2. Yes...Mr. President, HB 1398 deals with...SB that
3. we passed out of the Senate, SB 208. It's an exact
4. duplicate, it deals with armed violence and...removal of
5. probation for it. The Senate passed SB 208 out about a
6. month ago...

7. PRESIDENT:

8. You wish to advance without reference?

9. SENATOR BELL:

10. Without reference. It's the same bill.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Bell, moves to have HB 1398 read a first time
13. and advanced to the order of second reading without reference.
14. All in favor of the motion signify by saying aye. Contrary
15. no. Motion carries. So ordered. Yeah. I'm advised that
16. that bill has not been reported to the Senate yet, so we'll
17. take that motion out of the record and when it arrives you
18. can put the motion again, Senator Bell. Ok. Senator Knuppel.

19. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

20. Mr. Chairman, members of the Body, I'd like to move
21. for discharge of the Committee from further consideration of
22. HB 1494, that's the Committee on Licensing. I talked to the
23. Chairman of the Committee and there was a mixup this morning.
24. He had no objection. I move that it be...Committee be dis-
25. charged and be placed on second reading.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Knuppel moves to discharge the Committee on
28. Licensed Activities from further consideration of HB 1494.
29. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The
30. motion carries. The bill is discharged from Licensed
31. Activities. Senator Carroll.

32. SENATOR CARROLL:

33. Thank you Mr. President, I would like to move at this
time that HB 1190, that the Committee on the Assignment of

1. Bills be discharged and that the bill be assigned to a
2. special subcommittee dealing with the problem of racing
3. dates, fees, etc. That will be...

4. PRESIDENT:

5. What...what was the bill number...

6. SENATOR CARROLL:

7. 1190.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Carroll moves to discharge the Committee on
10. Assignment of Bills from further consideration of HB 1190
11. and have it assigned to the Committee on Licensed Activities
12. for reassignment for the working subcommittee dealing with
13. the...question of racing dates subject matter. All in
14. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion
15. carries. So ordered. Senator Bell.

16. SENATOR BELL:

17. Yes, Mr. President,...I'd like to move that the
18. Judiciary Committee be discharged from any further con-
19. sideration on HB 1398. I have spoken to the Chairman
20. of Judiciary Committee, it's a duplicate bill that passed
21. out of the Senate, as SB 208.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Bell moves to discharge the Committee on
24. Judiciary from further consideration of HB 1398 and have
25. the bill placed on the order of 2nd reading. All in
26. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. Motion carries.
27. So ordered. Senator Latherow.

28. SENATOR LATHEROW:

29. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I'd just
30. like to have you recognize in these late days how factual
31. sometimes the Calendar becomes. On House Bills first
32. reading, I'd like you to take note of HB 1999...1975
33. and see the explanation of that particular bill.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. ...Senator Wooten, you have a bill on...House Bills
3. on third reading, which you have an amendment, 591...
4. are you prepared...okay. Senator Kosinski, on HB 849.
5. We can get that housekeeping taken care of...House Bills
6. on third reading. HB 849. Is there leave to recall to
7. the order of second reading HB 849? So...so ordered.
8. Senator Kosinski.

9. SENATOR KOSINSKI:

10. Mr. President and members of the Senate, the...the
11. amendment puts the bill in its original form and...there's
12. no objection and I move for its adoption.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Kosinski moves the adoption of the amendment.
15. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The
16. motion carries. Are there further amendments from the
17. Floor? 3rd reading. Senator Walker, do you have a similar
18. motion?

19. SENATOR WALKER:

20. ...Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, in
21. regards to HB 1109, there's an amendment on page 2 striking...

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Is...is there leave to recall HB 1109 to the order
24. of second reading for the purpose of an amendment? So
25. ordered. Senator Walker.

26. SENATOR WALKER:

27. Section 5 of the bill now states, and this in regards
28. to Little Calumet River Flood Coordinating Commission Act,
29. Section 5 now reads Commission may without regard to the
30. personnel code employ and fix the compensation of the
31. executive secretary and such stenographic and clerical
32. assistants it considers necessary. This amendment strikes
33. the executive secretary and such stenographic and ...clerical
assistants and the bill will now read with the amend...

1. the Commission may without regard to personnel code employ
2. and fix the compensation such staff as it considers
3. necessary. Like to move the adoption of Amendment No. 1,
4. HB 1109.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Walker moves the...adoption of Amendment No. 1.
7. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion
8. carries. The amendment is adopted. Are there further amend-
9. ments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Senator Donnewald, you
10. have a similar motion?

11. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

12. Yes, on...HB 306. I'd like to call it back to the order
13. of second reading for purposes of an amendment.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Donnewald seeks leave to call HB 306 to the
16. order of second reading for purposes of amendment. Is
17. there leave? The bill is ordered to second reading.
18. Senator Donnewald.

19. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

20. Yes, this is an amendment requested by the sponsor and
21. it does this simply, the amendatory act is not a prohibition
22. upon the contractual or associational powers granted by Article
23. 7, Section 10 of the Constitution. That's it. I would move
24. its adoption.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Donnewald moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1.
27. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion
28. carries. The amendment is adopted. Are there further
29. amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. ...Senator Knuepfer,
30. on the order of House Bills on second reading...you have...
31. 1318, you wish that advanced?

32. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

33. I'd simply like to advance that. Yes Sir, Mr. President.

1. SECRETARY:
2. HB 1318 (Secretary reads title of bill).
3. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee amendments.
4. PRESIDENT:
5. Are there amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading.
6. Senate Bills on second reading. Senator Johns. 290.
7. Senate Bills on second reading. Advance.
8. SECRETARY:
9. SB 290 (Secretary reads title of bill).
10. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations
11. offers one amendment.
12. PRESIDENT:
13. Senator Johns. Is there discussion? On the motion
14. to adopt the amendment all in favor signify by saying aye.
15. Contrary no. Motion carries. The amendment is adopted. Are
16. there amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Senator Daley,
17. 1182, do you wish that advanced? Advance.
18. SECRETARY:
19. SB 1182. (Secretary reads title of bill).
20. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee amendments.
21. PRESIDENT:
22. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
24. We will now revert to the order of House Bills third
25. reading. House Bills third reading starting with HB 900.
26. So I may not have to tell you again, we're going to House
27. Bills third reading starting at HB 900. Senator Walker.
28. SECRETARY:
29. HB 900. (Secretary reads title of bill).
30. 3rd reading of the bill.
31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
32. Senator Walker will explain his bill.
33. SENATOR WALKER:

1. ...Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate...
2. HB 900 I would say is incorrectly described in the synopsis.
3. It states that it makes it unlawful for security guards to
4. carry firearms while commuting to work. It doesn't quite
5. do that...there's certain...exceptions to the Concealed
6. Firearms Act...there are exemptions rather. Peace officer,
7. wardens...armed services, reserves, special agents and also
8. security guards while actually engaged in the performance
9. of their duties. What this bill does is to state that the
10. security guards while actually engaged in performance of their
11. duties, of their employment or commuting between their homes
12. and place of employment...

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Ring the bell, Sweeney.

15. SENATOR WALKER:

16. ...provided that such...as the cops do in one hour.
17. What this bill provides if the guards have to successfully
18. complete a course of study approved by or supervised by
19. the Department of Registration, Education consists that
20. not less than thirty hours that the Department shall provide
21. suitable documentation to demonstrate the successful completion
22. of such course and this must be carried on the person of the
23. security guard. I think it's a good bill and I'd appreciate
24. a favorable roll call.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. Any discussion? Senator Partee. May we get a little
27. order Senator before you start? We have very little now,
28. let's try to get some more.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. I have question, Senator. What are the guidelines
31. for the course? ...The only thing I see here is that there
32. will be thirty hours of training. Now in what areas is this
33. training and what does it consist of. Who determines
what should be taught and who teaches it?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. Senator Walker.

3. SENATOR WALKER:

4. The Department of Registration and Education, I
5. assume, will approve the course, tell what should be
6. caught...taught in there. This bill is the result of
7. a story in Chicago today where a reporter got a job,
8. got a gun, got a star and found out, they ascertain
9. that none of this was...necessary. And there were, I
10. would say, fifteen or twenty...representatives of various
11. security guard departments down here when the bill was called
12. and they all seemed to be happy with the bill. The one
13. amendment that was put on here...the bill originally
14. provides this course of study had to be approved or
15. conducted by the Department. Now has to be approved or
16. supervised and it will include the theory of law en-
17. forcement, liability tracts and the handling of weapons
18. as stated in the bill.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Partee.

21. SENATOR PARTEE:

22. Does this mean that the schools where this will be
23. taught will be under the direct supervision of the
24. Department of Education and Registration?

25. SENATOR WALKER:

26. ...Yes. That's my understanding and...John Watson
27. of the Department was here and I would say approved of
28. the bill during the Committee hearings, Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. Now does it affect...does it affect those persons
31. who are now certified as security guards?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Senator Walker.

1. SENATOR WALKER:

2. I don't think there's a grandfather's clause in
3. here. I think the effective date would be apparently
4. on signature or whenever the...I would say it doesn't
5. have a grandfather's clause. It would not affect
6. those presently employed but those employed in the
7. future, Senator Partee.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. All right. Which would mean though that those
10. people who now serve as security guards in order to
11. maintain that status and posture would have to go
12. through the thirty day school. Is that correct?

13. SENATOR WALKER:

14. I don't think so Senator Partee.

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

16. Well, if it doesn't have a grandfather's clause
17. I don't see why not.

18. SENATOR WALKER:

19. I...I can't give you an honest answer to that
20. but I can say this that all the security agencies
21. that were represented here and there must have been
22. twenty or thirty were in support of the bill.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. Well, their...their support may have been based
25. on a lack of understanding or on ignorance, actually.

26. SENATOR WALKER:

27. No, they thoroughly understood the bill because
28. they were all registered in opposition to the bill. I
29. met with these opponents and with John Watson and this
30. one little amendment seemed to take care of their op-
31. position. This approved or supervised by the Department
32. of Registration and Education.

33. SENATOR PARTEE:

Well, now I don't want to belabor it. Let me

1. just be candid with you, Jack. One of the members on
2. my side would like to talk for a moment with the House
3. sponsor. There's a question that we want resolved on
4. that question and if it's resolved affirmatively as I
5. think it will be, you can get all the votes you need.
6. If it isn't, you may have a problem. But would you
7. hold it just a minute? I'll take about ten minutes...

8. SENATOR WALKER:

9. ...I'll be happy to...I'll be happy to, Senator
10. Partee.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Are you willing to hold it, Senator Walker?

13. SENATOR WALKER:

14. I'm willing to hold it.

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

16. I won't redebate it and I won't ask you the
17. questions again.

18. SENATOR WALKER:

19. I...I can't hear you, Senator...

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. I said that when we come back we won't ask you these
22. same questions again, we won't redebate it, we won't take
23. any additional time,....

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. Take it out of the record. The next bill will be
26. HB 902.

27. SECRETARY:

28. 902. (Secretary reads title of bill).
29. 3rd reading of the bill.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Senator Mitchler. SB 902, House Bill, I mean, I'm sorry.

32. SENATOR MITCHLER:

33. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, HB 902

1. provides procedures whereby persons who were entitled
2. to World War II bonuses but failed to make the application
3. in time to be paid that amount which they are entitled to
4. make application directly to the Illinois Veteran's Com-
5. mission before July 1, 1975. Now what this would do it'd
6. eliminate separate bills being put into the Illinois Illinois
7. General Assembly, give the authority and the appropriation
8. to the Illinois Veteran's Commission who has to approve the
9. bill before they are approved of in the General Assembly.
10. So this is streamlining and will relieve a lot of these
11. cases where you get one or two stragglers that are en-
12. titled to it and are entitled to the World War II bonus.
13. So I'd appreciate a favorable roll call.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Any discussion? The question is, shall HB 902 pass?
16. On that question the Secretary will call the roll.

17. SECRETARY:

31. aye. Shapiro, aye. We're going through the second roll call now.
32. Weaver, aye. On this question the yeas are 43. The nays are
33. none. The bill having received the constitutional

1. Majority required is therefore declared passed. Are we
2. ready on 900 now or are we still waiting? Are we ready
3. on 900? The next bill will be 907. Senator Regner.
4. Gentlemen. This is beginning to sound like Mrs. McGillicuddy's
5. picnic.

6. SECRETARY:

7. HB 907. (Secretary reads title of bill)
8. 3rd reading of the bill.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. Senator Regner.

11. SENATOR REGNER:

12. Yes. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I'd like
13. to explain 907 and 908 together they are a companion bills.
14. ...908...just changes the...Governmental Ethics Act...so
15. that when a person files their disclosure statement they
16. assert in the statement that they have filed the disclosure
17. statement with the proper authorities either before or at
18. the time they file...file their nominating papers. 907
19. is where the confusion is taking place in elections...
20. members...candidates for school boards and such where it
21. says the person has to file his...ethics statement at the
22. time of filing his nominating papers. ...In our county...
23. he has to file it with the school board and also with the
24. county clerk which means it says he has to file it
25. at the time of...in two different places. So all 907
26. ...908 does is add...or 907 does is add the word before
27. or at the time of. So what it does is it...it eliminates a
28. confusion that's taken place in some local election...

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Any discussion? Senator Buzbee.

31. SENATOR BUZBEE:

32. Would the sponsor yield to a question?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. He indicates he will.

2. SENATOR BUZBEE:

3. The...I'd like to know the definition of before if a
4. candidate...let's say one of us had filed a statement this
5. year, now we could go back and say well we filed before
6. next year...when it comes time to file next year we can
7. say well we filed before and we could keep on laying on
8. that same statement for several years to come. As I
9. understand this bill it just says before. Before could
10. be anytime.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Senator Regner. Get out Webster.

13. SENATOR REGNER:

14. ...Just...looking at it Senator Buzbee, I would assume
15. that your statement is correct...what we possibly could do
16. is hold these bills on third reading and I'll get an amend-
17. ment to correct that situation.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Take 907 out of the record. How about 908?

20. Senator Regner. Are we in trouble with it too?

21. SENATOR REGNER:

22. ...Hold them both Mr. President.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. HB 912, Senator Bruce are you prepared? ...For what

25. ...for what purpose does Senator Johns arise? Please?

26. SENATOR JOHNS:

27. Senator Bruce my good colleague, permit me to take
28. the privilege...a point of personal privilege to give the
29. following information. At ceremonies today in the Governor's
30. Office, three high school students received twenty-five
31. hundred dollars...Mr. Chair...Mr. Pres...could I have a
32. little order?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. The Senator from Marion is requesting a little order.
2. We have a little order but we do not have order and we're
3. going to have some order and then I'll...acknowledge him to
4. continue...

5. SENATOR JOHNS:

6. Mr. President...

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. Gentlemen, please.

9. SENATOR JOHNS:

10. You're a real gentleman. Three students today received
11. twenty-five hundred dollars...

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Just a moment.

14. SENATOR JOHNS:

15. All right.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. Will we please remove the caucuses from the Floor of
18. the Senate otherwise we're going to start calling the
19. Senators and House members by name who are disturbing the
20. operation of this Chamber. Now you may continue.

21. SENATOR JOHNS:

22. All right, thank you again. Gentlemen, today at
23. ceremonies today in the Governor's office three high
24. school students received twenty-five hundred dollars in
25. scholarships for winning the 1973 Illinois American
26. Revolution Bicentennial Medallion design competition.
27. the medallion is the first of four commemorating the
28. two hundredth anniversary of our nation and the part
29. Illinois has played in American's history. First place
30. winner, Robin Newman, 17, of Waukegan was presented with a
31. fifteen hundred dollar scholarship by Governor Walker. Sena-
32. tor Hudson Sours is the gentleman who sponsored that in the
33. 46th District. Senator Sam Vadalabene of the 56th and

1. Representative David Jones and Sours and Vadalabene served
2. as vice-chairman of this Illinois Bicentennial Commission
3. which conducted the contest. Valerie Bourland Fry, 17, of
4. Marion and Mark a Tue, 17, both of Marion. Would you stand,
5. please, in the audience? Received...

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. I wondered who we were paying tribute to the Senators
8. or the young people. Senator Partee.

9. SENATOR PARTEE:

10. ...Mr. President, while we're on this order of business
11. on a personal privilege I'd like to introduce the Occassio
12. family from Puerto Rico who are in the same gallery and
13. ask them to stand and be recognized by the Senate.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. No filibuster, Senator Johns, you already broke the
16. rules. Continue.

17. SENATOR JOHNS:

18. May I continue, just for a moment?... Valerie designed
19. the Jolliet-George Rogers Clark-Marquette Medallion. Right,
20. Valerie? Okay. And the Liberty Bell at Kaskaskia was
21. designed by Mark Rue and they received \$750 and \$250 res-
22. pectively. We congratulate you young people we're mighty
23. proud of you. Thank you, Mr. President and gentlemen.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. Thank you, Senator Johns, we are all proud of them.

26. SENATOR JOHNS:

27. Mr. President, could I introduce Katherine Barnfield,
28. the ar...

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. You just did.

31. SENATOR JOHNS:

32. All right. Katherine. Thank you gentlemen.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Senator Bruce...I think the Floor has been yielded
2. to you by the Senator from Marion, for the purpose of
3. calling HB 912. The Secretary will read it a third time.

5. HB 912. (Secretary reads title of bill)
6. 3rd reading of the bill.

7. SENATOR BRUCE:

8. ...By the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund. It's
9. supported by the Taxpayers Federation and approved by the
10. Pension Laws Commission. It provides a recomputation of
11. an annuity where a fellow has gone on an annuity been re-
12. turned to employment...

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. There is a large caucus behind you, Senator...and
15. there are other caucuses over the Senate Floor and they
16. are not going to be tolerated by the Chair. We're trying
17. to get the business of this Senate over with before June the
18. 30th. If you'll cooperate please. Continue, Senator.

19. SENATOR BRUCE:

20. What...what the bill covers is that one situation
21. where a fellow has gone on to an annuity, returns to
22. work, works more than forty-eight months and then again
23. retires a second time. It takes care of that one unique
24. situation so that there is a proper recomputation of his
25. last four serviceable years. There's no...problem, he pays
26. all the contributions due the State of Illinois as if he
27. were a regular employee. If he works four years or more
28. after he's come out of retirement and re-employed it takes
29. care of that one situation so we know how to compute
30. his annuity. Like I say, that's the Pension Laws Commission,
31. the Taxpayers Federation, Municipal Retirement System, they're
32. all in favor to solve a very small problem. But it is a
33. problem that exists.

1. Any further discussion? The question is, shall
2. HB 912 pass? The Secretary will call the roll.

11. Yes. And the proposal would provide that employees
12. paid on a per diem basis which means an average of fewer
13. than fifteen days a month, the average final monthly com-
14. putation is to be computed by dividing earnings for the entire
15. period in which the last four years of service credit received by
16. forty-eight. ...It's a...it's a manner that...has caused
17. trouble in computing pension rights for per diem employees
18. ...it has the approval of Pension Laws Commission passed
19. out of the Senate Pensions Committee. I know of no opposi-
20. tion. It clarifies the problem that's developed in our...
21. full-time per diem...or less than full-time employees.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Any further discussion? The question is, shall HB 920
24. pass? And before we start the roll call some Senator came
25. up and signed up for HB 1813. The only problem we have is

2. Mr. President, members of the Senate, this has to do
3. with...the problem we have with those people who have
4. pickup trucks and...

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. Just a moment...

7. SENATOR LATHEROW:

8. And put a camper on that pickup truck and many of them
9. have been running it as a recreational vehicle. Now in a
10. lot of cases they also use that as a vehicle to haul their
11. tools or in their business and we feel like when that camper
12. is removed or when that pickup truck is used for another
13. purpose it should carry the fees and plates...

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Senators. Senators. Just a minute, Senator Latherow.
16. I don't know what the Chair has to do to obtain some semblance
17. of order in this Chamber. This is absolutely impossible.

18. SENATOR LATHEROW:

19. Mr. President...

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Please.

23. This...this is really a good bill. They don't really
24. have to listen but then...

26. Well, if it were a bad one it would be a good time to
27. pass it.

29. And...this says that if they are using this as a
