This makes a very brief explanation that there has been a great deal of public misrepresentation about the effect of these two bills on State revenue. There's a matter of fact, in their existing form they produce an increase in State revenues as...calculated and evaluated by the board, I mean the staff of the Illinois Racing Board. However, as I have represented before, the formula is not entirely acceptable to the Board and they...and they do accept the principles expressed.

But we want to do some more work on these bills. We will ultimately exempt them and keep them in form of a continuing evaluation by the committee, hold some hearings this summer and try and get this problem worked

out and take action on them in the fall. So, I support 1. 2. Senator Graham in his motion to recommit Senate Bills 1110 and 1111 to the Committee on Licensed Activities. 3. 4 . I would like to stress just briefly the importance of the Metro-East area to the State of Illinois as a whole and the importance of further development of this area and as a part of that development this proposal to ok here an exposition and performing arts convention center. Now, I'm sure that no Senator here has a tendency to think of southern Illinois as an adjunct, or as a section of Illinois of lesser importance. You know of course that this is not true. And statistics on the economic importance of the Illinois Metro-East area amply attests to the contrary. The population of the Metro-East area according to the last census is between 550,000 and 600,000 people, which is the largest concentration in Illinois next to Cook County, and it's over 200,000 people more than the next largest concentration. Illinois Metro-East does not represent any one town or community. Its membership comes from and it represents a large metropolitan area. And particular that of St. Clair County, Madison and Monroe Counties as well as the immediately adjoining counties. SB 166 would pave the way for the building of a Metro-East Exposition and Performing Arts Center. And in this part of southern Illinois is the largest concentration of population outside of Cook County, and in the view of its economic importance as well as its growth potential due to its strategic location and the ample and attractive sites for industry. Then this is the place to build the next McCormick place, and I would appreciate your favorable vote.

I heard the comments about that part of Illinois 3. which will be benefited, of course, that can't be denied. 4. If I could have some attention here, Mr. President, I'd 5. like to explain to the Chamber here why this in nothing 6. more...why this is nothing more than the rankest special 7. legislation. This exposition authority would differ with 8. ...from the general Metropolitan Civic Center Act in five 9. or six very important characteristics. The Authority is 10. not authorized to sell general obligation bonds. Second, 11. it's specifically prohibited from levying any local tax 12. for any purpose while the other four authorities, by that 13. I mean the other towns, may levy up...a property tax 14. up to five cents per \$100 equalized assessed valuation. 15. This act would definitely earmark State horse racing 16. receipts for this authority only. After sufficient funds 17. have been set aside for the number one, McCormick Place. 18. Now, this is in direct conflict with all the other acts, 19. every single one of them. This in essence, Gentlemen and Ladies, is nothing more 3 than a grant and a grant is nothing more than a give 4. away. I...I'd like to ask Senator Partee a couple of questions, and let me preface my remarks Senator Partee by agreeing with the statement of Senator Soper, I believe also that the property that is tax exempt...there is a good reason for taxing that property, my concern is with the approach of this bill when you are taxing the leaseholder, the tenant, and I would ask you this question, specifically. Are you aware that under existing statutes, it's possible to tax the leaseholder, and therefore you really don't need this bill to do it? PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Partee.

#### SENATOR PARTEE:

You say that is possible. They tell me at the assessors office that it is not possible that they need this bill in order to...to do it. If they didn't think they needed it, I sure wouldn't be here with it. SENATOR GLASS:

Well, I would like to show you the citation. other...the other question I would have is how you can square the bill with...with the new Constitution, Article 9, Section 4-A which requires the taxes upon real property shall be levied uniformly by valuation, and under your bill the lease is taxed as if the lessee were the owner of the real estate. And I would be interested in your comments on how that can be constitutional.

SENATOR PARTEE:

Well, the bill does three things. It forces the taxable leasehold estate to be valued as if the lessee is the owner of the real property. It emphasizes that the incident of taxation is upon the lessee as opposed to his assignee as set forth in Section 26. And it uses the Black's Law Dictionary in defining when real estate is leased. Now constitutionally, we don't think we have any problem with it. There are of course other opinions. I'm sure that this question will finally find itself in the Supreme Court. But we have the feeling based on research done by the Assessors Office, that the manner in which we are doing it by the terms of this bill will make it constitutional. There was a similar bill in a few years ago which went to the Supreme Court and was found to be unconstitutional. We've taken all of that into consideration and the wording here satisfies the Assessor's Office that it is constitutional. They did an awful lot of work on it. SENATOR GLASS:

They are already committed to pay relatively high rent and in addition to that, you are now saying, they, the tenant is going to have to pay the tax rather than the owner. Well, we can't always expect a status to remain the same. I would assume that many people and corporations had entered into agreements, contracts, employment contracts, and other things based on the fact that they pay no income tax. We came along, we passed an income tax and there is an American way of readjusting. So I am certain that if there are outstanding leases there can be readjustments because competition will force it. And many of those leases have adjustment clauses in them because they know that this question has been discussed and debated for a number of years and knew that this was coming.

Well, Mr. President, this is a matter of course that relates primarily to those exempt educational institutions prior to the 1870 Constitution. We've been trying for years to assist the taxing bodies in those jurisdictions that are affected by this. It seems to me that we've just got to go ahead and make an attempt. There may be some adjustments that cut both ways, but the taxing bodies are certainly being denied the effective tax assistance that comes from the commercial use of these leaseholds. And, I supported this kind of legislation in the past. And, if it is in fact constitutional, that's a matter for the courts to determine, not for us in advance, and the purpose of this bill is laudatory. And, I certainly am going to support it.

Senator Partee, I'm just wondering in case the person l. leasing the property fails to pay, then who are we going 2. to collect from? 3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR): 4. Senator Partee. 5. Mr. President, Senators, as I understand the law today, charities are exempt. Now, so we're not going to tax the charities, we're going to tax their lessees, and that is ultimately going to be the burden, the tax is now going to be the burden of those charities which by law are exempt. So, we're doing with the left hand what we can't do with the right hand. I'd like to call the attention to Senator Partee of the famous Dartmouth College case, that held that, a State may not impair the obligations of contract. And, this legislation runs right smack jam into the Dartmouth College case. It's unconstitutional. It's evasive. And one other little comment and I'll quit on this. Statistics suggest that a private college the cost of alucating a young man or woman in a private college approximates one third of the actual cost of educating a young man or woman in any of the State institutions. So, what we're going to do, we're going to burden the charities, Northwestern University, Chicago University, Lincoln College, Illinois College, so they'll be in the legislature next week and next month for a handout. This is patently unconstitutional and is vicious legislation.

Well, I rise to oppose 994. Mr. President, the legislative audit commission working in cooperation with the General Services and other agencies in the State have introduced in the House a bill that is entirely revamped, the purchasing act, and I think they had an opportunity to provide input for the possibility of eliminating three bids, competitive bids. And they certainly did provide us a lot of good recommendations which we did accept, and work with them on it. So, I don't think this is a good measure, and if it is, why I'd like to know more about it. I think eliminating the necessity for three bids irrespective of the fact that we're trying and I would certainly agree that we should encourage small business but eliminating the bidding procedure as we have it outlined in the Purchasing Act would not be advisable as I can see. And accordingly I would suggest we not pass this.

I know this bill's going to pass Mr. President, but I want to call the attention of the Chamber to Section 7, of SB 1021, appearing on page 3, which reads very briefly, upon motion of the County Clerk, which motion shall be filed by the State's Attorney within three days after the petition has been filed and heard by the Circuit Court within four days thereafter, the Circuit Court shall set a date for hearing on a petition on the fifth day of July of each year, or if such date falls on Sunday then upon the following Monday. They would like their...their regulations by 11. law to be brought in line with the Supreme Court's 12. decision. I might mention by the way the Chicago Board 13. of Health has passed a series of regulations relating 14. to the places where abortions can be performed and so 15. on. But 1050 is I think a very simple bill, it merely 16. says that abortions must be performed in a hospital or 17. a facility that is specially licensed to perform minor 18. surgery that does not require an overnight stay. 19. might mention that the effect of this and regulations 20. in the Medical Society would be to place the whole 21. operation under fairly strict controls. And, as I told 22. you before my concern was not only for the health of 23. the mother, but what I think is a developing interest 24. the State has in the unborn child. I've also amended 25. this to forbid fee splitting which turns out to be a 26. very unhappy practice that has occurred in New York 27. between abortion referral clinics and abortion clinics. 28. So, it simply makes that statement that abortions must 29. be done in a hospital. Of course, that's true by the 30. way for the last six months regardless, it must be in 31. a hospital. But in the first trimester they must be 32. done in a hospital or in a very specially licensed 33.

changing the law relating to abortion, the other changing ı. the Medical Practices Act. While this has a relation-2. ship to abortion, it actually goes much beyond that. It 3. provides for the establishment and licensing of facilities 4. which can perform minor surgery. This would be things 5. like tonsillectomy, hernias, abortions would be included, 6. facial surgery, plastic surgery and so on. In other 7. words procedures which would not require an overnight 8. stay. And indeed these ambulatory surgical treatment 9. centers are forbidden to keep patients overnight. However, 10. those of you who have kept close to medical practices 11. know that untoward things can occur at any time, and so 12. provision is made in here that doctors who function 13. in such a center must also be licensed to practice in 14. a hospital nearby so that if any complications occur 15. they can quickly move the patient to that place. Now, 16. I handed out an outline to explain to you how these 17. things would work, definitions, they must get a license, 18. some of these things are left open as to regulations. 19. The Department would like to take a hand in that. This 20. is something doctors have been urging us to do for a 21. couple of years now, and ambulatory surgical treatment 22. centers are...are in effect out west. The idea is they 23. can be a great saving to a patient. One of the big costs 24. in a hospital, if you remember it's kind of like a hotel 25. which has special services. #### SENATOR WOOTEN:

In responding to Senator Ozinga, I'm afraid you've misstated the situation Senator. We did not do anything in any of these series of bills to permit abortion. That has been done by the Supreme Court. All we have done is change language to bring our Illinois statutes in line with the Supreme Court. We really don't change the law ...the practical effect of the law one way or the other. The only reason this is here, and I question the Medical Society about the good sense of putting it in this series. I did not think, strictly speaking it belonged here. But you see, just as a hospital can perform an abortion, if it so chooses, so could such a treatment center. The main thrust of this is to try to save some money by getting minor surgical treatment out of the hospital where it is hideously expensive and into a clinic. I showldn't call it a clinic because it's far more than that. It has life support facilities available. And, I might further add, as I say, I don't like to bring the subject of abortion really too close to this, because

as Senator Knuppel says it really goes beyond it. 1. would only affect this particular surgery-center they're 2. called in other parts of the country in the first tri-3. mester anyway. The bill does not...each institution to give the certificate. It simply says that a graduate of that institution can qualify for a certificate from the Board. The problem has been that...and I believe the Board has been incorrectly interpreting the existing law. This will make it clear as to what was intended in the original law. For example, in Chicago you could attend Loyola University or Northwestern and obtain a graduate degree in education, a Master's degree in education, for example in geography or something else. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I'd like to rise in opposition to this bill, because this is going to create a burden on every county treasurer in the State of Illinois that will cost more for them to keep the books and to appropriate or prorate this interest rate out over the protest taxes and it's impossible. the other one item you also must consider is that under the present law any interest raise or gain by any treasurer that invests the money. this interest goes into the general fund to help pay the cost of operating the county. Now under the new Constitution every county in the State is in trouble due to the loss of collectors fee. It runs from thousands of dollars to millions of dollars in different counties. This is one small item where the interest off this protest tax fund is gone in general fund and is some slight help to the county. But more importantly this bill to have the county treasurer prorate this interest is going to create a boondoggle of work that they're not only holding up the refunds that have to go, but it's going to have to cause added employees to prorate this tax...the interest out over this tax money that's being refunded.
