31. HB 211 (Secretary reads title of bill)
32. 3rd reading of the bill.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Schaffer.

2. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

3. I...believe this is not a controversial bill. I've
4. spoken to the leadership on both sides of the aisle.
5. ...And while we do concede...one potential problem, I
6. think there is support for the bill. This bill removes
7. the...200,000 population...limit relative to the use of
8. the...farm roll back, assessment procedure on farmland.
9. It's particularly important in...vast developing areas,
10. such as, my district where an agricultural area suddenly
11. finds itself where land is...becoming extremely valuable
12. and...very impossible to...successfully farm on a tax
13. base, tax rate base on a true market value. ...On the
14. other hand, this would allow the roll back concept which
15. would...give the local taxpayer a fair shake so that when
16. the farm is sold for development, there is a three-year
17. roll back. ...At that time, which makes up some of the
18. lost revenue. Quite frankly, there was a Constitutional
19. question on this...the experts are somewhat split but...
20. I think that we do need a little guidance in this area
21. and, I think, perhaps the bill will...stimulate it. I'd
22. appreciate a favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Is there any discussion? Senator Partee.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26. Senator...Netsch, was desirous of adding some light
27. to this subject. I don't know where she is...she was
28. around. Oh. Now, I see where she is. Did you want to
29. say something on this subject? 211. That's the one.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. Senator Netsch.

32. SENATOR NETSCH:

33. I think the...Senator Partee was referring to some

1. discussions on the Constitutional questions that...we've
2. had in the past. ...My feeling is that this is another
3. one of what is becoming to be a fairly common problem and
4. that is the attempt to distinguish between what is an act
5. of classification...with respect to the real property tax.
6. And that, of course, can be done only by counties of over
7. 200,000 or by the Legislature with respect to counties of
8. over 200,000 population and an act of defining what is the
9. assessed valuation of property. ...We have virtually no
10. case law on the matter. Dale Yung had called my atten-
11. tion to one case which...is perhaps gives some hints about
12. where we may be going but certainly doesn't solve it in
13. terms of the new Constitutional language. My own feeling
14. is, that at least it is arguable and defensible that the
15. basic objective of this Act, that is, the roll back device...
16. could be called an act of defining what is the value of
17. that property and on that basis it would not have to be
18. confined to counties of 200,000 population or over. I
19. think it's a close question. I think no one is going to
20. know for sure until there's a good court test which squarely
21. presents it but I think it is a defensible position.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Senator Donnewald.

24. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

25. Yes, Mr. President and Members of the Senate, of course
26. this particular bill is using the farmer as a camouflage to
27. protect the land speculators. It was a bad bill and it is a
28. bad bill and if it's introduced again, it'd still be a bad
29. bill. The land if it's held for more than three years, local
30. governments will lose tax revenues. If the land speculator
31. farms the land, his holding costs are reduced so he can make
32. himself out to be a farmer and...and have his taxes reduced.
33. And for the same amount of money, he can hold more land and

1. hold the same land longer. This...the speculator works with
2. public money while the taxes are shifted to other people. I
3. ...I oppose the bill and I would hope that the Senate not
4. pass it.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Is there further discussion? Senator Latherow.

7. SENATOR LATHEROW:

8. Well, Senator I just would like to have you answer one
9. inquiry. The area where property may normally be considered
10. by those joining it first we'll say for instance \$30,000
11. and someone gets the speculative idea that that should be
12. worth or would eventually be worth sixty-five, and I'll have
13. you know I am using an exact case, \$65,000. Now, what are
14. you going to do on a case like that? There is no particular
15. area where there is any development going on in...within
16. six miles of this property. How are you going to assess
17. him?

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

19. Senator Schaffer.

20. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

21. I'm not quite sure I understand the question. But...
22. quite frankly, the concept here is...to use an area, to use
23. an example, like my area. We have, and I might add that I
24. haven't heard word one from any land developer being in
25. favor of this but every farmer in my district is screaming
26. for it because they suddenly find farmland that is truly
27. worth anywhere from 8 to \$15,000 an acre for development and
28. if they're taxed on that basis, they're in real trouble.
29. ...What this allows us to do and it is at the request of the
30. individual land owner or farmer, it allows them to, at their
31. request use the roll back concept for assessment. ...I'm
32. not quite sure I understood your question. I tried to
33. answer it.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. Senator Latherow.

3. SENATOR LATHEROW:

4. Well, I'm just wondering...when you go in an area and
5. purchase property and pay what those living there generally
6. assume is twice what it's actually worth and the man is
7. speculating in his own mind that there's going to be future
8. development in that area. It's just exactly what he's doing.
9. Now, he in turn is putting a penalty on every property
10. owner in that whole township and county because he is
11. proving to the supervisor of assessments that that land
12. is worth more than what any man next to it locally is
13. willing to pay. Now, you say you want to be sure and
14. not penalize the farmer. Well, let me tell you in a case
15. like this you're penalizing everyone of them around this
16. man who individually has a speculative mind.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Senator Schaffer.

19. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

20. If I might point out that that doesn't have a whole
21. lot to do with the bill. But, I agree with you, we've
22. had cases where people have come in and paid unbelievable
23. prices for individual pieces of property or for that
24. matter individual homes. Hopefully, your supervisor of
25. assessment and your local assessor is intelligent enough
26. to realize that one sale does not make the basis for
27. assessing the whole are. Now, quite frankly, we've had
28. some assessors up in the northern part of the State that
29. have had gone, let the productivity...basis of assessment
30. go by the wayside and started assessing farmland for
31. what it would sell for if it were owned by a developer.
32. Now, I'm not concerned. I could care less about a developer.
33. They can pay the taxes, they should pay the taxes. But we've
got some people, I'm not talking about one or two, I'm

1. talking about hundreds of families. Some of whom have been
2. on the land hundreds of years. Three and four and five
3. generations and they're going to be taxed off this land
4. if they don't get this particular piece of legislation.
5. That is my concern. That is why I'm sponsoring this bill.
6. This is why I...I want this bill passed.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

8. Senator Berning. Excuse me, Senator Latherow, you
9. have another question?

10. SENATOR LATHEROW:

11. Well, I just wanted to suggest that he go over and
12. give that same speech to the Department on Local Govern-
13. ment. It would suit me very well.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

15. Senator Berning.

16. SENATOR BERNING:

17. Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Body.
18. At the possible expense of being redundant, I want to rise
19. in support of this HB 211 and attempt to point out that this
20. is a potential vehicle for slowing down the tremendously
21. accelerated development in the urban counties. The way the
22. assessment practices are now, a sale, and this is what
23. Senator Latherow was objecting to, a sale is reflected
24. in increased assessments for surrounding properties. It
25. becomes absolutely financially impossible for the person
26. to continue to hold the land. We are thereby forcing the
27. land into sale and into premature development. HB 211 is
28. a legitimate and defensible tool to hopefully retain some
29. additional open land for an additional period of time.
30. Ultimately, I suppose most of the territory around our
31. urban areas will be developed. But if we can slow it down
32. somewhat by making it possible for those who are actually
33. farming to continue to do so by giving them this kind
of relief, it is highly desirable and completely defensible.

1. I certainly would urge an aye vote on this.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. Senator Netsch.

4. SENATOR NETSCH:

5. Mr. President, if I might make one brief comment on
6. the merits of the bill. I think it is important to notice
7. that this bill really does not either create or destroy
8. the basic concept that was adopted, I gather two years
9. ago, and that is the roll back principle. All it
10. does is say that the roll back principle, if it ever was
11. valid, is now made available to all counties. ...And it
12. seems to me, if indeed it is valid, then if there is good
13. reason to make it available in all of the counties. I
14. would like to say, and this point was made by several
15. people at the hearing of the Revenue Committee that there
16. does seem to be some considerable doubt as to whether or
17. not the roll back principle has achieved the purpose for
18. which it was originally adopted. And that is to slow down
19. the speculative process... Some felt that it had, others
20. felt that it had not. It seems to me that the Senate
21. ought to reexamine...certainly next Session, whether that
22. device has worked, whether it is indeed sound. In the
23. meantime though, it seems to me that it is perfectly de-
24. fensible to allow the same thing to be available to all
25. counties until the whole principle is reexamined.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

27. Senator Schaffer may close debate.

28. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

29. This bill...is merely an extension of the roll back
30. principle. It's purely optional. It's not mandatory.
31. It doesn't penalize anybody. It provides a necessary tool.
32. I might point out that the county superintendent of assessment
33. or the county board's review on several of the medium size northern

1. counties are watching to see whether this legislation is
2. passed. If it is not passed, I think they will abandon
3. the productivity approach and assessment which, I think,
4. will cause an awful lot of hardship, I don't think it,
5. I know it. It'll put an awful lot of small farmers, some
6. pretty decent human beings that have been paying taxes on
7. their farms for generations out of business. It will put
8. an awful lot of land in the hands of the developers and
9. into the gravel pit interest up in my neck of the woods.
10. I would appreciate a favorable roll call. This is an
11. important piece of legislation both to my area of the
12. State and to me personally.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. The question is, shall HB 211 pass. And upon that
15. question the Secretary will call the roll.

16. SECRETARY:

11. excuse me, HB 251. I'm sorry. 251.

16. Senator Knuepfer.

18. ment that every property owner has to pay or a street assessment,
19. street paving, special assessment that every other property
20. owner has to pay. This bill says that where any unit
21. of local government makes a local improvement by special
22. assessment or special tax which benefits State property,
23. the State shall pay for the benefit so conferred on
24. the same basis as any other property owner benefitted
25. by the improvement. ...The bill also provides and
26. where a special assessment proceeding is instituted
27. in the courts, the State becomes a party to all proceedings,

32. in coming because...there are many instances where State
33. highway garages, for example, are built or the State does

3. way that any other human being or corporate property owner
4. is dealt with. I'd appreciate a favorable roll call.

19. bill is designed to encourage private citizens in the pre-
20. vention of crimes against the person or property of others
21. by apprehending criminals and...it does so by providing
22. the right of such persons to...receive up to \$10,000 ...
23. from the Court of Claims if they sustain injury or loss in
24. attempting to apprehend a criminal...in the, or otherwise
25. attempt to prevent a crime. I think it's an excellent bill
26. and would ask for a favorable roll call. I would be happy
27. to answer any questions.

31. I think it would be an excellent bill but I think it
32. puts the cart before the horse. Here we're going to give

3. to give people who suffer crime, as a result of crime, money
4. first and then we could get around to giving people money
5. who try to help to prevent them from...suffering crime. So,
