Assignment of bills are not mind readers really. The least 14. they could do was to give us a note asking us to assign 15. these two bills to a particular committee. And if this 16. isn't done from now on, I'm going to offer a serious ob-17. jection to bills being transferred after they're assigned. 18.

SENATOR GRAHAM:

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Mr. President and members of the Senate, I consider this as one of the important measures of the day today. And if we were living in Grafton, Illinois or in Quincy, or in many places.along the Des Plaines River or in the Northeastern Illinois area where flooding is rampant, we would feel that there is no political floodwater. This water affects people from both sides of the political aisle. And I think it is high time that the people in this State know that one Body in Springfield, and hopefully more, the Illinois State Senate is willing to call the attention of this... discrepancy to the Governor, recommended to the people that is something that we should consider now. We had a budget request of 9.15 million dollars, an increase of 2.4 million dollars. Last year much was said during the campaign about the need to do something about the Mussey Woods Area in Northeastern Illinois. This was a big campaign issue. And I was trying to help in this campaign by calling the attention to the candidates, both of them, and to the people that it was high time that we did something about the Flood plains Act of 1971, which was instituted and passed in this Body and subsequently by the House and signed by the Governor. This action on the part of the Executive then or now prescribed by me would have not cost one thin dime. All I ask was that they appoint an agent or an agency to compile all of the materials that are available from all of the people who have conducted all the flood surveys and see if we cannot, in fact, do something about establishing a flood plains when it is a flood plain and preventing development on it, at the expense of people down stream. I heard last year that we were doing our homework on this. In August we were doing our homework, and you know this reminds me of the Irishman's granary, out on the farm onetime and he'd...he'd lost a tremendous amount of grain, and one of the neighbors said to him why don't you

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- fix your granary? Well, he said, you know, it's like this. 1.
- When it's dry, I don't need the roof, and when it's raining, 2.
- it's too damn wet. Now, that's about where we are on the flood 3.
- control measures in the State of Illinois. We have a Chief 4.
- Executive of this State that made one real pragmatic speech
- last week when he said to the people that were flooded, well, 6.
- there's one comforting thing; we don't have it as bad here 7.
- at all. And on the Quincy radio this morning, the commentator 9.

It means a great deal to those who have lived outside of the City of Chicago and have not had the experience that Chicago had earlier with elected school boards. The problem that was sought to be cured by the method that is used by Chicago now for selection of a school board was precisely to take the school board out of politics, that was the whole purpose. Now, I can sympathize

with my colleagues desire to get representation from his 1. 2. own area. I think that's...that is as it should be. З. problem it...it seems to me is that the cure is going to be worse than the disease. The fact is now that the 4. 5. selection processes is such that that end can be achieved. It seems to me that the simple method to do that would be 6. to require that those persons selected to be appointed to 7. the board come from those lists that are submitted by a 8. committee that is appointed for that purpose. The problem, it 9. seems to me has been that on the appointment of those 10. persons to the school board, that there has been a definite 11. move to go outside those lists that have been submitted 12. by a committee, selected for the purpose of narrowing 13. school board selection. It seems to me that step ought 14. to be taken first. Now, there...there are two...two parts 15. to this and I think we have to be awfully careful about 16. Number one is we're talking about the paid elected 17. school board, and that puts entirely another connotation 18. on what it is that we're discussing today. We're not 19. simply talking about, discussing about electing people 20. and lowering the tax rolls, having people on the board 21. for the reason that their primary and sole interest is 22. service to the Board of Education. We're talking about 23. a job now, and we're talking about a job that...no... 24. question must become political by virtue of the method 25. by which people get that job. I think we ought to be very 26. clear on this, and I would submit to you who live outside 27. the City of Chicago that we take a look at history, that 28. what happened when we did at one time have a school board 29. that was partisan and that incidently was corrupt. And I'm 30. not saying that those two things must go together. 31. the facts of life are that this legislation, this method 32.

of selection in the first place was arrived at solely for

the reason that in the City of Chicago, that constituency
 found that other types of political...politically oriented
 school boards were completely unacceptable, the pot simply
 too big and there's too much involved. It seems to me that
 we have to do something less than destroy completely in
 order to bring order out of chaos. Thank you.

## PRESIDENT:

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Senator Glass.

#### SENATOR GLASS:

Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate; I rise to support this bill. I recognize the statements of Senator Newhouse are made in the best interest of his District and come from a Senator from the City of Chicago who is in perhaps a better position to speak on this bill. However, I am discouraged at the present time by the method of selection of these school board members. They are appointed by the Mayor of the City of Chicago and they are not appointed from a list of names submitted by any citizen's group. There is no requirement that the Mayor appoint anyone suggested by the citizen's group. He may appoint anyone he wishes. Now a school board is an example of local government, it should be local government at it's best. And I see no chance of that occurring unless the people in the district can at least have the right to vote on who will represent them in this most important part of the largest community of the State. I think we've seen in the teacher...recent teacher strikes and the negotiations that followed some of the dangers in having this... school board appointed and being in the compulsion that exists when the Mayor himself engages in the negotiations and the deliberations with the school board who he has appointed on one side, the union on the other. I think it's not a healthy situation for us to be in. I

think we ought to return to the people this basic right ı. to elect members of the school board. And I would urge 2. support of this excellent bill. 3. PRESIDENT: 4. Senator Wooten. 5. SENATOR WOOTEN: 6. 7. Will the sponsor yield for a question? PRESIDENT: 8. He indicates he'll yield. 9. SENATOR WOOTEN: 10. Is the school...are members of the school board 11. presently paid? 12. PRESIDENT: 13. Senator Swinarski. 14. SENATOR SWINARSKI: 15. No, they are not, Senator. 16. PRESIDENT: 17. Senator Wooten. 18. 19. SENATOR WOOTEN: Why the provision then for providing a salary for 20. members of this particular school board? 21. PRESIDENT: 22. Senator Swinarski. 23. 24. SENATOR SWINARSKI: In my closing statements, one of the matters that I 25. hope to discuss is exactly that particular issue. The 26. primary thing is why pay them. It is because we have 27. approximately a one billion dollar budget in the City of 28. Chicago. The salaries that would be paid would represent 29. less than 1/20th of one percent of the budget of the 30.

City of Chicago, because of the complexities, because of

the vastness of the Chicago School system; it is a full

time job. There are people, however, that are willing to

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1. serve and have served for no salary whatsoever. However,

2. with district representation where you're looking for

3. a broad spectrum of people, we don't want people who are

4. just the wealthy, the poeple who are just retired, the

5. people who just live on Lake Shore Drive to be able to serve.

6. But we want people from all the communities, the blue-

collar worker to be able to be present on the board, and

this man working a full time job with the complexities

of the board of education must receive a salary even

though he wants to serve his community, in order to be

able to feed his family, in order to be able to live

properly.

### PRESIDENT:

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Senator Wooten.

### SENATOR WOOTEN:

Senator, would you then envision this a good example for the rest of the State to follow because some of us live in districts that in which school boards handle considerable sums of money?

### PRESIDENT:

Senator Swinarski.

# SENATOR SWINARSKI:

I would say that it's necessary for each school district in the State to look upon its own problems and to judge its' own problems in the proper perspective. And, therefore, I wouldn't say across the board that all communities should or should not. I believe that each community should look within itself as to its answers, and if the answers are to be paid because of the complexities of education, certainly such legislation should be brought forth. PRESIDENT:

SENATOR FAWELL:

ı. Well, Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate, the Educa-2. tion Committee did spend quite a lot of time on this bill 3. and judging from the debate I've heard thus far, I 4. don't believe one very significant fact has been brought 5. out. Several years back when Senator Lanigan presented 6. a bill along these lines, I did support the measure which 7. at that time called for a referendum to be presented 8. to the people of the City of Chicago so that they could 9. determine whether they wanted an elected board. And the point that I want to bring out is that the people 10. 11. of Chicago, by, I believe, a three or four to one majority, soundly defeated the plan for an elected board. Now, I 12. 13. think that for us in Springfield to turn around and thus mandate for the people of Chicago that which in a 14. 15. referendum they had turned down is to follow a concept 16. that customarily we certainly do not follow here in 17. Springfield, and one that I could not follow. that if this bill were amended so that a referendum were 18. 19. attached to it, then we could say that the people of the 20. City of Chicago could make this all important decision, 21. especially inasmuch as the rather new concept of \$25,000 22. per year board members is also being established within the 23. purview of this legislation. So based on that... I don't 24. believe I can support it, and although I think that much of 25. what Senator Swinarski has said is correct, the Board of 26. Education in the City of Chicago, I guess, have been having 27. problems for a long time, and perhaps he is quite correct that 28. the membership on the Board is not quite as representative as it ought to be. Nevertheless, I come back consistently 29. 30. to the fact that, apparently, at least all of the citizen's 31. organizations which have written to me as Chairman of 32. Education are quite firmly against this concept, though 33. I am beginning to suspect that the political organization

which is in control in the City of Chicago may be one organization which has switched it's view and apparently is in support of this type of legislation. But I cannot support legislation which, in the face of an overwhelming defeat by the people of the City of Chicago, will turn around and in a very short period of time come back and say whether you like it or not, you've got it. And thus, I am... stand in opposition to the bill and believe it ought to be defeated unless there is a referendum attached to the provision.

# PRESIDENT:

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Senator Partee.

### SENATOR PARTEE:

Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I've listened rather carefully to the debate here and this is not an easy question. But Chicago is the only City without an elected school board. There have been times when I was in opposition to an elected school board in Chicago and then changed my mind and voted for the last bill which would have given Chicago an elected school board. I personally would prefer that there was a referendum on the bill. I'd vote for it with a referendum or without a referendum. I think the real basic question here is representation. We have been concerned over the years about being represented. A war was fought over a phrase...called taxation without representation is tyranny. It's been very clearly pointed out here that the method of selecting the present school board members has left, for a lot of people in my district, disenchantment. I think the Mayor has done as good a job as could have been done under rather difficult circumstances in picking from a list submitted to him, persons to serve on the school board. And let me be quick to say that what I am saying here today does

not in any way denigrate the work of those members of the present school board. But more and more people in my district are interested in their schools and interested in the personnel. There have been...there has been instance after instance in my community where ad hoc groups have gone to the school board and have asked for and in some instances rather forceably demanded change and a different kinds of approaches because they felt that their children are being short-changed in terms of the kind of education that they were supposed to be getting. So I take the position that perhaps we should bring about more representation so that the people in each of the individual areas can choose the person who is to represent them and that the representative who is to be on that board from that area be not chosen on some basis of tokenism or not be...be chosen on the basis of balance in terms of the entire board. I think certainly we should give the people of our communities the right to make that kind of selection. Now, what does it do in terms of community involvement? More and more people are commenced to be more and more interested in who is going to be their alderman to represent them. I think it's probably...properly and well fit, it fits quite well the concept of representation, that in the '75 election, if this bill becomes law, the alderman of the various areas as well as the members of the school boards from those areas will be on the same ticket. I think that will intensify the interest of the people in those areas about the kind of government and the kind of representation that they are going to have. I think it's a good bill, and I intend to support it.

31. PRESIDENT:

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Senator Knuepfer.

SENATOR KNUEPFER:

.This debate must be doing ex-Senator John Lanigan some service. John stood up here on these Floors and thundered and hollered four years ago, six years ago and then four years ago, and finally there was an ascent and he got the referendum. I agree with Senator Fawell; the referendum obviously was meaningless, if you now choose to say, well, the people didn't know what they were talking about, didn't make intelligent decisions, and we're going to overrule them. What strikes me as curious, however, and perhaps I should of asked that it be put on in the 2nd reading as the Home Rule Amendment, is that from the side of the aisle who insists upon the Home Rule Amendment on so many issues, you are now coming to us and said...saying in this question, we don't want Home Rule. We want to tell our people how they're going to do it. We don't even want to ask them, as Senator Fawell suggested, whether they want this or don't want this. is what we're going to give them. I suggest to you on the other side of the aisle that you are going to be, in my opinion, totally displeased by the results of what you get if you get an elected school board. There are very divisive forces, you must be well aware of them. The Mayor of any major City cannot escape the responsibility whether it is given to him by statute or not, for the operation of all of the City functions. The people aren't that sophisticated, if they have a problem with the schools, with the garbage, with any other city service, that responsibility can only go to one place. And simply by suggesting that we're going to set up a school board with the divisiveness that will exist, I think you are going to create a monster. The only thing I can say in favor of the salary of \$17,500 is that what's necessary to draw the so-called political type, without salaries

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l. you're not going to get them serving. I think the 2. people ought to have spoken. I think you're making a 3. mistake, and I recognize that while you...there are 4. undoubtedly the votes to pass this in the Hall, in this 5. Hall, you ought to be aware that you who have said we 6. want our freedom, we want to rule ourselves are now sug-7. gesting, no, let the Legislature tell us how to do it. 8. PRESIDENT:

Senator Buzbee. All right, Senator Howard Mohr.
SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

... Yes, Mr. President, very briefly, I'd like to

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PRESIDENT:

see Chicago conform with the other cities and villages in the State of Illinois, and I too sat here and listened to former Senator John Lanigan fight for this legislation. And being, still being a close friend of John Lanigan, I respect his opinion, his judgement; I also respect that of the only Republican member of this Senate from the City of Chicago, Ed Scholl, my seatmate who thinks there's a definite need for this, with regard to paying a school board member. I see nothing wrong with this in the case of the City of Chicago. I think maybe if they had a paid board they might resolve some of their problems on a much faster and better basis than going for the...the volunteer type, or those that are drafted to serve in these positions. I've dealt with a number of volunteer boards over the years, and some are good and some you just can't get to really move and to...to really devote the time that is required. I'm going to support this and hope that other members do. And I move the previous question.

Senator Mohr has moved the previous question. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary nay. The motion carries. Senator Swinarski may close the debate.

### SENATOR SWINARSKI:

First of all, I'd like to...

SENATOR SWINARSKI: 5. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I'd 6. like to address myself for / just a moment to the matter 7. of the referendum that was mentioned a moment ago. 8. true that there was such a referendum a couple years ago, 9. however, that particular bill was not the same as this 10. bill is. At the time the election took place, it took place 11. in June of the year and a little bit less than nine percent 12. of the voters of the City of Chicago came out and voted. . 13. Also, two people who are...the primary opponents of the referendum two years ago, do support it. I've talked 24. to them and they believe that it's time for a change in 25. the City of Chicago. It... I asked in just one moment, for 26. 27. the roll call, I'd like for a moment though to say that

I believe we must have a linkage between public opinion

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and public policy and that of periodic elections and

they have no voice in who administers school policy.

They want a degree of intimacy between themselves and

today in district representation in school boards, and 1. it would be a reflection of educators ideas as the com-2. plexities of education have demanded increased attention 3. to wise policy making; school board membership has made in-4. creasing demand on the time and energy of those serving on 5. the board. A decent salary is required to draw some pro-6. fessionalism to a board with a budget of over one billion 7. dollars. Chicago's board members today are trustees, and a 8. trustee is one who basically does not seem to care how things 9. are being run. But a majority of the people in Chicago are no 10. longer lacking in interest and they care about quality educa-11. tion and they do not want delegates rather than trustees 12. or bystanders. They want, one, men who will represent their 13. active interest. I can go on, and on, and on, but I'm asking 14. you Gentlemen today to give Chicago the opportunity that 15. you have in the rest of Illinois in electing school boards 16. and giving districts and neighborhoods the opportunity of 17. being represented in the City of Chicago. And I , ope the 18. Senate will see fit to give the City of Chicago this chance 19. for democracy in education. And I ask for a favorable roll 20. 21. call. Thank you.

# SENATOR BUZBEE:

# SENATOR FAWELL:

I must confess Senator Swinarski, I am impressed with the...with your ability to sway entire bodies of men and women here. Why, I can recall as has been brought out when Senator Lanigan tried to convince that side of the aisle that even with a referendum this is what you ought to do and the...the debate that I listened to, the impassioned pleas that that bill ought to be stopped, and suddenly a freshman Senator has come in our midst and has shown us how to truly sway many, many people, and I...I...it's...it's impressive to me to see it occur, because often, it isn't often that one is able to see men and women change their minds, and so I... I... Senator Swinarski, I want to take my hat off to you, there was a wag back here that said that because the Democratic Party and the County of Cook has changed it's mind, that that had something to do with the vote too.

But I... I don't think so. I think that it's fantastic

job you have done here. But in all due respect, although
 you have been tremendous in this presentation, I still must
 vote no. I'm sorry, I...I do vote no.

Senator Hynes.

SENATOR HYNES:

I believe that this legislation will accomplish something that the people of Chicago do, in fact, desire. And that is a closer, more direct, more immediate relationship with a Body that is making decisions every day that dramatically effect the lives of every citizen in Chicago. Education is perhaps one of the most important issues that we grabble with here in the General Assembly. It is a matter that is uppermost in the minds, I think of ... of most of the people of this State. Chicago is unique in the State of Illinois in that it has an appointed school board as opposed to an elected school board. This bill, and particularly with the provision that members shall be elected by district, will enable the various communities within Chicago to have a more direct voice in the management and operation of the schools in Chicago. I support the concept of an elected board as far as the State Board of Education is concerned. And I support it locally as far as the City of Chicago is concerned. Education has become a massive responsibility. I think that it is imperative that we have men and women on that board who are directly responsible to the electorate. I have become, since my election, a great believer in the electoral process. I think that it makes decision makers more responsible and more responsive to the people, and

Mr. President, members of the Senate, my...my vote is aye.

I'm happy to vote aye.

SENATOR JOHNS:

SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

But, Senator Partee has said from time to time, one of his favorite quotes is that wisemen change their minds and fools never. I'm glad to see that there...the wisemen on the other side of the aisle are

PRESIDENT:

Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

As a Chicagoan, this is not an easy issue to decide because in many respects there is no right way to decide it. My vote is going to be no. A couple of years ago in Chicago, we did have a referendum on the question of electing or appointing a school board. At that time, I was firmly opposed to changing the system to an election and I...I worked to that end. I'm not so sure now that given that opportunity again I would take the same position. I've had some second thoughts about that particularly because we remain virtually the only

place in the entire State of Illinois where our school 1. board is appointed and not elected. But elections are a 2. peculiar process in the City of Chicago, and I think 3. it's fair to point out that sometimes in terms of the results, it's kind of...it's difficult to tell the 5. difference between the elective and the appointive 6. process. And so, I'm not sure that many of the thoughts 7. and sentiments that have been expressed involving 8. participation of the people, meaning all of the people 9. who are not otherwise represented, if we turn to an 10. elective process would necessarily be the result. I 11. fully agree that the school board in Chicago should not 12. be dominated by Lake Shore Drive, even though Lake Shore 13. Drive is in my District. I would honestly say, with due 14. respect to the Mayor of Chicago, I don't think the board 15. is dominated by Lake Shore Drive right now. And if it is, .16. or if it is too much that way there is a very simple way to 17. change that. The Mayor has the power of appointment; he 18. need not turn to Lake Shore Drive or any other small part 19. of the City for his appointees. Finally, it seems to me 20. that...and I'm not going to invoke home rule in it's tradi-21. tional sense, a school district is not a Home Rule unit in 22. the traditional sense. But I cannot think of any decision 23. that more effects the...the people of Chicago than the 24. decision as to how they will choose the people who run 25. their very troubled school system. It seems to me that 26. this is a decision we should be allowed to make for our-27. selves in a referendum. It should not be imposed on us 28. by a very peculiar mix of motivations which I think are 29. reflected in the votes here today. Please, let us do it 30. again, but let us decide this for ourselves. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

Mr. President, Senators, my vote on this bill is yes. I spoke on it previously, but I want to simply say that I did omit to say that the PTA testified against this bill in committee. The Urban League opposes this bill. The NAACP in Chicago opposes this bill. My vote is no, I'm...I'm sorry. The NAACP opposes this bill. And let me just make one passing comment as to the representation, the factor has been laid on so heavily here, and that is previously the board did have the kind of representation that we...that we have referred to. And if my memory serves me correctly that was known as the Era of the Gray Wolves. Now, if you will recall the Era of the Gray Wolves was when a lot of people stole the treasury blind through the Board of Education. And I'm not intimating that might happen but that is a problem of the political process which we sought to avoid with the present...method of school board selection. I would hope that we could reform or rather apply whatever poultice is needed by simply saying that those selections for the board must be from that group of persons submitted for selection rather than going out...outside that list. It seems to me that that's the simple solution, and I vote no on this measure.
