21. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I think
22. SB 48, Mr. President is a bill which I would just like to
23. read. I think everyone is familiar with it. I think they
24. know pretty much how they are going to vote upon it. The bill
25. was amended yesterday by Senator Vadalabene's amendment, now,
26. reads as follows:, "Nothing herein shall be construed to
27. permit or empower the State Superintendent of Public Instruction
28. to order, mandate or requiring...require busing or other
29. transportation of pupils for the purpose of achieving racial
30. balance in any school". I think that we are aware that the
31. Superintendent has promulgated guidelines which mandate a
32. fifteen percent mixing of children because of race, color,
33. nationality, and so forth. Wherever this has happened

1. there has been tremendous resentment from the people. I
2. don't like to refer to this as an anti-busing bill. I like
3. to refer to it as a neighborhood school system bill. I
4. know the people in my district, black and white alike over-
5. whelmingly are in favor of maintaining the neighborhood
6. school district. There were usually three considerations that
7. they took into account when they went ahead and bought their
8. homes. One was transportation. Two was the shopping area and
9. three what...where is the school, how far away is it? What
10. kind of an education are my kids going to get. There has been
11. resentment. It started out in my district in Oak Forest,
12. Park Forest, Markham, Hazel Crest, Homewood. It has spread
13. out now into Rockford, Danville, Peoria, other areas of the
14. State. And I think that this bill will clarify the air as
15. far as the authority of the Superintendent to promulgate such
16. guidelines with the threat of withhold of State aid in the
17. event the local school districts do not conform. This does
18. not in any way prevent a local school district from busing
19. within its ...within its district itself, if it...if it...
20. sees fit. I'd be happy to answer any questions if there
21. are any one may have on the bill. If not, I would move for
22. a favorable roll call, Mr. President.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. The question is, shall SB 48 pass? Upon that question
25. the Secretary will call the roll.

26. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

27. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
28. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
29. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
30. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
31. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
32. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
33. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,

1. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,
2. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,
3. Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. Conolly aye. There has been a request...Davidson aye.
6. Been a request for a call of the absentees. The absentees
7. will be called.

8. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

9. Carroll, Chew, Daley, Donnewald, Dougherty, Fawell,
10. Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Newhouse,
11. Palmer, Rock, Roe, Romano, Soper, Swinarski.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. On that question the yeas are thirty, the nays are
14. twelve. The bill...having received a constitutional majority
15. is therefore declared passed. For what purpose do you rise,
16. Senator Rock?

17. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

18. ...Verification of the roll call.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Hall has asked for a verification of the roll
21. call. A verification will be had. Do you want a roll call
22. of those voting in the affirmative, Senator Hall? Senator
23. Hall. Senator Hall. Do you want just a call of the roll of
24. those voting in the affirmative?

25. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

26. That's correct.

27. SECRETARY:

28. The following voted in the affirmative: Bartulis, Bell,
29. Berning, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Davidson, Glass, Graham,
30. Harber Hall, Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler,
31. Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Nimrod, Ozinga, Regner, Roe,
32. Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Sommer, Soper, Sours, Vadalabene,
33. Walker, Mr. President.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

2. SB ...48 receiving a constitutional majority withstanding
3. the verification of roll call is therefore declared passed.
4. Senator Merritt... Forty...

5. SENATOR MERRITT:

6. Mr. President, having voted on the prevailing side
7. I move the vote by which SB 48 be...be reconsidered.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Senator Merritt moves the vote by which the SB 48
10. was declared passed be reconsidered. Senator Mohr moves that
11. Senator Merritt's motion lie upon the Table. All in favor
12. of Senator Mohr's motion will signify by saying aye.
13. Opposed. The ayes have it and the motion of Senator Mohr
14. prevails. Senator Richard Newhouse.

15. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

16. Mr. President, I was trying to get your attention
17. before the result of the roll call was announced, and I
18. know it was inadvertently that I was not able to get the
19. Floor at that time. At this time I would like to ask
20. leave of this Body to be recorded a resounding no on that
21. bill, Mr. President. I had hoped that that bill would
22. simply quietly die and for that reason I did not speak
23. against it. It's a bad bill. I simply do not want to be
24. not recorded on it. So if you will record me no, Mr.
25. President, I'd appreciate it.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Senator Newhouse seeks leave of the Body to be
28. recorded no on SB 48. All in favor will signify by
29. saying aye. No...those opposed. The ayes have it and you
30. will be so recorded, Senator. Now, Senator Sours while
31. we're cleaning up our cats and dogs here says that he
32. has SB 325 amendment in order and may we get that out
33. of the way. And gentlemen we are going to attempt to

1. adjourn at 2:00 o'clock or slightly before. So we're going,
2. hopefully, with your cooperation to start winding down today's
3. Session. Senator Sours.

4. SENATOR SOURS:

5. This amendment to SB 325 is an amendment that the
6. Commerce Commission desired. And this is Amendment No. 2, I
7. believe, is that correct? 3...

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Senator Sours moves the adoption of Amendment No. 3
10. to SB 325, and all in favor of that motion will signify
11. by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The amendment is
12. adopted. Any further amendments? 325, will be returned
13. to the order of Senate Bills on 3rd reading. Do we have
14. any business on your desk? Senator Buzbee, for what purpose
15. do you rise?

16. SENATOR BUZBEE:

17. Point of parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President. On that
18. verification of the roll call, the Chair announced that the
19. SB 148 had just been verified.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. I said SB 4, I hope.

22. SENATOR BUZBEE:

23. No sir, you did not. You said SB 148...

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

25. I...I corrected it later and said SB 48, I'm sure.
26. And I think the record will so prove.

27. SENATOR BUZBEE:

28. Okay.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Gentlemen, again, it has been agreed by leadership
31. and certainly by the Secretary of the Senate that this
32. stack of bills on the Secretary's desk at this time will
33. ...there at this time will be read a 1st time on Saturday

1. morning at 9:00 o'clock. Now, some of you who are having a
2. problem with bills perhaps in Reference Bureau or attempting
3. to get them up for introduction Saturday, if you will please
4. indicate to Senator John Davidson or me, or Senator...or
5. Mr. Fernandes your desire to have the bills delivered to
6. either one of the three of us expressing your desire, we
7. will get them introduced at the meeting Saturday morning.
8. And to expedite the business today and to get on to our
9. committee meetings with the leave of the Body, we would
10. like to read these bills, the remainder of them, Saturday
11. morning for introduction. Because they have a hundred and
12. some bills to process in there today. Leave is granted and
13. Mr. Secretary, we have any messages from the House.

14. SECRETARY:

15. A message from the House by Mr. Selcke. I'm directed
16. to inform the Senate the House of Representatives has
17. adopted the following preamble and Joint Resolution, in the
18. adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of
19. the Senate, to wit: House Joint Resolution 14 and it seeks
20. to establish an interim commission, joint commission.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

22. Executive. Senator...Any other messages from the House?
23. Senator Swinarski, I called your name four or five times, but
24. now you want to make a motion and will you state your motion,
25. please?

26. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

27. Mr. President, regards to SB 156, I wish to recall it
28. from...from 3rd reading and ask leave of the Body and move to
29. recall it from 3rd reading to 2nd reading for the purposes
30. of amendment.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator Savickas moves that SB...Swinarski, I'm sorry.
33. SB 156 will be returned to the order of 2nd reading for the

1. purpose of the consideration of an amendment. All in
2. favor will signify by saying aye. The bill is now on
3. 2nd reading, you will state...

4. SECRETARY:

5. Amendment No. 4 by Senator Swinarski.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

7. You want to explain your amendment...

8. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

9. Before the Clerk reads it I would..I move to Table...

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

11. It's the Secretary, it's not the clerk.

12. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

13. Excuse me. I move to Table Amendment No. 2 and 3.

14. I have Amendment No. 4 in the hands of the Secretary to be
15. read. What it does, it consolidates Amendment 2 and 3,
16. and deletes some of the overlapping of wordage. There is
17. no substantive change whatsoever. So I move to Table
18. Amendment 2 and 3 of SB 156...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Swinarski, your motion is to reconsider the
21. vote by which Amendments No. 2 and 3 were adopted.

22. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

23. I move to reconsider the vote by which Amendments No. 2 & 3
24. were adopted.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. Move to reconsider the vote by which Amendments No. 2 and
27. 3 to SB 156 were adopted. All in favor of that motion will
28. signify by saying aye. The ayes have it. The motion is recon-
29. sidered. The Senator now wishes to move that Senate...that
30. Amendments No. 2 and 3 to SB 156 be Tabled.

31. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

32. I move to Table...Amendments No. 2 and 3 of SB 156.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

All in favor of the Senator's motion will signify by

1. saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The motion to
2. Table prevails, and we are now considering Amendment No. 4
3. to SB 156.

4. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

5. Would the Secretary read the amendment, please...

6. SECRETARY:

7. Amendment No. 4.

8. (Secretary reads Amendment No. 4)

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM)

10. Do you wish to explain your amendment, Senator
11. Swinarski?

12. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

13. There's no substance change, it's just an overlapping
14. of wordage. And I move to...I move to adopt Amendment No. 4.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. This clears up the unworkability of Amendments No. 2 and
17. 3 and moves the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to SB 156. All
18. in favor will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have
19. it. The amendments are adopted. The bill will be returned to
20. the order of 3rd reading...the Senator Partee and Senator
21. Harris. Senator Partee. May we give leave...may we have
22. some order please. We are trying to work out some business
23. of the Senate. May we have leave of the Body for the
24. Secretary's office to accept committee reports Saturday
25. morning so they will be recorded and so the actions of
26. today's committees will be on the Calendar when we come
27. back.

28. SENATOR PARTEE:

29. Leave.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. All in favor of that motion will signify by saying aye, and
32. leave is granted. And it is so ordered. Now, I...Senator
33. Latherow moves that the Senate do now stand adjourned until

1. 9:00 o'clock, Saturday morning. All in favor of that
2. motion will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The Senate
3. stands adjourned until 9:00 o'clock, Saturday morning.
4. 9:00 o'clock.

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
