7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. Senator Don Moore.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Ok. He is here.

11. SENATOR ROCK:

12. Well if he wants to offer it now we can try it now.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Moore do you have the amendment?

15. SENATOR ROCK:

16. Ok, can we move it with the understanding that I will
17. call it back for that purpose.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Very good.

20. SECRETARY:

21. HB 794 (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Public Health,
23. Welfare and Corrections offers one amendment.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Rock.

26. SENATOR ROCK:

27. Yes, that was an amendment which I asked the committee
28. to offer, it's an amendment from the Department of Public
29. Health. It merely changes one section with...with regard
30. to fixtures and I would move it's adoption.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Is there further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

33. SENATOR MITCHLER:

1. This is the lead poisoning bill and I...was...
2. wondering, I haven't seen the committee amendment. It
3. came out of the Committee. If I could see the committee
4. amendment maybe it does the same thing as an amendment
5. I have on the Floor. I don't think it does. If not,
6. then I have Amendment No. 2.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Rock do you want to describe what the committee
9. amendment does for Senator Mitchler's explanation? Senator
10. Rock.

11. SENATOR ROCK:

12. Yes, Senator...Senator Mitchler the committee amendment
13. was offered by me on behalf of the Department of Public
14. Health. It merely changes three or four words in one
15. Section as it relates to fixtures. It is no way...identical
16. or similar to the amendment which you propose to offer and
17. I would move it's adoption. It's just...de minimis amend-
18. ment.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Is there further discussion? Senator Rock has move
21. the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All in favor signify by
22. saying aye. Contrary no. Motion carries, Amendment No. 1
23. is adopted. Senator Mitchler.

24. SENATOR MITCHLER:

25. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I would offer
26. Amendment No. 2 to HB 794. And the Amendment is on the
27. Secretary's desk. And I have given copies to the leader-
28. ship on both sides of the aisle. Would you like me to
29. explain the amendment? I move for the adoption of the
30. amendment.

31. SENATOR ROCK:

32. I would like it explained. I think one of the reasons
33. I did not agree to accept this amendment in committee is
I think this is a policy decision that the full Senate should

1. make and I would direct the memberships attention to
2. what the bill says and what this amendment purports to
3. do. And I am going to make every attempt to resist this
4. amendment. You are amending...it's a two part amendment
5. with the second part from line 15 to line 25 if you'll
6. read the bill I think it's totally unnecessary. It's ex-
7. cess baggage from lines 5 to 12 I think is the guts of the
8. amendment and it concerns the percentage of lead that is
9. in paint and I think it's something that the full Senate
10. should address itself to. And I would ask the Senator
11. to explain why he needs this amendment.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Mitchler.

14. SENATOR MITCHLER:

15. Yes, I...I've offered the amendment, now I'd like to
16. explain the amendment so that the members of the Senate
17. understand. We have already passed out of this Body SB
18. number 3, which is really identical to HB 794 with the
19. exception of the amendment that I am proposing. Now,
20. this bill creates the lead poisoning substances control.
21. I believe we're in agreement with about everything except
22. the language that is going to be used in the bill as it
23. relates to the description of lead bearing substance.
24. Now the amendment that I have and if you'll refer to
25. your bill, HB 794, it deletes lines 1 through 6 on page
26. 2, and inserts a new definition of lead bearing sub-
27. stance. The insertion in the amendment that I am proposing
28. is identical to the language contained in SB 3 that this
29. Body has already passed and is now over in the House, in
30. fact it will be heard either this afternoon or tomorrow
31. in the House Committee. Now, the reason, the reason for
32. Amendment No. 2 and to change the language from the existing
33. language in Amendment...in HB 794 is that the paint manufacturers

1. in the State of Illinois manufacture paint that goes to
2. all other States and naturally you would like to have
3. them have the type of an amendment that...that's why I'm
4. getting my no smoking bill fellows...I would like to have
5. a type...of an amendment that would permit them to man-
6. ufacture paint that could be distributed throughout the
7. United States and therefore the defintion of lead bearing
8. substance should be the Federal law and regulation which
9. is what Amendment No. 2 does to HB 794. It says that lead
10. bearing substance means any paint or other surface
11. coating material containing more than five-tenths of one
12. percent lead by weight. And if the Federal law changes
13. and that's lowered, then the Illinois statute will automatically
14. change to conform to the Federal law and regulation... Now,
15. I know of no reason why anyone should oppose such an
16. amendment in such language. And it's very similar to
17. SB 3.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there further discussion? Senator Netsch and then
20. Senator Knuepfer. Senator Netsch.

21. SENATOR NETSCH:

22. Mr. President, I would like to respond directly to the
23. point that Senator Mitchler just made that there is no
24. reason for anyone to oppose this change and suggest there
25. is a very good reason for opposing it. We heard a great
26. deal of testimony in the Welfare Committee on this question
27. of the proper level for lead content in paint. We heard
28. a good deal of testimony and read a good many things about
29. the effect thereof. It is quite true I think, it is fair
30. to say that there is not absolutely conclusively established
31. evidence that says that the level of .06 is the proper
32. level. On the other hand there is a great deal of evidence
33. to suggest that anything above that is going to be and has been

1. a source of very serious injury to those children who may
2. come in contact with that paint. Our feeling was, the feel-
3. ing of many of us who struggled with this problem that the
4. paint industry can adjust to this changed level. Why should
5. we take any chances at all with respect to the health of
6. children, and we're not just talking about kids living in
7. an inner-city ghetto, we're talking about lead levels found
8. in children throughout this State wherever the testing has
9. been done to date. Why shouldn't we for once resolve the
10. doubts in favor of the health of the children involved in-
11. stead of the industry and the answer that we always get under
12. such circumstances is we can't do it, you'll drive us out of
13. business, you'll put us in an economically disadvantageous
14. position. I think that is nonsense when it comes to some-
15. thing as critical as this and a...a source of a health
16. hazard that is as dangerous and horrible as this when it
17. does occur. I am convinced that the Federal government is
18. just playing games with what its level is going to be. And
19. that for once the States ought to tell the Federal govern-
20. ment what is the proper way to go and I would strongly suggest
21. that if the State of Illinois a major industrial State takes
22. this position firmly in its own legislation that .06 is
23. the proper level and the only proper level that that itself
24. may influence the Federal government in its revised regulations.
25. I think that is the proper course for us to follow and I
26. would hope that is what we do.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Knuepfer.

29. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

30. Well, Senator Netsch, you have suggested that this is a
31. question of resolving doubts in favor of the children.
32. I don't...I sincerely do not think that's true. This is
33. an area in which Federal Standards ought to obtain, and

1. the Federal government is moving in the direction. Now,
2. you know and I know that the real problem is not this issue
3. at all. If we really wanted to address ourselves to this
4. problem we would have to address ourselves to the destruc--
5. tion of probably a 100,000 homes in the State of Illinois.
6. Because the real problem is caused not by 06 or .1 but the
7. real problem is caused by the paints which were manufactured
8. some 30, 40 and 50 years ago in which the lead content was
9. up 15 to 20, 25%. As a practical economic matter we can--
10. not address ourselves to that problem because it would
11. mean the distruction, the repainting, the recovering of a
12. great many homes. There are some areas in...in this State
13. and most of them would be in your City. They're neither the
14. City of Chicago nor the State of Illinois has the resources
15. to address itself to the real solution of the problem
16. of lead poisoning. And I submit to you that is the real
17. solution. Short of that it seems to me that our problem
18. is to try and conform to a Federal standard and that Federal
19. standard, because manufacturers of a commodity such as paint
20. simply cannot economically manufacture the product for
21. different markets. You well know in Chicago that you have
22. a different standard set of City Ordinance and certainly
23. within the concept of Home Rule. I suggest to you that if
24. you want that that is perfectly acceptable to me. I do not
25. think however it is a desirable concept for the State of
26. Illinois. In part we're playing games because as I suggested
27. to you earlier, the real problem nobody has tried or has
28. even suggested that we attack because the expense of the
29. real problem is immense. I suggest to you that this is a
30. desirable amendment and we ought to support it.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Is there further discussion? Senator Saperstein.

33. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

1. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
2. I think Senator Knuepfer is right as far as it concerns the
3. older buildings, that is a big problem. But I think we have
4. to look at it in terms of what the...the American Institute
5. of Pediatrics stated as it relates to the safe percentage
6. of lead. The American Institute of Pediatrics said that
7. anything more than .06 is a danger to children, and it is
8. a danger to lead poisoning in children and to mental retarda-
9. tion. We...it is true that the older buildings are also a
10. factor in this, but it is also true without qualification
11. that the Institute of Pediatrics stated without equivocating
12. on the problem that any more than .06 is a danger to lead
13. poisoning and mental retardation in children. This is the
14. thing we ought to consider. It is true that the Federal
15. Government is dragging it's feet when it determines that
16. .5 is a safe level content. It is not, and anything more
17. ought to be rejected.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Newhouse.

20. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

21. Just one more point Mr. President and Senators and that
22. is this. The...the question arises then what will happen to
23. the industry in the interim and will this work a hardship
24. on the industry. Well the fact is that Sherman-Williams
25. has already achieved the point that we are suggesting, they've
26. already gone to the...the point that the Federal government
27. is talking about, reaching it at some point in the future.
28. Now in addition to that there is a period of time contemplated
29. by this bill that will permit them to deal with the stock
30. that they presently have on hand, so the fact is that this
31. doesn't work any real hardship, that this is the level that
32. ought to be achieved and I would hope that we give a favorable
33. roll call on this bill.

1. SENATOR BELL:

2. Well, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I think
3. what we have...personally what we have to do here is we
4. have to look at the...at the real issue in my mind is mental
5. retardation. And what...how it is brought about through the
6. eating by children of paint that has an extra amount of lead
7. in it or a lead that's above and beyond a certain percentage
8. point. Now, that is the question. What should be the parti-
9. cular percentage point that's allowed in lead based paint?
10. I say to you that the Federal standards call for a half of
11. one percent, but these standards have been tested they've
12. been found to be satisfactory as far as the Federal Govern-
13. ment is concerned, and that for us to superimpose side
14. standards over and above that at this time causes an undue
15. burden in the paint industry that is for all practical pur-
16. poses not proper or fitting. You know, why not go to .003
17. of a percent or...that would be even better yet. I say that
18. in lieu of the Federal guidelines, in lieu of the fact that
19. the Federal studies at this time show that a half of one
20. percent is a proper amount. It's a vast improvement over
21. what's been previously, that we should not impose on the
22. paint industry side standards that mean that they're going
23. to be producing this one level for one State, another level
24. for another State, and...really it seems to like it's
25. causing...a ridiculous situation.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Rock.

28. SENATOR ROCK:

29. Yes, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
30. before I move to Table Amendment No. 2, which I intend to
31. do, I would like to elaborate just for a moment on what
32. Senator Bell so rightly referred to as the real issue. The
33. real issue Ladies and Gentlemen is how much of a percentage

1. of lead are we going to allow in our paint, so that our
2. kids can get at it or not get at it. I have a letter
3. from the Environmental Protection Agency in Washington,
4. D.C., dated January, 1972, and I will quote only in part.
5. I don't think it's out of context, and if anybody wants
6. the whole letter they're welcome to it. It relates on
7. how they have done studies concerning lead poisoning,
8. and the letter, and I quote, these studies elaborated
9. in the attached In House Technical Report indicate that
10. lead paint in excess of 0.05%, my bill calls for 0.06,
11. but this letter says in excess of 0.05% could constitute
12. a danger to the health of children with pica, our con-
13. clusion is similar to that of the American Academy of
14. Pediatrics, which strongly recommended that lead point...
15. lead paint in excess of 0.06% should not be permitted.
16. Now, the City of Chicago has adopted an ordinance which
17. has been upheld by the courts in our State which calls
18. for this percentage. I think the State should do no less.
19. Most certainly it should try to do better. The real issue
20. as Senator Bell would have us believe is not whether we're
21. concerned with lead poisoning but whether or not we're
22. concerned with the manufacturers, whether or not they
23. have to change the labels on their paint. Well, I say
24. let's have a vote in favor of the children and let's
25. make the paint companies change their labels. I know
26. that's a hardship but I think they can well afford to
27. do it. I move to Table Amendment No. 2.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Rock, would you withhold your motion? Senator
30. Berning.

31. SENATOR BERNING:

32. Thank you, Mr. President; Members of the Body, speaking
33. as one lone legislator I resent bitterly and categorically

1. the implication that any inclination to support SB 794
2. is in derogation of the rights or concerns for children.
3. I submit to the members of this Body that aspirin in the
4. home or even such as table salt is a violent poison. It's
5. up to the members of the family to protect their children
6. and not allow them to pick the paint off the wall or to
7. get a can of paint and drink it. This is a specious argu-
8. ment. We owe our...an obligation to the industry as well.
9. These are realistic standards and I suggest we support them.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Smith.

12. SENATOR SMITH:

13. Mr. Chairman and Members of the Senate, the argument
14. made for the higher percentage of lead might sound reason-
15. able and perhaps factual. It is polite. But it so happens
16. that a majority of the buildings where lead poisoning has re-
17. sulted are a lot of these old, run down, leaning, creaky, rat-
18. infested, disease breeding old buildings that are a disgrace
19. to our boasted of 20th century civilization. It's a little
20. astonishing to me to sit here and hear the part of the
21. argument with regards to this particular amendment that I
22. have heard. This bill was heard in committee, if I mistake
23. not last week, was it not? They brought the attorney, their
24. national attorney, the attorney that represents them through-
25. out these United States, here to sell us a particular trend
26. of thought. A very entertaining gentleman and a very
27. talkative gentleman. He talked at length and he supported
28. the 0.05 lead content, and when roll was called I called
29. attention and that's all that I arise for now, Mr. President,
30. is to read from their own national publication which I hold
31. here in my hand. Unlike those who will probably support this
32. amendment, their association states here on whatever the
33. page is, you can verify it by reading here as I now do.

1. They presented no argument against the...0.06 lead content
2. of paint. As a matter of fact they say here in their
3. national publication that the National Paint and Coatings
4. Association which represents more than 900 companies has
5. notified the commission that it anticipates it's members can
6. produce by January, 1974 interior products not exceeding the
7. 0.06% maximum, not exceeding the 0.06% maximum lead level and
8. can produce by January, 1975 exterior products not exceeding
9. that limitation. In the light of their own admission as
10. evidenced in their own national publication I hope that the
11. entire membership on this side of the aisle at least will vote
12. against the Senator's proposed amendment to SB 794.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Is there further discussion? Senator Mitchler can
15. close the debate and then we'll proceed to Senator Rock's
16. motion to Table. Senator Mitchler.

17. SENATOR MITCHLER:

18. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, in lieu of the
19. fact that we passed SB 3 and at that time I believe we had
20. a debate on the same very subject that we're talking about
21. now, I just move for adoption of Amendment No. 2. Ask for
22. a favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Mitchler has moved the adoption of the amendment,
25. Amendment No. 2. Senator Rock has moved to Table. On the
26. motion to Table, all in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary
27. no. 27 to 27, the way I count it. There's been a request
28. for a roll call, on the motion to Table. The Secretary will
29. call the roll.

30. SECRETARY:

9. For what purpose does Senator Course arise?

10. SENATOR COURSE:

11. Am I recorded Mr. President?

12. PRESIDENT:

13. You...you are not recorded.

14. SENATOR COURSE:

15. Record me as voting aye, please.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator McCarthy recorded?

18. SECRETARY:

19. As voting aye.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. On that question the yeas are 25, the nays are 26, the
22. motion to Table fails. On Senator Mitchler's motion to adopt
23. Amendment No. 2, all those in favor signify by saying aye.
24. Contrary no. Motion to adopt carried 26 to 25. Are there
25. further amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Senator
26. Hynes, HB 344.

27. SECRETARY:

28. ...(Secretary reads title of bill)

29. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Local Government
30. offers one amendment.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Hynes.

33. SENATOR HYNES:

1. Move the adoption of the amendment.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. ...For what purpose does Senator Buzbee arise?

4. SENATOR BUZBEE:

5. Point of personal privilege, Mr. President. It's
6. my understanding that I was not recorded on that last vote
7. on the...on the amendment, and I voted aye. To Table, I
8. voted aye to Table, on the roll call.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Well, we are on other business. There was no request
11. for verification. I announced the results. On the motion
12. to Table it would not have been enough to carry anyway,
13. Senator Buzbee. Proceed.

14. SENATOR BUZBEE:

15. Mr...Mr. President, still on a point of personal privilege,
16. I realize that would not have been a sufficient, however on
17. the motion to put the amendment on the bill it would have
18. tied and that would affect...had the effect of killing the
19. motion.

1. to bring HB 739 back to the order of 2nd reading for
2. the purpose of an amendment. Is there leave? Leave.
3. Will you explain your amendment, Senator?

4. SECRETARY:

5. Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator Nimrod.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

7. Senator Latherow.

8. SENATOR LATHEROW:

9. Mr. President, members of the Senate, this is an
10. amendment to the bill allowing the board of town auditors
11. to contract with other municipalities and so on in town-
12. ships within the county to furnish funds for a fire
13. district, strictly to be qualified...to qualify them for
14. this use of the money of Federal revenue sharing. Move
15. the adoption of the amendment.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. Further discussion? Senator Latherow moves the adoption
18. of...Amendment No. 1. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. Parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President. These...both
21. these bills now are on the so-called consent calendar, or
22. agreed bill list. Now having been amended do they go back
23. on the agreed list or do they just go on the order of 3rd
24. reading?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. They go back on the agreed list, unless we disagree.

27. SENATOR ROCK:

28. Well, the...the only point I make is that that list
29. was given to each of the membership before we left on Friday,
30. and presumably everybody took a look at and read the bills
31. and now with the ten minutes before we're going to get to
32. the agreed list amendments are proposed. I'm not saying
33. the amendments are good, bad or indifferent, but it just

1. seems to me it's a standard practice that they should go
2. on 3rd reading.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

4. Well, I presume that the amendments have been read
5. and agreed to if...if they are not, then I...I would agree
6. that they could go back on...on 3rd reading if there is
7. objection. Senator Latherow did you want to explain...

8. SENATOR LATHEROW:

9. Senator Rock this amendment was the one that...that
10. Senator Nimrod wanted to put on, and was an agreed amendment
11. with the sponsors in the House and I moved it to 3rd and
12. forgot to put the amendment on. He called my attention to
13. it and I agreed to bring it back. Now, I don't want to
14. foul up the agreed list. If this bill going back on there
15. fouls it up, makes no difference to me. But I think the
16. amendment was...does what the bill was meant to do to
17. begin with when it came over here.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

19. Senator Rock is there...Senator Wooten.

20. SENATOR WOOTEN:

21. ...this bill, as I recall, in its present form is
22. identical to one that I sponsored and we passed out of
23. here. What does this amendment do to make it different.
24. What...in what way is it changed?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. Senator Latherow.

27. SENATOR LATHEROW:

28. Well, this amendment as I said before allows the
29. area to spend its money on the fire districts within the
30. area providing they come up to the maximum levy that they're
31. allowed and so on. It merely...it merely gives them per-
32. mission of the emergency, priority expenditure to be a fire
33. district expenditure.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

2. Senator Wooten.

3. SENATOR WOOTEN:

4. As I recall the bill permits townships to expend local
5. revenue sharing funds in cooperative agreements with other
6. units of government and other groups. This merely spells
7. out fire protection districts as well?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. Senator Latherow. Senator Latherow.

10. SENATOR LATHEROW:

11. Yes. Yes, that's right.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

13. Senator Wooten.

14. SENATOR WOOTEN:

15. I just...merely would question whether or not you
16. need it at all, because I believe the present language
17. says other units of government, and I think fire protection
18. districts would qualify.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

20. Senator Graham.

21. SENATOR GRAHAM:

22. I hope we don't get into this kind of a hassle too
23. often, because the agreed list was for the purpose of trying
24. to expedite our business. However, I do agree with Senator
25. Rock that once a bill is taken of...the agreed list and
26. amended that it should go back on the Calendar on the
27. regular order of business, 3rd reading, House Bills. So
28. I think that will solve our problem, let's get on with it.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

30. ...Senator Latherow you moved the adoption of that...
31. Senator Latherow moves to adopt Amendment No. 1 to HB 739.
32. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. Amendment
33. No. 1 is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.

1. They are back on the agreed bill list. Senator Graham.

2. SENATOR GRAHAM:

3. I was reminding the Secretary if too many people
4. don't give him too many things to do, that the bill we
5. just discussed will be on the order of House Bills, 3rd
6. reading on the regular list, so...so scratch it off your
7. agreed bill list so you don't read it so we vote on it the
8. same time. That's what I'm trying to do.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Senator Graham requests we take those two bills off

11. ...

12. SENATOR GRAHAM:

13. The one we were discussing that was amended.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

15. HB 360 and 739...

16. SENATOR GRAHAM:

17. I think that's only fair. .

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

19. ...that were amended. All right, that's...that's agreeable
20. they'll be placed on the order of 3rd reading. Senator McBroom.

21. SENATOR MCBROOM:

22. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I arise on a
23. point of personal privilege. In the gallery behind you
24. Mr. President are two young men, one whose down here visiting
25. his father, the other's his friend. One is Todd Porter who
26. is the son of Jerry Porter who's the head of the Republican

1. from the order of 3rd reading to 2nd reading?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Yes Senator.

4. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

5. HB 620, I would like to bring...leave to bring from
6. the order of 3rd reading to 2nd reading for the purpose
7. of adding an amendment that I had agreed on with Senator
8. Course.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Senator Knuepfer requests leave to bring back HB 620
11. to the order of 2nd reading for the purpose of amendment.
12. Is there leave? Is he...does the Secretary have the amendment?

13. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

14. Yeah, the Secretary has the amendment.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

16. Will you please... explain...

17. SECRETARY:

18. Amendment No. 2.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

20. Will you explain Amendment No. 2?

21. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

22. The amendment simply changes...20 years to 30 years,
23. and the bill got out of the Transportation Committee with
24. that agreement that I would make that change. This does
25. make the change, and I would move the adoption of Amendment
26. No. 2, I believe it is.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. Senator Knuepfer moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2
29. to HB 620. All those in favor signify by saying aye.
30. Opposed. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Further amendments?
31. 3rd reading. Senator Shapiro on HB 1410. I'm sorry, that's
32. HB 14.

33. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

1. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I would like
2. leave of the Senate to return HB 14 to the order of 2nd
3. reading for purposes of an amendment.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

5. Senator Shapiro requests leave to bring HB 14 to the
6. order of 2nd reading for the purpose of an amendment. Is
7. there leave? Leave is granted.

8. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

9. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate
10. HB 14 as you know as originally introduced is a ban on
11. the burning of leaves throughout the State. The amendment
12. that I'm about to place on it is an amendment worked out
13. with the House sponsor, Environmental Protection Agency,
14. and is approved by the EPA and I would like to read it to
15. you, then urge it's adoption. The Board may not adopt
16. any regulation banning the burning of leaves throughout
17. the State generally. The Board may, by regulation, restrict
18. or prohibit the burning of leaves within any geographical
19. area of the State if it determines based on medical and
20. biological evidence generally accepted by the scientific
21. community that such burning will produce in the atmosphere
22. of that geographical area contaminants in sufficient
23. quantities and of such characteristics and duration as to
24. be injurious to humans, plant or animal life, or health.
25. I urge it's adoption.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

27. Senator Shapiro moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1
28. to HB 14. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed.
29. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd
30. reading. Senator Conolly.

31. SENATOR CONOLLY:

32. May I have leave Mr. President to take back off 3rd
33. reading HB 449 to add an amendment that was overlooked by

1. me.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Senator Conolly request leave to return HB 449 to
4. the order of 2nd reading for the purpose of an amendment.
5. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Would you explain your
6. amendment?

7. SENATOR CONOLLY:

8. This amendment was an amendment that was suggested
9. in the...Personnel and Pension's Committee and removed
10. all objections and it was not actually taken as a committee
11. amendment, so that's why I... overlooked... amending it. But
12. it will take...give the 25 years to State Police of creditable
13. service, and I move the adoption of the amendment.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

15. Senator Conolly moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1.
16. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. Amend-
17. ment No. 1 is adopted. Further amendments? 3rd reading.
18. Any other Senators have bills that they'd like to bring
19. back. Senator Berning.

20. SENATOR BERNING:

21. Thank you Mr. President. Actually this is, Senator
22. Latherow's bill. It came from the House...Representative
23. McMasters is the chief sponsor. In committee a discussion
24. arose over of the maintenance of these bridges in this
25. Illinois-Mississippi park...

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

27. Senator would you...would you give us the bill number,
28. please.

29. SENATOR BERNING:

30. 162, I thought I did. I'm sorry. HB 162.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Latherow requests leave to return SB...or
33. HB 162 back to the order of 2nd reading for Senator Berning's

1. amendment. Is there leave? Is there leave, Senator Latherow?
2. Leave is granted. Senator Berning, will you explain the
3. amendment?

4. SECRETARY: .

5. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Berning.

6. SENATOR BERNING:

7. This is the amendment that was agreed to in committee,
8. but there was no opportunity to prepare the amendment for
9. the committee so it was prepared afterwards, and has the
10. endorsement of the Department of Conservation. In fact,
11. they were the ones who finally drafted the amendment for us.
12. It simply designates who shall be responsible for the main-
13. tance of these bridges...addition states the Department of
14. Transportation shall be...shall maintain these unless they
15. are designated by the Department of Conservation as part
16. of an access or a driveway of the park. It seemed that this
17. was necessary in order to define who's responsibility these
18. bridges in this Mississippi-Illinois State park actually
19. were.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Any further discussion? Senator Latherow. Senator Latherow
22. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to HB 162. All those
23. in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. Amendment No. 2
24. is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading. Last call
25. for House Bills, go back from 3rd to 2nd for purpose of an
26. amendment. Any Senator request that at this time? House
27. Bills, 3rd reading. Pick up where we left off yesterday
28. with HB 811, Senator Course. 820, Senator Scholl. 821,
29. Senator Bell. Ring the bell, please.

30. SECRETARY:

31. HB 821 (Secretary reads title of bill)
32. 3rd reading of the bill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

1. Senator Bell.

2. SENATOR BELL:

3. Yes Mr. President, Members of the Senate. This bill
4. seeks to address itself to a problem that's come up in the...
5. the election of...in library districts. Seeks to make a
6. correction whereby the territory that seeks come into a
7. library district that that vote will be taken and it will
8. also seek to have the vote taken in the...in the district
9. that...that currently has the library district. Tries to
10. make it a more equitable procedure. It's a needed situation
11. up in Greengarden township out in my county, and...I think
12. that's about it. Ask for a favorable roll call.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

14. Any further discussion? The question is shall HB 821
15. pass and on that question the Secretary will call the roll.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
18. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

31. the constitutional majority is delcared passed. Senator
32. Course, HB 811.

33. SECRETARY:

HB 811 (Secretary reads title of bill)

1. 3rd reading of the bill.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Senator Course.

4. SENATOR COURSE:

5. Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate.

6. HB 811 amends the Vehicle Code. It extends enforce-

7. ment powers of investigators for the Secretary of

8. State to include violations of the Motor Carriers of

9. Property Law, and an explanation of the bill. Under

10. the present law, violations of the Illinois Motor Carriers

11. of Property Law the regulating for hire trucks and buses

12. may lead to an arrest but only by a State Police trooper,

13. by an investigator of the Illinois Commerce Commission,

14. by a...a sheriff or by a local police officer. The

15. investigators of the Secretary of State, however, do not

16. have the enforcement power to make an arrest, nor to

17. issue a summons for violation of that law. House Bill

18. 811 will grant these enforcement powers to the investi-

19. gators of the Secretary of State. The State Police are

20. in favor of this. The Illinois Commerce Commission favors

21. this legislation, and...as does the Secretary of State's

22. Office. I would appreciate a favorable roll call, Mr.

23. President.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

25. Any further discussion? The question is shall HB 811

26. pass? And on that question the Secretary will call the roll.

27. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

28. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

6. Howard Mohr, no. Nudelman, aye. On that question
7. the yeas are forty-four, the nays are one. HB 811 having
8. received the constitutional majority is declared passed.
9. ...826.

10. SECRETARY:

11. HB 826 (Secretary reads title of bill)

12. 3rd reading of the bill.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

14. Senator Schaffer.

15. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

16. This is a...very simple bill. It basically will allow
17. candidates for State office including those of us who run
18. for the Legislature to get copies of the precinct by precinct
19. results of our own election. Several of us have had troubles
20. getting copies of these precincts even months after the
21. election of the individual count, that was amended to provide
22. for more time for the clerks to comply with the law. I
23. suspect it's a very limited problem, but where it exists,
24. it's a real problem. I would yield for questions.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. Senator Rock.

27. SENTAOR ROCK:

28. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. In our
29. county we don't have that problem but in addition to that
30. our County Clerk and Board of Election Commissioner Official,
31. we are charged per page. Would you object to an amendment
32. which calls for at least reimbursing the County Clerk for
33. the costs involved? I don't see why a candidate has to get

1. it for nothing, that's my only point.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Senator Schaffer.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. I have such an amendment prepared, if it might make
6. it more amenable to some of the members on this side.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

8. Senator Schaffer.

9. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

10. If...the amendment was permissive, because quite
11. frankly most of the Clerks hand this literature out free
12. right now, and if it were a permissive amendment I certainly
13. wouldn't have any objections. But I'd hate to be in a
14. position where I as a candidate for State Senator paid and
15. a candidate for sheriff walked in and got it for nothing,
16. if you follow me.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

18. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. Well, I do follow what you're saying. The point is
21. if you're going to ask for a copy of something that means
22. the Clerk has to photocopy or otherwise make some arrangement,
23. and I think it's not unreasonable that a fee for at least
24. reimbursement of his costs should be provided for. My
25. amendment would say that County Clerk or Board of Election
26. Commissioners shall charge for the above copy a fee not
27. to exceed \$3.00 per page.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

29. Senator Schaffer.

30. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

31. Well, my only thought on that quite frankly Senator
32. is, and I agree with you as a former county official, I
33. know the clerks downstate at least, are besieged by people

1. for copies of precinct list and for results, and it does
2. cost the taxpayers a great deal of money. And I...I for
3. one would support legislation that would empower the clerks
4. to charge for all of this stuff a reasonable amount. I
5. personally don't have any hang-ups on that amendment, but
6. I again find...I think would find ourselves in the situation
7. of being the only ones who are charged for this information.
8. I really don't know. I'm not at all sure...in my county,
9. I have four counties that send it to me automatically for
10. nothing right now. And one county with only five precincts
11. that I get a total for the five precincts, but I have yet
12. to see a breakdown of those five precincts, but I have yet
13. if the amendment were optional, I'd certainly go along with
14. it, but I think I'd hate to enforce the clerk to charge me
15. for something that I'd be the only one he'd charge for, if
16. you follow me.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

18. These are Chicago prices, is that right Senator Rock?

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. Up to, not to exceed our price. Right.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

22. Any further discussion? Senator Schaffer may close the
23. debate.

24. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

25. Well, in relation to Senator Rock's suggestion, I
26. think what I prefer to do at this point would be to put
27. this bill through, but I would be more than happy to come
28. back at a later date and authorize clerks to charge for
29. this type of material, not just those of us who are running
30. for State office, but anybody who wishes it. I think
31. this material should be readily available to the public,
32. but I've seen...precinct lists that are worth \$70 or \$80
33. handed out many, many times to just anybody who came in

1. and I'm convinced that 90% of these things wouldn't be picked
2. up if there was even a penny a page charge. I think there's
3. a need for legislation in this area. I would submit to you
4. that perhaps this is not the bill. I would appreciate
5. support for this bill. It's a very simple thing and I think
6. it's a good thing, and I would be very willing to come back
7. at a later date and propose that type of legislation.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. The question is shall HB 826 pass, and on that question
10. the Secretary will call the roll.

11. SECRETARY:

23. Bartulis, aye. Newhouse, aye. Kenneth Hall, aye. McBroom,
24. aye. Donnewald, aye. Johns, aye. On that question the
25. yeas are thirty-seven the nays are none. HB 826 having
26. received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
27. HB 827, Senator Carroll.

28. SECRETARY:

29. HB 827 (Secretary reads title of bill)
30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Carroll.

33. SENATOR CARROLL:

1. Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate.
2. HB 827 deals with the subrogated amount on a property
3. damage claim when the insured has paid part of the monies
4. and the insurance company comes in and sues in its own
5. behalf and in behalf of its insured. Last year in the
6. 77th General Assembly I passed HB 2467 that had a pro-
7. ration aspect in it that has ended up being a little bit
8. too much and it is...actually went far beyond what we
9. thought it would do. The net effect of it was that the
10. insurance companies were not even coming in and filing
11. these suits so that the insured were not better off as we
12. had hoped they would be, but actually worse off. This
13. is...does not go back to the old system but comes about
14. half way back and says that where there has been a legitimate
15. dispute as to how much the property damage was, that there
16. will be a proration of the gross receipts by way of suit
17. or settlement so that the insured and the insurance company
18. will share pro rata as to the total settlement as compared
19. to what their claims were in its origin. If there are any
20. questions I'd be glad to...answer any of them and would
21. ask for a favorable roll call.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

23. Senator Bell.

24. SENATOR BELL:

25. Yes, Senator Carroll, I'm sorry I...I didn't follow
26. your explanation on that. I wonder if you'd go over that
27. again?

28. SENATOR CARROLE:

29. All right. Jim the...going back again a second.
30. We changed the law two years ago and said at that time
31. anytime there's a subrogation claim that the insured
32. and there's a settlement by suit or compromise, the
33. insured gets his full deductible back first before the

1. insurance company gets any money whatsoever because there had
2. been numerous examples of the insureds getting zero or
3. almost zero regardless of the amount of the recovery and
4. as an attempt to cure that defect we started giving them
5. the full amounts. It was found that that also was some-
6. what unfair because in many cases the insurance company
7. does not receive the full amount of the claim, but they
8. only get a percentage back. So this bill...and what we
9. found was that the insurance companies in those instances
10. would not bother to file a suit because their real monies
11. and interest coming back to them were so negligible that
12. they didn't benefit by pursuing the claim. So this actually
13. went to the detriment of the insured who we were originally
14. trying to help. This bill says if for example there's a
15. \$500 property damage bill, and the insured paid a \$100
16. deductible, he is entitled to 1/5th of the recovery if
17. the recovery is 500, he gets his full 100 back. If the
18. recovery is 300, he gets \$60 back, he gets that pro rata
19. share.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Senator Bell.

22. SENATOR BELL:

23. Well, I'd like to say Senator Carroll, having been
24. 15 years as an insurance agent that...I think your explana-
25. tion is good. Sounds like a piece of needed legislation,
26. and I would certainly urge the members on this side of the
27. aisle to support this bill. It looks like a good bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

29. Any further discussion? Did you want to close, Senator?

30. SENATOR CARROLL:

31. No, I'd just ask for a roll call.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

33. The question is shall HB 827 pass and on that question

1. the Secretary will call the roll.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
4. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
5. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
6. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
7. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
8. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
9. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

14. Course, aye. Nudelman, aye. Hynes, aye. Knuppel,
15. aye. On that question the yeas are forty-one, the nays
16. are two. HB 827 having received the constitutional majority
17. is declared passed. HB 828, Senator Carroll.

18. SECRETARY:

19. HB 828 (Secretary reads title of bill)
20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

22. Senator Carroll.

23. SENATOR CARROLL:

24. Thank you Mr. President, HB 828 deals with the area
25. of life insurance situations where the company's become
26. insolvent. And this is to protect us from a situation similar
27. to what we're going through now in the Equity Funding
28. situation where it is quite possible that multi-million
29. of dollars have been defrauded from the people who were
30. policy holders of that particular company. And very similar
31. to what happens already by Illinois law in casualty insurance
32. cases. We have demanded here as a provision of doing
33. business in the State of Illinois that the insurance

1. industry itself clean its own house. That they create
2. a management company of their own that only comes into
3. operation and effect should a company become insolvent.
4. And in that case where a company has become insolvent
5. and the rest of the companies of this State form their
6. own association, can assess their own membership up to
7. a maximum of 2% of premiums written to protect those people
8. who have been paying premiums for years and years to this
9. insurance company, to protect those policies for the future
10. for...the life insurance that these people were attempting to
11. do. There's a maximum assessment in here. We know from
12. experience that this happens very seldom, but we think
13. that it's sufficient when it does happen that the industry
14. in effect as a cost of doing business within this State
15. that it, itself, assume these costs at a very minimal amount.
16. We have given this association of insurance companies the
17. power to say that anyone of their companies or groups of
18. their companies are actually also a little bit shakey or
19. small and cannot join this pool of assessment. They can
20. eliminate any companies if they so see fit as long as
21. they protect that portion of the 11 million citizens of
22. Illinois who have been paying in premiums for years to
23. this particular company that had become insolvent. I
24. would ask for a favorable roll call.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR);

26. Senator Merritt.

27. SENATOR MERRITT:

28. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I certainly
29. rise in opposition to this proposed legislation. I think
30. it's bad in almost any form. I don't believe it would have
31. ever gained passage out of committee without an amendment at-
32. tached to it. The amendment has been stricken at this point.
33. The bill even with the amendment was not the best bill in the

1. world. This...this makes it a real bad piece of legislation.
2. The real question is why should any life insurance company
3. be legally required to guarantee the financial soundness
4. and operation of his competitors. I think that's a real
5. basic thing. They refer to the fact that this...that we do
6. have a similar program now regulating the operation of
7. casualty insurance companies. But you've got to remember
8. in a casualty company, you're only dealing perhaps in an ex-
9. piration of one year, three years at the most, and then they
10. can revise their rates accordingly. This is completely con-
11. trary to what's going on in this bill because the company
12. would have to take over the policy at the same rate to be
13. in existence the next 20, 30, 40 years until death occurs.
14. In addition the company would have to assume the liability
15. of cash values, which you don't have in the casualty policies.
16. I just think that it should be pointed out to the Body
17. that our foreign companies under the 2% premium tax are
18. currently paying into State revenue nearly \$70,000,000
19. a year. And the Department by their own admission says
20. it takes about \$3,000,000 to 4,000,000 somewhere in that
21. area to do their investigative work and to police these com-
22. panies. Now, what the Department of Insurance is virtually
23. saying here we can't do our work properly any longer and we
24. want this board created to do it for us. This is bad legis-
25. lation at its best. I would...I would ask members on this
26. side of the aisle or other side also to oppose it.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. Senator Knuepfer.

29. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

30. Well, I want to suggest to you that if...if there is
31. any liability in this kind of concept it ought to be on
32. the part of the State of Illinois. I just came from the
33. House where they are engaging in some rather lengthy and

1. vociferous debate in reference to the City Saving and Loans
2. Association. And this kind of a thing is...somewhat of the
3. same concept. The State of Illinois has the regulatory
4. power. They are the ones that are supposed to prevent
5. these kinds of incidents from happening. And I would suggest
6. to that in view of the fact that they have a...regulatory
7. power, if there is a failure, that failure is that of the
8. State of Illinois, not of the companies...the rest of the
9. companies operating in this business. So that to the
10. extent that you believe that these people were deprived
11. of something unjustly, put the liability right where it
12. belongs, on the Department of Insurance or any other
13. department of the State of Illinois. But don't say to a
14. 3rd party you've got a liability because we didn't
15. regulate the way we should have regulated. And I personally
16. would...second what Senator Merritt has suggested. This is,
17. I think, a bad principle to embody in law and it ought to
18. be defeated.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

20. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll may close the
21. debate.

22. SENATOR CARROLL:

23. Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I'd
24. merely close by making a few points as to what has been
25. raised. First of all we have in this Session of the General
26. Assembly passed a regulation requiring mandatory insurance
27. for savings and loans, to avoid another situation like City
28. Savings and Loans, to avoid exactly the type of debate that's
29. going on in the House. Any of you who have followed the
30. equity funding arguments would know that it was almost entirely
31. impossible for the Department of Insurance to have found that
32. situation. It is alleged that the Company was writing its
33. own policies and underwriting those to another company in order

1. to gain this 1.8 times the premiums to fund themselves. And
2. there was no way at that point for the Department to know which
3. were and were not the legitimate life insurance policies that
4. Equity was floating through its firm. What we are saying
5. here which this State and any State has the right to say,
6. that for the privilege of doing business in this State, for
7. the privilege of insuring the lives of the 11 million
8. people of this State, be they foreign or domestic corporations,
9. for that privilege they must be willing to take the situation
10. where a company and we know it's seldom, but it does happen,
11. where a company becomes insolvent, that they pool among them-
12. selves to protect those little old ladies and everyone else
13. who has paid premiums for 20, 30, or 40 years, to protect
14. them from getting nothing back for all those years of paying
15. in. I don't think anyone here in this Chamber would want
16. to have to vote on the appropriation to save those people
17. in the city...in the Equity Funding situation for the 20 or 30
18. million dollars it may take to protect those who had been
19. paying year in and year out to that particular company
20. or any company that becomes insolvent. We have the right,
21. we should have the duty of saying as a right of doing
22. business they should come in and insure themselves. We have
23. the situation in unemployment compensation where we say to
24. insurers, insure yourself. I think that it should be
25. reminded also that this was a commission proposal originally,
26. bipartisan that first came to the Legislature under
27. the Ogilvie administration, under the Republican Department
28. of Insurance that has been carried forward under the present
29. administration. This has had bipartisan support in its
30. inception. And I would hope it has that kind of support
31. on the roll call.

13. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
14. HB 846 as amended eliminates the preference that a junior
15. college must give to its resident students when and only
16. when they enter into a mutual contract with an adjoining or
17. multiple junior...junior college district for the purposes
18. of providing those courses that have low enrollments so
19. on and so forth. The legislation is permissive. It has
20. the backing of all the interest, vested interest as far
21. as the junior colleges are concerned and I would urge a
22. favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there further discussion? Senator Soper.

25. SENATOR SOPER:

26. Senator, yield to a question or two? Now, under the
27. present law the students that are within the junior college
28. district must be...must be accommodated first. Now, is this
29. going to change the law so that anybody can come in...into
30. a junior college district from out of the district, because
31. the fact that you have a...an agreement on some special courses?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Shapiro.

1. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

2. No, Senator Soper. This only applies to where two
3. junior college districts decide that only one of them can
4. offer the course. Then the students from the two districts
5. that want to take just this course...the students from each
6. of the districts will be given equal preference. There
7. will be no preference, but only for that course. It does
8. not do away with the preference for any other course, only
9. those where there is a mutual agreement between the multiple
10. districts.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Soper.

13. SENATOR SOPER:

14. Now, how can a junior college agree with another
15. junior college to offer a course and...and how do they
16. fund this then?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Shapiro.

19. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

20. Senator Soper, let me give you an example. The...
21. many junior college districts want to offer courses in
22. dental hygiene. Now to offer a course in dental hygiene
23. requires not only physical plant but a lot of equipment
24. and the course...the equipment alone sometimes will run
25. in excess of \$100,000. Because...and then because each
26. junior college district may have only one or two students
27. that are interested in that course, possibly four or five
28. districts will get together, decide which district is
29. going to offer the course. That district will offer it,
30. then they will charge back to the participating districts
31. the tuition costs. In other words they'll all share
32. equally.

33. SENATOR SOPER:

1. They can do that now. Now, what you're...how do you
2. pay for that \$100,000 worth of the equipment, that's what
3. I want to know. That...the tuition costs don't take care
4. of that because...Senator Shapiro, now, if you teach a course
5. in dental hygiene, I know we have that course at our Junior
6. College, they want to come from out...out of the district
7. and come in...they can take the course if it's not taught in...
8. in their school. Now...so you're not doing anything with
9. this at all.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Shapiro.

12. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

13. Well, admittedly all the bill does is when districts
14. enter into a mutual contract in...to provide teaching courses
15. that the preference limitation we have now is eliminated.
16. And in that particular instance the dental hygiene, every
17. junior college's district in the State cannot offer the
18. course, and when they...in my area where one college has
19. decided to take it, it...with mutual agreement with the other
20. ones and they entered into contract to provide the service
21. or the course to the other districts, I...I think it's
22. discriminatory to keep the...the preferential treatment
23. for the principal college district.

24. SENATOR SOPER:

25. I understand all of that, Dr...Senator, but how does
26. a junior college, you haven't answered that yet. They
27. can't enter in any agreement where this one junior college
28. would receive all the equipment and the other junior colleges
29. pay for it. Does your bill allow for that where the other
30. junior colleges would help pay for the equipment?

31. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

32. A junior college tuition charge backs are based on
33. per capita costs which includes the cost of the equipment

1. amortization, so on and so forth.

2. SENATOR SOPER:

3. All...I...I don't believe that's right, because that's...
4. that's a separate entity and as far as the budgeting is
5. concerned, and if...and then how many...you say per capita. Well,
6. How many students and how long will the equipment be
7. available and how do you charge it off? How do you
8. depreciate it? Suppose you had...you said there are two
9. students, now suppose you had ten students altogether, two...
10. two from the...I'd call the mother college that's got the
11. equipment and six students from...from another...would they
12. pay...or you take, make ten students altogether, would...
13. would they pay 8/10ths of the equipment or \$80,000 toward
14. the equipment?

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Shapiro.

17. SENATOR SHAPRIO:

18. Senator...Senator Bruce. All right. The...the...the
19. charge back takes that into consideration. That's all I can
20. tell you on it. I mean...the principal junior college district
21. does not pick up the entire cost. They only pick it up on
22. the basis of the number of students they have enrolled.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Soper...

25. SENATOR SOPER:

26. I...think, that Dr, I mean Senator. I think that ...
27. already can do this, and I don't think that...that you can
28. add the tuition cost to the equipment. I mean the equipment
29. cost to the tuition. I think...I don't think you can do that,
30. and I think that the junior college that does put in the
31. equipment should have the privilege of...of taking care of
32. their own students first, and...and not...not this other
33. manner. I think this will cause a lot of trouble.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Is there further...Senator Bruce.

3. SENATOR BRUCE:

4. I would just like to rise in support of this bill. It
5. clarifies a very difficult problem, Senator Soper. And that
6. is the State Junior College Board has mandated that junior
7. colleges go into cooperative agreements to limit the number
8. of expensive courses, but the statute also says that the
9. junior college must prefer in-district students. Well, if
10. they do that it makes it very difficult for junior colleges
11. to agree to offer like nursing in my junior college district,
12. or ag-mechanics and we have a cooperative agreement with
13. Belleville that they will offer aviation because they have
14. an airport there. We don't really get in the question about
15. equipment because they're already offering the course. We
16. don't buy their airplanes, they don't buy our tractors and
17. diesel equipment. We just write it off and we hope that if
18. we can offer it to a broad enough number of students and
19. get the charge back from the State and from the other junior
20. colleges it will pay for our equipment. We still pay for
21. our own equipment. They pay for their own equipment, but
22. if we can't get rid of this preference, junior colleges are
23. reluctant to agree to have jointly offered courses. I think
24. it's a very good bill and urge a favorable roll call.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Is there further discussion? The question is shall
27. HB 846 pass? The Secretary will call the roll.

20. SENATOR WEAVER:

21. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, HB 857 would
22. amend Section 5 of the Illinois General Non...Not for Profit
23. Corporation Act. It would allow these non...Not for Profit
24. Corporations to indemnify their officers and directors against
25. expenses incurred when they are made defendants in law suits
26. as the result of their positions or...that they hold in
27. these corporations. The directors and officers would be
28. indemnified against the legal expenses, settlement costs,
29. except in cases arising as a result of willful misconduct.
30. Every State in the Union has this enabling or permissive
31. legislation, except Idaho and Illinois. If there are any
32. discussion...any questions I will be happy to try to answer.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Is there further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

2. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

3. This is good legislation because these people assume
4. responsibilities and as long as they're acting in the course
5. of their employment they should be indemnified. I urge a
6. favorable roll call on this side of the aisle.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there further discussion? The question is shall
9. HB 857 pass. The Secretary will call the roll.

26. 857 having received the constitutional majority is declared
27. passed. Senator Kosinski, do you wish to call 849? HB 865,

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Roe.

1. SENATOR ROE:

2. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, this bill was
3. developed by the Commission on Children after about a year
4. of testimony and review in this area. There were several
5. suits in Cook County that revealed that children, parents
6. and foster parents were not getting the court on notice
7. in situations involving emergency shelter care. Now, the
8. reason for this was that there were long time periods
9. and no time limits under the juvenile court act in which
10. action had to be taken as far as these minors were concerned.
11. Now there's two specific changes in the bill, that indicates
12. that a hearing must be had within 36 hours for a child
13. placed in emergency shelter-care, and that an adjudicatory
14. hearing on a petition for dependency or neglect must be
15. held within 90 days. Has been amended I think to satisfy
16. Senator Rock's objection to the bill originally. I would

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there further discussion? The question is shall
20. HB 865 as amended pass. On that question the Secretary will
21. call the roll.

22. SECRETARY:

5. HB 870 (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 3rd reading of the bill.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Course.

9. SENATOR COURSE:

10. Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate.
11. HB 870 amends the Illinois Highway Code. It provides
12. for the painting of an edge...edge line on uncurbed high-
13. ways having either U...Illinois or U.S. route traffic
14. markings. Now, this is a recommendation of the Depart-
15. ment of Transportation. And at the present time the
16. two-lanè highways are only painted. This will make it
17. mandatory to paint all four-lanè highways having traffic
18. of 1,000 or more vehicles per day. I think it's a good
19. piece of legislation and I would appreciate your support.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Is there further discussion? The question is shall
22. HB 870 pass and on that question the Secretary will call
23. the roll.

24. SECRETARY:

HB 874 (Secretary reads title of bill)
3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Glass.

SENATOR GLASS:

Thank you Mr. President and Senators. HB 874 would establish a presumption that when a certificate of title to a...an automobile is made out to a husband and a wife with a marital relationship shown, a presumption is established that the title is held as joint tenants with right to survivorship. This would eliminate the need for a widow or widower upon the death of a spouse to have to apply for a new title, that the title would automatically be in the survivor. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

PRESIDENT:

Is there further discussion? Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Just a question Mr. President, if the sponsor will yield. In our files, Senator Glass, we have an amendment. Was that amendment proposed, or was it adopted, or was it ...which would say that if the certificate of title is made out to more than one person, it has no reference whatever to husband and wife, has...has that amendment in effect been adopted?

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Glass.

3. SENATOR GLASS:

4. I'm not familiar with the amendment. As a matter of
5. fact, this bill when I...when it came up in committee, I
6. walked in a little bit late and the testimony was underway.
7. I don't remember any amendment being offered, but... this
8. is limited to the situation of the spouses, husband and
9. wife.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Rock.

12. SENATOR ROCK:

13. I'm advised that...it was not offered, so I think the
14. bill is a good one as it stands.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Is there further discussion? The question is shall
17. SB...HB 874 pass, and on that question the Secretary will
18. call the roll.

19. SECRETARY:

1. SENATOR COURSE:

2. Yes, Mr. President, I looked at the consent Calendar
3. today and I saw that I had HB 866 on there and it was removed
4. from the consent Calendar. What is the procedure for handling
5. those bills?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Yes, they go back to 3rd reading and there...I under-
8. stand there was amendment to be offered to that, and we'll...
9. we will develop another agreed bill list though.

10. SENATOR COURSE:

11. Thank you.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. HB 879, Senator Berning.

14. SECRETARY:

15. HB 879 (Secretary reads title of bill)
16. 3rd reading of the bill.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Berning.

19. SENATOR BERNING:

20. Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Body. This
21. bill sets aside a portion of the motor fuel tax paid by
22. boaters now going into the motor fuel tax fund, sets it
23. aside for use by the Department of Natural...Water Resources
24. for use in maintaining channels, rivers and waterways in
25. the State of Illinois. This is a bill approved by the
26. administration, supported by Mr. Guillou of the Division
27. of Waterways. I would appreciate a favorable roll call.
28. These are monies that belong really to those who are using
29. the waterways and at this time not getting any benefit
30. from them.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Is..Senator Donnewald.

33. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

1. Yes, Mr. President, I rise in opposition to this bill.
2. I personally am not, I don't object to the use of motor
3. fuel funds for mass transit, but I think we're going
4. a little bit too far here. This will come out of MFT fund,
5. and it takes money away from the Department of Transportation,
6. municipalities, counties, road districts, and which...they
7. were supposed to be used for road construction. I would
8. urge a no vote.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Is there further discussion? Senator Latherow.

11. SENATOR LATHEROW:

12. Mr. President, and Members of the Senate, I'd like
13. to recognize the fact also along with Senator Donnewald
14. that about four years ago we passed legislation that we
15. thought stretched every bit of the imagination as far as
16. what the people in the motor boat business may be taking
17. from the motor fuel tax fund. And I asked for some
18. verifications of the...to show that the people in the motor
19. boats and so on were using enough gasoline to make it
20. bearable to us the fact that we take one million dollars
21. from the motor fuel tax and give to this particular fund
22. and receive no information concerning that whatsoever. I
23. think we're presently making a very large and possibly
24. excessive contribution to the motor boating industry from
25. motor fuel tax and I too would suggest that this bill be
26. defeated.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Sours.

29. SENATOR SOURS:

30. Mr. President this is one of the days in my own self-
31. effacing manner I haven't had much to say. I know that
32. will draw considerable applause. You know we live by
33. principle, that's p, l, e. And once we start digging away

1. at the motor fuel fund you can just about rationalize and
2. make reasonable in your own mind a million other good, honest
3. approprius diversions. It's little like chastity, there's
4. no such thing as a little un-chastity. It's a little like
5. putting garlic in the soup. Once it's there, it's there and
6. the aroma lingers on, like my old friend Tennyson's, "The
7. Brook", which no doubt would appeal to your Senator Wooten,
8. being a classicist. Now, we can spend and spend and spend
9. and pretty soon we'll quit building bridges, we'll quit build-
10. ing roads, we'll quit building shoulders on highways because
11. we have other uses for the gasoline tax. I would like to
12. also talk about maintenance and if any State in the 50 States
13. needs a little more maintenance even in this austere ad-
14. ministration, it's the State of Illinois. Now, this in
15. principle is bad. I know there are other reasons probably
16. for supporting the bill; but in principle we are departing
17. from the...the fact that the road fund has been, ought to
18. be, and I trust will remain inviolate. I'm going to
19. oppose this bill on principle, an all-enduring principle.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Is there fur discussion? Senator Course.

22. SENATOR COURSE:

23. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I rise in
24. support of this legislation. We're talking about that
25. sacred cow, road fund again. But ladies and gentlemen
26. this money can be refunded to the motor ^{fuel}, boat users,
27. but very little of...of the tax money...ever is. Now, ^{runers need}
28. these people are entitled to it. These lakes and ~~are~~ ~~are~~
29. some...a lot of work done on it, and I think this is a good
30. piece of legislation we're talking about a million dollars
31. and it's only a drop in the bucket compared to what the
32. motor boat owners pay every year. I would urge my side
33. of the aisle to support this legislation.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Knuppel.

3. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

4. Mr. Chairman, when we can't build the roads that are
5. necessary in my district, I don't have one mile of four-
6. lane highway . I think that it's atrocious to attack the
7. motor fuel tax fund, and I say that you can't go wrong for
8. long with Sours and Knuppel are together.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Is there further discussion? Senator Berning may
11. close the debate.

12. SENATOR BERNING:

13. Thank you Mr. President and Members of the Body, I'd
14. like to call your attention to the fact that up to this
15. point the motor fuel tax money paid by boaters has been
16. like the garlic in the soup lost in the motor fuel tax
17. funds and benefited the boaters not one whit. Now I submit
18. to you that a motor fuel tax in its concept is for and
19. should be by those who use the highways, not those who
20. burn gasoline or...vehicle fuel for other than highway
21. use and if you need further justification for this con-
22. tention, I point out to you that the airplane owners
23. now can and do apply for a refund and they get it, a
24. refund on the motor fuel tax which is collected when
25. they buy gasoline for their airplanes. There is no
26. justification, no fairness, no equity whatsoever in
27. requiring a motor boat user to pay a motor fuel tax to
28. support the highways when the use of his vehicle is on
29. the waterways. This is pure and simple fair treatment.
30. It is further justified I might add by the fact that the
31. boater could petition for a refund if he wanted to do so.
32. This entails a bit of administrative chore would be
33. costly to the department...effect the refund, so that there

1. is justification on that score also. Fairness dictates
2. Mr President, Members of the Body, fairness dictates
3. that those who are paying these tax dollars get some
4. benefit from them and bear in mind that this is not all
5. the tax money paid by these people, the proceeds are now
6. in excess of \$4,000,000. This bill will...apply to about
7. \$1,000,000 of that \$4,000,000. This is pure and simple
8. justice and will do a portion of the job of reclaiming
9. our waterways. I earnestly solicit your aye vote.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. The question is shall HB 879 pass? And on that ques-
12. tion the Secretary will call the roll.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
15. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
16. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
17. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
18. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
19. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
20. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,

24. PRESIDENT:

25. On that question the yeas are fourteen. The nays
26. are ten. HB 879 having failed to receive a constitutional
27. majority is declared lost. Senator Partee.

28. SENATOR PARTEE:

29. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I'd like
30. to move for personal consideration and on a point of
31. personal privilege to change the order of business. Seated
32. to my left is a gentleman that most people in government
33. have known for a long time, and his name is Mr. Roger W.

1. Irving. I would ask that we consider a Resolution which...

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Is there leave to revert to the order of Resolutions?

4. So ordered. Senator Partee is recognized.

5. SENATOR PARTEE:

6. Now, this Resolution coming from Senator Harris and
7. myself, and I hope all Members of the Senate will join and
8. as I stand, Mrs. Irving is....in the gallery and I'd like for
9. her to stand and be recognized by the Senate. Want you
10. to know I tricked Mr. Irving over here, he didn't know
11. what was going to happen. But he was born in Chambersburg,
12. Illinois on August 4, 1925, where he attended grade and
13. high school and earned letters for four years in basketball,
14. baseball and track. And from September of 1943 until March
15. of 1946 when he was honorably discharged, he served his
16. nation with distinction during World War II, having been
17. selected for Aviation Cadet Training in the Army Air Force.
18. And in May of 1945, while attending advanced navigation
19. school at San Marcos, Texas, Mr. Irving sustained an injury
20. which left him permanently paralyzed and confined to a
21. wheel chair. Undaunted, however, by this injury, Mr. Irving
22. attendded Illinois College in Jacksonville, Illinois, receiv-
23. ing in 1953 an A.B. Degree. He also attended the University of
24. California in Los Angeles where he earned the M. A. degree
25. in 1955. He taught school at Midland School in Los Olivos,
26. California from 1955 to 1958. He has applied his considerable
27. talents as a historical researcher to the National Lincoln
28. Sesqui-centennial Commission and revised a series of books
29. title Day by Day History of Lincoln. And whereas Mr. Irving
30. from March of 1963 to the present has served State govern-
31. ment in Illinois in the following positions: Assistant
32. Director of the Department of Personnel; Acting Director of the
33. then newly created Department of General Services; Assistant

1. Director of the Department of General Services; Assistant
2. State Auditor in the Office of the Auditor of Public
3. Accounts and Associate Superintendent in the Division
4. of Business Affairs of the Office of the Superintendent
5. of Public Instruction; and whereas Mr. Irving has com-
6. bined a deep commitment to the two-party system with an
7. honest and compassionate manner of carrying out the con-
8. siderable and varied responsibilities associated with
9. the various described positions; and whereas Mr. Irving
10. has demonstrated to all with whom he has worked a rare
11. capability to lend brilliance of mind as well as an
12. ingrained sense of practicality to the role of dedicated
13. public service to the citizens of this State; and whereas
14. Mr. Irving's successful professional record is mirrored
15. in his private life roles of devoted husband to his wife
16. Alice Mae and loving father to his two sons, Michael and
17. Scott; and whereas recent medical review and advice dictates
18. that Mr. Irving prematurely retire from public service
19. therefore, be it resolved, by the Senate of the 78th
20. General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we extend
21. to Mr. Irving our commendation and deep gratitude and
22. appreciation for his service to the State and People of
23. Illinois and that a suitable copy of this Preamble and
24. Resolution be forwarded to Mr. Roger W. Irving and his
25. family. I would ask that the rules be suspended for the
26. immediate consideration and adoption of this Resolution,
27. and that all Senate members be shown as co-sponsor.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Partee has moved to suspend the rules for the
30. immediate consideration of the Resolution. All in favor
31. signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion carries,
32. the rules are suspended. For the matter of consideration
33. of the Resolution, Senator Latherow is recognized.

1. SENATOR LATHEROW:

2. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I too, would
3. like to state my real fine feelings toward Roger Irving
4. and the fact that at one time he did live in a good
5. district in the State of Illinois which included Pike
6. County. His father and I have met on many occasions
7. for the good of the State of Illinois while our party
8. affiliations didn't seem to be the same, we could agree
9. on many points. And I am sure it's through the good work
10. of Roger here in Springfield that Pike County is known
11. because of Roger Irving as a real good County. Thank you,
12. Mr. President.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. The President wishes to add his voice enthusiastically
15. to the recognition of this great and dedicated public
16. servant, Roger Irving. We all know who have experienced
17. his contribution to State government what an outstanding
18. practitioner of the art of government he is, and it is
19. fitting that Senator Partee asked me to join as co-sponsor
20. of this Resolution and I enthusiastically do so, and inquire
21. whether there is leave for all Senators to join as co-
22. sponsors. So ordered. On the motion to adopt, all those
23. in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The record
24. shows that the Resolution is adopted unanimously.

25. SECRETARY:

26. Senate Resolution 199, Senator Palmer and it's
27. congratulatory.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Palmer.

30. SENATOR PALMER:

31. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, the Secretary
32. has the Resolution congratulating one Oscar Nudelman a
33. prominent citizen of the State of Illinois and a distinguished

1. and eminent attorney for 50 years in the State of Illinois.
2. And on this Friday, June 15th, 1973 he will be honored for
3. 50 years as an attorney in the State of Illinois who...they
4. will confer upon him the title of Senior Counsellor of the
5. Illinois Bar. I'm going to ask the Secretary to read the
6. Resolution. I'd like to mention one more thing that is
7. not in the Resolution that Oscar Nudelman has the distinction
8. of being the father of our own Senator Harold Nudelman. Will
9. the Secretary please read the Resolution?

10. Whereas, The Legal Profession is the foundation upon
11. which order in our society is founded, and the attorneys and
12. the judges who make up that profession are those who
13. contribute most to the stability of our civilization; and
14. Whereas, the Illinois State Bar Association will on Friday,
15. June 15th, 1973 honor Oscar M. Nudelman, Attorney at Law
16. and confer upon him the title of Senior Counsellor of the
17. Illinois Bar; and whereas Mr. Nudelman was admitted to
18. the practice before the Supreme Court of Illinois on October
19. 11, 1923; the United States District Court in 1925; the
20. Supreme Court of the United States in 1959 and the United
21. States Court of Appeals in 1966; and whereas he's a member
22. of the Chicago, Illinois and American Bar Associations and
23. is a past President of the Decalogue Society of Lawyers; and
24. Whereas Mr. Nudelman has served his country as Government
25. Appeal Agent and a Member of the Local Board of the Selective
26. Service System; and as a Community Commander in the Civilian
27. Defense System; and Whereas he's a past president of the Sinai-
28. Lawndale B'nai B'rith, and a Commissioner of its Adult Jewish
29. Education Commission and has served as a speaker for the
30. Decalogue Society and B'nai B'rith; and Whereas he has
31. contributed to the sum of legal knowledge through his
32. articles for bar journals and his participation in many of
33. the organizations of lawyers in the State of Illinois; there-

fore, be it resolved, by the Senate of the 78th General
1. Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we congratulate
2. Oscar M. Nudelman, Esquire, upon 50 years of service to
3. the People of the State of Illinois through his work in
4. the legal profession; and that we congratulate him upon his

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate Resolution 200 by Senator Kosinski and it's
18. congratulatory.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Palmer has urged that all Senators join in
21. co-sponsor of the Resolution for Mr. Nudelman. So ordered.
22. Senator Kosinski.

23. SENATOR KOSINSKI:

24. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, this is a
25. Congratulatory message for...congratulating Reverend
26. Father Kaleth, Pastor of St. Stanilaus Kostka on his 31st
27. anniversary of priesthood and that is my home parish.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. On the motion to suspend for immediate consideration,
30. all in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion
31. carries. On the motion to adopt, all in favor signify by
32. saying aye. Contrary no. The motion carries, the Resolution

33.

1. is adopted. Senator Regner.

2. SENATOR REGNER:

3. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I'd like to
4. move to discharge the Committee on Local Government from
5. Senate Bills 958 and 959 so they can be re-referred to
6. the Committee on Revenue. I've discussed this with
7. Senators Harris and Partee both and they are in agreement.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. And...you also cleared with Senator SoPer?

10. SENATOR REGNER:

11. Yes, right.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Yes. All right, the motion is to discharge the
14. Committee on Local Government from further consideration
15. of...are they Senate Bills or House Bills?

16. SENATOR REGNER:

17. Senate Bills 958 and 959.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senate Bills 958 and 959 and be re-referred to the
20. Committee on Revenue. All in favor signify by saying
21. aye. Contrary no. The motion carries, so ordered. Senator
22. Daley.

23. SENATOR DALEY:

24. Mr. President and fellow Senators, at this time I
25. would like to introduce a...a former State Senator, he's
26. presently chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals in the City of
27. Chicago. He's a neighbor, and a voter in my district, the
28. honorable Bud Finley. Bud. Also his son Patrick is with
29. Bud.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Knuepfer.

32. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

33. Mr. President, Members of the Body, I would like to

1. discharge Local Government Committee from further consideration
2. of House Bills 1452, 1453 and 1454 for the purpose of re-
3. referring them to the Public Welfare Committee. Then I would
4. like to make a further motion after that.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Soper is off the Floor. You have...

7. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

8. I have his concurrence, yes.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. All right. Senator Knuepfer moves to discharge the
11. Committee on Local Government from further consideration
12. of House Bills 1452, 1453 and 54 and re-referred to the
13. Committee on...

14. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

15. Public Welfare.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Public Welfare, Health and Corrections. All in favor
18. signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion carries,
19. so ordered. Senator Knuepfer.

20. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

21. Now, I don't know in view...what the six-day ruling
22. is anymore, but in...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. ...it has been suspended.

25. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

26. ...the event that I need it, I want permission to
27. have them heard this evening. Do I need that?

28. PRESIDENT:

29. No. We amended the rules during the month of June
30. it is no longer necessary for the six-day notice.

31. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

32. Oh, ok. Then...

33. PRESIDENT:

1. ...it's a prerogative of the chair.

2. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

3. Then can I make one announcement while I'm up here
4. and that is...

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Please do.

7. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

8. ...Public Health, Welfare and Corrections will meet
9. at 7:00 o'clock tonight. I urge all of you to attend, we
10. only have two more meetings this week. Tonight and our
11. regular meeting Thursday at which we must dispose of all
12. the business that's going to be disposed of. Please show
13. up.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Well, Senator did you say where the meeting is?

16. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

17. The...the meeting...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Tonight.

20. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

21. ...the Senate Floor this evening, at 7:00 o'clock.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Public Health, Welfare and Correction on the Senate
24. Floor at 7:00 p.m. tonight. Senator Mitchler.

25. SENATOR MITCHLER:

26. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I have two
27. items. The first item, I would ask leave of the Senate
28. to have the Senate Appropriations Committee leave out,
29. or rather discharge from the Senate Appropriations
30. Committee HB 534. It's an appropriation bill that originally
31. was 3.5 million dollars, been reduced to \$100,000 for an
32. overpass, north Farnsworth Avenue, in Aurora, Illinois.
33. We passed a similar bill out of the Senate and it is now

1. over in the House. I checked this out with the Senate
2. Appropriations Committee and notified both sides of the
3. aisle. I would ask leave of the Senate to have HB 534
4. discharged from the Senate Appropriations Committee placed
5. on the order of 2nd reading.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Mitchler has moved that HB 534 be discharged
8. from further consideration by the Committee on Appropriations.
9. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. the motion
10. carries. So ordered. Senator Mitchler.

11. SENATOR MITCHLER:

12. The next item, I would like to introduce in the gallery
13. immediately to my left a group of Cadet Girl Scouts from
14. St. Rita's Church, in Aurora. The Rita-Kaskia School, and
15. they're lead by Mrs. Robert Fox and I would ask the Girl
16. Scouts to please rise and be recognized by the Senate.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Newhouse.

19. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

20. Thank you, Mr. President. And I wonder if Senator
21. Knuepfer would...be with me on this. Mr. President, I
22. don't know what the proper motion is but I have Senate
23. Bill, or rather House Bill 1299 which is a companion bill
24. to HB 1298 which is to be heard in Public Health, Welfare
25. tonight. Senator Knuepfer, now, they're companion bills
26. and I'm wondering if the proper motion is to ask unanimous
27. leave to have them heard together, since it has not been
28. posted, it has to be heard before the end of the week.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. In what committee is 1299?

31. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

32. I don't see it in any committee now, Senator, that's
33. why I want to get it ...Perhaps this is not...if this is

1. the proper form, I'd like to settle that...

2. PRESIDENT:

3. I don't think it has caught up with 1298.

4. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

5. They were picked up at different times, so it may
6. not have been assigned yet.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Yes. 1299 is...in the Committee on Assignment of
9. Bills. It was only read a 1st time today, so in the process
10. of things now, if you could move to discharge the Committee
11. on Assignment of Bills and have the bill referred to the
12. Committee on Public Health, Welfare and Safety. Is that
13. acceptable to the chairman of Public Health? All right.
14. Senator Newhouse moves to discharge the Committee on
15. Assignment of Bills from further consideration of HB 1299,
16. and be referred to the Committee on Public Health, Welfare
17. and Corrections. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary
18. no. Motion carries, so ordered. Now, Senator Knuepfer has
19. acknowledged that the bill will be heard this evening.

20. Senator Walker.

21. SENATOR WALKER:

22. Thank you Mr. President. Point of parliamentary inquiry.
23. Do we start tomorrow with 900, House Bills 3rd? Seems like
24. you always get down to me and then there's a distraction.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Tomorrow we start with HB 900.

27. SENATOR WALKER:

28. Thank you. Now, Mr. President, there's a...a meeting
29. of the Licensed Activities and Credit Regulations Committee
30. meeting tomorrow at 8:30 and the bills have been posted
31. and all bills assigned after the posting will be heard. I
32. understand there's some House Bills that over here, so if
33. the Senate sponsors pick them up and they're sent to committee

1. I'd suggest you be there at 8:30 tomorrow morning. I'd
2. like to have a quorum by at least 8:32, let's say.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Are there further announcements? Senator McBroom.

5. SENATOR MCBROOM:

6. Mr. Chairman, the Appropriations Committee will meet
7. this afternoon in the Senate Chambers, but the time has
8. been extended from 2:15 until 3:15. Secondly, Mr. Pre-
9. sident, Governor Hartigan's bill on the Department of Ag-
10. ing was to be heard today, and at his request it's being
11. delayed until tomorrow. It will be the first bill heard
12. tomorrow in the Appropriations Committee.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Clarke.

15. SENATOR CLARKE:

16. Mr. Chairman, the Revenue Committee will meet at 2:15,
17. or as soon thereafter as possible in A-1.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Are there further announcements? Senator Knuepfer.

20. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

21. I'm looking up the number of a bill, or Senator Hynes
22. is. In any case I want permission to show the lead sponsor
23. as Senator Knuepfer rather than Senator Hynes, and Senator
24. Hynes will be the secondary sponsor of the bill. May I give
25. the Clerk the number as soon as we're able to locate it?
26. I would move for leave to change the lead sponsor anyway
27. on SB number blank, blank, blank.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there leave? There's been a request for a roll call.
30. The record will show that Senator Knuepfer is the lead
31. sponsor of an unnumbered, unknown bill that Senator Knuepfer
32. is going to inform the Secretary of. HB 1628, no longer
33. unknown or unnumbered. Are there further announcements? The
Senate stands adjourned until 10:00 A. M. tomorrow morning.
