1. (Secretary reads title of SB No. 1) 2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR): 3. Senator Harris. 4. SENATOR HARRIS: 5. Mr. President, members of the Senate, point 6. of inquiry...we are on the order of introduction 7. of bills? Yes. I want to call attention to the 8. Senate that on the Secretary's desk is SB 1 in 9. the Second Special Session of the 78th General 10. Assembly sponsored by the President and the 29 11. other Republican Senators. This bill addresses 12. itself to the question of tax relief. It provides for direct tax relief without any confusion. 13. provides for tax relief with no additional adminis-14. .15. trative cost. We have calculated that the effect 16. on a per capita basis in the operation of the present 17. sales tax for vernacular identification operations 18. that the effect of this will be to provide tax relief 19. on a per capita basis of \$14 per person as compared 20. to a suggested plan by the Governor of \$10 per individual 21. relating to those who apply. The cost of this suggestion 22. the administrative cost has been estimated at anywhere 23. from four to six million dollars. Certainly those who 24. are members of the Revenue Committee recall the testimony of the Department of Revenue when Senator Weaver's bill 25. 26. providing for rebates under the provisions of the Sales 27. Tax Act relating only to food purchases and medicine purchases and restricted to ten thousand dollars a year 28. 29. my recollection is gross income - Senator Weaver is off 30. the Floor right now - but essentially those were the. facts involved in Senator Weaver's bill. That would 31. involve far less numbers than every individual in the 32.

- was estimated at four million dollars. The cost of 1. 2. administration of the Governor's plan has to be admitted to be significantly more expensive than that. 3. I make the point that tax relief, that's what we're 4. 5. talking about, tax relief should be accomplished through the means of reducing a tax and not providing 6. for the distribution of State largess through some 7. scheme of rebate or redistribution of what must be 8. 9. then a surplus accumulated because the existing taxes 10. are too high.
