Mr. President, members of the Senate, I don't want this moment to pass without saying a few well chosen words because I too, have some familiarity with this map, though not as much as my colleague on the other side. I didn't get a chance to be in on the intimate drawing of it that he was, as I recall. I would say first that I was one of the sponsors, or the sponsor of a bill last December to do this exact same thing, to pass this map in its entirety exactly as it was approved by the Supreme Court and Drawn by the Legislative Reapportionment Commission. Since that time there has been a change in the situation nationwide, as you are aware. There was a United States Supreme Court decision that spoke to the very problems that we wrestled with two years ago and, I'm happy to say, I think had some rationality in terms of what they said regarding this question of reapportionment. Because we were faced at that time with supposedly an exact mathematical requirement under the one man, one vote to whereas the sponsor of this bill said, I don't know whether it was one-tenth of one percent, but it was well under one percent deviation. And as I recall that meant not just splitting cities, and
