1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. The Senate will please be in order. Senate will be
3. open, after the invocation by the Reverend Marvin L.
4. Matzke, of the Trinity Lutheran Church of Jim Bottomely's
5. home town, Nokomis, Illinois. Reverend Matzke.

6. (Prayer by Reverend Matzke,
7. Trinity Lutheran Church,
8. Nokomis, Illinois)

9. Thank you Reverend Matzke. The Senate will be open on
10. Special Session number Three. Senator Soper, reading of
11. the Journal. Senator Soper.

12. SENATOR SOPER:

13. Mr. President I move that we postpone the reading of
14. the Journal of November 6th pending the arrival of the
15. printed Journal.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

17. You've heard the motion of the Senator from Cicero.
18. All in favor will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The
19. ayes have it, the motion carries. Committee reports.

20. SECRETARY:

21. (Secretary reads Committee reports)

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

23. Introduction of bills.

24. SECRETARY:

25. SB number 40 by Senators Fawell, Harris and Walker.

26. (Secretary reads title of bill)

27. 1st reading of the bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. Senator Fawell.

30. SENATOR FAWELL:

31. Yes, Mr. President this...I've talked to Senator
32. Saperstein in regard to this bill and Tom Hynes also
33. had a copy given to him. What it does is the last Session

1. the...this particular section of the School Code dealing
2. with the Life Safety Code was incorrectly drawn by going
3. back to the '71 Revised Statutes rather than to the Statutes
4. as supplemented by the '72. So it left out a section that
5. was actually in the law, passed and...was in the '72
6. Supplement to the Revised Statutes. This is designed
7. to simply put the bill...put the law, Section 7...17-2.11
8. and 17-211-a of the Life Safety Code back to where it
9. was before it got goofed up in the last Session. We simply
10. insert bond provisions back so we have the automatic levy
11. as you had before. This was inadvertently left out and a
12. bunch of bonds cannot be sold right now without this so
13. I am asking that...for unanimous consent to have the bill
14. read a 1st time and advanced to the order of 2nd reading.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. You have... Senator Rock.

17. SENATOR ROCK:

18. No, I...I don't have any particular objections, Senator...
19. in your judgment is this within the purview of the call?

20. SENATOR FAWELL:

21. Yes. It is.

22. SENATOR ROCK:

23. All right. Well, we can...why don't we move it
24. and...

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. You have heard the motion of the Senator from Naperville.
27. Bill just introduced be read a 1st time, advanced to the order
28. of 2nd reading without reference to committee. All in favor
29. of the motion signify by saying aye. The bill has been a
30. read a 1st time and it will now be shown on the Calendar on
31. the order of 2nd reading. Any further introduction of bills?
32. Any further business on the Secretary's desk at this moment?
33. The leadership...Senator...Partee and Senator Harris are meeting

1. now. I have been informed and correct me if I am not
2. informed correctly Senator Rock, Senator Carroll that
3. Senate Bills 23 and 24 on the order of 3rd reading in
4. the Third Special Session are to be called back to 2nd
5. reading for the purpose of considering amendments. If
6. that is in agreement then I recognize Senator Carroll.
7. For making a motion.

8. SENATOR CARROLL:

9. Thank you Mr. President. I would move that Senate
10. Bill...Third Special Session, SB 23 be brought back to the
11. order of 2nd reading for purposes of amendment. There's
12. an amendment on the Secretary's desk.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. All in favor of the motion of Senator Carroll to have
15. SB 23 recalled to the order of 2nd reading will signify by
16. saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it, the bill is now
17. on the order of 2nd reading. And the Secretary...you want
18. him to read the amendment Senator Carroll? Senator Carroll.

19. SENATOR CARROLL:

20. Mr. President, I would move the adoption of the
21. amendment. It's an agreed amendment between the staffs
22. and Appropriation Committee on both sides so that the
23. funds are earmarked for the specific purpose. Drafted
24. by the Republican staff.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

26. I better not disagree then, had I? Any further
27. discussion? All in favor of the adoption of Amendment
28. No. 1 to SB 23 will signify by saying aye. Opposed.
29. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Any further
30. amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Senator Carroll.

31. SENATOR CARROLL:

32. Yes now Mr. President, on Third Special Session, SB
33. 24 I would move...I would ask leave that the bill be brought

1. back to the order of 2nd reading for purposes of an agreed
2. amendment.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. Senator Carroll requests leave be granted to return
5. SB 24 to the order of 2nd reading for purposes of considering
6. an amendment. Is leave granted? Leave is granted, the bill
7. is now on the order of 2nd reading. Discuss your amendment,
8. Senator Carroll.

9. SENATOR CARROLL:

10. This is a...

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. May we have some order please? The Senate really
13. is in Session, Gentlemen in southeast corner.

14. SENATOR CARROLL:

15. Thank you Mr. President. This is an agreed amendment
16. reducing the amount of the appropriation to 7/12's of
17. the original amount of the bill to bring it into line
18. to the rest of the fiscal year and I would move the adoption
19. of the amendment.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. All in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1
22. to SB 24 will signify by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes
23. have it, the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments
24. from the Floor? 3rd reading. Could the Chair inquire the
25. purpose of the caucus in the southeast corner of the Senate
26. Chamber please? Could...could the Chair inquire the purpose
27. of the caucus? Well, could you take it out in the hall
28. please? ...might suggest the Senate be at ease just briefly
29. until Senator Harris and Senator Partee finish their
30. conference. To expedite...to expedite the business... We...
31. It's been suggested perhaps that we could recess the
32. Special Session number Three and that we, Senate do open
33. up on Special Session number Four for the purpose of

1. considering any matters in that Session and perhaps
2. establishing an adjournment date for that Session. Is
3. leave granted? Senate will be... Rather we will just
4. be at ease in the Third Special Session. Temporarily.
5. Senator Harris. We are open, awaiting for your...
6. ...you out of order. ...recognizes the Senator from
7. Lansing, Senator Walker.

8. SENATOR WALKER:

9. Thank you Mr. President, we're privileged to have
10. on the Floor with us here today one of the greatest
11. legislators that I ever had the privilege of serving
12. with, J. Norman Shade, former Mayor of Pekin, a long
13. time member of the Legislature.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

15. He has other qualifications that I am aware of too.
16. The Senate will be in order. Senate will be in order,
17. please. Senator Scholl stay on the Floor, will you please?
18. The Senate will please be in order. The Chair recognizes
19. on Senate Bills on 2nd reading, Senator Scholl. Senate
20. Bills 2nd reading, in the Third Special Session.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate...Senate Bill...

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

24. Senator Scholl, asks that SB number 12 be read a 2nd
25. time.

26. SECRETARY:

27. SB 12 (Secretary reads title of bill)
28. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Are there amendments from the Floor? Senator Scholl
31. do you have a motion to make with regard to your bill?

32. SENATOR SCHOLL:

33. Yes, I make a motion that we move it to 3rd.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

2. Senator Partee.

3. SENATOR PARTEE:

4. Yes, I just spoke with Senator Harris about the...
5. an amendment that's coming up which has not yet arrived
6. and we have the understanding that we'll bring it back for
7. that amendment at the time it gets up here.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. The Chair has been advised that that is agreeable.
10. So the bill has been read a 2nd time. No further amendments
11. offered at this time. It will be advanced to the order of
12. 3rd reading.

13. SECRETARY:

14. SB 13 (Secretary reads title of bill)
15. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Revenue offers
16. one amendment.

17. SENATOR SCHOLL:

18. I move the adoption of the amendment.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

20. Senator Scholl moves the adoption of Committee Amend-
21. ment No. 1 to SB 13, all in favor will signify by saying
22. aye. Opposed. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted.
23. No further amendments from the Floor at this time, this will
24. be advanced with the same understanding as SB number 12.
25. Is that correct Senator Scholl? 3rd reading.

26. SECRETARY:

27. SB 14 (Secretary reads title of bill)
28. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Any amendments from the Floor? SB number 14 moved
31. by Senator Scholl be advanced to the order of 2nd reading
32. with the same agreement that applied to Senate Bills 12
33. and 13. Third reading, I'm sorry. 3rd reading.

1. SECRETARY:

2. SB 15 (Secretary reads title of bill)

3. 2nd reading of the bill. Committee on Revenue offers
4. one amendment.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. Senator Scholl moves the adoption of Committee
7. Amendment No. 1 to SB 15. All in favor will signify
8. by saying aye. Opposed. The ayes have it, the amend-
9. ment is adopted. Any further amendments? Be advanced
10. to the order of 3rd reading with the same agreement as
11. applied to the other three bills. We'll now... direct
12. our attention to Senate Bills on 3rd reading. Senator
13. Harris. May we have some order please. Very little order.
14. Senator Ozinga. Mr. President.

15. SECRETARY:

16. SB 22 (Secretary reads title of bill)

17. 3rd reading of the bill.

18. SENATOR HARRIS:

19. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, this is
20. a very simple bill. It was drafted by the Council. It
21. is co-sponsored by all of the members of the Council. It
22. is short of some funds for the service unit which we all
23. use. It's a very modest additional or supplemental
24. appropriation of \$30,000 to the service unit of the
25. Council. I know that it's new Chairman Senator Ozinga
26. is prepared to add additional support for the need for
27. this legislation, if there are questions. Otherwise
28. I would just seek a favorable roll call.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Any further discussion? Senator Ozinga.

31. SENATOR OZINGA:

32. No, I would just go along. If there are any questions
33. with reference to it why I'd be happy to try to answer them,

1. but otherwise a favorable roll call is all that should be
2. necessary.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

4. No further discussion. The question before the
5. Senate is shall SB 22 pass. Upon that question the
6. Secretary will call the roll.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
9. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Mitchler, aye. Walker, aye. Bruce, aye. ...question
20. the yeas are forty-eight, the nays are none. The bill having
21. received the constitutional required majority is therefore
22. declared passed. SB 21.

23. SECRETARY:

24. SB 21 (Secretary reads title of bill)
25. 3rd reading of the bill.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

27. Senator Harris.

28. SENATOR HARRIS:

29. Yes. Mr. President, SB 21 was introduced in this
30. Special Session and I don't want to point the finger of
31. blame at anyone, but in that jam of evaluation that
32. comes in the Governor's office when he evaluates all
33. of the bills that reach him after a Regular Session, this

1. line item was stricken from the Department of Corrections
2. bill or Vetoed, Item Vetoed from the Department of
3. Corrections bill. Now the need for this is this and I
4. need to go into just a little bit of history. All of us
5. who have State institutions in our districts are familiar
6. from time to time of local accommodations that are worked
7. out with the municipal officials and the Department
8. involved with the institution on sharing of costs of
9. capital projects within the community. Now for years
10. and years based on joint engineering studies there has
11. been agreement that the State of Illinois through the
12. Department of Corrections and its predecessor the
13. Department of Safety has a one-third volume contribution
14. to the Pontiac sewage system and on capital projects the
15. State has always met it's one-third share. Now we have
16. been involved in planning a project, a capital project
17. of improvement in the Pontiac sewage treatment plant
18. for some two and a half or three years. A referendum
19. was held for the city's share. It carried, the bonds
20. have been issued. The specifications for the contract
21. have been drawn. But the contract cannot be let until
22. the total amount of the money is available for the project
23. to fund it, to pay the contractor. The State's share
24. of this project is this \$220,000. Now whatever the
25. reason for the line item veto and my understanding is
26. that someone either in the Bureau or in the Governor's
27. Office thought that the State's share could be provided
28. for out of State Pollution Bond money. This is not the
29. case. Now since the veto this has been learned and
30. personally I hope that this question doesn't become
31. understood as an effort to embarrass anybody. It is
32. not. It is an effort to proceed with a project that
33. is waiting for the State's share of this capital improvement

1. project. I would be happy to respond to any questions
2. that might deal with...that you might have in connection
3. with it. This kind of activity takes place in practically
4. every institution community in the State. If we do not
5. appropriate this money, the project of course will be
6. delayed a year. It's ready to go. It probably could
7. be under contract within a month from the time of the
8. signature of the final enactment of this appropriation
9. measure. Be happy to respond to any questions otherwise
10. would request a roll call and hope it's favorable.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

12. Senator Partee.

13. SENATOR PARTEE:

14. Would the Senator yield to a question?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

16. He indicates that he will.

17. SENATOR PARTEE:

18. Perhaps I misunderstood you but I had the impression
19. from our conversation a few moments ago that you were not
20. going to call this bill, but I don't know what happened
21. since you left my office, you may have enumerated to the
22. bodies on your side.

23. SENATOR HARRIS:

24. No, I indicated that I would not call it first. If
25. you would like to delay a decision on this fine. I honestly
26. would like to get to it today, but...we can...we can pass
27. over it for now. That's ok with me.

28. SENATOR PARTEE:

29. All right let's pass over it.

30. SENATOR HARRIS:

31. Ok.

32. SENATOR PARTEE:

33. 'Cause I think we need to have another conversation.

1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Ok. I...I thought it was going to be called last
3. of...these bills on 3rd reading but somehow we got to
4. it 2nd. But let's just take it out of the record.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

6. Be taken from the record. Then I am assuming that
7. we are prepared to proceed on SB 23, is that correct?
8. Senator Harris this bill has been amended and has been
9. returned to the order of 3rd reading, SB 23.

10. SECRETARY:

11. SB 23 (Secretary reads title of bill)
12. 3rd reading of the bill.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Senator Carroll.

15. SENATOR CARROLL:

16. Thank you Mr. President. SB...Third Special Session
17. 23 deals with a...an award of \$250,000 to the Court of
18. Claims to set up a fund for operation of the Crime
19. Victims Act. This is similar to the other funds that
20. the Court of Claims has. It has been amended to assure
21. that any funds drawn from this account are used strictly
22. for the actual awards made under that Act so that the
23. citizens of this State should they receive an award from
24. the Court of Claims would not have to await their monies
25. until a further act of a future legislature. We have
26. done this in other areas of the Court of Claims Act and
27. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

29. Any further discussion? If not, the question before
30. the Senate is shall SB 23 as amended pass. Upon that
31. question the Secretary will call the roll.

12. Merritt, aye. McBroom, aye. Conolly, aye. Shapiro,
13. aye. Fawell, aye. On this question the yeas were forty,
14. the nays were six. The bill having received the con-
15. stitutional 3/5's majority required is therefore declared
16. passed. SE 24.

17. SECRETARY:

18. SB 24 (Secretary reads title of bill)
19. 3rd reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

21. Senator Carroll.

22. SENATOR CARROLL:

23. Thank you Mr. President. SB, Third Special Session,
24. 24 deals with appropriations to the Attorney General of
25. the State of Illinois in order to have the additional
26. investigators needed as per his request. And there's an
27. appropriation to the Secretary of State's Office for the
28. additional clerical help that they have to provide to
29. the Court of Claims as per their request. And an additional
30. appropriation, a deficiency appropriation to the Court of
31. Claims itself at the request of the Governor and the Bureau
32. of the Budget. All of these figures have been reduced to
33. a 7/12's of an annual amount to carry them through the

1. fiscal year. These are necessary in order to proceed
2. with the investigation and processing of claims and to
3. have additional hearing officers. I would move the
4. adoption ...the successful passage of Third Special
5. Session, SB 24.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SEANTOR GRAHAM):

7. Any further discussion? Senator Knuepfer.

8. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

9. I just...I just have one question Senator. Was
10. there a fiscal note attached to the bill at the time
11. of passage that indicated these additional costs would
12. be incurred?

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. Senator Carroll.

15. SENATOR CARROLL:

16. Senator, by way of background when we did pass
17. the legislation there was some appropriations at that
18. time attached thereto. I don't recall an exact fiscal
19. note, but in starting up on the administration of the
20. Act the Attorney General came in and the Secretary of
21. State as well as the Bureau of the Budget and asked
22. for these deficiency appropriations to carry them through
23. the administrative aspects.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. Senator Knuepfer. Any further discussion? Question
26. before the Senate, shall SB 24 as amended pass. Upon that
27. question the Secretary will call the roll.

28. SECRETARY:

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

14. On this question the yeas were thirty-six, the nays
15. were ten. Bill having received the constitutional required
16. 3/5's majority is therefore declared passed. Senator
17. Davidson. Been a request for...Senator Davidson for
18. SB 25 to be read a 3rd time.

19. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

20. Mr. President...

21. SECRETARY:

22. SB 25 (Secretary reads title of bill)
23. 3rd reading of the bill.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. Senator John Davidson.

26. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

27. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, this bill is
28. a appropriation so that the Medical College here in
29. Springfield can move into the new building when it's
30. ready January the 1st as well as establish the utilities
31. and the telephone and the carpeting in the building
32. to get it ready. This had had the word medical facilities
33. Phase I dropped off of the description in the old SB 659

1. and it was vetoed, Item Vetoed on the basis that it was
2. not described where it was going to be spent. And they
3. didn't know whether it was at Carbondale or Edwardsville
4. or elsewhere. There...the Governor's office is now aware
5. of this mistake. They're supporting this bill. He will
6. sign it. I would appreciate 36 votes. If you want a
7. breakdown on the money, \$29,000 is for the hookups of
8. the telephone and utility, 30,000 is moving expense for
9. the Medical Library, Deans Office and the staff. And I
10. would like to say that if this is not moved it will cost
11. us extra \$33,000 worth of rent for the Library area if
12. we don't get this done. And \$36,000 for the initial
13. cleaning and carpeting of the library and offices because
14. the contract did not...construction contract did not call
15. for the carpeting to be installed. I'd appreciate a
16. favorable 36 votes please.

18. Any further discussion? If not the question before
19. the Senate is shall SB 25 pass. Upon that question the
20. Secretary will call the roll.

22. Bartulis, Bell...

24. Gentlemen the Secretary is having difficulty hearing

7. aye. Berning, aye. Shapiro, aye. Keegan, aye. Weaver,
8. aye. I got more votes on the second roll call than you
9. did. On this question the yeas were forty-eight, the
10. nays were none. Bill having received the constitutional
11. 3/5's required majority is therefore declared passed.
12. The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oswego, Senator
13. Mitchler.

14. SENATOR MITCHLER:

15. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, if I could have
16. your attention please. We have a very distinguished
17. guest with us this morning and I'd like to have presented
18. to the Senate Miss Paula Ann Zahn She has just been
19. selected as Miss Teenage Aurora and Miss Zahn if you would
20. please advance and stand before the Senate I would like
21. to have at this time Mr. President have the Secretary
22. read a Resolution and this would be commending Miss
23. Zona for this award.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

25. This kind of a motion always gets the Senators
26. attention. Will the Secretary please read the Resolution.

27. SECRETARY:

28. (Secretary reads Senate Resolution number 6)

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

30. Senator Mitchler.

31. SENATOR MITCHLER:

32. Mr. President, . . .

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

1. Do you have something to say?

2. SENATOR MITCHLER:

3. Mr. President I would ask for suspension of the
4. rules for immediate consideration of this Senate
5. Resolution and immediate adoption and passage of the
6. Senate Resolution.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

8. All in favor of the suspension of the rules, signify
9. by saying aye. The rules are suspended and the Chair
10. sees an urgent hand going up from the Senator from Naperville.
11. Senator Fawell.

12. SENATOR FAWELL:

13. Well, the...the title here may indicate Aurora, but
14. I want everyone to know I think as its been indicated
15. perhaps in the Resolution that this beautiful young lady
16. comes from the center of the universe which is Naperville
17. in DuPage County.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

19. Now that you gentlemen have said...taken care of your
20. differences, all in favor of the adoption of the amendment
21. will signify in the usual fashion of the Senators when they
22. are acclaiming a nice young lady and rewarding her for her
23. efforts. All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed.
24. The ayes have it and the Resolution is adopted. Senator
25. Mitchler.

26. SENATOR MITCHLER:

27. Mr. President, I would invite and request the Secretary
28. if there's no objection to have all Senators join in
29. sponsorship of this Senate Resolution.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

31. Leave is granted, Senator Partee says. Now, Gentlemen
32. you have had an opportunity to hear the short Resolution
33. prepared by Senator Mitchler. You have had an opportunity

1. to meet the parents of this young lady. Now, you're
2. going to have an opportunity to hear from her and you
3. fellows can call me lucky Piere because I'm on the
4. podium at this time. Miss Zahn would you please express
5. your gratitude to the Senate, if you have gratitude.

6. MISS ZAHN:

7. Just think a Zahn has finally made history.
8. Gentlemen, are the tapes rolling, because if they
9. aren't my mother brought some along with her. I'm
10. not here to give you any Springfield ethics, but I
11. am here to talk about youth involvement in the govern-
12. ment. If we are to preserve our American heritage teen-
13. agers as well as adults must become involved. Until
14. recently teen-agers have been a part of the...vocal
15. majority. They were just voices among many. Now
16. instead of just being vocally involved they are becoming
17. actively involved. Young people are assisting in
18. shelter workshops, some are serving on local youth
19. juries and for other ecology is their thing. When I
20. was a sophomore in high school, public speaking was
21. my thing. But now I'm a senior and I never would have
22. dreamed that I'd be standing before you today. Although
23. I can't speak for all teen-agers most of them feel an
24. obligation to become involved with their governments.
25. I assure you that many young people are concerned about
26. politics. When Governor Walker and Senator Stevenson
27. came to our school, I'd never seen such a turnout in
28. the auditorium. Everyone was particularly anxious to
29. hear about the lowering of the voting age. Naperville
30. Central High School students are also becoming involved
31. in campaigns. One of our teachers, Representative Glen
32. Schneider can probably tell you what a positive affect
33. teenage support can have. I'm truly thrilled with the

1. opportunity to speak before you. Please accept my
2. sincere thanks; but more importantly let me thank you
3. on behalf of the teen-agers of Illinois for providing
4. us with a new voice in government. We won't let you
5. down. Thank you.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

7. Thank you very much. If I...if I lived in either
8. of those districts, if I were one of you Senators I
9. would be more than concerned. Senator Mitchler.

10. SENATOR MITCHLER:

11. Mr. President I would like to introduce to the
12. members of the Senate Mr. and Mrs. Norman D. Zahn
13. who reside in Crest Creek, Royal Gorge Road, in the
14. township of Naperville. That...it must be very difficult
15. Mr. and Mrs. Zahn to have in your household the number
16. one scholastic student at Naperville Central High School
17. when they have almost 800 students in her class. Also
18. Mr. President I would like to introduce Joann Salerno
19. who is the motivating factor behind many young ladies
20. in the Aurora community in this Miss Aurora Teen-Age
21. Pagant each year. And she will be chaperoning Paula
22. Ann Zahn down to Ft. Worth, Texas where on November 24th
23. on nation-wide television we all hope and pray that
24. Paula Ann Zahn will be crowned Miss Teen-Age American.
25. Last year we had in one of the eight runner ups in
26. that national competition another young lady from Naperville
27. Marguerite Smith. In fact from Crest Creek area, the
28. same place that the Zahns reside. And Joann Salerno is
29. accompanied by her husband Mr. Anthony Salerno and I
30. would like for you to recognize the presence of these fine
31. people from Aurora.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

33. On behalf of the President of the Senate and the

1. entire Illinois State Senate to all of you we wish God
2. speed, good luck, and bless you and we're glad to have
3. you here today. Yes. All right, you and Mitchler fight
4. that out in the backroom. Is there a motion...any further
5. business to be brought before the Third Special Session
6. of...the Illinois Senate. Senator Harris.

7. SENATOR HARRIS:

8. Well, Mr. President I think we have the problem
9. worked out as far as an understanding on what to do about
10. SB 21. We've just had a discussion with the Governor's
11. liaison, Mike Duncan. We may have had a communication
12. problem but we did determine I think to go ahead, pass
13. 21. If it develop in the intervening 10 days or so
14. before this bill would reach the Governor's desk that
15. there is some way, I personally don't think there is,
16. other than a direct appropriation for the State's share
17. of this need as a user, not as a sovereign participating
18. in a subsidy, fine the bill will be vetoed. But in the
19. meantime the project is being held up and...I think
20. with that explanation if...I...I'm certain that Senator Partee
21. will agree that that does represent the discussion that
22. we just had with Mr. Duncan. I would seek a favorable
23. roll call, we'll keep the bill moving on its way and if...
24. if we are able to learn of a source other than a direct
25. appropriation, fine and dandy. And then the bill could
26. be vetoed or if we learn of that before the House would
27. act on it...they wouldn't have to take action on it.
28. But in the meantime I think the more...the safer way
29. to proceed would be to move this along. Would seek a
30. favorable roll call.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

32. Senator Harris as a Chairman of the Commission to
33. visit and examine penal institutions I can assure the

1. Gentlemen of this Senate that Senator Harris has presented
2. to you this problem fairly and squarely and if there is
3. no further discussion the question before the Senate, ...
4. We have to read the bill a 3rd time, I'm sorry. SB 21.
5. SECRETARY:

6. (Secretary reads title of bill)
7. 3rd reading of the bill.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

9. Any further discussion? The question before the
10. Senate is shall SB 21 pass, upon that motion the Secretary
11. will call the roll.
