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SENATOR KEEGAN:

I...I simply wondered if we could have the explanation
 concurrent with the distribution. It's awfully hard to read
 that quickly. Perhaps he could explain the three amendments
 as the copies are being distributed.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

We'll attempt to get that done Senator. Now, that all the Senators have the amendments, once again I plead with you, if you really want to understand the amendments, you have them in front of you. The Chair is going to request that Senator Scholl does explain those amendments, now that you have them in front of you, but there is really no reason to do it if the Senate is not going to be in order. So, when we reach that stage of affair we will ask Senator Scholl to explain Amendment No. 1.

17. SENATOR SCHOLL:

Mr. President, what this amendment does is...gives the 18. definition of a Lottery, and it's expanded to allow the 19. 20. conduct of more than one lottery game at a time. And, this 21. is done by most of the other states that presently have a 22. Lottery. The provisions regarding the removal of a Lottery Con-23. trol Board Members has been changed to eliminate the requirement that any such removal be agreed to by the Senate. The pro-24. 25. visions regarding the holding of at least four public hearings 26. prior to the adoption of any rules or regulations suggested 27. by the department have been changed to require four hearings only on the initial set of the rules and regulations. 28. 29. after only one hearing is required, although more than that may be held. Language has been added to the Sections spelling 30. out the duties of the Lottery Superintendent to make explicit 31. that he is the subordinate of and shall report to the Director of 32. Revenue. The procedures for revocation of licenses for agents 33.

- l. has been changed to allow immediate suspension with the right 2. for a hearing within 30 days. At the administration's request 3. a provision allowing a maximum application fee of \$10 for 4. obtaining a license has been added. The language concerning 5. the purchase of tickets for resale or gifts has been clarified 6. to make explicit that only the licensed agent may sell Lottery 7. tickets. Purchase of a ticket as a gift for another person 8. is illegal. The penalities provided for any violation of 9. this Act have been changed to conform with present penalities 10. for gambling convictions under the Criminal Code. Specifically, 11. a second or subsequent conviction will be a felony offense. 12. Some changes have been made in the requirements concerning the 13. deposits of the proceeds from ticket sales to correspond with the Administration's desires. Several technical changes are 14. made to conform with the Administration's suggestions. The date 15.

Let me just say, Senator, that the State is going to have this secured and I'm very confident, being the sponsor of this legislation, that...we're patterning this Lottery Bill after seven states that already have a Lottery and they have been successful in it and there has been no criminal element enter into it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Scholl. Senator Ozinga.

SENATOR OZINGA:

If I feel that this amendment would discriminate...I'd then feel that this amendment might discriminate against the people of the State. On the basis that I don't have enough sense not to vote or to buy these tickets and so this would be a discriminatory bill, then wouldn't it?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Scholl. Senator Scholl.

SENATOR SCHOLL:

This would be a salesmanship type of thing where you... you'd be buying your tickets from a reliable business man in your community.

2.	Could I buy these tickets for other people? Could I
3.	buy a whole block of tickets for other people?
4.	SENATOR SCHOLL:
5.	You can only buy Lottery tickets and give them to
6.	other people as a gift. G-i-f-t.
7.	SENATOR OZINGA:
8.	In other words your answer is yes.
9.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
10.	I think the Senator said as a gift.
11.	SENATOR OZINGA:
12.	Yes, that's right, but I could buy a \$1,000 worth of tickets
13.	at 50 cents a piece so that would be, maybe 2,000 tickets and
14.	then start peddling them. If I got caught peddling them, but I
15.	could give them to somebody else as a gift, couldn't I?
16.	SENATOR SCHOLL:
17.	Senator
18.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
19.	Senator Scholl.
20.	SENATOR SCHOLL:
21.	Senator, you can't buy a ticket for resale. You can't
22.	you just can't go out and buy tickets and then go out and resell
23.	them.
24.	SENATOR OZINGA:
25.	GiftCould I give them as a gift, as a side racket for
26.	some other kind of illicit attitudes or action?
27.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
28.	Senator Scholl. His answer is a big, broad smile. Senator
29.	Sours.
30.	SENATOR SOURS:
31.	I don't know whether, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen
32.	of the Senate, whether this is the toe-in-the-door approach

to the Lottery, but assuming it is and assuming the worst, I

- have a few comments and if I happen to approach my limit, I'm
- hoping that someone in the same sympathy as I find myself now,
- will yield to me his time.
- 4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
- 5. Senator, I think that there will be time to do this and if
- 6. we could do it sometime during the time we address ourselves
- 7. to the adoption of the amendment...that's the order of business
- 8. that we really are on now.
- 9. SENATOR SOURS:
- 10. All right.
- 11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
- 12. I don't want...wish to preclude you but I know your feeling.

- 33. We're happy to cooperate.

- PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 18.
- 19. Any discussion? Those in favor of the adoption of Amend-
- 20. ment No. 3 to SB No. 12 will signify by saying aye. Opposed.
- ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amend-21.

- 23. SECRETARY:
- 24. Amendment No. 4 by Senator Mitchler.
- 25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
- Senator Mitchler. 26.
- 27. SENATOR MITCHLER:
- 28. Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, if I may have
- 29. your attention please. I distributed on all of the desks of
- the Senators, copies of this amendment. Now, what this amend-30.
- ment does is this: Under the provisions of SB 12 as introduced
- by Senator Scholl and other co-sponsors, 45% of the net proceeds 32.
- from the Illinois State Lottery will be returned to those 33.

- 1. persons who purchased the tickets, 45% will go into the General
- Revenue Fund of the State of Illinois, 10% will be used for
- 3. administration and operational purposes. Now, during this
- 4. Session, we've had some things relate to the General Revenue
- 5. Fund and the financial condition of the State of Illinois that
- 6. prompts my introduction of this amendment to SB 12 in the
- 7. Third Special Session. First of all, in the Governor's budget
- 8. for fiscal year '74, there is an appropriation for \$110,000,000
- 9. to be used in connection with an Appropriation Bill to refund
- 10. \$10 per person upon application. This was a Tax-Relief Program
- 11. of the Administration. We all know that this tax rebate and
- 12. Tax-Relief Program as advocated by the Governor has failed.

Yet, there is an appropriation in the budget of \$110,000,000

- 14. that will be unexpended. We also know that there was intro-
- 15. duced in Special Session in the Fall a bill by 30 Republican
- 16. sponsors and it passed this Body by 30 votes, a bill to reduce
- the Illinois State Income...the Illinois State Sales Tax by
- 18. one-half cent, thereby giving tax-relief to the people of the
- 19. State of Illinois. This would be approximately in the neighbor-
- 20. hood of \$170,000,000 out of the loss of revenue to the State
 21. of Illinois. Now, it's obvious that both the Governor and the
- 22. Republican leadership and Republican Senators on this side of
- 23. the aisle believe that there is sufficient money in the General
- 24. Revenue and we do not need additional taxation, but we are in
- 25. a position to give tax-relief and we are so doing in the passing
- 26. of the bill that we did...
- 27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
- Senator...Senator Carroll. Senator Carroll, for what
 purpose do you rise.
- 30. SENATOR CARROLL:

- 31. On a point of order, Mr. Chairman...Mr. President.
- 32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
- 33. State your point.

SENATOR CARROLL:

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I don't believe he's talking about the amendment or the bill, but is just talking in general about things that have happened in the past.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Your point is well taken and we're trying to address ourselves to the amendment.

SENATOR MITCHLER:

I am addressing myself to the amendment, Mr. President, and I'm getting to it now. This amendment, if adopted, would give 90% of the net revenue from the Illinois State Lottery back to the people who made the purchases of the tickets. In other words, the 45% would not go into the General Revenue Fund. This amount is estimated to be in the neighborhood of approximately \$60,000,000. Now, I just pointed the others out, Senator Scholl, that we're giving tax-relief because we have surplus in the General Revenue Fund and we don't have to have additional taxation. And, this may be called a voluntary tax in the form of the State Lottery, it may be called as the Director of the Department of Revenue said before the Executive Committee, a participation of the people in putting money into the General Revenue Fund, but what this would do at this time, would give all of the net revenue except the 10% for the Administration Operational cost of the Illinois State Lottery, back to the people who purchased the tickets. Now,...the main point on this also is, that if at a future date the Illinois Lottery Act was in effect and we felt that the State did need some revenue could we say 10% would go into the Illinois General Revenue Fund and we could to certain amounts, whatever is needed. And, this could fluctuate just as we fluctuated the Illinois State Inc...Sales Tax up and down. Now, I think this is a good amendment because the people of my district, in talking to them about a lottery, they liked the idea of gambling and they like a lottery.

But, when I tell them about the hardware that's connected with 1. this and all the ramifications of...of scandals and shoe boxes 2. and everything else like you've had with horse racing that could з. come out of it, they sort of quiver at it, but I say if we 4. give you all the money back and don't take any money off the 5. top, would you like it. And they like it and I think the people 6. would like to get 90% back and therefore I would like to ask 7. for a favorable roll call on adoption of this amendment. 8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 9. I'm glad you asked for a roll call cause your time was up. 10. Senator Rock, Senator Scholl, Senator Swinarski...let Senator 11. Scholl, the sponsor of the bill and recognize you right after 12. that, Senator Rock. Do you have any... 13. SENATOR SCHOLL: 14. Yes, Mr. President, I was going to stay up all night. I 15. read about Senator Mitchler's proposal... 16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 17. Let's speak to the amendment, Senator. 18. SENATOR SCHOLL: 19. I was going to stay up all night to dream up some type of 20. a story, because it really is a fairy tale. Let me just say 21. that, what really shocked me was that my conservative friend 22. from the 39th District wants to give 10% for administrative 23. costs. Let me just say that, in my bill we're allocating 4% 24. and this has been approved not only by the Governor's office, 25. but this is basically what the 7 other states that have lotteries 26. at the present time, spend for administrative costs. And I 27. don't care to give 2 1/2 times more per administrative costs 28. when it's not needed. Now, when you talk about the fact that 29. the State of Illinois is going to possibly benefit some 60 30.

million dollars, I say fine. And, you know where I hope

that money goes? I hope it goes for tax-relief. I know when

I came down here to Springfield my people sent me here to do

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something about their taxes and I would hope that we would get
 some tax-relief from the lottery.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

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Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 4. It is quite obviously an attempt, on the part of one who, it seems apparently at least, to be against this program, to gut this bill. And, I would say when all the flag waving stops about what the people want, did you also Senator Mitchler, in the form of a question, if the sponsor will yield, did you also tell your people that you are on the one hand giving the prizes to them but subjecting those prizes to the State Income Tax, which we are not doing in Senator Scholl's bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Mitchler.

SENATOR MITCHLER:

I'm fully aware of that, Senator, that the money that would go back, certainly you couldn't expect the State to deny themselves of what the Federal Government would collect in Income Tax and the State collect in Income Tax and I understand and know full well that in my amendment, when the net proceeds, which means all revenue remaining after the payment of costs incurred in the operation and administration of lottery, and that could be 1%, 1/2%, 10%, 12%, it could even get up to as high as 30%, all depends who's administering it, that money that is given back to the prize winners would be taxable by the Illinois State Income Tax, by the Federal Income Tax. And, I am one that have always followed the leadership in the Senate Revenue Committee and have not tampered with the Illinois State Income Tax and start giving consessions to those who win lottery tickets and soforth because we have a...just a straight deduction for the Illinois State Income Tax, and I don't want to get into

- a program and that would be one of the reasons that I would 1.
- 2. oppose the bill in its present form, the fact that it does
- give tax...State Income Tax-Relief to those winners of the 3.
- lottery. They should be taxed. They have income and whether 4.
- they get it by chance or by work or how, that is income and 5.
- the Federal Government looks on it as such and the State of 6.
- 7. Illinois should do likewise.
- 8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

- 9. Senator Rock, are you satisfied with that answer? Senator
- 10. Swinarski.

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- SENATOR SWINARSKI: 11. 12.
- Mr. President, I too rise in opposition to this bill. And,
- I believe as Senator Rock has pointed out just a moment ago... 13.
- 15. We're speaking on the amendment. Is that where you're...
- 16. SENATOR SWINARSKI:
- Excuse me. ...that this is an attempt to just destroy the 17.
- 18. entire purpose and the philosophical attitude of the main bill.

- 24. SENATOR MITCHLER:
- Right now, Senator, we're working on the amendment. 25.
- 26. think that's related at all to the...to the bill. On the amendment
- 27. stage, Senator, we try to get a bill into a form that if it does pass...
- His answer was no. 29. SENATOR MITCHLER:
- ...it is more acceptable. 31.
- 32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

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I don't know that I agree with the 10%, but I do agree with the concept. I don't think anybody in the State of Illinois ought to be preferred above the man who works and earns his money and certainly those who win it can best afford to pay income tax on it. Now, we don't need that carrot to encourage people to sink into the debacle of losing their money because they're prone to gamble. Now, if the Federal Government can tax it as badly as the State needs revenue, the State can tax it. This is the phoniest kind of bill to put on the people as a means of raising revenue. It provides the tax-relief. I think it's really ludicrous that we stand here today and talk about ethics in government on the one hand and the ...

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Are we speaking to the amendment, Senator? SENATOR KNUPPEL:

I am...I am addressing myself to the amendment and at the same time tell people that they ought not to have to pay their fair share of financing government. I think that...that this is the phoniest Session that's ever been called where to... on the one hand we encourage ethics in government and immorality as I see it, from the Bible, on the other.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

It was not on the amendment, but I recognize Senator Ozinga. SENATOR OZINGA:

Mr. President, I am in thorough agreement with Senator
Rock and I guess, once in this Session, I am in thorough agreement with Senator Knuppel. Ethics and Lottery just should
not be in the same bag of worms, shall I say. This is hypocritical on both sides of the aisle. However, with this
amendment it...all that it does is... makes a bad bill worse.
It was bad enough to have the Lottery, but now if we're going
to make the enducement just almost 100%, I think that's just

compounding it a little bit more. ... With reference to the 1. cost of administration, I would be inclined to think that the 2. 10% is closer, however, I think that...when we're starting to talk about ethics and honesty in statements, I don't think that Senator Scholl is quite being frank when he says that it's only 5. going to be 4 1/2% because I don't think that includes the 6 salesman's commission that sells it. That comes right off the 7 top and therefore, it looks like the big rackets will come off first before the little rackets start getting into the rackets 9. game. 10.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Partee.

SENATOR PARTEE:

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It's interesting that those who will be recorded as no against the bill raise all the moralizing questions about it. It's not a matter of morality, it's a question of salability. If a person says he won \$3,000, if that's what the announced figure is, that's what he ought to get, less of course his Federal taxes. We can't control that. But, the State should not, on the one hand, proffer a...an opportunity to win some money and then tax the money after it's won. And, if you're going to sell these and if you're going to have the salability aspect of this kind of a proposition, you got to be realistic with people. You've got to give them a good return on their money and you have to not tax them. Now, that's just as simple as can be. You don't give somebody something and take it away from them. That's all that it amounts to. I think this amendment should fail and I think 90% is unrealistic. Statistically, when you look at all the other States that have them, nobody has any kind of figure like this. You cannot survive on that kind of a figure basis. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Any further discussion? You...after all of the Senators

who desire to speak have spoken, Senator Knuppel. Any further discussion? Any further discussion? Senator Sour...Soper.

SENATOR SOPER:

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I move the previous question. We've...we've chewed this up enough. We know what it's all about.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

The...the motion is not debatable. Well, let's get this motion taken care of. The question before the Senate is, shall Amendment No. 4...Senator Mitchler.

SENATOR MITCHLER:

Thank you, Mr. President, I think the sponsor of an amendment or a bill can close debate after there's been discussion. The salability, Senator Partee, will be greatly increased by the adoption of this amendment to SB 12 in the Third Special Session, because you see, it's like playing a slot-machine. If you're going to get into the game of gambling and there are two slot-machines, one is called the Michigan slot-machine that pays out, let's say a percentage of 50% and then there's the Illinois slot-machine that when you pull the handle you're going to be guaranteed 90% or more, what slot-machine are you going to put your coin in: You know, you'll have New Jersey money coming in to Illinois, you'll have Michigan money coming in to Illinois. All these States that have these sharing lotteries will come over to Illinois because we give the big prizes. So, the salability is not going to be hindered because of having to pay an Illinois State Income Tax. And, once you start monkeying around the State Income Tax and give consessions, then you're in to a...problem that we've tried to avoid ever since enactment of that State Income Tax. Now, in answer to Senator Scholl's question, about the 10% that I mentioned versus his 4%, you don't know what the cost of operation will be, because, you don't, first place, know how many tickets will be sold and how much of the cream's

- 1. going to come off the top for those that are licensed to sell
- 2. the tickets. You don't know how big a staff you're going to
- 3. have, and how many people you're going to have in this new
- 4. department to control the lottery. But, in my amendment, I
- 5. want to point out, that it said, net proceeds means all revenue
- 6. remaining after the payment of costs incurred in the operation
- 7. and administration of the lottery. It does not give any specific
- 8. amount nor does it in Senator Scholl's original bill, because
- 9. that is an unknown factor and as you know that'll increase
- 10. and decrease with the type of administration that we have.
- 11. There's going to be a lot of jobs for a lot of ... payrollers to
- 12. get in here, and I'll get into that when we argue the merits
- 13. of the bill. I'd like to have a roll call on this amendment
- 14. that I'm proposing to SB 12 in the Third Special Session.
- 15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

- 3. with them and I found no general opposition except for the idea of

- 5. think we can overlook. And I would ask that you not have this
- 6. bill...have any special privileges and that income coming in from
- 7. this area also...be taxed as any other income would be.
- 8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):
- Discussion? Senator Scholl.
- 10. SENATOR SCHOLL:
- 11. Mr. President, we've...we have exempted all the winnings
- 12. under this ... bill from any State or Local Tax. And the
- 13. reason for it. is for marketing reasons. Illinois can better
- 14. compete with lotteries that are presently being conducted in
- 15. Michigan and Ohio and in the Eastern States, the Irish Sweep-
- 16. stakes and even the illegal numbers, if this is included. It

also makes little sense as a matter of public policy for the

- 18. State to be collecting a tax on money it disburses. Winnings
- 19. will, of course, remain subject to Federal taxes unless Congress
- 20. takes action to the contrary. But, we're going to go before
- 21. the people of this State, we want to sell the lottery. And,
- 22. how can we compete...how can we sell tickets when Michigan
- 23. and other bordering States that have a lottery do not charge
 - and denote address of the second state of the
- 24. a State Tax. I ask for the defeat of this amendment.
- 25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

And for us to have to go back and reconstruct a collapsed system, would be far more expensive than to take the excellent mass transit facilities that are now intact and manage them through a transit authority where fares, schedules are coordinated and regulated and an improved system of mass transportation can be created for the 6 county area of Northeastern Illinois. About 15 years ago, Ben Heineman, then the President of the Chicago Northwestern Railway, predicted that there would have to be a collapse of mass transportation in the area before we would create a Mass Transportation Authority. This may well be our last chance to prove him wrong and I would urge us to adopt and pass these bills.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

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For the last day or two, I think I've said more than my share. And, quite frankly, gentlemen, I'm...I'm happy at the... the turn of events. I'm not totally happy but then in this Body, I guess you...very seldom are you totally happy. This bill as amended, does provide for district referendum. It does provide for the 2/3's...assurance in our local areas and admittedly, it's a very small safety valve, but the last amendment that I was able to place on does provide a mechanism for the outer counties, should they feel strong enough, and I admit they'll have to feel awful strong, does provide for a way to them to get out of the district. Authority, then this Senator. This is a problem with which we 17. have lived for a long time. This is a problem which becomes 18. increasingly more demanding every day. Not only with a larger 19. number of people, but with all of the concomitant things, like 20. the energy crisis, and the pollution aspects and the absolute 21. need to move people. We do in fact, need a bill. I would hope that 22. no one would take the position that there's any fun and games, 23. that there is any attempt in any way to forestall the passage 24. of an RTA bill. We desperately need it.
