2. The Senate will come to order. Prayer will
3. be offered by Dr. Adam Baum of Central Baptist Church
4. of Springfield. Dr. Baum.

5. (Prayer given by Dr. Baum).

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Thank you, Dr. Baum...Reading of the Journal.
8. Senator Soper.

9. SENATOR SOPER:

10. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I move that
11. we postpone the reading of the Journal and the approval
12. of the Journals of June 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 25th, 26th,
13. 27th, 28th and 29th pending the arrival of the printed
14. Journals.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. You've heard the motion, all in favor signify by
17. saying aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. ...
18. Message from the House.

19. SECRETARY:

20. A Message from the House by Mr. Selcke, Clerk:

21. (Secretary reads Message from the House).

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Resolution by Senator Newhouse. We have a motion
24. by... Senator Nimrod. Let's direct your attention up
25. here. Senator Nimrod, did you have a motion? Sen...
26. Senator Knuepfer, for what purpose do you arise?

27. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

28. ...To make a motion that SB 94 on the Secretary's
29. desk be recommitted to the Executive Committee.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. You've heard the request from the Senator...by
32. the Senator from Elmhurst. All in favor signify by
33. saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it and the bill.

1. be recommitted to the Committee on Executive. ...Get few
2. more tri smore trips here...let's get a few... We will now...
3. go to the order of business on the Secretary's desk as
4. may need concurrences or nonconcurrences. Gentlemen.
5. SB 3. Senator Mitchler. Senator Rock, do you have
6. SB 35 on the Secretary's desk?

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. Yes, thank you Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen
9. of the Senate, the four bills relating to the subject of
10. child abuse have come back from the House each containing
11. a House Amendment, SB 36 containing two amendments. These
12. are Committee amendments which were put on in the House
13. Judiciary Committee. I was present at the Committee hearing.
14. I agreed to the amendments at that time and I would ask that
15. this Senate concur with the House Amendment to each of these
16. bills. We can take them one at a time and I will briefly ex-
17. plain each amendment and then I'm going to move that we con-
18. cur with these amendments.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Our staff has made a request that we deal only with
21. 35 right at this time, Senator.

22. SENATOR ROCK:

23. Well, which one...which one are we on first?

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. 35.

26. SENATOR ROCK:

27. How about...can we start right at 32, 33, 35, and 36?

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. 35's the only one the staff's ready. Just a moment,
30. just a moment. 32 and 33 and 35. So we'll start with 32.
31. Yeah. All right. What's the dif... If we could have a
32. little order. We'll...35 is up on the desk and then we'll...
33. 35 is ready to be acted upon and then we'll go back to
32 and 33, Senator Rock. Do you have a motion to make on...

1. Could we have some order, please? SB 35 on the
2. Secretary's desk. Senator Rock.

3. SENATOR ROCK:

4. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of
5. the Senate, SB 35 as it passed the Senate called for
6. an on sight investigation of each report of child
7. abuse by the...Department of Children and Family
8. Services. The Department in the House Judiciary
9. Committee added an amendment and I will read the amend-
10. ment. It's a one line amendment. "The Department
11. may delegate to other public agencies or to private
12. social service agencies the performance of the on
13. sight investigation." I think it's...the amendment
14. is a good one. It was at the request of the Depart-
15. ment...in many instances, for instance, the Juvenile
16. Division of the Chicago Police Department does in
17. fact handle this on sight investigation. I...think to
18. require or to proscribe the delegation of this duty
19. will put, at this point in time at least, kind of an
20. overburden on the departments simply because they do
21. not have the requisite staffing. So I think the amend-
22. ment is a good one, I would ask the Senate concur in
23. House Amendment No. 1 to SB 35.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. Senator Rock moves that the Senate do concur in
26. House Amendment No. 1 to SB 35. Any discussion? The
27. Secretary will call the roll.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
30. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
31. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Course, aye. On this question the yeas were 45.
8. The nays were none. The bill having received the con-
9. stitutional majority is declared passed. SB 32, on
10. the Secretary's desk. Senate concurs in the House
11. amendment. SB 32, Senator Rock.

12. SENATOR ROCK:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen
14. of the Senate, SB 32 as it left the Senate provided
15. that foster parents should receive notice of any hear-
16. ing or proceedings under the Juvenile Court Act. There
17. was, again, an amendment offered in the House Judiciary
18. Committee...which restricted a little bit the service in the
19. the notice insofar as it said, any current foster parent
20. of a minor and the agency designated by the court or
21. Department of Children and Family Services as custodian.
22. ...The only cutback then would be that the word current
23. is added. So that if, in fact, a child had been in more
24. than one foster home the only foster parent that was
25. required to receive notice is the current foster parent.
26. Again, I think the amendment is a good one. I agreed to
27. it ...in the House Judiciary Committee. And I would urge
28. that the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1 to SB 32.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. On the motion of Senator Rock is there any dis-
31. cussion? If not the Secretary will call the roll on
32. the question, shall the Senate concur in the House
33. amendment to SB No. 32. Call the roll.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Bartulis, aye. Bell, aye. On that question the
13. yeas are 53. The nays are none. The Senate does con-
14. cur in the House Amendment to SB No. 32. SB 33, on
15. the Secretary's desk. Senator Rock.

16. SENATOR ROCK:

17. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen
18. of the Senate. SB 33 is another amendment to the
19. Juvenile Court Act and what it said as introduced
20. was if, in fact, the child...or the parents had been
21. adjudicated neglectful based upon physical abuse or
22. if there was a finding of physical abuse before the
23. child could be restored to the natural parent there
24. had to be prior court approval. In the Senate Jud-
25. icial Committee, Senator Fawell offered an amend-
26. ment which I accepted which said that in all cases
27. of neglect or dependency before there was a return
28. to the natural parent there had to be prior court
29. approval. That is the way the bill left the Senate.
30. When we were in the House Judiciary Committee there
31. was some opposition based upon the sheer volume of
32. cases in some of the larger counties of our State and it was
33. felt to require prior court approval in each and every

1. case would be simply unworkable so the House Amendment
2. in fact cuts back to the point where the Senate...same
3. point which the Senate Bill was originally introduced.
4. That is to say that in cases where there has been an adjud-
5. ication of neglect and there is a finding of prior
6. physical abuse in those cases there will have to be before
7. restoration to the natural parent of that child, there
8. will have to be prior court approval. Now I personally
9. agree with Senator Fawell and I accepted his amendment
10. that there should in fact be some prior court approval
11. in each and every case. The fact of the matter is it
12. is not required in every case...especially in cases of
13. dependency and that frankly the bill could not have
14. gotten out of House Judiciary too unless I agreed to
15. this amendment. I agreed to the amendment, I concur
16. with it...I think in this instance at least a half a
17. loaf is better than none. We are making a significant
18. step forward. We are saying to the Department of Children
19. and Family Services you will not return a child to its
20. natural parents where there has been prior evidence of
21. physical abuse until and unless you get prior court
22. approval. I think it's a significant step forward and
23. I would urge the Senate to concur in House Amendment No. 1
24. to SB 33.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. Senator Fawell.

27. SENATOR FAWELL:

28. I...I would rise in opposition to the concurrent
29. and the reasons I think to a degree are what have been
30. expressed by Senator Rock. Johnny Lindquist was a case
31. of a dependent child not a child where there was a finding
32. of neglect. In fact in many instances where there is
33. a finding of neglect through the process of negotiation

1. and compromise it ends up as a dependent child. This
2. bill, as I understand it, as it has been amended, you
3. would have a obligation on the court to make a determination
4. of whether there is physical abuse only in regard to a
5. problem in a neglect case. I think that the better solution
6. is to simply say that if a child is in such a condition
7. that the court has taken him from his natural parents and
8. put him elsewhere that the court ought to take just enough
9. time before returning the child to the home from which that
10. child had been taken on the basis that we must assume the
11. home was not suitable for the child. There ought to be a
12. judicial determination that that home is now suitable. And
13. Senator Rock, perhaps this may be the only conclusion
14. but I...I think that it would be worth the try at least in
15. and one conference committee at least to run this through
16. and if...if at least we can extend this...this finding of
17. physical abuse over to the dependency cases too because
18. practically speaking many a neglect case is called a
19. dependency case. And as I have indicated Johnny Lindquist
20. was a case of dependency and...so that perhaps we could
21. give this at least one try in a conference committee and
22. see what we might come up with.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Any further discussion? Senator Rock.

25. SENATOR ROCK:

26. Yes. I...I think Senator Fawell is probably correct.
27. I think we should at least make the attempt. I did agree
28. with his amendment and I think that before we concur...it
29. might well be worth a try. So I would move, Mr. President,
30. that we do not concur in House Amendment No. 1 to SB 33
31. and ask that a conference committee or let the House know
32. that we request a conference committee.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. The Senator moves that we do not concur in the House
2. Amendment to SB 33. All in favor signify by saying aye.
3. Opposed? The ayes have it and the House will be so
4. advised. Senator Mitchler, are you prepared on Secretary's
5. desk, SB 3?

6. SENATOR MITCHLER:

7. ...Mr. President, Members of the Senate, on the
8. Secretary's desk is SB No. 3 which is the act relating
9. to the Lead Poisoning Substance Control Act. The House
10. placed an amendment on our SB No.3 and I move that the
11. Senate do not concur with the House amendment.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Senator Mitchler moves that the Senate do...all
14. right not everybody at once, I'll get... Senator Kenneth
15. Hall.

16. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

17. I'd just like to ask Senator, just what does this
18. amendment do?

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Mitchler.

21. SENATOR MITCHLER:

22. The amendment...changes from point five percent to
23. point 0 six percent as to the lead content in the paint.
24. Now the reason, I'll give you the reason Senator Hall
25. why this is not acceptable. As pointed out before the
26. paint industries in the State of Illinois manufacture
27. paint that is shipped not only in the State of Illinois
28. but to all other States and even internationally. And
29. the standards that should be applied upon them with
30. respect to the lead content should be that the same as
31. the Federal standards and at the present time the language
32. that we had in our bill, SB 3, that we agreed to and sent
33. over to the House had point five percent and in addition

1. stated that the Illinois standards would conform to
2. the Federal standards. If the Federal standards would
3. be lowered at a future date, Illinois' automatically
4. would be lowered with the Federal standards and that is
5. the way the paint industry can operate. Without that
6. you're placing a great burden on the Illinois industries
7. and...really, and I say this in all sincerity, Senator,
8. and other members of the Gen...of the Senate, point five
9. percent, point 0 six percent is not the big issue and I
10. don't even know why we're wasting time even talking about
11. it. The issue is to give the Department of Public Health
12. the necessary authority that where there is an incident
13. downstate where they can go in and work with the local
14. community to resolve the problem of lead poisoning. And
15. as far as the City of Chicago, they have an ordinance and
16. I don't know why the Department of Public Health would
17. ever want to interfere in the City of Chicago with their
18. ordinance, they don't have the personnel to do it. Now
19. I've talked with Dr. Lashof, the Director of the Depart-
20. ment of Public Health on this over at breakfast one morning
21. at the State House Inn and she agreed this was insignificant
22. as far as the...point five or point 0 six and if this
23. gets back in a conference committee I'm sure that we'd
24. get the approval of the Director of the Department of
25. Public Health. At least she told me that she would do this
26. and accept the point five percent.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. ...Senator Netsch and then Senator Wooten.

29. SENATOR NETSCH:

30. Mr. President, we have been through this argument now
31. at least three times that I recall in the Public Health
32. Committee and at least three times on the Floor of this
33. Senate. There is a difference between point oh five and

1. point or point five and point o six...the point o six
2. is defensible, it is possible, we've already learned that
3. one of the major paint manufacturers in the...country has
4. gone to that standard and I would strongly urge that we
5. accept the House's version of the proper standard for
6. lead content.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. No further discussion, the motion before the
9. Senate is that the Senate do... Senator Berning, were
10. you seeking recognition?

11. SENATOR BERNING:

12. Yes. Just briefly. Members of the Senate, if you
13. were to examine your drinking water you would find that
14. it is far from pure. Sometimes we delude ourselves with
15. technicalities, the point five percent is completely
16. acceptable, non-injurious and is...nothing but an emotional
17. appeal and I suggest we reject the amendment.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. The motion before the Senate is that the Senate do
20. not... Senator Harris.

21. SENATOR HARRIS:

22. I just want to make clear to the membership so that
23. they understand what they're voting on, Senator Mitchler's
24. motion was to nonconcur. So that those who support
25. Senator Mitchler and I urge support of Senator Mitchler
26. vote aye. Is that not correct?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. That is correct.

29. SENATOR HARRIS:

30. All right. The vote is aye.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Depending upon your point of view. The motion is by
33. the sponsor of the bill that we do not concur in the House

1. Amendment to SB 3. Secretary will call the roll and
2. may we have some order.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
5. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
6. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Just a moment, now. Knuppel, no. Vadalabene, no.
16. Kosinski, no. Sommer, aye. Carroll, no. Rock, no.
17. McCarthy, a late no. On this question the yeas were 30.
18. The nays were 24. The House...Senate does not concur
19. in the House Amendment to SB No. 3 and the House will
20. be so advised. SB 83, Senator Vadalabene.

21. SENATOR VADALABENE:

22. Yes. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the
23. Senate. On the Secretary's desk SB 83 which has been
24. amended in the House. They've made a technical change
25. by inserting on page 1 between lines 4 and 5 the following
26. article 1. Also, they have...

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. Senator Harris, for what purpose do you arise?

29. SENATOR HARRIS:

30. Mr. President, we have concern that I'm sure we can
31. get worked out. We haven't had a chance to talk with
32. Senator Vadalabene. Could we take this out of the record
33. momentarily and see maybe we can get it worked

1. out before we call the matter?
2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
3. He agrees that we may take it out of the record.
4. SB 84, Senator Regner.
5. SENATOR REGNER:
6. Yes, Mr. President...this House amendment that
7. was put on SB 84 includes shelter care homes in the
8. projects that the Illinois Housing Development...
9. Authority can work on and I would move that we do
10. concur in House Amendment No. 1 to SB 84.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
12. Motion of Senator Regner. Is there discussion?
13. Senator Knuepfer.
14. SENATOR KNUEPFER:
15. What...what shape are you leaving the nursing
16. homes in with this? We took this off, we reconsidered
17. that amendment, Senator. Now where does that...stand
18. now?
19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
20. Senator Regner.
21. SENATOR REGNER:
22. This is the same amendment that we're talking about
23. in the first place, Senator Knuepfer and...as far as I
24. can see nursing homes are not included, it's just shelter
25. care homes for the aged.
26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
27. Senator Knuepfer.
28. SENATOR KNUEPFER:
29. Now, I...I'm not so...I'm not sure the status of
30. that bill. We reconsidered the amendment that was adopted.
31. That amendment is no longer on the bill. Is it back in
32. the original shape that it was in?
33. SENATOR REGNER:

1. My un...my understanding is that we...just re-
2. considered the vote by which we had concurred prior
3. to that. I don't think we took the amendment back
4. in fact I'm sure we didn't take the amendment off
5. before.

6. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

7. Then we are now in a position to discuss
8. whether or not to accept that amendment. Is that the
9. status of this? Okay. Then I would like to speak to
10. the amendment and this is a dialogue that we had the
11. other day. If there is a move to concur I would like
12. to urge this side and the other side as well to non-
13. concur. I suggested to you the other day that the
14. program is a program for low and middle income housing
15. and has should...and has nothing to do with the Federal
16. level with shelter care homes. There is a great
17. possibility of endangering the whole program by putting
18. this amendment on. This amendment should not be a part
19. of the bill and I would encourage those of you who want
20. a housing development act to resist putting this amend-
21. ment on because I think it jeopardizes the whole program.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Any further discussion? Senator ParTEE.

24. SENATOR PARTEE:

25. I just talked to Senator Regner a few moments ago...

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Just a moment, Senator,...

28. SENATOR PARTEE:

29. I just talked to Senator Regner a few moments ago
30. and I expressed a desire to do a particular thing on this
31. bill and the question that has just been raised by Senator
32. Knuepfer is a question that I raised in my own mind since
33. I had a chance to talk to Senator Regner. I wonder if

1. Senator Regner would respond to that question because I think
2. it's quite important that we get some definitive answer
3. on whether or not this would jeopardize the entire program.
4. I do know what is attempted to be done and I want to help the
5. gentlemen from the House who has this amendment...maybe,
6. it affects the E. St. Louie area and I know exactly what
7. they want to do. But I do want to know whether this will
8. jeopardize the entire program.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. Senator Regner.

11. SENATOR REGNER:

12. Senator Partee, it was my understanding in talking to
13. Representative Flynn that he had worked on this amendment
14. with the Illinois Housing Authority...people and whether
15. or not it does jeopardize it, I can't say personally but
16. I do know that Representative Flynn...told me that this
17. amendment was worked out with the people from the Authority.
18. Now if we should...if you would desire that we hold this
19. and confer with Representative Flynn that'd be okay with
20. me too.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

22. Senator Harris.

23. SENATOR HARRIS:

24. Well, I think there is a major policy question
25. here that each of us has got to decide whether it jeopardizes
26. the program or not. This is a major policy decision and I
27. think we should exercise a great deal of care and caution
28. about broadening the operation of the Illinois Housing
29. Authority Act to step beyond housing which it presently
30. is limited to, to the financing of sheltered care homes.
31. Now we all would love to have additional sheltered care homes
32. in our districts. Fine and dandy, I understand that but
33. certainly the expense of the construction of sheltered

1. care homes insofar as a comparison to the cost of
2. building housing capability is a tremendous comparison.
3. I just think every member ought to be on a...significant
4. point of caution whether there is a problem within
5. specifically St. Clair County or not, is not the question
6. here. That problem exists almost every place in
7. Illinois but there is a major policy decision inherent
8. in this amendment. ...As we vote on it we should be
9. mindful of the effect that if we are involving ourselves in here.
10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
11. Any further discussion? Senator Regner.
12. SENATOR REGNER:
13. ...Mr...Mr. President, I was wondering if we
14. should take this from the record and...hold it for a
15. while and I'll check it out to assure whether or not
16. it does endanger the program.
17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
18. The motion by the Senator from Mt. Prospect is that
19. the Senate do concur. Want to take it out of the record.
20. SECRETARY:
21. No, that's been taken care of.
22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
23. The Chair recognizes the...President of the Senate,
24. Senator Harris. Took it out of the record. Senator Harris.
25. SENATOR HARRIS:
26. Mr. President and members of the Senate...
27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
28. May we have your attention please? This is rather
29. important to many people.
30. SENATOR HARRIS:
31. The Senate could be at ease just a moment, please.
32. Okay. Mr. President, members...
33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Ladies and-Gentlemen, please.

2. SENATOR HARRIS:

3. Mr. President and members of the Senate, one of
4. the great delights that I personally experienced in the
5. performance of my responsibilities here as a member of
6. the Senate and I'm sure is shared by everyone of you
7. is our working relationship with Mayme Lawrence. There
8. is no more devoted, dedicated and professional servant
9. not only of the Senate, but of the people of Illinois
10. than Miss Lawrence. We have a particularly noteworthy
11. opportunity today to join in recognition of this lovely
12. person by presenting her with a token of our esteem
13. and love for her and to wish her many happy returns of
14. the day and truly a happy birthday. Senator Mohr,
15. would you present to Mayme the bouquet?

16. MISS LAWRENCE:

17. Well, I wasn't prepared for this, that's for sure.
18. Senator Harris, thank you very much and all of the staff.
19. And Senator Partee and all your staff. And thank all the
20. Senators and all the participants in this...great event.
21. I'm very pleased and very proud. Thanks all of you.

22. SENATOR HARRIS:

23. Mayme, if...if you would wait just a moment, I would
24. like to seek unanimous consent to revert to the order of
25. resolutions and ask the Secretary to read a resolution
26. that is on his desk.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Resolution 237 by Senators Davidson, Harris,
29. Mohr, Graham, Partee, Donnewald, Rock and all members of
30. the Senate.

31. (Secretary reads Senate Joint Resolution).

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. Mr...Mr. President, I yield to Senator Davidson.

1. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

2. Mr. President, I move for the suspension of
3. the rules for the immediate adoption of the resolution.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. All...all in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed?
6. The ayes have it and the resolution is adopted.

7. MISS LAWRENCE:

8. Thank... Well, it's...thanks a million to everybody
9. and to Mr. Fernandes and if all my birthdays continue
10. to be like this I hope to live to be a hundred.

11. SENATOR HARRIS:

12. Maym.. Mayme, would you see that someone in
13. Enrolling and Engrossing takes care of that resolution
14. up there?

15. MISS LAWRENCE:

16. I'll maybe write it myself. Thank you very much.

17. SENATOR MOHR:

18. For some of the new members and probably some of
19. the old members I'd just like to point that the last
20. Session when we passed bingo there was a lot of...of
21. newspaper...p.r. on a Grandma Kelly from Chicago who worked
22. very hard to support and hopefully pass bingo legislation
23. which we did. But Mayme Lawrence was the Grandma Kelly
24. of the Senate and really worked with me to pass that
25. bill over here.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Add also that some of you youngsters who think
28. you know how to play bridge get in a foursome with
29. Mayme some night you'll find out how it's done. We
30. are now prepared to go to the...more sober business of
31. the Senate and are we now prepared on SB 83 on the
32. Secretary's desk. Senator Vadalabene.

33. SENATOR VADALABENE:

1. Thank you Mr. President and members of the Senate.
2. I have just discussed this problem with...the President,
3. Senator Harris, in regard to SB 83 and because of a
4. technical change that it has to be made that was in SB 83
5. when it left the Senate and went over to the House. I
6. move now we do not concur with House Amendment No. 2
7. so that we can strike out the problem language on line
8. 17 which states provision of service facilities. So I
9. move that we do not concur with SB 83 so that we can get
10. this problem language straightened out.

17. SENATOR GLASS:

18. Thank you, Mr. President, Senators, I have had
19. a chance to discuss with Senator Course's legislative aide
20. and staff the amendment that was adopted in the House.
21. Membership will recall this is the bill that advances
22. the delinquency date for real estate taxes in Cook County
23. to March 1st and I...it was September 1st, we've now
24. moved it to August 1st for the House amendment. The other
25. significant change was to give the same opportunity to
26. the entire State for the earlier delinquency dates on
27. the real estate taxes on an optional basis. So it would
28. be optional downstate...I...I believe the amendments are
29. in proper form and I move to concur in House Amendments,
30. I believe, 3 and 4 to..

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Two, three...

33. SENATOR ROCK:

1. ...SB 138.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. Senator Glass, there are three amendments...

4. SENATOR GLASS:

5. Two, three and four.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Any discussion? Senator Course.

8. SENATOR COURSE:

9. Senator Glass, would you hold that up for a

10. few mil...few minutes and our staff members, I think .

11. we're going to concur so just...

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. He indicates that he will.

14. SENATOR COURSE:

15. ...hold_it up for a few minutes please.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. We'll take the motion out of the record. Senator

18. Schaffer are you prepared on 148? He indicates

19. he is. Senator Schaffer.

20. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

21. The...SB 148 to refresh everyone's memory is the

22. bill that would allow a...the political central committee

23. of either party in a caucus to have the option of re-

24. questing a primary instead of a caucus...in the original

25. bill that I drafted I had a twenty thousand required...

26. applied to townships of twenty thousand people or more

27. in the belief that the smaller townships were not interested

28. in this And it came out in the House Committee that...

29. Troy Kost and Clarence Neff and some of the people that

30. are interested in the smaller townships indicated

31. as long as it was optional they would kind of like to have

32. their townships over five thousand have this option too.

33. I have no objections to this, I evidently read them wrong

1. and I would like to move to concur in the House amendment.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. Any discussion? Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Yes, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
6. Senate, the House amendment removes the restriction. It
7. seems to me if I recall the explanation at the time the bill
8. was called for passage the thrust of the bill was to ad-
9. dress itself to townships, only the townships, with over
10. twenty thousand population. Now that restriction's been
11. removed so it seems like there's no necessity for the bill
12. anymore. I would urge that we nonconcur.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Any further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

15. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

16. I don't follow you, Senator Rock. I would remind
17. you that the statutes don't allow a township under five
18. thousand to have a partisan ticket so obviously all this

20. affected the intent of the bill. The intent of the bill
21. very clearly was to allow townships over twenty thousand
22. to allow the political central committee or township or
23. organization to request a...a primary instead of a caucus.
24. All the amendment in the House does is say the townships
25. over five thousand, that the political central committee
26. can still do this. All the effect of the amendment is is
27. to allow those townships between five thousand and twenty
28. thousand to have this option too. ...Personally I did not
29. think that the smaller townships would have the need for it but
30. the people over in the House, that seemed to speak for the
31. small townships...and that always have, indicate a...a desire
32. to have this option, I personally have no real hangups
33. on it. My problem is in the larger townships.

4. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen
5. of the Senate. SB 36 as it left the Senate was an
6. amendment to the child abuse reporting statute. And what
7. it did was enlarge the class of persons required to
8. make written reports under the child abuse act to in-
9. clude school teachers, school administrators, directors
10. and staff assistants of nursery schools, etc. House
11. Amendment No. 1 to SB 36 was a committee amendment
12. offered by the Committee...House Committee on Judiciary
13. and all it did was tighten up the language of those
14. persons included in the class. And now says, "Any
15. school teachers, school administrator, truant officers,
16. social worker, social service administrator, registered
17. nurse, licensed practical nurse, director or staff
18. assistant of a nursery school or child day care center,
19. law enforcement officer or field personnel of the
20. Illinois Department of Public Aid or the Cook County
21. Department of Public Aid having reasonable cause to
22. believe that any child with whom they have direct con-
23. tact has suffered injury or disability". I think it's
24. a good amendment. It tightens it up. Certainly
25. specifies what persons the class is to include and to
26. exclude. Amendment No. 2 was offered by Representative
27. Hyde in the House Committee at my request and what that
28. says is that a child can be said to have been physically
29. abused if in fact he has been subjected to deliberate
30. withholding of feeding endangering his health. Now
31. this, Mr. President and members of the Senate, is aimed
32. specifically at those situations which have unfortunately
33. come to our attention where there is a child in a hospital

1. setting who is allowed to starve for reason that it...
2. expectancy of life is not very great so the child is just
3. allowed to starve. All this does is say in that sit-
4. uation that child is deemed to be physically abused
5. so that the registered nurse or the licensed practical
6. nurse is in fact required to make a report to the
7. Department. I think the amendments are excellent and

7. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, SB 344
8. concerned itself with the limitation on the use of
9. studded tires on the highways in Illinois. The way
10. the bill passed the Senate...studded tires were allow-
11. able under the bill between the months of...between
12. the dates of November 1 to April 1. That is to say,
13. ...studded tires could be used only during that period,
14. November, December, January, February and March. The
15. House amended that so that the effective date on the
16. studded tire usage would be November 15th. The terminal
17. date, April 1st remains the same. I've talked to
18. Representative Neff who handled the bill in the House,
19. he's fully in...in concurrence with the amendment that
20. was adopted. I've talked it over with Senator...Course
21. who served on the subcommittee of the Motor Vehicles
22. Commission and we're in favor of the amendment. We feel
23. that the November 15th happens to coincide with the
24. State Police date of putting their winter tires on. If

33. to the Merit Board for the purpose of an affirmative action

1. officer in that Merit Board. I'm certainly in agreement
2. that affirmative action officer in...at every campus is
3. needed. But I don't think it's needed in the Merit Board
4. which gives the exams for all university employees through-
5. out the State, nonacademic and there's just no need to have
6. an affirmative action officer in that division. Now I agree
7. that affirmative action officers are needed at every campus
8. but certainly not at the examination level.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. Senator Partee.

11. SENATOR PARTEE:

12. It seems to me that's precisely where they do need
13. someone as an affirmative action officer. This is...has
14. been one of the complaints about the university in terms
15. of not having affirmative action measures taken to make
16. certain that all people are treated equally and that all
17. people have some opportunity to obtain the kind of jobs
18. that they're qualified for. I think this is a very small
19. amount to be put in there and I think it is absolutely
20. needed. I wish you could change your mind on it because
21. I don't want to vote against you but I certainly think
22. that this is an amendment we ought to concur in.

23. SENATOR WEAVER:

24. ...dent.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. Senator Weaver.

27. SENATOR WEAVER:

28. Well, Senator Partee, as I said each campus at...at
29. every campus of public supported universities has an affirm-
30. ative action officer in their personnel department. The
31. Merit Board is the place where anyone in the State can take
32. an exam, they're put on the register and from that register
33. they are hired into positions at each campus. But I see

1. no real value in having an affirmative action officer
2. in that examining board or in that capacity at...at the
3. examination level and the roster level. Now the
4. promotions are handled at each individual campus based
5. on exams also. But I...I just don't see the need for it.
6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Senator... Any further discussion? Senator
8. Newhouse.

9. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator, you probably
11. know that I headed a committee from the Board of Higher...
12. Senator Weaver. Senator Weaver, you probably know I
13. headed a committee appointed by the Board of Higher
14. Education to take a look at what was going on on campus scenes
15. with regard to minority employment and upgrading. Now
16. let me tell you exactly why there is a need for this and
17. a need for an officer here. As you and I both know there
18. are affirmative action officers on the campuses. I think
19. you'll find in every case they report directly to the
20. President which to me is not the arrangement that ought
21. to be made but even more important, let me give you an
22. example in Champaign. In Champaign there's a...there is
23. an examination given by this organization for truck drivers,
24. right? The experiences show that the truck drivers who were
25. hired as a consequence of this...examination were largely
26. graduate students from the university. And in Champaign
27. there are a fairly large number of veterans from World War II
28. many of whom took the toughest driving exam in the world.
29. They drove for the Red Ball Express. None of these Red
30. Ball Express drivers passed the test for truck drivers on
31. that campus. Now the point is this, that if the exam given
32. had absolutely no relation to the job to be done then there
33. needs to be someone in the Civil Service Board to begin to

1. point these things out and to structure the examination
2. so it will do what both you and I want it to do. And that
3. is, make it possible for those people with experience
4. to do the job they want to do. Now a guy with a Master's
5. Degree or graduate to be, of course, does need a job. I
6. don't think either you or I want that to happen to
7. eliminate from our tax rolls some of the citizens in
8. our areas who ought to be paying taxes and who could as
9. a consequence of this kind of action. So I would strongly
10. urge that you give that some consideration and...approve
11. of the affirmative action officer in this department.
12. Over the next several years I think it's going to be
13. vitally important that this happen.

14. SENATOR WEAVER:

15. Well, Senator, you and I both have the same concerns
16. but I think that...that the input into the Board for the
17. type of exam given has nothing to do with having...an affirm-
18. ative action officer on...in that working in that division.
19. Now if they were reviewing the exams given this is where
20. the input should be made rather than to just have an
21. affirmative action officer in that department. What...
22. what...what serv...what usefulness would he have if he
23. didn't write the exam or concur in the exam?

24. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

25. Senator, that's exactly what he ought to be doing
26. because the department has known that these...the department
27. has known for years that something is wrong. No one in
28. the department has been assigned to determine what it is
29. and to ask for the corrective measures. And that's
30. precisely what I see an affirmative action officer doing
31. in this department.

32. SENATOR WEAVER:

33. Well, let's...let's take this out of the record for

1. just a minute. I'd like to talk to both Senator Partee
2. and Senator Newhouse.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Leave is granted. The bill will be taken out of
5. the record and the next bill will be 402 by Senator
6. ...Senator...Senator Newhouse. ...

7. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

8. ...They...there has been an amendment to this bill
9. that... Senator Latherow on the Floor? ...I'm sure
10. that he would concur. This...this...what happened
11. is that...a new licensing fee had been asked for the
12. bulk milktank operators and it was set at \$20. ...After
13. consultation with Senator Latherow we...we compromised
14. on a \$15 licensing rate and the bill went out of here.
15. Over in the House that amount has been reduced to \$10.
16. ...The Department says that they can live with the
17. \$10 rate, they'll get some experience this year. If
18. it doesn't...if it doesn't do what it ought to do then
19. they'll come back and ask you next year to ask for more
20. money. But...here's Senator Latherow now. Senator
21. Latherow, this is the bulk milktank operators. I think
22. you know about this. The Department has concurred on
23. the \$10 rate rather than the \$15 rate that we agreed
24. upon and I would move that we concur in House Amendment.

7. International's Eleventh World Congress accessibility
8. symbol for the handicapped. I think most of you are
9. familiar with this, it's the...wheelchair...ensconced
10. person in a circle so that it is a recognizable kind
11. of symbol...posted in public places where this kind of
12. accommodation is available. ...We had...no opposition
13. to this in the Executive Committee and would urge the

21. SENATOR PARTEE:

22. Me? 23? That's not mine.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Anyone care to take it? Senator Knuppel.

25. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

26. I move the adoption of House Joint Resolution No. 23.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Is there any discussion? Senator Sours.

29. SENATOR SOURS:

30. I just...I just have a question Mr. President and
31. Senators. What's the...what's the reason for this
32. resolution, Senator? Will it raise court cost or what's
33. the purpose of it?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

2. I assume the purpose is not to raise court cost
3. but to allow these matters to be held...handled more
4. informally. In other words, most of the courts I've been in
5. they expect you to have an attorney to file a formal
6. pleading where you don't have to file a formal pleading.
7. And since the time \$1,000 was fixed as the limit...
8. we've had rampant inflation as you're suggesting.
9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Senator Sours.

11. SENATOR SOURS:

12. I...I just had the feeling that a claim of \$2500
13. is not a small claim and probably ought to to be brought
14. to the court in a formal pleading with the usual motions and
15. answers and all that. \$2500 represents at least a third
16. of the year of a salary of a human being under normal
17. circumstances. And...and to me it's not small at all. It's
18. quite sizeable and I feel this is something I cannot
19. support.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. ...tor Partee.

22. SENATOR PARTEE:

23. Now Senator Sours, this simply...I remember what it's
24. calculated to do now. It simply takes into consideration
25. inflation and it helps the poor working stiff who has a
26. claim a little better than a thousand dollars and he gets
27. a chance to go into court on his own with it.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

29. Senator Sours.

30. SENATOR SOURS:

31. ...That would give me all the more reason to...to...
32. oppose this Senator Partee because when you're about to
33. take \$2500 away from somebody in the form of a judgement,

1. or a levy or a subsequent garnishment to me that's a
2. lot of money. As I want to repeat it's at least a third
3. of a year's gross income for the ordinary person if he's
4. hooked on the end as a defendant.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Any further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

7. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

8. Let's give the poor stiff on the street a break,
9. that's what I want to say and to...I don't think the
10. lawyers need it. There's a shortage of lawyers and
11. actually I loose money just about any claim I handle
12. that's less than a thousand dollars. I mean, you just
13. can't handle them and so I'm going to say let's give
14. the stiff on the street a break.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

16. Senator Sours.

17. SENATOR SOURS:

18. We just by a bill yesterday, Senator, disposed of
19. twenty million dollars of the money of a poor stiff or
20. a group of poor stiffs and the city savings.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Any further discussion? All in favor of the
23. adoption of House Joint Resolution 23 signify by saying
24. aye. Opposed, nay. Resolution... Roll call has been
25. requested. Secretary will call the roll.

26. SECRETARY:

10. SENATOR SOURS:

11. I'd like verification of that. I'm not trying
12. to make a mountain out of a molehill either. This is
13. something that I think many people who are entirely ignorant
14. of the law and the legal procedures. I think they ought
15. to know what's going on. This is important.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Well, Senator, we've already moved to the next order
18. of business. The vote received 31...30 to 7. It only
19. takes a simple majority to adopt. House Joint Resolution
20. 30, Senator Latherow.

21. SENATOR LATHEROW:

22. House Joint Resolution 30, Mr. President, members of
23. the Senate, merely suggests the position that the State of
24. Illinois takes that the requirements on the Federal Am-
25. bulance provisions are rather exorbitant and should be
26. given some reconsideration. I'd appreciate the favorable
27. roll call.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

29. Is there any discussion? All in favor of the adoption
30. of House Joint Resolution 30 signify by saying aye. Opposed,
31. nay. Resolution's adopted. House Joint Resolution 38,
32. Senator Mitchler.

33. SENATOR MITCHLER:

1. Mr. President, members of the Senate, House Joint...
2. Resolution 38 was a bill introduced by Representative
3. DiPrima that joins with all States organizations urging
4. Federal Congress to provide additional funds for State
5. and Federal employment agencies primarily directed
6. to...assist the returning Viet Nam veterans and other
7. veterans. I would move for concurrence and adoption
8. in House Joint Resolution 38.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Is there any discussion? All in favor of adoption
11. of House Joint Resolution 38 signify by saying aye.
12. Opposed nay. Resolution's adopted. House Joint Resolution
13. 44. Senator Knuppel.

14. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

15. House Joint Resolution 44 merely petitions Congress
16. to retain the provisions of capital gain treatment for
17. timber. I...I move the adoption of that resolution.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

19. Is there any discussion? All in favor signify by
20. saying aye. Opposed, nay. Resolution's adopted. House
21. Joint Resolution 71, Senator Mitchler.

22. SENATOR MITCHLER:

23. ...Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, House
24. Joint Resolution 71 is a resolution by Representative
25. Schoeberlein and this came over...and this is one that we
26. have...I talked to Senator Partee and also to Senator Ozinga
27. and Senator Harris. It bypassed the Senate Executive
28. Committee and it was agreed that this bill...or the
29. House Joint Resolution calls upon the Department of
30. Transportation to hold hearings in relation to a four
31. lane highway construction on Route 59. This is where
32. a shopping center is going in fast growth area. I would
33. ask for a favorable roll call to concur in...adopt

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

4. So ordered. All in favor signify by saying aye.
5. Opposed, nay. Resolution's adopted. House Joint Res-
6. olution 72, Senator Shapiro.

7. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

8. ...Mr. President, members of the Senate, the Calendar
9. is not correct in the description of HJR 72. ...This
10. resolution No. 72 directs Congress to place in the Federal
11. fiscal year 1974 budget the necessary monies...

12. SECRETARY:

13. House Joint Resolution is described on the Calendar,
14. Senator.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

16. Senator Shapiro, would you like to check with the
17. Secretary on this? Any further resolutions on the

17. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

18. HB 608. (Secretary reads title of bill).
19. 3rd reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Senator Swinarski.

22. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

23. This is the ordinary and contingent expenses of the
24. EPA Agency and I ask for a favorable roll call.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. Any further discussion? The question is shall
27. HB 608 pass. And on that question the Secretary will
28. call the roll.

29. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

30. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
31. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
32. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
33. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,

1. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
2. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
3. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,
4. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,
5. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,
6. Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

8. Weaver, aye. Buzbee, aye. Soper, aye. On that
9. question the yeas are 39. The nays are 2. HB 608 having
10. received the constitutional majority is declared passed.
11. Senator Scholl.

12. SENATOR SCHOLL:

13. Mr...President, members of the Senate, I'd like to
14. make a motion to send HB...554 and 555 to the Committee
15. on Revenue. I'd like to move it from third to the
16. Committee.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

18. Senator Scholl moves to recommit HB 554 and 555 to
19. the Revenue Committee. Is there leave? Senator Scholl.
20. Leave is granted. Senator Scholl.

21. SENATOR SCHOLL:

22. Mr. President, members of the Senate, a great deal
23. of thought and consideration has gone into the determination
24. that a lottery in Illinois is desirable. My colleague in
25. the House of Representatives Zeke Giorgi is to be commended
26. for introducing this measure into the...deliberation of
27. the General Assembly this Session. He has built significant
28. support for its passage and I want to help him in that re-
29. gard. I share his strong desire that it be enacted into
30. law and become a truly fun game for participants. After
31. lengthy evaluation however President Harris, Minority
32. Leader Partee, Representative Giorgi and I have concluded
33. that the administrative machinery to operate the lottery

1. needs a good deal more legal work and refinement. There-
2. fore, I am going to vote to send HB 555 to the Senate
3. Revenue Committee for further development. I am confident
4. that the necessary refinement can be accomplished and that
5. the measure would be ready for final consideration when we
6. return in the fall. Among the several governmental issues
7. still to be resolved before we commit the State of Illinois
8. to a lottery are: one, should a commission be responsible
9. for the administration and collection of a lottery as set
10. forth in this bill or should the Illinois Department of
11. Revenue have that responsibility? Two, what should we do
12. with the proceeds of the lottery? Should its revenues be ear-
13. marked for education, mass transit, other high priorities or be
14. deposited in the General Revenue Fund? How can we better
15. coordinate this proposal with the new strong State Comp-
16. trollers Act which becomes effective July 1st 1974? Here
17. I am particularly concerned about the preaudit provisions
18. and other protections of the taxpayers money which will be in
19. the concern of this new act. How would the lottery be coor-
20. dinated with the present criminal code to prevent the in-
21. trusion of criminal interest into this form of legalized
22. gambling? Should the dispersments of funds from the agency
23. administering the lottery be in the form of appropriations
24. from the General Assembly or from a revolving fund operated
25. by the...lottery commission as is presently provided in the
26. bill. As a matter of policy this Senate has opposed the use
27. of revolving funds in most instances and my inclination is
28. to handle dispersements in another manner. What steps do we
29. take to make sure that the money deposited by the ticket-
30. holders gets from the lottery sales agent to the State
31. Treasurers' quickly and properly? Considering the varying
32. degrees of success of the lottery in other States what should
33. the cost of the tickets be, and what about the amount of prizes?

1. It seems to me that these questions are serious issues
2. which should be a matter of thoughtful consideration
3. and decided by the Legislature before we embark the
4. State on this type of program. As a matter of fact,
5. delaying action on the lottery until this Fall will
6. probably not affect the ...the eventual starting date of
7. its operation by one day. The experiences in other
8. States has been that it has taken nine to twelve months to make
9. lottery...up...up. Up...up...up...for these reasons I would
10. move that the Senate support me in sending this bill to
11. the Revenue Committee at this time. Since I think the
12. votes are here to pass the lottery bill this year I be-
13. lieve that we should take the time between now and this
14. Fall to put the machinery which will run it into proper
15. shape.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. Senator we have supported you. Senator Bell.

18. SENATOR BELL:

19. Well, Mr. President, fellow Senators, I guess I'm
20. rising in support of this measure. ...Well, I'd like to
21. address myself in this now, just a minute, Mr. President.
22. I happen to feel that the lottery...

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

24. You...have You...can rise on a point of personal privilege.

25. SENATOR BELL:

26. All right. I rise on a point of personal privilege.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. You're recognized on that...

29. SENATOR BELL:

30. All right. Thank you. I happen to feel that the
31. lottery is not the way for the State of Illinois to conduct
32. its affairs. Well, you know, you can boo me all you want,
33. but I'd like to see this go back to Revenue Committee...

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
2. For what purpose does...
3. SENATOR BELL:
4. .. and stay there permanently.
5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
6. For what purpose does Senator Swinarski arise?
7. SENATOR SWINARSKI:
8. I'd like to direct my question to the...to the
9. Senator and ask him how this is germane to the point
10. taken just a moment ago. Senators in the State of
11. Illinois sitting in this Legislature I am making a state-
12. ment on the point of personal privilege. I'd like to see it go
13. back to Revenue Committee and just stay there permanently.
14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
15. The next bill is No. 518, Senator...for what
16. purpose does Senator...Kenneth Hall arise?
17. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:
18. A parliamentary inquiry. Did...did we vote on this
19. to recommit....
20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
21. We voted to recommit, that's all...they're already...
22. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:
23. You've already voted.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
25. They're already committed. HB 312, Senator Daley.
26. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
27. HB 312. (Secretary reads title of bill).
28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
29. Senator Daley.
30. SENATOR DALEY:
31. Thank you Mr. President and fellow Senators. This
32. increases the State minimum wage...earning of about 300,000
33. people in the State of Illinois. I would like to give the

1. particulars when this law goes into effect and in-
2. creases the minimum wage of everyone to \$1.75. Those
3. under 18 years of age \$1.40. On January 1, 1975 and
4. increases it to \$1.90; those under 18 to \$1.55. On
5. January 1, 1976, it increases those over 18 to \$2.10
6. and those under 18 to \$1.75. The House sponsor accepted
7. a...an amendment to this bill whereby it states: However
8. at no time shall the minimum hourly wages established
9. by this Act exceed those specified under Federal Law.
10. This was acceptable to the House sponsor...acceptable
11. to me. I think we could debate this for many, many
12. hours. I would ask for a...for a favorable roll call.
13. And if there's any questions I'll...I'll answer any
14. of the questions. Thank you.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

16. Senator Mitchler.

17. SENATOR MITCHLER:

18. ...This bill passed out of the Senate Industry and
19. Labor Committee. ...I don't think that we should address
20. ourselves as to whether or not Illinois should have a
21. minimum wage law. This...has been put into effect in a
22. previous Session and this is the first increase that we've
23. had in the minimum wage law in Illinois and I note it takes
24. it all the way through January 1, 1976. And important, the
25. amendment has been accepted by the sponsors to have at no
26. time shall the minimum hourly wage in Illinois established
27. by this Act exceed those specified under Federal Law. And
28. think that's a very important amendment and it makes it
29. satisfactory. And I would ask for a favorable roll call
30. on HB 312.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Graham.

33. SENATOR GRAHAM:

1. Mr...Mr. President, members of the Senate, I
2. have no thought other than it...that this bill is
3. going to pass but I want to remind you of the
4. potential damage we're doing to the Little Joe
5. and Mary places and to our retired citizens when
6. we impose this kind of legislation on them. And
7. the Senator from Barrington will have to vote in
8. the negative.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Any further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

11. SENATOR NIMROD:

12. One thing I think I might call attention to it.
13. I'm not opposed to a minimum wage law but what this
14. law basically does is bring a lot of people under
15. the act which are normally not covered and brings them
16. under Federal standards...brings them under the
17. Federal minimum wage and...it seems to do that in
18. one big fell swoop but it doesn't infer that in this
19. particular place...rather than just calls...it says its
20. raising for adults and going through what it doesn't
21. say is that we automatically are covering a lot
22. of people under this act that are normally not
23. covered by the Federal regulations and we are auto-
24. matically doing that with this bill.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. Senator Berning.

27. SENATOR BERNING:

28. Thank you Mr. President. I assume of course that
29. it's somewhat useless to speak in opposition to this
30. minimum wage act we already have established. But I
31. really want to point out to you what really is signi-
32. ficant and if some of you did not see the Chicago
33. Tribune on June 24th in their Metro section and a

1. very significant article entitled The Mark of the
2. Vandal. But what...and what is significant about
3. that in relation to SB 312 is this. Patrick Mc-
4. Donald who is the Director of the Division of
5. Youth for the Chicago Police Department says he
6. blames the rising vandalism among teenagers on
7. the ever-rising minimum wage scale. The neighbor-
8. hood shopkeeper and other small outfits can no
9. longer afford to hire kids. It's against the
10. law to pay 75¢ a hour anymore so the kids don't
11. have much to do during their free time. And leisure
12. time for kids is bad if it isn't directed. I said
13. many years...several years back when we were con-
14. sidering the minimum wage bill that our society
15. could do nothing but suffer from the imposition of
16. the Minimum Wage Act and the deplorable, deplorable
17. vandalism that's occurring throughout the City of
18. Chicago to monuments, statues, to public buildings,
19. yes, even the seats in the public transportation
20. conveyances, the L cars and the busses are the
21. result of the excess time on the hands of so many
22. young people who were they able to get a job for
23. 75¢ or a dollar an hour would be kept occuppied.
24. I submit that we have made grievous mistake and
25. now we are only going to compound it.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

27. Senator Sours.

28. SENATOR SOURS:

29. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
30. I'm confident that some of the members of the Committee
31. before whom this bill came after assignment perhaps
32. didn't understand that this legislation touches only
33. that which is not covered by the Federal Law. Many

1. years ago Interstate Commerce was strictly construed
2. and it had to be just that. ...During the Roosevelt
3. years and after Interstate Commerce was diluted, diffused
4. in thinking and could be pretty much what the gastro-
5. nomical decision of the Supreme Court might be having
6. had a good breakfast or a bad breakfast. Anyway this
7. bill touches only those employers not engaged in Inter-
8. state Commerce and whose gross business is \$250,000 a
9. year or more. Now what we're doing by this bill we're
10. not touching Standard Oil, we're not touching US Steel,
11. you name them, the big fellows, Caterpillar Tractor
12. Company, the distilleries, nothing like that, we're
13. taking the little fellow whose monthly gross would be
14. somewhere in excess of \$20,000 whether he had a gasoline
15. station, whether he had a little restaurant or tavern,
16. you name it, any small business. And we're putting the
17. strictures of a minimum on him whether he can afford it
18. or not. Now I've said in the past this has been a saloon-
19. keepers Session, this has al...also been a very profligate
20. Session. We just passed out \$20,000,000 yesterday. Now
21. we're going to get this, we're going to get this law in
22. the books that will punish the little fellow, not the
23. big fella, the big fella can employ the finest lawyers,
24. the finest accountants and all that goes into proper
25. avoidance of the law. We're pecking away now, Ladies
26. and Gentlemen of the Senate, at the little fella. And
27. that's what's wrong with this bill. The little fella
28. doesn't need coercion, he needs a little help and this
29. is just the inverse of that. This bill will never get
30. my support and I have every reason to believe that it
31. will probably pass just as a lot of other perfidious
32. legislation has sneaked through this semester.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

1. Senator Knuppel.

2. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

3. We decided last year that we were going to have
4. a minimum wage law. The question now is who is smaller
5. than someone who is making less than \$2.00 an hour?
6. Those people are I'll assure you on ADC. I say let's
7. ...let's give the man a decent salary to give the
8. courage and the...and the pride to earn a living. This
9. is good legislation. As I understand it it doesn't
10. broaden the coverage merely...it provides for a smaller
11. minimum and last year we excluded most of the people
12. ...we don't have a great number of people who aren't
13. already covered by the Federal Law.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

15. Further discussion? Senator Daley may close.

16. SENATOR DALEY:

17. ...Mr. President, fellow Senators, this only in-
18. creases the wages of every working man and woman through-
19. out the State and I would ask for a favorable roll call.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Question is, shall HB 312 pass? And on that
22. question the Secretary will call the roll.

23. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

24. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
25. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
26. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
27. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
28. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
29. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
30. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,
31. Saperstein, Savickas, Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith,
32. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker,
33. Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

2. Kenneth Hall, aye. Senator Partee.

3. SENATOR PARTEE:

4. While he's tabulating the vote I would like to
5. present to the Senate a Mr. and Mrs. Morris Davis
6. from Jackson, Mississippi and their niece Alencia.
7. Mr. and Mrs. Davis are the parents of our own staff
8. assistant Sylvia Davis. They're sitting in the
9. west gallery. I'd ask them to stand and be recognized
10. by the Senate.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

12. On that question the yeas are 40. The nays are
13. 11. HB 312 having received the constitutional majority
14. is declared passed. 653, Senator Berning. You wish the
15. bill called?

16. SENATOR BERNING:

17. That is Senator Carroll.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

19. Senator Carroll, 653? 708, Senator Regner. The
20. Chair would point out that this is the last day in case
21. some of you members aren't aware of that. 717, Senator
22. Palmer. 799, Senator Scholl. 799, Senator Scholl.

23. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

24. HB 799. (Secretary reads title of bill).

25. 3rd reading of the bill.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

27. Senator Scholl.

28. SENATOR SCHOLL:

29. Mr. President, members of the Senate, the House
30. sponsor, Representative Philip...would like to have this
31. bill passed. No petition or application for a variance
32. or for rezoning filed by or on behalf of a land trust
33. may be considered unless it states the name and address

1. of each beneficiary of that land trust. Being a
2. member of the Chicago City Council I found that
3. some situations...being a member of Chicago City
4. Council many occasions we found zoning changes
5. coming in where the beneficiaries names were hidden
6. in land trusts. All we want to know is who these
7. people are. And I would urge a favorable roll call.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. Senator Palmer.

10. SENATOR PALMER:

11. ...Mr. President, members of the Senate, I rise
12. in...opposition to this bill. This Senate has on two
13. previous bills passed...the two previous bills passed
14. disclosures for land trusts. And those particular
15. bills that provided wherein the State shall sell or
16. lease property to land trust, the law shall require
17. that they disclose the beneficiaries of this land
18. trust. Under those circumstances the beneficiaries
19. or the land trust do not have a right to sell to the
20. State or they do not have the right to lease from the
21. State. Under those circumstances I think the...it is
22. proper for this Legislature to regulate and to pass
23. that kind of legislation. However, this particular
24. legislation is an absolute denial of a right to certain
25. citizens. There's nothing in the law that says that a
26. land trust is illegal. A land trust is a entity as well
27. as a person or as well as a corporation. Now I do not
28. think that it's constitutional or right for any law to be
29. passed by this Body to abridge or to...deprive any person,
30. any corporation or any land trust to prohibit them for
31. filing an application the same way any other citizen.
32. This is a right that they have and if this law specifically
33. says that no petition or application for a variance or

1. for filing or rezoning shall be considered. This is
2. an absolute denial of a right and for that reason I
3. think it is unconstitutional and it should not be passed
4. by this Body. Now, Senator Scholl...Senator Scholl,
5. may I have your attention? Now you stated that you
6. were an alderman and you're familiar with zoning ap-
7. plications. You stated that you're familiar with
8. applications. The applications that are filed in the
9. City of Chicago and I believe in all municipalities is a
10. simple form which states that can be filed by the owner
11. for any kind of variance where major or minor and...
12. and will you answer me this question. Can not that be
13. filed even by an agent of the owner?

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

15. Senator Scholl.

16. SENATOR SCHOLL:

17. Yes it can.

18. SENATOR PALMER:

19. Well, in that case I think it brings out my point
20. that it would not be right or correct or legal or con-
21. stitutional for this Body to deny a trust to file their
22. application if that's what this act is trying to do. I
23. would submit to this Body that just like in any other
24. legal proceedings and I think Senator Sours will agree
25. with me that during the course of the proceedings just
26. like in any court of law if the hearing officer or any
27. of the interested parties request the disclosure by
28. notice of motion as to the name of the beneficiaries that
29. can be had. But I do not think that you should prevent
30. any citizen or any entity from filing this application.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Rock.

33. SENATOR ROCK:

1. Thank you Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen
2. of the Senate. I rise in opposition to HB 799. It is
3. again an ice cream cone we're talking about a land
4. trust bill and therefore of necessity has to be good.
5. I would ask if the sponsor would yield for a question?

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

7. He indicates he will.

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. By the terms of this bill we are amending the
10. municipal code, the county zoning act and the township
11. zoning act in one bill which I think is unconstitutional.
12. But in addition to that you are saying to the municipalities,
13. the counties and the townships that no petition for a
14. variance or rezoning may be considered unless this infor-
15. mation is in fact included. What happens if they do in
16. fact consider it?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

18. Senator Scholl.

19. SENATOR SCHOLL:

20. Would you repeat your question?

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

22. Senator Rock.

23. SENATOR ROCK:

24. My question, Senator, is that you are proscribing
25. the consideration apparently of petitions or applications
26. for variance or rezoning unless certain stated information
27. namely the name and address of each beneficiary is in fact
28. given. My question is, what is the sanction, what happens
29. legally if in fact the municipality or the county or the
30. township does consider such a petition or application?

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Scholl.

33. SENATOR SCHOLL:

1. I don't know.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Well. That...that, I think, points out one...one at
6. least glaring defect with this bill. This bill was
7. put in again because it dealt with land trust. Now
8. if we're saying that an application that does not have this
9. information is ipso facto invalid, that's one thing. And
10. if we're saying if in fact the municipality considers
11. it and their consideration is null and void that's
12. quite another. But in fact we are saying nothing. It
13. just says they must consider it. Now, I would ask then,
14. Mr. Chairman...Mr. President, based upon the fact that
15. it proscribes municipalities and counties from certain
16. actions and does not contain any sanctions I would ask
17. under...ask a ruling of the Chair under Article 7,
18. Section 6G that this a proscription on home rule unit
19. powers and as such it is preemptive and it requires a
20. three-fifths vote of this Chamber.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

22. The Chair would rule that it takes 30 votes on
23. this measure. Any further...Senator Fawell.

24. SENATOR FAWELL:

25. ...Senator Rock, I...I...I don't know if you have
26. a copy of HB 1508 within reaching distance there. I...but
27. I would...would like to know what...your reaction is...in your
28. opinion does 1508 when it refers to...a trustee of a land
29. trust making application to the State of Illinois or to
30. any of its agencies or political subdivisions for any
31. benefit, authorization, license or permit relating to the
32. land which is the subject of such trust and the interest
33. therein, improvements thereto or use thereof does cover

1. county and municipal zoning, in your opinion?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Yes. I...I thought your bill as I recall it,
6. now I do not have a copy in front of me but I thought
7. it dealt with governmental unit which would include
8. all these political subdivisions. Yes.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Senator Fawell.

11. SENATOR FAWELL:

12. Well, that...that was my feeling too and I...I...
13. I would believe that the word political subdivision
14. would be construed to cover municipalities, indoor
15. counties and...the word license or permit would es-
16. pecially as it refers to the use of land would cover
17. therefore zoning, etc. But, I...I would think too
18. there could be a question there. There's a little bit
19. of question in my mind. This certainly would make it
20. ultra clear and it would...I have found at least in my
21. area that every time I am representing a land trustee
22. before the zoning board one of the first things they
23. ...they...are asking us to do now is to tell us who
24. happen to be the beneficiaries anyway. And I think the
25. time really has come where it's becoming very apparent
26. that the...when one utilizes the land trust you...you
27. better be in a position to let people know who the
28. beneficiaries are. There's still a lot of very valid
29. purposes for the land trust and use of mortgages and
30. in the use of the disposition of property upon death, easy
31. transferability, etc. And although I think Senator Rock
32. may be quite correct, there may be a duplication here
33. there's just enough of a question in my mind that I think

1. this could...could settle it. That indeed as far as
2. zoning is concerned we're asking for a full disclosure
3. of the beneficiaries.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

5. Senator Rock.

6. SENATOR ROCK:

7. Well, I just want to respond to that question even
8. though it may well have been a rhetorical question. In my
9. view, 1508 was worthy of our support. This bill, however,
10. is not. And there are couple of definite differences. Your
11. bill said that people involved in land trust in fact had
12. to disclose. This bill attempts to proscribe a county
13. and says you may not consider an application unless this
14. information is there. And I don't think we want to do
15. that. And if we want to do that we need a three-fifths
16. vote of this Chamber, so to that extent, I agree with
17. your comments regarding 1508. But they in no way imply or
18. should imply that I am in any way in favor of 799.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

20. In the back of the Chamber is our Attorney General
21. and his son Billy. I'd like the Senate to stand and recog-
22. nize the Attorney General and his son Billy. Any further
23. discussion? Senator Nudelman.

24. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

25. Mr. President, thank you. I would oppose this bill
26. on two scores. One, it's a simple matter of law that,
27. excuse me, an entity be it a human being or a trust should
28. have a right to a zoning change. If it has that right
29. whether it be a trust or something else, I don't think the
30. ownership of the trust should matter if the cause is just
31. and equitable. The other reason I would oppose this bill
32. is its genesis. The sponsor of the bill came before the
33. Judiciary Committee and indicated the reason for this bill

1. is that they were troubled by the type of people
2. attempting to move into the area and that they
3. might not approve of their color or ethnic back-
4. ground. I think that basis is the wrong basis
5. for passing the law in this Senate.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

7. Any further discussion? Senator Scholl may close.

8. SENATOR SCHOLL:

9. As I pointed out, being a member of the City
10. Council man...many times we were faced with applications
11. that came in and they were hidden in land trusts and
12. I'd like to know, as a member of that Committee, I want
13. ...a lot of times I'd like to know who are we passing
14. the zoning change for? And this bill will do just that.
15. And I hope that the Senate will Do Pass this.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. Question is, shall HB 799 pass? And on that
18. question the Secretary will call the roll.

19. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

1. absentees.

2. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

8. Soper was aye.

9. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

10. Vadalabene, Walker, Welsh.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

12. Moves postponed consideration. I've reminded the

13. Senators on several occasions this is the last day and

14. I would hope that we get through this Calendar and as we go

15. through you would call your bill. ...803, Senator Regner.

16. 820, Senator Scholl, 820.

17. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

18. HB 820. (Secretary reads title of bill).

19. 3rd reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Senator Scholl.

22. SENATOR SCHOLL:

23. Mr. President, members of the Senate, yesterday we

24. put on two amendments. One was Representative...Senator

25. Carroll's and one was mine. We debated this issue on bi-

26. cycle safety on lengths and after our meeting I got to-

27. gether with Representative...Senator Carroll and came to

28. the conclusion that he was right and I was wrong. Ill-

29. inois has initiated safety programs to make citizens

30. more aware that bicycles are more than toys. The bikes

31. renewed popularity and increased accident rates have

32. prompted State officials to create new laws requiring

33. additional equipment for bikes. Approximately 8.9

1. million Americans bought bikes last year. Twice as
2. many persons as a decade ago. The National Safety
3. Council officials predict approximately 880 cyclists
4. will be killed nationwide this year from collisions
5. with automobiles. Another 130 persons are expected
6. to die from other type of accidents while on bi-
7. cycles. This is an important piece of legislation
8. and I recommend Do Pass.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Senator Carroll.

11. SENATOR CARROLL:

12. Thank you. I would also rise to support this
13. legislation. I think it's now in very meaningful
14. form whereby in this new type of safety feature,
15. this bicycle rim along the tire, is established to
16. be usable in enough quantity to be of good use
17. that we could then move to that system in '75 with-
18. out taking the chance of not having any type of
19. reflectors. I think as it now stands it's a good
20. attempt at saving the lives of children of this
21. State. And I would urge everybody to vote for this
22. bill.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

24. Any further discussion? The question is, shall
25. HB 820 pass? And on that question the Secretary will
26. call the roll.

27. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

9. HB 820 having received the constitutional majority
10. is declared passed. Senator Carroll on 653.

11. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

12. HB 653. (Secretary reads title of bill).
13. 3rd reading of the bill.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

15. Senator Carroll.

16. SENATOR CARROLL:

17. Thank you Mr. President and members of the
18. Senate. Although the Calendar says that the sponsor
19. is Senator Berning he asked me to take this bill as
20. did the House sponsors. Although it partially affects
21. his district and I know he's in full support of it
22. this is creating a commission to study the problems
23. that have been created along the chain the lakes and
24. along the Illinois-Mississippi Canal and to see what
25. kind of an effect the growth of that area has had, the
26. sludge, the dredge, the environmental problems, the
27. social and economic problems. It's a commission that
28. dies automatically in 1974, so...as to report back to
29. the Legislature on its findings. This has met with
30. the approval of leadership of both sides of the aisle
31. ...And it's an attempt as I've said to evaluate the
32. social, health and environmental problems along those
33. canal routes. And I would ask for a favorable roll call.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
2. Further discussion? The quest...question is
3. shall HB 653 pass? And on that question the
4. Secretary will call the roll.
5. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
6. Bartulis, Bell, Berning,
7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
8. ...Mr. Secretary, one minute please. Senator
9. Carroll.
10. SENATOR CARROLL:
11. Someone yelled out a question about the appropriation
12. I just might add that the companion bill was amended into
13. Senator McBroom's Omnibus Appropriation Bill with a \$20,000
14. appropriation to cover both commissions.
15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
16. Secretary will call the roll.
17. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
18. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
19. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
20. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth...Kenneth

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
29. Glass, aye. Partee, aye. McBroom, aye. Re-
30. quest to call the absentees. Weaver, aye. Hold the
31. bell, Sergeant at Arms. Hold the bell. Sergeant at
32. Arms, hold the bell. Graham, aye. On that question
33. the yeas are 37. The nays are 7. HB 653 having

1. received the constitutional majority is declared passed.
2. HB 911. For what purpose does Senator McBroom rise?
3. SENATOR MCBROOM:
4. I wonder, Mr. President, if we could take care...
5. if Senator Clarke would wait a minute, if we could take
6. care of HB 1937, the Commission Omnibus Bill? ...The...
7. I think we're all set on the amendment now.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
9. We'll take HB..911 out of the record, go to HB 1937.
10. Senator McBroom.
11. SENATOR MCBROOM:
12. Yes. Well, I have the...explained the amendment,
13. Mr. President. I believe everybody's in tandem on it
14. and I move its adoption.
15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
16. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment
17. No. 1 to HB 1937. All those in favor signify by saying
18. aye. Opposed? Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Further
19. amendments? 3rd reading. Senator Clarke, HB 911.
20. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
21. HB 911. (Secretary reads title of bill).
22. 3rd reading of the bill.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
24. Senator Clarke.
25. SENATOR CLARKE:
26. Mr. President, members of the Senate. HB 911 is the
27. one that we discussed...considerable length yesterday
28. on amendment stage...or two days ago. Just refresh
29. your memory, we adopted four amendments...or adopted
30. three amendments, defeated one. But we adopted an
31. amendment that took care of transfer of function from
32. one...taxing unit to another. We adopted amendment
33. that would not put this bill if it became law in conflict

1. with the...a proposed new school formula so that we
2. do not discourage any school district from obtaining
3. the maximum State aid. We adopted an amendment that
4. exempted from the freeze any new parcels. In other
5. words, new construction whether it be in the form of
6. industrial or...industrial park or a new residential
7. development from...accruing to the benefit of the
8. taxing district. And then Senator Knuppel's amend-
9. ment, lastly, that directed that the Department of
10. Local Government would make up the difference or the
11. loss between what the taxing district could have gotten
12. if the extensions were not frozen. ...Let me just
13. point out that this is a far different concept in
14. its present form from what we originally talked about
15. as a real estate tax freeze last Fall in the special
16. Session. We had several hearings at that time and it
17. just did not seem that there was enough time to address
18. ourselves to this issue. I think it is of vital im-
19. portance that this is not something standing by itself
20. we are talking about. We might adopt a new formula that
21. would allow the State to pay as we must at some time
22. more of the State aid to schools. We know that we have
23. to study and make changes and improvements in the assess-
24. ment procedures. And we have at least two groups that are
25. going to be addressing themselves to that during the
26. coming interim in the next year. Because those assess-
27. ment procedures have got to be improved. Most important
28. I think we have talked a lot about tax relief. I
29. personally think that to the people of this State who
30. own real estate, who own their own home, that this is
31. the most meaningful form of tax relief that we could
32. give to them. And that is at least a partial slowdown
33. of the increase every year in their real estate tax

1. because the other things that we've talked about in
2. my opinion are in the terms of maybe \$10 per individual
3. or pennies on the sales tax. But we know that our real
4. estate taxes all over the State have been going up, not
5. \$10 but by the hundred or maybe two hundred dollars
6. every year and...in a bi...in a quadrennial it's often
7. more. I just recall...recall the incident I mentioned
8. to you the other day, in our hearing last February up
9. in Palatine, an...retired couple in Evanston whose taxes
10. went up in one year from \$500 to \$1200. And this man
11. was frantic because he wanted to keep his home. I think
12. this is a vital issue. I'd be happy to try and answer
13. any questions anybody has. I think most of you know
14. what the issues are and what the exemptions are.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

16. Senator Soper.

17. SENATOR SOPER:

18. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I rise to
19. support this bill at this time. The amendments made it
20. a very good bill. We'll...we'll have the proper freeze
21. for the little home owner and we won't preclude the
22. schools from getting their fair share...money that's
23. necessary to run the schools. So with further...without
24. further ado I think we've discussed this thing and I don't
25. think we can say anymore about it. I think we ought to
26. pass this bill.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. Senator Sours.

29. SENATOR SOURS:

30. Mr. President, Senators, I, too...if anything has
31. impressed or ought to impress members of legislative
32. bodies it is the cries of the real estate property tax
33. payer. In my town of Peoria, the Town of the City of

1. Peoria, the rate this year has gone from \$5.30 per
2. \$100 equalized valuation to \$5.74 per \$100 equalized
3. assessed valuation. Now for someone for example who
4. had a \$20,000 family residence maybe retired living
5. on social security and other pension benefits this
6. would mean if the house were valued at \$20,000 which in
7. these days is a rather modest domicile the tax in-
8. crease itself would be around \$45. Now as Senator
9. Soper has suggested and Senator Clarke has stated
10. in explaining the bill all new construction, all im-
11. provements for structural repairs or additions to
12. old structures will not be frozen but will be additional
13. valuation resulting in additional taxation. Now this
14. is something that has been long in coming and if we permit
15. the local taxing bodies being pressured primarily for
16. salary increases which undeniably increase inflationary
17. troubles we're in for it and it is time that someone did
18. just what this bill does. And I just wish we could all
19. send a personal letter to each one of our Congressmen
20. suggesting that a little economy and a little husbandry
21. might not be the wrong approach in the District of
22. Columbia. The big demon today is Uncle Sam. And this
23. Legislature has not been too much of a slouch either
24. on increasing taxes. This is long overdue. I'm tired
25. of talking about it. And I hope this bill passes.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

27. Senator Rock.

28. SENATOR ROCK:

29. Thank you Mr. President. Just a parliamentary in-
30. quiry ruling from the Chair. My understanding is that
31. when this legislation was before the House the Speaker
32. ruled it was preemptive as I believe it to be and there-
33. fore requires a three-fifth vote of the General Assembly.

1. I would ask the Chair for a ruling under Article 7,
2. Section 6G of our Constitution that this is in fact
3. preemptive and requires a three-fifth vote.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

5. The Chair would rule that it would take 30 votes
6. Senator Rock. Senator Knuepfer.

7. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

8. Well, I hate to take issue with my colleague
9. Senator Clarke on this because I know he has labored
10. hard to come up with some kind of a package that could
11. freeze taxes. I would suggest that this is a sub-
12. stantially better bill than it was prior to the amend-
13. ments that were put on the other day. But I want to
14. suggest as well that it takes no great courage for this
15. Body to freeze somebody else's income. Now the day I
16. can support this kind of legislation is when we say we're
17. going to freeze the extension, the amount of money the
18. State government spends. It's easy to tell someone else
19. how to get along on what they've got. It's much more
20. difficult to make do yourself with what you've got. We've made
21. made no attempt this Session whatsoever to live anywhere
22. close to the expenditures of last year. And now we pre-
23. sume to tell the local governments of this State that
24. they ought to be able to get along with what they had
25. last year. Some of these governments have been the bene-
26. ficiary of Federal revenues from the Revenue sharing pro-
27. gram. But many others have been...have not had...received any
28. additional funds. Inflation affects them and their em-
29. ployees and where is the additional money to pay for pay
30. raises for their employees? Even those who have been the
31. beneficiary of Revenue sharing have also found that at
32. the same time the Federal government withdrawing the
33. categorical programs so that they have felt impelled by

1. the demands and requests of their citizenry to sub-
2. stitute the revenue sharing...use the revenue sharing
3. funds for the categorical programs which are no longer
4. being used. I would concur with what Senator Sours
5. says about Washington. I would concur with what...that..
6. that we ought to take action as well. Neither one of us has
7. had the guts to do anything and we are simply suggesting
8. that the evil one is local government that is creating
9. all the spending. I suggest to you that is not true. If
10. we can't keep our house in order and maintain our level
11. of expenditure why saddle somebody else with the job?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

13. Senator Wooten. Senator, I'm...I recognized you
14. but you're about number five on the list. I'm going by
15. the number here.

16. SENATOR WOOTEN:

17. Thank you very much Mr. President and colleagues.
18. This is an extremely difficult vote and I believe some
19. of the agitation for this particular movement began in
20. my community. However, it is only fair to point out
21. that none of that agitation originates from those who
22. are charged with local government at the county level,
23. municipal level, township level. Indeed, I know in one
24. or two circumstances a genuine freeze will drive one
25. township out of business. It seems to me that we have
26. placed obligations on our counties enjoining them to
27. raise minimum salaries. The new Constitution took away
28. from them the fee for collecting taxes and they are in
29. serious straights. And now we come along with, I think,
30. a somewhat righteous air and tell them that you simply
31. cannot take action to keep your books balanced. We
32. want you to stop right here. I think the skids for this
33. bill is somewhat greased because we did put on an amendment

1. saying that State government will take up the difference.
2. And that, of course, shifts it from our back on to the
3. Governor's because he now must veto this bill. They...
4. every sword cuts two ways, you can argue for and against
5. this bill. You can point out virtue and vice on either side.
6. But it seems to me in all candor and with all due deference
7. to the sponsor and those who worked so hard, that in its
8. present shape the bill is pretty much of a fraud. And I
9. must abstain from participating in voting.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

11. Senator Bell.

12. SENATOR BELL:

13. Well, Mr. President, fellow members of the Senate,
14. I don't think that this bill is a fraud. I think it's
15. a statement of intent on the part of the General Assembly
16. that we're going to continue the thrust that started so
17. to speak at the top by the Federal Government through
18. revenue sharing in the last few years. That we're going
19. to try to backtrack on some of...tremendously costly,
20. wasteful programs and that we're making a statement to
21. the people in local government that we are concerned that
22. we want to do our part to try to reverse what has been
23. going on during the last twenty years, specifically the
24. last five years. And I think it is something we must
25. address ourselves to in a positive manner because without
26. doing it we're not continuing with what the people of
27. this State are asking or actually what the people of this
28. nation are asking. And it is not a fraud. The State of
29. Illinois is saying with this bill as amended that we're
30. going to return to you, local government, what you can't
31. exist without. And that's money but from the State coffer.
32. And that it is in my humble opinion along with Senator
33. Clarke's one of the most meaningful tax reductions that

1. this State can make. Whether we're talking about a
2. tax on utilities as proposed by Governor Walker which
3. is regressive in my humble opinion or whether we're
4. talking about a half a percent cut in sales tax which
5. I think is meaningful but I don't know how significant.
6. Well this is significant, this is significant and I
7. would hope that the members of this General Assembly
8. will see the significance to it, to the people of this
9. State and will endorse it by an aye vote.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

11. Now we'll hear from Senator Merritt.

12. SENATOR MERRITT:

13. Yes, Mr. President, I'm glad I got on somebody's
14. list although not exactly the President's list. ...Mr.
15. President, members of the Senate, it's been said here
16. a minute ago I believe by Senator Wooten that this bill's
17. a fraud on the people. Well I'm telling you very loudly
18. and strongly as I'm told by the people of my district
19. they're sick and tired and fed up with this ever increasing
20. taxes and it's about time that some of us exercised some
21. responsibility and began to face the issue squarely at
22. this time. This is not a forever deal. This is for a
23. two year period while we certainly have the opportunity
24. in this Legislature of addressing ourselves to some
25. permanent solution of this important problem. But the
26. important thing is in the meantime taxes will remain the
27. same. Now just getting back to some cases right back
28. in my hometown county where we've done a tremendous job
29. of increasing our assessments the past year, in fact
30. such a good job that the multiplier was reduced. Well
31. I'm telling you when assessments go up for instance one
32. third in one year in a county and the tax rates remain
33. the same it does nothing but...produce monies and revenues

1. to already over hungry taxing bodies and they will
2. not reduce rates as assessments goes up. They want
3. those monies badly and they'll spend them. This is
4. a step really, truly in the direction and the interest
5. of our taxpayers who have been long forgotten by
6. this Body. And I'm certainly going to be one
7. that's most happy to support this legislation keeping
8. in mind the amendment that does return the lost revenues
9. by the State of Illinois through the government...
10. of local government affairs...Department of Local
11. Government Affairs. And I would urge all other
12. members of this Body who are interested in really
13. doing something for the people back home, the long
14. forgotten poor stiff on the street, the forgotten
15. citizen to support it.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. Sen...will the guests in the gallery please re-
18. frain from any exhibition please. The next speaker
19. will be Senator Buzbee.

20. SENATOR BUZBEE:

21. Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President had
22. HB 911 come up before this Body without Amendment
23. No. 5 we put on the other day, which says that the
24. Department of Local Government Affairs will fur-
25. nish the money back to those taxing districts...would
26. have lost under the tax freeze. I'm not sure how I
27. would have voted on HB 911. However, Mr. President,
28. during the length of my campaign last year I wrote a
29. position paper on how I felt about various issues. A
30. good portion of that position paper was devoted to the sub-
31. ject of tax reform. And in that position paper I took
32. the position then and I still strongly support the
33. position of increased State aid to local schools so that

1. we can have a decrease in local property taxes. Now
2. at this point, Mr. President, I don't claim to have any
3. crystal ball and I'm not sure where the money for in-
4. creased State aid to local schools is going to come
5. from. I think a lot of us may suspect where it may
6. come from someday but as of right now I don't think in
7. my area that we can stand anymore property tax increases.
8. I certainly didn't want to see our local schools be hurt
9. under HB 911 as...as it was originally written. But with
10. the amendment this is entirely in keeping with my philos-
11. ophy of the financing of local schools and as 911 is written
12. therefore other local government units. That the State of
13. Illinois will participate more in the funding of especially
14. local schools and give our property taxpayers a very badly
15. needed tax relief. So I rise in support of HB 911.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. Senator Mitchler.

18. SENATOR MITCHLER:

19. Thank you, Mr. President. You know...when the first
20. concept of this property tax freeze was injected in the
21. Illinois General Assembly last Session by Representative
22. McCormick it received quite a bit of publicity and
23. certainly the very name of the legislation is very much
24. accepted. Property tax freeze. We all know, each and
25. everyone in this Body and in the House, throughout the
26. State know that people are very disgruntled with property
27. taxes. They were very disgruntled with personal property
28. taxes, we've eliminated those, now it's real estate taxes.
29. So when you talk about a tax freeze bill how could you not
30. support such a thing? But you really know it really is...
31. was a misnomer because it did not guarantee you what you
32. thought you were getting as a taxpayer in the State. Now if
33. the bill said in the legislation that was adopted would

1. say that your tax bill for the next two years would not
2. exceed what it was at the present time maybe that would
3. be something pretty good. But there are a lot of ifs,
4. ands and buts built into that legislation. I could not
5. support the tax freeze even though it sounded good be-
6. cause it was a misnomer and up until this point I have
7. voted present in Committee and expressed myself so.
8. But we do have an amendment on this bill now that allows
9. local governments to...in certain cases as provided for in
10. the legislation to have increases in the taxes to meet
11. the needs of the local governmental units but the State
12. will reimburse and make up the difference if there is
13. a loss so that you can move forward in the fast growing
14. areas so that you can continue to develop under home
15. rule powers and authority without being chained down by a
16. tax freeze bill in legislation enacted by the State
17. that is detrimental to local government. Now, when
18. HB 911 first came up for our consideration I took that
19. position which restricts the ability of local govern-
20. mental units to raise sufficient funds to sustain
21. effective government that this would not benefit my
22. district. Now that position holds because I represent
23. a very extraordinary district that's expanding as fast
24. as any in the entire State. But with this amendment I
25. can support this legislation and for the next two years
26. I hope that it is effective. And HB 911 as amended
27. which is a compromise that a lot of people back home
28. and throughout the State don't understand must take
29. place before many of us can act on legislation such as
30. this. HB 911, the property tax freeze bill coupled with
31. our Republican tax package would I...which I supported
32. which reduces the State sales tax by a full half cent,
33. those two things will give to the people of the State of

1. Illinois tax relief. Not tax reform or you're shifting
2. it from one place to another. And that's what they want
3. and I know that's what they're going to get, as far as
4. this Senator goes, is tax relief. And 911, HB, coupled
5. with that one half cent reduction sales tax is going to
6. give the people of the State a very good piece of tax
7. relief for this Session.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. Senator Fawell.

10. SENATOR FAWELL:

11. I, as has been indicated, it is not easy to oppose some-
12. thing which is called a tax freeze. I think there are
13. many inequities in this bill. I think it is unconsti-
14. tutional. But I just want to look at one phase which I
15. think perhaps some of you may not be aware of. This is
16. a freeze of assessments and for any of you who represent
17. areas which are growing very fast this bill, if it were
18. ever signed by the Governor, I don't think many of us
19. really believe the Governor could possibly sign it but
20. if it were it would say this: That if you happen to have
21. some real estate which was assessed as improved real
22. estate prior to December 1st, 1972 I believe is the date,
23. or '73. If it was prior...if it was previously assessed
24. as improved then in that regard you do not have a right to
25. take into consideration any further improvements in de-
26. termining what the assessed valuation for the taxing district
27. the schools and the municipalities are concerned. That is
28. they cannot apply their tax rate against any...the increased
29. assessed valuation attributable to the improvements of
30. tax parcels which previously were assessed as improved.
31. Example No. 1, a three hundred acre farm being developed,
32. it has...it is on the tax books as a parcel which is im-
33. proved, with a farmhouse and the barn. Under this bill you

1. could put sixteen hundred homes onto that property and
2. you could not take into consideration the improvements
3. in increasing the assessed valuation for the application
4. of the tax rates of the schools and the municipalities. Just
5. unthinkable. It would bankrupt any community, any school
6. district, any municipality in a fast growth area. That's
7. just one reason why it...it...it couldn't possibly...see this
8. bill ever signed into law and...and I think although the motivation
9. are...are excellent here. Although we all have empathies
10. for the beleaguered taxpayers of which we are a part this
11. is...it ends up being...not a misrepresentation, I don't
12. mean anybody's motivated to try to fool anybody but it just
13. is nothing. It can't possibly work. It's just some-
14. thing that ought to be laid to rest and then we ought to go
15. back to the drawing boards and try to...to perhaps freeze
16. the rates so that the taxing bodies can't increase their
17. rates but by no means monkey with the assessments because
18. unless the State of Illinois is willing to come in and just
19. take over the increased cost that I have indicated comes
20. when you have a hundred thousand people coming in as we
21. have in communities in DuPage and Kane and Lake and these
22. areas. It...it just...this just can't possibly work, I am
23. prepared to vote no and I know I have many people back in
24. my home district misunderstand. And I'll have to do a lot
25. of letter writing but I think it's the only vote that one
26. can have.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. ...Walker.

29. SENATOR WALKER:

30. ...Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate.

31. I'd like to move the previous question. I think we've
32. heard enough debate on this.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

1. No...we did have five more speakers... What is
2. the will of the Body? Senator Walker moves the pre-
3. vious question. All those in favor signify by saying
4. aye. Opposed? So ordered. Senator Clarke may con-
5. clude.

6. SENATOR CLARKE:

7. Well, Members I think that the discussion in-
8. dicates that you're all familiar with the subject.
9. You've heard something about it and you've been
10. thinking about it and I think that's good. I'd just
11. like to conclude by pointing out once again that I think
12. that this could be one of the most significant steps
13. that this Session takes in terms of moving toward
14. equalization and reallocation of our resources in this
15. State. I, too, share the intrinsic distrust of trying
16. to freeze some other government, but a homeowner who
17. has a tax bill that has fifteen taxing districts that
18. make up that bill has no recourse other than to this
19. Body. And I think that we do have a responsibility
20. I don't hold this out as a panacea. It is only a tem-
21. porary step while we do and urge others to do reforms
22. that will give some permanent relief. I'd like to
23. speak though once again as I did two days ago to the
24. last point that Senator Fawell made because I think it's
25. important. The fact of the matter is that if you don't freeze
26. assessments as well as rates it's meaningless to the tax-
27. payer because we all know how assessors can manipulate
28. or how they can increase, and maybe they don't do it. Maybe
29. the multiplier does it from the State, or maybe it's
30. the quadrennial assessment that does it. I'd like to
31. point out that this would be of benefit not just to
32. homeowners but to renters because the tax bill is included
33. in the rent. So this means a great many people who would
benefit. And lastly, I have checked out again with the

1. experts such as the Civic Federation and the Tax-
2. payers Federation. And Senator Fawell's example
3. of the sixteen hundred homes coming in is just
4. not so because each one of those homes would be a
5. new parcel and would be exempt. And those fast
6. growing areas would have the benefit of that assess-
7. ment. But improvement^s in assessments would give relief
8. to the taxpayers and that's good. I think this is
9. a good bill as it stands. I urge an aye vote.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

11. Question is, shall HB 911 pass? And on that
12. question the Secretary will call the roll.

13. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

14. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
15. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
16. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
17. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
18. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
19. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. Clarke...Clarke, aye. President Harris, aye.
27. Harber Hall, aye. Howard Mohr, aye. Netsch, aye.
28. Swinarski, aye. Ok. On that question the yeas are 50.
29. The nays are 4. One voting present. HB 911 having
30. received the constitutional majority is declared
31. passed. 999, Senator Schaffer. I wonder if the members
32. would be kind enough to advise the Chair of bills that
33. they have on third reading that they don't intend to call.

1. It would make our job a lot easier in trying to
2. figure out what we have left to do. If you have
3. a bill that you're not going to call, you don't
4. have to Table it but just let us know. Either
5. Table it or let us know. Senator Fawell, 1105?
6. Okay. 1323, Senator McCarthy? 1360...1507,
7. Senator Bruce? 1528, Senator Mitchler. Senator
8. Mitchler, 1528? Call, 1528.

9. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

10. HB 1528. (Secretary reads title of bill).
11. 3rd reading of the bill.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

13. Senator Mitchler.

14. SENATOR MITCHLER:

15. ...This is the bill that does exactly that. It
16. continues the Labor Laws Study Commission for fiscal
17. year '74. The appropriation for the Labor Laws Study
18. Commission is contained in an amendment to HB 1937.
19. And I would ask for a favorable roll call HB 1528.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Further discussion? The question is, shall HB
22. 1528 pass? And on that question the Secretary will
23. call the roll.

24. SECRETARY:

25. Bartu...Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
26. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
27. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
28. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
2. Well, wants to make sure they're...
3. on that question the yeas are 37. The nays are
4. none. HB 1528 having received the constitutional
5. majority is declared passed. Senator McCarthy.
6. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
7. Yes...Mr. President, is the point of personal
8. privilege still in order?
9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
10. It's always in order, Senator.
11. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
12. Well, I thought so because former Senator Zygmunt
13. Sokolnicki told me that was a rule that should never
14. be...taken away and he was fortified by other members
15. that formerly served with him and Senator Romano is
16. very insistent on a point of personal privilege. But
17. I'd certainly like to state my point...
18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):
19. ...Would...state your point please.
20. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
21. Yes. The Chair recently said to the Body, asked
22. us a question if we would inform the Chair what bills
23. we did not wish to have called and that would expedite
24. business. My point of personal privilege, Mr. President,
25. is I wonder as a concomitant to that if you would in-
26. form the members of the Body what bills you do not in-
27. tend to call.
28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR.MOHR):
29. I...I thought the Body's been aware of that for a
30. couple of days.
31. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
32. Why...if I'll exchange notes with you would you
33.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Senator, you know which two bills you have that
4. are being held. President Harris.

5. SENATOR HARRIS:

6. Mr. President, if Senator McCarthy will come over
7. I'll help him work up his list.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. We had success with the last announcement where I
10. suggested that members that wanted to hold a bill or
11. didn't intend to call a bill or Table a bill would let
12. us know and we've gotten about six of them off the
13. list so I'll repeat that announcement. Senator Fawell
14. has a...an amendment to a bill that's on postponed
15. consideration. Do we have leave of the Body to bring
16. back HB 1484 off of the order of postponed consideration
17. for the purpose of an amendment? Leave. Senator Fawell.

18. SENATOR FAWELL:

19. ...Mr. President, I would like also leave of the
20. Body to return HB 1484 to the order of second reading for
21. the purpose of affixing an amendment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

23. There...is there leave to bring back this bill to
24. second? Leave is granted. All right, now, Senator Fawell
25. has an amendment. Will you explain the amendment?

26. SENATOR FAWELL:

27. Yes. Amendment No. 1, Mr. President, is an amend-
28. ment which does have the agreement of leadership on both
29. sides of the aisle. You all did hear the rather extensive
30. debate in regard to 1484 yesterday or the day before yes-
31. terday and are aware that under HB 1484 a given school
32. district has the alternative of utilizing the...what
33. we will be calling the old formula which is the current

1. formula. This amendment will produce an add-on of
2. the .19% which is now in the formula to .25%. It
3. will produce an alternative choice in regard to
4. the density factor which is applied against the
5. average daily attendance so that one can use either
6. the density factor or can use .45% which pertains
7. to the title...number of title 1 children in a
8. given school district. The estimated cost of those
9. districts which might opt to utilize this alternative
10. is estimated to be in the area...the cost is estimated
11. to be in the area of approximately \$10,000,000. Suffice
12. it to say however it is agreed to by many persons who
13. have labored quite long in regard to trying to work out
14. a distributive formula here which is acceptable and
15. thus I do present it to the Body for adoption, Amend-
16. ment No. 1.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

18. Sen...Senator Hynes.

19. SENATOR HYNES:

20. I would second Senator Fawell's comments and move
21. the adoption of this amendment. We had lengthy dis-
22. cussion of the bill in its original form the other day
23. and suffice it to say that many of us felt that there
24. were defects which perhaps is always the case with a
25. ...with a new concept. I think some of those defects
26. are cured here. Some remain and I think we will have
27. an opportunity to work on those as we go along. This
28. will assist I think in a rather substantial way many
29. of those districts that were not being treated as well
30. as we thought they ought under the original proposal.
31. I would urge the adoption of this amendment.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. ...zbee.

1. SENATOR BUZBEE:

2. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. As it's been
3. pointed out by the previous two speakers...this
4. particular bill has been the subject of quite some
5. controversy and I think with this amendment that
6. we have worked out many of the bugs that some of
7. us felt were in...in the bill as...as was pre-
8. viously written. Now I personally don't feel that
9. this is still...makes it a perfect bill but I think
10. that it does give those downstate schools that we
11. felt were going to be hurt under the previous bill
12. somewhat, it does give us a chance to get a little
13. more equalization. For instance, we're going to
14. increase the weighted average daily attendance from
15. 19% to 25%. That is used as a multiplier, of course.
16. And that will give a considerable amount of increase
17. plus we're going to leave in the disadvantaged factor
18. ...and the density bonus. Now, what this bill will do
19. will add on somewhere between eight to ten million
20. dollars which will go primarily, we feel, to downstate
21. schools. Downstate schools being those outside of the
22. urban six county area because the bill as it's now
23. written in the amended form if we accept this amendment,
24. the schools will have the option of either using the
25. equalization under...under 1484 or they will have the
26. option of using the old formula we presently go under
27. with these two add-ons. Going from average...weighted
28. dai...

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. For what purpose does Senator Bell rise?

31. SENATOR BELL:

32. ...Mr. President, could we get some...some order
33. here in the side gallery, we can't hear what's going on.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. I've been...

3. SENATOR BELL:

4. I'm sorry to interrupt...

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. ...trying for three months. I'll try again.

7. The caucuses around Senator Bell please go out in the...

8. in the rotunda, he can't hear the debate.

9. SENATOR BUZBEE:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. I think this is an
11. extremely important piece of legislation because we
12. have just been talking about increased State aid to
13. schools and lack of State aid of schools and so forth
14. under HB 911. And now in this bill we're trying to do
15. something about it. And as I was saying I feel like
16. that this will give...I don't feel like, I know that this
17. will give school districts the option of going under
18. the...HB 1484 as it's presently written or it will
19. give them the option of going under the old formula but
20. with this increase in of 6% in the weight...average
21. weighted daily attendance and with the...density bonus
22. and the disadvantage factor added in also. So, again,
23. even though we from downstate may not feel like we're getting
24. all that we really should be getting I think this certainly makes
25. the bill a lot more palatable and it will give, it looks
26. like, at the present time that added eight to ten
27. million dollars would go almost all to downstate schools
28. because it would be to the advantage of the Chicago
29. schools as well as those urban schools in the six county
30. area. They probably will be to their advantage to go
31. under HB 1484 as it's presently written. So I would
32. urge a favorable roll call on Amendment No. 1, I assume
33. it is, to HB 1484.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. Any further debate? Senator Partee.

3. SENATOR PARTEE:

4. Well I just wanted to publicly thank those
5. members of our group and the other House for this
6. last minute job of trying to get this thing put
7. on track. And I don't want to sound a discordant
8. note but I'm becoming more and more wary of our
9. commissions and our commissions system. We have
10. a School Problems Commission that meets all the
11. time. In every single year we come down to the
12. wire and just a handful of guys sit down and
13. work out what our formula is going to be. And I
14. just simply say that I would hope that the School
15. Problems Commission could give us a little more
16. enlightenment on these subjects in the years to
17. come - because I think as of the moment we're get-
18. ting nothing much but rhetoric.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Any further discussion? The question before
21. the Senate is, shall the amendment pending to HB
22. 1484 be adopted? All in favor will signify by
23. saying aye. Opposed? The ayes have it and the
24. amendment is adopted? Any further amendments
25. from the Floor? Bill will be returned to the order
26. of consideration postponed. ...Next bill will be
27. 1611, Senator Dougherty.

28. SECRETARY:

29. HB 1611...

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Is it...Sours'? Just a minute. One moment.
32. Yes, it's Senator Sours'. He...

33. SECRETARY:

1. HB 1611. (Secretary reads title of bill).
2. 3rd reading of the bill.
3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
4. Senator from Peoria.
5. SENATOR SOURS:
6. Mr. President, Senators, don't let the...
7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
8. Just a moment. Continue.
9. SENATOR SOURS:
10. Mr. President and Senators, the syllabus of this
11. bills is erroneous in an amount-it states in the syllabus
12. 72,000. That has been reduced to \$9600. That is the
13. appropriation for the deputy coroners in two of the Ill-
14. inois trauma districts. The other day we discussed briefly
15. the trauma district law which necessitates in many cases
16. a considerable increased activity on the part of a
17. coroner. Now, in the Town of Peoria for example, the
18. City of Peoria, County of Peoria, our coroner has had
19. a tremendous increase in business, grisly as it is
20. because many people involved in horrible auto accidents
21. are brought to Peoria because of the hospital complex
22. there and they die in Peoria County. This bill would
23. permit the payment of \$400 per month, \$4800 a year, to
24. a deputy coroner in two areas of the State. That is all
25. this bill does. I trust it will pass.
26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
27. Further discussion? Senator Mitchler, were you
28. asking for...?
29. SENATOR MITCHLER:
30. Yes. I'd like to ask the sponsor a question....
31. I know...
32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
33. He indicates he'll yield.

1. SENATOR MITCHLER:

2. I know he'll...the State's Attorney up in Kane
3. County contacted me recently and he pointed out that
4. because in Kane County they have a number of State
5. institutions, the Elgin State Hospital, St. Charles
6. Training School for Boys, Valley View Training
7. School for Boys, Geneva Training School for Girls,
8. a number of other State institutions. He claims that he's
9. got a little bit...additional work too...as a State's
10. Attorney, I'm very serious about this, and he was
11. asking me to research to see if there could be
12. additional compensation from the State for those
13. State's Attorneys that have that additional work.
14. Do you believe in that concept too?

15. SENATOR SOURS:

16. I have never actually believed in...what we
17. used to call the impacted areas, Senators. And I'm
18. not so sure that your State's Attorney is overburdened.
19. I do know that in Peoria County our coroner is officiating
20. in coroner's inquest about 4 to 1 because people are
21. brought there-for example across the river is Taze-
22. well County-there's been a...there's been a...death
23. corner there, there's been twelve people killed in the
24. last year. They're brought to Peoria and they die in
25. one of the hospitals in Peoria and coroner is busy all
26. the time. Now I don't know what your situation is in Kane
27. County, if it is impacted, then that would be a fit matter
28. for you to present a matter here in the...in the Senate
29. for us to consider. Now that's as far as I can go on that.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Senator Wooten.

32. SENATOR WOOTEN:

33. Just a question. You mention there were two areas.

1. What is the other area, Senator, Senator?

2. SENATOR SOURS:

3. Senator if you hadn't asked me I'd probably
4. have known but I just can't recall. There are two
5. trauma centers that will be affected by this bill.
6. And I can't tell you the other one, I'll have to
7. get the bill and send you an autographed copy later

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Any further discussion? The question before
10. the Senate is, shall HB 1611 pass? Secretary will
11. call the roll.

12. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

13. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
14. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
15. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
16. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
17. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
18. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,
19. Ozinga, Palmer, Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano,

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Buzbee, no. Sours, aye. Roe, no. The question
25. ...on this question the yeas were 42. The nays are 5.
26. The bill having received the constitutional majority
27. is therefore declared passed. Now Ladies and Gentlemen
28. of the Senate,...Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
29. we have upon the Secretary's table a tremendous amount
30. of paper work consisting of either concurrences or
31. nonconcurrences on Messages from the House. In addition
32. to that we have the Executive Committee Report but we
33. must get to work on these concurrences and nonconcurrences

1. and as we have no way of having any advanced knowledge of
2. what bills are coming over in these Messages necessarily
3. we can not alert you and that's unfortunate but that's
4. the way it is. So the only answer to the problem is
5. for us to stay in our seats and be attentive to the
6. Secretary's proclamations so that you may act properly
7. on a measure that may be affecting you. Mr. Secretary.
8. SECRETARY:

9. A Message from the House by Mr. Selcke.

10. (Secretary reads Message from the House).

11. HB 620, Senator Knuepfer.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Senator Knuepfer.

14. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

15. Well, I move that we refuse to recede and that a
16. conference committee be appointed.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. We refuse to recede and inform the House and if
19. they refuse to accede to our request, I think then
20. the conference committee is appointed. No. You asked
21. for a conference committee. The House will be so advised.
22. The motion is that the Senate do refuse to recede and ask for
23. a committee on conference. All in favor signify by saying
24. aye. Opposed? The ayes have it and the conference com-
25. mittee will be appointed.

26. SECRETARY:

27. HB 856, Senator Shapiro. The House refused to concur
28. with the Senate in the adoption of the Senate Amendment.

29. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

30. ...Mr. President and members of the Senate, I move...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator Shapiro. Senator, our staff has had...not
33. had an opportunity to review that I believe and would you

1. withhold action on that for...momentarily? This
2. one apparently has been cleared. Senator Shapiro.
3. What is your motion, Senator? He's holding it.
4. Take it out of the record.
5. SECRETARY:
6. The next...the next bill, HB 1133, Senator Rock.
7. The House refused to concur with the Senate in the
8. adoption of the Senate Amendments 1, 2 and 3.
9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
10. We do not have that one analyzed either, Senator
11. Rock, so...he does...our staff doesn't. Try again.
12. SECRETARY:
13. HB 1282, Senator Harber Hall. The House refused
14. to concur with the Senate in the adoption of Senate
15. Amendment No. 1 to HB 1282.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
17. ...Senator Partee.
18. SENATOR PARTEE:
19. Mr. President, I think to facilitate this matter and
20. to move it along both ways let's have a list of those
21. Messages when they come over given to both staffs so that
22. when we get back to them we...will have had time to
23. analyze them. Now some of the numbers that are being
24. called now we are not aware of it and your staff ob-
25. viously is...is already analyzing them. Now that's
26. just not the way to run a railroad.
27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
28. I'm not so sure that they're aware of it either
29. but they're not on my list as having been analyzed.
30. That's all I know, Senator.
31. SENATOR PARTEE:
32. Well, let's do that. As soon as they come in
33. let us...we should both get a list. You get a list, we

1. get a list and we can start moving and you can too.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. Senator Harris. Let's revert to the order of
4. conference committee reports while we're settling
5. this question, Mr. Secretary. We could go to
6. Executive Committee. While we're getting it all
7. straightened up I recognize the Senator from Ever-
8. green Park. No? Committee Reports.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senator Ozinga, the Chairman of the Committee
11. on Executive to which was referred the Governor's
12. Messages of June 29 reports the same back with a
13. recommendation the Senate advise and consent to the
14. following appointments:

15. (Secretary reads Governor's Messages).

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. Senator Ozinga.

18. SENATOR OZINGA:

19. Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would

23. It's been moved by Senator Ozinga that the Senate do
24. now resolve itself into Executive Session for the

27. Senate is now in Executive Session. Senator Ozinga.

28. SENATOR OZINGA:

29. The Senate having resolved itself into Executive

9. PPRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. Senator Weaver.

11. SENATOR WEAVER:

12. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. You've heard the motion of the Senator from
17. Urbana. All in favor signify by saying aye.

20. George Washington that hangs in the rotunda of the
21. Capitol. Mr. and Mrs. August C. Meyers of Champaign
22. are donating to the State of Illinois this picture

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Senator Weaver moves the suspension of the Rules

29. lined. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed?

31. is adopted. Senator O...

32. SENATOR OZINGA:

33. And now Mr. President I would move that the

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. All in favor signify by saying aye. The Senate
4. has arisen from Executive Session. Senator ParTEE.

5. SENATOR PARTEE:

6. Mr. President, while we are on the order of
7. resolutions I'd like...I just have two resolutions
8. I'd like to take them together, they're both con-
9. gratulatory resolutions. And it happens that on
10. July 4th two men who have given a lot of their
11. lives to this Senate will be enjoying a birthday.
12. One of them no longer is with us, the other still is
13. with us. These two congratulatory resolutions I would

27. SENATOR SMITH:

28. Mr. Chairman, you know this is an extraordinary
29. honor that you do me here and now. My wife just came
30. in from the Floor and she will tell you that at the
31. time that I was told to return to the Senate Floor with the
32. young Senator Daley and my wife and I we were looking
33. at pictures that were taken the day that I was sworn

1. into the Illinois General Assembly. The year was 1942.

14. as well. I respect and appreciate their opinions of
15. each and every man and the lady members as well. It's...
16. true that oftentimes I might differ with your con-
17. clusions but I have for the most part this Session
18. held myself to this chair. And my main participation has
19. been to say aye or no because I swore to that girl, the
20. wife of my bosom, that I intended to make this Session
21. without being carried again over here to the hospital as I...
22. as has been true during previous Sessions. I'm thank-
23. ful to you Mr. Leader for the fact of the recognition
24. of the fact that the 4th of July is my birthday. While
25. on my feet may I call your attention to the fact that
26. the other name that was mentioned, W. Russell Arrington,
27. was in the City of Ch...Springfield on yesterday. He
28. came from out in the eastern part of this State here to
29. Springfield. He stopped down here at the State House
30. Inn and he then proceeded down to.. what is the name of
31. the city-Bell...Bell...whatever it is I didn't quite get
32. it. Belleville for the purpose of being in attendance
33. at a school celebration there. A school that he once

1. attended some 50 years ago. I hope and believe that
2. we will be able to continue until the close of this
3. Session, God willing, I will not have been carried
4. again to the hospital. Have a happy holiday.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. The Chair recognizes Senator Walker.

7. SENATOR WALKER:

8. ...Thank you Mr. President and members of the
9. Senate, if we're still on the order of resolutions
10. and I assume we are I have one downn there that's
11. a very short one that I would appreciate if the
12. Clerk would read and I'd like to address myself
13. to it for just a minute.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Can you name the principal?

21. Sen...Senator Walker.

22. SENATOR WALKER:

23. ...Thank you Mr. President and members of the
24. Senate...first I would like to say that I think as a
25. number of the rest of you do that Bob Howard would have
26. made a wonderful legislator. He has an adept and ana-
27. lytical mind and since he's les...left the Tribune and
28. I understand the fruits of his retirement are coming
29. from the publication of his book rather than his salary
30. from the Tribune. I found him articulate, persuasive
31. and I would like for the...leave for the rest of the
32. members of the Senate to join me and inasmuch as Bob
33. I really believe is retiring this time, he retired two

1. years ago but I think this one is going to stick. I'd
2. sure appreciate it Mr. President and fellow members and
3. sister members of this Senate if we could just hear a
4. few words from Bob Howard he's close to a microphone
5. right down here on my right.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Would you move for the adoption of the resolution?
8. Move the adoption of the resolution. All in favor sig-
9. nify by saying aye. Opposed? The ayes have it. The
10. resolution is adopted. The Chair recognizes Senator
11. Howard.

12. MR. HOWARD:

13. Keep on...keep on calling the roll. Thank you
14. very much. I'll be back to see ya.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Senator Harris. One more resolution.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senate Resolution 242 by Senator Newhouse and
19. it's a congratulatory resolution.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Congratulatory. Senator Newhouse, since we are on
22. the order of resolutions moves the adoption of the reso-
23. lution, congratulatory. All in favor signify by saying
24. aye. Opposed? The ayes have it. The Resolution is
25. adopted. Senator Harris, did you seek recognition?

26. SENATOR HARRIS:

27. Yeah. I wanted to verify the roll call on Bob
28. Howard's resolution.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. It'll be July 4th on Senator Fred Smith's birthday.
31. Next bill.

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. There's one announcement. I want to alert the

1. Senate to. We have a crew of...three photographers
2. that have requested permission to take some shots,
3. they'll work for about ten minutes. I afforded them
4. this privilege. I want the members of the Senate
5. alerted to the fact that they will be working for just
6. a very short period of time and I will announce when
7. they're finished.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Straighten your ties. Do we...want to go to
10. the order of...committee reports that we should dis-
11. pose of. Let's go to the order of conference com=
12. mittee reports and your attention is invited.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Conference Committee Report on HB 143, Senator
15. Partee is the Senate sponsor.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. Senator Partee are you familiar with that?

18. SENATOR PARTEE:

19. I don't...I don't see a copy of the conference
20. committee report. Do we have it here? Take it out
21. of the record for a minute until I can find the re-
22. port. I don't see it.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Conference Committee Report on 539. HB 539.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. Who's the sponsor? Senator Schaffer. Senator
27. Schaffer is recognized.

28. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

29. ...Th...539 is...the appaloosa bill...the conference
30. committee report basically does this and our Senate amend-
31. ment...we took quarter horses out of the bill at the request
32. of the Illinois Racing Board...our House colleagues did not
33. like that...we have held meetings with the Racing Board

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1. and with the Conference Committee and the Conference
2. Committee members and the House and...the Racing Board
3. has rescinded their opposition and...the...Conference
4. Committee Report has the effect of putting quarter-
5. horses back into the act.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. You move the adoption of the Conference Committee
8. Report.

9. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

10. I do.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Any...further discussion. The Secretary will
13. call the roll.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Bartuliš, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
16. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
17. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
18. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
19. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
20. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,

30. SECRETARY:

31. HB 143.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. Senator Partee.

1. SENATOR PARTEE:

2. Thank you Mr. President, we had a chance now
3. to see that Conference Committee Report and I move
4. that the Senate adopt the Conference Committee Re-
5. port.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Senator Partee.

8. SENATOR PARTEE:

9. Yes. I move that we adopt the Conference Com-
10. mittee Report. It just changes the dates on the
11. multipliers. It has acceptance of all groups that
12. were interested.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Any further discussion? The question is, shall
15. the Senate adopt the Conference Committee Report on
16. HB 143? The Secretary will call the roll.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
19. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
20. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
21. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
22. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
23. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. Netsch, aye. Buzbee, aye. Newhouse, aye. On
30. this...on this question the yeas are 46. The nays are
31. none. The Senate does adopt the Conference Committee
32. Report on HB 143. Mr. Secretary.

33. SECRETARY:

1. HB 794. Senators Rock or Smith.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. Thank you.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. Who...who's the sponsor S...

6. SENATOR ROCK:

7. I'm...I'm...are we ready? Okay. I'm asking
8. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
9. that the Senate do concur in the Conference Com-
10. mittee Report that the Senate do concur in the
11. Conference Committee Report on HB 794.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Any discussion?

14. SENATOR ROCK:

15. There are two changes that the Conference Com-
16. mittee Report did make. We are asking that the House
17. concur in Senate Amendments 1 and 3 to that legislation
18. and that we are also suggesting by this Conference Com-
19. mittee Report that the Senate recede from Senate Amend-
20. ment No. 2. 794 as you will all recall is the lead
21. poisoning, or lead bearing substances bill. Senate
22. Amendment No. 2 was offered by Senator Mitchler, it
23. raised the percentage content from .06 to .5. The
24. Conference Committee has suggested that the Senate re-
25. cede from that amendment and I am asking this Senate
26. to concur with the report of the Conference Committee.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

28. Senator Mitchler.

29. SENATOR MITCHLER:

30. I move that...I would oppose that motion and ask
31. that...I believe the motion would be proper to...I be-
32. lieve we should defeat the motion of Senator Rock. I
33. believe that's the proper order.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
2. We only...
3. SENATOR MITCHLER:
4. The reason...the reason for this we've gone
5. over and over and over this because as we have with
6. the Conference Committee on SB 3 the paint industry
7. in the State of Illinois manufacturer paint for
8. Illinois and all fifty states and ship it to other
9. countries and they have to conform to the Federal
10. standards. Now these Federal standards-and I might
11. say that I just received a letter this morning in-
12. dicating as follows. This letter comes from Attorney
13. Edward F. O'Toole the General Council for the Chicago
14. Paint and Coating Association and he says: I have just
15. been advised that a bill has pas...been approved by
16. House Banking and Currency Committee in Congress setting
17. the lead standard for household paints at .5%. Under
18. the Federal Lead Poisoning Prevention Act it also con-
19. tains a preemption clause preempting any State or local
20. law setting a standard at variance therewith. Now, it
21. would seem to me that we're making a...much ado about
22. nothing over...whether we've got .06 or .5% the main
23. thing about this legislation is that...it has authority for
24. the Department of Public Health to go into...communities
25. where lead poisoning incidents occur and cooperate with
26. the local community authorities to prevent such things.
27. Now this is what it's all about and I think as soon as
28. we get this resolved because Dr. Lashof has told me over
29. at the State House Inn over breakfast that after the
30. Conference Committees get going she will agree to the .5%
31. and will not hold out from the Department of Public Health
32. for the .06%. So I would ask for defeat of this so that
33. we can get the bill in proper form to conform to the

1. Federal status. Thank you.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. Senator Knuepfer?

4. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

5. Yeah. I just...

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. ...Newhouse and Netsch.

8. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

9. We have debated this at least six times in my

10. memory. The best thing the sponsor could do is set...

11. lay it on the Table and take it up another Session.

12. There's no sense in going through this whole routine

13. again in which we produce 30 votes and you produce

14. 28 and...gamesmanship we need not at this ninth hour.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Senator Newhouse.

17. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

18. Wonder if Senator Mitchler would yield to a question

19. of this?

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Senator Mitchler is not the sponsor of the motion.

22. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

23. Senator Mitchler made a point, I believe Mr. President

24. that there was a preemption clause on the Federal statutes

25. ...I believe that was the point that he made. If so,...

26. the question I want to ask is if there was a preemption

27. clause if that preemption clause existed when he passed

28. this bill out of here earlier? If so, why did he pass it?

29. And if not, why did he bring up the point now?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Senator Mitchler.

32. SENATOR MITCHLER:

33. I told...Senator Newhouse I just received this. This

1. letter is dated June 28th and I opened it up on my
2. desk late this morning. I just put it with the
3. Conference Committee Report on SB 3. I just opened
4. it up a little bit ago. I think Senator Newhouse
5. you...you understand what it's all about. We down-
6. state do not have...we have nothing to go into these
7. communities as the Department of Public Health to
8. help out. You have an ordinance in the City of Chicago
9. and I assume that you have no problem with lead poisoning
10. in the City of Chicago because you've long had an ord-
11. inance, you've got it down to .06% in that ordinance
12. and I'm sure that you've got enough inspectors that
13. you've got no lead poisoning problem in Chicago. But
14. I'm going to admit we do downstate. We lost a little
15. girl in the City of Aurora and we want the help of the
16. Department of Public Health. Please give us this legis-
17. lation for downstate.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Senator Newhouse.

20. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

21. Senator, I'm perfectly willing to give you this
22. legislation. We'll give you some even stronger legis-
23. lation than you suggest. The point I would make though
24. is I...I thought I understood you to say that there was
25. a preemption clause on the Federal statute which would
26. make it beyond our competence to pass any legislation
27. whatsoever. Is that the point that you made?

28. SENATOR MITCHLER:

29. You...you could leave off the...

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MITCHLER):

31. I think...I think if the Chair might suggest we're
32. getting into a dialogue between two principles that are
33. not directly involved with the motion. I'll recognize

1. Senator Netsch.

2. SENATOR NETSCH:

3. Mr. President, I think Senator Mitchler's comments
4. ...from the letter he read really answer what this has
5. been...the debate has been all about. I admit these long
6. many weeks and these long many bills, the Federal govern-
7. ment has not yet changed its standards. They are 05 until
8. January 1, 1974 at which point they go to .06. ...At
9. that point we will be exactly consistent with the Federal
10. standards and they have not yet been changed. If, indeed,
11. the law that Senator Mitchler referred to that was ap-
12. proved in the Banking Committee, mind you, not by the
13. Senate or the House of Congress but only by the Banking
14. Committee if that is indeed...passed by the entire Con-
15. gress then the whole issue is resolved by the preemption
16. clause. Right now we are consistent with the Federal
17. Government. It is the proper standard and please let's
18. have it that way.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Saperstein.

21. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:

22. I rise to agree with Senator Knuepfer. It seems
23. to me that we have locked horns on this bill for at least
24. four years. And...and also it seems to me that we all
25. understand they are many of us who will not accept the
26. lower point average because we are fully convinced that
27. anything less .06 is dangerous to children. And there-
28. fore I...also would recommend this be returned to the
29. Committee if...and in the next Session or in the Fall
30. to work this problem out.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator Don Moore.

33. SENATOR DON MOORE:

1. ...Thank you Mr. President. I move the previous
2. question.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Don Moore has moved the previous question. Is leave
5. granted? Leave is granted. Senator Rock will close the
6. debate.

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. Thank you Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of
9. the Senate. I did not frankly appreciate some of the
10. comments made by Senator Knuepfer and Senator Saper-
11. stein. I think this House Bill deserves our attention
12. whether it's in the form Conference Committee report
13. or any other form. I do not intend to Table this bill.
14. This is an administration measure from the Department
15. of Public Health. There are many, many aspects of this
16. law that are essential and I stress the word essential
17. and I think it will be totally, totally irresponsible

27. correct?

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. In...in...in the absence of the adoption of joint
30. rules there is no provision I'm informed for it. The
31. second conference automatically be created.

32. SENATOR ROCK:

33. Well. All..all I'm suggesting, Sir, is I do not
wish if in fact I do not obtain the necessary affirmative

1. votes. I do not wish the bill to die. I would at
2. that point then request...second conference committee.
3. But I do not wish anybody to lay off or not vote on
4. that basis. I think this is important enough where one
5. could...should adequately state his belief. We are
6. dealing here with the question of children's lives not
7. the paint labels and I think we had better well address
8. ourselves to it. And if Dr. Lashof has made some break-
9. fast time agreement with Senator Mitchler, frankly I'm
10. not privied to that information. This is the way the
11. Department of Public Health has told me they want this
12. bill. And I would urge an affirmative vote.

31. or 28? Fawell, aye. Give me a new sheet here, I can't
32. keep up with this. Merritt, aye. Who? Merritt, aye.
33. Howard Mohr, aye, he was on the roll call. Gentlemen

1. it would be so much easier...just stay on the Floor.
2. On this question the yeas are 28. The nays are 6.
3. The bill having failed to receive the constitutional
4. majority is declared lost. Next bill... We skipped
5. over a bill because of an amendment attached on
6. third reading one of the early bills, 230. HB 230.
7. Senator ParTEE.
8. SENATOR PARTEE:
9. It's my understanding that HB 1443 was going to
10. be next.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
12. I...
13. SENATOR PARTEE:
14. ...Have Senator Harris' attention?
15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
16. Senator Harris.
17. SENATOR HARRIS:
18. Go ahead, we'll...
19. SENATOR PARTEE:
20. No. Senator Harris, I was getting to...your attention,
21. I...
22. SENATOR HARRIS:
23. Yep. You've got...
24. SENATOR PARTEE:
25. Okay. 1443, I had the understanding...
26. SENATOR HARRIS:
27. Yeah. We're going to wait a minute. We were very
28. unhappy about the results on 1012 just now. We thought
29. we had an understanding on it and we'll get to 1443 in...
30. SENATOR PARTEE:
31. Now just...just a minute, Senator Harris. Now, I
32. don't know what you thought but I had no understanding
33. with anybody on 1012 except that 1012 would be called as

1. an intervening bill between the one you called before
2. it and 1443. Now that's the way it is.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. We'll revert to the order of HB 230. Senator
5. Nimrod. It was amended...is it back yet?

6. SECRETARY:

7. HB 230. (Secretary reads title of bill).
8. 3rd reading of the bill.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. Senator Nimrod.

11. SENATOR NIMROD:

12. Mr. President, distinguished colleagues...this is
13. the bill that has for open meetings act and I think when
14. we were amending it...we were conforming with the objection
15. of Senator Rock and the...chapter 51, subsection 57 which
16. allowed for those that refused to testify on the grounds
17. that they be might be able to be a witness and that pro-
18. vision has been provided for. Also there was some in-
19. dication there...Senator Rock, I don't know whether you
20. want it mentioned about that...part about the Legislature
21. but I...I would at least defer to you for that comment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Any discussion? Senator Rock.

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. Yes, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
26. Senate, as I previously told Senator Nimrod, I am opposed
27. to HB 230. I did say that, in my opinion, the amendment
28. which he offered did preserve the rights that we afforded
29. a witness in the Evidence Act which is chapter 51 and I
30. also stated and he's quite correct that the passage of
31. a bill like this would in my opinion lead to the use of
32. television in the Chamber. Now I am well aware that the
33. Open Meetings Act as written specifically says this act

1. does not apply to the General Assembly or the
2. committees or commissions thereof. We had a long
3. drawn out fight one evening over in the State Office
4. Building with certain Chicago newspeople concerning
5. the Illinois Legislative Investigating Commission.
6. I was quite familiar with the provisions of this
7. act and that which relates to the rights of a wit-
8. ness. What I did say at that time and what I do
9. say is that if in fact legislation like this mandating
10. the broadcasting of open meetings for everyone else
11. except the General Assembly is in fact passed you can
12. rest assured that next Session there will be legis-
13. lation introduced supported and promoted by the media
14. to take that General Assembly exception out of the
15. open meetings act and we will have little, little
16. if any justification for voting against that legis-
17. lation. In my judgement there is a great deal of
18. justification for voting against this legislation.
19. We are hereby mandating county boards and city
20. councils to open their meetings to the media in
21. terms of television. Now I don't think we should do
22. that. I think that if in fact a deliberative body
23. such as the city council of the City of Chicago wants
24. to have their proceedings televised that body should
25. determine it. They have in fact done that in the
26. City of Chicago. That's their business. But to say
27. by virtue of a state law that all these bodies and all
28. these school boards and evèryone else must allow them
29. to be broadcast I think is a mistake and would urge
30. opposition to HB 230.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. Senator Knuppel.

33. SENATOR KNUPPPEL:

1. I also rise in opposition to this bill. With
2. the new types of recorders, magnetic tapes that can
3. easily be altered, spliced or otherwise these...
4. these matters can be taken out of context made to
5. appear whole and be used against people and politicians
6. and others trying to serve. And it puts the person
7. who's on the Body at the mercy of disreputable people
8. of the profession who would come in and transcribe.
9. There's no...no way of knowing that these tapes won't
10. be taken as we've just witnessed by Juckett himself
11. losing tapes and he's the sponsor of this bill. He
12. made tapes of the ISU hearings apparently. But these
13. tapes can be taken, excerpts can be taken out of con-
14. text. They can be used in political campaigns and
15. other places to destroy you for something that actually
16. you never did. I therefore feel that it's unwarranted.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Senator Sours.

19. SENATOR SOURS:

20. Mr. President, Senators, I think so far Senator
21. Rock and Senator Knuppel have been inordinately kind
22. to this bill. And I certainly have no intention of
23. incurring the wrath or enmity of Representative Juckett
24. but I'm not disposed to have the law make you and me
25. and every school board, every park board, every sanitary
26. district, every board of aldermen sell cornflakes and
27. sell that hemorrhoid medicine, whatever they call it,
28. ...what is? Preparation H, TL 70, which makes your
29. teeth glow and all the myriad of gimmicks that we now
30. have on what we modestly call the television. Now if
31. this were on a voluntary basis, fine, but I don't think
32. we ought to... Here...here, again, Gentlemen on the
33. left side you've been compelling people to do things

1. this semester and I've been opposing making people
2. do things. I'm glad to see you come over to our side.
3. And I'm tired of making people do things that they
4. shouldn't have to do. Now let's be a little sane about
5. this. I'm not going to participate in...in handing over
6. to what is also a...a misnomer media. It's not media
7. at all. I have another descriptive noun for it. I'm
8. not disposed to pass over to them the advertising
9. rights to what I have to say here tonight. And that's
10. what we're doing. And I'm looking straight at the
11. gentleman from Rock Island who apparently at sometime
12. or other pandered his living doing that. And if you
13. don't like the choice of the verb I'll find another
14. one equally as offensive. And I might also refer to
15. the gentleman from southern Illinois whom I under-
16. stand also procured his living that way, partially.
17. Now I'm not anxious to have GL 70 and cornflakes and
18. all that be sold on what public officials who are
19. elected to do something decent and kind and right and
20. good always be on the...the apprehensive and the...
21. and the worrywarts of whether they've got the blue
22. shirt on which takes well on television. To me this
23. is an outrage. I've used the word today I think the
24. descriptive adjective pernicious wants and perfidious
25. and other time: I'm going to say this is outrageous
26. and I sure hope it doesn't pass.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Any further discussion? Senator Netsch.

29. SENATOR NETSCH:

30. Mr. President, just one comment. Senator Sours
31. whose meetings do you think they are?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Senator Sours.

1. SENATOR SOURS:

2. Well if you're going to contend Senator Netsch
3. that they are exclusively John Q. Public therein I
4. shall differ with you. Now we are now in a diarrhea
5. of exposure. You go to the wailing wall and you...
6. and you hand John Q. Public a copy of your Form 1040
7. and then you got that abortion that the Governor has
8. made everyone of his employees execute consisting of
9. 50 personal questions about income and that. To me
10. that is ridiculous. That's the very...bottom of
11. mediocrity. It is not...it is not the public's right
12. to be entertained by you and me. Believe me it isn't.
13. If they want to come down and hear your deathless
14. comments on any bills here they know how to get here.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

16. Senator Netsch.

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. I hes...I hesitate to ask another rhetorical
19. question but whose money do you think it is that's
20. paying for us to put on this entertainment? That
21. is a rhetorical question Senator Sours.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Senator Knuepfer.

24. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

25. Senator Sours...Senator Knuppel, I think you're
26. fighting a battle that's already over and was over a
27. long time ago when the new Constitution and the Stat-
28. utory Authority opened meetings. These are open meetings
29. that...that are held by these local governmental bodies.
30. Now the only thing you can suggest is we ought to go to
31. the media of the 17th Century which we obviously have
32. here in the place of newspapermen rather than the media
33. of the 20th Century. We're in a new world. We deal

1. with the television. We deal with the radio. There's
2. no difference in my opinion between somebody who scribbles
3. and writes in a column and somebody who takes your pic-
4. ture or records what you've got to say. Either one can
5. be misused. Either one can be taken out of context. I
6. would invite you simply to recognize that today we have
7. some different kinds of methods and media of expressing
8. this concept of the open meeting and let them in. Let
9. the light come in.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Senator Mitchler. Any...Senator Partee.

12. SENATOR PARTEE:

13. Well, this has been very revealing discussion. I
14. happen to be on the same side of this question as Senator
15. Rock and Senator Sours. But I would point out that the
16. flower of success grows on a plan called justifiable in-
17. consistency. Senator Knuepfer was at least consistent.
18. I am going to be consistent because I voted against the
19. televisions coming in the polling places. Some persons
20. who now support this concept negatively, supported the
21. other one affirmatively. I'm going to be consistent.
22. I'm going to vote against this bill also.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Senator Wooten.

25. SENATOR WOOTEN:

26. I think a lot of what I have to say you'll be glad
27. to hear was said by Senators Knuepfer and Senator Partee.
28. I am perhaps irrationally committed to the idea that all
29. the processes of government ought to be as open as possible.
30. It is not always logically easy to defend that position,
31. but it's mine and I'm stuck with it. I would merely sug-
32. gest to my colleague Senator Sours for whom I have the
33. greatest respect that he is the best proof I know, that in

1. arguments in this kind as in television entertainment
2. it's not much what you say as how you say it. And...
3. I suggest that the substance of his speech is not
4. nearly as strong as the artifice of it and indeed that
5. would make the subject of a very good soap opera.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

7. Senator Nimrod may close debate.

8. SENATOR NIMROD:

9. Mr. President and distinguished colleagues I think
10. we have had ample discussion and we have apparently
11. covered the meaning and intent for this particular bill.
12. This bill has been here before. I imagine it...I would
13. hope it would pass today. I think that we must remember
14. ...remember this that there are...there is the opportunity
15. for the authority which is holding the meeting to pre-
16. scribe rules, reasonable rules, to govern the rights of
17. such recordings. I think that we are in a position to
18. say that within the act and within the Constitution that
19. certainly this is called for this is within the concept
20. of it. And I would urge you to...vote aye on this
21. measure.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. The question is, shall HB 230 pass? Upon that
24. question the Secretary will call the roll.

25. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

26. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
27. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
28. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
29. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
30. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard
31. Mohr, Don Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman,

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
4. ...Have the absentees been made? The absentees
5. will be called.
6. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
7. Bartulis, Bruce, Carroll, Chew, Conolly, Course,
8. Daley, ...Donnewald, Graham, Kenneth Hall, Hynes, Johns,
9. Keegan, Kosinski, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don
10. Moore, Roe, Romano, Saperstein, Scholl, Sommer, Soper,
11. Swinarski, Vadalabene, Walker.
12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
13. On that question the ayes are 21. The nays are
14. 16. HB 230 having failed to receive the constitutional
15. majority is declared lost. Messages from the House.
16. SECRETARY:
17. A Message from the House by Mr. Selcke, Clerk.
18. (Secretary reads Message from the House).
19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
20. Senator Nimrod. Senator Nimrod.
21. SENATOR NIMROD:
22. ...I would move that we recede from the...Senate
23. Amendment.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
25. Senator Nimrod moves to recede from House Amendment
26. No. 1 to HB 495. Will you explain the amendment, Senator?
27. SENATOR NIMROD:
28. The...this bill of course is that special bill and
29. what it...for Mt. Prospect...no wait a minute. Oh, I'm
30. sorry. By receding we're accepting. Mr...Mr. President,
31. we had put on an amendment that transferred this from the
32. ...General Revenue Fund to the Road Fund and...since then
33. I have learned, I have talked with the sponsor and...

1. what is...this is that the rest of the funds covering
2. this area do come from the General Revenue Fund...
3. for the Superintendent of Instruction and...we would
4. like to have this amendment then removed so that we can
5. be...conformed to the uniform practice. Is there any
6. discussion? Senator Partee.

7. SENATOR PARTEE:

8. I'm sorry I...I tried very hard to follow that but
9. I...I just...I think I got lost in the shuffle some-
10. where. Would you say that again, I'm...

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Senator Nimrod.

13. SENATOR NIMROD:

14. On this Floor providing for the funds for this
15. transportation for the...

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Let's break up the aucuses. Senator Nimrod.

18. SENATOR NIMROD:

19. Yes...we had originally presented an amendment
20. that would have transferred...from the General Revenue
21. to the Road Fund the cost of the amount of money for the
22. transportation for these students for these private
23. companies. Since then we have learned that the other
24. funds covering the similar operation do come from the
25. General Revenue Fund. So in order for us to conform and
26. be uniform then we should recede from this amendment so
27. that we can add this item and be uniform with the other...
28. disbursements in this area.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

30. Senator Rock.

31. SENATOR ROCK:

32. Well, I...I may be...I'd ask you to hold this. I
33. have the Department of Transportation budget which is on
second reading. And all the money that is for this purpose

1. is from the Road Fund. So I think that...be taking
2. it from General Revenue would be inconsistent and I
3. think we should stick with our amendment.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

5. Senator Nimrod.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. Yeah. What I might add is that the Transportation
8. Bill that has come to us...it's been amended out by the
9. House....so that would mean then...if we leave this it
10. would be the only one if we proceed with that way the
11. Department of Transportation Bill is at the present time.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

13. Senator Harris.

14. SENATOR HARRIS:

15. Well, I'm informed by representative of our staff
16. that what Senator Rock has just said is...is in fact
17. and I'm...that...that...the appropriation bill for DOT,
18. are you referring to 1979? You've got the bill in the
19. form it came to us from the House?

20. SENATOR ROCK:

21. Yes, I do.

22. SENATOR HARRIS:

23. Well, I'm just...I was just advised that the House
24. did change it. That it was introduced out of the Road
25. Fund and changed in the House by House action to Gen-
26. eral Revenue. Now this is...a bureau effort every year
27. to take it out of the Road Fund and the...I know Rep-
28. resentative Neff led the fight over there to...put it
29. back into General Revenue. Now I haven't looked at
30. the bill and I...I just think that 495 ought to be con-
31. sistent with what 1979 provides. Now whatever that is
32. that's the way we ought to go on 495.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. That Senator Harris is exactly my point. As I
4. read 1979 at pages 3 and 4, if in fact I have the
5. right sections. It calls for these funds to come out
6. of the Road Fund. And I think that the Senate amend-
7. ment to that bill was the correct one.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

9. Any further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

10. SENATOR NIMROD:

11. Yes. I...agree with Senator Harris...that this...
12. and our only attempt in...in doing this is to be...be
13. consistent. ...And...I've been asked to take it out of
14. the record for a moment if we may so we can get this
15. straightened out?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Take it out of the record. ...Gest that we try
18. to get these Messages cleared by both sides so that we
19. all know what's going on. This is the only...the
20. Secretary's desk is the only place that we have...a
21. message and it's unfortunate that the membership doesn't
22. all have a copy or they're on the Calendar. Senator
23. Rock.

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. ...A point of order again to reiterate this happened
26. before and we kind of hogged down. My suggestion would
27. be that when those Messages from the House come to the
28. Secretary's office that the staff...leadership staff on
29. both sides just simply be provided with a list of those
30. bills that have in fact come back. We can avoid a lot
31. of this haggling on the Floor.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. ...Was our understanding that you...

1. SENATOR ROCK:
2. We did not get the list. We did not know this
3. bill was here.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
5. This is not on your list? ...ary can you pro-
6. vide both sides of the aisle with a list of these
7. Messages? Next...next bill, Mr. Secretary.
8. SECRETARY:
9. HB 458.
10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
11. Do you have 458 Senator Rock?
12. SECRETARY:
13. HB 603. Senator Dougherty.
14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
15. Senator Dougherty.
16. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:
17. Mr. President, I'm informed that 603, the amend-
18. ments that were put on...the House were deleted but...
19. amendments put on in the Senate that were deleted by
20. the House. I would move that we do not concur.
21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
22. Senator Dougherty moves that we refuse to recede
23. from Amendments No. 1, 2 and 3.
24. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:
25. We refuse to recede from the amendments we put on
26. in the Conference Committee be appointed.
27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
28. HB 603. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed
29. nay. Motion carries. 458, Senator Nimrod.
30. SENATOR NIMROD:
31. Yeah. Mr. President on 458...ask the Senate to
32. refuse to recede and we appoint a conference committee.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. ...Nimrod moves that the Senate refuse to recede
2. from Senate Amendment No. 1 to HB 458. And that a
3. conference committee be established. All in favor sig-
4. nify by saying aye. Opposed nay. Motion carries.

5. SECRETARY:

6. ...Bill 610. The...the Senate has concurred with
7. the Senate in the adoption of Amendment No. 1 and re-
8. fuse to concur with the Senate in the adoption of
9. Amendment No. 2. Senator Buzbee.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Senator Buzbee moves that the Senate refuse to

19. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

20. ...Mr. President and members of the Senate...I

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
11. Senator Wooten moves that... Senator McBroom.
12. SENATOR MCBROOM:
13. ...I...I would have to concur with Senator Root..
14. Wooten there's only \$5400 involved here and...and I
15. would concur with his motion to recede.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
17. Senator Wooten, what is your motion?
18. SENATOR WOOTEN:
19. I wish I knew. Just a moment, please.
20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Yeah. I...move to refuse to recede and...
3. let's see...and ask for a committee on conference.

5. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed

8. HB 716. Senator Rock. The House refused to

14. SENATOR ROCK:

15. ...Would you just read that again, I...I've just
16. figured out which bill it is.

17. SECRETARY:

18. The House refused to con...716, the House refused
19. to concur in Senate Amendment No. 1 and concurred in
20. Senate Amendment No. 2.

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. Fine. Then I would move Mr. President, Ladies
23. and Gentlemen of the Senate, the Senate do in fact
24. recede from Senate Amendment No. 1. This, Senator
25. Mitchler, this is the flood and drain control. Senate
26. Amendment No. 2 was the amendment which you offered
27. and which was adopted which the House has accepted.
28. Senate Amendment No. 1 was the one I had put in which
29. deleted certain sections. I, frankly, don't think it's

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. On that question the ayes are 45 and the nays are
3. none. The Senate does recede from Amendment No. 1 to
4. HB 716. House Bills on third reading. HB...Senator
5. Hynes on the Floor? ...Hynes. Senator Hynes, HB 1443.
6. Are you ready? Secretary will read the bill.

7. SECRETARY:

8. HB 1443. (Secretary reads title of the bill).
9. 3rd reading of the bill.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Senator Hynes.

12. SENATOR HYNES:

13. Mr. President, members of the Senate, House...House
14. Bill 1443, as amended, essentially accomplishes two things.
15. First of all,-it...it authorizes the Chicago Board of
16. Education to issue ninety million dollars in bonds for
17. capital construction. The sinking fund for the payment
18. of those bonds will come out of existing tax rates so that
19. there will be no increase in taxes whatever necessary to
20. fund the repayment of these bonds. The bonds will be issued
21. over a three year period. Secondly, the bill authorizes
22. the Chicago Board of Education in connection with its
23. annual budget and with a supplemental budget...immediately
24. this year to charge the expense of custodial employees to
25. the Building Fund as opposed to being limited now to the
26. Educational Fund. Therefore the Board of...Chicago Board of
27. Education will have the option of charging these building
28. maintenance related expenses to either the Building Fund
29. or the Education Fund. This latter provision gives the
30. Chicago schools the same authority that the downstate schools
31. presently have. The School Code presently contains a
32. similar provision for the benefit of downstate school
33. districts. This is an important measure to the people and

1. school children of Chicago and I would ask for your
2. favorable consideration.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

4. Is there any discussion? The question is...
5. Senator...Senator Sours.

6. SENATOR SOURS:

7. Mr. President, Senators, as I understand this
8. bill has been very radically amended. Has it not?

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Senator Hynes.

11. SENATOR HYNES:

12. Yes...Senator, yes it has. One other thing I should
13. have mentioned. The amendment to this bill makes it
14. identical to SB 998 which has been pending on the
15. Calendar here for quite some time and which was approved
16. almost, I shouldn't say unanimously, but close to it
17. by the Senate Education Committee.. So it is now the
18. identical bill as SB 998 of which Senator Partee and
19. I are co-sponsors.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. Senator Sours.

22. SENATOR SOURS:

23. Well, as a matter of fact, doesn't this provide
24. for...a tax of somewhere around...well, is it twenty
25. million or more?

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

27. Senator Hynes.

28. SENATOR SOURS:

29. ...know the exact. I...I can't seem to find my
30. documents here.

31. SENATOR HYNES:

32. No. This will auth...presently the Board of Education
33. in the City of Chicago has authority to issue a

1. hundred and twenty million dollars in bonds. And this
2. reduces it to ninety million. Those bonds can now be
3. issued without referendum, but the money to provide the
4. ...the sinking fund to pay off the bonds over...to amortize
5. the bonds over the life time of the bonds, will come out
6. of existing tax rates. There will be a reduction in the
7. Building Fund tax rate in the City of Chicago by an amount
8. equal to that necessary to amortize these bonds over
9. the life of the bonds. Therefore the net tax in
10. Chicago will be identical. There will be absolutely
11. no change in the tax rate in the City of Chicago for
12. this purpose.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Sours.

15. SENATOR SOURS:

16. But as I understand this, this is absolutely without
17. any referendum. Isn't that true?.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

19. Senator Hynes.

20. SENATOR HYNES:

21. That is correct. It is with the issuance of the
22. bonds is without referendum but there is no tax being
23. imposed without referendum. We are using existing
24. tax authority, authority that is being collected annually
25. every year to pay off these bonds. Presently the City
26. of Chicago unlike many of the other districts is paying
27. for a substantial portion of its school construction out
28. of current income.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

30. Senator Sours.

31. SENATOR SOURS:

32. Now you mention another bill. You alluded to another
33. bill. That bill hasn't passed yet, has it? And it's
equally as inf...

1. SENATOR HYNES:

2. No. No. It has...it has not.

3. SENATOR SOURS:

4. It's equally as infirm as this one, is it not?

5. SENATOR HYNES:

6. I...Senator, I happen to...cause that's really
7. tantamount to asking me if I still beat my wife. But
8. I frankly would answer you this way, I think SB 998...
9. is an excellent bill and I think this one is equally
10. fine. It...it is a very desirable piece of
11. legislation. It is, I think, fiscally responsible.
12. There is no increase in taxes and it will give the
13. flexibility to the Chicago Board of Education that it
14. has long needed.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

16. Any further discussion? Senator Fawell.

17. SENATOR FAWELL:

18. I...I merely want to say that this is a bill that
19. we discussed for, I think two sessions in the Education
20. Committee, originally in the form of SB 998 which also
21. incorporated these provisions. And...it's an intricate
22. piece of legislation but I think very sound, it...it
23. does...as has been the case authorize the nonreferendum
24. bonds. But as Senator Hynes has pointed out there is
25. no increase in the tax rate because there is a...a rebate
26. required here and it's combined with a...an authorization
27. that certain expenses which downstate have always been
28. a part of the Building Fund are transferred from the
29. Educational Fund to the Building Fund, if I have my facts
30. straight-and I think that this is all part of it also-
31. so that a...therefore the utilization of the bonds here
32. can take up some of the load that previously the Building
33. Fund had to assume and then also the Building Fund can

1. assume some of the expense that the Educational Fund
2. previously assumed. And as a result, the Building
3. Fund will be used just as the Building Fund really in
4. the downstate school districts is being used. I think,
5. also, if the Capital Development Board bills do pass
6. that...that even the need for the issuance of some of
7. these nonreferendum bonds would not be necessary. But
8. I rise in support of the bill. I...I think it is a...
9. a sound piece of legislation.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Any further discussion? Senator Harris.

12. SENATOR HARRIS:

13. Well, I want to inquire of Senator Hynes, this
14. applies only to the City of Chicago. Isn't that the
15. case?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Senator Hynes.

18. SENATOR HYNES:

19. That is correct. It...it...it gives us the right to
20. do what the downstate schools are doing now.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Senator Harris.

23. SENATOR HARRIS:

24. Well, I just wanted to say, y'know, I appreciate the
25. point that Senator Fawell made but I...I wanted just to
26. affirm the fact that this is a matter that as far as this
27. amendatory action by the General Assembly it applies only
28. to the City of Chicago. If you want it, that's okay with
29. me. I would just caution that members on this side that
30. there's nothing partisan about this at all...if this solves
31. your problem just like always I stand ready to be helpful.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Senator Hynes may close debate.

1. SENATOR HYNES:

2. Thank you Mr. President. I readily acknowledge
3. that fact and I would say in conclusion I think this
4. is a very good, sound, fiscally responsible piece of
5. legislation and it is vitally, vitally important to
6. the citizens of Chicago and I would ask for your support.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

8. The question is shall HB 1443 pass? And upon that
9. question the Secretary will call the roll.

14. Take it out of the record. House Bills on third
15. reading. HB 213, Senator Don Moore.
16. SECRETARY:
17. HB 213. (Secretary reads title of the bill).
18. 3rd reading of the bill.
19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
20. Senator Don Moore.
21. SENATOR DON MOORE:
22. ...Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate...
23. before I proceed with an explanation of HB 213 I would
24. like to inform the membership that the House has just
25. passed SB 1198 which was the Committee bill creating
26. the State Board of Elections and I would have liked at
27. this time to personally thank Senator John Graham and
28. Senator Dan Dougherty for their effort in seeing that
29. this bill did pass...the House. And I'm just informed
30. that the reapportionment bill which the Senate sent to
31. the House three months ago has just passed also. Thank
32. you Representative McCormick.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Is there any discussion? The question is shall
2. HB 213 pass? And upon that question the Secretary
3. will call... Senator Partee.

4. SENATOR PARTEE:

5. I think it would be...I think it would be meaningful
6. to a lot of people who are asking what the bill does over
7. here to give a little bit of an explanation.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

9. Senator Moore.

10. SENATOR DON MOORE:

11. Thank you, Mr. President. What the bill does it
12. provides that the registration record cards shall be
13. public records and that they shall be open to the public
14. for public inspection during the regular business hours
15. except the 28 days immediately preceding the election.
16. At the request of the Senate Election Committee...an
17. amendment was added that the registration cards may also
18. be inspected upon the approval of the officer in charge
19. of the cards during the 28 days immediately preceding
20. the election. In addition to that the registration
21. cards shall be open to inspection to the certified
22. judges and poll watchers at the polling place on election
23. day. There was also an amendment added to that language
24. that states but only to the extent necessary to determine
25. the question of the right of a person to vote. At no
26. time will poll watchers be allowed to physically handle
27. the registration cards. That is what the bill does. It
28. makes the registration cards public records open to in-
29. spection and allows them to be looked at by the judges
30. and poll watchers on election day. I would appreciate
31. a favorable roll call.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Senator Dougherty.

1. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

2. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate.
3. These bills 213 through 220 are all to a degree...a part
4. and parcel of the new election code...SB 1161 now in
5. Committee. I have some objections to 213 because I feel
6. that it might in some degree...intrude upon the process
7. of conducting elections. ...However, I am perfectly
8. willing to let 213, 214, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 220.
9. I do have an objection to 220. I...and I maintain
10. that objection to 220 and Senator Moore knows I object
11. to it. I'm not going to raise any objection to the
12. series except 220. The other bills are a part and
13. parcel of the code which we are trying to get adopted
14. at this time.

24. Senate. HB 218 provides or...the bill requires the
25. election authorities who remove a judge of election
26. for cause, to specify such cause in writing and to
27. make such writing a matter of public record. It's
28. similar language that is in 1161 only 1161 does not
29. require the...written...notice as to why a judge
30. is removed. I would expect a favorable roll call.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. Is there any discussion? The question is,
33. shall HB 218 pass? And upon that question the
Secretary will call the roll.

22. Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate,
23. HB 219 again is similar to provisions contained in 1161.
24. The bill provides that monies deposited as security for
25. cost by a petitioner contesting an election must be re-
26. turned to the petitioner if the challenge is successful.
27. Similarly monies deposited by a respondent in opposition
28. to a recount petition must be returned if the election is
29. upheld. The bill only applies to county and local elections
30. not to judicial elections or to elections for senators
31. or representatives in the General Assembly. I'd appreciate
32. a favorable roll call.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Is there any discussion? The question is,
2. shall HB 219 pass? Upon that question the Secretary
3. will call the roll.

20. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

21. HB 220. (Secretary reads title of bill).
22. 3rd reading of the bill.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Senator Don Moore.

25. SENATOR DON MOORE:

26. ...Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate.
27. ...What this bill does, HB 220, the bill amends the
28. election code to provide that voters unable to read
29. the English language may be assisted by instructions
30. outside the polling booth only. The president law...
31. the present law permits assistance in marking ballots
32. inside the booth. ...I want to add that assistance
33. is still allowed inside the booth to physically dis-
abled persons. Now there was some question which

1. came up in Committee as far as the...those that could
2. not read the English language and there was an amend-
3. ment which was offered by myself which states that the
4. judges of election may use an interpreter in instructing
5. a voter on a model machine. Any such interpreter shall
6. execute the interpreter's affidavit English language
7. disability as set forth in section 14-4-1. So I
8. think what we are doing here is saying that if someone
9. is unable to read the English language, if they do need
10. help, an interpreter can be provided, instructions
11. can be given them on a model machine outside of the
12. voting booth or the voting machine. Again I want to
13. emphasize that assistance is still allowed inside the
14. booth or inside the machine to physically disabled
15. persons. I'll yield to Senator Dougherty.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Senator Dougherty.

18. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

19. Sen...Senator Moore and his explanation...
20. Senator Moore explains HB 220 is perfectly correct.
21. What he says is true. However, this is a complete
22. derivation, it's a complete walking away from...has
23. been the law of Illinois for many, many years. The
24. law provides that when any person makes an affidavit
25. saying that because of their inability to thoroughly
26. understand the English language they shall be allowed
27. the privilege of being assisted in the polling place
28. within the booth, as it were, or with the machine, as
29. it were, by the judges of election. One from each
30. party who will assist him in casting his ballot. Now,
31. we this Body right here, has spent millions of dollars
32. in...adopting bilingual programs for the Spanish speaking
33. people. Now there is a wealth of Spanish speaking

1. people or...multiplicity I should say all over the
2. State of Illinois particularly in the City of Chicago
3. and other large urban areas. This will be an in-
4. vasion of their privacy if they must be instructed
5. outside the booth so everyone will know their in-
6. tention. In the..as the law now is the only one
7. that knows how they vote is the two judges of election
8. ...one from each party. This is the strictest in-
9. vasion of privacy I've ever known and...I completely
10. resist this bill. I think it's a derivation of
11. what we've been doing for many years. I might point
12. out to you that they have charged fraud but in the
13. many years I've been...working on elections the area
14. of fraud is miniscule. It's a lot of hogwash. A lot
15. of talk...but we've documented cases...the number of
16. people ask us as citizens...I might point out that we
17. have a large number of people living all over this
18. State in every community who do not thoroughly under-
19. stand the English language. I'm talking about people
20. who come here when they're young and they learn the
21. English language but as they grow older they tend to
22. regress and revert back to their...mother tongue.
23. They find themselves unable to read and regress...
24. the meaning of things. They know what they want to
25. do cause they know the...spoken word. They know who
26. they want to vote for but they feel they shouldn't
27. have to reveal that...within the earshot...hearing
28. of everyone in the polling place. This is bad legis-
29. lation. I might point out to you the State of Georgia
30. will permit anybody to ask for assistance in voting
31. and will permit a person...anyone, he may select
32. anyone, not the judge of election. He can go out on
33. the street and pick a person and that person is ...

1. permitted to help him inside the polling place,
2. inside the booth and the only restriction is he
3. can...he cannot assist anymore than 10 voters.
4. This is not good legislation. I would urge its
5. defeat.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Senator Walker.

8. SENATOR WALKER:

9. ...Thank you Mr. President, members of the
10. Senate. I don't know whether the bill's been in
11. this Session or not but I know we've had it here in
12. past Session that someone comes in and requests
13. assist in voting. In fact...the legislation pro-
14. vides that they would produce a drivers license
15. if they had one. As I say...the...legislation
16. to my knowledge hasn't passed, probably hasn't
17. been introduced...this Session but I feel, from
18. what I've heard debated on this bill for the
19. past 10 or 12 years that there's too many people
20. who don't need this help that come in are offered
21. this help perhaps by precinct workers or even the
22. ...the judges. There's too many people that are
23. carrying driver's license, too many people have
24. lived here long enough to...purchase their premises
25. wherein they live and sign a...a mortgage. ...I
26. just can't see anything wrong with it. As far as
27. their being no election I...fraud I just read the
28. other day where someone got a slap on the wrist
29. perhaps six or seven people. I think it was six
30. months probation for election fraud at the last
31. election. And what I particularly didn't like
32. about this bill is the ethnic twist that it's been
33. given. Senator Dougherty I don't know who helped

1. the Irish, I don't know who helped the German.
2. I don't know who helped the Swedes. I don't
3. know who helped the Poles. All of a sudden
4. we're on this big ethnic kick where we have to
5. print everything in Spanish. I have nothing
6. against the Spanish speaking people I worked
7. with them when I was a kid on the section. But
8. I think they're just a capable of learning our
9. ways as our predecessors were who came over here
10. and succeeded without any of this help that we're
11. trying to give this particular race by the spending
12. of huge sums of money each...each Session. I can't
13. see, I absolutely can't see anything wrong with
14. this bill. I think the assistance should be out-
15. side the polls where it's in open view and not in-
16. side where perhaps this poor person that can't
17. understand what's going on is being voted the wrong
18. way perhaps against their desires.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GPAHAM):

20. Senator Carroll.

21. SENATOR CARROLL:

22. Thank you Mr. President and members of the
23. Senate. I think maybe many of you are missing the
24. point on this. You're talking about allowing a
25. lot of people exercise their franchise to vote.
26. You're talking about allowing them to do it in the
27. way they find most meaningful for them and that is
28. by voting for the candidates of their choice. The
29. laws that now exist allow two people to go into the
30. ...booth with them if they ask for assistance. A
31. judge from each of both major political parties.
32. You've seen those sample voting machines. No one
33. can tell what they mean compared to a regular machine.

1. Our own state representatives, there's nothing on
2. the sample machine that shows you how to cast one,
3. one and a half or three votes for the candidate of
4. your choice. There's no where on the sample machine
5. that it locks out the other aspect of a candidate
6. if the one you want to vote like if you want to give
7. three votes to your Republican running in your dis-
8. trict. A sample machine doesn't show you what happens
9. if you do that nor is there anywhere in those sample
10. machines that have the correct names of the candidates
11. running in that precinct so that when these little old
12. ladies or these people that have trouble with our
13. language go in there to vote they're shown a sample
14. machine it means absolutely nothing to them. If they
15. want to vote for Senator Don Moore it doesn't show that
16. on the sample ballot and they won't be able to be shown
17. that before they go into the booth. There's nothing
18. wrong with having a judge from both parties go in there
19. and assist them in voting the way they want to vote
20. with the names there with the buttons the way they're
21. supposed to be and I think this bill should be defeated.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Any further discussion? Senator Harris.

24. SENATOR HARRIS:

25. Just briefly and I'm not being facetious but this
26. is in fact really effective election law reform bill
27. in this package. I urge every member of this side of
28. the aisle to support election law reform by voting for
29. HB 220.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Further discussion? Senator Moore. Question be-
32. fore the Senate. Senator Moore.

33. SENATOR DON MOORE:

1. ...Thank you Mr. President, members of the
2. Senate. I think we are all aware of the stories
3. of illegal assistance in the voting booths. It is
4. so common that they need not be repeated here. I
5. can look at different clippings out of the paper:
6. State acts on vote fraud. Political heat...rises
7. in race for voting indictment. Federal jury ex-
8. pands vote..board probe. I can go on: Forty in
9. dicted in Chicago. I would think that the members
10. of the other side of the aisle would welcome a bill
11. like this. There can be adequate instructions given
12. outside of the booth to people who cannot read the
13. English language. We have model machines where we
14. can show them how to vote for a candidate. How to
15. split a ballot. How to...vote a straight party
16. ticket. I would think the members on the other side
17. of the aisle would welcome a bill like this so as
18. to remove the tinges and bad publicity that has
19. come out in the voting machine areas of this State
20. specifically the City of Chicago. I would all to
21. give me a favorable vote on this particular bill.
22. Thank you Mr. President.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Senator Moore has just closed the debate. The
25. question before... Senator Dougherty, for what pur-
26. pose?

27. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

28. I would....

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. I'm breaking the rules.

31. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

32. ...statements that were made. Yes Sir, I think
33. I have a right to...in opposing this bill. First, I

1. would like to answer Senator Walker...

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

3. You're rising on a point of personal privilege.

4. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

5. ...Personal privilege if you will, something
6. I rarely do. I would like to inform Senator Walker
7. the Irish don't need any instruction they speak
8. the English language when they got here far better
9. than a lot of people I know. And furthermore, as
10. far as we're talking about fraud now God knows I've
11. been up and down this State for many years on election
12. fraud but I've heard many, many charges where votes
13. were cast by the telephone in downstate areas. Where
14. they call up and say give the vote to my friend Ray
15. Welsh and while you're voting for Ray vote for my
16. Fred Smith and the rest of them, I'm busy on the
17. south forty. That's what I've heard and I know it
18. to be true.

6. Senator Moore. May we have...

7. SENATOR MOORE:

8. Thank you, Mr...thank you, Mr. President,
9. members of the Senate...this bill has also been on
10. the Calendar for quite some time awaiting action of
11. the Reapportionment Bill which the House has just
12. passed. It provides for filling vacancies in the
13. General Assembly by appointment by the Representative
14. or Senatorial Committees if the office is vacated...
15. by a party not affiliated by appointment by the Governor.
16. There is the way to go provision that was added on to
17. this whereby the various township committeemen for
18. example up in Cook County cast the number of votes
19. for the...that the deceased candidate received in the
20. November election. I would appreciate a favorable
21. roll call.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Senator...Senator Partee.

24. SENATOR PARTEE:

25. The vote I'm going to cast on this bill would in
26. a measure memorialize a man who worked and served on
27. this side of the aisle, his name was Bill Lyons. And
28. after his demise I stood at this microphone and asked
29. for this bill to be passed time and time again and I
30. just want to remind you that I recognize that deaths
31. on the other side have now motivated you to do that
32. which is proper. I'm going to vote aye just as I would
33. have the first time we tried to do this two years ago.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. Senator Don Moore...any further discussion?

3. Senator Moore will close the debate.

4. SENATOR MOORE:

5. Very briefly in closing the debate I want to
6. thank the distinguished Minority Leader...there is
7. a problem that we are all aware of in filling
8. vacancies regardless what side of the aisle they
9. come from. I appreciate his support on this bill
10. and would respectfully request a favorable roll call.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Question before the Senate is, shall HB 452
13. pass? The Secretary will call the roll.

2. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee amendments.
3. Amendment No. 1 by Senator Bruce.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
5. Senator Bruce.
6. SENATOR BRUCE:
7. Yes...Mr. President, is Senator McBroom...?
8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
9. Gentlemen, will you let us know the results
10. of your caucus? SB 604 has just been read by title
11. a second time. All right.
12. SECRETARY:
13. We take them usually in order in which they
14. appear on the Calendar. For the most part we do
15. it that way.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
17. We will take HB 604 action out of the record and
18. we'll proceed if we...if we could have some order.
19. HB 1979.
20. SECRETARY:
21. HB 1979. (Secretary reads title of bill).
22. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee amendments.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
24. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading.
25. Are...are we now going to...the Chair'd like to know
26. are we now for 604?
27. SECRETARY:
28. HB 604. (Secretary reads title of bill).
29. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee amendments.
30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
31. Senator Bruce.
32. SENATOR BRUCE:
33. At...at this point there will be no amendments
offered from the Floor. So we can just go to 3rd

1. reading there is a possibility the bill will be
2. called back from 3rd to 2nd.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. No amendments from the Floor. 3rd reading.
5. Next bill will be HB 1268. Senator Knuppel.

6. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

7. ...President, the 3rd amendment which is the
8. amendment we were considering yesterday was not
9. printed and on the desk. It has been...printed and
10. distributed and...and this time I'd move the adoption
11. of Amendment No. 3 to HB 1262.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

13. Is there any further discussion? The Senator...
14. Knuppel offers an amendment to HB...Amendment No. 3
15. to HB 1268 and is there any discussion? Other than
16. what's going on on other matters. Senator Sours.

17. SENATOR SOURS:

18. I'd like to ask Senator Knuppel a question.
19. And I'm looking at the bare syllabus of this bill
20. appearing on page 1016 of the digest of June 7th.
21. It says: Amends Workmen's Compensation Act and
22. Workmen's Occupational Diseases Act. Here's...I
23. want to call to your attention: removes language per-
24. mitting awards for disfigurement of chest, legs
25. and arms applicable to females only. Permits re-
26. covery for these types of injuries to both male
27. and female. Now is this amendment...does this
28. amendment have to do with disfigurement of chest,
29. legs and arms applicable to females only removing
30. that language. Just yes or no...if you can.

31. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

32. In my opinion its germane. The amendment is
33. germane.

1. SENATOR SOURS:

2. Mr. President, I'd like an answer if it deals
3. with disfigurement of chest, legs and arms applicable
4. to females only removing that language. Not whether
5. its germane. That's...that's the ultimate question
6. this Chamber should consider. Does it deal with those
7. Senator?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Senator Knuppel.

10. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

11. Well, I...I've been a trial lawyer too long to
12. ...you can't answer every question yes or no. You
13. know there's black and white and a lot of shades of
14. gray. This amendment deals with changes in the Work-
15. men's Compensation Law and the compensation to be paid
16. thereunder as well the...as the Diseases Act. And that's
17. what you're getting at and the answer is it does.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Senator Sours.

20. SENATOR SOURS:

21. This is one of the most hypocritical amendments
22. it's based on...it's based on positive deceit, positive
23. misrepresentation and has no connection with the original
24. bill other than the fact that it does touch upon Work-
25. men's Compensation just as if we were to appoint for
26. example, perhaps ridiculous, confirming a member of the
27. Industrial Commission. This is a nongermane amendment
28. and should not be adopted, should not be supported by
29. this side.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

32. SENATOR MITCHLER:

33. Yes. Mr. President and members of the Senate.

1. Now in the Senate Industry and Labor Committee when
2. we heard HB 1268 and we voted it out of Committee with
3. a recommendation Do Pass. Now this was to more or less
4. bring the female employees in line with the male em-
5. ployees and make them persons under the Equal Rights
6. Approach amending the Workmen's Compensation Act and
7. Workmen's Occupational Disease Act. Now I believe the
8. amendment does not do what we did in Committee in
9. accepting HB 1268 as put to us in Committee. It's
10. a very drastic change from what we passed out thinking
11. HB 1268 would do. So actually you have a different
12. approach and it's a change in HB 1268 'tis very sub-
13. stantive. And I want to call that to the attention of
14. the members of the Senate.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. Senator Rock.

17. SENATOR ROCK:

18. Well, I just want to point out Mr. President,
19. members of the Senate, we, in this Chamber, operate
20. under rules and under our rules where they are silent
21. Roberts Rules prevail. An amendment to be germane
22. must in some way involve the same question that is
23. raised. To be germane the amendment is required to
24. relate only to the same subject. I submit Sir that
25. this is germane. The amendment should be adopted.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Senator Glass.

28. SENATOR GLASS:

29. I'd like to ask a question of the sponsor...
30. this is in fact the amendment that would increase
31. the Workmen Compensation benefits 14%? Is that
32. correct?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

2. This is what the amendment is supposed to do.

3. Yes.

4. SENATOR ROCK.

5. Well, I...I do want to comment because this
6. subject was on the Floor last night and at that
7. time I asked a question with regard to the other
8. Workmen's Comp Bill that is before the Senate
9. and I think this is important and related to the
10. issue. And at that time I asked if there were any
11. members of organized labor who supported the model act
12. that Senator Sours is sponsoring SB 567. It was in-
13. dicated at that time by Senator McCarthat that...that
14. there...were none. ...I would like to read a report
15. very brief...by James R. O'Briend and Michael R. Peevey.
16. Mr. O'Brien is Assistant Director of the AFL-CIO
17. Department of Social Security in Washington. Mr.
18. Peevey the Director of Research in California Labor
19. Federation AFL-CIO San Francisco, California. And
20. with respect to the model act they made this statement.
21. "The report supports this view and makes recommendations
22. for positive change", and they...they're referring to
23. the report that recommended the model act, "We concur
24. with the mandates and recommendations in the report
25. with but few exceptions"....I just thought we ought
26. to set the record straight on that point. I'll show
27. this to Senator McCarthy and I would certainly urge
28. opposition to the amendment.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Senator McCarthy.

31. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

32. Well, I'll...I'll discuss it privately. Is it the
33. same book?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Any further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

2. SENATOR NIMROD:

3. Mr. President, as I said yesterday and I'd
4. just like to repeat. This is a one way street.
5. There has not been an opportunity to get both
6. sides of the picture here to get these groups
7. together. This is the wrong approach I think
8. for us to be...justifiably to be awarding Workmen's
9. Compensation Benefits without having a chance to
10. discuss this serious problem where most the money
11. does not go to the recipient - where we are not
12. concerned about the widow who has the children -
13. when he dies she ends up with \$30,000 and that's all
14. she gets for a lifetime when a husband should really
15. ...we should be concerned about a 150,000 dollars. I
16. just think this is the wrong way to do it at the last
17. minute and I think we ought to give this some serious
18. thought and force the reaction of getting it into the
19. ...the Committee where we can study it from both sides
20. to come up with some reasonable answers before we end
21. up with this Federal legislation. I just can't tell
22. you how important it is.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Any further discussion? Senator Knuppel will
25. close the debate.

26. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

27. Mr. President, I'm not the captive of either labor
28. or capital and I would say this that 14% increase will
29. give more money to the widows and children. That's
30. what we're talking about. If we do nothing...do nothing
31. then the people who are represented by...the people
32. who represent the vested interest here rather than
33.

1. the little man will be the ones who win. I said
2. something to one of the people here today that to-
3. day for the first time this looks like this Session
4. may be tabled the Session for the little man. We're
5. doing something for him. Maybe I don't agree with all
6. of it like City Savings and Loan but I do the tax re-
7. form and I say here where we have rampant inflation
8. we have all the things we have...we have the management
9. as well as maybe labor refusing to agree and I'm talking
10. about organized labor, I'm not talking about the union
11. member, this bill...this bill is directed to the benefit
12. of the little man. The union card carrier not the
13. leadership. The hell with them and management too.
14. This is a hell of a lot better for the widows and the
15. children than nothing. And anybody wants to stand up
16. here and wants to talk about widows and children and
17. all this other stuff if they're consistent they're
18. going to vote for this bill.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. The question before the Senate...Senator Bell,
21. for what purpose do you arise?

22. SENATOR BELL:

23. Well, I'd like to say something in reference
24. to this...

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. You're out of order Senator I asked twice if there
27. was any further debate before Senator Knuppel closed the
28. debate. The question is, shall Amendment No. 3 to HB
29. 1268 to be adopted. All in favor signify by saying
30. aye. Opposed. 28 and 28 and we'll call the roll.

31. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

32. Bartulis,

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Those voting for the adoption of the amendment
2. will vote in the affirmative. Those in opposition to
3. it will vote no. And the Secretary will call the roll.

4. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

13. McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore,
14. Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman, Ozinga, Palmer,
15. Partee, Regner, Rock, Roe, Romano, Saperstein, Savickas,
16. Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Smith, Sommer,

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. Please. Leave the Secretary have a chance to
19. hear the roll.

20. ACTING SECRETARY (MR WRIGHT):

21. Sommer, Soper, Sours, Swinarski, Vadalabene,
22. Walker, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Mitchler, no. Netsch, aye. Senator Fred Smith,
25. aye. Senator Walker, no. Gentlemen, you make it awfully
26. difficult for the Secretary. On this question the yeas
27. were 29. The nays were 21. There has been a request
28. for a verification of the roll of the affirmative votes
29. will the Senators please be in their seats? Senator
30. Sours for what purpose do you arise?

31. SENATOR SOURS:

32. Not only the affirmatives but the presents.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. They are synonymous.

2. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

3. Those...the following voted in the affirmative:

16. Senator Regner, for what purpose do you arise?

17. SENATOR REGNER:

18. ...Mr. President yesterday when we were first...

19. discussing this bill and amendment I made the statement

20. that if this amendment were adopted it created an en-

21. tirely new piece of legislation completely different

22. from what had been heard in Committee on the original

23. bill or we had before and I was going to make a motion

24. that with a new piece of legislation and as comprehensive

25. as this is I would like to now move that this bill be

26. recommitted to the Industry and Labor Committee for

27. further consideration by that Committee.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. The motion before the Senate is, shall HB 1268

32. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

33. I move that that motion lie upon the Table.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. The motion by Senator Knuppel is that the motion
3. to recommit lie upon the Table. The Secretary will
4. call the roll. Senator Berning, for what purpose do
5. you arise?

6. SENATOR BERNING:

7. I move to strike the enacting clause.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. That motion is out of order. The Secretary will
10. call the roll on the motion of Senator Knuppel to Table.
11. Those...those in favor of Tabling Senator Regner's

31. Be in your own seats and the Secretary will call the
32. roll of the affirmative votes.

33. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

10. Any discussion? All in favor of adoption of
11. Amendment No. 2 will signify by saying aye. Opposed.
12. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Any
13. further amendments? 3rd reading.
14. SECRETARY:
15. Amendment No. 3...
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
17. I asked for further amendments. That's all I'm
18. waiting for. Amendment No. 3.
19. SECRETARY:
20. Amendment No. 3 by Senator Bruce.
21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
22. Senator Bruce.
23. SENATOR BRUCE:
24. Yes, Mr. President, Amendment No. 3 consolidates
25. the Capital projects in the General Revenue Fund, State
26. Boating Act, The Game and Fish Fund and the Land and Water
27. Recreation Fund. The House has seen fit to detail those
28. projects...too severely we believe and that this con-
29. solidates some of that money so that they have a little
30. more latitude in expenditures in Capital projects next
31. year. It meets with the approval of both sides and I
32. move the adoption of Amendment No. 3.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. All in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3
2. signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it and
3. the amendment's adopted. Senator Bruce, Amendment No. 4.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Amendment No. 4 by Senator Scholl.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Scholl. Senator Scholl.

8. SENATOR SCHOLL:

9. Amendment No. 4 provides for the construction
10. development of a tree nursery in the northeastern
11. section of the State to be managed by the Department
12. of Conservation. The appropriation is one million
13. dollars.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. Any further discussion? All in favor of the adoption
16. of the amendment signify by saying aye. Opposed? The
17. ayes have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further
18. amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Now we will
19. revert to the order of HB 1631 on second reading.

27. that has been heretofore discussed with the leadership on
28. both sides of the aisle as well as Senator Mitchler, the
29. Chairman of the Committee. What Amendment No. 1 does
30. with reference to Unemployment Compensation is that...it
31. provides for the four weeks of continuous unemployment
32. would be a condition where they could pick up the first.
33. I talked with Senator Mitchler yesterday while not in-

1. dicating support for the bill he indicated that it
2. was acceptable to him that the amendment be adopted
3. and I so move.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

5. Has been a motion by Senator McCarthy to adopt
6. ...is this Amendment No. 1, Mr. Secretary...to HB
7. 1631. Is there discussion? Senator Glass.

8. SENATOR GLASS:

9. I...I just wanted to make sure Mr. President
10. that I do understand the terms of this amendment...
11. Senator McCarthy under this amendment is it true
12. that after four weeks of unemployment...and only
13. then would the employee or ex-employee be entitled
14. to get the first week of unemployment comp. Is that
15. ...that correct?

16. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

17. Yes Sir. That is correct.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Any further discussion? Senator Sours.

20. SENATOR SOURS:

21. Mr. President, this is just another amendment
22. to destroy the incentive of the employee to go out and
23. find a job so that he cannot be at the trough of the
24. unemployment compensation all of which money is repre-
25. sented by...by contributions by the employer. This is
26. the same kind of bills we just dealt with five minutes
27. ago. Something for nothing.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. Any further discussion? The question before the
30. Senate is, shall Amendment No. 1...Senator Harris...
31. to HB 1631 be adopted.

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. I just...I just to...I just want to call attention

2. Senator Harris.

3. SENATOR HARRIS:

4. ...to...the fact that there is a position on
5. this after a great deal of discussion by the members
6. of this side. So that there isn't any misunder-
7. standing I just make that statement to these members.

9. I assume I can be joined in another. This is on...
10. in connection with the...Amendment that would pro-
11. vide for the qualification for the first week's benefit
12. in the event that there had been unemployment for how
13. many weeks? Four. Okay well we have a position on

16. You have a sufficient number of Senators joining

32. SENATOR MITCHLER:

33. The...private I believe you're referring to Senator

1. that's explained in the definition on page 2. It
2. means any sewage handling or treatment facility re-
3. ceiving domestic sewage from less than 15 people
4. or population equivalent, and having a ground service
5. discharge or sewage handling or treatment facility
6. receiving domestic sewage and having no ground service
7. discharge. That's for these small treatment plants
8. in these small subdivisions.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

10. Senator Latherow.

11. SENATOR LATHEROW:

12. Well, Mr. President, that...reminds me of a lot
13. of answers I receive in the Committee that I've been
14. Chairman of. I said, how many people in the population
15. can there be a minimum, when you'll have to have this
16. private sewage disposal system license.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

18. Senator Mitchler.

19. SENATOR MITCHLER:

20. Well, that would be 15, less than 15.

21. SENATOR LATHEROW:

22. Well, Mr. President, I remind you that less than
23. 15 could be 1.

24. SENATOR MITCHLER:

25. Let me answer that. Yes, if it's a private sewage
26. disposal system and...let's say it's put into an area
27. and it's only receiving from one person. Yes.

28. SENATOR MITCHLER:

29. Well then why didn't you say one or more instead of
30. trying to say less than 15?

31. SENATOR MITCHLER:

32. Well, that's...

33. SENATOR LATHEROW:

1. Once again, Mr. President, here again is the
2. possibility of the control of every piece of sewage
3. that may move. Now it also says that ground sur-
4. face discharge of any treatment facility....re-
5. ceiving domestic sewage so I assume then Mr. President
6. and members of the Senate that means anything, anyplace
7. where there is some type sewage. I think you're entering
8. into a field here you're going to be very ticklish with
9. and you better take a good look at this bill before you
10. pass it.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Any further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

13. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

14. I just want to comment and although I commented
15. several weeks ago on...on this subject this is a problem
16. that is very prevalent in my area. These sewage disposal
17. men have, I'm sure the majority, the vast majority
18. operate very scrupulously. But we have had quite a few
19. incidents in my area where people have paid to have their
20. septic tanks pumped out and the...lo and behold weeks
21. later we discovered that-and sometimes not weeks later-
22. we discovered that these guys just go off on a back road
23. and dump it in a swill and let it flow down into a stream
24. or into a farmers pond. We've had some pretty tragic
25. incidents where little ponds have been totally poisoned
26. by this type of thing. These guys do need to be regulated.
27. This is a serious problem and as we get more and more homes
28. as we do in certain areas of the State on septic tanks
29. this problem is going to get a lot worse instead of
30. better. I would appreciate a favorable roll call on
31. this bill too.

32. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

33. Yes, Mr. President, Senator McBroom and his staff

1. have looked this over. What it is is a transfer of

9. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

14. 522. House Amendments 1 and 2. Senator Carroll.
15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
16. Senator Howard Carroll.
17. SENATOR CARROLL:
18. Yes, thank you Mr. President. The House adopted
19. two amendments. I would move to concur with House
20. Amendments 1 and 2. House Amendment 1 and this has
21. been I understand explained to Senator Merritt also,
22. House Amendment 1 excludes from the provisions of the
23. mandatory insurance to two associations in Illinois
24. that are exclusively owned and operated for the employees...
25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
26. Just a moment...just a moment. Can we get a
27. little better order?
28. SENATOR CARROLL:
29. Those two that are exclusively owned and operated
30. for the benefit of their employees they are not on ground
31. floors and etc. The only two this applies to is the
32. one run by R. R. Donnelly and Company, and the one
33. run by the Tribune and I would move that we do concur

1. in House Amendment No. 1. As to House Amendment No. 2,
2. in this amendment they have said that the Commissioner
3. may upon good cause shown waive the requirement of in-
4. surance. I personally am not enthralled with that con-
5. cept. I think I've been led to believe that that is the
6. only way we could pass it at this time. I, for one,
7. would put the future commissioner on notice however,
8. that I, for one, will be looking over the causes in
9. which he gives extensions and looking over the budgets
10. of that department should any extensions be granted. But
11. at this time I in order to get some type of legislation

3. SB 689 with House Amendment 1. Senator Welsh.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
5. Senator Welsh.
6. SENATOR WELSH:
7. Mr. President, I now move that...the House...
8. that the Senate concur in Amendment No. 1 to SB 689.
9. The amendment provides that this act is not a limit
10. upon any home rule unit. I would move for its adoption.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
12. There doesn't seem to be agreement on that Senator
13. Welsh.
14. SENATOR WELSH:
15. Can we take this from the record for the moment
16. Mr. President?
17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
18. Take it out of the record.
19. SECRETARY:
20. HB 701 with House Amendment 1, Senator Bruce.
21. HB 704, House Amendment 1, Senator Bruce.
22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
23. Senator Bruce, 704?
24. SENATOR BRUCE:
25. Well, I understand that leadership is meeting on
26. that one and 705, 701, 4 and 5.
27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
28. Take it out of the record.
29. SECRETARY:
30. HB 1158 with House Amendments 2, 3 and 5, Senator
31. Swinarski.
32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
33. Senator Swinarski.

1. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

2. Mr. President, I move that we do not concur and
3. have a conference committee.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

5. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed,
6. nay. Motion carries. Senator Rock, for what purpose
7. do you arise?

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. Just a suggestion, Mr. President. Right now the
10. Chairman and Minority spokesman on the Committee on
11. Appropriation and their respective staffs are upstairs
12. going over all these bills. Can we just hold all the
13. reports or Messages from the House as they relate to
14. Appropriation Bills until we get some agreement?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

16. Senator Bruce would you like to call 780 on post-
17. poned consideration? Senator Carroll, 828? Senator
18. Carroll.

19. SENATOR CARROLL:

20. Thank you Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of
21. the Senate, HB 828 would prevent the situation that
22. Senator Sours and so many others were concerned with in
23. many areas such as City, Savings and Loan and these
24. insurance companies and so on. We just concurred with
25. certain amendments and have taken final action on mandatory
26. insurance for Savings and Loan institutions to take care
27. of that area in the future. We have already done that
28. with casualty insurances. This is the bill by which
29. the Association of Insurance Companies would in case of
30. another equity funding situation assess themselves a
31. very miniscule amount to cover any losses incurred as a
32. result of the failure of a life insurance company where
33. people have been paying premiums year in and year out

1. I might remind the other side of the aisle that this
2. is a model legislative proposal from the National
3. Association of Insurance Commissioners originally drawn
4. by former director Jim Baylor under the Ogilvie adminis-
5. tration and approved by the bipartisan insurance laws
6. study commission. I think this is needed legislation
7. to protect the citizens of this State. I think it's
8. needed legislation to protect this State. I would ask
9. for a favorable roll call.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Senator Sours.

12. SENATOR SOURS:

13. Mr. President, Senators, as long as we've opened
14. the floodgates on the city service, I see no reason
15. why we need this bill. We've already created a precedent.
16. We're going to simply give everybody who has a claim a
17. cite draft on Alan Dixon's treasury and we can pay it
18. out. Now these gentlemen who are howling about this bill
19. everyone of them so far as I know voted for the city
20. service bill. Now they've set the precedent. Let's
21. just open the front door of the Treasury. Now,
22. seriously, this bill is bad because it makes good old-
23. line life insurance companies contribute to take care of
24. the sick ones. Now the remedy is not in this bill but
25. to prohibit the sick ones from ever getting a license
26. to pedal third party beneficiary contracts, that's what
27. is commonly known as insurance policy in the State of
28. Illinois. This bill has no more virtue now than it had
29. the other day.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. Senator Bell.

32. SENATOR BELL:

33. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I'd like

1. to concur in what Senator Sours said. And in actuality
2. what you're going to do with this bill is you're going
3. to pass on the cost to the consumer and many of those...
4. many of those consumers have enough difficulty in pur-
5. chasing the adequate amounts of life insurance that they
6. need to protect their families. And I would say that
7. life insurance has been closely regulated in this State.
8. It's been closely regulated on a Federal basis. And
9. that it does not need this type of legislation. I would
10. hope we vote against this.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Is there any further discussion? Senator Carroll
13. may close debate. Excuse me, Senator...Senator Merritt.

14. SENATOR MERRITT:

15. Mr. President, also rise in opposition to this
16. bill. Everybody around here should know this bill is
17. no good...no...no better today than it was 10 days ago
18. when it was here. It was defeated then. By some devious
19. methods they took off an amendment that would have made
20. it acceptable, in some form. Certainly wouldn't to me
21. but it would to some people. With that amendment off
22. it's the most vicious bill here yet. And I would ask
23. the people withhold their vote.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. Senator Buzbee.

26. SENATOR BUZBEE:

27. ...Mr. President, I know that I'm probably a little
28. bit...a my procedure's a little bit wrong but I would
29. like to ask Senator Sours a question on this bill. Would
30. ...would... ..My question, Senator Sours, is I...I
31. really want to agree with you on this. I...I think you're
32. right but isn't it true that we have set the precedent in
33. the past on casualty companies of making them do this sort

1. of thing?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. Senator Sours.

4. SENATOR SOURS:

5. Senator Buzbee, the only way to cure the sick
6. insurance company in this State whether it be life,
7. accident and health, casualty, suretyship, you name
8. the variables is to not let them get in if they are
9. under-capitalized. Now that's a remedy that all of
10. us, seriously, ought to pursue and make these com-
11. panies be equal to even though small - the USF&G for
12. example, the New York Life, the Massachusetts Mutual,
13. I can name you a great number of them, but not be-
14. cause they're large - but little companies can be
15. equally as solvent. Now the problem is in...in the
16. last 15 years, and that's no reflection on Kerner
17. it's also including Stratton and Stevenson, these
18. companies have been permitted to come into this State
19. or incorporate in this State and be under-capitalized
20. and the...and the...the advancement who drive around
21. in pearl gray Cadillac sedans, they skim off the original
22. investment. Now that's where the problem is. Not in
23. making a good company and I'll just name one out of
24. the hat Massachusetts Mutual or New York Life or...or
25. Connecticut General, Connecticut Mutual, you name any
26. one of them you want, Mutual Benefit. Why should they
27. make any contribution to companies sick and company
28. dishonest and company fraud and company deceit. That's
29. what's wrong with this bill. ...We're...we're making
30. the good ones tolerate, not only tolerate, but support
31. the bums ones. And the bum ones let them go. They
32. should never have gotten here to begin with.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Buzbee. Senator Carroll may close debate.

2. SENATOR CARROLL:

3. I would only close by saying once again we talk
4. about closely regulated and we're in the midst right
5. now of the equity funding situation where it's been
6. estimated many tens of millions of dollars will some-
7. how mysteriously be gone and we're talking about
8. Senator Sours' poor stiff on the street, who's the
9. one who's going to bear the cost of this, who's the
10. one who's...been concerned about who's going to bear
11. the cost? This is model legislation. This has been
12. suggested to us by bipartisan commissions, by insurance
13. directors under both party's administrations. It only
14. takes effect if a company has gone under and the other
15. companies around pool themselves to protect those
16. people who did nothing wrong but who gave premiums to
17. a company in good faith. I would urge those who are
18. concerned to vote aye.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. The question is, shall House Bill 828 pass?
21. Upon that question the Secretary will call the roll.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

32. called as is possible.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Appreciate it if you'd give Senator Newhouse your
2. attention, Ladies and Gentlemen. Senator Hall, will

5. Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President, Senators,
6. HB 1299 addresses itself also to the Board of Public
7. Aid Commissioners. It's a little bit different however.
8. What HB 1299 does is this. It increases the composition,
9. increases the number of members on the Board of Public
10. Aid Commissioners and it adds to that group four persons
11. who are public aid...who receive public aid. Now this
12. puts this...this board in line with the...with the Federal
13. requirements of HEW which states in fact that there should
14. be some input from those persons who receive services.
15. ...I'm not sure whether an explanation of these bills
16. tonight Mr. Chairman is a good idea or a bad idea. But
17. I would appreciate a favorable roll call and I'll answer any
18. questions that will be posed on this subject.

23. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

24. Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate,
25. now everyone's been complaining about the amount of money
26. we're spending...we're spending. Now here's a chance to
27. get some revenue back to the State. The revenue from the
28. live boxing and wrestling events at 10% of the gross receipts
29. July 1, 1972 has been \$103,000. It's estimated that the
30. revenue from this bill would be in that area. Illinois,
31. mind you, is the only State with an athletic exhibition
32. law that does not tax closed circuit television for boxing.
33. We're only asking 5%, several States collect 10. I would

1. ask your most favorable support for this bill.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. Is there any discussion? Senator Harber Hall.

4. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

5. I rise to oppose this bill Mr. President. This
6. is a new tax. I think most of us ran before our con-
7. stituents and said we wouldn't impose any new tax.
8. This is obviously a new tax. It's so described in the
9. new digest. It's so described in the body of the bill.
10. And further than that it won't produce any revenue. It
11. might produce a few dollars actually for the limited
12. number of boxing events that would be held. But...that
13. revenue would be nothing in administration because you'd
14. have to have separate administration of the collection of
15. that tax. I think it was a bad bill when it was put on
16. postponed. It's still bad.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Any further discussion? The question is, shall
19. HB 1410 pass? Upon that question the Secretary will call
20. the roll.

13. stitutional majority is declared lost. HB 1548,
14. Senator Sours. Senator Sours, do you wish to call
15. 1548?

16. SENATOR SOURS:

17. Yes, Mr. President, and while I'm engaging in a
18. peroration if one could call it that modestly I wish
19. someone would (foreign phrase) ring the bell. Now,
20. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I
21. have already discussed at length this bill but for the
22. benefit of those whose memory fails them at this time
23. I'd like to be a little repetitious while the troops
24. are assembling.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. The sergeant at arms will invoke Rule 2.

27. SENATOR SOURS:

28. Now, Mr. President, I'm not so sure that the members
29. are aware that at midnight in this Session there is not a
30. single consumer bill alive except this one Senator Rock.
31. Not a single consumer bill is alive in either Chamber
32. except this. Now I...I have the feeling that the other
33. side, some of them rather, in this case oppose this bill

1. because it happens to be espoused and supported by
2. the present Attorney General. Well, I can recall
3. where I supported the Clark bill with reference to
4. charities some years ago because I thought it was
5. good legislation where charities were being bilked
6. by the promoters. I also supported the eschest bill
7. in the time of Attorney General Clark. Let me make
8. a few comments about this bill. This bill follows
9. pretty much the Federal and I'd like to refer the
10. critics of this bill to page 3 as soon as we get a
11. little quiet.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

13. Let's take our caucuses off the Floor, gentlemen.
14. Continue Senator Sours. We're going to have to clear
15. the side aisles. Sergeant at arms, that's where all
16. the noise seems to be coming from. Let's clear the aisles.
17. Plenty of seats in the galleries. Continue Senator Sours.
18. SENATOR SOURS:

19. Page 3, line 10. In construing this section con-
20. sideration shall be given to the interpretations of the
21. Federal Trade Commission and the Federal Courts relating
22. to Section 5A of the Federal Trade Commission Act. Now
23. I have...I have that Act with me today from the US Code
24. annotated with respect to the unfair methods of competition.
25. Now this Congressional Act which the instant act seeks to
26. follow by interpretation was a product of probably as many
27. as ten years' study in the Federal Congress. Now I...
28. I'm not certain the scholarship anywhere is necessarily
29. increased by longevity but at the same time I'm sort of
30. persuaded that when Congress got around to passing its
31. law on fairness dealing with the consumer it had had
32. ample study and ample consideration and certainly considerable
33. scholarship. This bill is very broad. It encompasses

1. just about every conceivable transaction wherein the
2. unwary are persuaded to part with their treasure by the
3. huckster and the slicker and the carnivallian and the
4. advertiser and those who use the mail to defraud honest
5. ...otherwise honest people. Other than that that's all
6. the comment I'd like to make at this time. I'm going
7. to call the bill now and I wish it would pass because I
8. think it's something we need in this State and I want...
9. I want to repeat as of now that we have done absolutely
10. nil for the consumer in this State by any State legislation.
11. This is not to infer that I am one of Ralph Nader's fans.
12. because some of his conduct has reached the very nadir
13. of goodness. This is a good legislation. I don't think
14. it should be penalized because the present Attorney General
15. favors it. I'd appreciate a favorable roll call because
16. this is something this State truly needs.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. Thank you Mr. President, I will not belabor this
21. subject. I thought I made myself quite clear the last
22. time this bill was called and failed to get enough affirm-
23. ative votes. I have looked on with great interest these
24. past few days when the Attorney General of our State has
25. been here and I'm sure the suggestion that this is the
26. last alive consumer bill came from him. I'm glad Senator
27. Sours indicated that we have done nothing for the consumer
28. of Illinois this Session because I can tell you that the
29. Senate Judiciary Committee of which he is the Chairman
30. and the Senate Executive Committee upon which he sits
31. has succeeded in my judgment in killing...killing outright
32. the consumer oriented package of bills, 16 in number, that
33. were introduced in both the House and the Senate under

1. Democratic sponsorship, those were consumer protection
2. bills, they met their demise in the Republican controlled
3. committees. This bill, HB 1548, is an amendment to the
4. Consumer Fraud Act. An amendment whose purpose I know
5. not because it seems to me there was an old saying you
6. can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. We are taking
7. a silk purse, in my judgment, the Consumer Fraud Act which
8. this General Assembly enacted in '61, amended in '65 and
9. '67 to the point where it's the single strongest consumer pro-
10. tection statute in the country. We are now taking that same
11. Consumer Fraud Act, the veritable silk purse, and we are
12. making it by HB 1548 into a sow's ear and I for one will
13. have no part of it.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

15. Senator Bell.

16. SENATOR BELL:

17. Well, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I think
18. Senator Rock has addressed himself to what is at issue here.
19. He made the point, I don't know if it's true, but he made
20. the point that in previous Sessions that there has been
21. Democrat legislation that was consumer oriented killed.
22. I don't know. But I do know this that the people of the State
23. of Illinois need consumer protection. And if we're going to
24. have the other side of the aisle that's going to work a
25. retribution against the great Attorney General because this
26. is the type of legislation that he wants for the people of
27. this State then I say to you that we the people of the State
28. of Illinois are going to suffer by it at the hands of the
29. Democrat leadership. Now I think we better get ourselves
30. together here in this General Assembly and start addressing
31. ourselves to the needs of the people that we were elected
32. to come down here to serve. I'd like to have the question.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Sours may close debate.

2. SENATOR SOURS:

3. Just to conclude briefly Mr. President and Senators,
4. I'd like to just read a couple of excerpts from this bill
5. and...the excerpts are very brief to indicate the broad
6. terms of the bill. I'm reading line 7 on page 2: "The
7. terms trade and commerce" and that really is what we're
8. talking about. We're talking about trade and commerce
9. that is not included within the interstate concept. Means
10. the advertising and how much of that we see offering for
11. sale, sale or distribution of any services and any property
12. tangible or and intangible, real, personal or mixed and every
13. other article, commodity or thing of value wherever it's
14. situated and shall include any trade or commerce, directly
15. or indirectly affecting the people of this State. Now
16. we've gone at consumer protection piecemeal. In my
17. judgment this bill is sufficiently broad to take just
18. about anything into its cornucopia of ideas and prohibitions.
19. This is good legislation. I don't think it ought to suffer
20. because it so happens, and I want to repeat this, that the
21. present Attorney General favors it. So do many other good
22. people, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This bill
23. ought to pass.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. Question is, shall HB 1548 pass? And upon that question
26. the Secretary will call the roll.

27. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

16. Latherow, aye. On that question the ayes are 35.
17. The nays are 1. HB 1548 having received the constitutional
18. majority is declared passed. Senator Hall. Senator Hall
19. moves to reconsider. Senator Nimrod moves to Table that
20. motion. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed nay.
21. Motion carries. House Joint Resolution 16, Senator Knuepfer.

22. SENATOR KNUEFFER:

23. We've discussed it before I'd simply ask for the
24. immediate adoption of the resolution.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. All in favor of the adoption of...House Joint Resolution
27. 16 signify by saying aye. Opposed nay. Motion carries.
28. Resolution's adopted. HB 799, Senator Scholl.

29. SENATOR SCHOLL:

30. Mr...President, members of the Senate, we discussed this
31. bill at long length this afternoon but this bill provides
32. that any particular application for a zoning, rezoning or
33. variation to the county, municipal or township zoning board

1. of appeals filed by a trustee of a land trust shall
2. contain the name and address of each and every beneficiary
3. of such trust. I pointed out as a member of the City
4. Council that some occasions we came across a land trust
5. being filed, and we didn't know who was asking for the
6. rezoning. I think this is very important when you're a
7. public official and I would ask a favorable roll call
8. on this measure.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Senator Rock.

11. SENATOR ROCK:

12. Well it seems to me that in the waning hours we're
13. spending an awful lot of time beating already dead horses.
14. This is that same land trust bill that I...in my judgment
15. is totally preemptive, requires a three-fifths vote and
16. in addition to that it does not in any way say what the
17. effect or what the sanction is if in fact the city fathers
18. or the county fathers or the township fathers go ahead and
19. consider a petition without this information. This is
20. meaningless legislation. We voted on it a little bit
21. earlier. I don't know why we bring it up again. I think
22. it got the fate it deserved before. It should receive the
23. same fate again. I urge a no vote.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. The question is, shall HB 799 pass? And upon that
26. question the Secretary will call the roll.

25. SENATOR MCBROOM:

26. Yes, Mr. President, HB 314 provides that more than one
27. department can be in one bill. Senator Regner passed a
28. similar bill to...to this some time ago. I would appreciate
29. a favorable roll call.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. Is there any discussion? The question is, shall

21. SENATOR DON MOORE:

22. ...Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate
23. ...HB 1360 is a municipal league bill...it does two
24. things. One it increases the existing...or it changes
25. from 5% to 7 1/2% the amount of property tax debt limit
26. for nonhome rule units of government. It also adds a
27. new section 1-1-10 which empowers nonhome rule unit...
28. units of government to authorize by ordinance the in-
29. currence of debts, the amount not to exceed one and a half
30. ...one half of one percent of their assessed valuation.
31. Be happy to answer any questions. If not, I'd ask for
32. a favorable roll call.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Is there any discussion? Senator Regner.

2. SENATOR REGNER:

3. Yes, Mr. President...Mr. President, Members of
4. the Senate, this is a bill which gives the same non-
5. referendum bond authority to nonhome rule units that
6. home rule units have right now. Over the last year
7. and a half since the enactment of the new Constitution
8. thirteen counties have had a referendum to go to be...
9. nonhome rule...or home rule units. ...Each and every-
10. one of them have been turned down by the taxpayers be-
11. cause of their fear of added taxation. And this is the
12. same thing that we have with many municipalities right
13. now. The taxpayers are scared and if we give this
14. further authority to nonhome rule units I submit we are
15. in effect increasing taxes which we swore not to do at
16. the beginning of this Session. And I would...urge a
17. no vote on HB 1360.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

19. Is there any further discussion? Senator Glass.

20. SENATOR GLASS:

21. Well, I...I'd like to ask Senator Moore...Senator
22. Moore wouldn't it be better simply to let the nonhome
23. rule units vote on the question of home rule then they
24. could have this power?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Senator Moore.

27. SENATOR MOORE:

28. If the citizens desire to have a referendum to be-
29. come a home rule unit they could. I know several
30. municipalities have done it by referendum. Village of
31. Summit has done it. The Village of Bedford Park has
32. done it. They do have this authority but there are over
33. 1200 other local units of government who are not home
rule units that should be placed in the same competitive

1. position as the home rule units of government insofar
2. as this type of matter is concerned in my opinion.

11. here without any amendment. If I'm right I'd like to
12. know a little more what the House Amendments did.

16. The...the amendments were put on here, Jack. The...
17. these are Senate Amendments to the House Amendments and
18. when they went back over to the House; the House did not
19. concur on account of in the second amendment which the
20. Illinois Municipal League had asked for, there had been
21. inserted that part of the urban...council, whatever the
22. correct name was and they're not a statutory group which
23. could be included. And the House did not concur in that
24. amendment. And I called for a conference committee they
25. agreed to adopt Amendment No. 1 which was put on here in
26. the Senate and to recede from our Amendment No. 2 and
27. adopt a new language which puts the...as the Illinois
28. Municipal League wants it in Illinois Municipal Retirement

4. is a pretty significant amendment to the Pension Code
5. I see neither Senators Berning nor Shapiro are in
6. evidence. I think they're tied up in other conference

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Senator Harber Hall.

23. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

24. Mr. President, this was a technical amendment that
25. needed to be done in this fashion. I move for adoption
26. of the Conference Committee Report.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Senator Rock.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I was a
31. member of this Conference Committee. What Senator Hall
32. says is correct. It's a technical correct. I would
33. urge support from the members of this side.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

23. HB 224, are you going to call that? ...313,
24. Senator Daley.

25. SENATOR DALEY:

26. Thank you Mr. President, House...

27. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

28. HB 313. (Secretary reads title of bill).
29. 3rd reading of the bill.

30. SENATOR DALEY:

31. Mr. President, HB 313 provides for the mandatory
32. payment of benefit funds or fringe benefits whereby
33. an employer enters into a written agreement with

1. their employee to pay the fringe benefits such as
2. health, dental insurance, profit sharing and pensions
3. on a due date. If the employer does not pay these
4. fringe benefits on the due date the employee must send
5. a notification to the employer, must give him a thirty
6. day notice. The employer has 30 days to respond with
7. payment or reason that he could not pay or provide these
8. benefits. Also the sponsor of the bill accepted a
9. amendment by the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce
10. in order for an employee to violate this law he must
11. knowingly and willfully fail to make such payments...
12. The penalty is under the Business Corporation Act.
13. The penalty would be first offense would be a fine;
14. plus the second offense would be a fine or a sentence.
15. The Illinois State Chamber of Commerce as well as the
16. Association of General Contractors have endorsed this
17. bill. What this bill does is to protect good businesses
18. throughout the...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

20. Senator Daley, would you hold it please?

21. Sergeant at arms clear the rear aisles there are un-
22. authorized people in this Chamber and clear the side
23. aisles. There are all kinds of seats up in the gallery.
24. Senator Savickas, would you ask your guest to leave, please?
25. We're trying to conduct our business here and it's most
26. difficult with all the interruptions. We'd appreciate
27. your cooperation. Continue Senator.

28. SENATOR DALEY:

29. This bill protects the...business community
30. throughout the State from the fly-by-night businesses
31. who do not pay the fringe benefits to their employees.
32. It protects all the business whether it's dealing with
33. public bidding or private bidding. I would say it's a

1. good consumer bill. It protects the employee because
2. under a written contract they're entitled to these
3. fine benefits. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

5. Senator Mitchler.

6. SENATOR MITCHLER:

7. ...Yes, Mr. President, HB 313 does have some
8. reason to be in the Senate after it passed the House.

11. it was voted out under some rather hurried circumstances

16. payment he must knowingly and intentionally fail to file this
17. ...to make payment...I would...refuse the amendment as I
18. understand the sponsor did not...agree in the House
19. or in the Senate to such an amendment. This amendment
20. would really gut the bill because...this...the amendment
21. would take away what we're try...seeking to protect the
22. business community throughout the State of Illinois as
23. well as the employees.

25. Further discussion? ...Is shall HB 313 pass? And
26. on that question the Secretary will call the roll.

15. to note that you reiterated the...well there's the applause
16. already...also note that you reiterated the principle to
17. Senator Walker that even though you were trying to save
18. all of our time the sponsor is in charge of his bill. I
19. might comment that that...any right is subject to some
20. limitation like the right of free speech doesn't allow
21. you to yell fire in a crowded theatre. I know I'm a

23. Senator Hall moves to concur in House Amendments
24. 1 and 2 to SB 317. Call the roll. Senator Rock.
25. SENATOR ROCK:
26. Yeah. I was just going to suggest I had seen these
27. amendments earlier. I agree with Senator Hall we should
28. concur. I urge our members to vote aye.
29. PRESIDENT:
30. Call the roll.
31. SECRETARY:
32. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
33. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

1. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth
2. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,
3. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard

10. On that question the yeas are 45. The nays are

12. SECRETARY:

13. SB 701, Senator Bruce, House Amendments No. 1.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator-Bruce moves...

16. SENATOR BRUCE:

17. Yes, we're all clear move to nonconcur...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. ...to nonconcur. All in favor of the motion to
20. nonconcur signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The
21. motion carries. House will be so informed.

22. SECRETARY:

23. SB 1097, House Amendment No. 1, Senator Nimrod.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Nimrod.

26. SENATOR NIMROD:

27. ...I would refuse to...recede. Call for a conference
28. committee.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Yeah. Senator Nimrod moves to nonconcur in the
31. House Amendment to SB 1097. All in favor signify by
32. saying aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. The
33. House will be so informed.

1. SECRETARY:
2. HB 638, House Amendments No. 1 and 2, Senator
3. Shapiro.
4. PRESIDENT:
5. HB 911, Senator Clarke.
6. SECRETARY:
7. The House...they concurred in Senate Amendments
8. 1, 3 and 4 and nonconcurred in Senate Amendment No. 5
9. to HB 911.
10. PRESIDENT:
11. Senator Clarke.
12. SENATOR CLARKE:
13. ...Mr. President, the House concurred in 1, 3 and
14. 4 right?
15. SECRETARY:
16. 1, 3 and 4, yes.
17. SENATOR CLARKE:
18. 1, 3 and 4 and I'm going to make a motion that we
19. move to recede from Amendment No. 5. This bill and I just
20. want to explain it. This bill is a tax freeze bill and
21. the gentleman on the other side put Amendment No. 5 on,
22. there was a slight miscount at the time but I let that
23. pass. We voted on the bill in that form and then the
24. members of their party and the other House refused to
25. accept the amendment and I think they're playing games
26. with this vital issue. And I think it's too important
27. to let go down the drain at this late hour and that's what
28. would happen. And so I move that we recede from Amend-
29. ment No. 5.
30. PRESIDENT:
31. Senator Rock.
32. SENATOR ROCK:
33. Yes, thank you Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen

1. of the Senate, SB No. 5 which was adopted with the
2. support of the full membership...the bill going out
3. of here with the support...near unanimous support
4. of the membership I would resist a motion to recede
5. from our Senate Amendment. I would urge our members
6. to vote no and to have a conference committee report.
7. I would further request a ruling from the Chair if
8. in fact the motion is to recede from this amendment
9. that is final action. When this bill again reached the
10. House there was a ruling from the Chair that a three-
11. fifths vote was required. I would suggest that under
12. Article 7 Section 6 of the Constitution a similar vote
13. is necessary in this House and I would request a ruling
14. from the Chair.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Well, the Chair rules that Section 10 of Article
17. 9, the Revenue Section, states very clearly that this
18. article is not qualified or limited by the provisions
19. of Article 7 of this Constitution concerning the size
20. of the majorities in the General Assembly necessary to
21. deny or limit the power to tax, granted to units of local
22. government. So I rule that there is no extraordinary
23. majority required. Senator Harber Hall.

24. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

25. Well, Mr. President, this is a very important bill
26. and I just would like to make a few comments regarding it.
27. Senator Clarke has properly suggested that this Body con-
28. sider receding from the House proposal. In...in the
29. argument against that Senator Rock has suggested that when
30. we first proposed the Senate Amendments to the bill that
31. they were by an overwhelming majority supported. This is
32. not quite right Senator Rock although they did carry I
33. think the vote margin was either one or two in favor of

1. this particular amendment which is Amendment No. 5
2. to Senate...HB 911. Now this Ladies and Gentlemen
3. of the Senate, I...I frankly as a former tax collector
4. can say that with this amendment on the bill it is
5. unworkable administratively and I would support
6. Senator Clarke in receding in...in recommending
7. that we recede...from the House action. Now in this
8. regard I would point out to the members on the Senate
9. Floor tonight that the House in making this proposal
10. to the Senate the...the Democratic members of the
11. House are the ones that suggested that Senator Knuppel's
12. amendment was unworkable and they move to reject that.
13. I suggest that the members of the Democratic Senate
14. consider why they did that. It...it's a poor amendment
15. frankly, it's unworkable administratively and it should
16. be rejected. Either we're going to have a tax freeze
17. that works or we're not going to have a tax freeze.
18. With that amendment we have a tax freeze that is impossible
19. to work so let's...let's recede.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. ...Senator Knuppel.

22. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

23. Mr. President, I find it interesting that the House
24. wants us to recede when a year ago they voted almost
25. unanimously in favor of a outright refund of all...of all
26. increases in tax. Now this has been diminished by the
27. amendment that was placed on this bill by Senator Clarke.
28. It seems strange...it seems very strange indeed that...the
29. Democrats or anyone else in the...in the House should
30. change their mind and now come to realize that what they
31. believe to be unworkable...what they had was an administrative
32. nightmare last year because they wanted refund of each of
33. the individual homeowners of whom there may be as many as

1. ten or eleven million people. This only calls for
2. refund to the districts of which there are five or
3. six thousand. It's always easy to have a tax
4. freeze on somebody else's pocketbook. What...what
5. they're telling us is they want a tax freeze that'll
6. injure the boys and girls back home because the
7. schools won't get their fair amount of revenue.
8. They want a tax freeze at the expense of the
9. municipalities but they don't want to pay a dime out
10. of here you see they're all for tax relief out of
11. your pocket, out of the pockets of the local units
12. of government and out of the pockets of the municipalities.
13. But as I said before the only way that we'll ever have
14. true tax relief is to change the source of benefits and
15. burdens. And this is what this bill does. We should
16. not recede and if somebody takes the rap for not getting
17. tax relief in this Session it should be the House, we
18. had to take it for them last winter and I'd say to you
19. Ladies and Gentlemen that it's a fraud. It's a fraud on
20. the people, on your school children, on the municipalities
21. if you remove...if you remove this amendment. This is
22. the way of the future. Let's get at it. To freeze some-
23. thing in an unworkable situation we wouldn't need a tax
24. freeze if our revenue collection and disbursement was
25. adequate. To freeze it in that condition and then un-
26. freeze it two years from now it's going to be in the same
27. condition. And I say to you that if you allow the House
28. to hang on you and you go back and tell your taxpayers
29. that you were against the tax freeze and they hang the burden
30. on you for killing it like they did the last time that
31. you're making a serious mistake and you're doing it at
32. the expense of your own boys and girls.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Clarke moves that the Senate recede
2. from Amendment No. 5 to HB 911. Senator Mitchler.

3. SENATOR MITCHLER:

4. Well Mr. President, members of the Senate, I've
5. studied this tax freeze misnomer that's been placed
6. before us on many occasions. It isn't any better
7. when it's placed before us in the original form now
8. than it was the Fall just before the election when
9. it made a good campaign issue. It's a misnomer.
10. You're telling the people you're going to freeze
11. their taxes. That's like the Scenic Rivers Bill,
12. Lake Michigan Bill of Rights and all those other
13. things that come up. But what are you telling the
14. people? If you could tell the people and guarantee
15. the people back home that their real estate taxes...that
16. the real estate taxes for the next two years would
17. not be higher or show any increase than they are today
18. then you'd be guaranteeing them something. But I tell
19. you, you put through this tax freeze and you're only
20. trying to fool them. Their taxes will be higher and
21. they won't be satisfied. Now if you vote against this
22. tax freeze in its original form without this amendment
23. it may sound good and many of you will be criticized
24. when you go home for not voting for a tax freeze because
25. it sounds good. But after a year or so they're going
26. to wake up to the fact that those that voted against
27. it and told you...told 'em it was a misnomer were correct
28. because the real estate taxes will be higher. You've got
29. ...you've got a income tax and you've got increases right
30. along in your real estate taxes.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. For what purpose does Senator Hall arise? Senator
33. Hall, for what purpose do you arise?

1. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

2. Well, I'm...I'm saying that...that Senator
3. Mitchler is not concerning himself with the...with
4. the...

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Your remarks should be confined to the amendment
7. under consideration, Senator Mitchler, which is
8. Senator Knuppel's amendment.

9. SENATOR MITCHLER:

10. All right and that's exactly what I was trying
11. to build up to because without this amendment you're
12. right back to where you started from and I don't think
13. that you had the support at that time that you had
14. after Senator Knuppel's amendment got on. When Senator
15. Knuppel's amendment got on you guaranteed the local govern-
16. ments they weren't going to lose any money under this
17. because you're going to have to increase services in
18. certain areas where you have more people coming in, more
19. industry and that includes the district I represent.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. For what...

22. SENATOR MITCHLER:

23. And that's why I voted for this after Senator
24. Knuppel's amendment got on. But if you're going to
25. play games and take his amendment off and succumb to
26. the way the House wants it over there you might lose me.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Sen..Senator Bell and then Senator Ozinga.
29. Senator Bell.

30. SENATOR BELL:

31. Well, Mr...Mr. President, members of the Senate,
32. this bill is not in the same form as it was in the 77th
33. General Assembly. It's been amended to four times.

1. Now there's provisions in the bill that allow for
2. the growth factors that allow for the schools to be
3. able to meet their needs and I say to you that the
4. people of the State of Illinois have spoken to us
5. time and time again during the past few years in
6. reference to the needs for a tax freeze. I think
7. it's time that we stood together, receded from
8. this amendment that is unworkable and pass this
9. bill out with the four amendments that have been
10. put on since the 77th General Assembly to make it
11. more workable. It's a good bill. Let's address
12. ourselves to the needs of the people. Let's make a
13. statement here. Let's send it back to the House and
14. let's pass it out of the Legislature.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Ozinga.

17. SENATOR OZINGA:

18. Mr. Pres...Mr. President, this thing has come up
19. and down, sideways, backwards, forwards, the amendment
20. that has been put on is a lousy amendment. The question
21. has been put and it's now my privilege to move the
22. previous question.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Ozinga moves the previous question. All
25. in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The
26. motion carries. Senator Clarke may close the debate
27. on the question receding from Amendment No. 5 to HB 911.
28. Let's go Tex.

29. SENATOR CLARKE:

30. I think everybody knows what they're voting on.
31. I urge an aye vote. I think this should go to the
32. Governor and I would appreciate your support.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Clarke moves to recede from HB 5 on...
2. Amendment 5 on HB 911. Parliamentary inquiry, Senator
3. Rock, requires 30 votes.
4. SENATOR ROCK:
5. Yeah...some of our members just asked and I don't
6. think they heard before the Chair has ruled that it
7. takes only 30 votes.
8. PRESIDENT:
9. Under the provisions of Article 9 Section 10.
10. Roll...roll 'em, Eddie.
11. SECRETARY:
12. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
13. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

13. The House refused to concur in Senate Amendment
14. No. 1.
15. SENATOR BARTULIS:
16. Wish to concur.
17. PRESIDENT:
18. Yeah. You wish to recede?
19. SENATOR BARTULIS:
20. Wish to recede rather, yeah.
21. PRESIDENT:
22. Senator Bartulis moves to recede from Senate
23. Amendment to HB 208. Call the roll.
24. SECRETARY:
25. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
26. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

16. I...I know. It pertains to this bill. We're

17. having some people on our side they're not voting for

18. the bill because they don't understand what the amend-

19. ment does. I just thought we might be able to pass

20. the bill if we had a very brief explanation.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Bartulis.

23. SENATOR BARTULIS:

24. ...All the amendment does is take away the paper

25. on...on this bill and I'd say half a loaf is better

26. than none.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Kenneth Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer,

29. Knuppel, Kosinski, McCarthy, Howard Mohr, Newhouse,

1. For what purpose does Senator Don Moore arise?
2. SENATOR MOORE:
3. How am I recorded, Mr. President?

5. How is Senator Don Moore recorded?

8. SENATOR MOORE:
9. ...I'd like to be recorded as aye.
10. PRESIDENT:
11. Change Senator Don Moore from no to aye. Senator
12. McBroom, aye. Senator Weaver, aye. Senator Schaffer,

22. For what purpose does Senator Walker arise? Is...
23. is Senator Walker recorded?
24. SENATOR WALKER:
25. How's my friend Sammy Vadalabene doing on the other
26. side?
27. PRESIDENT:
28. He's...Senator Rock, aye. On that question the yeas
29. are 30. The nays are 6. And the Senate recedes from its
30. amendment to House Bill 208. Next item.
31. SECRETARY:
32. 873, Senator Swinarski. House refused to concur in
33. Senate Amendment...No. 1. The House refused to concur in

1. Senate Amendment 1.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Swinarski.

4. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

5. Mr. President, I move to recede in the House
6. concurrence. What it is basically doing is this amend-
7. ment, which has been taken off in the House, is a
8. Federal Government...of approximately 90% of the funds
9. which are given to us by the Federal Government it
10. amounts to about \$22,000,000 from the State that we're
11. about to receive, also \$15,000,000 in extra categories.
12. And by this particular amendment it's making it very
13. restrictive in all categories, and by making it re-
14. strictive the Federal Government will delete from the
15. amount of money they're willing to give the State of
16. Illinois approximately \$32,000,000.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Swinarski moves to recede from the
19. Senate Amendment to HB 873. Is there...Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. I'm not certain that I heard the entire explanation
22. but my recollection is that if we do recede from this
23. amendment certain funds that would come from the Federal
24. Government would not be available to this branch of govern-
25. ment...State Government. Is that true, Senator?

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Swinarski.

28. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

29. That is correct, Senator. Approximately \$32,000,000.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Partee.

32. SENATOR PARTEE:

33. Well then why are we receding and taking a chance on

1. losing \$32,000,000 which this State so desperately needs?

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Swinarski.

4. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

5. This amendment was put on in the Senate. It was
6. taken off in the House. By receding from this amend-
7. ment we are taking off the amendment which is making
8. it more restrictive for the State to receive the funds.
9. By deleting this amendment we'll have the funds
10. available to the State.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Partee.

13. SENATOR PARTEE:

14. That answers my question. I just didn't under-
15. stand the nomenclature.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator McBroom.

18. SENATOR MCBROOM:

19. Well, Mr. President, I was off the Floor as you
20. know. I've been trying to work with Senator Hynes.
21. Senator Swinarski's called to talk to me about this
22. bill on several occasions. I had hoped it could be
23. discussed when I was on the Floor, Mr. President. If
24. you could bring me up to date I...I would appreciate
25. it.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Swinarski has moved to recede from the
28. Senate Amendment to HB 873. Senator Partee asked a
29. couple of questions. Senator Swinarski satisfied
30. him and I have now recognized you. Senator McBroom.

31. SENATOR MCBROOM:

32. I suggest we have a conference committee on
33. this Mr. President.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator McBroom calls for...what will be the
3. party roll call. Senator Swinarski's motion to
4. recede requires 30 votes. The Secretary will call
5. the roll. Senator Partee.

6. SENATOR PARTEE:

7. Well, I...I just wanted to say that I would
8. hope that there would be some persons in this
9. Body who would vote other than by their party iden-
10. tification. This is a very important amendment
11. in terms of bringing money to the State. \$32,000,000
12. is not to be sneezed at. And if this Senate Amend-
13. ment is so restrictive as to prevent the Federal
14. Government from bringing the \$32,000,000 that we would
15. be entitled to, except for the language of this Amend-
16. ment, I think it would be absolutely foolhardy to not
17. recede from this amendment.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. ...The motion is...or the question is that the
20. Senate recede from House...the Senate Amendment to HB
21. 873. Secretary will call the roll.

7. Nimrod, Regner, Savickas,
8. PRESIDENT:
9. Savickas, aye.
10. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
11. Soper, Sours,
12. PRESIDENT:
13. Senator Regner, no. Senator Glass, no. How
14. is Senator Conolly recorded?
15. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
16. Aye.
17. PRESIDENT:
18. Senator Conolly is recorded aye. Senator
19. Conolly, how do you wish to be recorded, Senator Conolly?
20. Senator Conolly wishes to be recorded no. Well,...
21. Senator Swinarski, I respond to Senator Conolly's re-
22. quest not yours in connection with Senator Conolly.
23. Now if you were paying attention Senator Conolly expressed
24. himself no. Senator Conolly, how do you wish to be re-
25. corded? Is that clear? Okay. All right. Three times
26. sometimes makes a difference. On that question the
27. Senate recede, the yeas are 29. The nays are 21. The
28. motion to recede fails and the House will be so informed.
29. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
30. HB 1045 the...refused to concur with...they concur
31. with Senate Amendment No. 1. Refuse to concur with
32. Senate Amendment No. 3. Senator Bruce.
33. PRESIDENT:

1. For what purpose does Senator Hynes arise?

2. SENATOR HYNES:

3. Mr. President, on the last bill, I think it
4. was HB 873, I think we ought to request a con-
5. ference committee on that.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. That message is inherent. It goes back to
8. the House. Senator Bruce, do you wish to proceed
9. on 1045? All right. Take it out of the record.
10. Message to the Senate.

11. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

12. Honorable Howard Mohr, Chairman, Committee on

2. HB 98, 3rd reading. Senator Rock.

3. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

4. HB 98 (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. 3rd reading of the bill.

6. SENATOR ROCK:

7. Thank...thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen
8. of the Senate, I wish Senator McCarthy were here so he could
9. see that Coach Elliott has not yet blown the whistle. HB 4679
10. which I sponsored in the 77th General Assembly did authorize
11. the Chicago Board of Education during 1972 to borrow up to
12. \$35,000,000 from the proceeds of the rehabilitation bond
13. fund. The Board did act and they borrowed some \$33,000,000.
14. What this bill does, and it's a very simple bill, it says the
15. Board of Education of the City of Chicago upon approval by
16. 3/5's of the members may use the proceeds of the sale or
17. mortgage of common school lands or any income from invest-
18. ments of such proceeds to repay any such loan. The law cur-
19. rently permits the use of funds received from the sale of prop-
20. erty for capital expenditure, but we are now saying here is
21. that they may use the same proceeds to repay...Oh, ok.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. We're trying to straighten out some other problems.

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. Ok. As I was saying when Senator Berning so rapidly
26. departed, the law currently permits the use of these funds
27. for capital expenditures. All we are saying here is that
28. we are permitting, authorizing the Chicago Board of
29. Education to use these funds to repay that money which
30. they have borrowed. Now, the sale of school property
31. requires the approval of the City Council of the City of
32. Chicago and 3/4's of the School Board. In addition, the
33. Board must approve by 3/5's vote the use of the proceeds

1. in this manner. All we are saying by this bill, we are
2. giving to the Chicago Board of Education another avenue
3. by which they might repay this \$33,000,000. The Board
4. will have to decide itself. The City Council will have
5. to approve it. We are seeking permissive legislation.
6. I urge an aye vote.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Glass.

9. SENATOR GLASS:

10. ...Senator Rock will yield for a question Mr. President.
11. I'd like to know Senator Rock whether this is constitutional.
12. In committee this question was asked and there was a some-
13. what of a difference of opinion on whether this could be
14. done. Do you have anything in your file on that?

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Rock.

17. SENATOR ROCK:

18. Yes, Senator. The question of constitutionality I
19. understand was raised in the Senate Education Committee.
20. It was in fact raised by me when the Chicago Board asked
21. me to sponsor this bill, as...as it came over from the
22. House. There was some question about the...an early
23. northwest ordinance, or early enactment of Congress as
24. to the use to which proceeds from the sale of common school
25. lands could be used. I frankly think this law, insofar as
26. it is totally permissive and does require a 3/5's vote of
27. the Board, and any sale requires approval of the City
28. Council, I happen to think frankly it is constitutional.
29. I know there are opinions to the contrary, but I think
30. it's constitutional.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Fawell.

33. SENATOR FAWELL:

1. I...I simply want to say we...as Chairman of the Edu-
2. cation Committee we...we did ask the Attorney General for an
3. opinion in this regard. He would give only an oral opinion,
4. but he did say it was constitutional. So that has been cleared.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Rock.

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. I want to say that's the first time in at least a couple
9. of weeks that the Attorney General and I have agreed. I would
10. urge an aye vote.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Further discussion? The question is shall HB 98 pass.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. HB 1323.

19. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

20. Well, I'll be glad to take that...

21. PRESIDENT:

22. All right, let's go...

23. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

24. ...we did get...1268 is on third reading?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Right. And we're going to call it next.

27. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

28. Oh. All right. Mr. President, members of the

8. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
9. HB 1323. (Secretary reads title of bill).
10. 3rd reading of the bill.
11. PRESIDENT:
12. Senator McCarthy.
13. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
14. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, thank
15. you. HB 1323 is an amendment to the Savings and Loan
16. Act which would allow banks and credit unions both to
17. participate with savings and loans insofar as...lending
18. money is concerned. This is...has the banking...backing
19. of the administration...backing of Commissioner Lanigan,
20. I withdrew an amendment that I had talked about. Senator
21. Merritt he...he supports the bill. Senator Bell supports
22. the bill. Senator Partee supports the bill. I would hope that
23. Mr. President you would support the bill along with every-
24. one else. Absolutely noncontroversial.
25. PRESIDENT:
26. What does Oren Mensick have to say about this?
27. SENATOR MCCARTHY:
28. ...I didn't get the signal yet.
29. PRESIDENT:
30. Any further discussion? Senator Merritt.
31. SENATOR MERRITT:
32. ...I assume we got on...on the order of third readings
33. here.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. That assumption is correct.

3. SENATOR MERRITT:

4. Is...Am I correct in assuming there has been no...
5. amendment...offered or adopted?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. The answer is yes.

8. SENATOR MERRITT:

9. Does the...bill is in its present form then.

10. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

11. Yes Senator Merritt. We...the banks are still in
12. the bill.

13. SENATOR MERRITT:

14. Fine. I'd...I give it my support.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Any further discussion? Kenny, call the roll.

29. Senator Kenneth Hall, Senator Rich Newhouse,

31. Senator Welsh, aye. On that question the yeas are
32. 40. The nays are 1. HB 1323 having received the
33. constitutional majority is declared passed.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Knuppel, you're wanted on the telephone.
3. Seriously, they'll have to get the bill. Girls. Girls.

4. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

5. HB 1268. (Secretary reads title of bill).
6. 3rd reading of the bill.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Knuppel.

9. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

10. Mr. President, this bill doesn't do exactly what
11. the caption says it does. However what it does do is
12. raise Workmen's Compensation benefit by 14%. It's un-
13. fortunate that we couldn't have done this earlier in
14. the Session and at this hour we're all acquainted with
15. what's in the bill. You're either for it or you're
16. against it. It's time that these people received the
17. cost of living increase in their Workmen's Compensation
18. Benefits and I recommend a Do Pass vote.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Glass.

21. SENATOR GLASS:

22. I'd like to ask the sponsor a question...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. He indicates he'll yield.

25. SENATOR GLASS:

26. ...Senator Knuppel we've heard a lot about a 14%
27. increase in Workmen's Comp benefits but wasn't there...
28. just a 20% increase last year?

29. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

30. Sir, I...I believe that was in 1971. That's two
31. years ago.

32. SENATOR GLASS:

33. When...when was it effective?

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

2. Well, it was effective in the Fall of that year
3. on October 1st the same as this will be if it's adopted.

4. SENATOR GLASS:

5. Well...

6. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

7. It's been two years.

8. SENATOR GLASS:

9. Well, it seems that 10% a year and I think the...
10. Body ought to know that when we talk about a Workmen's
11. Comp increase of 14% that...there just has been a sub-
12. stantial one and I would certainly urge opposition to
13. this bill.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Newhouse.

16. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

17. Mr. President...I don't want to take up a lot of
18. time but I do want to make one thing clear and that's
19. this. Out of respect for Senator Knuppel and out of
20. respect for Senator McCarthy I'm going to vote for this
21. bill and I want the leaders of organized labor to know
22. that that's why I'm voting for this bill. I got a number
23. of reasons why I wouldn't otherwise but those two and
24. the people it's going to protect. And that's the only
25. reason why I'm going to vote aye on this bill but I will
26. vote that way.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. 14%...Senator Glass is not a large amount when you
31. consider the increased cost in hospitalization and doctor's
32. bills in the last two years. Hospitalization has gone up
33. over 20% in the last two years and medical care and attention
has soared in that kind of a proportion. So when you have

1. the feeling of tenderness for the employer don't forget
2. that it cost more to be hurt. It cost more to be injured.
3. It cost more to get well today than it did two years ago.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Nimrod.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. Mr. President, I think the sponsor said it when he
8. said this bill doesn't do what it says. I think what we
9. all know is that this is not intended to help the worker.
10. We know that at this very last minute...we know at this
11. very last minute that they have taken, I'm talking about
12. organized labor, and destroyed every means of having
13. the employees benefits whom they're supposed to represent
14. labor is the...is the...is the champion of collective
15. bargaining and yet they say they cannot sit down with
16. management and reach a decision. The reason they can't
17. is because they haven't tried. This is a one way ticket.
18. The money will not go to the...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Proceed, Senator Nimrod.

21. SENATOR NIMROD:

22. The money is not going to go to the employees. It's
23. a crime when only 34 or 35¢ out of every dollar ends up in the...
24. in the injured pocket. We end up with all this money
25. that's going here...most of it's going to go for other
26. people and for other costs. You are not doing right when
27. you leave the widow...when they leave that widow and those
28. children without any money when a...when a person is killed
29. on a job and they end up with \$30,000 rather than getting
30. a \$150,000. I think they got your standards all mixed up.
31. You've got your values all mixed up. And on the last
32. minute, on the last day and within the last hours you're
33. trying to run something through. And those of you whoo

1. that have traded your vote for this vote tonight you
2. just remember what you're doing. You're giving a one
3. way ticket, not a two way ticket, you're giving a one
4. way ticket that's going down the drain and not letting
5. people sit down and do the job. They're making you do
6. the job for them. Labor and management are capable of
7. reaching an agreement and reaching a decision and coming
8. to us. Instead you have taken that task upon yourself.
9. I would urge us all to realize what is happening here
10. tonight and let's be concerned about this little man, this
11. stiff that we've been talking about and not about all the
12. other people that're going to benefit from this. I've
13. worked in the Industrial Commission. I worked there for
14. three years. I've seen the inequities that exist. I see
15. the fact that we do not help our injured with the rehab-
16. ilatation. We don't help them with compensation properly
17. and yet we sit here and take this meager way out. I
18. would hope that we would not accept this, and force labor
19. and management to come back with a proper package.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Sommer.

22. SENATOR SOMMER:

23. I has just been stated by my distinguished colleague
24. that the working man only gets 34 and 35 percent of an award.
25. I represent workingmen in my law practice and the State law
26. says you can get no more 20 percent of any award as an attorney.
27. And quite often when you present your bills before the
28. Commission they're reduced. Those of us who represent the
29. workingman in this capacity do it out of...out of a love
30. of trying to help a man who's worked hard all his life.
31. And that's why I do it. I've never made any money at it
32. particularly but I have seen the workingman struggle hard
33. and I can assure you that he gets more than 34 and 35 percent.

1. And if the implication is made that somebody else is
2. siphoning that money I want it answered. Where is that
3. money going, Senator Nimrod?

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Nimrod.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. I'm glad you asked, Senator Sommer. There are a
8. number of attorneys who represent properly but when you
9. start looking at the costs of what is involved with the
10. medical fees and all the costs that are involved when
11. applying are through the records are there. I would like
12. ...that's why I want to have a study commission so we
13. don't start increasing these benefits and go away. I'm
14. sorry that you make the effort for these people to get
15. that money and yet it doesn't get to them. I would like
16. to see us force them to come up with a study commission
17. between labor and management and find out where that
18. money goes. So instead you're saying arbitrarily...
19. instead you're saying arbitrarily just give them a raise
20. and let's not worry about it it will get there. There
21. are a number of dedicated people such as you but I'm
22. sorry to say that statistics and facts do not prove it out
23. and we ought to know where that money is going.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Sommer.

26. SENATOR SOMMER:

27. Senator Nimrod it was also said that I traded my
28. vote on this or someone else did and I can assure you
29. that I was elected by the people of this State in my
30. district and I've never traded a vote and nobody owns
31. my vote.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Is there further discussion? The quest...Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL: .

2. In summary all I can say is I agree with Senator
3. Sommer. I've represented clients in the workmen's
4. compensation field for some 20 years and even the smallest
5. claim 20% marks the total. And the larger claim, death
6. claims, I'm lucky if I get 5% the widow gets the rest of
7. it and anybody who pursues this as a vocation knows this.
8. I say to Senator Glass who raised the question of the 10%
9. that that 20% they got two years ago was to cover the two
10. years they hadn't had it or the four years they hadn't
11. had it before that. This is a modest increase after two
12. years of waiting and I don't think the widows ought to
13. have to wait another two years. I'd ask for an aye vote.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. The question is, shall HB 1268 pass? The Secretary
16. will call the roll.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

4. To yield to Senator McCarthy to make the motion
5. to reconsider which I will move to Table. After it's
6. announced obviously.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. On that question the yeas are 36. The nays are
9. 13. HB 1268...Senator Mitchler has requested a
10. verification. Secretary will call for those who voted
11. in the affirmative. Senators will be in their seats.
12. Senator Mitchler, you wish a verification of those
13. voting in the affirmative. Yes.

14. SECRETARY:

28. 1268 having received a constitutional majority is
29. declared passed. Senator Rock yields to Senator McCarthy
30. for the purpose of reconsidering and Senator Rock moves
31. to Table. All in favor of the motion to Table signify
32. by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion carries.

33. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

1. Thanks, Ray...Elliott. We got the game.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. HB 1471...is there...Senator in charge of that
4. bill?

5. SECRETARY:

6. HB 1471. (Secretary reads title of bill).

7. 3rd reading of the bill.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator McCarthy.

10. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

11. Yes...Mr. President, members of the Senate, on
12. this bill I do not anticipate any debate. This bill
13. elevates a rate of unemployment compensation according
14. to a formula that was worked out in the House. It was
15. agreed between the Chamber of Commerce and sponsors of

33. Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL:
2. HB 518 to whatever Committee it was in, I assume
3. was Local Government.
4. SECRETARY:
5. Revenue.
6. SENATOR KNUPPEL:
7. Revenue. All right recommit it to Revenue.
8. PRESIDENT:
9. ...Senator Knuppel moves to recommit HB 518 to
10. the Committee on Revenue. All in favor...Senator Hall,
11. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

31. Senator Rock moves to Table House Bills 1838 through
32. 1842. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no.
33. Motion carries. The bills are Tabled. Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

2. I move to Table SB 115.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Knuppel moves to Table SB 115. All in
5. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion
6. carries. HB...SB 18...SB 115 is Tabled. Senator Palmer.

7. SENATOR PALMER:

8. You promise to applaud I move to Table HB 717.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Palmer moves to Table HB 717. All in
11. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. Motion
12. carries. HB 717 is Tabled. Senator...Senator Welsh.

13. SENATOR WELSH:

14. Mr. President, I move to Table HB 370.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Welsh moves to Table HB 370. All in
17. favor signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The motion
18. carries. HB 370 is Tabled. House Bills 1565, Senator
19. McCarthy.

20. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

21. Yes, Mr. President, House...oh...

22. PRESIDENT:

23. 1565.

24. SECRETARY:

25. HB 1565. (Secretary reads title of bill).
26. 3rd reading of the bill.

27. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

28. Yes, Mr. President, HB 1565 sponsored in the House
29. by Representative Berman amends the...this amends the
30. General State Aid to Education in...it...it affects the
31. weighted average daily attendance. What it means is,
32. from this point forward in those areas...districts in
33. the State that have declining enrollments the school

1. can use for its distribution formula the preceding year...
2. in making its claim. But...so it's a one year carry back
3. but terminates each year. This...affects favorably about
4. 542 districts in the State of Illinois. It cleared Committee
5. with Senator Fawell as Chairman, unanimously. I know of no
6. opposition. I recommend its passage to you.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Knuepfer.

9. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

10. ...I just like to point out to Senator McCarthy
11. there is at least one Senator in opposition. Last year we
12. had one or two school districts who decided it would be
13. advantageous to take advantage of the fact that...or had
14. a problem with the fact their school district was reduced.
15. This year I understand you've gotten up to 542. ...Senator
16. this doesn't solve any problems. This is the kind of thing
17. that occurs generally because of poor planning. ..I...I
18. certainly encourage a no vote on this. School districts
19. ought to be able to determine the enrollment. If they can't
20. determine the enrollment something's wrong with the process.
21. Something's wrong with the way they operate. We are con-
22. tinuing to give people the benefit of the doubt this, that
23. or the other. Next year I suspect you will have a bill up
24. for 1058 school districts exempted. I'm for...I'm one
25. who's in opposition to this concept.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there further discussion? Is there further
28. discussion? Sention McCarthy.

29. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

30. Well, just this...Senator Knuepfer...the bill two years
31. ago took into consideration two different facets. One was
32. in the districts where they had a population break between
33. 20 thousand and 10 thousand. And then there was the general

1. provision to take care of all school districts with
2. declining enrollment. This bill does not go into the
3. population breaks at all but merely continues that
4. portion of the bill of two years ago to take care of
5. declining enrollments. And so that we understand
6. each other. And...I would...I understand Senator
7. I...I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is there further discussion? The question is,
10. shall HB 1565 pass? Senator Newhouse.

11. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

12. Very briefly Mr. President and Senators, in the
13. metropolitan areas particularly the areas in which I...
14. the area from which I come for example there's a great
15. deal of movement in that area that's occasioned by
16. metropolitan development. Let me give you an example.
17. In the last several years either in my district or
18. adjacent to it there's been a great deal of construction
19. that required the demolition of a number of housing units.
20. For example the Dan Ryan Expressway moved an awful lot of
21. people around. The development at Lake Meadows moved an
22. awful lot of people around. We're talking now about a
23. crosstown expressway that moves an awful lot of people
24. around. There is a continuing redevelopment of cities
25. in the metropolitan areas and this is healthy in some
26. respects. It means new housing units. It means a different
27. kind of housing for an awful lot of people who don't have
28. the complete control that people who live in individual
29. houses with their mortgages have. We're talking about
30. renters. We're talking about people who rent. Who are
31. ...who are not at the mercy of entrepreneurs...I won't
32. put it that way but who have to live where housing is
33. being built. This means then that there's an awful lot

1. movement back and forth. Movement back and forth
2. means that school enrollment varies from one day
3. to the next based upon factors that those people
4. who attend those schools cannot control. In those
5. instances a bill of this nature is almost absolutely
6. necessary for us to continue a school system that
7. will do for us, do for the State of Illinois, needs to
8. be done and that is to provide adequate education.
9. Without...without an amendment of this sort...with-
10. out a bill of this sort we're in constant trouble.
11. Our school board simply cannot perform their function
12. and we need very desperately legislation of this kind
13. ought to do the job that needs to be done and I would
14. certainly support this amendment. Would hope that
15. we would have others to join us and an aye roll call
16. on this. Thank you Mr. President.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Question is, shall HB 1565 pass? Secretary
19. will call the roll.

20. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

21. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Nimrod, aye. Scholl, aye. Mitchler, aye.
33. McBroom, aye. Ozinga, aye. Dougherty, aye. Palmer, aye.

1. Got it? On that question the yeas are 33. The nays
2. are 3. HB 1565 having received a constitutional majority
3. is declared passed. Senator Carroll moves to reconsider.
4. Senator McCarthy moves to Table. All in favor of the
5. motion to Table signify by saying aye. Contrary no. The
6. motion to Table prevails. The next...the bill that is
7. next order numerically is HB 16...no I'm sorry. We skipped
8. Senator Dougherty. Senator Dougherty did you have any
9. discussion with Senator...oh Senator Berning is on the
10. Floor. Yeah.

11. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

12. I don't see him, I...he was here yeah.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Yeah. He's...he's...Senator Berning. Can you come
15. to the podium please? Senator McCarthy's bill is next
16. in numerical order. 1631. That bill has been read a first
17. ...a second time previously. It is on the order of third
18. reading. HB 1631.

19. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

20. HB 1631. (Secretary reads title of bill).

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

23. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. HB
24. 1631 is now in the same shape when it was unanimously
25. approved by the Industry and Labor Committee. What the
26. bill does is incorporate in the Illinois Unemployment
27. Compensation Act certain features and words of the Federal
28. Unemployment Act. I understand it is a necessary
29. procedural type of bill. No money involved as such.
30. No opposition. I would encourage a favorable roll call
31. on this matter.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Is there further discussion? The question is,

1. shall HB 1631 pass? Secretary will call the roll.

2. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

14. Senator Schaffer, aye. Senator McBroom, aye.
15. Senat...Senator Glass, aye. Senator Merritt, aye.
16. Senator Latherow, aye. Senator Shapiro, aye.

17. On that question in behalf of Alan Ameche the yeas
18. are 38. The nays are 1. Sokoy voting present.

19. And the bill having received a constitutional majority
20. is declared passed. Senator Dougherty, HB 1912.

21. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

22. HB 1912. (Secretary reads title of bill).
23. 3rd reading of the bill.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Dougherty.

26. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

27. Mr. President, HB 1912 provides for an increase
28. in the bonding power to the Chicago Board of Education
29. for the purpose of increasing their working cash fund.
30. As you know every school district in the State of Illinois
31. except Chicago has the privilege of levying a tax...a
32. tax of 75% of their educational fund for the purpose of
33. an operating and working cash fund. We do not have that

in Chicago and our...our educational levy is
278,000,000. Seventy-five percent of this would
be \$208,000,000. Now this bill provides that we
1. could issue bonds in the amount of \$25,000,000
2. for the purpose of achieving what is a right...
3. enjoyed by all other school districts 75% of our
4. education levy for the purpose of operating our
5. working cash fund. Now if we were...to be denied
6. this it would mean we'd have to go out in the
7. market and borrow money from year to year and to
8. pay interest which we will have to pay on these
9. bonds anyway. I do not deny this. However if
10. we go on a year to year basis we will be just
11. paying the interest on it we will have no surplus.
12. This...by issuing these bonds, we will be able to
13. pay the interest as we would have to pay on any
14. other circumstances and still retain this \$25,000,000
15. on a working cash fund. This is very equitable. It
16. was not...approved of by the Committee on Education
17. and I do not know of any other opposition to it at
18. least I have heard of none. I have not heard from
19. the Civic Federation or any other... I would urge
20. a favorable roll call.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Harber Hall.

23. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

24. Would the sponsor yield for a question?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Indicates that he will.

27. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

28. I...I wonder Senator Dougherty if this is issuance
29. of these bonds without referendum?

30. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

31. That is true.

32. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

33. I wonder if this would increase the percent of interest
on these bonds from 6 to 7%.

SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

1. I have placed an amendment on there that indicates that
2. the bonds not to exceed 7%.

3. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

4. ...That increases it which is now 6% to 7%. Is
5. that right?

6. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

7. Not...not...not to exceed 7%.

8. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

9. Not to exceed 7%.

10. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

11. But...as the average...at the present time as far
12. as I'm able to determine we are paying 5 to 5 1/4%.

13. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

14. Right. Tax free.

15. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

16. ...That...that is true.

17. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

18. That's tax exempt.

19. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

20. That...that's...

21. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

22.You're raising that to 7% is that roughly...

23. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

24. I, no sir, I did not...

25. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

26. Is that...is that...excuse me Senator Dougherty
27. is that roughly the equivalent of 14%...

28. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

29. You are most correct.

30. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

31. ...for most investors?

32. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

33. You are correct.

1. SENATOR HARBER HALL:
2. Thank you, Sir.
3. PRESIDENT:
4. Senator...Senator Hall.
5. SENATOR HARBER HALL:
6. Well, I...I think maybe Senator McCarthy would
7. take some interest in this.
8. PRESIDENT:
9. Is there...Senator Dougherty. Is there further
10. discussion?
11. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:
12. I would appreciate a favorable roll call.
13. PRESIDENT:
14. Question is, shall HB 1912 pass? Secretary will
15. call the roll.
16. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):
17. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
18. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,
19. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth

32. SENATOR HARBER HALL:
33. I would like to verify the affirmative roll call.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Hall requests a verification of the
3. affirmative votes. Senators will be in their seats.
4. Secretary will proceed with the verification.

5. ACTING SECRETARY (MR. WRIGHT):

6. Bartulis, Buzbee, Carroll, Course, Daley,
7. Davidson, Donnewald, Dougherty, Glass, Kenneth Hall,
8. Johns, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski, McCarthy, Don
9. Moore, Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman, Palmer,

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Hall. Is Senator Don Moore within the
14. bar? Remove Senator Moore from the roll call. Senator
15. Swinarski. Is Senator Swinarski recorded? You are not
16. recorded and on verification there is nothing we can do.
17. Senator Bell, for what purpose do you arise? For what
18. purpose do you arise, Senator Bell? Is Senator Bartulis
19. recorded? Yeah. Well, now the Secretary has an extremely
20. difficult problem and I am certain that no one questions
21. the integrity of the recording by the Secretary. On...
22. will...will you tabulate those who are recorded in the
23. affirmative, Mr. Secretary, and report to me. For what
24. purpose does Senator Swinarski seek recognition? Well,
25. Senator, don't raise this question please. If you are
26. questioning the integrity of the Secretary I'm going to
27. raise a point of objection. Now we're going to protect

30. question of subjective determination. The roll call has

22. I'm certain of that but I...

23. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

24. ...nor was I...comment please.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Proceed.

27. SENATOR SWINARSKI:

28. Thank you very much. I was not challenging the
29. integrity of the Secretary of the Senate nor the
30. President of the Senate but we must recognize that we
31. do have an audibility problem in this Chamber and it
32. is possible at times that the Secretary of the Senate
33. could not have heard the voice vote. And I therefore

1. am saying on that particular question although I'll
2. stand with the opinion of the Chair that I did vote
3. although there could have been an audibility problem
4. and not a problem of integrity.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Regner.

7. SENATOR REGNER:

8. The only thing I question Mr. President is you
9. announced 30 prior to the verification. When the
10. verification came one man was removed from the roll
11. call and then we had 31. And I just wonder is this
12. new math or what?

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Well, Senator Regner, I've tried to make an
15. explanation here of what can happen and it is not
16. new math. Senator Rock and then Senator Harber
17. Hall.

18. SENATOR ROCK:

19. Mr. President so that we may get on with the
20. business of the Senate having voted on the prevailing
21. side I move to reconsider the vote by which...

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Well, now...

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. ...1912 passed.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Well. I indicated that I was going to recognize
28. Senator Hall. Senator...

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. ...withdraw then.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Hall.

33. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

1. Mr. President, I'm satisfied with the work of the
2. Secretary and I would second Senator Rock's motion.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Rock moves to reconsider. Senator Hall
5. moves to Table. All in favor signify by saying aye.
6. Contrary no. The motion carries. Is Senator Sommer
7. in the Chamber? HB 1987. Senator Sommer.

8. SENATOR SOMMER:

9. Mr. President and fellow members I find myself
10. in the unique position of handling an administration
11. measure. ...What it does it...it furnishes to the
12. Bureau of the Budget a certain amount of expense
13. money to sell Capital Development Bonds. This was
14. inadvertently left out in the enabling legislation and
15. it's a very necessary piece of legislation and I
16. hope we could meet our responsibilities to the State
17. and all of the people here by passing this bill. I would
18. urge a favorable roll call.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Is there further discussion? The question is,

4. 1987 having received the constitutional majority
5. declared passed. Senator Carroll on HB 1631. 1639.
6. You have a motion Senator.
7. SENATOR CARROLL:

8. Now Mr. President this is a bill on second
9. reading. There is an amendment on the Secretary's
10. desk. I would ask that the amendment be read. That

13. HB 1639. (Secretary reads title of bill).

28. SENATOR SOPER:

29. ...Senator Knuppel. Senator Knuppel. I'm very happy
30. to have you say something nice at the end of this
31. Session. And not in a loud cantankerous voice and you
32. didn't slam down your mike. I think we've mellowed you

7. adopted, 1, 3 and 4 and that these amendments are agreed
8. to by both sides. Hence I move you that we...concur in

29. Johns, aye. Bruce, aye. On that question the yeas are
30. 37. The nays are none. Senate concur on...House Amendments
31. 1, 3 and 4 to SB 379. Senator Harber Hall. Senator Harber
32. Hall.

33. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

1. Well, Mr. President, another point of personal
2. privilege. I would like to take this opportunity
3. in the slowing down of the Senate's activity to say
4. that as one member of this Senate, a freshman member
5. if you please, Mr. President, that in the last six
6. months that I've been privileged to serve the people
7. of Illinois in the State Senate of Illinois one of
8. the most pleasing and satisfying and frankly positive
9. associations that I've ever been privileged to par-
10. ticipate in Mr. President is the privilege of serving
11. with the Minority Leader of this distinguished House
12. in the General Assembly of the State. And I think
13. with the last days of this General Assembly on us I
14. would be remiss not to say to my colleagues in the
15. Senate that we have among us one of the finest, highest
16. gentleman of personal character that I have ever known.
17. And this is one individual I would say, Cecil Partee,
18. wherever our paths may lead us individually I want you
19. to know that I appreciate the friendship that I've come
20. to know between the two of us as colleagues working on
21. adversary sides, if you please, but on the people's
22. business. I appreciate your honesty, your forthrightness
23. and your diligence to the people's work. And I just want
24. to make that statement before my colleagues here in the
25. Senate.

26. SENATOR HARRIS:

27. Mr. President, if I might have the attention of the
28. Senate might I inquire, are there any other items of
29. business on the Secretary's desk?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

31. We just received two, Mr. President.

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. All right. Let's dispose of those then I'll have

1. an announcement.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

3. Mr. Secretary.

4. SECRETARY:

5. A Message from the House by Mr. Selcke.

6. (Secretary reads Message).

7. SB 296 with House Amendment No. 1. Senator Swinarski.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. Senator Swinarski here?

10. SECRETARY:

11. Commissioner of banks and trust company bill.

12. SB 296.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

14. SB 3.

15. SECRETARY:

16. SB 3 and SB 83. That's all right. They're
17. just setting up the conference committee. ...796...

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

19. Is that...does somebody want to handle that for
20. Senator Swinarski. We'll hold it....President Harris.

21. SENATOR HARRIS:

22. Mr. President, members of the Senate, with the
23. knowledge that our work tomorrow will require 36 votes
24. for passage of every legislation...every piece of legis-
25. lation before us I want to urge the members be here ready
26. to go at noon tomorrow July 1st. If there is nothing
27. further to come before the Senate tonight June 30th I
28. want to move that the Senate adjourn until 12 o'clock
29. noon tomorrow July 1st. I will withhold the motion for
30. the opportunity for any member to bring before the
31. Senate any last item of business.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

33. Senator Walker.

1. SENATOR WALKER:

2. ...Thank you Mr. President...members of the
3. Senate I would like to be removed as sponsor of
4. Senate Bills 443 and 591 and I ask unanimous con-
5. sent for that leave and that the leadership on
6. this side or the other side pick a principal
7. sponsor for those two bills. And if you wish my
8. reasons I'll give them to you. We were told that
9. we would be out of here by this time this morning
10. now we're coming back at noon tomorrow. Some of
11. us have made some commitments. I personally have
12. to be in the Civic Center at 9:30 Monday morning.
13. I have nothing to go on here. We're going to be
14. back at noon tomorrow. We may be back at noon
15. Monday and I don't intend to break this commitment.
16. I haven't...I hope I haven't usurped the time of
17. this Senate this Session as a lot of freshman have,
18. trying to win that freshman award. I think after
19. 16 years I've learned to appreciate what each
20. member of the Senate and also the House time means
21. to them. I don't blame the Senate leadership. I
22. blame the House leadership. We've been in Session
23. when they haven't been in Session. We've been
24. sitting here playing Mickey the Mope for the House
25. for the last week or two and I, for one, don't
26. appreciate it and I, for one, think I have the
27. intestinal fortitude to stand up here and so say.
28. I'm going to close with this. I have two bills here
29. for the Board of Governors. I wanted to move tonight
30. to concur in the House Amendments but for some reason
31. I was precluded from so doing. I don't know whether
32. there's been a conference committee appointed. If so, I don't
33. know what they're doing and I don't intend to be back

1. here at noon tomorrow and I hope all of my constituents
2. are listening to find out what they're going to do.
3. They have to have a second sponsor on there and if the
4. second sponsor will please take over I will bid you
5. adieu and I've enjoyed your company.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

7. Senator I would just point out...President Harris.
8. SENATOR HARRIS:

9. No. Senator Rock...

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

11. Senator Rock.

12. SENATOR ROCK:

13. Those two bills are in fact in conference committee.
14. I will be most happy to have the Journal show that I am
15. the chief sponsor.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. I will...I would point out Senator Walker that the
18. conference committees are made up sometimes the names are
19. ...submitted in advance and when they're read here a note
20. is taken in my office and within five minutes...or ten
21. minutes at the outside a conference committee has been
22. appointed by this Body. Delay is on the other side of
23. the rotunda and I would have to agree that's where the
24. delay has been. Senator Nudelman. Senator Nudelman.

25. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

26. Mr. President, I'd like to get a reading. I don't
27. want to be as precipitous as Senator Walker and I don't
28. want to win any awards but I'd like a reading on how
29. long leadership thinks we'll be here tomorrow. Or if it's
30. going to go beyond tomorrow.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. President Harris.

33. SENATOR HARRIS:

1. Well, Senator Nudelman, if I could make an
2. accurate estimate of how long it will take to
3. finish business of the State of Illinois by this
4. Body tomorrow I certainly would. We have at least
5. 30 or 40 important items of business yet unresolved.
6. in connection with the implementation of the budget.
7. The Senate has been prepared for at least three days
8. and if there had been equal cooperation on the other
9. side of the rotunda we would have finished up our
10. business sometime ago tonight. It's not possible
11. for me to be definitive about how long it will take
12. tomorrow. It is my suggestion that we adjourn until
13. noon. Give us some time to get some rest. Many of
14. us are going to be back in here early. Staff will be
15. in here early being prepared for the work that has to
16. be taken care of beginning at noon. I would hope that
17. it would take us no longer than three or four hours
18. tomorrow but there is no way in my judgment for anyone
19. at this point to say precisely how long it will take.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Senator Nudelman.

22. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

23. Mr. President if this motion is in order I would
24. make it. I would move you sir that all matter not
