8. Now members of the Senate, if I can have your attention  
9. again so you'll understand. We're trying to help you. We  
10. are now going to leave the order of House Bills on 1st reading,  
11. give the Senators additional time to sign up and indicate  
12. their desire and later on today before adjournment we'll do  
13. like we did yesterday and go back and pick those up. And  
14. we'll now go to the order of House Bills, 2nd reading. Senator  
15. Sours.

16. SENATOR SOURS:

17. Mr. President there's one bill on 1st reading that I  
18. desired the other day to advance to 2nd without reference  
19. and Senator McCarthy wanted me to hold it up which I did  
20. for three days. Now apparently he finds no objection  
21. to it and I'd like to make the proper motion that the...  
22. that this bill be advanced to 2nd reading without assignment  
23. to committee. What the bill does...

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. We need...We need the number of the bill, Senator.

26. SENATOR SOURS:

27. HB 1054. I thought I'd mentioned that. What the  
28. bill does is extend the...the rate of interest beyond  
29. the Arrington Amendment which would come to an end  
30. June 30, 1973 unless it's extended.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. You've heard the motion of Senator Sours that  
33. HB 1054 be order...be placed on the order of 2nd read

1. a 1st time, placed on the order of 2nd reading without  
2. reference to committee. All in favor of the motion will  
3. signify by saying aye. Opposed. Senator Hall. May we  
4. have some order please? We have to read the bill a 1st  
5. time. We are on an order of business now Senator...  
6. wait till we read this bill.

7. SECRETARY:

8. HB 1054, Senator Sours (Secretary reads title of bill)  
9. 1st reading of the bill.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. Were you speaking to this bill Senator? All in favor  
12. of the motion of Senator Sours to have the bill placed on  
13. the order of 2nd reading without reference to committee  
14. will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it,  
15. the bill's on 2nd reading. The Chair recognizes Senator  
16. Kenny Hall, and then Senator Berning.

17. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

18. Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like leave of this Body  
19. to be shown as principal sponsor of HB 1344. It has Senator  
20. Saperstein's...shown and she and I have been in conference  
21. on it.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. 1344, Senator Kenneth Hall wants to be shown as  
24. the official Senate sponsor. Leave granted? Leave is  
25. granted and the Journal will so show. Senator Berning.

26. SENATOR BERNING:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. Having confred with  
28. the Chairman of the Local Government Committee, I would  
29. ask leave to discharge the committee from further con-  
30. sideration of HB 886 and advance it to 2nd reading. By  
31. explanation, this is identical to the SB 534 which was  
32. passed out of the committee unanimously and passed this  
33. Body without a dissenting vote. There seems to be no need

1. to have 886 heard in Committee.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. You've heard the motion of Senator Berning, all  
4. in favor will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The  
5. ayes have it and the Local Government Committee is dis-  
6. charged from further consideration of HB 886. Senator  
7. Walker. We're not on the order of announcements, but  
8. we are now.

9. SENATOR WALKER:

10. ...Than you, Mr. President. SB 1109 creating the  
11. Little Calumet River flood control coordinating commission  
12. ...

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Senator, we can't hear what you're saying up here,  
15. I'm sorry.

16. SENATOR WALKER:

17. I would like to request unanimous consent to advance  
18. HB 1109 to the order of 2nd reading without reference  
19. to committee. I've checked with the leadership on the  
20. other side and I assume it would be allright with the  
21. leadership on this side. That's all it does, creates the  
22. Little Calumet River Flood Control Commission.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Please, Senators. Senator Walker has requested that  
25. HB 1109 be read a...that the committee on...what, what  
26. committee Senator?

27. SENATOR WALKER:

28. Agriculture.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Committee on Agriculture and Conservation be discharged  
31. from further consideration of HB 1109, placed on the order  
32. of 2nd reading. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed.  
33. The ayes have it, the bill's on 2nd reading. I asked if it



1. had been read, it has not been read a 1st time. The  
2. motion is that the bill will be read a 1st time and placed  
3. on...let's find out where the bill is. Disregard the  
4. committee action, it was never in committee.

5. SECRETARY:

6. HB 1109 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
7. 1st reading of the bill.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. All in favor of this bill being advanced to the  
10. order of 2nd reading without reference signify by saying  
11. aye. Opposed. The ayes have it. The bill is on 2nd  
12. reading. Senator McBroom. You're recognized. Gentlemen,  
13. we just cannot hear.

14. SENATOR MCBROOM:

15. Mr. Chairman, I've been asked to pick up HB 1568.  
16. I'd like to move it to 2nd reading without reference  
17. to committee. The...it was on the...the consent Calendar  
18. in the House. I don't believe it's controversial. If  
19. any one would like to ask me a question about it, I'd...  
20. I'd be happy to try to answer it, if there's any discussion  
21. why it can go to committee, but it came over here on the  
22. consent Calendar and as I understand the bill there's  
23. no reason why there should be any controversy over it.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. My only feeling is I've never known Representative  
26. Hanahan to have a non-controversial bill.

27. SENATOR MCBROOM:

28. This is his first one, Mr. Chairman.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. I'm going to request it go to committee.

31. SENATOR MCBROOM:

32. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Senator Partee. Are you going to be the sponsor?  
2. You want the bill read a 1st time? Senator Partee, we'll  
3. get to you.  
4. SECRETARY:  
5. HB 1568 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
6. 1st reading of the bill.  
7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):  
8. Were you wanting to speak to that bill Senator?  
9. Senator Partee for what purpose do you rise?  
10. SENATOR PARTEE:  
11. On a point of personal privilege, Mr. President.  
12. I wanted to introduce to the Senate members of the Chicago  
13. Board of Education who are seated in the President's  
14. gallery...some of them have left, but if...there was  
15. Superintendent Redmond, Mr. Bird the Deputy Superinten-  
16. dent, President Carry, Mrs. Certa, Mrs. Malase, Mrs. Wilter,  
17. Mr. Boutay, Miss Denader, Dr. Freedman and Mr. Sharbarbo.  
18. I'd ask them to stand and be recognized by the Senate.  
19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):  
20. And at the same time we might apologize to them  
21. Senator for some of us being absent at their meeting  
22. this morning because of several other meetings going  
23. on at the same time. Any one else? We're now on the  
24. order of House...Senator Saperstein we're going to the  
25. order of House Bills 2nd, so if we have any motions,  
26. suggestion or otherwise confusion to offer we'll listen to  
27. you this time. Senator Saperstein.  
28. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:  
29. 2nd reading? Mr. President...  
30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):  
31. We're trying to get there, yes.  
32. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:  
33. Right.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. We're trying to get to House Bills 2nd as soon as  
3. we can relieve ourselves of all the hands that are rising  
4. to make suggestions. . . .Saperstein. We'll take the House  
5. Bills on 2nd reading in order Senator. It's just easier  
6. for the Secretary. Senator Partee, would you take Senator  
7. Johns' microphone there, you wanted to do something.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. Yes, Senator Hynes has an amendment to SB 998.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

11. And...you want leave of...Senator Hynes wants leave  
12. of the Body to have it returned to the order of 2nd  
13. reading for the purpose of considering an amendment, is  
14. that it?

15. SENATOR HYNES:

16. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I would ask  
17. leave of the Senate to bring SB 998 back to 2nd reading  
18. for purposes of offering an amendment.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. All in favor of Senator Hynes' motion will signify  
21. by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it the bill is  
22. now on the order of 2nd reading and Senator Hynes will  
23. discuss his amendment.

24. SENATOR HYNES:

25. I would offer Amendment No. 1 which would permit  
26. the Chicago Board of Education to adopt a...

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. It's Amendment No. 2 I believe Senator. Just one  
29. moment. It will be Amendment No. 2, Senator Hynes, our  
30. records show. May we have some order please? Senator  
31. Hynes has the Floor to discuss an amendment. May we  
32. give him our attention please. That would be desirous  
33. of the Chair if all of us gave him our attention. Continue

1. Senator Hynes.

2. SENATOR HYNES:

3. I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
4. SB 998. Amendment No. 2 would permit the Chicago Board  
5. of Education to adopt a supplemental budget to make use  
6. of the funds that would be made available through the  
7. provision of SB 998. The bill provides for the issuance  
8. of up to \$90,000,000 in bonds and also would permit the  
9. board to pay custodial salaries from the building fund.  
10. This ultimately has the potential of freeing up a total  
11. of \$26,000,000 per annum for educational purposes and  
12. this amendment is necessary to permit that to be done  
13. in this fiscal year. And I would move the adoption of  
14. the amendment.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. You have heard the motion of the Senator from Chicago  
17. on Amendment No. 2 to SB 998, all in favor will signify by  
18. saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it, the amendment is  
19. adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading. Senator  
20. Saperstein has a similar motion on a House Bill and we'll  
21. go out of order to do this, despite the fact that I don't  
22. want to. Senator Saperstein.

23. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

24. Thank you very much Mr. President, Ladies and  
25. Gentlemen. HB 1405 is similar to SB 4 therefore...

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Continue Senator.

28. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

29. Thank you. I would like to suspend the rules to  
30. place HB 1405 on 2nd reading without reference to committee.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. The Senator's motion is that HB 1405 be read a  
33. 1st time and moved to the order of 2nd reading without

1. COmmittee consideration. HB 1405. It's on the Calendar  
2. today. HB 1405. Senator Moore, for what purpose do you  
3. rise?

4. SENATOR DON MOORE:

5. I believe there's a motion to advance this without  
6. reference, is that correct?

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. That is the motion, it was clearly stated, Senator.  
9. What is your desire?

10. SENATOR DON MOORE:

11. I wonder if the sponsor would hold that motion until  
12. Senator Knuepfer gets on the Floor, Mr. President, there  
13. may be an objection to that. Would the sponsor hold his  
14. motion on that bill?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Where is Senator Knuepfer? She reluctantly indicates  
17. that she will hold it until Senator Knuepfer...will some-  
18. one send a page for Senator Knuepfer? Senator Moore.

19. SENATOR MOORE:

20. I'm informed he has no objection to it, Mr. President.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

22. Then the motion is that HB 1405 will be read a 1st  
23. time, placed on the order of 2nd reading without reference  
24. to a committee. All in favor will signify by saying aye.  
25. Opposed. The ayes have it and the bill's on the order of  
26. 2nd reading. Senator Course. Oh, he has to read the  
27. bill, I'm sorry.

28. SECRETARY:

29. HB 1405 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
30. 1st reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. 2nd reading. Senator Course.

33. SENATOR COURSE:

1. Thank you Mr. President. I'd like to return to  
2. House Bills on the order of 2nd reading for the purpose  
3. of correcting an error. I'm shown as the chief sponsor  
4. on HB 29, 270 and 271, and I think this should be Carroll.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. I think these bills were assigned by your leader-  
7. ship. Do you want...will you want...you're moving now  
8. that you be removed as a sponsor of HB 29, 270 and 271  
9. and that they be assigned to Senator Carroll as the  
10. House sponsor of those bills. Is that correct?

11. SENATOR COURSE:

12. That is correct, Mr. President.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. All in favor of the request signify by saying aye.  
15. Leave is granted.

16. SENATOR COURSE:

17. Thank you.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Senator...Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. Mr. President, I'd like to move to the order of business  
22. which would permit my calling House Joint Resolution 14 for  
23. the purpose of an amendment. The study commission calls  
24. for sixteen members which we think is just too cumbersome,  
25. and we want to diminish it to eight.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Senator Partee moves that we move to the order of  
28. motions for the purpose of him recalling, or calling  
29. House Joint Resolution No. 14 for the purpose of con-  
30. sideration of an amendment. Is leave granted? Leave  
31. is granted and we will now consider his request on  
32. House Joint Resolution 14.

33. SENATOR PARTEE:

1. Now I offer Amendment No.1 which simply strikes the  
2. word sixteen in reference to the number of persons who  
3. shall serve on the committee and inserts in lieu thereof  
4. eight. I move the adoption of the Amendment.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. You've heard the explanation of the Minority Leader,  
7. all in favor of the adoption of this...of this Amendment  
8. will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it,  
9. the amendments adopted. Resolution will return to the  
10. Secretary's Desk. Now, we are hopefully on the order  
11. of House Bills 2nd reading where I tried to get fifteen  
12. minutes ago. House Bills 2nd reading. First bill...we'll  
13. start on HB 137 on 2nd reading. If I remember we kind  
14. of stopped on 32 yesterday. My memory serves me clearly.  
15. We'll start on 137 and continue on House Bills 2nd reading.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senator Bruce. HB 137

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Do you want to advance it?

20. SECRETARY:

21. HB 137 (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Senator Nudelman you want 144? 3rd reading on 137.

25. Secretary will read HB 144 a 2nd time. That's assuming  
26. there were no amendments from the Floor on 137, none were  
27. offered. 3rd reading.

28. SECRETARY:

29. HB 144 (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Insurance  
31. and Financial Institutions offers one amendment.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Senator Nudelman moves the adoption of the committee

1. amendment to HB 144. All in favor signify by saying aye.
2. Opposed. The ayes have it the amendments adopted. Any
3. further amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Secretary
4. will read HB 151 by title a 2nd time.
5. SECRETARY:
6. HB 151 (Secretary reads title of bill)
7. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
9. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Senator
10. Latherow are you ready on 162? Senator Latherow, do you
11. want to move it? Senator Fawell. Senator Harber Hall, 178.
12. You want to move it? 178 be read by title a 2nd time.
13. SECRETARY:
14. HB 178 (Secretary reads title of bill)
15. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
17. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading.
18. Senator Mitchler. Senator Roe. 188, read it by title
19. a 2nd time.
20. SECRETARY:

21. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard  
22. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,  
23. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,  
24. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,  
25. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,  
26. Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Senator Hall.

29. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

30. Mr. President, I'm going to take this opportunity  
31. to vote, I haven't voted on this, but I would point out

32. ...

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Hall, there's no explanation of votes,  
2. please. Let's not get started on that this early in  
3. the morning. Thank you. On that question the ayes are  
4. fifty, the nays are none. SB 3 having received the  
5. constitutional majority, excuse me. SB 4 having received  
6. the constitutional majority is declared passed. Another  
7. bill on that subject is, we promised to call together is  
8. SB 517, Senator Moore.

9. SECRETARY:

10. SB 517 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
11. 3rd reading of the bill.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

13. Senator Moore.

14. SENATOR DON MOORE:

15. Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate.  
16. This is another bill dealing with the senior citizens  
17. of our State. Little different approach than the prior  
18. bill. I think that both bills have merit. What this  
19. bill does it creates a Division of Services for the Aging  
20. in the Office of the Governor. The coordinator shall  
21. be a resident of the State and shall be appointed by the  
22. Governor with the advise and consent of the Senate and  
23. shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The duties  
24. of the coordinator would be to coordinate and evaluate  
25. the social services furnished by State agencies to senior  
26. citizens. I think we're all aware that we have various  
27. functions dealing with senior citizens in many of the  
28. code departments. It's my feeling that by having a  
29. coordinator in the Office of the Governor that can  
30. coordinate the activities of the various directors that...  
31. so as to accomplish something insofar as our senior  
32. citizens are concerned is a very good approach. Also  
33. what this bill does it takes and creates the Illinois

1. State Council for the Aging, it takes it out of the  
2. Public Aid Code and puts it in the...in the Office  
3. of the Governor. Be happy to answer any questions, or  
4. if not, I'd appreciate a favorable roll call.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senator Hall.

7. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

8. Well, Mr. President, I've read both of these bills  
9. that you have chosen to call at the same time and I think  
10. it's incumbent upon this Body to vote for the best bill  
11. available, and I would suggest to the members that this  
12. bill is superior in many, many respects to SB 4 that  
13. we just passed. It's true that everything both sponsors  
14. have said about the aged in our State, very true. But  
15. we need a vehicle and I suggest this is better for the  
16. simple reason that we are increasing the bureaucracy,  
17. we are bringing this under separate heading in the Office  
18. of the Governor where it should be. And I would certainly  
19. solicit 59 votes from this Body indicating their acceptance  
20. of the proposal of the sponsor.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Is there any further discussion? The question is  
23. shall SB 517 pass, and upon that question the Secretary  
24. will call the roll.

25. SECRETARY:

26. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

1. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

4. On that question the ayes are fifty-two, the nays  
5. are none. SB 517 having received the constitutional  
6. majority is declared passed. Senator Partee, would you  
7. like to introduce our friend?

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. Yes, Mr. Speaker, our friend is a man who has some  
10. familiarity with this place having served as Lieutenant  
11. Governor of the State under the old Constitution we...where  
12. he had the privilege of presiding and he was a very fair  
13. presider, and I would say to you only that he is now a  
14. professor at Harvard and has come back to edify our youth  
15. in this area at a school in this town, the Honorable  
16. Paul Simon.

17. HONORABLE PAUL SIMON:

18. Mr. President, Senator Partee, but you'd better  
19. stop the applause or I'll deliver a state of the State  
20. message here. I...I used to borrow papers from Senator  
21. Partee when he sat in back of me and I just came to  
22. borrow a paper here right now for old time sake. It's  
23. great to be back once again. For the new members I just  
24. say it's the greatest experience you're ever going to have  
25. to sit in this Body. And I...right now, you don't think  
26. so I can hear my Senator complaining, but it was great  
27. to be here. Incidentally, at Harvard one of the really  
28. bright young students I met was a fellow named Kelly  
29. Welsh whose the son of Senator Ray Welsh wherever he  
30. may be. He's on the telephone...there he is, right  
31. back there. And another is a student by the name of  
32. Albert Molly whose the grandson of Representative Corneal  
33. Davis so Illinois was represented back there too. It's

1. great to be here, I'm going to be back in Illinois and  
2. be over here visiting with you every once in a while.  
3. Good seeing you Mr. President.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

5. Very nice to see you sir. SB 955. Senator Mitchler,  
6. for what purpose do you rise?

7. SENATOR MITCHLER:

8. Yes, Mr. President, I tried to get your attention  
9. before. I wonder if I could be listed at this time as  
10. a co-sponsor of SB 517 that we just passed.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Is there leave? Leave is granted. 955.

13. SECRETARY:

14. SB 955 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
15. 3rd reading of the bill.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Senator Knuepfer.

18. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

19. Well the few minutes that I am allotted under the new  
20. rules would have been a substantial problem in addressing  
21. itself to this bill. However, there was a Committee of  
22. the Whole hearing that you were all invited to that  
23. discussed this bill in some considerable detail about three  
24. hour's worth, so that I think most of you are familiar with  
25. the substantive provisions of the bill or at least in  
26. general familiar with those. At the Committee hearings  
27. you may remember we had the secretary of the equivalent  
28. department from Florida testify and Florida has this kind  
29. of a structure, and in fact is moving to...moving more  
30. completely in the direction of the structure as articulated  
31. in this bill. It provides in essence a single point of  
32. delivery for all social and health services, some 22 States  
33. have adopted this concept one way or the other. It provides

1. for a single secretary who would be in charge of this  
2. department. That single secretary would then have the  
3. power to provide the coordination which so frequently is  
4. lacking between the various division director, department  
5. directors now in office. In fact one of the questions we  
6. addressed ourselves to at that Committee hearing was the  
7. fact that some of the directors were not even sure how  
8. many coordinating committees did exist statutorily or  
9. by department rule within their department. The bill  
10. generally provides for the delivery system at the point  
11. of the seven regions. That delivery system for all of  
12. the services would be unified. The services as we know  
13. them now or the departments as we know them now would  
14. exist only as functional units rather than as specific  
15. departmental units. The bill leaves the Governor maximum...  
16. the bill unlike most other reorganization bills I've seen  
17. leaves the Governor the power to really provide all the  
18. framework on the skelton. For those of you who have read  
19. the bill you will note that there is very little framework  
20. and that was done very deliberately. It was the feeling  
21. that that skelton existing the bill can better be filled  
22. in by the various department heads when the...as the bill  
23. becomes effective. It was the feeling that there might be  
24. ...desirable differentiation as between various regions,  
25. and that can be accomplished with this kind of open structure.  
26. The bill establishes a coordinating council which would  
27. become effective on October 1 of this year. The committee,  
28. or council would be made up of the department heads involved.  
29. They would have some nine months to work out the various  
30. organizational problems until the effective date of the  
31. bill, July 1, 1974. It is the...certainly a trend that  
32. many States are moving in. I suggest to you it is a  
33. desirable trend from two points of view. From the point

1. of view of the State of Illinois and...but most importantly  
2. from the point of view of the clients who now tends to fall  
3. in between the cracks, between the various agencies and  
4. departments of those agencies. I would be happy to attempt  
5. to answer any question on these bills if you still have  
6. them.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

8. Is there any discussion? Senator Rock.

9. SENATOR ROCK:

10. Yes Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
11. We all sat I think at the Committee of the Whole hearing  
12. and there were many questions raised. The question that  
13. I raised at that time and raise here again today as I stand  
14. in opposition to SB 955. This would effect substantial major  
15. overhauls with regard to reorganization of certain State  
16. agencies. Under the new Constitution this is the first  
17. such attempt. And I think that if anyone will look at  
18. Article 5, Section 11, I think what the framers of the  
19. Constitution had in mind was that this is more rightfully  
20. a prerogative of the Chief Executive. It says the Governor  
21. by Executive Order may reassign functions among or reorganize  
22. executive agencies which are directly responsible to him.  
23. If such a reassignment or reorganization would contravene  
24. a statute then the Executive Order shall be delivered  
25. to the General Assembly. Now, I think this is rightfully  
26. a prerogative of the Chief Executive. I think to attempt  
27. to effect a major overhaul with...in the first few months  
28. of a brand new administration is just a little premature,  
29. a little presumptuous on our part and I would urge  
30. opposition to SB 955.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. Is there further discussion? Senator Bell.

33. SENATOR BELL:

1. Well, I might just point out that we've gotten very  
2. little in the way of executive leadership from the Governor  
3. or the Governor's Office at this time. And I think that  
4. the General Assembly, the Senate here has every right  
5. and indeed these particular times for the lack of executive  
6. leadership the responsibility to assert ourselves. And  
7. I think this is a responsible law, one that's going to help  
8. cut into the bureaucracy that plagues the State and I think  
9. it should be passed out of the Senate.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Is there any further discussion? Senator Knuepfer,  
12. do you care to close debate?

13. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

14. Well, all...all I can suggest and I'll be very brief  
15. on this is that certainly I recognize that the Governor  
16. stands behind this bill eventually. He does have the veto  
17. power. If sincerely he doesn't want it he has a mechanism  
18. for killing it. I suggest to you further that if the  
19. Governor does initiate the proposal then it comes before  
20. this Body within 60 days under the new Constitution. There's  
21. no constitutional provision restricting legislative implementation.  
22. The new constitutional provision simply provides a mechanism  
23. for the Executive to do it. I think it's a good bill for  
24. the people of Illinois and I would urge your support.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Excuse me Senator Knuepfer, I forgot to call on  
27. Senator Netsch. I didn't see her in time. Do you wish  
28. to say something on the bill Senator?

29. SENATOR NETSCH:

30. Thank...thank you Mr. President. I did. I'll make  
31. it very brief because Senator Knuepfer has closed now. I  
32. wanted to add simply one thing to what Senator Rock had  
33. said. I think that it is not fair to say that a Governor

1. has not exercised leadership in a massive reorganization  
2. of this sort within a couple of months after he has come  
3. into office, Senator Bell. In fact if a Governor had  
4. presented this proposal himself after he had held office  
5. only six weeks or two months I think you would rightfully  
6. have been highly suspect of it because it's the sort of  
7. thing that takes a great deal of thought and consideration  
8. and a great deal of familiarity with how these agencies  
9. operate. But apart from that question I wanted to add  
10. only one thing. We did consider this in addition to the  
11. Committee of the Whole hearing in the Committee...on  
12. Health, Welfare and Corrections and had some discussion  
13. about it. And my...my concern about the bill is not its  
14. concept. Senator Knuepfer is quite right, at some point we  
15. are going to have to head in this direction. But I think  
16. that several of us, at least I felt that this particular  
17. structure was a little too heavily management oriented and  
18. was not necessarily going to achieve the end result which  
19. was a consolidated delivery of services and not an additional  
20. bureaucracy. I don't feel we have quite found the right  
21. key to that yet and I...I genuinely believe it needs some  
22. more time and some more work. Thank you.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. President Harris.

25. SENATOR HARRIS:

26. Well, Mr. President, I just want to say that this is  
27. a tremendously sound piece of legislation and everyone  
28. of us has experiences constituent frustration of Illinois  
29. citizenry in need of service going from door to door, multiple  
30. stop service requirements. Surely we have the administrative  
31. capability and sense to structure statutorily the  
32. organizational delivery capability to provide acceptable  
33. service to our people. That's the whole thrust of SB 955.

1. The natural dichotomy of separate civil administrative code  
2. department delivery systems with their independent and  
3. separation is a fact about which this bill directly asserts  
4. a solution. I urge this Body to accept the principles  
5. that were in fact affirmed by several of the Directors  
6. in the testimony before the Public Health, Welfare and  
7. Corrections Committee. We do have here a product of a  
8. great deal of background study and evaluation of it's  
9. effective operation in several of the sister States. Illinois  
10. was first, way back in the days of Lowden with his civil  
11. administrative code. Let Illinois be first within it's  
12. relationship and this border of one of the best pieces  
13. of administrative reorganization machinery for health and  
14. social services delivery to its people. 955 is a vast  
15. improvement over the experience of North Carolina, Florida,  
16. California. I urge the membership of this Body to support  
17. this very meaningful and far-reaching concept of improvement  
18. of delivery services to its people. I urge a favorable  
19. roll call.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. The question is shall SB 955 pass. Upon that question  
22. the Secretary will call the roll.

23. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

24. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,  
25. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,  
26. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. McCarthy, no. On that question the ayes are thirty-  
3. two, the nays are seven. SB 955 having received a con-  
4. stitutional majority is declared passed. Senator Buzbee,  
5. 982.

6. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

7. SB 982 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
8. 3rd reading of the bill.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Senator Buzbee.

11. SENATOR BUZBEE:

12. Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President, this is a  
13. bill that on yesterday's Calendar it showed that it would  
14. appropriate \$3,000,000 to build an overpass in the City  
15. of DuQuoin, Illinois. I might add, Mr. President, that  
16. this bill was amended down to \$750,000 so already in  
17. this bill I have saved the State of Illinois \$2,250,000.  
18. Mr. President this bill would build an overpass in the  
19. City of DuQuoin over a railroad track there, the Illinois  
20. Central-Gulf Line which sometimes traffic is tied up one,  
21. two and three and four hours a day. This bill is a little  
22. bit different than most of the so-called creek bills in  
23. that the City would participate in the paying on this  
24. railroad overpass also with the State participating up  
25. to 75% or \$750,000. I would ask for a favorable roll  
26. call.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Is there any discussion? Senator Walker.

29. SENATOR WALKER:

30. Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I  
31. think here's our chance to save the State another \$750,000.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Is there any further discussion? Senator Harris.



1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Well, I would just point out that there is some kind  
3. of a mutual cooperation understanding that exists in  
4. deliberative bodies and...if one were to recall the procedures  
5. of individual Senators yesterday appropriating funds for  
6. their special unbudgeted projects within their States and  
7. the record of those who would come to the trough for them-  
8. selves that we just give some thought to past record.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Senator Savickas.

11. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

12. I just wondered if this was in the budget, this bill.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Buzbee.

15. SENATOR BUZBEE:

16. Senator Savickas I have looked the budget over thoroughly  
17. and I'm sure...it's been a mistake on my part that I  
18. haven't found it in there yet.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Is there further discussion? The question is shall  
21. SB 982 pass and upon that question the Secretary will call  
22. the roll.

23. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

12. This is an appropriation of \$15,000 to a companion  
13. bill which we passed out last week dealing with the Handgun

6. way we seem to be able to keep your husbands on the Floor.

8. On that question the ayes are thirty-one, the nays  
9. are ten. SB 1024 having received a constitutional majority  
10. is declared passed. Senator Dougherty moves to reconsider  
11. the vote by which 1024 passed. Senator Carroll moves to  
12. Table. All in favor signify by saying aye. The motion is  
13. Tabled. SB 1147...oh, excuse me.

15. Howlett.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
17. On that question the ayes are forty-eight, the nays
18. are none. SB 1174 having received a constitutional majority
19. is declared passed. 1173.
20. SECRETARY:
21. SB 1173 (Secretary reads title of bill)
22. 3rd reading of the bill.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
24. Senator Mohr.
25. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:
26. Yes,...
27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
28. For what purpose does Senator Bruce arise?
29. SENATOR BRUCE:
30. Yes, Senator Mohr, I know Senator Harris is off
31. the Floor. I gave an amendment to 1173 for his perusal
32. this morning and I don't know whether he's made a decision
33. on that or not.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. Senator Mohr.

3. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

4. Yes, Mr. President, I'll respond to that. Senator...  
5. Senator Harris has looked over the amendment and it is not  
6. acceptable. No, he's going to call the bill. The amendment  
7. is not acceptable Mr. President and the bill does as the  
8. synopsis states, and I'd ask for a favorable roll call.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Is there any discussion? The question is shall  
11. SB 1173 pass. Senator Bruce.

12. SENATOR BRUCE:

13. Well, I suppose that in these last days that from  
14. time to time courtesies will not be extended. It's surprising  
15. to me that this amendment at least we did not have the attempt  
16. to...allowed the attempt to place this amendment on and  
17. I would like to discuss very briefly the problem this bill  
18. now presents. SB 1173 is an appropriation to the State  
19. Supreme Court, and I hope the lawyers who have cases before  
20. that and before the Judicial Commission and the Courts  
21. Commission will have a chance to take a look at this  
22. appropriation. For what this appropriation does I believe  
23. violates two things. First of all a constitutionally created  
24. commission is funded in SB 1173. My amendment and bill which  
25. was not allowed to be introduced would have corrected that  
26. error. We now find in SB 1173 \$15,000 for the Courts  
27. Commission, established by the Constitution under Article 6,  
28. Section 15, Subsection E. I don't believe that we can fund  
29. that through this particular piece of legislation. It's a  
30. question of disagreement with leadership, but I am...I am  
31. thinking that this Legislature is making a mistake that  
32. I hope can be corrected in the House for this reason, if  
33. we do...if we do appropriate the money to this Supreme Court

1. in this fashion I believe there's a chance that in a case  
2. before the commission someone can allege that there's been  
3. an inappropriate appropriation. You've got to remember  
4. there are two bodies involved, the Judicial Inquiry Board  
5. and the Courts Commission. Both of those are constitutionally  
6. created not legislatively but constitutionally created.  
7. We have historically since the beginning of the Judicial  
8. Inquiry Board given them money directly. Now, the Courts  
9. Commission however last year I did not catch it, I think  
10. it's time we correct our errors. We proceed with the error  
11. by putting the money with the Supreme Court. You find  
12. yourself in the very delicate situation of funding the  
13. body that is going to be investigated. Now maybe everyone  
14. would like to do that with the court system in the situation  
15. it is in Illinois. I don't want to and I believe others on  
16. this Floor don't want to and would have supported an amendment  
17. to remove that \$15,000 and give it directly to the Courts  
18. Commission. But now what we've said is we're giving the  
19. money to the State Supreme Court, you give it to the  
20. Courts Commission and that Court Commission will investigate  
21. the very judges that are underneath your control. I feel  
22. very uncomfortable about that. I believe other members  
23. feel uncomfortable about it. For one thing the Constitution  
24. says we by law will give sufficient money to the Commission.  
25. I don't think we can do it in the appropriation to the  
26. Supreme Court. I'm going to support this appropriation.  
27. I don't understand Senator Harris' view that we could not  
28. at least have discussed the amendment, discussed the very  
29. delicate situation we're in of giving money to the Supreme  
30. Court for the Courts Commission, a constitutionally created  
31. commission. I don't know why we don't put the Judicial  
32. Inquiry Board in here under that logic. I know why we  
33. don't, is this Legislature and the Constitutional Convention

1. wanted an independent investigatory body under the Judicial  
2. Inquiry Board and an independent trier of fact under the  
3. Courts Commission. It seems to me just bad legislative procedure  
4. to give this money to the State Supreme Court. I'm sorry  
5. that we were not able to talk about that amendment. We're  
6. not able to discuss the Judicial Inquiry Board, and the  
7. Courts Commission particularly in light of what has happened  
8. in some of our courts in this State.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Is there any further discussion? Senator Mohr may  
11. close debate.

12. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

13. Yes Mr. President, of course the time to put the amend-  
14. ment on Senator Bruce would be either in Committee or on 2nd  
15. reading. I would raise that point and Senator Harris has  
16. had time to review this. It is his bill and he just does  
17. not want to accept the amendment. He points out that the  
18. Commission is created by the 1970 Constitution under Article  
19. 6, Section 15, paragraph E through G which provides that the  
20. General Assembly shall provide by law for the expenses of the  
21. Commission and this is not a statutory body as suggested by  
22. Senator Bruce. The Legislative Reference Bureau has no  
23. problem with the bill, so I'd ask for a unanimous roll call.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. The question is shall SB 1173 pass. Upon that  
26. question the Secretary will call the roll.

27. SECRETARY:

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senator Chew would like to be recorded aye. Buzbee,  
7. aye. Daley aye. Bell, aye. On that question the ayes  
8. are forty-eight, the nays are none, three present. SB 1173  
9. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.  
10. 1193.

11. SECRETARY:

12. SB 1193 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
13. 3rd reading of the bill.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

15. Senator Harris.

16. SENATOR HARRIS:

17. This is a transfer within the appropriation to the  
18. General Assembly out of committee expense of \$50,000 to  
19. the Senate Operations Commission. No new money, just a  
20. transfer. Would urge favorable roll call.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Is there any discussion? Senator Swinarski.

23. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

24. I've looked in the synopsis and in the bills and I've  
25. gone in the backroom looking for a copy of it, and I don't  
26. quite understand that where the transfer is coming from  
27. and to and what for exactly. And I wanted the opportunity  
28. to read it. I don't believe it's printed yet, Senator.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

30. Senator Harris.

31. SENATOR HARRIS:

32. Senator, if you want this bill printed now that will  
33. be just fine. Just take the bill out of the record. Any

1. old time you want some help, you let me know.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. The question is shall SB...take it out of the record,  
4. Mr. Secretary. We will proceed to the order of House Bills  
5. on 3rd reading, and by agreement we're moving to HB 200.  
6. Senator Mohr.

7. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

8. Mr. President, I think if some of the members would spend  
9. more time on the Floor and be here every day...during the week  
10. and read these bills and not wait until the last minute  
11. until the bill is called, we'd be in much better shape. I  
12. hope Senator Swinarski can get that off of the tape, he isn't  
13. listening, but it's for his benefit.

14. SECRETARY:

15. HB 200 (Secretary reads title of bill)  
16. 3rd reading of the bill.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Senator Glass.

19. SENATOR GLASS:

20. Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate. HB 200  
21. would lower the drinking age in Illinois for beer and wine  
22. to 19. Now I believe this is a bill which represents the  
23. natural step in giving the full rights and responsibilities  
24. to our citizens at earlier ages. As you know, 18 year olds  
25. are now deemed old enough to vote, sign contracts and serve  
26. their country in the armed services. And frankly I can see  
27. little justification for discriminating against them in many  
28. other areas. Now, I think there are advantages also in moving  
29. in step. In the House the original bill contained the age  
30. of 18 and it was increased to 19 basically on the grounds  
31. that a 19 year old would be out of high school. I believe  
32. this is an appropriate distinction. Now, 18 year olds and  
33. 19 year olds have entered our adult society in many respects

1. and as you know many of them drink already. Our neigh-  
2. boring States of Iowa, Wisconsin and Kentucky have  
3. legalized drinking for 18 years olds without serious  
4. incident. Many European countries have no curtailment  
5. on...on drinking rights. And frankly I have a good deal  
6. of faith in our younger citizens and I believe this is  
7. a right that they should have. I would just amplify  
8. briefly on this by saying that to me the single argument  
9. that is most compelling is that of military service. It  
10. seems to me inconceivable that we can send our young men  
11. and women into the service of their country and then tell  
12. them on the other hand that they are not morally responsible  
13. enough to drink beer and wine. I...I believe this is  
14. indefensible. I think that virtually everyone who does  
15. attend college today who wants to drink beer does so,  
16. that it's hypocritical to assume the posture of attempting  
17. to prohibit them from...from drinking. And I would point  
18. out also that we're talking about not only college students  
19. but the many, many, young men and women who do not go to  
20. college but enter society upon their graduation from high  
21. school and are breadwinners and are employed in gainful  
22. employment and yet legally cannot indulge in the drinking  
23. of beer and wine. So, Mr. President and Senators, I would  
24. urge your support of HB 200.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Senator Bell.

27. SENATOR BELL:

28. Well, Mr. President, I'm going to rise in opposition  
29. to HB 200. And it's something that I'm doing after a lot  
30. of study on my part. I know that as many of you have done  
31. because I've talked to many of you that we've searched  
32. our minds and come up with different position at times,  
33. but I think I've come to the proper position at this time.

1. and I'd like to point a few...a few incidents...a few  
2. statistics...I'd like to point a few statistics that I  
3. think are very meaningful and proper in our considerations  
4. upon this problem. And now I'm quoting in reference to,  
5. or I'm taking these statistics in reference to a study  
6. conducted in Ontario, Canada by Drs. R. G. Smart, a Diana  
7. Faser, A Father J. White concerning the survey of addiction  
8. sponsored by the Research Foundation of Ontario, Canada. It  
9. was printed...printed in a magazine called the American  
10. Issue, by the American Council on Alocohlic Problems. There  
11. has been a 10% increase in youthful drinking under the  
12. Canadian, the Ontario, Canada study that allows 18 year  
13. olds the right to drink. There has been a 71% increase in  
14. drinking by students in the grades of 7, 9, 11 and 13.  
15. They have consumed alcohol at least once a month, the 71%.  
16. 23.3% admit to the fact that it's four or more times per  
17. month. I might add that in 1971 Ontario brought in 18 year  
18. old drinking as a law, they reduced it from 21 to 18.  
19. The making of a drug, and that's what alcohol is, the  
20. making of a drug legal for use is vastly, vastly different  
21. from allowing them to decide for themselves whether or not  
22. they're going to marry, or whether or not they're going to  
23. get a drivers license. And I submit to you...I submit to  
24. you that the question of military service while on the  
25. surface seems related is in fact not. I'd like to mention  
26. in reference to Senator Glass' comment about military  
27. service making an individual a responsible individual  
28. and able to imbibe in alcohol. You know we can carry this  
29. a step further and granted it is ridiculous, but the point  
30. can be made that four year olds are old enough to fight and  
31. they'll take on almost anyone as you know, even an adult  
32. sometimes. However more pointedly 12 year olds can be  
33. taught to obey orders and to shoot a gun with accuracy

1. And they did it in the German army during the fall of  
2. the Nazi regime. But they're not old enough to drink,  
3. and for you that don't know it witness the problem that  
4. they have in France with 6 year old that have an alcoholic  
5. problem. Now I don't think we're going to be doing any  
6. favors for our youth by passing this bill. I think it's  
7. a bill that rather than giving them what they need and  
8. what they really desire to pssess puts an added burden  
9. on them that their responsibilities in life has been too  
10. limited to properly adjust to. I might finally add in  
11. closing Senators that the State of Michigan the 29th  
12. of May had sought to reverse it's previous passed bill  
13. that allowed 18 year olds to drink it's before committee  
14. in the Michigan Legislature, evidently there's about a  
15. 10 to 1 committee favor...showing favoritism to reverse  
16. this so it's highly likely that the State of Michigan  
17. may reverse it's previous action in allowing 18 year olds  
18. to drink and put it back to 21. I think we stand on the  
19. verge in this Senate of some responsible decisions. We've  
20. been trying to make some. I feel that this decision can  
21. be irresponsible. I think we need it...I think we need to  
22. make that decision for the State of Illinois and to safe-  
23. guard our children. I have three teenage daughters, and  
24. I don't think that I want to see this bill passed. Thank you.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Senator Rock.

27. SENATOR ROCK:

28. Yes, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,  
29. I rise in support of HB 200. I congratulated the sponsor  
30. for successfully getting this bill out to the Floor of the  
31. Senate to get the kind of debate and discussion it deserves.  
32. I was the Senate sponsor of a similar measure which died  
33. in committee last year. There was only one sole objection

1. in the Senate committee and that was with regard to the  
2. arbitrariness of the 18, 19 or 20 year old. It was pointed  
3. out and I think probably rightfully that an 18 year old in  
4. many instances is still a senior in high school. This bill  
5. has now been amended to cover just exactly that objection,  
6. and relates to those who are 19 and 20. These are the  
7. citizens of our State who have a right to vote, who have  
8. the duty to fight and I suggest that we should extend to  
9. them the privilege to have a glass of beer. I urge an  
10. aye vote.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Senator Mitchler.

13. SENATOR MITCHLER:

14. Very briefly, Mr. President, Members of the Senate,  
15. because I believe all of you have received considerable  
16. mail both pro and con and I can't conceive why anyone  
17. would not have his or her mind made up at this time. I  
18. would like to ask the sponsor a question, and that is why  
19. is this bill at 19 years of age for drinking only beer  
20. and wine when you so eloquently advocated the age 18 for  
21. voting and doing many other things, serving on jury duty  
22. and I would suspect that you'd even approve of legislation  
23. to have 18 year olds on school boards. Could you answer  
24. the question why it's 19 and why it's limited to beer and  
25. wine?

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

27. Senator Glass.

28. SENATOR GLASS:

29. Yes, Senator Mitchler, I did allude to that in my  
30. earlier presentation, but specifically the age was increased  
31. to 19 over in the House for several reasons, and changed  
32. to beer and wine rather than all alcohol for several reasons.  
33. I think the majority feeling was that by raising the age

1. to 19 high school students would not be included and many  
2. persons in that Chamber had reservations with regard to  
3. high school students and so the sponsor in the House agreed  
4. to increase the age to 19. Beer and wine are not...are  
5. alcoholic beverages but do not cause intoxication as readily  
6. as others you know. And I think it was felt that this  
7. was a proper first step for Illinois to move in the direction  
8. of more complete rights for 18 year olds. So I believe  
9. these are the reasons that the age was changed and the  
10. bill modified in the House.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Senator Mitchler.

13. SENATOR MITCHLER:

14. Well, Senator Glass then you concur that age 19 is  
15. the proper age to have in this bill rather than 18.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Senator Glass.

18. SENATOR GLASS:

19. Well, I would concur for the reasons I gave that this  
20. is a proper first step toward giving more complete rights  
21. to 18 year olds and I believe it is a proper age to have  
22. in the bill.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Senator Mitchler.

25. SENATOR MITCHLER:

26. Thank you. Now, I want to go back to where this ball  
27. started. You know...everytime you get a bill down here  
28. you want to have a referendum on it when it involves the  
29. taxpayer, that poor little Mr., what was it, Sweeney or  
30. that guy the stiff on the street that Senator Sours refers  
31. to him in Peoria? But you know we had a constitutional  
32. convention and they put this proposition of lowering the  
33. voting age to 18 to the people. And the December 15, 1970

1. this is how the people voted. You always talk about the  
2. people. Yes, 869,816 on the question of lowering the voting  
3. age to 18, no, 1,520,924. But in February of 1971 immediate-  
4. ly following the expression of the people this Body and the  
5. other Body across the rotunda saw fit to ratify and lower  
6. the voting age to 18. And from that we've had the genesis  
7. of all of this lowering down and lowering down giving all  
8. these additional privileges. If you put this up to the  
9. people, the people you'd find that the vote would be no.  
10. Because if you're mail is anything like my mail they do not  
11. believe that it is a proper thing. Now you all know of the  
12. arguments pro and con and I'm going to cast a negative vote.  
13. My little son happens to be sitting in back of me, he's going  
14. to be 18 here in January, another year he'll be able to vote.  
15. And I hope he votes right, at least I've tried to train him  
16. so, but I'm not going to try to train him to drink at 19.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Senator Partee.

19. SENATOR PARTEE:

20. Well, I think it's unfortunate that Senator Mitchler  
21. brought in the vote on the 18 year olds subject before the  
22. constitution...as a part of the constitutional ratification  
23. because he simply ignores that this Body did not act on the  
24. basis of ignoring what the people had chosen to do on that  
25. question. We were virtually mandated into that position by  
26. an order coming from the Supreme Court. You know that and I  
27. don't know why you don't mention it. I don't think you've  
28. forgotten it. You just simply didn't mention it because  
29. it wasn't constant with your argument. But it makes your  
30. argument very specious and fatuous. Now, the fact of the  
31. matter is I'd like to see this bill be 18 or 19 across  
32. the board. It's sort of silly to me it seems for a young  
33. man to go into a place if he can drink beer or wine and

1. engage in arguments with the proprietor as to what the  
2. components and constituent parts of a particular  
3. alcoholic beverage is. Some things that are called wine  
4. are not in fact wine, and some things that are called other  
5. things are something else. And I suggest to you...it's...  
6. if a kid sitting in there with his father and he's drinking...  
7. he has two beers and the old man says give him a shot,  
8. what happens? He has an argument with the bar keep,...  
9. he has an argument with proprietor. This bill ought  
10. to go all the way across the board. Either if they can  
11. drink at 19, beer, wine or whatever is made alcoholic, or  
12. nothing - one or the other. But inasmuch as this is what  
13. appears to be a reasonable compromise of conflicting dif-  
14. ferences, I'm going to support the bill. But it ought not  
15. be limited to beer and wine, if he's 19 then you say he has  
16. ability to carry any kind of alcoholic beverage ...you ought  
17. to be able to carry any. It's like saying he should be able  
18. to buy cigarette but not cigars or pipes, it's just that simple.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Senator Knuppel.

21. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

22. Mr. President and Members of this Body, I ask you why  
23. does anyone want 19 year olds or 20 year olds to drink, in  
24. fact why does anyone want to drink? Actually what is liquor,  
25. alcoholic beverages? It's distilled grain. It's slop, it's  
26. swill, it's what we use to feed our hogs at home. Now, what  
27. are the results of this? God gives you a beautiful body, it  
28. can in no way be improved by the use of drugs or alcoholic  
29. beverages. They only make you look silly, out of place.  
30. They dull your senses, and make a stupe out of you. But  
31. what's happened? Let's look at what's happened where they've  
32. done it in Michigan. And Ladies and Gentlemen these facts  
33. are irrefutable. Total accidents are up 140% for the 18 to



1. 20 year old drivers while they're only up 14% for other  
2. drivers. Fatal accidents are up 164% for the 18 to 20  
3. year old drivers while they're only up 38% for other  
4. drivers. Injuries...accidents with injuries are up 153%  
5. for the 18 to 20 year old driver. They're only up 26%  
6. for other drivers. The facts are irrefutable as to what  
7. is to happen. Are you to wish these deaths, these injuries,  
8. these maiming injuries on your own youth? Now, I have a  
9. boy 11 years old and I very much want him to find it as  
10. difficult as possible to find alcoholic beverages to drink.  
11. The arguments that youngsters do drink is not persuasive,  
12. any more so than that...than are the facts that some teen-  
13. agers use guns and knives. This is no reason to legalize  
14. it, I say to you that this is as good an exhibition of the  
15. moral decay and the...weakened moral fiber of America as  
16. exists anywhere, the idea...the idea that 59 grown intelli-  
17. gent men elected by the people would stand here and believe  
18. that they're doing something that's worthwhile. Oh today,  
19. Oh God, for another Carry Nation for all of us, not just  
20. our teenagers. What are we doing? This is the number one  
21. drug problem in America, it's worse than...and they just  
22. found that a committee...it's worse than any other drug.  
23. It's caused more misery, more trouble, more heartbreak,  
24. more poorness, more losses of gambling and other things that  
25. people wouldn't do if they were sober. Why wish this on  
26. your children at an age when they can enjoy life, when  
27. they can have all the fulfillment of their capacities and  
28. the enjoyment of those beautiful bodies that God gave them.  
29. I say to you, stop and think. What you do here and when  
30. you return here if you pass this bill this year or next  
31. year you may be thinking as Michigan has where the Senate  
32. has already passed a repealer on May 23rd of this year.  
33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Mohr.

2. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

3. Yes Mr. President, I would agree wholeheartedly with  
4. Senator Knuppel on this subject, being a man that has the  
5. problem of controlling some 60 liquor establishments in my  
6. municipality serving as Liquor Commissioner, the thought  
7. occurs to me that there is no way that this could really be  
8. policed. We're talking about serving beer and wine in  
9. restaurants, you put a tremendous burden on a tavern owner  
10. or a restaurant owner, the waitresses. There's just no way  
11. possible that this could really be policed or enforced. This  
12. is a bad, bad bill and I again agree 100% with Senator Knuppel  
13. ...with regard to the deaths caused by drinking. I've wit-  
14. nessed that in many, many...many occasions in a spot that we  
15. have up in Wisconsin, where my young boys have palled around  
16. with young men that have been killed by automobile accidents  
17. when imbibing and they'll get it soon enough. You know,  
18. you have to wait sometimes for these things that we think  
19. are good. But we'd be doing a great disservice to the 18  
20. year olds and the owners and proprietors of liquor establish-  
21. ments. Now, Mr. President, I would like to take a minute  
22. to introduce to this Body a man that probably doesn't need  
23. introduction to all but possibly a few new members. Up in  
24. the President's gallery, a gentleman that retired after some  
25. 36 years, the dean of the Illinois State Senate, a grander  
26. guy never lived, we're happy to have him back here with  
27. us today, Senator Arthur Bidwill. With...with...with  
28. Senator Bidwill is a real authority on the drink, well  
29. on everything, that's true, but any information that one  
30. might want on 18 year old drinking, Senator...Senators,  
31. I would suggest you talk to Senator Bidwill's friend up there,  
32. Phil Conolly, known to many of the fellow down here also  
33. and another gentleman with him, former Senator Art Gottschalk.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. Senator Sours:

3. SENATOR SOURS:

4. Mr. President, I want to confirm just about every-  
5. thing Senator Knuppel has said with reference to the  
6. experience in Michigan. It's been a slaughter pen up  
7. there and when there's such a complete reversal in such  
8. a very short time it's quite obvious that the highways  
9. did become an area of carnage, drunken drivers, young  
10. people. I wonder how many of those in the Chamber who  
11. are supporting this bill ever had the occasion to defend  
12. a drunk, even in the small community of Peoria I had  
13. one client who was arrested so he said 32 times for reck-  
14. less walking. And he was confined in Peoria State Hospital  
15. about a dozen times in four or five years. I'm thinking  
16. also of the drunk I had one time, he was so drunk we had  
17. to get him in AA one A at a time. Now, the problem is  
18. at one time within the last ten years in Peoria State  
19. Hospital there was a population of about 2400 people  
20. committed. There was...there were 700 alcoholics at that  
21. time. Now there's...there's a bill on the Calendar right  
22. today, or it...it may be in Judiciary Committee which will  
23. treat the alcoholic party different from the non-alcoholic  
24. party. Now, we're just causing a lot of trouble here and  
25. as Senator Knuppel says this is a grave matter. It isn't  
26. anything we can laugh at or wink at or pooh-pooh once we...  
27. we throw the right to the...to the young person 19 years  
28. of age to booze it up, that's exactly what a large number  
29. of them will do. And we'd better realize that when this  
30. vote comes up for a roll call.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. Senator Johns, excuse me, Senator Hynes. Go ahead  
33. Senator Johns I don't see Senator Hynes on the floor.

1. SENATOR JOHNS:

2. Will the sponsor yield to a question? Senator Glass.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

4. He indicates that he will.

5. SENATOR JOHNS:

6. Senator Glass, would you tell me what is the largest  
7. disease in the United States noted by public health au-  
8. thorities?

9. SENATOR GLASS:

10. Well, I...I can't honestly say I know Senator, but  
11. I'd be glad to have you tell me.

12. SENATOR JOHNS:

13. It's alcoholism. Now here we stand as members and  
14. representatives of the public. We're supposed to set an  
15. example, really for the young people of our nation. Silently  
16. and secretly as you attend functions and as you traverse  
17. about your territory, the young people once aware that  
18. you're a Senator look at you and evaluate you as a human  
19. being and as an adult. We need leadership in this country  
20. throughout for the young people to look to. They're crying  
21. for leadership with adults who must set an example in our  
22. everyday behavior and especially in the behavior that  
23. we conduct ourselves herein. We must give them something  
24. to live by and to look forward to. We cannot give them  
25. everything they want simply because they want it. I came  
26. here to represent the majority of the voters and I consider  
27. them to be adults. We gave the young people the right to  
28. vote and they sure didn't accept that responsibility. I  
29. guess less than 12% of those available to vote turned  
30. out. They really accepted responsibility. I was saddened  
31. by that fact. I really was. We will have insurance  
32. increases, our police force already beleaguered will be  
33. short in numbers to conduct the needed enforcement. Public  
and private property will be in jeopardy, our parks and

1. all of our public facilities will suffer. I ask you  
2. gentlemen as adults can we stand here today and offer  
3. them this example for them to look to in the future?  
4. Thank you very much.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senator Hynes.

7. SENATOR HYNES:

8. Mr. President, Members of the Senate I rise to  
9. recognize a very important person who is with us today,  
10. the beautiful bride of Senator Philip Rock, Sheila Rock.  
11. And...and the wife of Senator Ben Palmer, Betty Palmer.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

13. Senator Nimrod.

14. SENATOR NIMROD:

15. Mr. President, fellow Senators we have heard a great  
16. deal of discussion relating to the facts of what has happened.  
17. I've heard very little about other than we should give the  
18. 18 year olds the right to drink on some weak excuse or  
19. the 19 year olds on some weak excuse that since they're  
20. able to fight they should be able to drink. But I want  
21. to tell you that we've been a number of wars and I've been  
22. in two myself, and I've seen a lot of drinking going on,  
23. and it doesn't mean that when they go to war they can't  
24. drink because it's available to them, they drink when they  
25. go to war. This doesn't give them the right to drink when  
26. they're in war or when they're in camp. I think this  
27. problem is a national problem and not one that States  
28. should be fooling around with allowing us to have these  
29. borders of crossing over whether or not our children have  
30. been running over to Michigan. I didn't see thousands of  
31. young people flying up or driving up to Wisconsin because  
32. they've allowed it. I don't see them running over to Iowa  
33. or to Kentucky. I think it's about time we realized what

1. the issue is here. The real issue is one where we as  
2. parents and as responsible citizens and adults have to  
3. say no to children. And it's about time that we stood  
4. up and took away some of this permissiveness and we main-  
5. tained the kind of discipline that has brought us to this  
6. day of responsibility. You and I are responsible today  
7. because we had good teachers. Now, what happens with...  
8. with alcohol or with drinking when we allow it to go to  
9. 19 year olds? Up until now it's the 19 and 20's, pretty  
10. soon it's going to be the 15, 16 and 17 once you get by  
11. the next ones. And when you start getting down to that  
12. age what are we talking about? We saw it here and when  
13. we go through...and marriage at 16. We see it here in  
14. all the other permissiveness that's down to an area is a  
15. person responsible at that age or are they still under  
16. the guidance and leadership and learning. Is there any-  
17. thing that we could not offer a young person that he would  
18. not accept. He will want everything. Now, we have heard  
19. today that 50% of the drug problem, over 50% is alcohol.  
20. We've heard that accidents pertaining on the road that the...  
21. over 60% of the deaths between the ages of 19 and 25  
22. have been caused in death with young people involved.  
23. I attended a symposium two weeks ago. The shortest five  
24. minutes I've ever had. The symposium, I attended an alcohol  
25. and I found out that leaders from all over this nation  
26. substantiate and prove this particular issue. All I can  
27. say to us is that we must make a decision today that will  
28. effect the young people. If we're spending millions and  
29. billions of dollars to eliminate drugs and the biggest  
30. drug problem we have today by far is alcoholism, why are  
31. we introducing new factors?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Senator Nimrod, there are six other speakers and your

1. time has...

2. SENATOR NIMROD:

3. I'm closing Mr. President. The big problem today is  
4. that we must look to ourselves and be ready to accept the  
5. responsibility of the deaths on the highway, the broken  
6. homes, the suicides and all the ills that come with alcohol.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

8. Senator Davidson.

9. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

10. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,  
11. I rise in opposition to this bill. I think you've forgot  
12. two items which all of you remember when you were young,  
13. when you used to have...when you were 17 or 18 and you looked  
14. up to the guy who was 21 as your friend and he'd go in  
15. and buy a beer or a bottle and bring it out and give you  
16. a drink. Now, the kids who are 15 or 16 year old, the 19  
17. year old doesn't get away, they are still their friend,  
18. they are that many years senior, you look up to them. This  
19. guy can go in or this girl can go in and legally buy beer  
20. or wine that the 15, 16 year old or even a 14 year old is  
21. going to be sitting out in the car drinking, which now is  
22. more difficult for anyone at that age to attain alcohol.  
23. I think the best opposition to this bill was given in  
24. two of the letters I received in opposition to it early  
25. when this bill first came over and their closing line was  
26. that we youth don't always know what's good for youth  
27. and please vote no on this bill. And I urge all of you  
28. to vote no on this bill.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

30. Senator Merritt.

31. SENATOR MERRITT:

32. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. This  
33. ought to begin to bring home to us the falling of our ways.

1. Now I realize it was the Supreme Court ruling that lowered  
2. the voting age to 18. But I think the people also spoke  
3. very heavily in that constitutional convention election.  
4. It's just another case of piecemealing everything together  
5. for 18 year olds. They also now can be guardians, they can  
6. be executors, administrators. We had to do each one piece-  
7. meal. This is just another prime example of getting it  
8. one more bit of legislation. I attempted to ge the LRB  
9. to draft a bill to plain old say in simple terms that a per-  
10. son reaches their majority at age 18 for all purposes. And  
11. that's the way we should...attempt to address ourselves  
12. to this problem. Unfortunately we have not done it. The  
13. Legislative Reference Bureau indicates there are perhaps a  
14. thousand or more Sections of the Act involved and you could  
15. not do it with one bill. But believe you me, we're going  
16. to regret what's being done here today if this bill passes.  
17. We made great strides in this State, in my humble opinion  
18. in combating the problem of the drunken driver on the high-  
19. ways with our implied consent laws that's even been  
20. strengthened. Now, in one fell swoop with the passage  
21. of this bill you're going to undo all the good that has  
22. been done in the lowering of our death rate and injuries on  
23. the highways. Take the State of Michigan, and I'm not  
24. going to bore you with all those figures again, but believe  
25. me you when you're talking about the 18 to 21 group in  
26. nine months of the operation 4,282 injured, 116 killed,  
27. you better begin to think about your loved ones at home  
28. once again. As I understand it the State of Michigan did  
29. see the folly of their ways, a bill has been passed in one  
30. house to repeal that action. I think we in Illinois, if  
31. we love our families and don't want to look at that slaughter  
32. of them on our highways, we better begin to think in terms  
33. of what Michigan finally has acceded to as being the right



1. addressment to this problem and you're going to create all  
2. sorts of havoc with good restaurants and tavern owners...  
3. operators who own fine establishments, some have already  
4. indicated to me we've got enough problems already with the  
5. young, are you going to add further complexity to it. When  
6. they walk in droves, some get a pitcher of beer, some a  
7. little wine, all of a sudden a highball is delivered because  
8. one's a little bit older and then...then you've got trouble,  
9. the waitress is in trouble and the fellow loses his license  
10. if there's an investigator there. I'm sorry, I certainly  
11. oppose this bill vigorously in the interest of our loved  
12. ones.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Wooten.

15. SENATOR WOOTEN:

16. Mr. President, it's extremely difficult to steer a  
17. straight course when faced with legislation that has the  
18. emotional impact of this one. Actually it really is too  
19. bad that we drink at all. But the fact is as far back as  
20. history goes men have attempted to alter their consciousness  
21. in one way or another. And in the western hemisphere it  
22. seems that alcohol is the device most commonly used. I  
23. think if we could abolish drinking altogether it would be  
24. a small loss. But that small loss is not one that many  
25. people would easily sustain including I suspect members of  
26. this Chamber. We have attempted this before in prohibition  
27. and the plain fact is that it did not work. Now, the next  
28. step is we're faced with a question of when is a person an  
29. adult. I don't think I qualified in any sense until I was  
30. at least 30 and they're probably people in the Chamber who  
31. would think I don't quite make it today. There's a serious  
32. question as to whether 18 or 21 qualifies a person as an  
33. adult. But the plain fact is that's when people vote, and

1. we're talking about the rights of adult citizens. They  
2. are rights that we enjoy and if they are old enough to  
3. vote I am afraid we must by logic if nothing else extend  
4. them the rights of majority. I'm not comfortable doing it.  
5. I think we backed into this in a series of egregious  
6. errors beginning all the way back in national policy  
7. with the war in Viet Nam which pushed it back to voting  
8. to 18 and now we're faced with this. It's a series of  
9. mistakes and unhappy choices and I'm afraid we're just  
10. kind of stuck with it. Also this is not a mandate to drink,  
11. it's permission. And I don't think quite frankly we're going  
12. to change greatly the percentage of young people who are  
13. drinking right now. In terms of what alcohol can do in  
14. accident rates, it's absolutely true. It certainly  
15. contributes to them but then so do automobiles and many  
16. other things that are very dangerous weapons. We probably  
17. should not let our youngsters deal with but in plain fact  
18. we do. I'm unhappy with this. I would just as soon we  
19. could dodge the whole issue but as I say we seem to be  
20. impaled on several points of logic, questions that perhaps  
21. do not go ...go together easily, we must bring together  
22. in this vote. And so I'm going to support this compromise  
23. of drinking beer and wine at the age of 19 because I really  
24. do not see any other way for us to go.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Senator Graham. Senator Graham.

27. SENATOR GRAHAM:

28. Well Senator Glass should feel pretty good, his bill has  
29. been picked pretty clean. I have heard of the virtues of  
30. the 18 year olds and the lack of the virtues. That concern  
31. I'm not going to deal with. One person, only Senator Merritt,  
32. alluded to it briefly. It hasn't been considered at least  
33. openly here today is a man and...or his wife or a family

1. who has put together their family fortune or have their  
2. family investments throughout the years involved in a lounge,  
3. cocktail lounge and or restaurant or what have you, that  
4. can not sustain a series of closing or a losing of their  
5. license. Now, there is no good restaurant or tavern or lounge  
6. in Springfield, Decatur, Chicago or anywhere else that is  
7. going to properly be able to police a large crowd to the  
8. extent that they're going to be able to say that these...  
9. this table is drinking only beer and wine and this one  
10. over here is drinking Seven Crown and 7-Up. So the  
11. ultimate result of this kind of a problem will result in  
12. effecting whom. Not the 18 year old that's not paying  
13. taxes, it's going to effect that person, that guy on the  
14. street, that fellow who has been paying a liquor license  
15. municipally and state-wide and real estate taxes and  
16. personal property taxes and sales taxes and all the other  
17. things all through the years. And we're going to take  
18. a chance on putting him out of business. So if we must  
19. pursue this course, then for God's sake let's have a  
20. separate facility bill where they can know then this...  
21. in this one location that they're only drinking beer and  
22. wine, and don't have any whiskey around. This is absolute  
23. insanity.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. Senator Schaffer.

26. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

27. I think I have a distinction in this Body, I don't  
28. know if it's a totally unique one. I don't drink. I  
29. don't drink at all. Those of you who know me know that  
30. that's true. I haven't got any traumatic story to tell.  
31. I made my decision a long time ago, long before I was 19  
32. and my daily existence reinforces my conviction that this  
33. is a wise and prudent path. I've represented districts

1. that voted two to one for Barry Goldwater, destroyed the  
2. gentleman the Democrats ran in the last Presidential  
3. election, and perhaps is one of the most conservative  
4. districts in this State. And I'm down here I believe  
5. to represent their interest. I put a public opinion  
6. poll out to over 2,000 homes of registered voters, which  
7. means that these people are predominately over 21.  
8. Obviously they're probably over 35, they're probably  
9. average aged somewhere around 50. Oddly enough we got  
10. a tremendous response back, we got a 33% response back.  
11. And 60% of the people who responded indicated that they  
12. favored lowering the drinking age either to 18, to 19  
13. or to 19 for beer and wine. Quite frankly that indicates  
14. to me that this idea is an idea whose time has come. I  
15. share Senator Graham's reservations about 19 for just  
16. beer and wine. I think it is going to impose some hard-  
17. ships on the people that run these type of establishments.  
18. If my mail is any kind of an indicator they are prepared  
19. to accept these hardships. I wish them well on it. I'm  
20. going to support this bill because the people in my district  
21. want it. I think it's going to create some problems but  
22. I think the..we've lowered the voting age, I think these  
23. people have these rights. And I'm going to support this  
24. bill.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Senator Ozinga.

27. SENATOR OZINGA:

28. Mr. President, being one of the vociferous members  
29. of this Body I think it's about time that I would rise  
30. to the occasion here and as I stand here I am thinking  
31. along the line that about ten or twelve or maybe fourteen  
32. years ago I can remember sponsoring a bill that would have  
33. raised the limit to 21 for all people and as Senator Bidwill

1. sits up there he can remember when Denny Collins got up  
2. and made a 4th of July speech on that very issue and it  
3. took up about twenty-five minutes to calm him down. Well  
4. here we've had all of these 4th of July speeches here  
5. today and all of the reporters have done a...great big job  
6. of getting everybody's quote in the newspaper. And I  
7. don't think it's changed a vote from the minute they  
8. stepped into this Chamber. Therefore, Mr. President, I  
9. would move the previous question.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. There's one more that I...is on the list, Senator  
12. Bartulis. He waves off, so Senator Glass may close debate.

13. SENATOR GLASS:

14. Thank you, Mr. President. Briefly closing debate  
15. because it has been a long debate and I think a good one,  
16. I would make a plea for the bill simply on this ground.  
17. You've heard Senator Knuppel call attention to the fact  
18. that there are many evils in drink, that we should set  
19. examples for our young people and I would agree with them.  
20. I think the way to set an example is to do so by acting  
21. and not by saying. What we're...what we're doing in this  
22. bill is simply saying to the young people we accept you  
23. as adults and we're giving you the responsibility to  
24. make this important decision on your own. You don't have  
25. to drink, there's nobody forcing you to do it but you  
26. ought to be entitled to make this decision yourself. I  
27. would urge a favorable roll call on HB 200.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

29. The question is shall HB 200 pass and upon that  
30. question the Secretary will call the roll.

31. SECRETARY:

32. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,  
33. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

1. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth  
2. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,  
3. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard  
4. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,  
5. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,  
6. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,  
7. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,  
8. Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.  
9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
10. Daley, aye. McBroom, no. Clarke, no. Graham, no.  
11. On that question the ayes are thirty-two, the nays are  
12. three. HB 200 having received a constitutional majority  
13. is declared passed. Verification has been requested, the  
14. Secretary will verify the yeas.  
15. SECRETARY:  
16. The following...  
17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
18. Will the Senators please be in their seats for  
19. verification.  
20. SECRETARY:  
21. The following voted in the affirmative. Berning,  
22. Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Conolly, Daley, Donnewald, Dougherty,  
23. Glass, Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Hynes, Kosinski, Don  
24. Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nudelman, Palmer, Partee, Regner,  
25. Rock, Roe, Romano, Saperstein, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro,  
26. Vadalabene, Walker, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten.  
27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
28. Senator Conolly on the Floor? Senator Conolly on the  
29. Floor? Upon verification the ayes are thirty-two, the  
30. nays are thirteen, one present. The roll has been verified.  
31. Senator Glass is recognized on a motion.  
32. SENATOR GLASS:  
33. Having voted on the prevailing side I move to reconsider

1. the vote by which HB 200 passed.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. Senator Glass moves to reconsider the vote by which

4. HB 200 was passed, and Senator Chew moves to Table. All

5. in favor signify by saying aye. Motion is Tabled. Chair

6. recognizes Senator Glass on a motion on SB 1061.

7. SENATOR GLASS:

8. ...On the President's Desk is a motion to reconsider

9. the vote by which the bill was defeated and I would ask

10. the unanimous consent of the Body to have...that...preserve

11. that motion until tomorrow.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

13. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Any announcements?

14. Senator Latherow:

15. SENATOR LATHEROW:

16. Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege

17. for the purpose of introduction. Sitting in the President's

18. Galery is the good wife of Senator Merritt and her sister,

19. Mrs. Sikes. I wonder if they would rise and be recognized

20. by the members of the Senate?

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Senator Knuepfer.

23. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

24. Are we on some miscellaneous business, Senator?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER);

26. No, we're on announcements, Senator.

27. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

28. Oh, that's what I want to do, announcement. Next

29. week there will be...there will be a change in the order

30. of the committee meeting on Public Health, Welfare and

31. Corrections. The first meeting will be held on Tuesday

32. night at 7:00 o'clock and the last one at our regular date,

33. Thursday afternoon. Now, we're putting on...an extra meeting on

1. so that we can get all the bills out by the deadline which  
2. is next week. Those bills will be put on as far as possible  
3. on the Tuesday evening meeting so that we don't have every-  
4. thing left for Thursday. So those of you who have bills  
5. before this Committee or who are members of the Committee  
6. put 7:00, Tuesday evening on your schedule for the first  
7. meeting of two, next week.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

9. Senator Hynes.

10. SENATOR HYNES:

11. Mr. President, I have two motions to make with respect  
12. to SB 1187. This bill deals with the fiscal year of the  
13. Chicago Board of Education. It was assigned to the Revenue  
14. Committee, and I believe it appropriately belongs in the  
15. Education Committee. I've talked to Senators Fawell and  
16. Clarke and they have...they are in agreement, I would move  
17. to discharge the Revenue Committee from consideration of  
18. this bill and ask that it be assigned to the Education  
19. Committee. That's the first motion. And secondly I would  
20. move to, since this is a Senate Bill to suspend the rules  
21. of the Senate and ask permission to have this bill heard  
22. today without the required six day notice.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Senator Hynes moves to discharge and re-refer SB 1187  
25. from Revenue to Education. Is there leave? Leave is  
26. granted. Now he moves to suspend the rules so that the  
27. bills may be heard today. Is there leave? Leave is  
28. granted. Senator Carroll.

29. SENATOR CARROLL:

30. Thank you Mr. President, I would have a similar motion  
31. that HB 982 which has been assigned to the Committee on  
32. Public Health be re-referred to the...that the Committee be  
33. discharged and that the bill be re-referred to the Committee



1. on Judiciary. I have discussed this with the Chairman of  
2. Public Health and he is...has agreed to this motion.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

4. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Buzbee.

5. SENATOR BUZBEE:

6. Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President I would move  
7. that SB 1071 be discharged from the Executive Committee and  
8. be moved to the order of 2nd reading. I've checked with  
9. the...this is agreeable with the Chairman of the Committee  
10. and with the leadership of both sides.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Dougherty.

13. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

14. ...of the Senate, I would ask that the Judiciary Com-  
15. mittee be discharged from further consideration of HB 841,  
16. and the bill placed on the order of 2nd reading. I have  
17. discussed with the Chairman of the Judiciary and he is  
18. agreeable.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Is there leave? Leave is granted. So ordered.

21. Senator Regner.

22. SENATOR REGNER:

23. Mr. President...Mr. President, Members of the Senate  
24. I would like to ask for suspension of the rules on posting  
25. notices so that HB 907 can be heard in Elections Committee  
26. tomorrow morning, along with its companion bill 908 which  
27. was posted last week.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

29. Is there leave? Leave is granted, so ordered. Senator

30. Hall.

31. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

32. I'd like leave of the Senate to be included as co-  
33. sponsor on SB 517.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. Is there leave? Leave is granted, he will be so  
3. shown. Senator Ozinga.

4. SENATOR OZINGA:

5. Senate Executive Committee is already 25 minutes  
6. late, therefore, we'll go into Session immediately,  
7. Room 212.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

9. Senator Knuepfer.

10. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

11. As far as...are there any provisions for the 6-day  
12. rule as of next week? Now some of the bills are still  
13. coming here, there's obviously not going to be six days  
14. available. Is there some kind of a general provision we  
15. can make to exempt next week everything on the 6-day rule?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. The rules that have to be suspended then, would you  
18. talk to Senator Harris or Senator Partee. Senator Partee.

19. SENATOR PARTEE:

20. I'd like Senator Harris' attention if I may on the  
21. question which Senator Knuepfer just asked. Senator  
22. Knuepfer just asked a question with reference to whether  
23. we're going to wave the 6-day rule. I would suggest this  
24. is a matter we take up in Rules Committee tomorrow, because  
25. it's perfectly obvious that something has to be done. The  
26. House's Bills should have been here two weeks ago and they're  
27. still passing House Bills over there as of this time, I'm  
28. told.
