3. I'd like to find out if the \$199,000 is enough...for

24. questions, the yeas are 43. The nays are one. SB 963

25. having received a constitutional majority is declared

26. passed. 1181, Senator Merritt.

28. SB 1181 (Secretary reads title of the bill)

29. 3rd reading of the bill.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Merritt.

32. SENATOR MERRITT:

33. Yes,...Mr. President this is the last bill in the

34. series. We, having passed out of here last week or the

1. week before, 1179 and 1180 setting up the proper subsidy law
2. on this. In the event 1181 passes, then I will move to
3. Table 915 which was improperly structured. ...I know of
4. no objection. I...I appreciate a favorable roll call.

8. SB 666, could...get that advanced to 3rd reading.

9. SECRETARY:

10. SB 666 (Secretary reads title of the bill)

11. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Transportation

12. and Public Utilities offers one amendment.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Knuppel moves the adoption of the amendment.

15. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary, no. The

16. motion carries. The amendment is adopted. 3rd reading.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. SB 1107. SB 1107.

19. SECRETARY:

20. SB 1107 (Secretary reads title of the bill)

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Senator Harris.

24. SENATOR HARRIS:

25. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, SB 1107 is one

26. bill in a series of three bills that implement a stipulation

27. that was agreed to between the Attorney General and the

28. Illinois Teachers' Retirement System as the result of the

29. new contractual obli...policy enunciated in the Constitution.

30. While I recognize that ultimately out of the General Assembly,

31. this concept may not be the final product but this provides

32. for 100% funding over a 50 year period of time. But I think

33. there is general recognition that we do need to make a start

1. in this direction and I'm certain that everyone is familiar
2. with the fact that the House passed a similar series of
3. three bills to this one. I think it is appropriate that
4. we move this bill along and understand that ultimately some
5. reshaping may result. But this does, in fact, implement
6. the stipulation that was entered into between the contend-
7. ing parties who filed a matter in the...before the Court of
8. Claims to proceed on this procedure. I would appreciate a
9. favorable roll call.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. Senator Partee.

12. SENATOR PARTEE:

13. Well, Mr. President and Members of the Senate, this is
14. a very difficult decision. This is the second series of
15. bills that sought to fund the Teachers' Retirement Fund.
16. Obviously, to us on this side of the aisle, that the first
17. set was absolutely without reason, judgment or logic because
18. of our financial situation. We knew, as well as the sup-
19. porters of that other series knew, that we couldn't
20. possibly have come up to the requirements of that bill.
21. I certainly don't like to kid anybody, particularly
22. the teachers, about whether or not we're going to do something
23. economically for them. I think that if there is any way to
24. do this. That this is at least a start in that direction.
25. And, these bills when they go to the House, I...they prob-
26. ably will find themselves in the Conference Committee. I
27. know that the Governor and those on his staff are studying
28. this problem. It's a rather Gargantuan one and I think the
29. only thing we can do in logic and reason is to pass these
30. bills out and hope that during the intervening period be-
31. tween now and adjournment, something can be worked out on
32. these series of bills. For that reason, and for that rea-
33. son alone, I'm going to support them. I recognize that the

1. amount of money set forth in these bills can't possibly be
2. paid at this time...I like the idea of trying to catch up
3. over a 50 year period. I think that's probably the only
4. way it can be handled. But, I'm going to support the bills
5. based on the reasons I have given.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Any further discussion? The question before the
8. Senate is, shall SB 1107 pass? Secretary will call the
9. roll.

32. This is the second bill in this series of three bills.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. The question is, shall SB 1108 pass? The Secretary will
3. call the roll.

29. SB 1109 (Secretary reads title of the bill)
30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator Harris.

33. SENATOR HARRIS:

1. This is the third bill in this series implementing this
2. stipulation. I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Any further discussion? The question is, shall SB 1109
5. pass? The Secretary will call the roll.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
8. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
9. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth

18. Kenneth Hall, aye. Netsch, aye. On this question, the
19. yeas are 47. The nays are none. The bill having received
20. the constitutional majority required is therefore declared
21. passed. Where to now, Chief. Senator Netsch, do you wish
22. to advance SB 295 on 2nd reading or... Any of the other
23. Senators have any motions or desires on any other Senate
24. Bills? Next order of business will be House Bills, 3rd
25. reading. House Bills, 3rd reading. Senator Walker. I
26. can't hear you, Senator. Senator Walker.

27. SENATOR WALKER:

28. Will you pass that one over and call it next, please.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. SB or HB 17, Senator Clarke. Didn't want it. HB 24,
31. Senator Soper. Senator Soper, do you...we'll read HB 24
32. by title a 3rd time. HB 24.

33. SECRETARY:

1. HB 24 (Secretary reads title of the bill)

2. 3rd reading of the bill.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Senator Soper.

5. SENATOR SOPER:

6. ...Mr. President, Members of the Senate, where a senior
7. citizen reaches the magic age of 65 most insurance companies
8. require that he take a physical examination before he's given
9. automobile insurance. All this bill says is that if they
10. require him to take an examination, that he be able to go
11. before...his own physician...duly qualified to practice
12. medicine in the State of Illinois and there take his examina-
13. tion and the insurance company pay for the examination. ...
14. Many insurance companies if they want to get rid of a...one
15. of their clients, one of their insured, they send them down...
16. either the other end of Chicago or the other end of the county
17. to their own doctor and...they make it inconvenient for the...
18. for the insured to be able to take this examination...they...
19. the dates are inconvenient. This way...duly qualified physi-
20. cian takes the examination that they require and he makes the
21. report and they pay for it. It's a very simple bill and I
22. think it will help our senior citizens and...and it will keep
23. the insurance companies from brooming our...the senior citi-
24. zens that...have had insurance with them for over 5 years.
25. This calls for senior citizens that have been insured for 5
26. years or more. I'd like your favorable roll call on this.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. Discussion? Senator Bell.

29. SENATOR BELL:

30. Well, Mr. President, Members of this Senate, I think
31. it's a popular thing to be able to support a bill like this.
32. After all a senior citizen has many burdens to bear. Many
33. costs that he can't offset. And this aspect of insurance

1. is one that...that certainly is...would be a popular bill
2. to come out in support and vote for. However, I think the
3. position of the insurance industry has been one that has been
4. practical and pragmatic in view of the amount of vehicles
5. that are on our highways today. All we have to do is to
6. look at the statistics as to accidents, see how they're
7. climbing year by year, the amount of highway fatalities
8. that are climbing year by year and I know for a fact as
9. an...as being in the insurance business for many years
10. myself, that there is nobody that is trying to make it
11. hard for senior citizens because they are against senior
12. citizens. It's simply a matter that, in many cases, I've
13. seen it time after time myself, when you become quite aged,
14. your reflexes slow up, your eyesight fails, and in many
15. cases, quite frankly and honestly, those individuals should
16. not be driving for the safety, health and welfare of those
17. other driv...drivers that populate our highways. I think
18. it's a...it's a bad bill quite frankly and I intend to vote
19. against it.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Any further discussion? Senator Scholl.

22. SENATOR SCHOLL:

23. I've discussed with Senator Soper about being a co-
24. sponsor of this bill and I ask leave to be a co-sponsor of
25. SB 24.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Senator Scholl asked for leave to be shown as co-
28. sponsor. Is leave granted? The Journal will so show.
29. No further debate to the question before the...Senator
30. Merritt.

31. SENATOR MERRITT:

32. Mr. President, I certainly would rise in support of
33. this legislation. This is...came out of the Committee

1. of which I am Chairman, the Insurance and Financial Institu-
2. tions Committee, 11 yeas and 1 nay. ...This bill's in the
3. best interest of everyone. It does prohibit that physical
4. examination for that period of five years...with one exception
5. that Senator Bell, I don't know...I didn't hear all of his
6. debate, don't know whether he touched upon it or not, unless
7. the company wants to pay for the cost of that examination.
8. There's nothing unreasonable about that. ...If they want
9. the examination every year, let the company pay the cost of
10. it. I think this's in the interest of all of our policy-
11. holders. I support this legislation.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Senator Rock.

14. SENATOR ROCK:

15. Yes, Mr. President, just a question if the sponsor will
16. yield? The bill is relatively short and obviously meritorious
17. since...Senator Scholl's now the co-sponsor. I wonder what
18. type of insurance policy this is aimed at?

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Soper.

21. SENATOR SOPER:

22. This is a...an automobile insurance. Where you take...
23. many companies want to take a physical examination after...
24. they reach a certain age now. Senator Bell says that...that
25. this is going to put a lot of people on the highway that
26. can't pass the examination, that's not what this bill does. All
27. this bill does is that if the insurance company wants you to
28. take the examination even after you...even before you take
29. your examination to drive an automobile, that they can't
30. send you all over...all over the country to take this
31. examination. You go to your own physician who's qualified
32. and they pay the bill. It's very simple. Why should you go
33. out and if you've been with the company for five years or

1. more to pay a bill for this type of thing. That's all. Doesn't
2. put any bad people on the road. We're not going to kill some-
3. body's grandmother or somebody's children. Just says the insur-
4. ance company will pay the bill for the examination. It's simple.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. I'm not sure you're answering Senator Rock's question.
7. Senator Rock.

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. Well, that...that may well be the intent...Senator Soper.
10. The problem is, the way it's worded. It says, no company
11. selling insurance defined in Clause B of Class II, which I
12. expect would be automobile insurance, may require a policy-
13. holder, it doesn't say a policyholder holding that type of
14. policy. It just says, if the company's in the business of
15. selling this type of auto insurance, it can't require any
16. policyholder, ever to take a physical exam unless the com-
17. pany pays the cost. And all I'm suggesting is what this will
18. ...I...I can appreciate your intent and the motivation is
19. probably good but all this is going to do, in my judgment, is
20. raise the cost of insurance premiums on all the other policy-
21. holders because if, in fact, the insurance company is in a
22. position where it has to pay the cost of this, you can be sure
23. that they are not altruistic enough that they will eat those
24. costs. They're going to spread them out among the other
25. policyholders. I think the idea's probably a good one but...
26. but the way this bill is worded, it'll never get off the
27. ground.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. Any further discussion? The question before the Senate
30. is, shall SB...Senator Knuppel.

31. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

32. Well, there isn't even a requirement here that it be a
33. policy that the policy be issued to a person who's...who's

1. licensed. I think that additional thing if...if it's pointed
2. out will cause more people without licenses to try to continue
3. driving.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. Senator Soper. Any further...

6. SENATOR SOPER:

7. Well...

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. ...discussion before we put the question?

10. SENATOR SOPER:

11. Mr. President, ...I'll talk to Senator Rock. Maybe I'll
12. talk to the House sponsor and if he wants an amendment on this,
13. we'll put an amendment on it and we'll...we'll clear it up.
14. Hold the bill.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Take it out of the record. I can't see you, Senator.
17. The next bill will be HB 12. Read HB 12 by title a 3rd time
18. Mr. Secretary. 12.

19. SECRETARY:

20. HB 12 (Secretary reads title of the bill)
21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Senator Walker will explain his bill.

24. SENATOR WALKER:

25. ...Thank you, Mr. President, and Members of the Senate.
26. HB 12...introduced with bi-partisan sponsorship. ...pro-
27. vides that vehicles if they make a right turn after a full
28. stop at a red signal, unless specifically prohibited by
29. local ordinance by posted sign at the intersection. It
30. also permits a left turn after a full stop at red signal only
31. as authorized by local ordinance by posted sign at the inter-
32. section. I've been...asked as to the effective date and the
33. bill...is amended--the effective date of January 1,74. Now

1. briefly...this concept would expedite the flow of traffic. It
2. would ease traffic congestion and reduce one source of driver
3. frustration. ...Cars would be permitted to turn right at a
4. red light after a full stop or to turn left on red from a one
5. way street into a one way street on which traffic moves to the
6. left. The drivers would have to yield the right of way to
7. pedestrians and to through traffic. Municipalities would be
8. empowered to designate any intersections where such turns
9. would be prohibited by signs. The bill prohibits pedestrians
10. from crossing against a red light. A provision to promote
11. the safety of pedestrians. California implemented their
12. right turn on red in '46 and since then it has been adopted
13. by 11 other states and I know a number of you have driven
14. in those states. It goes into effect in Indiana July the 1st
15. of this year. And no state that's ever enacted it has ever
16. repealed it. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration
17. has recommended inclusion of right turn on red in the Federal
18. Model Code on Uniform Traffic. The bill has the support of
19. the Secretary of State's office, WMAQ-TV ran a series of
20. editorials, and the viewer response was 8511 in favor of
21. the right turn and 30, only 37 opposed.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Gentlemen, please.

24. SENATOR WALKER:

25. Inasmuch as it doesn't go into effect until January 1,
26. '74, there's sufficient time for municipalities to select
27. locations where right turn on red should be prohibited and
28. for a campaign of public education to be conducted by the
29. news media, the Secretary of the State and the State Police.
30. I think it's a good bill. I've had a lot of reader response
31. to it. And I'd appreciate a favorable vote.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Senator Partee.

1. SENATOR PARTEE:

2. Well, I want Senator Walker know...to know that I per-
3. sonally sort of like this program. I have observed it...

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. Please, Ladies and Gentlemen.

6. SENATOR PARTEE:

7. I have observed this program particularly in the west-
8. ern states. I would only say that I have a communication
9. from the Secretary of the Department of Transportation,
10. Mr. Bond, who recognizes that this is a subject that is under
11. much discussion at this time. And he says this, there is a
12. Federally coordinated research program that has taken into
13. consideration all of the proposals involved here and that
14. very soon there will be authorization or lack of authori-
15. zation for the studying of this particular problem in depth.
16. Whereby they will make recommendations for a National policy,
17. which I suppose is to say as he says in his para...last para-
18. graph, I strongly recommend that no change be made in Illinois
19. law until the results of the Federal Research Study are
20. completed and distributed to the states. And he would appre-
21. ciate our cooperation in that matter. I suppose what he's
22. saying really is that your bill though perhaps meritorious
23. is just a little early because they'd like first to get this
24. coordinated Federal study so that the recommendation could
25. be made Nation-wide. I don't want to be the first by whom
26. the...there's an old expression of mine, "Never be the
27. first by which the new is tried and or...yet the last to
28. lay the old aside" - but I think it is premature at this
29. time. And I want you to understand, Senator Walker, that
30. any lack of support of your bill does not indicate any lack
31. of feeling and concern about what you seek to accomplish. It's
32. just that we prefer, in the suggestion of the Director of
33. Transportation, to wait until the National survey has been

1. made so that this matter may be...if...it shows to be proper,
2. implemented Nation-wide.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Any further discussion? Senator Scholl.

5. SENATOR SCHOLL:

6. Mr. President, and Members of the Senate, I've heard
7. over the past month and a half, the City of Chicago is doing
8. this. Now, I hear the Federal government's doing something
9. else. I say the State of Illinois needs this bill and we
10. ought to get on with the job and pass it. And I ask for
11. a favorable roll call on this bill.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Senator Clarke.

14. SENATOR CLARKE:

15. If the sponsor would yield, I would like to ask him
16. a question or two.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. He indicates he will. Senator Walker.

19. SENATOR CLARKE:

20. Senator Walker, I've heard a good deal about the prob-
21. lems of the municipalities financially. Now, can you give
22. me or does anybody have any facts as to how many streets
23. actually have this heavy traffic that this would facilitate
24. the flow, as against the cost of the municipalities in
25. putting up signs prohibiting the right turn.

26. SENATOR WALKER:

27. I...I think the answer to that, Senator Clarke, would be...
28. would...you'd have to know the number of stop...red and
29. green lights in each municipality, in my own Lansing they're
30. probably aren't over 10 or 12. This would probably be per-
31. mitted at half of them... In Chicago Heights probably the
32. same number of stop lights... Thornton, Glenwood and...
33. well Glenwood about 3 or 4 and I can think of a couple of

1. streets there where a right turn would expedite the flow
2. of traffic. It would...it...it would depend on the number
3. of stop and go lights in each municipality. As I say,
4. using my town of 26,000 as an example...they would prob-
5. ably have 12 corners to post there.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Senator Clarke.

8. SENATOR CLARKE:

9. Let me ask further then. As I understand the present
10. law, ...a municipality can permit this if they so desire.
11. How widespread is that in this present time? How many
12. municipalities are using a right turn or just putting up
13. a sign to allow it?

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Senator Walker.

16. SENATOR WALKER:

17. ...The City of Rockford now has it. The second largest
18. city in the State and the Illinois Motor Vehicle Law now
19. permits right turns on red at certain...designated corners
20. if the corner's posted. So, if it's not causing any incon-
21. venience and if it's expediting the flow of traffic in
22. Rockford...I assume the same would apply to Peoria and some
23. of our larger cities as well as some of our 25 - 30 thousand
24. population.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. Senator Clarke.

27. SENATOR CLARKE:

28. Well, let me...let me ask a further question then. Many
29. of those large corners are becoming very...congested and
30. that's the reason for this bill. But we have in many of
31. these corners a left turn period. And...if a person gets
32. in a wrong lane because they don't know that this flashing
33. light is going to go on sho...saying that they can turn left

1. then they make the people in back of them mad. Now, the
2. same thing is going to be true in the right lane. If they
3. don't know and they pull up in the right lane not intending
4. to turn right. Isn't this going to cause confusion?

5. SENATOR WALKER:

6. ...I understand that it hasn't worked out that way in
7. ...Rockford and...I think the average motorist, if he's
8. going to turn right on a red light is...going to turn right
9. at an intersection is usually in the right-hand...lane. As
10. I say, it's worked well in Rockford where they've...they've
11. tried it by ordinance.

12. SENATOR CLARKE:

13. Mr. President, I...I just like to conclude by saying
14. that I don't know enough about this to say that because
15. it's worked in Rockford, it's good for the entire State.
16. ...There is differing opinions about it. I have information
17. from the Northwestern Traffic Institute that indicates the
18. Institute of Traffic Engineers which is a Nationwide organi-
19. zation is not sold on the idea and it's trying to talk this
20. group, that Senator Walker said is for it, into reversing
21. their stand. I think it's a rather questionable thing and I
22. also think most important that pedestrians have rights, too.
23. And it's going to make for great difficulty in pedestrians
24. crossing the street as to whether a car's coming around the
25. corner from the back of them and as to the coordinating
26. of the traffic signals, as to when you're going to walk
27. on a green, and when the car's coming on the green and you
28. can't walk on the red. And, I think we ought to have more
29. study as the Federal government is doing.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. The Senator's time is up. Senator Course.

32. SENATOR COURSE:

33. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, this is a

1. very good piece of legislation but as Senator Partee pointed
2. out it's a little bit premature. Now, as has been pointed
3. out by previous speakers, I'd just like to cover it again,
4. the Federal government DOT is making a study. They appro-
5. priated \$100,000 to see if this would be feasible throughout
6. the United States. The State Department of Transportation
7. is opposed to it. They're making a study. The...City of
8. Chicago, the Traffic Engineers in the City of Chicago are
9. making a study of it. In fact, they have 11 or 130 locations
10. in the City of Chicago where they have posted signs permitting
11. right turns. Now, they have had a lot of complaints. Now,
12. in the City of Chicago they've taken all different kinds of...
13. of intersections. They've taken them close to schools,
14. business districts, residential districts, church districts,
15. every place. Now, they've had a lot of complaints from people
16. around churches and schools where signs have been posted.
17. Now, another thing I'd like to add, Ladies and Gentlemen,
18. these signs aren't put up for nothing. These...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Please.

21. SENATOR COURSE:

22. ...signs cost a minimum of \$15.00 a piece. That's a
23. minimum. Now, we don't know what it's going to cost to put
24. them up. The...intersections require four signs to be
25. posted. Now, as I say the City of Chicago is currently
26. making a study, they have taken some of the signs down
27. because they were...were too many complaints and the...
28. pedestrians were complaining. Now, the radio station in
29. Chicago has done a very good job of...promoting this right
30. turn on red lights. But even they admit, Ladies and Gentlemen,
31. 11 states in one of their editorials there was...is strict
32. discipline by the people...the pedestrians and crossing against
33. the red lights. Now, in the State of Illinois we don't have

1. that...kind of discipline with the people. Representative
2. Brandt and I were crossing the other night about 9:00 o'clock.
3. A semi came around the corner, we had the...the red light, the
4. walk sign and a...truck made us get back on the...on the curb
5. on the other side of the street. We had in...we had to run back
6. to...for fear of being hit. Well, we...if...if the motorist
7. doesn't care that much about a pedestrian when they have the
8. right-of-way, what are they going to do when they have the
9. right-of-way and they...the vehicle is permitted to turn on the
10. red light. Even in the editorial here, it says right here
11. Ladies and Gentlemen and I quote, "But the dangerous prac-
12. tice of crossing against a red light would be prohibited."
13. Now, who's going to prohibit that a...are we going to put
14. a policeman on every corner. If we're going to put police-
15. men on every corner, we don't have to have a sign
16. permitting...right turn after a stop on a red light. Most
17. important, and I continue to quote, "Most important they would
18. have the right-of-way even if they were wrong." Now
19. that's a wonderful piece of verbiage. Even if they are
20. wrong. In other words, if you get hit, well you're wrong.
21. It's all right, you can get hit and it goes on to say, "And
22. where right turns might not be safe, signs would be put up
23. prohibiting them." Well, this is fine but again, Ladies and
24. Gentlemen, we go into the cost. How many of these inter-
25. sections are going to be posted? Who's going to pay for
26. them? How long are they going to be posted? And some of
27. these municipalities is by local ordinance okay. So, I'm
28. alderman, a warder, I'm a township committeeman and some-
29. body, some businessman comes to me and he says, well
30. there's too much traffic building up on the main street and
31. if you...may...permit a right turn at the next block it'll
32. clear the traffic away from in front of my house. He's not
33. concerned with whether there's going to be anybody...any

1. pedestrians crossing. It's just to get the traffic away
2. from in front of his establishment. So, the local politician,
3. we're all politicians, we're going to go to the proper peo-
4. ple and say, well put a sign up in that corner. I'd...I
5. think it's a good spot for one. Ladies and Gentleman, I
6. did ask Senator Walker to postpone or to...allow me to put
7. an amendment on this bill, postponing the date for one year.
8. Make it effective January 1, 1975. When the studies are
9. complete, I would be happy to support this bill and I think
10. all the membership of the Sen...Senate would be happy to
11. support it. But, again, I say, this legislation is a little
12. bit premature and I'm not going to see a bunch of people get
13. hit by a bunch of maniacs who are in a hurry to get home and
14. sit in front of their...their idiot box and watch TV.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Any further discussion? The question shall be put.
17. Senator Walker.

18. SENATOR WALKER:

19. It's those people who are in a hurry to get home as a
20. result of waiting at a red light when there wasn't any
21. traffic crossing the intersection that...get in trouble.
22. And in regards to these studies, Mr. President and Members
23. of the Senate, takes me back about 12 years ago when...I
24. introduced a bill to put the numbers on the plates such as
25. they are now. ...I recall...Charlie Carpentier was Secre-
26. tary of State. Well, they made a study and six years later
27. the legislation...passed. ...This right turn on red has
28. worked excellently in states like California and Florida
29. where there's a lot of off-season travel. It's endorsed
30. by the House Motor Vehicle Committee and I think that's
31. as good a study commission as we...can look forward to or
32. expect any expertise...from. It's similar to the picture
33. on the driver's license legislation that's been kicked around

1. here for five or six terms in which I've sponsored in the
2. past. Now, I might say I've sponsored similar legislation
3. to this two years ago and they were talking about a study
4. at that time. I think it's high time that we passed
5. legislation like this. If a car pulls up to a red light
6. it's on a half a minute, a minute, a quarter minute and
7. a half. With the gas shortage they can turn without
8. standing there waiting for the light to change provided
9. that there's no other traffic or no pedestrians. I think
10. it's a good bill. I think it's a timely bill. I think
11. it's time we passed it. Two years ago we needed a study.
12. Apparently to the opponents, we still need it. I'd
13. appreciate a favorable vote.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. The question is, shall HB 12 pass? Secretary will
16. call the roll.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. For what purpose does Senator Chew rise?

21. SENATOR CHEW:

22. ...I think the time has come when...

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. You are out of order, Senator Chew, the first of June
25. was last week. There was no explanation of votes on roll
26. call. You are out of order, Senator. Continue the roll.
27. Continue the roll.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Chew,

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Continue the roll.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Chew, Cl...Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson,

1. Donnewald, Dougherty,

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. Senator Dougherty, present.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Hynes,
6. Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, Latherow, McBroom,
7. McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch,
8. Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner,
9. Rock, Roe, Romano, Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl,
10. Shapiro, Smith, Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene,
11. Walker, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Daley, present, Saperstein, aye. Saperstein, aye.
14. That's it. Let's have a little order please. Bruce, no.
15. On this question, the yeas are 31. The nays are 5. Two
16. are voting present. The bill having received the required
17. constitutional majority therefore is declared passed.
18. Senator Chew. Senator Chew moves that having voted on
19. the prevailing side, the vote by which the bill was passed
20. be reconsidered. Senator Scholl moves to Table Senator
21. Chew's motion. All in favor of the motion by Senator
22. Scholl will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes
23. have it. The motion is carried. Now, Senator Soper says
24. he has made peace with everybody and he is ready to call
25. HB 24 will be read by title again a 3rd time.

26. SECRETARY:

27. HB 24 (Secretary reads title of the bill)
28. 3rd reading of the bill.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Do you think the bill's been fully debated, Senator
31. Soper? Please. Gentlemen.

32. SENATOR SOPER:

33. All right, the only amendment required by the Insurance

1. Committee was put on. It calls for a licensed physician.
2. There's nothing wrong with the bill. I'll ask for a favor-
3. able roll call.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. The question is, shall HB 24 pass? The Secretary will
6. call the roll.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,
9. Clark, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
10. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
11. Hall, Hynes, Johns,

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Could we have some order, please. We cannot hear the
14. answer to the roll. Please, Gentlemen, please.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Johns...

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. Wait a minute, Mr. Secretary. There's no use to con-
19. tinue. As soon as we can get some order, we will continue
20. the roll call. If your name appears on the roll call dif-
21. ferently than you voted, it might be your own fault. Please.
22. We are waiting, Gentlemen. We are waiting to continue the
23. roll, as soon as we have some order. Let's try again.

24. SECRETARY:

25. Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer,
26. Knuppel, Kosinski, Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt,
27. Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod,
28. Nudelman, Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,
29. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,
30. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker, Weaver,
31. Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Kosinski, aye. Hynes, aye. Roe, aye. On this question,

1. the yeas are 34 and the nays are 4. The bill having received
2. the constitutional majority required therefore is declared
3. passed. Mr...Senator Partee.

4. SENATOR PARTEE:

5. I just wanted to make the announcement that we've just
6. heard again from Senator Newhouse and he's having automobile
7. trouble and that's why he's not here.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. The record will so show. Senator Glass had a...an
10. announcement of great importance that he wanted to make
11. at this time and then we'll try to get back to this roll
12. call.

13. SENATOR GLASS:

14. This announcement is that the Senate Team will have
15. one last polish-up practice immediately after adjournment.
16. Hoping all players will be there. It's diamond 4 at Lin-
17. coln Park. Repeat, Lincoln Park, diamond 4. Thank you,
18. Mr. President.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. The next bill will be HB 25, Senator Soper. Senator
21. Glass, HB 35. To be read by title a 3rd time. Senator
22. Glass.

23. SENATOR GLASS:

24. Mr. President, I would ask for leave to take HB 35 back
25. to 2nd reading for purposes of amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Requests leave for returning HB 35 back to the order
28. of 2nd reading for purpose of amendment. All in favor.
29. Opposed. Leave is granted. Tell...

30. SENATOR GLASS:

31. Amendment....

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. the Secretary of the amendment. Senator Glass.

1. SENATOR GLASS:

2. ...The amendment would...correct a mistake that was
3. made in the last Session where two sections 6b were in-
4. advertently passed. ...So, this amendment will distin-
5. guish the correct Section 6b which is to be repealed and
6. I would move for its adoption.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. Senator Glass moves for the adoption of Amendment
9. No. 2 to HB 35. All in favor of the adoption, will signify
10. by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The motion
11. carries. Senator...any further amendments? 3rd reading.
12. Next bill will be HB 57. Senator Course. Senator Course.

13. SECRETARY:

14. HB 57 (Secretary reads title of the bill)
15. 3rd reading of the bill.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. Sen...Senator Course will explain his bill.

18. SENATOR COURSE:

19. Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. SB
20. or HB 57 is a Motor Vehicle Laws Commission bill. It amends
21. the Vehicle Code, adjusts weight taxes for truck auxiliary
22. axles confirm...to conform to Section 3-815. Allows properly
23. registered auxiliary axles to be used for converting two-axle
24. truck tractors to three-axle truck tractors effective July 1st,
25. 1973. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, back in 1969 we passed legis-
26. lation of...increasing the fees. And, at that time, there was
27. an error made in the classification of the...the...vehicles.
28. As an example, the...Class S vehicle was the...cost is \$1,176,
29. Class P is...9...hundred twenty-six dollars. The difference
30. should have been \$250 but...on...in the 1969...the bill
31. provided for only...\$242. ...Now, this is true all...
32. the way down the line...with the exception of one class
33. and that is the...in the case of a...higher class, a full

1. trailer at 36,000 pounds costs \$718 and semi-trailer costs
2. \$20 thus this fee should have been \$698 instead of \$704 as
3. provided in the 1969 legislation. This will take care of
4. this...this discrepancy, Ladies and Gentlemen. It will mean
5. an increase in the revenue about \$200 per...class of vehicle,
6. each vehicle in each class. Now, I would appreciate a favor-
7. able roll call.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Any further discussion? The question is shall HB 57
10. pass? The Secretary will call the roll.

11. SECRETARY:

12. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
13. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
14. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
15. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
16. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
17. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
18. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,
19. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Bartulis, aye. Hynes, aye. Daley, aye. Johns, aye.
24. Kosinski, aye. On this question, the yeas are 37. One
25. voting nay and one voting present. The bill having re-
26. ceived its constitutional required majority therefore is
27. declared passed. Next bill, SB 58, Senator Donnewald.

28. SECRETARY:

29. HB 58 (Secretary reads title of the bill)
30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator Donnewald.

33. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

1. Yes, Mr. President, this amends the Motor Vehicle Code
2. and provides that the Secretary of State may provide that
3. drivers' license applications may include a photograph of the
4. applicant and may require such photographs on drivers' li-
5. censes. ...It also states such provisions inapplicable unless
6. the funds are appropriated therefor. The effective date of
7. the Act would be January 1, 1974. It is the intention of
8. the Secretary to initiate a trial program with non-drivers'
9. ID cards.--With a photograph so as to determine which system
10. would be the best one to utilize for the State of Illinois.
11. There are at least five or six different systems in use in
12. various other states but who have different problems than we
13. in Illinois. The Secretary wants to use...only the system
14. that is the most efficient, economical and tamper proof.
15. Now, this cannot be implemented until the General Assembly
16. appropriates money therefor. I would urge a favorable roll
17. call.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Any further discussion? Senator Course.

20. SENATOR COURSE:

21. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I would like
22. to bring to the attention of the Assembly that there is an-
23. other bill that makes it mandatory. It says it shall, the
24. Secretary of State shall, affix a photograph of the driver
25. to the driver's license. So, I just want you to be aware
26. of what's happening in the drivers' license situation.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. Senator Donnewald.

29. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

30. I...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. What did you say, Senator Course? Senator Wooten.

33. SENATOR WOOTEN:

1. Would the sponsor yield for a question?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. He indicates that he will.

4. SENATOR WOOTEN:

5. Senator Donnewald, ...are you requiring that a new

6. photograph be submitted whenever the license is renewed

7. so they can be somewhat up-to-date?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Senator Donnewald.

10. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

11. You mean they can't put their high school picture

12. on? I think that's right. That would be right. This

13. is a piece of legislation that is, may and not shall,

14. but it would require a recent photograph. I imagine

15. the Secretary would have that...should be...

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. Any further discussion? We're getting ready to

18. go on roll call, I guess. The question before the

19. Senate is, shall Senate...HB 58 pass? The Secretary will

20. call the roll.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

23. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

24. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth

25. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,

26. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard

27. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Saperstein, aye. Knuppel, aye. McBroom, aye.

1. Vadalabene, aye. Johns, aye. Glass, aye. On this question,
2. the yeas are 39. The nays are 3. This bill having received
3. the required constitutional majority, is therefore declared
4. passed. Senator Soper wants to...leave of the Senate to
5. return HB 25 to the order of 2nd reading for the purpose of
6. considering amendment. Is leave granted? Leave is granted.
7. The bill is now on the order of 2nd reading. Senator Soper
8. will explain his amendment.

9. SENATOR SOPER:

10. Well...it's Senator Regner's amendment so he'll ex-
11. plain it.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Senator Regner will explain the amendment.

14. SENATOR REGNER:

15. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the House, I checked this
16. with Senator Soper and also Representative Sevcik, the...
17. House sponsor of this bill, and they were in agreement...
18. that it's okay to put this amendment on as far as they're
19. concerned. But, as you know, when we award a General
20. Assembly scholarship one of the statements we have
21. to sign is, that the student is a resident of our own dis-
22. trict and what this says, that if he changes his residence

26. ...For purposes of definition, he changes his residence
27. if he registers to vote in a location outside of the dis-
28. trict from which he was nominated...but he does not change
29. his residence just by merely taking off-campus housing.
30. And I would move adoption of Amendment No 1 to...HB 25.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator, you say that if you award a scholarship and
33. your awardee moves out of the district and establishes other

1. ...another address he then forfeits his scholarship?

2. SENATOR REGNER:

3. Yes, and the definition is, that if he register...
4. registers to vote but if he stays registered in your dis-
5. trict but just takes off-campus housing then it's not
6. eliminated.

1. Sen...HB 35 having received the constitutional majority,
2. is declared passed. HB 25.

3. SECRETARY:

4. HB 25 .(Secretary reads title of the bill)
5. 3rd reading of the bill.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

7. Senator Soper.

8. SENATOR SOPER:

9. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, HB 25 does
10. exactly what the synopsis says. Permits the Members of
11. the General Assembly and the nominating person to receive
12. General Assembly Scholarship to designate one nominee for
13. four years or two nominees each for two years. Because
14. of the junior college situation in the State, a lot of
15. the Senators have found that...that a scholarship is taken
16. up for two years and then the last two years are wasted be-
17. cause you don't watch the scholarship. Now, this time if
18. you have two...two people in...junior college who need a
19. scholarship you can give them each a scholarship for two
20. years. You can break it up and give them a scholarship
21. for one year without watching the scholarship.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Senator Wooten.

24. SENATOR WOOTEN:

25. Senator, did we not just amend this to...to effectively
26. destroy my vote on it. I just gave a scholarship to a young
27. man who is going to move his residence out of my district.
28. Do I understand that we have just adopted an amendment which
29. would...cancel out the scholarship I've just given?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. Senator Soper.

32. SENATOR SOPER:

33. According to...Senator Regner's amendment, if...now so

1. he get back to the prerequisites on scholarships. In order
2. to give anybody a scholarship, he must state whether he is
3. a resident and sign an affidavit that he's a resident of
4. your district. Now, it seems fair, under Reg...Regner's
5. Amendment, Senator Regner's Amendment, that if he just
6. takes the scholarship and then he goes...he moves out of
7. the district and...and creates a new residence for him-
8. self by...say he puts on the...on the test that if he
9. registers to vote in another district, then he must for-
10. feit the scholarship after that first year, because he's
11. no longer a resident of your district.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER)

13. Senator Wooten.

14. SENATOR WOOTEN:

15. Senator, I think that is wholly unreasonable, narrow-
16. minded and absolutely irresponsible amendment. I fully
17. intended to vote for this bill but now I must vote no and
18. urge everyone to oppose it. It's absolutely wrongheaded
19. to take that attitude.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. Senator Buzbee.

22. SENATOR BUZBEE:

23. Thank you, Thank you, Mr. President, I...I voted for
24. this bill in Committee and intended to...vote for it on the
25. Floor. Unfortunately, that amendment was kind of slipped
26. through a while ago and I...I asked for a roll call vote on
27. it but...we didn't...weren't able to have the roll call
28. vote. I think any time that you start using...the voters
29. right to register anywhere he wants to, you start using
30. that against him. I think we're setting a dangerous prece-
31. dent. Now, I understand that a lot of people are trying
32. to aim at college students and not allow them to vote in the
33. towns where they go to college. I can understand that feeling

1. in some people. But I wonder if they would like to pass
2. a bill saying that construction workers who come to a town
3. to live for a year or two if they're unable to vote in
4. that particular town. I don't believe that there would be
5. too many people in this Chamber that would want to do
6. that sort of thing and I think we're setting a bad prece-
7. dent. I'm voting no on the bill.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

9. Senator Saperstein.

10. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

11. Will the sponsor yield to a question, please?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER);

13. He indicates that he will.

14. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

15. Senator Soper...what is the status of a scholar who
16. we give an award to but in the course of the...the matter
17. he moves out of our district, and...and what do we do...
18. what does the law now say about a student who moves out
19. of the district. Does he forfeit the...the scholarship?

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. Senator Soper.

22. SENATOR SOPER:

23. I think you'll have to ask Regner to answer that.

24. I don't think he does at this time. But the purpose of this...

25. the amendment, I would say this, Senator Saperstein, it's

26. to preclude people from having a residence in your district

27. and coming to you, or having a Senator say, well give me

28. an address in...in this district. You know, there's two

29. sides to this coin. And then he gets the scholarship through

30. subterfuge or whatever with...with the cooperation of

31. the Senator or Representative and then he goes back to live

32. where he lived before. That's another side of this coin.

33. And...then you sign an affidavit that he's a resident of your

1. district and all that could happen to you is that some...
2. somebody'd say, well, you...if you had no knowledge of
3. this, you should have had knowledge of it, you should have
4. gone to the place he lived. He never lived there. He
5. went to live with an aunt. His folks live down in
6. Carbondale or his folks live in Cairo. You gave him a
7. scholarship from the 11th District...in...in Chicago.
8. Now, you're responsible and you've...you've committed
9. a...crime by signing an affidavit that he's in your
10. district when...when you...when you didn't. You don't
11. need this kind of trouble. That's the other side of this
12. coin.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Saperstein.

15. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

16. But the amendment does another thing. Certainly no
17. scholar is entitled to a scholarship if he doesn't legally
18. live in the district. But...this does another thing, though,
19. it takes away his scholarship...if he registers to vote.
20. I...I know it's a very sticky question but it...it seems to
21. me that we're penalizing the student for voting in the...his
22. school...in the district in which his school is located.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Senator Soper.

25. SENATOR SOPER:

26. Well, now, you know Senator, if you...if you...
27. register to vote from a certain area, you state...you state
28. that's your residence. And all I say is, that the Super-
29. intendent of Public Instruction sends you an affidavit and
30. says, we want to know that he's a resident of your dis-
31. trict. Now, if the student, or the person cares to go some-
32. place else and register to vote, then he says this is my re-
33. sidence. That's all. We don't tell anybody where to vote from with

1. this bill. But, that's just a way to prove residency. If
2. he registers...If he doesn't register there and he still
3. registers and he just goes to school there or if he...or
4. if he goes to another district but he still lives in the
5. district, well then,...well that's his...his residence.
6. And about these...fellows who come...who is it... Buzbee
7. I think, Senator Buzbee talked about...some teamsters or
8. workers or mechanics that go and move to a place for two
9. years and then they move, they can't vote. Sure they can
10. vote wherever they're registered, if they meet the require-
11. ments. But if they,..if they...if they want to live there
12. and that's their residence and they want a scholarship and
13. still be teamsters or whatever they are, then they'll have
14. to live in the...in the district from which...they got the
15. scholarship. If you want fellows to go around and
16. make all these explanations on these affidavits. You know
17. today if you turn around, everybody wants to put everybody
18. in jail. That's all you have to do is walk around your
19. district and ask the neighbors; does John Brown live here,
20. does Sophie live here, does Frank live here, but if you want to
21. do that and make all these checks and then go back the next
22. year and find out if they're still living there, well be
23. my guest. I think it's a good bill.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. Senator Sours.

26. SENATOR SOURS:

27. I just heard two very vacuous objections to this bill.
28. I think it was Superintendent Bakalis who was the one who in-
29. sisted...that there be an affidavit now that the...the
30. donee or the recipient be a resident. Now, these shrinking
31. violets who object to this bill can't have it both ways.
32. ...Either their mentor, Bakalis, ought to get rid of his
33. affidavit or this bill ought to pass. It's...it's so

1. irksome and so distressing to hear these weeping willows
2. always worrying about whether someone will have the right
3. to vote. They can vote. They can vote wherever they want
4. to establish their legal residence. Now, if they do that
5. then, the affidavit that one has to fill out today for Super-
6. intendent Bakalis is going to be perjury or annulity. Now,
7. you can't have it both ways, Gentlemen. This is a good
8. bill and certainly merits your support.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Is there any further discussion? Senator Soper, care
11. to close the debate?

12. SENATOR SOPER:

13. The...the bill, the original bill...I think is meritori-
14. ous and I think the amendment doesn't ...doesn't offend it.
15. If...if you look at it now, nobody's trying to throw a curve
16. here, but we say that if you've got to sign the affidavit,
17. then it ought to be true. And, I don't think I want to go
18. around through my district, I have people that come on the
19. border line of Brookfield and..and...and LaGrange Park. I
20. don't want to be going from one side of the street to
21. the other to find out whether or not the address is in
22. my territory or not. But if the affidavits are signed
23. and I find out that the fellow doesn't live there, I
24. don't want him to have the scholarship. I'd ask for a
25. favorable vote.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

27. The questions is, shall HB 25 pass? And upon that
28. question, the Secretary will call the roll.

22. ther provides that any...that such physically handicapped
23. person must not be...be disqualified from obtaining a
24. driver's license under Sec...Sub-Section 8 of Section 6-103
25. of this Act. So, to me that means that they...can't de-
26. prive him of...having a driver's license. Now, Ladies and
27. Gentlemen, we opposed this here in the...Committee. Now,
28. what this means is going...to mean that persons who are
29. physically handicapped can go and at the discretion of the
30. Secretary of State be issued a special plate. Now the...
31. talked about plates with wheelchairs on them with crutches
32. and everything...and difference...kind of plates to...de-
33. signate the...these people as being physically handicapped. But,

1. what it's going to mean, Ladies and Gentlemen, it's going
2. to mean that these people are going to be permitted to
3. park wherever they want...and enjoy special privileges
4. the ordinary person doesn't have. Now, Ladies and
5. Gentlemen, it's fine for the physically handicapped per-
6. son but that means that any person driving this car, be
7. he physically handicapped or not, is going to take ad-
8. vantage of the plate and park wherever he wants to and...
9. create a lot of confusion. I...I don't think this is
10. good legislation.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Senator Roe.

13. SENATOR ROE:

14. My...my recollection was that there was not opposi-
15. tion to this bill in Committee and I don't think that...
16. what Senator Course...says is correct. It says that...
17. in Section 3-616 that you must be qualified to have
18. a license in order to apply, you know, for these plates.
19. So, I think we're talking about two different things.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Senator Wooten and then Senator Netsch.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. Yes, I...I don't know if I'm correct or not but I
24. believe what Senator Course is referring to is another
25. piece of legislation, which would suggest that there were
26. several things, including the fact that if a car stopped,
27. you were required to stop and give assistance and so on.
28. At least as I read what's in my bill book here I think
29. it only applies to plates. Because, I too, shared some of
30. the Senator's reservations about those other provisions making
31. special allowances. But apparently this only applies to plates
32. and I don't think has any reference to special considerations
33. given those who...have these plates on their car.

1. ...I've been approached by...persons who are handi-
2. capped in my district and...this is one piece of legis-
3. lation I'd indicated that I could easily support. The
4. other, though, has as Senator Course suggested, some
5. rather serious problems.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Senator Netsch.

8. SENATOR NETSCH:

9. Just to add one additional comment on that, I think
10. that the suggestion that the people who bore such license
11. plates on their automobiles would be, in a sense, immune
12. from arrest for wherever they parked or whatever they did
13. with their automobiles. It is not really borne out by the
14. text of the Statutes as I read it. I think what it would
15. do, Senator Course, at least this is my understanding of
16. what is intended by it, is to permit them to move into a
17. place, for example, to unload passengers or whatever where
18. perhaps they might not otherwise be permitted with an under-
19. standing on the part of...of policemen who see them that
20. it is a necessary thing. Because they simply...do not have
21. the same mobility that other people have and it seems to me
22. that on that basis that it serves a very useful function and
23. does not really disrupt the entire enforcement mechanism of
24. the traffic laws.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. The Chair might state that if that's all it does, I
27. can appreciate it. Any further discussion? The question
28. before the Senate is, shall HB 187 pass? Secretary will
29. call the roll.

22. does exactly what the synopsis...

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Please, Gentlemen. Just a moment, Senator. Gentlemen,
25. please. Continue, Senator.

26. SENATOR MOHR:

27. Yes, Mr. President, out of the Railroad Crossing Study...
28. Commission...a few years back, why it was determined the
29. need for two-way radio c...communication between the engine
30. and the caboose. The...it was felt then and now it is put
31. in bill form that this is a must to help...the delays in...
32. in blockage of railroad crossings by means of better communi-
33. cation. This bill has been worked out and it's agreed to by

1. the...both the brotherhood and the railroads. I know of no
2. objection. It doesn't become effective until July 1st
3. of 1974. If there's any questions, I would be happy to
4. answer them, otherwise, I'd accept a favorable roll call.

32. SENATOR BARTULIS:

33. Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate,

1. ...Amendment No. 1 to HB 208 is merely two words. It adds
2. (or paper) immediately after the word (metals).

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Any discussion? Senator Wooten.

5. SENATOR WOOTEN:

6. Yes,...Senator Bartulis, as I recall the Committee
7. hearing when this bill came up, after, I believe it was...
8. a corollary of the vote or actually not a corollary, it I
9. believe it happened pretty much when it was over the
10. discussion came up about the possibility of recovering
11. paper in a sanitary land fill operation. And I don't
12. really think that those of us who were voting would
13. have con....sented to that...maybe I have this all wrong
14. but... I think the case that was made for recovering
15. metals from a sanitary land fill is a good one and I'm
16. very happy to go along with the bill. But when you
17. include, or paper, you're bringing in a substance that is
18. not a...as easily scavenged. It is susceptible to all
19. sorts of...infestations and contaminations. Most paper
20. that is collected and recovered is that that is collected
21. and recovered in bundles and I think by granting this
22. exemption, along with the more defensible one for metals,
23. you are really making the...whole purpose of the sanitary
24. land fill the very unsanitary process and not only
25. will it be dangerous for the workers but I really
26. think it's...it just will not work too well in a sani-
27. tary land fill operation. I urge that we not adopt
28. this amendment because the exception for metals, I
29. believe is...is rather easily defensible in many ways.
30. But, I don't think that you strengthen the bill at all
31. by putting in the exemption for paper. I believe you
32. give us all kinds of trouble in regulating a land fill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Senator Bartulis.

2. SENATOR BARTULIS:

3. Yes, Sir, in answer to Senator Wooten I would say...
4. the reason for...for putting in paper is more or less for
5. recycling purposes. And I would just like to make one
6. comment. In Illinois, the 18,000 tons of wastepaper
7. generated daily is equivalent to 300 thousand trees, 400
8. acres of forest, 4400 acres of forest, I'm sorry, and I
9. think that's reason enough.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. You have spoken once, Senator. The rules do not
12. provide for you to speak only once but we will let you
13. do it rapidly. You're breaking the rule and I'm alarming
14. you a little.

15. SENATOR WOOTEN:

16. All right, I'm sorry, but my objection is to paper
17. that is in garbage. There's no problem with...with re-
18. cycling the other paper that's collected as paper but
19. rec...trying to pull it out of garbage is another matter
20. altogether.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

22. Senator Knuppel.

23. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

24. As Senator Bartulis has pointed out there is a shortage
25. of paper for ...printing newspapers and so forth in Illinois.
26. This doesn't prohibit the...it doesn't make it so that they
27. may do it, they can still regulate it, it doesn't prohibit
28. it and I say this is good legislation. The Environmental
29. Protection Agency has a right to regulate it and, as to
30. safety and so forth, and I think that's all right.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Any further discussion? Senator Merritt.

33. SENATOR MERRITT:

1. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I happen to be
2. a member of the Senate Agricultural, Conservation and
3. Ecology Committee in which this bill was heard. And, as
4. Senator Bartulis knows, it was asked by several people
5. in that Committee that day if there was an objection to
6. the adding on of paper. The importance of recycling
7. paper today in the environment. In fact, there was one
8. man who operated a sanitary land fill outside of Spring-
9. field here who testified that he could very well...re-
10. claim the paper and the refuse the same as the metals.
11. I would, therefore, strongly support this bill, this
12. amendment.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Senator Bartulis.

15. SENATOR BARTULIS:

16. Yes, I would like to close in saying that the pur-
17. pose of this amendment is not for...for the scavengers
18. to pick up any piece of paper. This, more or less when
19. ...an outfit comes in to dump a whole load of cardboard
20. or wastepaper that would be picked up so at the base of
21. the land fill. And I would urge a favorable roll call.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. The question before the Senate is, shall we adopt
24. Amendment No. 1 to HB 208. All in favor of the motion
25. signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it.
26. The amendment is adopted. The bill will be returned
27. to the order of 3rd reading. Senator Schaffer are you
28. prepared on... Senator McBroom. Senator Roe. Is
29. Senator Davidson, 245 gone? Secretary will read HB 245
30. a 3rd time.

31. SECRETARY:

32. HB 245 (Secretary reads title of the bill)

2. Senator Davidson will explain his bill.

4. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, this is the Court

33. SENATOR COURSE:

1. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of
2. the Senate, HB 254 was introduced in the House by J. J.
3. Wolf. It amends the Illinois Governmental Eth...Ethics
4. Act. It requires that each person examining a state...
5. statement of economic interest under this Act who was
6. acting in a representative or employment capacity for
7. another person shall disclose the name of the sub...
8. principal or employer on the form identifying the examiner
9. provided by the Secretary of State. It becomes effective
10. immediately. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, why this was
11. brought about, prior to the last November election, we
12. received notice that...a statement, many of us received
13. a notice that our statement of economic interest was
14. going to be examined by a person who purported to be a
15. lawyer in the City of Springfield. Now, he said it was
16. going to be for research for an almanac. Now, Representa-
17. tive Wolf did a little research and found out this person
18. was a resident of Springfield, he was an attorney but he
19. was not licensed to practice law in the State of Illinois.
20. He was not acting in his own behalf. He was acting in
21. the...the capacity as a...attorney, I believe, for a
22. citizen's group or a watchdog group...It was not for
23. what he said it was for, a research for an almanac. Now,
24. Ladies and Gentlemen, if we expect honesty from the
25. Legislators, the least we can do is expect it from the
26. people who are going to examine our statement of economic
27. interest and then who are afraid we're going to do some-
28. thing wrong. They should be afraid if they're going to
29. do something wrong, too. I think this's a good piece
30. of legislation and would appreciate your vote. I also
31. talked with the Secretary of the State's office and they
32. said there would be no problem of including on, this is
33. the request for...to...of the statement to be examined and...

1. a copy...and they said they could include it right on the
2. one side of this here regular form. It would not cost
3. any more money. I would appreciate your support.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. Any discussion? Senator Knuppel.

6. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

7. I have a question of the sponsor, if he'll yield?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. He indicates he'll yield.

10. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

11. Does this mean...it says there'll be an affirmation.
12. Does this mean that the person, if it's found out that he
13. has...has prevaricated that he will subject to the penalties
14. of perjury?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Senator Course.

17. SENATOR COURSE:

18. Yes, it is. Yes...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Knuppel.

21. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

22. I have...have nothing to say. I'm not sure that
23. that's true but...it says he'll give an affirmation but
24. I don't know that an affirmation necessarily subjects
25. him to the penalties of perjury.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Any further discussion? If not, the question before
28. the Senate is, shall HB 254 pass? The Secretary will call
29. the roll.

30. SECRETARY:

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. We don't have it. Where is it?

24. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

25. I want it discharged from the Committee.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Oh, you want...you want to move to discharge a...which
28. Committee?

29. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

30. Suspend the rules. Yes.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. You want to move to suspend the rules to discharge the
33. Committee on what?

1. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Harris.

21. SENATOR HARRIS:

22. This...is this the bill that provides for a transfer

5. You're moving for the suspension of the rules for
6. the immediate consideration. All in favor of the sus-
7. pension of the rules will signify by saying aye. Opposed.
8. The ayes have it, the rules are suspended. Now, Senator
9. you have a motion to make.

10. SENATOR DALEY:

11. Move for the adoption of this...congratulatory re-

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. It's on 2nd reading.

12. SENATOR COURSE:

13. 2nd reading.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Senator Course moves that HB 755 now on 2nd reading

16. be re-referred to the Committee on Transportation. All

17. in favor will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes

18. have it and the bill is in the Committee on Transportation.

19. It was 755, wasn't it Senator?

20. SENATOR COURSE:

21. Correct.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Senator Palmer.

24. SENATOR PALMER:

25. Mr. President, I'd like to move HB 277, that's on

26. 3rd reading now, back to 2nd reading for the purpose of

27. filing an amendment. The Secretary has an amendment on

28. his desk. All that this amendment provides is to include

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The

27. rules are suspended. Senator Partee has a motion. Moves

28. that...

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. Yes, Mr. President...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. ...the Senate do...

33. SENATOR PARTEE:

1. ...I would move for the immediate adoption of this
2. Resolution. I would like to have the entire Senate shown
