Illinois in 1970 addressed itself to this issue, in which 10. the people of the State voted as to the maintaining of a 11. death penalty and there was in slighly in excess of 2/3s 12. of the people that voted in support of that measure across 13. the State. I might also say that I saw a survey conducted 14. in my county, Will County in which the people of Will 15. County addressed themselves to the need for a death 16. penalty by 88%. Now that may have some bearing in relation 17. to the I-57 murders, in relation to a correctional institution 18. quard, as a matter of fact at Stateville that was catapulted 19. over to a railing to his death. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 7. Senator Bell. SENATOR BELL: 8. 9. No, I don't... I don't see that in the bill but... 10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 11. Senator Wooten. 12. SENATOR BELL: Excuse me...excuse me. Mr. President. 13. 14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 15. Senator Bell. 16. SENATOR BELL: 17. Senator Wooten, I'm sorry. Senator Wooten has alluded to it just now. I think the l. 2. wisdom of this Legislature should prevail that to those who wish a death penalty we should attempt to do something 3. that we do not know in advance to be unconstitutional. 4. Florida as a State had passed legislation a few years ago 5. that is now being appealed in the Federal courts that 6. 7. provides a mandatory death penalty for the killing of 8. a prison guard, very similar to the type of legislation we are considering now. That is already through the court 9. 10. system, someone was convicted under that law prior to 11. the Furman decision and that is now being appealed through 12. the Federal courts. If you read the entire Furman decision to which this bill and the others like it were aimed, they 13. were aimed at the four members...at the three members of 14. 15. the court who held in that particular case in Furman that it was unconsitutional because it was not a mandatory 16. 17. sentence. But if you read Chief Justice Burger's opinion: 18. and the three members of the court who concurred with him 19. each one of them held that if you take away the deliberative 20. power of the jury, if you do not allow a jury in the 21. interest of justice to determine whether or not a death 22. sentence should be imposed, you take away the inherent 23. rights of our judicial system whereby the jury can reflect 24. the common conscience of the people at any period of time, and Chief Justice Burger joined by the others held that 25. 26. were we to go to the exact system that this bill puts in, it would be held in their opinion unconstitutional. 27. I don't think we want to dangle a carrot in front of those 28. 29. people in the State who want a death penalty by passing 30. something that is clearly going to be stricken by the 31. court. I think wisdom should say, we should await the 32. opinion in the Florida case and then those who wish a capital punishment bill can take the guidelines of that 33.

and draft one therefrom within a year. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Glass.

SENATOR GLASS:

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Thank you Mr. President. I spoke previously when this bill came up and was taken out of the record so I'm not going to repeat the arguments that I have against the bill generally, that capital punishment is not a deterrent and in the constitutional arguments that have already been made. But I would like to call the attention of the Membership to a fact that I don't think you have taken into account. I think that most people believe that the ... majority of the public want the death penalty, in fact there was a 59% majority of the public favoring capital punishment in a Harris poll recently. But on June 14, another Harris poll was published and it seems that although people say they want capital punishment, when the question is put to them, if you were on the jury in all cases could you find a person quilty even though his guilty were proven to you knowing that the death penalty would follow. And in that case only 39% say yes. I think what you would be doing by passing a bill like this even if it were upheld would be putting people on the jury who would be finding defendants not guilty simply to avoid the death penalty. That is what the polls indicate and as I said earlier I think that's the kind of results you would be getting to with the plea bargaining ... that would go on and with the prosecutors having to face a...case in which they either would try the defendant for the capital crime or reduce the sentence and get a lesser offense simply because the death penalty would not be obtainable. I think it's an impossible situation and again for this reason would urge a no vote on the grounds

- 1. that the polls say that the public favor the death penalty
- are indeed misleading.

- Senator Sours.

## SENATOR SOURS:

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Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, some years ago in the...in the Chamber we had a bill in fact two or three different Sessions to have a moratorium on the death penalty and about that time there were two black men in Chicago, one of whom was executed and the other, his sentence was commuted by Governor Kerner. There seems to be a new school of thought around this Chamber that all we have to do is pass the law and that's good, that's all we have to do. Dinner's over, nothing further remains. Well, those of you who may have heard the radio today will remember that the latest aberrations of parochaid coming out of New York and Pennsylvania have been stricken down by the United States Supreme Court. We passed those bills twice because certain people insisted, they finagle around and they got a majority in each case. I can agree pretty much with Senator Carroll who says we ought to let wisdom be the substitute here for the... insistence of certain groups that there be a death penalty. I am not opposed to the death penalty. I know this, that Lloyd Miller down in Senator Knuppel's district lingered on death row for thirteen years. Now we've got public defenders now and we have legal aides and don't you ever kid yourselves gentlemen that when one is found guilty and there's a possibility of the death penalty, he's going to do everything possible in the court system to be around and not be executed. Lloyd Miller was thirteen years waiting to be executed, he's out on the street now. This bill, Senator Bell I'm confident just as I was in

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PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Mitchler.

# SENATOR MITCHLER:

Mr. President, Members of the Senate, the subject of whether or not to have a death penalty and whether it's a deterrent to crime or whether it's a just penalty for a certain crimes committed has been of interest to me for many, many years. Even before I came to the Illinois State Senate. And in my correspondence, I don't have the file here in front of me, it's a rather lengthly correspondence with different individuals I did correspond with the then Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, J. Edgar Hoover on this subject. And I think that his analysis and his position with respect to capital punishment was one of the finest that I was able to get in my file and make up my mind on this subject. And Director Hoover did point out that he felt in his many, many, many, years of law enforcement work that a capital punishment, the death penalty when administered properly was a deterrent to crime. Now the problem that we have today is that the courts have not used properly in my opinion capital punishment and given just cause where just cause is due. It just irks me and it irks the people that I represent to know that you've got a guy like Speck sitting there drawing pictures and enjoying life, probably eating three better squares than he ever

ate in life after doing the heinous crime that the committed in the City of Chicago to those poor innocent nurses. And you can go on and cite case after case after case and you have to have an eye for an eye. Now on that basis in my file has convinced me long time ago that capital punishment has it's place in society when justly administered. And I think that this bill is a good bill and I'm going to vote in favor of it Senator Bell.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator McCarthy.

#### SENATOR McCARTHY:

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Yes Mr. President, Members of the Senate I'd like to make one observation about the bill, ...by way of statementas a preface I...I...many years ago in 1957 sponsored a bill to abolish capital punishment when I was a member of the House and that bill passed and had ... a bill in here where I was the chief sponsor in, I think, 1961 to abolish capital punishment and we received 27 votes out of 30 necessary to abolish it. But that's not the point that I make on this speech here, except to say that in the debate and I think Senator Smith may remember this in the debate in 1961 and 1963 Senator Nathan Kinnally occupied a seat next to me and he had been a former assistant State's Attorney. And he came to the conclusion that the death penalty should be abolished, and he came to that conclusion as a prosecutor. And I think the prosecutors ought to remember those that are...were here at that time, Senator Kinnally reasoning why he as a prosecutor didn't believe that the death penalty was any good. And it went about like this, at that time the Supreme Court was deciding criminal law that affected each and every criminal prosecution but the decisions, the hard decisions were made on death cases. It would work like this, that there'd be a person who was

under the penalty of death, the appeals would go up through the State Supreme Court, up to the United States Supreme Court and the United States Supreme Court would sometime hold Sunday sessions, pretty hard to get them to hold a Sunday session, but they'd reach and search the record trying to find something that was done wrong in that criminal case because those nine men did not want to play God. They didn't want to have to say yes that man should be put to death and will be put to death, therefore the United States Supreme Court would come out with bad criminal law on capital cases that would apply to all criminal cases. You end up with them around a decision, all of these various United States Supreme Court decisions which have been counterproductive to our theory of law and order. And therefore Senator Kinnally being an ex-prosecutor voted to abolish it. And I think that's something that was very persuasive to me and I think some of you are of the opinion that law and order is served by capital punishment ought to give it a second thought. I would encourage you to think about that and vote no.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Netsch.

## SENATOR NETSCH:

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Mr...Mr. President for just this once I would like to put legal arguments aside, others have made them and make a plea. There is no way to kill another person deliberately in the name of humanity. And anyone who had to sit with a Governor the night of an execution as I have would come to realize that. I hope that we do not restore the death penalty in any form.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Smith.

## SENATOR SMITH:

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Mr...President, Members of the Senate, I guess I rise here now for the purpose of adding a little color to this particular argument. I note that no one of the other members of my ethnic group has as yet a word to say with regards to this subject. And I did not perhaps originally intend to say anything myself. As always I was impressed by what Senator Sours said with reference to exercising a bit of wisdom with regards to this particular question. Then too I recall the particular occasion when Senator McCarthy had a bill along this line but just the opposite to abolish the death penalty while you were a member of the Illinois 14. House of Representatives. I handled that bill here in the Senate. We came near passing that bill and as you said I think it was 27 votes we succeeded in getting in favor of abolishing the death penalty. Now, this debate here this morning confirms my belief that an argument contributed but little insofar as Senators arising at just conclusions with regards to a matter like this. And it's almost childish for me to exert any energy in debating this question. The good Senator said from Peoria, said that we should exercise wisdom and how often have I thought that as I sat here and heard members grow eloquent in speaking with reference to purported crimes committed. Personally I don't think that we are competent to determine what is crime. which we call weakness in a...rather a crimes on the part of an individual could be so far as we honestly know merely weaknesses inherent in the scheme of things. Mr. President and Man may read, he may study, you may 31. pass, he may be observant and he can and he will find something about the tides perhaps and currents of the

sea and the wayward winds, but as I stand here now, I don't think that there is an individual in this Body who can determine for an example where these clouds are formed in the...in the realm of the mind and that just came on just as I got up as always. And I assure you I know what the rules are and I will be governed by the rules. What I... I don't believe that we can tell where the mists and clouds are formed that darkens all the heavens of the individual mind now from whence comes the impulse that seizes an individual and holds him or her until the so-called frightful crime is done. Whatever my philosophy is with reference to the death penalty and I state it here and now I could never vote for a death sentence. I could never vote for a bill such as this because the purport and intent of it is to reestablish the death penalty here in the State of

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

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Senator Smith, I think this is the last week of the Session and we're going to have to all abide by these lights up here if we expect to accomplish... SENATOR SMITH:

...well you start the light when an individual begins his speech, and of course your...your vision is here and the light's to your rear and I don't know whether you get the flash. I wouldn't debate it, perhaps you know that...the precise moment when it came on. If I've spoken four minutes,...five minutes, I will gladly take my seat. If I haven't I demand for myself the same right and recognition as all others... PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Smith, the light goes on each individual when he begins speaking.

## SENATOR SMITH:

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...take my seat.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Thank you sir. Senator Berning.

SENATOR BERNING:

Thank you Mr. President and Members of the Body, I rise in support of this measure. It appears to me that it's time we start thinking in terms of the citizenry back home. And even as the result of the one bill I had requiring mandatory incarceration, I received a good deal of correspondence. And I submit to each and every member of this Body if you or I were ever called to the morgue to identify a murdered member of our family you would be as much concerned about justice being imposed on the individual responsible as are those who have been called to make such identifications up to this point. I along with most of our citizens still have hopes that...the judiciary could and would be willing as well as objective enough to pronounce sentence imposed by such legislation. Certainly the judiciary cannot and will not act in an arbitrary and capricious manner in all cases particularly if we lay down a specific guideline, such as a mandatory death penalty. I was most interested to read in a recent issue of the newspaper an interview with his Highness the Emperor of Ethiopia Haile Selassie. His philosophy was very explicit, very definite. Society depends on order. He has no compunction whatsoever about extinguishing a useless life, and in my opinion while I don't subscribe to the type of dictatorship or form of government that he represents he does have a great deal more internal peace than perhaps we do. In my humble opinion we must take action with this kind of legislation in order to be

able to assure our people of eventually enjoying the peace and

- security of their person they are entitled to. I urge
- your vote for SB 20.
- 3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
- Senator Walker.
  - SENATOR WALKER:

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Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate. 6. 7. This Furman decision was rendered the latter part of June, 1972. This is out of the spring issue of State 8. Government, I think it might be worth dwelling a few 9. 10. seconds on here. Shortly after the Furman decision a young family was brutally murdered in an armed robbery 11. of a small 24-hour grocery store in Oklahoma City. There 12. 13. was evidence tending to show that the killings were for 14. the purpose of insuring that there be no eye witnesses to the robbery. And a bank robbery where nine hostages 15. been taken in an effort to escape officers an assailant 16. communicated with his family, and he used the Furman 17. 18. decision by stating I will shoot everyone in the bank. 19. The Supreme Court will let me get away with this. 20. is no death penalty, it is ridiculous, I can shoot everyone here, then throw my gun down and walk out. And they 21. 22. can't put me in the electric chair. You have to have a death penalty otherwise this can happen every day. I 23. realize that this bill applies only to certain cases. 24. 25. I'm happy to hear that my good friend Hudson Sours is 26. not opposed to it. He only feels that this bill may not...may not be constitutional, but on the other hand 27. 28. I'm willing to take a flier on it. It won't be the first wrong decision that the Supreme Court has made, 29. if they decide it's unconstitutional but let's let them 30. decide this. There's a difference between his reasoning 31. here and that of some social theorists... I don't know 32. what sitting up with the Governor all night would have. 33.

That's one of the risks of the trade, like there's a risk in being a legislator. You say there's no justification to take the life of any one, how about the lives of the innocent that are taken by...by these killers. While this abolishment of the death penalty is given in my estimation life-termers a license to kill after all, what does he have to lose? It's never been totally effective, but I do think it's partial deterrent. I think it's something that we should have and as Senators before me have stated our constituents want. And I would urge support of HB 20. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Merritt.

#### SENATOR MERRITT:

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Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, just very briefly. I do not for one minute feel that I can debate along with the fine lawyers in the Senate, the legal aspects of this bill. I do however..believe that there are enough provisions in this particular bill that should the act be held unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court that there are provisions for ... indeterminate terms of not less than fourteen years. Be that as it may, what I'm...concerned about and what I intend to address my remarks about, this is an ordinary layman reflecting what I feel are the wishes of a high 90% of the people of my district back home. I think they spoke to the tune of at least three to one in the Constitutional Convention saying the death penalty should be retained. And if one of us for one moment needs to search our consciences, try to put ourselves in the position of one of these officers, policemen, firemen, otherwise who have been murdered then I hope that you can go to the wake and face that widow and say yes, I was a Member of the General Assembly that

said we do not need the death penalty any longer. And let's give them a short sentence and let them out and let them do it again. Let's for one minute place ourselves in the position of a mother and father of one of those nurses. Just think about it, killed by Speck. Reflect upon it carefully and say to yourselves, yes, let's put him away for...a few years and give him a chance to do it again, in all good conscience I have to support strongly the provisions of HB 20. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Graham.

## SENATOR GRAHAM:

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Thank you Mr. President, I thought I was in the penalty box. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, I can speak with some experience with regard to what the death penalty effect has on some people. I hear...heard Senator Netsch talking about sitting with Governor Kerner the night... I think that was Young that was commuted. was sitting the same night waiting to be called as a witness. I also had an unfortunate experience of being in Menard Penitentary before the blood was mopped up after the murder of those guards in 1966, '65. That wasn't a very pretty sight. And I sat and talked to those widows and those children that night, then the death penalty was still in effect. About the only comfort they had was their faith in God and the faith in perhaps that the judicial wing of our government would have the sense and the guts to send these men to the electric chair. Senator Kenneth Course and I were at Sheridan last year when the so-called children, the young punks of our society had killed one man and almost kicked to death another. I talked to Speck not very long ago and he's sitting there grinning as a result of the Supreme Court decision. That miserable

piece of human flesh who should have died a long time 1. ago is sitting there getting fat and basking in the 2. 3. sunshine of his heinous crime. Gentlemen, I don't know if this will have any influence upon our courts or not, Δ. sometimes I think it will. But I'll tell you the wives 5. 6. of the employees of the penitentaries and the residents 7. of the towns such as Joliet, Pontiac, Chester, Sheridan 8. and you name it will be happy if we have the courage 9. to indicate to the Supreme Court no matter how soft-10. headed they get on some of their decisions that there 11. is a feeling in the Illinois General Assembly that those 12. who commit those heinous crimes and espeically those in our correctional institutions that can get no more than 13. 14. life after they've been sentenced to life without the 15. death penalty will be comforted by the fact that we had 16. the courage to tell our people and our weak-kneed judicial 17. system that there are some people who believe that there's 18. some persons that commit these crimes on the face of this 19. earth who should go to their great beyond wherever it may 20. be.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Bell may close debate.

SENATOR BELL:

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Well...

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Excuse me Senator Soper I didn't know you wanted recognition.

SENATOR SOPER:

Mr. President, Members of the Senate...by the time

President found time to call on me everything on this

subject's been said. But can you imagine the police to

try to apprehend a criminal in a situation where he's

committed every crime in the book except murder, now they've

I believe that many of the objections have been taken away from or by 21. 22. the Election Laws Commission although I believe they are still in opposition to the bill. I'd be happy to answer 23. any questions that anyone may have. 24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 25. Senator Shapiro. 26. SENATOR SHAPIRO: 27. Well Mr. President, Members of the Senate I don't 28. have any questions to ask the sponsor. I think that the 29. basic objections to the bill in its present form are 30. probably the following. The bill even though some objections 31. were removed as far as administration is concerned, it's 32.

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practically void of any specific language as to contributions,

what type of contributions shall be made, what percentage, l. what the benefit shall be, how it's going to be funded, 2. and what the actuarial requirements are. The bill authorizes 3. the Comptroller to manage the funds and to set up the 4. rules and regulations for its operation. Now I think it's 5. probably questionable whether the Comptorller's office 6. is geared to administer pension funds, and in the interest 7. of uniformity with other pension funds it would seem to be 8. better if the system were established along the lines of 9. other pension funds. I think most of you know tht volunteer 10. firemen are not paid salaries, they are paid so much per 11. fire, something along that line at the end of the year. 12. Most of them have a benefit and the monies collected are 13. used to replace clothing that has been destroyed or damaged 14. or to buy certain things. By definition volunteer fire-15. men do not earn their living as being firemen, so I think . 16. in my mind it's questionable as to whether you can establish 17. a pension fund for them or not. I think a much better 18. resolution to this problem would be allow these fire 19. protection districts to purchase insurance if they cannot 20. do so now. The funding of it naturally would have to come 21. from taxes. The volunteer firemen do not receive salaries 22. to pay into their own and what they would pay in would 23. come from other salaries that they earn and the ... probably 24. the bulk of the funds would come from real estate taxes. 25. I think in its present form the bill is objectionable and it 26. should be defeated. 27.

PRESIDING FOFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Any other questions? If there are...any further debate? Senator Don Moore will close the debate.

SENATOR DON MOORE:

## SENATOR DON MOORE:

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Well, I reluctantly rise to oppose this bill Mr. President. A former Representative with sixteen years service from my present district was the author of this right to know bill or this open meetings law as it is known. His name was Representative Scariano. And... in all sincerity he is still a constituent of mine in my district. ### SENATOR WOOTEN:

I had a somewhat less ironic question and in opposition to this bill earlier and considered in the context of the whole package it does not do violence to the open meeting

act, that was my initial concern. And it is as Senator
Carroll has expressed it entirely within the rational
structure of that act. Does no violence to it, it serves
the ends of justice and I'm very happy now that we're
considering the second around to support it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

He's glad to have an attorney of your stature supporting him. Any other question? Senator Fawell.

SENATOR FAWELL:

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Well, I still feel the same. It seems to me that in the juwenile court act we have our files completely open, the hearings open. I don't see why we should give a... an exception to even those particular ...

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Just a moment Senator. Gentlemen, let's wait a moment. Gentlemen, we're trying to get your attention as quietly and calmly as possible. Will the Senate please be in order? Senator Fawell, you'll just have to talk a little louder.

SENATOR FAWELL:

21. Well, I... I just about said what I wanted to say. 22. that courts of law are open and they have all and every type of a heinous case that one can possibly think of. 23. I don't see why insofar as the court of claims is concerned 24. there should be any exception made. And I think that here 25. the public at all times perhaps ought to have sigust as much 26. of a right to know what is being done and why the peoples money 27. is being spent in a certain way. Perhaps even more so than 28. in some cases where one might think especially involving 29. children and the abuse of children in our courts of law, 30. yet we have made it very clear I believe that our courts 31. of law are completely open to the press at all times. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

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of this bill. I can think of a situation where...could be a very gory set of facts. It might be a case involving sexual molestation of the worst kind to a woman, and you would say to yourself maybe she shouldn't have to testify about that in an open meeting. But the fact of the matter is to have obtained a conviction she would have had to testify about it in a courtroom to whoever was sitting in the courtroom or a jury or whoever was present. So that we start making exceptions of this kind because of the tenderness of our hearts and souls, we're going to make the law a very meaningless kind of law. I can understand what motivates the kind of thinking that causes a bill like this to be drawn, but it is absolutely inconsistent with the other part of what has to be to obtain a conviction. So I think the bill is unnecessary and should be defeated. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Well, I will join Senator Fawell in his appraisal

### SENATOR McBROOM:

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Well, Mr. President and Members of the Senate I've discussed this with Senator Soper on several occasions, and I know I've discussed it with Senator Moore. think there was ever...an agreement as to exactly what was the perfect way to do this and I... I would... submit to you Senator Soper that there probably isn't a perfect way to resolve this, and I think part of the dialogue is ...is...and the questions are based upon what is best in each individual's district. I think it's a case whether we want to...want to do something to fill vancancies or whether we don't want to do something , and I... I don't

really feel that there is a perfect way to do it. I 1. don't see anything wrong with Senator Moore's amendment. 2. 3.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

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Well, I...Senator McBroom touched closely on the point that I want to make and that is the bill provides that in the event of a vacancy it shall be filled by the legislative committee from the party from which the decedent was a representative and elected at the general election. I think that's the more critical consideration, and just as Senator McBroom has pointed out you can think of examples where it'd be better to use the primary vote, and certainly you can think of examples where it's better to use the general election vote. Under existing law if they continue that type of an operation they continue to force their own constituents to pay higher taxes and they get less State aid. districts and...can give more quality education in
 terms of the greater diversity of teacher talent and
 of curriculum. So that in that sense yes, in the
 artifical motivation for the creation of new unit
 districts it...it would eliminate that. And I think
 that would be a very good step. However in any community
 that would still want a unit district of course they...

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

they could still do so.

Senator Merritt.

#### SENATOR MERRITT:

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The point I'm making though is that much of the bitterness and hard feelings today come from the fact that they gave up individual school boards that they had to go with the unit district. They lost their local autonomy completely and now having done it maybe in the past year or so they're really full of resentment about it. They feel like they were forced into something that if they'd just held their...their...and bided their time they would have gotten the same amount of money. And that's...that's what pretty sorrowful.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Fawell.

# SENATOR FAWELL:

Well, that's...that is entirely correct and this is why we have said in past years that this legislation is long overdue because a lot of communities have had to give up their community oriented grade school districts. I think a lot of communities are...are willing to accept the larger regionalized high schools but they do like their community oriented grade schools. And they've had to give those up as Senator Merritt points out and this is unfortunate. We hope it won't have to...occur.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Is there further discussion? Senator Sours.

SENATOR SOURS:

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My feelings Mr. President, Senators about this
 bill haven't changed since we last discussed this last
 week. I have to oppose it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Latherow.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

I'd just like to recognize a little of what Senator Merritt was saying, for years we've driven our schools into the unit districts in my area. And within the last two years have driven about the last ones into a unit district and the biggest thing they had to say was look, why do we stay in the...in high school district and our grade school district when all we have to do is become a unit district and draw more money. I...I think if we intended to do that years ago, we ought to retain that intention.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Hynes.

SENATOR HYNES:

Well, Mr. President to reiterate the discussion on this bill the other day. I remain in opposition to it for the reasons that I enumerated. And primarily those reasons boil down to this. This bill calls for an appropriation of almost \$60,000,000 for dual districts alone. It leaves... out the unit districts in this State completely at a time when there is a shortage of educational funds, at a time when we are attempting to work out a formula that will be equitable to everyone. The present school aid formula is filled with inequities, inequities that effect dual districts and this bill is

ı. addressed to that point. Inequities that effect urban 2. areas, inequities that effect districts with very low 3. assessed evaluation per pupil. In other words the formula 4. is simply not adequate in its present condition and all 5. of us I think would like to see it changed. In fact the 6. sponsor of this bill is the sponsor of another bill on 7. the Calendar which he will be calling very shortly for 8. a vote. HB 1484 which would do everything that this bill does 9. and more for dual districts. It would also, in part at 10. least I think handle some of the other problems I mentioned. 11. I think that bill gives one consideration that we should 12. have in mind here. Secondly a proposal which I introduced 13. and which was defeated in the Senate Education Committee 14. called for the elimination of the discrimination against 15. dual districts over a five year period. In other words 16. put in a five year plan to totally eliminate the discrimination 17. that exists between the units and the dual districts. 18. proposal I thought was most reasonable and enabled us to do 19. something about the problems in other areas, in areas 20. other than dual districts. We will have another opportunity 21. here to vote on that proposal as we are going to offer 22. an amendment to another bill which will set forth that 23. proposal and which will give each member a chance once 24. and for all to vote to eliminate discrimination and 25. disparity against dual districts and to phase it out over 26. a period of five years. And at the same time in a fiscally 27. responsible measure to do something about the problems 28. that exist in all of the other districts of this State. 29. I think this bill is undesirable in principle as it stands 30. here now and I think it is particularly untimely in terms 31. of the other proposals that will be coming before this 32. Body within the next two or three days. I would urge that this bill be opposed. 33.

### PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Soper.

### SENATOR SOPER:

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Mr. President, Members of the Senate, we speak about bills that are timely or untimely. I...I'd agree with Senator Hynes when he says that bills are untimely when they effect him. And they effect other districts. Now the dual districts don't want to take any money away from the unit districts, they just want to be put on an equal basis. And it's about time that the dual districts were treated in the same way that the unit districts are treated. We're not asking for any money from the unit districts. And I think it's timely that we were more than second class citizens in this effect. The people from the dual districts pay their taxes as well as the people from the unit districts and this is the time, it's not later, and it's too late unless you do it now and let's get it done.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Any further discussion? Senator Fawell may close the debate.

### SENATOR FAWELL:

Yes, I... I just want to again say that the \$60,000,000 23. allegation is simply not realistic or accurate especially 24. in light of the fact that the formula bill, 1484 which 25. will probably be called very late this week, certainly 26. not today, is a bill that will allow your dual districts 27. to opt to go under that particular bill and probably many 28. of them will. So I would say that really we're talking in 29. the area of maybe 10 or 15,000,000, not the 60,000,000 30. that has been brought out. SENATOR HARRIS:

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Well Mr...it's my understanding that this bill really never got into the Licensed Activities Committee. I know it lie here at least week, ten day, two weeks without even having a Senate sponsor. And it was my understanding that when we concluded our...our committee hearings that it bypassed committee going onto 2nd reading, that was my understanding. Now, this bill is in direct conflict with the bill just passed, and it has some provisions which have already been ruled by a lower court in Chicago as being unconstitutional. These are anti-solicitation provisions which prevent a real estate broker or salesman from talking to certain. people or even presenting them with his business card in the discussion of properties for sale. I think there's other legal remedies for panic peddling and certainly the bill we just passed provides these very adequately and I certainly would oppose this bill vigorously.
