I have passed out a folder 14. containing editorial opinion of some of the major newspapers 15. throughout the State. Not only in Chicago but throughout 16. the State. There is also a free capsulized opinion sheet 17. which says in essence that the time has come that this State 18. should have a limited branch banking act. I would point out 19. Mr. Chair...Mr. President, members of the Senate, some of 20. the ideas that were brought out in the Senate Committee. 21. There are, in fact eleven hundred and fifty commercial banks 22. in the State of Illinois. There are twelve hundred seventy-23. two cities, villages and town in our State, seven hundred 24. and fifteen of these cities, villages and towns have a bank. 25. Five hundred and fifty-seven are without a bank. Most of them 26. are of such size that raising the five hundred thousand dollar 27. capital to start a bank would probably in all candor be an 28. uneconomical venture. However, their inhabitants would be con-29. venienced and better served in many such communitites if, in fact, 30. they had a bank. The whole thrust of this bill, SB 934 is to 31. provide a service vitally needed to the economy to the State of 32.

33.

Illinois, to the people and the citizens in the State of Illinois.

do not think SB 934 had the kind of hearing, the kind of public airing such a concept deserves. That, Mr. President, is the reason for this motion to discharge that Committee, to bring that bill to the attention of the full Senate here on the Floor. And I would ask a favorable roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

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Senator Merritt, for what purpose do you arise?
SENATOR MERRITT:

Mr. President, members of the Senate, those of you who in this Body know me the best know that I'm no lengthy debator. This issue was, in my opinion on last Friday, given perhaps one of the most fair hearings I've ever heard in any Committee that I've ever attended. By agreement and what I mean is total agreement of both the proponents and opponents they agreed to take three witnesses each, try to limit their remarks to ten minutes. I didn't even shut any of them off; if they ran slightly over that, no one was shut off. I told all of our members that each would have an opportunity to do all the questioning they desired. There was no attempt at any time to shut anybody off. I think if my memory serves me correct, it went on for approximately two hours. I have never seen a more orderly group; the room was crowded with bankers from both sides. They were completely orderly and I certainly feel like they had a very, very fair hearing. Now, at the same time, all of us here who were in Committees last week know what a tremendous job was done by those Committees, all of them trying desperately to meet our May 12th deadline. And I think we can all take pride in the fact we, for the most part accomplished that, with the exception of the Appropriation Bills and those that were going to be exempt. I think that all of us knew if I had a bill in Committee that if I didn't have it out of there by the 12th, it was virtually a dead issue and I was willing to accept any bills I had on that same

- basis. Now, the issue before us on this motion is not
- 2. whether we're going to be for or against branch banking.

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- 3. That's not the issue at all. The issue is, are we going
- 4. to believe in the Committee system that over the years
- has functioned well in this Body. If not, then I don't
- 6. know how many bills are still sitting in Committee in the
- 7. same status that this one is, still sitting there, and if
- we're going to spend all of our time in the coming days 8.
- 9. and I'm sorry this had to be the first of these type of
- 10. motions, if we're going to spend all of our time doing this
- on the Senate Floor, then I wonder sometimes if the Committee 11.
- 12. system should prevail. I happen to be one Senator that
- 13. believes in it. It's the only way that we can do an
- 14. orderly business here in the Senate. And I certainly
- 15. would ask those that believe not necessarily for or
- 16. against branch banking but in the Committee system to join
- 17. me in resisting this motion. Thank you. 18.

SENATOR ROCK:

Mr. Chairman, I...Mr. President, I indicated the

1. other day that I wanted to make something clear and I just 2. like to speak to it so far as I am listed as the second 3. sponsor on this bill and my name was used in a variety of 4. letters that went out to bankers over the State indicating 5. that Senator Rock and I were going to sponsor this motion to 6. discharge the Committee. And for you newcomers this is the 7. type of problem you might fall into. I have been for several 8. years a co-sponsor with Senator Horsley two years, four years 9. ago on the bill that breaks the concept of a holding company, 10. banking concept. I favor that idea. I have for a good many years been opposed to branch banking even in a limited sense 11. 12. because this has very vital repercussions in a county the 13. size of Cook County. The person who is a very honorable 14. person that came to me early in representing this group 15. early in this Session asking whether I again supported him in this concept and I did and the delineation was not made 16. 17. that there were two bills and one was a branch banking bill. 18. bill was introduced the 14th of April, the last day so I didn't 19. get a chance to look at it because I was gone and the first I 20. learned that I was a sponsor was when I read it in the 21. editorial in the Chicago Daily News. And I just want to 22. make it perfectly clear, the situation, the trap you can 23. fall into was just a misunderstanding but I'm not sponsoring this bill. I'm not going to vote for this motion and I 24.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

just want you to know that.

Do you have any motion to make with regard to your name? Senator Wooten.

SENATOR WOOTEN:

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Yes, Mr. President, just an innocent inquiry from one of the newcomers. I have heard the argument made before that we should not go against the Committee's judgment. Then, in innocence, why is there provision in our rules for discharging

a committee if this is never to be done? I would assume that we have that recourse and when...when there is strong feeling on a certain subject and I just assume from reading the rules that this is something that could be done and while it may not be the customary thing to do and obviously is extraordinary, there really are no provisions against it.

And it is a course of action left open to us and I'm assuming that no one is calling that provision in to question.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

There is no prohibition against the motion of Senator Rock. The only problem he has or anyone making a similar

motion is attaining 30 votes. Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

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Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, Senator Wooten you are very right, we do have such a rule because generally we try to pass that legislation which expresses the will of this Body, not just a segment of this Body. I have absolutely no idea how a vote would come out if it were taken on the subject of limited branch banking by the entire Body. I think what Senator Rock was saying and I think he said it well was that we think that this is the kind of an issue where when the legislative judgment has been rendered, it should be a judgment of the entire Body rather than a segment of this Body. Unfortunately, issues can not be weighed like flour or meal by the pound. If it could be, we could have a rule that if a bill weighed more than twenty pounds it would automatically go to the Floor for discussion by the entire Body. The weight, the heaviness, the impact of a measure, it seems to me, should have consideration by the entire Body. This is a very sensitive subject, I'm aware of that. It is also a subject, I think, of general concern. We have two separate kinds of institutions in this State. One being banks and the other being savings and loans, which perform many of the same functions. Many of you know at this moment several things are happening in the savings and loan field particularly those that are federally chartered which will eventually place those two institutions in disproportionate positions and postures. The savings and loans are going to be permitted to branch. The Federal savings and loans. An attempt will be made in this Body to permit State savings and loans also to branch so that they can remain competitive with Federal savings and loans. I think we owe it to the citizens of this State to make certain that banks and savings and loans are kept in parallel position in the context of keeping viable our banking institutions whether they be formerly called banks or savings and loans. Hence, to Senator Rock and others, this is a very heavy problem, it is a heavy bill. It is not a mere bill and the judgment that is rendered on this issue should be the judgment of the entire Legislature and not just a segment of it. On that basis, I think he rightfully asks that you support a motion to bring it to the Floor. As I say, I have no idea what the vote will be eventually. But whatever the vote is, it will reflect the judgment of this entire Legislature on so crucial a question.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

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Senator Rock will close the debate. I guess, again. SEANTOR ROCK:

Mr. President, members...Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, again I wish to reiterate that I too am a firm believer in this Body and its rules and its traditions and its committee system. I say in all candor that this is an issue of such magnitude that it deserves the full attention of the full Senate and I would solicit the support of the forward thinking members of this Body to at least...to at

It was primarily my deciding factor and I'm just happy that the bill is not coming from Committee on the Floor because that would give several of the other papers a chance to rap more than two of us who happen to be stockholders in a couple of banks. Thank you for your time, Mr. President, fellow Senators. And I understand here from a note in closing, the editor of the Illinois State Journal owns stock in a bank and is director of a bank so I can't understand his attitude. Thank you very much.

If there's any questions this, basically this amendment amends Section 15.113 of the Pensions Codes and defines the various types of service which are...which a member may in the Universities Retirement System may receive. Its rationale is that certain credits were given for military service when really the intent of the original bill was to give military service for these credits only when university personnel were working in educational fields or advisors to other units of local government. If there's any further questions on it, I'll be happy to try to answer. I would move adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Weaver moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to SB 634. Any discussion? All in favor will signify by saying

SB 384 amends the election code to provide that upon any re-registration of voters the County Clerk or the Board of Election Commissioners shall cause to be printed on the voters identification card a list of all governmental units applicable to the precinct in which the applicant is registered. I think that many, many of our registered voters do not know what various units of government they actually live in. This is one advantage of the bill. The other advantage of the bill is that in the event we do have consolidations of elections, it will enable the Election Judges to determine exactly what ballots that we should go ahead with. That each voter would get. Would save the County Clerks and Board of Election Commissioners a lot of time in trying to redraw precinct boundary lines which are in many cases impossible to redraw because of the overlapping of the different units of government. I'd be happy to answer any questions or refer the matter to Senator Dougherty for his explanations.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Dougherty, do you wish to be heard on this bill? The Chair recognizes...

SENATOR DOUGHERTY: 2. I just wish as said by Senator Moore that the event 3. of consolidation we have discussed this bill before. 4. think this is a good bill and I urge an aye vote. In my own district, you have a mosquito abatement district, library district; you've got a multiplicity of districts that are going to be printed on the front of this card. I don't know who's going to pay for it, my County Clerks are very much opposed to this bill. I..if you limit it maybe to school districts or junior college districts but even at that we have overlapping districts within my own county for precincts within the city, townships...it's almost unworkable for our County Clerk you'd have to spend ...you'd have to hire at least another person just to print the card.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE:

The only units of government that would be listed would be those in which people are...candidates are elected from. In my county we've got a mosquito abatement district. They do not run for election. There are certain types of sanitary districts where there...the trustees are elected or others where they are appointed. I think the vast majority of the special youth districts that we have in the State of Illinois are by appointment. They would not be on this card. Only those units of government from which candidates will be elected will be on the...on the face of the card.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Bruce.

SENATOR BRUCE:

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I would point out to the sponsor that is not what
the bill says. It says, any unit of local government
and then lists some other units such as junior colleges,
school districts but nothing about the fact that it's
limited to elected districts. Absolutely nothing in this
bill that says you're going to limit it - the mosquito
abatement district would not be on there. There's...this
...this bill says that any unit of local government is
going to have to be put on the face of the voter registration
card. And I just tell you that that is, in my thirteen
counties, is an unworkable situation. Absolutely unworkable.
And I rise in opposition to this bill. I don't know who's
going to be for it but my local counties who have lost a
significant amount of revenue aren't willing to pay for it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Moore will close the debate.

SENATOR MOORE:

Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, it is my intention that only those units of government in which candidates are elected will be on the card. Now if the interpretation of the bill could possibly be otherwise, I would be happy to in the event this bill did pass, have it amended in the House to make it specific that it shall apply just to those units of local government and school districts in which candidates are elected. This is my intention in putting this bill in. And I'd request a favorable roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Berning.

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SENATOR BERNING:

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2. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Body. 3. SB 386 does just what the syllabus says it does. It's a very simple bill and a mandatory provision for con-5. viction of a crime with the use of a gun. I hardly 6. feel it is necessary to remind the members of this 7. Body that crime today does seem to pay. In fact, the 8. criminal in most instances does not have to pay at 9. all. The citizens are, on the other hand, becoming 10. irate, fearful and demanding of some protection from 11. the onslaught of the criminal element. Without be-12. laboring the Body but typical of comments, I have had, 13. let me quote one sentence from a letter I received 14. from Chicago. I'll eliminate all the foregoing amenities 15. and just cite this, please accept my expression of gratitude for sponsoring a measure that is concerned 16. 17. with the rights of the law abiding citizen and not those of the criminal element. Mr. President, members of the 18. 19. Body, I commit this bill to your tender mercies. I think it is good. I would like to see the citizens have an 20.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

opportunity to have their day protected.

Senator Wooten.

SENATOR WOOTEN:

Yes, Mr. President, before making a comment, I would like to address a question to the sponsor just to be sure I'm correct in my assumption. Senator, do I understand now that you make the sentences mandatory? Judges, juries have no latitude that these sentences must be imposed? Is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Berning.

SENATOR BERNING:

1. That is correct.

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PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Wooten.

SENATOR WOOTEN:

Well, it seems to me, Senator Berning, with all due respect that the problem with a law like this is that invariably one of the first things, it will encounter in practice is the situation in which an exception seems mandated by circumstances. If you impose such rigid sentencing requirements on judges and juries, you really place them at an extreme disadvantage in judging human acts, which are various in their circumstances, in their consequences and in their motivations as are human beings themselves. To put this kind of rigidity into law, I think would actually not serve society but perform a disservice. I believe that it is a quite frankly bad principle. I don't think this is the proper area in which to attack a very serious problem. I believe you will perhaps find it creating more difficulties or perhaps not more but you certainly would create difficulties because you take away from the people involved in judging a given situation. the flexibility to look at all circumstances and make their judgment on those circumstances as they apply to the law. In setting down some kind of mandatory sentence like this I actually believe that you are not serving justice at all

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

and I would oppose this bill.

Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

...Senator Berning, I,of course,don't believe everything I read in the paper but I would bring your attention to an editorial which appeared in yesterday's Chicago Tribune in which it is stated that a colleague said to you when you

were presenting this bill in the Committee that it was
 unconstitutional and that your answer was, I don't care
 if it is unconstitutional, the people committing these crimes
 don't care what they do why should we consider their rights.
 Are you properly quoted there?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

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Senator Berning, do you care to reply? SENATOR BERNING:

As I recall at the Committee Hearing that is essentially what transpired. What I had in...wanted to add to that was to my esteemed colleague on the other side, he has repeatedly ruled against us judging what is constitutional and what is not and has informed us as a Body, let the court decide and that is in essence what I wanted to add to the comments is quoted in the paper. Let's don't prejudge this, let the... let the Courts decide whether it's unconstitutional. Pass the bill and then we'll find out.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

If I might capsulize your long and rambling answer.

The answer is yes, you did say you don't care if it's constitutional or not. Right? Maybe I shouldn't give you another chance to answer because you may...maybe we don't have time to hear the rest of it. ...I think possibly,

Senator, it may well be unconstitutional but if that is your attitude then I have the kind of respect for constitution that I'm going to have to vote no.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Any further discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Mr. President, I think one of the difficulties about this kind of proposal it tends to create kind of illusion

of what its results are likely to be. It seems to me that if I may use one of today's common terms it is likely to be counterproductive. And there are a couple of reasons for this one of which is and I think you'll find this affirmed by a great many people in law enforcement area. Where you have stiff mandatory sentences you are very likely to get a bargaining process that results in accepting a plea on a much lesser offense and the...the mandatory sentences and the crimes to which they are directed therefore kind of get left in the wings in the process. I think also and I do not suggest that there are that many dishonest policemen or other law enforcement officers abroad but where they do exist and they do exist in various parts of the State and Country this kind of mandatory sentence, absolutely no discretion at all tends to produce a great temptation for shakedowns and indeed that has been one of the objections by some people in the law enforcement area to it. Finally, I would just note that this goes very much against the grain of what this State did when it adopted a very enlightened criminal code beginning in 1961. The whole brunt of that Code was to attempt to get away from mandatory sentences and especially mandatory minimum sentences. The...we've been fighting this battle ever since to try to retain the kernel of what was suggested in that very enlightened criminal code in 1961. And in my judgment this is a step absolutely in the wrong direction.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

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Well, Mr. President, members of the Body. I don't think it's a step in the wrong direction, I just think it's a little too long a step. I don't think there's anything wrong at all with putting an additional penalty on those people who use firearms to commit crimes. The general public is not in favor

of abolishing or...registering guns are doing away with handguns and so forth, they're unilaterally opposed to this, therefore, we have to punish the people who misuse these weapons. We have people stand up and speak and say they want to do something but they want to start someplace else and I ask those people rhetorically, where? Where? They...it's easy to be negative but I'd like to hear some affirmative talk. think the big thing that is wrong with this is it doesn't allow for differences in the situation with respect to people that ...it...it's not at all flexible. But certainly, there should be some additional penalities placed on those crimes where people use firearms. And we read the paper this morning and every morning but just pick up this morning's daily paper where six people...or five people some such matter were killed in the State of Georgia. And it goes on and on and on. And the weeping willows, the weeping hearts those people who feel we can always be more...lenient and that the criminal will automatically respond to this, ignore the fact that the criminal in the first instance is...isn't subject to respond to anything in the way of law and order. That's why he's in trouble. I don't think I'll be voting for this bill but the only reason I'm not going to be voting for it is the inflexibility of it, not that it's a step in the wrong direction because it is a step in the right direction. only problem is that it's too long a step.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Merritt.

SENATOR MERRITT:

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...Mr. President, members of the Senate, I certainly rise in support of this legislation. Throughout my district, many surrounding counties downstate, the people are vehemently opposed to any type of gun registration. Any type. And their constant hue and cry to me is, and I hear it wherever I go

l. throughout any community, why don't you put the handcuffs on the criminal where they belong. In other words, in a 2. 3. crime where any gun is used then let's say to the courts 4. this is our legislative prerogrative. Put those mandatory 5. sentences on the criminal where it belongs and leave our 6. many fine citizens to own their own guns as is provided 7. under the constitution. I... I certainly would support this 8. legislation.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Clarke.

SENATOR CLARKE:

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Mr. President, I didn't quite hear the discussion, I don't know just what Senator Partee was referring to as being unconstitutional, whether it was the mandatory feature or what. But you may recall seeing an article in one of the Chicago papers about six weeks ago that the Chicago Crime Commission under Peter Bensinger who was down here the other day, is now investigating the court situation in Cook County and the disposition of cases. As I recall, their survey that got them into this indicated that only about 3% of the crimes committed in Cook County result in conviction. Only 3%, something like that. And it's a very small percent even that are...even apprehended and brought to trial and I think that one of the problems there, obviously, is what's been pointed out that if you put a mandatory provision in then they go to a lesser crime but in this case you're talking about the use of a firearm and I don't see how that can't be knocked down to something other than what it is. And as long as we have that kind of situation in our courts, I'm generally against mandating sentences but I think that when it comes to firearms it's a different situation. About ten years ago, I had a secretary and one night her eighteen year old son was out driving and a group of boys pulled up along side; the guy

1. stuck a shotgun out and killed her son. And it ruined

2. that family and the last I heard about two and a half

years later that kid that committed that crime was still

loose and running around free. I think this is a good

bill and it ought to be supported.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

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Well, less the...Mr. President, less the hue and cry of law and order prevail here let me point out that I was the colleague who pointed out to Senator Berning in that Committee that this bill was patently unconstitutional and unconstitutional on its face. We are in a situation where in Section 33 Bl we are setting up the fact that there are two crimes now for the same...self same single act. It just cannot do it, and I would urge a no vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

...Further discussion? Senator Berning may close the debate.

20. SENATOR BERNING:

Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Body, I appreciate the great interest that has been evidenced here and I'd like to respond to a few of the comments if you will. Let me take the last one first. Criticizing two penalities. I remind you that throughout the statutes we provide for a fine and a jail sentence or both, time and time and time and time again. This is two penalties, I don't care how you look at it. It is still two penalties. So there is really nothing new about adding an additional penalty to the statutory provisions that now exist such as they are for the commission of a crime with a gun. And I submit that this is inflexible, yes but only insofar as it involved the use of guns in the commission of a crime. It might

lead to bargaining. This, in my opinion, is one of the 1. difficulties that confronts us as a society. Bargaining. 2. Plea bargaining involves the courts and the practicing 3. attorneys in an effort to come to an agreement so that it is not necessary to go through the trauma of trial. 5. 6. Now I'm not saying that in all cases this is bad but in 7. cases such as this where it is absolute evidence that a gun has been used in a commission of a crime, a plea bargain 8. would be absolutely indefensible and the Court ought to be 9. 10. enjoined from following such a procedure. At the same time, let me remind you, inflexible as it may seem, that when you're 11. 12. driving down the highway and you exceed the speed limit that fine is inflexible. The same applies if you happen to be a 13. 14. tavern owner and you should serve a minor, that is inflexible. So this again, SB 386 is not unique; it is merely expanding 15. on a procedure, a format that already exists. Now I admit 16. that I didn't expect to get too much support from the lawyers 17. since this does infringe to a degree on some of their perhaps 18. rightful prerogatives. But let me just remind you that the 19. American criminal is getting away with murder not to mention 20. rape, robbery and other things and the time has come for 21. soft-headed judges and probation officers to show as much 22. concern for the rights of the innocent victims of crime as 23. they do for the rights of the convicted criminal. Now I 24. submit that what may be the constitutional right of an 25. individual is in most cases where a criminal is released contrary 26. to constitutional rights of the rest of society. Let me 27. summarize by saying...reciting just two instances. 28. Washington, D.C. Police Chief Jerry W. Wilson told the House 29. Select Committee on Crime that 60 to 70% of armed holdups in the 30. nation's capital are committed by persons on parole or out on 31. bail. If you need any other arguments to support this bill than 32. that, I really don't know one. Likewise from the New Orleans

- of victims seldom are the wives and daughters of judges

Now 90% of the time the Tribune's wrong but this one 10%...this is one of the 10% of the times they're right and I'm going to have to vote against you, Senator Berning. No.

SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

I'm concerned that we completely take discretion away from judges and while they at times do not meet up with our expectations; the fact is that we do need to rely upon some flexibility in the law. I'm concerned about another aspect and that's the practical aspect of enforcement. Senator you...you pointed out two areas in which you said that the law was inflexible and that was the area of traffic and the area of tavern business, I do believe. And what you really illustrated I think was the kind of thing that may happen from this bill and that is the two areas that you mentioned are two of the areas of greatest source of corruption that exists. you notice the recent scandals that we've had around this State have involved the tavern business where the shakedowns occur daily. And I think you...acquainted as well with the shakedowns

It's absolutely true that we're not always satisfied with the results of our court proceedings. It's absolutely true that people are concerned that the courts do not function at the top efficiency level at all times. The fact of the matter is that this kind of mandatory law has been tried before in this State and I would remind you that we had a mandatory law in the field of marijuana and narcotics. I would remind you that it was this Legislature that realized the hopelessness of that kind of a situation which took away from the judges the right to individualize cases. Judges have a right to look at those cases on an individual basis. And the mandatory law simply meant that in cases where the judge felt it was a small matter rather than a large matter in terms of the use or the possession of a narcotic, they simply found ways to get around it. They found ways to obviate the plain intent of the law. And I think if you take away from judges the right to have discretion and to be able to individualize their cases; you're only creating a chaotic situation, that of course in addition to the other aspect which relates to the unconstitutionality. It is absolutely axiomatic that you cannot have two penalties for the same crime. I vote no.
